

As the sanction of the Department of Education to the approved Scheme of Schöldrships fröm Primary Schools to Secondary Schools, adopted by the Council at their November Meeting, had not been received, this Item was defetred to the January Meeting. WICKLOW COUNTY COUNCIL. Resolutions made in pursuance of Sec. 28 of County Management Aci, 1940, prescribing the procedure to be followed in regard to the reception and examination of Tenders for the supply of goods, the execution of works, or any other thing for which the Council may lawfully invite the submission of Tenders. These Regulations may be cited as the Wicklow County Council (Tenders)

Regulations, 1944. In these Regulations the expressions: (a) "Minister" means the Minister for Local Government and Public

- (a) "Minister" means the Minister for Local Government and Fubile Health;
  (b) "Council" means the Wicklow County Council;
  (c) "Manager" means the Wicklow County Manager.
  Before any contract for the carrying out of work, other than minor works of an urgent nature due to sudden damage, or works on cottage repairs, or for the supply of provisions and necessaries, etc. for use in County Institutions, to the value or amount of £50 or upwards is entered into by the Council, at least ten days public notice by advertisement in one or more Newspapers circulating in County Wicklow shall be given. expressing the nature and purpose thereof, and inviting tenders for the execution of same; provided that no such advertisement shall be issued unless the plans and spectifications of the Contract shall have been first approved by the Council.
  Every Tender must be signed by the person or firm tendering and be enclosed in a scaled envelope. Every Tender must state:---(a) the lowest sum for which the person tendering is prepared to con-tract for the carrying out of the work or the supply of Goods, etc.;
  (b) the description and address of the person tendering;
  (c) the names and descriptions of the guarantors for the performance of the contract. 8.

- 5. The Council and Manager shall not be bound to accept the lowest or
- The Council may not accept any tender unless the Council and Man-ager are satisfied:-(a) that the tenderer is competent to carry out the work or supply the
- (a) that the tenderer is competent to carry out the work or supply the goods in a satisfactory manner;
  (b) of the sufficiency of the guarantors, and their willingness to execute the guarantee; and
  (c) that the tender has not been made for any unfair or fradulent purpose and that all the conditions of the advertisement has been fulfilled. Where the lowest tender submitted is not accepted, the reasons for such non-acceptance shall be set out in the Minutes of Proceedings of the Council. When the terms of the advertisement inviting tenders require the lodgment of a deposit with such tender, such deposit shall be in cash or cheque guaranteed by the Bank on which it is drawn. Tenders aliall be opened by an authorized official of the Council in the presence.

- B. Where the approval of the Minister is required to the making of any Contract, Tenders shall only be accepted subject to the sanction of the Minister.

The amount of any tender submitted shall not be disclosed until a tender for the particular work tendered for shall have been accepted, and in any case in which the Minister's sanction is required, until such sanction has been received by the Council. 10. The Council and the Manager, together with an authorised official, may
- open and examine Bills of Quantities or any other documents (required to accompany tenders) in the case of non-accepted tenders, as well as in the case of accepted tenders, but the particulars or details of fuch
- documents in the case of non-accepted tenders shall not be made public. 11. Tenders for the supply of Machinery, Materials, or other commodities (excluding those required for Cottage building, Cottage repairs, minor works, or works of an urgent nature, or for the supply of provisions, etc., for use in County Institutions) shall be dealt with in like manner as in the case of tenders for works.

Tenders for the supply of materials for Cottage building, Cottage repairs, and for supply of provisions and necessaries, etc., for use in County Institutions, as well as tenders for the carrying out of minor works or works of an urgent nature, may be dealt with by the Manager directly. but particulars of such tenders so dealt with by him shall be laid beforethe Council subsequently.

The County Manager stated that the Resolution had been forwarded to the Department of Local Government and Public Health, and that he had received a reply referring the matter to himself. He stated that having regard to the fact that he had already increased road workers' wages on two occasions, and to the general policy that wages of road workers should

be somewhat less than wages of agricultural workers, whose rate of wage is controlled by the Department of Agriculture, he did not propose to take

controlled by the Department of Agriculture, he did not propose to take any action in the matter at present.
 Councillor Ledwidge raised the question of wages to Carters in Bray area, and pointed out that as Bray Urban District Council had contracted recently for carting at the rate of 15s, per day, it was unreasonable that Carters working for the County Council should be paid at a lesser rate. Dear Sir, I received your letter re Petition from residents of Sugar Loaf, Rocky Valley and Glencap Commons, protesting against the erection of huts and shacks in the District shacks in that District.

Valley and Glencap Commons, protesting against the erection of huts and shacks in that District.
On the 10th June, 1925, the former Rathdown No. 2 Rural District Council made Bye Laws with respect to New Streets and Buildings and said Bye Laws were confirmed by the Minister for Local Government and Public Health on the 20th June, 1925.
If there is any building in the District unfit for human habitation, on a certificate being obtained from the M.O.H. or Surveyor, the Council may direct a notice to be served requiring the owner of said building to furnish a statement in writing showing cause why the said building shall not be declared unfit for human habitation. Should the owner fail to show sufficient cause the Council may proceed to make an order that the building be closed until same is rendered fit for human habitation.
Articles 93 and 99 of the Bye Laws provide that every person who intends to lay out a street or construct a new building shall furnish plans to the Clerk of the Council or the Surveyor and shall also give notice of the date he intends to lay cut or construct a new building shall furnish plans to the Clerk of the Council or the surveyor and shall also give notice of the date he intends to lay cut or construct a new building.
Articles 103-105. These articles provide that a person shall not let or occupy any new dwellinghouse until it has been examined by an Officer of the Council and certified by him to be fit for human habitation.

Article 106. Under this article any work done in contravention of the Bye Laws may be removed, altered or pulled down unless sufficient cause is shown by the owner after service of notice on him to attend before the Council

At local elections there is a separate poll for each county electoral area. You are therefore requested to furnish separately details of any proposed polling district which will comprise portions of two or more county electoral areas, so that the question of adjusting the boundary of the County Electoral Area may be considered at an early date. #### NUMBER AND VALUE OF SCHOLARSHIPS.

- (a) Wicklow County Council offers for competition amongst students from the entire County of Wicklow six (6) Scholarships of the Annual Value of Fifty Pounds (£50) for the first year, and of the Annual Value of Forty-five Pounds (£45) in the second and each subsequent year.
- 2. (b) Six Scholarships—three reserved for boys and three reserved for girls—shall be awarded to candidates who are not more than fourteen years of age on the 1st August, 1945, provided that in the event of an insufficient number of boys and girls qualifying at the examination the unawarded Scholarships may be allocated to the next highest qualifying candidates, irrespective of sex.

