

#### Pavilion at People's Park:

After the Estimates were adopted last year it was decided to make a contribution of £100 towards the cost of a Sports Pavilion in the People's Park, the remainder of cost to be subscribed by the football Clubs who would use it. A design for the Pavilion was prepared by the Town Engineer but as the Clubs did not proceed with the work last year, the Council's contribution is now included in the Estimates.

#### Band Performances:

Last year the amount for Band Performances was increased from £150 to £300 as in recent years there has been a rise in the charges for the hire of Bands. For the coming year, £300 is again included.

#### School Meals:

The cost of food for meals for children attending National Schools shows a marked increase (£504). Last year the sum allowed was £972, which was £372 in excess of the provision made in 1950/51. The withdrawal, over a year ago, of State subsidies from bread and butter used in School Meals has resulted in increased costs and in addition, there has been an increase in the number of children partaking of the meals. The cost of serving the meals in the coming year will be £284 as compared with £205 provided last year; this is due mainly to the necessity for providing additional equipment. One-half the cost of food is met from State Grants so that the net increase under this heading is one-half of £504 or £252. The cost of serving meals however, has to be met in full by the Council, and the extra cost to Rates for the coming year consequently, will be £331.

#### Salaries:

The cost of salaries of existing staff shows no change but it has been represented that owing to the increase in the volume of clerical and accounting work, an additional clerical Officer (at cost of £220) would be necessary in the Council's office. There is merit in the submission that work has expanded very much in recent years, and furthermore an examination of the position shows that numerically the staff is the same as it was twenty-five or twenty-six years ago, apart from the recruitment of an additional Shorthand-Typist three years ago. In 1926 the number of Council Houses was 185 and it is now 869; there were only four loans under the Small Dwellings Acts, whereas the number now is 137 (including 27 - 1939 loans). In the intervening years, new legislation has involved additional clerical work and the keeping of further administrative and accounting records, such as those arising in connection with Fuel Scheme, Town Planning, Housing lists, etc. Moreover, it should be mentioned that in the same period the population of the town has increased from 8,000 to over 12,000; such an increase in population is bound to result in an expansion in the Council's activities and commitments.

#### Office Expenses:

There is an increase of £70 - from £150 to £220. This is due altogether to postage expenses.

#### Fuel Scheme:

There is a rise in the cost of this item of £526, as there are now more families availing of the Scheme and the cost of fuel has risen. The additional cost however, is fully recouped and will not have to be met from Rates.

#### Office Safe:

A new Safe is found to be very necessary for the safe keeping of important records, such as Agreements, Leases and other legal documents. The cost is estimated at £100.

#### Civil Defence:

For this purpose £100 is included, which is the same as the provision made last year.

#### Stores:

£84 is provided for a half-year's lown charge on the new Stores, which together with Fire Station, are being provided on site near Town Hall. The cost of Fire Station is being borne by County Council. The Town Engineer has reported that a new roof, at a cost of £220 is required for the Store at Harbour.

#### County Council Demand:

This Demand, as already mentioned, is up by £2,806, which represents 1s 3d in the Rate Levy. In the past two years it has increased by 2s 7d. The Demand compares as follows with that for the present year:-

Whilst there are variations in the costs under each heading, the increase in the Demand is really ascribable to the Health Services, the cost of which in the past few years, has shown a marked upward trend and is due to the expansion of these services and the rise in the costs of Hospital treatment.

#### Unemployment Assistance Acts Levy:

This is the product of a Special rate of 9d in the £1 which the Council is required to raise under the Unemployment Assistance Acts, 1933 and 1940, and the money is paid to the Department of Social Welfare. The levy which is based on the gross valuation, excluding Council houses and a few minor items, shows an increase of £76. As stressed, when submitting the Estimates last year, the levy of this charge and the County Council Demand on the gross valuation of property in the Urban District shows clearly the lack of merit in any claim that the erection of new dwellings, which are only rated to one-third for the first seven years, is of immediate benefit to an Urban Authority.

#### Comparison of Rates:

Whilst the Estimates now presented for your consideration would involve an increase of 3s 5d over the rate for the present year, it will be evident from the details given that provision is included for many new works, and the Council may consider that some of these might be deferred. It is unfortunate however, that the increase in the County Council Demand, which cannot be pruned in any way, entails an automatic increase of 1s 3d.