#### PAYMENT OF SCHOLARSHIPS.

2. The County Council shall pay, in two instalments annually, the amount of Tuition Fees, Maintenance Charges, Cost of Books, etc., of each holder of a Scholarship, on receipt of a detailed account from the Head of the School or College, provided that this amount does not exceed the value of the Scholarship. The Scholarships shall be tenable only at schools approved by the County Council and the Minister for Education for the purpose, and may be renewed for a period not exceeding five years.

The County Council desires that, in the selection of schools parents will give preference to schools in which Irish games and pastimes are adopted. RENEWAL OF SCHOLARSHIPS.

6. The annual renewal of Scholarships for such period as the Council may deem fit, not exceeding five years, shall be subject to the receipt of reports as to the conduct and progress of the holder, which are accepted as satisfactory by the Wicklow County Council and the Minister for Education. A scholar who does not pass with Honours the Department's Intermediate Certificate Examination at or before the end of the third year shall not, as a rate, be eligible for a further renewal of the Scholarship All renewals of Scholarships shall be subject to the approval

of the Minister for Education.

#### EXAMINATION CENTRE.

7. Subject to the approval of the County Council and the Minister for Education, Wicklow town has been selected as a centre for the 1945 Examination, which shall be partly oral and partly in writing, and will be conducted by Inspectors and Examiners appointed by the Minister. The Examination shall be held during the week immediately following Easter Sunday. **REFERENCES.** 

8. Every Candidate for aScholarship shall, before being admitted for examination furnish a completed Application Form together with a Registrar's Birth Certificate, a satisfactory reference from the Teacher or School Manager of his or ber School and a Medical Certificate as to fitness. AGE LIMIT.

9. See Clause 1 (b).

MANNER OF MAKING APPLICATION FOR EXAMINATION.

10. Completed Applications from intending candidates, accompanied by Birth Certificates, will be received by the Secretary of the County Council at his Office, Courthouse, Wicklow, up to 29th January, 1945, from whom a Form of Declaration can be obtained, which is to be verified by a parent or guardian of the applicant, and a Form of Certificate to be filled up by a Clergyman or Peace Commissioner. These documents, when properly completed, will be submitted to the Wicklow County Council and if the application is approved by them the Secretary will make the necessary arrangements for each approved candidate to sit for the Examination. Application Forms received after the 29th January, 1945, cannot be considered.

Each candidate must indicate on the application form his selection of optional subjects. Any alteration he desired to make in his selection, subsequent to forwarding the application form must be notified to the Secretary of the County Council on or

before the 1st March, 1945. On the day of examination no candid ate will be allowed to take a paper in an optional subject unless he has given notice not later than the 1st March, 1945, of his intention to take such paper. METHOD OF AWARD.

11. Subject to these Rules and Regulations, scholarships shall be awarded in order of merit as determined by the Examination. All awards are subject to the approval of the Minister for Education.

#### SYLLABUS OF EXAMINATION.

12. The Syllabus of Examination will be the Syllabus of the Sixth Standard Primary School Programme.

13. The following shall be the subjects of examination: (a)
Irish; (b) English; (c) Arithmetic; (d) History and Geography;
(e) Algebra; (f) Geometry; (g) Drawing; (h) Rural Science of Nature Study; (k) Needlework.

All candidates must present themselves in (a), (b), (c) and (d) above. In addition, candidates may present themselves in one or two, but not more than two, of the subjects (a), (f), (g), (h) and (k).

Irish and English versions of the question papers will be set in each of the following subjects: Arithmetic, History, Geography, Needlework, Algebra, Geometry, Drawing, Rural Science of Nature Study, but only one version, either Irish or English, will be supplied to candidates.

Candidates who answer the questions in any subject wholly in Irish from the Irish version of the question paper, will get a bonus of not more than 10 per cent. of the marks awarded, excepti n Arithmetic, Algebra, Geometry, Needlework and Draw-Ing, in which the bonus will be not more than 5 per cent. of the marks awarded. No bonus will be awarded to a candidate who answers in Irish from the English version of the paper.

Copies of the question papers set in 1944 for this examination may be obtained from Gevernment Publications Sale Office. 3 and 4, College Street, Dublin, price one shilling and threepence per copy.

#### CONDITIONS FOR PASSING THE EXAMINATION.

14. To be eligible for the award of a Scholarship a candidate must pass the examination.

In order to be regarded as having passed the examination, a candidate must secure not less than 30 per cent. in each of the obligatory subjects, viz.: (a) Irish, (b) English, (c) Arithmetic, (d) History and Geography, and not less than 50 per cent. of the aggregate marks assigned to those subjects. For the purpose of placing in order of merit those candidates who pass the examination, the total marks obtained by each candidate in the four obligatory subjects will be reckoned, and, in addition, the total marks obtained by him (or her) in any optional subject (not exceeding two in number) in which he (or she) obtained at least 20 per cent, of the maximum marks assigned to that subject.

15. Every question or dispute which shall arise in relation to the interpretation or construction of this Scheme shall be determined by the Minister for Education, whose decision thereon shall be final and conclusive.

NOTE.—It is the intention of the County Council when operating a University Scholarship Scheme to give preference in the allocation of one University Scholarship to a student who declares in writing that his studies are to be devoted to obtaining a degree in Agricultural Science.

#### SYLLABUS OF EXAMINATION.

In all subjects the programme of the Examination for Scholarships in Secondary and Vocational Schools is the programme prescribed for Standard VI pupils in the official programme for National Schools, subject to such alterations therein as are set out in the "Revised Programme of Primary Instruction" (issued in September, 1934), and to such further modifications as are mentioned below:—

I beg to report as follows:

I beg to report as follows.— I propose only to deal with the building in Baltinglass for the present. I recommend demolition, except such accommodation as may be required for the storage of timber, Ambulances, and other equipment needed for the District Hospital, Baltinglass. An estimate has been submitted by the As-sistant Surveyor, Mr. Foley, giving the value of the material usable for the storage descent of the storage down. cottage building at £925 (slates, timber, etc.) The estimate for taking down and stocking materials, £300.

Stones from the buildings could be used for road materials over a period as required and paid for out of Wicklow County Council Road Maintenance Funds.