Last year it was pointed out that in the years 1937 to 1942 the expenditure on Municipal Services under the control of the Council, was about 14s 0d in the £1. In 1951/52 the rate for similar services was 13s 7d, notwithstanding the radical changes in prices, wages rates, and other costs which have occurred in the meantime. In recent years there have been insistent demands for improved services and new amenities, such as improvements at the Esplanade, better roads, improved water supply, more public lighting, etc., but it must be appreciated that these cannot possibly be provided without the incurring of additional costs which inevitably are reflected in the rates. In fact, it might be held that the achievement in a brief period of so many improvements, without a marked rise in the levy for municipal services (i.e. excluding the statutory demand services) has been no mean achievement on the part of the Council.



Once more I desire to express sincere appreciation of the co-operation and assistance which has been received from the Chairmen and the Members of the Council. The satisfactory service given by all members of the Council's staff, both indoor and outdoor, must also be mentioned. The preparation of the Estimates and the review of your services was much facilitated by the thorough manner in which the Town Clerk kept the necessary records and supplied all relevant information, and valuable assistance was also given by the Town Engineer and Staff Officer.

BRAY URBAN DISTRICT COUNCIL

Roads in Bray Urban District.

As you are well aware the condition of the roads maintained by Bray U.D.C. is very far from satisfactory.

Practically all the tarmacadam roads are in a very bad state of repair and are deteriorating at an alarming rate. Several of these roads are so rough and uneven that it is now essential that the surface should be scarified and levelled, and that a new surface of premixed tarmacadam should be provided.

A number of the tarmacadam roads which have not yet deteriorated to such a great extent need immediate attention in the form of levelling and tar-dressing. This latter treatment which is a comparatively cheap treatment, is essential if the present rapid deterioration is to be arrested. It is generally recognised that tar-macadam surfaces must be treated at regular intervals with a surface dressing of tar and chippings. The chippings are merely held by the tar and are intended to form the wearing coat of the road. In no case should the road be allowed to deteriorate to such an extent that the foundation of the road is forced to do the work of the wearing coat.

Normally a wearing coat or surface dressing has a life of only 4 to 6 years, depending on the volume of traffic, rate of spread of tar, quality of the chippings, etc.. This means that surface dressing at reasonable intervals is essential and it is only when this is provided that tarmacadam roads can be properly maintained.

Practically all the tarmacadam roads are now in immediate need of tar-dressing and those which have deteriorated beyond tar-dressing need new tar-grouted or tar-macadamed surfaces.

In view of the urgency of the matter and the fact that any further deterioration of the roads will increase enormously the capital sum which must eventually be expended to restore these roads, I strongly recommend that a substantial sum should be provided for in the coming financial year to carry out these urgently needed roadworks.

I attach a list of the roads which I consider should be given new tar-macadam surfaces and those which should be immediately tar-dressed, together with an estimate of the cost for each road.

Short Specification and Estimate of Cost of Road Repairs of the more important roads.

- (1) Seapoint Road: Length: 570 yards. Width: 21 feet.

Scarify existing road surface to average depth of  $2\frac{1}{2}$ ". Pitch old cuttings and soft spots to depth of 6". Shape and grade surface and thoroughly roll. Lay a  $2\frac{1}{4}$ " carpet of  $1\frac{1}{2}$ " premixed tarmac which shall be sealed with a  $\frac{3}{4}$ " coat of  $\frac{3}{8}$ " tarmac. (Est. cost - £1,900)

- (2) Novara Avenue: Length: 580 yds. Av. Width: 27 feet.

Specification as for Seapoint Road.

(Est. Cost - £2,480)

- (3) Herbert Road (portion only) Length: 600 yds. Av. Width: 25ft.6 inc.

Strengthen sides and pitch soft spots and old cuttings. Surface with 2" of premixed tarmacadam.

(Est. Cost - £1,400)

- (4) Galtrim Park: Length 180 yds: Width: 20 feet.

Specification as for Seapoint Road except scarify  $1\frac{1}{2}$ " and 2" carpet

(Est. Cost - £390)

- (5) Westfield Park: (portion) Length: 120 yds. Width: 18 feet.

Break out defective portion of this road and lay new 5" thick concrete slab on 5" consolidated layer of hardcore.

(Est. Cost - £720)

- (6) Greenpark Road (portion) Length: 500 yds. Width(av.): 20 feet.

Scarify to average depth of 4", reshape, form graded concrete channels and lay new tar-carpet as on Seapoint Road.