The Council approved of the recommendations made in the Report regarding Baltinglass Workhouse, and noted that no action was proposed to be taken at present in connection with Shillelagh Workhouse. Item No. 12.—Replies received from the three Urban District Councils consequent upon the Council's Resolution dated 11th L cerning the advisability of setting up Committees under Section 11 of the Public Assistance Act, 1939, in the towns of Arklow, Bray and Wicklow, were submitted to the Council. All three Urban District Councils expressed their approval of the setting up of a Committee in each town, and, following a discussion on the constitution of the Committees, the County Manager suggested that each Urban District Council should be appointed as Public Assistance Committee in its own area. The Council approved of the Manager's proposal. Councillor Fitzpatrick suggested that three women be asked to act on the Committee in each District, and Councillor Patrick Doyle exact on the Committee in each District, and Councillor Patrick Doyle ex-pressed the desirability of setting up similar Committees in the Rural area. Item No. 13.—The Council approved of the following Regulations in respect of the letting of Cottages and allotments under the Labourers' Act:— Regulations made by the County Council of Wicklow with respect to the letting of Cottages and Allotments under the Labourers Acts.

Each cottage and plot shall be let only to an agricultural labourer within the meaning of the Labourers' Acts, whose tenancy thereof shall be weekly, and the weekly rent shall be as set forth in the Schedule hereto, which said rent has been fixed so as to scure a reasonable return, having regard to the circumstances of the locality affected, on the expenditure of the Council under the Labourers' Acts, and the cost of the Scheme under which the Cottage or Allotment was provided.

Provided that this Regulation shall not inany way affect the rent charged to existing tenants under their letting agreements. 2. (a) On the first letting of any cottage or allotments comprised in a scheme preference shall be given to agricultural labourers who have signed on their own behalf the representation on which the scheme was founded, or on whose behalf representation was made, unless the applicant has in the meantime ceased to be an agricultural labourer. (b) Where the houses have been provided under the Labourers' Acts. 1883 to 1931, otherwise than in pursuance of a scheme founded on representa-tions made under these Acts, a first preference to such of the applicants for the houses as are members of the special class; a second preference to such of the said applicants as are persons (not being members of the special class) with families who are living in houses which have been condemned as being unfit for human habitation; and then a third preference to such of the said applicants as are persons with families whose existing accommoda-tion is insufficient: provided always that in determining the relative order of preference amongst a class of applicants to whom a preference in the

of preference amongst a class of applicants to whom a preference in the of preference amongst a class of applicants to whom a preference in the letting of the houses is hereinbefore required to be given, the local authority shall consider and have regard to a report to be obtained from the Medical Officer of Health as to the existing housing accommodation of each such applicant and as to the degree of urgency of his need for alternative accommodation

(c) the dwelling has been condemned as being unfit for human habita-

3. The tenant shall pay the rent to the Collector, or other person authorised by the Council. 4. The tenant shall not assign or sub-let, or sub-divide or part with

The tenant shall not assign or sub-fiel, or sub-divide or part with the possession of the premises, or any part thereof, or make any letting thereof in conacre, or allow any part of such premises to be occupied by a lodger. 5. The tenant shall not commit any wilful dilapidation of the premises, or any part thereof, and shall not erect on the premises any shed, out-office or building whetherer without permission in writing from the Council

office or building whatever, without permission in writing from the Council.
6. The tenant shall comply with the following conditions:—
(1) He shall keep the premises and every part thereof in a cleanly and sanitary state, and shall not allow any refuse, nuisance, or offensive

Item No. 14.—The following amended Regulations in respect of paying patients in the District Hospital, Baltinglass, and County Hospital, Wicklow, plained the necessity for these Regulations, and the Council approved of their adoption:-

## WICKLOW COUNTY COUNCIL.

Wicklow Public Assistance District. The Wicklow County Hospitals (Admission of Paying Patients) Regulations, 1945.

- These regulations may be cited as the Wicklow County Hospital (Ad-mission of Paying Patients) Regulations, 1945.
- 2. In these regulations-(a) "Minister" means the Minister for Local Government and Public Health;
- (b) "public assistance authority" means the Wicklow County Council.
  (c) "Manager" means the Manager for the public assistance authority.
  (d) "Hospital" means the district institution of the public assistance authority known as the County Hospital, Wicklow. (e) "Surgeon," "Physician" and "Matron" mean respectively the Sur-
- geon, the Physician, and the Matron of the Hospital. Subject to the provisions of these regulations, the public assistance authority hereby authorises the admission to the Hospita! of persons not eligible for public assistance for treatment, maintenance and ac-
- commodation therein. 4. No person shall be admitted to the Hospital under these regulations unless there is available for such person in the Hospital at the time of his admission thereto, accommodation not required for persons eligible for public assistance and admissible to the Hospital.
- Persons admitted to the Hospital under these regulations shall be ac-commodated in such special wards of the Hospital as the Manager shall with the approval of the Minister, allocate for the purpose or in the
- public wards of the Hospital. (1) A person not eligible for public assistance seeking admission to the Hospital under these regulations shall, if a suitable bed is available, be admitted to the Hospital by the Matron upon presentation to her of a certificate of a registered medical practitioner that such person requires reatment in hospita!
- (2) The Matron may, in case of urgency, if a suitable bed is available, without requiring a medical certificate as aforesaid, admit such person
- without requiring a medical certificate as aforesaid, admit such person to the Hospital on the direction of any medical officer of the Hospita or in his absence withouts such direction.
  7. The Matron shall report forthwith to the Surgeon or Physician, as the case may require, any admission by her to the Hospital of a person under these regulations, and shall, if the Surgeon or Physician as the case may require, is of opinion that the person cannot suitable be treated in the Hospital, discharged such person from the Hospital as and when so directed by the Surgeon or Physician, as the case may be.
  8. Save as otherwise provided herein every person admitted as a person
- so directed by the Surgeon or Physician, 3s the case may be. Save as otherwise provided herein, every person admitted as a person not eligible for public assistance to the Hospital under these regulations, shall, as a condition of such admission, be required to pay to the public assistance authority the appropriate charge, as set forth in the Schedule hereto, for each dayor portion of a day during which such person shall remain in the Hospital, together with such appropriate additional charges as the public assistance authority may determine, for any special nursing or other expenses incurred in connection with his or her treatment therein.

Provided always that notwithstanding anything contained in this regula-

tion-(1) the appropriate charge and the amount of any appropriate addi-tional charges as aforesaid payable in respect of a person not eligible for public assistance admitted to the hospital under these regulations in accordance with the agreement with the public assistance sutherity made by the sanitary authority under saction 155 of the Public Health (Ireland) Act, 1878, or under a school medical treatment scheme approved of by the Minister under the Public Health (Medical Treat-ment of Children) (Ireland) Act, 1919, or a maternity and child welfare scheme approved of by the Minister, under the Notification of Births Acts, 1907 and 1915, as amended by the Maternity and Child Welfare Act, 1918, or under an agreement approved of by the Minister for the purposes of the Tuberculosis (Ireland) Acts, 1908 and 1913, shall be payable on behalf of such person, if so agreed or specified in such scheme, by the relevant sanitary

Tuberculosis (Ireland) Acts, 1908 and 1913, shall be payable on behalf of such person, if so agreed or specified in such scheme, by the relevant sanitary or local authority and shall be of such amount as shall, with the approval of the Minister, be agreed upon between the public assistance authority and the relevant sanitary or local authority or where the public assistance authority is also the relevant sanitary or local authority as shall be deter-mined by it with the approval of the Minister. (2) The appropriate charge and the amount of any additional charges as aforesaid payable in respect of a person admitted to the hospital under these regulations in accordance with an agreement with any local authority other than a local authority named in the next preceding proviso, shall be of such amount as shall, with the approval of the Minister, be agreed upon between the public assistance authority and the relevant local authority, or in default of agreement such amount as may be determined by the Minister. (3) Th appropriate charge and the amount of any appropriate addi-tional charges as aforesaid payable in respect of a person not eligible for public assistance admitted to the Hospital under these regulations as an insured member of Cumann an Arachais Naisiunta ar Slainte in accordance with any scheme for additional benefit made by the said Society with the sanction of the Minister under section 4 of the National Health Insurance Act, 1942, shall, if such scheme is accepted by the public assistance authority, be payable on behalf of such person by the said Society and shall be of such amount as shall, such scheme

be payable on behalf of such person by the said Society and shall be of such amount as shall be authorised by such scheme. (4) The appropriate charge and the amount of any additional charges as aforesaid payable by the Minister for Defence in respect of a member or a dependent of a member of the Defence Forces admitted to the Hospital under these Regulations shall be in accordance with any agreement for the time being in force between the said Minister and the public assistance authority and shall be of such amount as shall be authorised by such agreement.

- (5) The charge in respect of children under the age of 14 years shall be half the appropriate rate of charge.
- 9. The Matron shall, before admitting any person to the hospital under these regulations, bring under the notice of such person or the person claiming admission on his or her behalf the provisions of these regulaions.
- 10. The Surgeon or Physician, as the case may be, shall, at the request of a person admitted to the Hospital under these regulations or a person acting on his or her behalf, permit any desired registered medical practitioner to have access to the person admitted and shall, as fas as pos sible, act in the treatment of the person in consultation with such medical practitioner

11. Persons admitted to the Hospital under these regulations shall be accommodated in such special wards of the Hospital as the Manager shall, with the approval of the Minister, allocate for the purpose or in the public wards of the Hospital.
(1) A person not eligible for public assistance seeking admission to the Hospital under these regulations to the Hospital under these regulations to the Hospital under these regulations shall, if a suitable bed is available, be admitted to the Hospital by the Matron upon presentation to her of a certificate of a registered medical practitioner that such person requires treatment in hospital.

1. This site is a good ground, but slopes heavily towards the north. It is fairly convenient to sewer and the town water supply is immediately adjoining. The Committee felt that owing to the slope and the aspect the site would hardly be suitable.

 2. This site slopes towards the north-east and at a sharp grade and is very uneven. It would be convenient to the town water and sewer mains but was not approved owing to the above features.
 3. This site is situated on the Arklow Road about 1 mile from Wicklow town. Almost the whole field is heavily sloped, but the aspect is almost southerly. Part of the field could be utilised for building, but it would be necessary to construct a special sewerger system and even though the town necessary to construct a special severage system and even though the town water main is close by, the existing pressure from that source would be inadequate. It was suggested, however, that there appears to be some difficulty as regards its availability for building, owing to restrictions which are said to exist in leases of certain adjoining property. #### WICKLOW COUNTY COUNCIL

County Manager's Report on the Estimates for the Service of the Financial Year, 1945/1946.

To the Chairman and Members of Wicklow County Council. Gentlemen.

In accordance with Section 22 of the County Management Act, 1940. I submit for your consideration at the Estimates Meeting to be held on 27th February, 1945, at 1030 a.m., the amounts which, in my opinion, will be necessary to meet the expenses and provide for the liabilities and require-

ments of the Council during the coming financial year. It will be noted that the amounts estimated for the maintenance of the Council's Services, apart from Mental Hospitals, show a considerable increase over the Estimate for 1944/'45. The net Estimated expenditure on each Service in the current year 1944/'45 and in the forthcoming year '1945/'46 are shown hereunder:-

nce: The Estimate for this service for the year 1944/45 included provision for an estimated debit balance of £4,662, so that the amount actually provided for the service of that year was £58,628. The increased provision for the year 1945/'46 is accordingly £3,762.

The principal items of increase are as follows:----

District Institutions and Home Assistance: Net increase £5,314, due principally to (1) increase in salaries and wages of Medical Officers, Nurses, and other staff £2,818, a new scale of salaries for Nurses having been intro-duced by the Department of Local Government and Public Health during the year 1944/'45, and increased Emergency Bonuses being now payables' (2) increased 'provision for repayment of Locals £426; (3) Council's con-tribution to additional allowances to Old Age Fensioners, etc., under Govern-ment Scheme introduced in 1944/'45 £1.300; (4) Estate Duty Grant inc'uded in estimated receipts for 1944/'45, £1,700. There is a reduction of £813 in the amount estimated for Food. Drink and Tobacco. and of £340 under the the amount estimated for Food, Drink and Tobacco, and of £340 under the head of Medicines and Medical Appliances.

Medical Astistance: Net increase £782 (Medical Supplies £200, Repairs; Fuel Allowances, etc., £800, less reduction in estimate for superannuation allowances £177).

Assistance in Extern Institutions: Increase £1.000. The cost of this Assistance in Extern Institutions: Increase £1.000. The cost of this Service has risen steadily since 1925, in which year it cost £600. In the year 1935 the cost had risen to £3,656, and it is estimated that the cost in the current year will be £7,500. The amount provided for 1945/46 is £6,500, as it is hoped that the operation of the National Insurance Hospital Benefit Scheme will occasion a reduction in the charge under this head. It must, of course, be borne in mind that all Dublin Hospitals have increased their charges by amounts ranging from 25 to 40 per cent. Other Expenses: Increase £1,666 (Ambulance Service and other Trans-port £350, Burials £150, Salaries and Wages £646, Printing and Stationery £4307.