(Est. cost - £1,670)

- (7) Parnell Road (portion) Length: 160 yds. Width: 21 feet

Scarify 2" depth, shape formation, pitch cuttings and soft spots and surface with  $2\frac{1}{4}$ " carpet of  $1\frac{1}{2}$ " tarmac sealed with  $\frac{3}{4}$ " coat of  $\frac{3}{8}$ " tarmac. (Est. Cost - £500.)

- (8) Old Connaught Ave. Length: 150 yds. Width: (Av.) 28 feet.

Specification as for Seapoint Road.

(Est. Cost - £630).

In addition to the above I would request that a sum of £1,000 (including Strand Road) should be provided to level and tar-dress a number of the other roads in the town, which urgently require same.

A sum of £200 included in the Estimates for tree planting at Head was reduced to £50. It was agreed to provide a sum of £200 for repairs to footpaths, etc., at People's Park. Provision of a sum of £200 for storage hut at Bandstand was reduced to £60. A sum of £350 provided for Legal Expenses was reduced to £250. The sum of £100 provided under the heading "Miscellaneous" was reduced to £50. The sum of £100 provided for Civil Defence was reduced to £75. The Council deleted the sum of £220 provided for repairs to the Harbour Stores. The sum of £220 provided for additional Clerical Officer was reduced to £120.

RECEIPTS

The amounts provided in the Estimates for Receipts under the various Services were approved, subject to an increase by £430 in the amount provided for Receipts from the Letting of the Kiosks at the Esplanade.

### APPROVAL OF MINUTES.

103. The Minutes of the Monthly Meeting held on 11th March, 1952, and of adjourned Monthly Meeting of the 18th March, 1952, which had been circulated, were taken as read and signed by the Chairman.

Clr. Temple explained that he was unable to attend the Estimates Meeting held on the 31st March, 1952, owing to illness.

### COUNTY MANAGER'S ORDERS.

104. The County Manager's Orders No. 7261 to 7266 as circulated, were noted.

Concerning Order No. 7262 it was agreed to request the Town Engineer to submit a report on the condition, etc., of No. 20 Castle Street, and to direct the Health Inspector to submit a report regarding the use of the premises for human habitation.

### BUS SERVICE.

105. The following Motion standing in the name of Dr. Donnelly on the Agenda Paper was adjourned in view of the terms of a letter from Coras Iompair Eireann concerning the provision of 'bus service to Killarney Road district, viz. :—

"At next Statutory Meeting of the Council, I wish to propose that means be pursued to accommodate residents and visitors to Bray re a 'round-the-town' bus service."

The letter intimated that the Company were not prepared to provide a 'bus service to Killarney Road district as such service would not be economical. Following discussion it was agreed to ascertain from Coras Iompair Eireann and the Department of Industry and Commerce if there would be any objection to a local contractor operating a 'bus service to cater for residents in the outlying parts of the town. It was agreed to represent to the Company that the population of the outlying parts of the town had increased considerably since the erection of County Council dwellings at Killarney Lane, etc., and the erection of 44 new houses on lands at Boghall and that the 'bus serving Wolfe Tone Square should continue on to the Boghall Road.

### PURCHASE OF WATERMAINS.

106. Proposed by Clr. P. Ledwidge, seconded by Clr. Hipwell, and resolved :—

"That the Seal of the Council be affixed to the Deed of Charge in respect of the Loan of £4,100 which is being borrowed from Council's Treasurer, repayable over a period of 20 years, for the purchase of watermains.

## *REMUNERATION OF FIRE BRIGADE PERSONNEL.*

110. Submitted report of the Town Clerk giving details of the proposed revised allowances to be paid to the firemen for attendances at Fire outbreaks, practices, etc., call-to duty and retaining fee.

Members of the Council represented that the firemen would prefer to receive the allowances payable under the Circular, May, 1948, if the rates for "Stand-to" duty were increased from the old rate of 15/- to 30/- for each week during which the men are required to be available for attendance at fire outbreaks.

Mr. Ledwidge referred to the initiative displayed by a member of the Brigade, Mr. Sutton, who dealt personally with a fire outbreak in Dargan Street recently.