To cover cost (£300) of a Trailer Pump to be stationed at Greystones the offer of which was made, as a con-cossion, through the good offices of the Local Government Department, and £450 to provide for payment of retaining fees to members of Fire-Fighting and Rescue Squads established in the various towns and villages, to which the necessary equipment has already been supplied. Burial Grounds: Increase £750—For this additional sum it is proposed during the coming year, to fence properly and clean all old Burial Grounds in the County—53 in humber. in the County-63 in humber. Tuberculesis Acts: I have increased the provision in this case from £6,600 in respect of the current year to £3,014 for the coming year. I think it may be safe y anticipated that a very much wider provision must be made for the treatment of Tubercular Cases in the coming financial year, par-ticularly with regard to patients awaiting admission to Sanatoria, and those convalering after Institutional heatment. Provision must also be made for the issue of Supplemental Supplies of such foods as Eggs. Milk, Bread, etc.; and Clothing, Beds, and Bedding, to certain classes of patients undergoing domiciliary treatment. The financial provision proposed, may, however, prove inadequate.

domiciliary treatment. The financial provision proposed, may, however, Scheois Medical Service: This item is increased by £375 for the coming year. Due to the issue of increased petrol allowances to the Schools Medical Officer and Dentist, employed under the Scheme, it is hoped that much more work under this head will be performed in the future than has been done since the advent of the existing Emergency.
Provision has also been made of £500 for clearance of Derelict Sites, and of £400 for the purchase of a Steam Disinfector.
Housing Charges: This service also shows an increase over last year's estimate, the amount of increase being £885, which is principally accounted for the provision of an additional £537 for Cottage Repairs.
Roads: The Road Works Scheme for the year 1945/46 was approved by the Council at the Meeting held on 8th January, 1945. The remaining items to be considered comprise the salaries of the Engineering Staff, Ihsurance Premiums, and other administrative expenses. Dear Sir.

Fully 90 per cent. of the land-owners in this County have been served with the Statutory Hedge and Tree Cutting Notice during the present season, and about 50 per cent. of these have failed to comply. season, and about 50 per cent. of these have failed to comply. I do not require very drastic work in this matter, but I do think that farmers and other land-owners might consider giving a little more co-operation, and I suggest that each County Councillor in his own district might be able to influence his neighbours to make a small effort in cutting and trimming hedges which, in many cases, have become a scurce of danger to the users of the public road, apart from the fact that the shading of the road surface thereby is making it more difficult to maintain. #### Courthouse, Wicklow, 11th July, 1945. 1939 Scheme-Blessington,

Dear Sir, With reference to your letter of the 15th ult. in which you indicated that the Law Agent asked for a comprehensive report in connection with the site of 13 cottages at Blessington under the 1939 Scheme and with re-gard to the danger of erosion from the Liffey Reservoir Lake, I beg to reply as follows:-

This site was selected under the 1939 Scheme for cottages but building was not commenced on the site until about February, 1945, owing to difficulties regarding title, rights-of-way, etc., of which you are undoubtedly aware. At the outset I would refer you to a letter of mine dated 10th June,

1943, in which I expressed anxiety regarding the proximity of the site to the Reservoir Lake, and the likelihood of erosion and cutting away of the banks adjoining this field.

banks adjoining this field. After prolonged correspondence regarding the lay-out of the cottages, a suitable plan was devised and building commenced, but under date 20th March, 1945, Mr. Foley Assistant Surveyor, reported to me that the banks adjoining the lake had slipped and fallen for a distance of about 45 yards. He further stated in his letter that there did not appear to be any slip at the toe of the bank where it met the Lake and that the slipping occurred following heavy frost. Mr. Foley had given instructions that no further building was to be proceeded with on the site of the lay-out adjoin-ing the lake nending my further consideration and decision on the matter.

ing the lake, pending my further consideration and decision on the matter. Under date 23rd March, 1945, I wrote to the Secretary of the E.S.B. (copy attached), and I asked what measures the Board would contemplate taking immediately to protect this property and ensure that no further slipping occurred. In the meantime I discussed the matter with Mr. Foley and it was arranged that Mr. McDonald, Chief Engineer, E.S.B., should be

asked to examine the place and submit his views. Under date 27th March, 1945, I received a communication from the E.S.B. (copy attached) in reply to mine of the 23rd idem., informing me that it was not intended to take any measures at the moment to prevent erosion and slipping of the cliff face.

I instructed Mr. Foley verbally and under date, definitely in writing, on the 14th April, 1945, that no further foundations were to be dug on the Lakeside of the site., until I would have satisfaction from the E.S.B. regarding its responsibilities.

Mr. Foley and I agreed that if the presence of the Lake interfered with anyone's property, the E.S.B. should pay full compensation, or alterna-tively, provide an equal quantity of suitable land in a suitable place.

Alternatively, we agreed that it would appear to be reasonable to expect that if damage were anticipated that the E.S.B. should take steps to prevent it occurring

Mr. Foley and I did not entirely agree as regards the actual causes of the slip or the likelihood of further slips: he seemed to think that the slip was simply due to frost, but that the toe of the bank adjoining the did not show any signs of collapse and therefore the lake water was not likely to cause further erosion.

However, the Chief Engineer, E.S.B., supplied me with a plan showing the cross section of the bank down to the Lakeside, and for a considerable

distance under water, and I regret to say that I fear a further collapse: to the casual observer from the top of the bank, the toe adjoining the lake would appear to be fairly sound and level, but if the cross section of the bank is examined, it will be seen that the ground slopes away into the lake and that there is fairly deen water a short distance from the collapse. bank is examined, it will be seen that the ghort distance from the shore, lake and that there is fairly deep water a short distance from the shore, in fact, almost 30 feet. Under these circumstances, and relying on my own experience of coastal erosion and saturation of banks, I am inclined to think that the new Lake will gradually seep into the soil under the bank for a considerable distance, and whilst it looks fairly sound now, the bank and field might collarse at a later date unexpectedly and field might collapse at a later date unexpectedly.

The formation of the soil is a light layer of grass, undergrowth and trees over a very unstable bank of excellent pure sand, the natural slope of which would be about 30 degrees. If the soil were not of this pure sandy nature, there might be a possibility of it assuming a natural slope by spreading out even into the lake and remaining stable, but the fact that it is of such a clean sandy texture means, in my opinion, that no limit to the extent of possible cutting erosion can be safely decided.

The Chief Engineer, E.S.B., attended at Blessington on the 16th May 1945, and I met him there with Mr. Foley and the County Manager. Altogether there are 6 cottages adjoining the Lakeside on the lay-out plan: actually the E.S.B. referred to 4 cottages only in a letter which was addressed by the Secretary of the E.S.B. to the Secretary, Wicklow County Council, under date 11th May, 1945 (copy enclosed). In this letter the E.S.B. informed the County Council that "this site is unsafe by reason of the erosion of the banks which obtains at present and a further erosion which may reasonably be anticipated in the future."

Under these circumstances, and having regard to this letter particularly, I regret that I cannot advise the County Manager to proceed with the building of the 4 cottages in question. I wrote to the Secretary of the E.S.B. under date 17th May, 1945, and I suggested that the Board might see no objection to the erection of the remaining cottages on this field, particularly to a block of two cottages proposed fo be erected on the Lake-side, and the only reply I received, however, was a communication dated 16th June, 1945 (copy enclosed) in which I was referred to the previous letter, above mentioned, dated 11th May, 1945, sent by the E.S.B. to the Wicklow County Secretary.

In the course of the investigations it was thought that, if the cottages on the Lakeside were moved inwards and away from the Lake, so that the minimum distance between the building and the top of the bank would be 100 feet, the risk would be greatly minimised, and perhaps the L.G.D. would aprove of this alteration in the lay-out site plan already submitted

and sanctioned by that Department. Regarding the suggestions to remedy the situation and prevent further possibility of erosion, I desire to say that this would be a very difficult and costly undertaking. The steepness of the banks at present existing would have to be altered somewhat, and I suggest that sally trees might be grown on the lower half of the bank. I am afraid that they could not be got to grow on the upper or sandy portion. At the same time, it would be necessary, in my opinion. to construct two or three rows of close sheeted wooden piling, first on the edge of the water line, and again at a distance back along the toe towards the steep embankment. A permanent solution would be found by cement pressure grouting on all sides of the embankment. Yours faithfully,

The provision of a Nurses' Home cannot be proceeded with until the Sewerage system is improved. The Consulting Engineers acting in conjunc-tion with the Engineering Advisers to this Department and the Wicklow County Engineer, investigated the manner in which the necessary improve-ments could be effected, and reported that the only effective solution consists of an extension of the Newtownmountkennedy. Sanatorium. The extension of the Sewer can only be carried out by your Council and with a view to having the work carried out without delay the Minister undertook to recommend that a grant of 40 per cent. of the cost should be made available to the Council from State Funds. At present the Railway Company is running a 'Bus Service via Dun-lavin, Road No. 315, Carrigower No. 319, 301 to Baltinglass, whilst the Dis-tricts between Dunlavin, Grangecon and Knockarigg, formerly served by train services, have been abandoned.

It is understood that the C.I.E. is prepared to provide a Service on the Dunlavin-Grangecon Route if the Road is made suitable for such traffic by widening, strengthening and surfacing.

It is estimated that the cost of this work would be £6,700 approximately for a distance of 3.70 miles, and we, the Wicklow County Council, request for a distance of 3.70 miles, and we, the Wicklow County Council, request the Department of Local Government that a Grant be made available for this important work. The Department is reminded that the C.I.E. is bound to provide adequate Road Services if an existing Railway is closed. ## The Scheme as adopted reads as follows:--WICKLOW COUNTY COUNCIL.

SCHEME OF SCHOLARSHIPS IN SECONDARY AND VOCATIONAL SCHOOLS, 1946.

Wicklow County offers the following Scholarships for competition:-

1. (a) Six (6) Scholarships of the annual value of Fifty Round (£50) in the first year and of the annual value of Fortyfive (£45) in the second and each subsequent year to be competed for only by students attending schools in a Rural Area.

(b) Six (6) Scholarships of the annual value of Twenty-five Pounds (£25) in each year, to be competed for only by students attending schools in an Urban Area.

Of the six Scholarships to be awarded in each class, three will be reserved for boys and three for girls provided that in the event of an insufficient number of boys or girls qualifying at the examination the unawarded Scholarships may be allocated to the next highest qualifying candidates irrespective of sex.

If less than six candidates in either category (a) or category (b) pass the examination, the unawarded Scholarship, or Scholarships, allocated to that category shall be awarded to the next highest candidate, or candidates, in the other category, irrespective of sex, who have not already received a Scholarship. PAYMENT OF SCHOLARSHIPS.

2. The County Council shall pay, in two instalments annually, the amount of Tuition Fees, Maintenance Charges, Cost of Books, etc., of each holder of a Scholarship, on receipt of a detailed account from the Head of the School or College, provided that this amount does not exceed the value of the Scholarship. unexpended balance, if any, of each Scholarship shall be paid annually to the parent or guardian of the Scholarship holder to meet the cost of railway travelling, etc.

RESIDENTIAL QUALIFICATION.

2. The parents or guardians of intending candidates must have been bona fide resident in County Wicklow on the first day of October preceding the Exa

MEANS OF PARENTS OR GUARDIANS.

4. Competition for these Scholarships shall be confined to children whose parents or guardians (a) occupy agricultural land the annual Poor Law Valuation of

which does not exceed:-

(I) £100in the case of families of 3 children or less. (II) £110 in the case of families of 4 children.

(III) £115 in the case of families of 5 children.

(IV) £120 in the case of families of 6 children or more. (b) derive an annual income from all sources not exceeding (I) £300 in the case of families of 3 children or less.

(II) £320 in the case of families of 4 children.

(III) £340 in the case of families of 5 children. (IV) £360 in the case of families of 6 children or more.

Children referred to in this clause must be under 18 years of age. The Council may award in special circumstances, subject to the approval of the Minister for Education, the whole or part of a Scholarship to a candidate whose parents or guardians do not comply with the foregoing means conditions.

## TENURE OF SCHOLARSHIPS.

5. The Scholarships shall be tenable only at schools approved by the County Council and the Minister for Education for the purpose, and may be renewed for a period not exceeding five years.

The County Council desires that, in the selection of schools parents will give preference to schools in which Irish games and pastimes are adopted.

#### RENEWAL OF SCHOLARSHIPS.

6. The annual renewal of Scholarships for such period as the Council may deem fit, not exceeding five years, shall be subject to the receipt of reports as to the conduct and progress of the holder, which are accepted as satisfactory by the Wicklow County Council and the Minister for Education. A scholar who does not pass with Honours the Department's Intermediate Certificate Examination at or before the end of the third year shall not, as a rule, be eligible for a further renewal of the Scholarship All renewals of Scholarships shall be subject to the approval of the Minister for Education.

#### EXAMINATION CENTRE.

7. Subject to the approval of the County Council and the Minister for Education, Wicklow town has been selected as a centre for the 1946 Examination, which shall be partly oral and partly in writing, and will be conducted by Inspectors and Examiners appointed by the Minister. The Examination shall be held during the week immediately following Easter Sunday. REFERENCES.

8. Every Candidate for a Scholarship shall, before being admitted for examination furnish a completed Application Form together with a Registrar's Birth Certificate, a satisfactory reference from the Teacher or School Manager or his or her School and a Medical Certificate as to fitness.