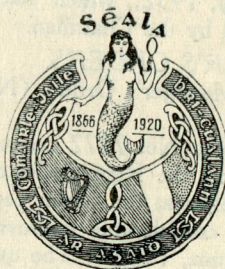

### CONFIRMATION OF MINUTES.

129. The Minutes of the Monthly Meeting held on the 8th April, 1952; of the Estimates Meeting held on 31st March and Rates Meeting held on the 6th May, 1952, which had been circulated, were taken as read and signed by the Chairman.

### COUNTY MANAGER'S ORDERS.

130. The County Manager's Orders (Nos. 7267 to 7275) as circulated, were noted.

With reference to Order No. 7272 concerning *inter alia* the withholding of increments from the Rent Collectors, the County Manager stated he would not implement the Order regarding suspension of the Collectors, if there was considerable improvement in the state of the Collection at the 30th June, 1952. The question of the payment of the increments was also being considered.

### QUESTIONS—CLR. FRENCH.

131. (1) QUESTION: By whose authority were the kerb stones on the footpath at the Casino, Strand Road, removed?

ANSWER: During the erection of the Casino portion of the footpath in front of the Casino was damaged and was replaced by Mr. Boni's Contractor. It was replaced to the Engineer's satisfaction.

2. QUESTION: Why were two Weighing Scales installed in the sanitary conveniences at the Southern End of the Esplanade?

ANSWER: Weighing Machines have been installed in the South Sanitary Conveniences for the past few years. Permission was granted for the installation at the request of the Company. As far as can be ascertained, no obstruction is caused to users of the Conveniences.

3. QUESTION: Why have the gates on these Conveniences not being attended to?

ANSWER: An Order has been issued for the rehanging and repainting of the gates.

4. QUESTION: The Publicans recently got 70 per cent. reduction on excess water. Why did the remaining few—the market Gardeners, not get the reduction also?

ANSWER: The Council agreed to grant an allowance of 70 per cent. to Publicans in respect of water consumed on the premises, which would also be used for domestic purposes. In the case of market Gardeners the meters have been installed in the gardens. As these premises are not being used for domestic purposes and as all the water used is for commercial purposes the question of rebate does not arise in these cases.

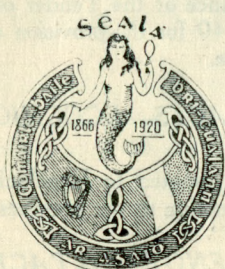

#### SMALL DWELLING (ACQ.) ACTS.

157. Further consideration of applications for Loans under the Small Dwellings (Acq.) Acts received from Messrs. G. E. Collier and Michael Kirby were adjourned pending completion of the Agreement relating to the provision of a Storm Overflow at Dempsey's Field.

#### RENTING OF TOLLS OF CONVENIENCES AT BRAY BRIDGE.

158. The only Tender received, viz., that of Mrs. Violet Dutton, 7 Vevay Road, for renting of the Tolls of Sanitary Conveniences at Bray Bridge in the sum of £3 3s. 0d. for one year from 1st June, 1952 to 31st May, 1953, was accepted.

#### STRIP LIGHTING.

159. The Council approved of the Report of the Town Engineer recommending the acceptance of the Tender of Messrs. Breen Electrical Co., in the sum of £240 for the provision and maintenance of strip Lighting at the Esplanade.

#### TOWN PLANNING ACTS—EGGCHICK HATCHERIES.

160. Permission was granted to Eggchick Hatcheries for the retention of a temporary structure at the premises.

#### REPAIRS TO FONTENOY COTTAGE

161. The Council approved of the proposal of the occupier, Mr. Devitt, to have repairs carried out to the roof of his premises, subject to the condition that in the event of the Town Planning Scheme coming into operation he will not seek compensation in respect of betterment of the premises as a result of repairs to the roof.

#### ERECTION OF GATES AT 40 WOLFE TONE SQUARE, MIDDLE.

162. The Council granted permission to Mr. Peter Broughan, 40 Wolfe Tone Square Middle, to erect gates at the premises.

#### HOUSING DEVELOPMENT AT NEWCOURT ROAD.

163. The Council approved of a Plan submitted on behalf of Mr. R. Bohan for proposed housing development at Newcourt Road, subject to compliance with the requirements of the Town Engineer regarding road, sewers, watermains, etc., as set out by him in his report.

#### ADDITIONS TO BRAEMAR BALLROOM AND CAFE.

164. The Council refused permission for the erection of additions to Braemar Ballroom and Cafe, Strand Road, for Mr. Baird, in accordance with Plans submitted on his behalf by Mr. O'Driscoll.