### AGE LIMIT.

9. Candidates must not be more than 14 years of age on the 1st August, 1946.

MANNER OF MAKING APPLICATION FOR EXAMINATION. 10. Applications from intending candidates, accompanied by Birth Certificates, will be received by the Secretary of the County Council at his Office, Courthouse, Wicklow, up to 10th January, 1946, from whom a Form of Declaration can be obtained, which is to be verified by a parent or guardian of the applicant, and a Form of Certificate to be filled up by a Clergyman or Peace Commissioner. These documents, when properly completed, will be submitted to the Wicklow County Council and if the application is approved by them the Secretary will make the necessary arrangements for each approved candidate to sit for the Examina tion. Application Forms received after the 10th January cannot be considered.

Each candidate must indicate on the application form his selection of optional subjects. Any alteration he desires to make in his selection, subsequent to forwarding the application form must be notified to the Secretary of the County Council on or before the 1st March, 1946. On the day of examination no candidate will be allowed to take a paper in an optional subject unless he has given notice not later than the 1st March, 1946. of his intention to take such paper.

#### METHOD OF AWARD.

11. Subject to these Rules and Regulations, scholarships shall be awarded in order of merit as determined by the Examination. All awards are subject to the approval of the Minister for Education.

#### SYLLABUS OF EXAMINATION.

12. The Syllabus of Examination will be the Syllabus of the Sixth Standard Primary School Programme.

13. The following shall be the subjects of examination: (a) Irish; (b) English; (c) Arithmetic; (d) History and Geography; (e) Algebra; (f) Geometry; (g) Drawing; (h) Rural Science or Nature Study; (i) Needlework.

All candidates must present themselves in (a), (b), (c) and (d) above. In addition, candidates may present themselves in one or two, but not more than two, of the subjects (e), (f), (g), (h) and (i).

Irish and English versions of the question papers will be set in each of the following subjects: Arithmetic, History, Geography, Needlework, Algebra, Geometry, Drawing, Rural Science or Nature Study, but only one version, either Irish or English, will be supplied to candidates.

Candidates who answer the questions in any subject wholly in Irish from the Irish version of the question paper, will get a bonus of not more than 10 per cent, of the marks awarded. except in Arithmetic, Algebra, Geometry, Needlework and Drawing, in which the bonus will be not more than 5 per cent. of the marks awarded. No bonus will be awarded to a candidate who answers in Irish from the English version of the paper.

Copies of the question papers set in 1945 for this examination may be obtained from Government Publications Sale Office, 3 and 4, College Street, Dublin, price one shilling and threepence per copy.

# CONDITIONS FOR PASSING THE EXAMINATION.

14. To be eligible for the award of a Scholarship a candidate must pass the examination.

In order to be regarded as having passed the examination. a candidate must secure not less than 30 per cent. in each of the obligatory subjects, viz.: (a) Irish, (b) English, (c) Arith-

#### metic, (d) History and Geography, and not less than 50 per cent. 12 NOV 1945 of the aggregate marks assigned to those subjects. For the purpose of placing in order of merit those candidates who pass the examination, the total marks obtained by each candidate in the four obligatory subjects will be reckoned, and, in addition, the total marks obtained by him (or her) in any optional subject (not exceeding two in number) in which he (or she )obtained

at least 20 per cent. of the maximum marks assigned to that subject 15. Every question or dispute which shall arise in relation to the interpretation or construction of this Scheme shall be determined by the Minister for Education, whose decision thereon shall be final and conclusive.

NOTE .- It is the intention of the County Council when operating a University Scholarship Scheme to give preference in the allocation of one University Scholarship to a student who declares in writing that his studies are to be devoted to obtaining a degree in Agricultural Science.

SYLLABUS OF EXAMINATION.

pital, submitted by the County Manager, and a copy of which had been forwarded to each Member of the Council was considered.

COUNTY FEVER HOSPITAL AT WICKLOW.

"The continued difficulties experienced by the Medical Officer of the County Fever Hospital in the treatment of Fever Patients as a result of inadequate accommodation therein, having been brought to his notice, the County Manager inspected the Institution on Wednesday, the 10th October, 1945, when the position was found to be as follows:-

'The Hospital, which was opened by the late Board of Health and Public Assistance in 1929, when the Shillelagh Fever Hospital was closed, consists of 3 wards, capable of accommodating 15 patients, 2 nurses' bedrooms (a large room divided), 1 bedroom for Matron, 1 Small room which serves as a sittingroom, dining room, and Matron's Office, 1 kitchen with pantry or store, 4 lavatories Very inadequate provision exists for the carrying out of launtry work. Since 1st Oct., 1943, an epidemic of diphtheria has existed in the County, particularly in the Wicklow/Rathnew area. A table showing the number and classification of cases of infectious disease treated in the Hospital during each of the 9<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> years to 30th September, 1945, is attached. "It has been found difficult and indeed, sometimes impossible,

to find accommodation for patients either in St. Columcille's, Cork Street, or Naas Fever Hospitals, during this period. As a temporary expedient a wooden annexe to the Hospital was edected in February. experient a wooden annexe to the Hospital was elected in February. 1944, providing accommodation for an additional 15 patients. In January last, however, this further accommodation also proved in-adequate, necessitating the renting of rooms in a nearby house to ac-commodate the Nursing Staff, thereby making available their rooms in the Hospital for use of patients. The total beds now available in the Institution is 36. "No natients other than Diphtheria cases have been treated in

"No patients other than Diphtheria cases have been treated in the Hospital, since December, 1943. Infectious cases other than Diphtheria are sent to Loughlinstown or Naas Hospitals.

Diphtheria are sent to Loughlinstown or Naas Hospitals. "The number of patients in the Hospital on the day of the County Manager's inspection was 37. The housing of patients in the Annexe and also the provision for laundry work is unsatisfactory from every point of view. If the epidemic continues over a further pro-longed period, the question of alternative accommodation must be-come an absolute necessity. However, the difficulty of finding such alternative accommodation is very great. It is unlikely that a new Fever Hospital could be provided and ready for use, for at least five vears.

years. "In an effort to solve this acute problem, the County Manager, Dillon, Mr. Dillon, accompanied by the Medical Officer of the Institution, Mr. Dillon, B.E., Assistanc Engineer, the County Secretary, and members of his staff, inspected the Marine Hotel, The Murrough, Wicklow, on Friday, 12th inst, with a view to exploring the possibility of utilising this building as an alternative to the present Hospital. The building, which seems to be in comparatively good order, and is not at present in use, would be capable of accommodating over 50 patients, in addi-tion to the Fever Hospital Staff, leaving ample provision for other services. The Hotel is leased by the Wicklow Urban Council to the Irish Transport and General Workers' Union, at £15 per annum, the Lessee paying rates, taxes, etc. The unexpored period of the Lease is 57 years.