#### TENDERS FOR PAINTING.

165. Councillor Martin referred to the acceptance by the Town Engineer of a Tender for painting of poles, etc. Members represented that Tenders should have been brought to the notice of the Council. The Town Engineer pointed out that the work was of an urgent character and it was necessary to accept a Tender immediately, so that the work could be completed before the 1st June, 1952.



#### TENANCY OF COUNCIL HOUSES.

166. The Council considered applications for tenancy of two houses recently erected at Boghall. Following discussion, it was decided not to consider four applications which were not received within the prescribed period.

After examination in detail of the circumstances of each of the 64 applicants it was agreed to approve of the allocation of the two houses to Mr. John Fitzgerald, St. Helen's, Gate Lodge, Killarney Road and Mr. James Gorman, Oldcourt Lodge, Vevay Road, Bray.

It was agreed that No. 30 Wolfe Tone Square, North, be offered to Mr. Treacy, 11 Quinsboro' Road, in the event of a family named Keenan, 15 Harbour View, refusing to comply with the requirements of the Council regarding the vacation of the house at Harbour View by Mr. Keenan, Senior.

#### TEMPORARY OVERDRAFT ON REVENUE ACCOUNT.

167. It was proposed by Clr. E. Byrne, seconded by Clr. Sayers, and resolved:—

"That we the Bray Urban District Council hereby make application to the Minister for Local Government for sanction to the raising of an Overdraft on the Revenue Account in the sum of £10,000 for the period to end on the 30th June, 1952, to meet commitments pending the receipt of Municipal Rates.

#### 170. 20 Castle Street.

Submitted report of the Town Engineer and Health Inspector concerning the condition of premises, No. 20 Castle St.. The Town Clerk explained that a Closing Order had been made in respect of the upper storey of the house and pointed out that the Owner, through her Solicitors had been asked to intimate whether she would be prepared to sell the premises to the Council for a nominal sum, if the Council decided to acquire the premises.

It was agreed to defer the matter pending a reply from her Solicitor concerning disposal of the premises.

#### 171. 29 Houses Scheme.

Proposed by Clr. J. French, seconded by Clr. H. J. Byrne and resolved:

"That we hereby apply to the Minister for Local Government for sanction to the raising of an additional Loan of £1,250, from the Commissioners of Public Works, to defray the cost of the erection of 29 Houses on various Sites by Direct Labour"

#### 172. Assignment of 3 O'Byrne Road, Bray.

The Council approved of the proposed assignment of No. 3 O'Byrne Road, by Miss Joan O'Reilly to Mr. Edmund Moloughney.

#### 173. Tenders for Stationery requirements.

Four Tenders for Stationery requirements, for a period of one year from the 1st April, 1952, were opened, viz., Dargle Press, Hibernia Printing Works, Falconer, and the North Wexford Printing & Publishing Co.. It was decided to accept the lowest Tender for each individual item contained in the Schedule and in any case where Tenders for a particular item were identical, preference is to be given to local Tender.

#### 174. Vacancy for Clerk Typist.

The Town Clerk stated that Miss V.C. Byrne resigned from the service of the Council on 23rd February, and it was proposed to fill the vacancy created by the resignation. A Miss K. Cullen, Rathdrum, who competed at the Examination for Clerk Typists held by Wicklow County Council in March, 1951, was the only remaining candidate on the panel who had not yet been appointed. It was pointed out that if the houses were demolished, three new houses could be erected on the cleared site. It was unanimously agreed to have the houses demolished as they become vacant.



176. Cultivation of gardens by Council's tenants.

Submitted report of Rent Collector upon cultivation of gardens by Council's tenants. The reports state that generally, the gardens are being cultivated satisfactorily with some exceptions. It was agreed to instruct the tenants of houses whose gardens are not being satisfactorily cultivated that unless improvement is shown by them that Council will consider terminating their tenancy of the premises. Collier and Michael Kirby, in respect of houses at Dempsey's Field. These loans were now approved unconditionally.

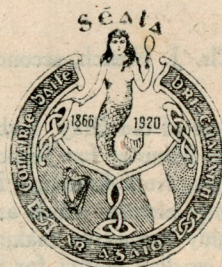

It was decided to call a Public Meeting to be held in the Town Hall on Thursday, 26th June, 1952, at 8 p.m. and to invite the Gardai and Clergy of the various denominations. A sub-Committee consisting of the Chairman, Cllrs. P. Ledwidge, G. H. G. Stuart and H. B. Hipwell was appointed to draft the form of Notices, Advertisement, etc.

#### APPOINTMENT OF COUNCIL'S LAW AGENT.

197. Proposed by Cllr. J. Temple, seconded by Cllr. P. Martin:

"That a Solicitor resident in Bray shall be appointed Law Agent to the Bray Urban District Council."

Following discussion it was proposed by Cllr. Hipwell and seconded by Cllr. Sayers:

#### ASSIGNMENT OF 36 CONNOLLY SQUARE.

199. The Council approved of the proposed assignment of 36 Connolly Square by Mr. James Fox, to Mrs. Breda Fox.

#### UNIVERSITY ADULT EDUCATION SCHEME.

200. The Council adopted a Resolution from Fermoy U.D.C. concerning Grants towards the University Adult Education Scheme.

#### STORAGE OF CIVIL DEFENCE EQUIPMENT.

201. Submitted correspondence with the Department of Defence regarding the provision of suitable storage accommodation for Civil Defence equipment. The County Fire Officer had recommended that a Nissen hut should be erected at the Fair Green. The Department of Defence had intimated that 60 per cent. of the cost of the provision of stores would be recouped to the Council.

It was agreed to adjourn consideration of the matter pending reports from the County Fire Officer and the Engineer as to the cost of erecting a permanent store which could also be used to store Council's equipment.

#### AMUSEMENT PREMISES.

202. Submitted report from the County Fire Officer and the Town Engineer regarding the following premises used for Amusement devices, Pongo, etc., viz.: Eddie's Amusements, Albert Walk; Manhattan Pongo Saloon, Albert Walk; Mick and Sons, Albert Walk, Hunt's Amusements; Dawson's Amusements; Boni's Casino and Ivy Cottage.

The Town Engineer reported that in general the Saloons were well kept as regards cleanliness, light, state of decoration, and all provide comfortable seating accommodation. He stated that the principal difficulty appears to be lack of adequate sanitary accommodation.

The County Fire Officer reported that no major alterations were necessary to make the buildings reasonably safe in the case of fire, but he recommended the installation of fire extinguishers in a number of the premises.

#### AMUSEMENT SITE AT BRAY HEAD.

203. The Council granted permission to Mr. Williams to use the Shelter at Bray Head in connection with the operation of the Amusements. It was decided to ask the Contractor to give the Council 50 per cent. of the proceeds received from the Amusement devices for one week which would include the 12th July, 1952, in lieu of the week to be given in June and September, in accordance with the terms of the Agreement.

#### BRAY COVE SWIMMING POOLS.

204. Submitted Report of the Town Engineer regarding the Bray Cove Swimming Pools intimating that the cost of erection of a suitable hand rail would be approximately £80, and that repairs to the Diving Stage will amount to £50. No action was taken by the Council in the matter.

Permission was granted to the Club for the erection of a sign at Bray Head and Display Boards on the Esplanade—the Notice Boards to be removed after the holding of the last function for the season.

#### LIFE BOAT ASSOCIATION.

205. Permission was granted to the Life Boat Association to hold a Flag Box collection on the Esplanade and seawall on the 18th and 19th July, 1952.



# RED CROSS SOCIETY

206. It was agreed to grant permission to the Red Cross Society to hold Meetings in the Boardroom at the Town Hall on one afternoon in every quarter, free of charge.

# CONTROL OF ERECTION OF STRUCTURES.

207. The Law Agent, Mr. McCarroll explained the powers of the Council in the control of erection of new structures and alterations and repairs to existing ones. Briefly, the Council's powers are obtained under the Public Health Acts, 1878, Public Health (Amendment) Act, 1907, Town Planning Acts and Towns Improvement Clauses Act, 1847. Bye-laws which have been made by the Council under the Public Health Acts provide for the control of erection of structures or additions to existing ones. The 1907 Act provides for the control of temporary structures. The Towns Improvement Clauses Act 1847, empowers a Local Authority to control the erection of such structures as sign post, show boards, etc., provided it can be proved that the erection of such structure would be an obstruction to the safe and convenient passage along any street. The Town Planning Acts empower a Local Authority to control erection of all structures but there is no power at present to have a structure removed once it has been erected, until such time as the Town Planning Scheme comes into operation.