"The Medical Officer, Dr. Conway, agreed that the accommoda-tion offered by the proposed acquisition of the Marine Hotel, would; on the whole, be satisfactory, and certainly would be a vast improve-

ment on existing conditions. "Pending receipt of a report from the Assistant Engineer, Mr. Dillon, setting out the extent and cost of repairs and improvements necessary to fit up the building as a temporary hospital, the Co Manager deferred further consideration of the proposal to his sitting on Wednesday, 17th October."

"A further inspection of the Marine Hotel was carried out by the County Engineer and Medical Officer of the Fever Hospital on 29th October, with a view to the allocation of rooms in the building for use of patients and the accommodation of the Staff in the event of the premises being acquired for use as a Hospital. The accommoda-

tion which can be provided, is as follows:--Ground Floor.--1 ten-bed ward, 1 four-bed ward, Doctor's room, room for medicines and medical stores, nurses' sitting room, nurses' dining room, childrens' playroom, maids room, bathroom, kitchen, and spacious hall and waiting room.

First Floor—1 eight-bed ward, 1 three-bed ward, 4 two-bed wards, Matron's bed-sittingroom, 3 nurses' bedrooms, 2 bathrooms, 2 toilets, washbasins, etc., and linen press. A Chara, With reference to your letter of the 15th inst. to the Secretary: With reference to your letter of the form inst. to the Secretary, when the withdrawal of Passenger train services on the Naas/Wick-low Branch line was under consideration due to insufficiency of fuel to maintain Rail services generally, a survey of the area was canted out for the purpose of ascertaining how the substitute road service could be best operated, and it was found that owing to the unsuita-bility of the road between Dunlavin and Grange Con, this latter dilage could not be served by 'bus, and consequently the service to Tullow had to be operated to Carrierower Cross and then vis the main toad had to be operated to Carriggower Cross, and then via the main road to Baltinglass.

The Company has always been prepared to operate a service via Grange Con provided the road is suitable, and is approved by the Minister for Local Government, but the Company could not under-take to contribute to the cost of improving the public road. The area is at present served by the Dublin/New Ross and Dublin/Tullow Mise, le meas, services.

I am directed by the Minister for Local Government and Public Health to state that in connection with the appointment of visiting committees for institutions, it is considered desirable to draw attention to the procedure to be followed and to the functions which could be assigned to such committees. Visiting Committees of mental hospitals are appointed under Section 34 of the County Management Act, 1940, and the duties of these bodies are

laid down in that section. The Public Assistance Act, 1939, Section 11, regulates the procedure for the appointment of committees under that Act. It is open to a county council to appoint a visiting committee for each of the institutions estab-lished under the Act or one committee for all such institutions. It is not necessary that all the members of a visiting committee should be county councillors, but the county council will no doubt consider it desirable that the members of the council should be in the majority on the committee. The function of such a visiting committee might be as follows: 1. To inspect the institution and examine the state of the fabric of the

2. To visit the patients or inmates and give them full opportunity for

3. To hear (in private if so requested) any complaint made by a patient

or inmate. To inquire into the condition of patients or inmates as the case may be.

5. To report to the county council on any matters, other than matters relating to the remuneration, privileges or superannuation of officers, which they consider should be brought before the council.

6. To enter in a special book (to be provided for the purpose) any remarks the visiting committee think proper in regard to the institution, or the state of the patients or inmates therein. Such statements should be signed by the members making the entry.

It would be open to a county council to authorise a visiting committee to act collectively or by any two or more members nominated by them A committee should be entitled to visit district institutions at all reasonable times, whether or not accompanied by the county manager and should have free access to every part of the institution and to require during the time of their visit the attendance of the principal officer of the institution. The County Manager submitted the following Statement relative to

the Small Dwellings Acts: SMALL DWELLINGS ACTS.

Arrangements can be made at any time to formulate a Scheme making arrangements for Loans under these Small Dwellings Acts. In fact, such a Scheme, prescribing the conditions under which the Council would be a scheme, prescribing the conditions under which the Council would be prepared to make advances was prepared some years ago. Applications for Loans were then received from a number of persons, but advances were not made owing to certain difficulties which the Council's legal adviser drew attention to in connection with the operation of the Acts. The Scheme-consequently was not put into operation, and the Council did not borrow any money for the purpose

any money for the purpose. The legal advice tendered to the Council at that time indicated that difficulty might arise in connection with advances to persons whose holdings were subject to the payment of Land Annuities. The existence of such Annuities gave the Land Commission a prior charge on the holding. Under the provisions of the Land Act, 1927, if Land Annuities were considerably in arrear, the Land Commission might arrange for the sale of the holding without regard to any other charges on the property. The Opinion of Senior Counsel was to the effect that the County Council, in consequence, would not be well advised in accepting a charge to secure a Loan under the Small Dwellings Acts on a holding which, although held in fee simple, was subject to a Land Annuity.

Subject to a hand Annuity. Until such time as there is some indication from the State as to national policy in relation to housing, it does not seem advisable to put into operation the provision of the Small Dwellings Acts. At present build-ing can only be carried on under Licence. There is a shortage of building materials, and such materials as are available are in short supply and ing can only be carried on under Licence. There is a shortage of building materials, and such materials as are available are in short supply, and can only be secured at prohibitive cost. Furthermore, there is the important question of obtaining the necessary money for the purpose of making advances. When there is an indication as to the conditions on which money can be borrowed, and the rate of interest at which it can be obtained, then the Centrel can again consider this question. The rate of interest then the Council can again consider this question. The rate of interest and the level of building costs are, of course, important matters for borrowers, as on them will depend the charges for which they will be liable in respect of advances. It would not, for instance, be in the interest of in respect of advances. It would not, for instance, be in the interest of borrowers that they should incur very heavy annual charges consequent on high building costs and high interest rates. Moreover, the primary obliga-tion of the Council must be to endeavour to secure that persons, at present living in unhealthy dwellings, are properly rehoused. The Council's credit, accordingly, must be used towards the latter end. As already mentioned, however, the whole question can be again investigated on the resumption of however, the whole question can be again investigated on the resumption of nowever, the whole question can be again investigated on the resumption of normal building operations. At present there is no evidence that even if the Council were to borrow money for the purpose of the Small Dwellings Acts, there would be a demand for such Loans.

The Council having passed the Resolution on a show of hands, the County Manager stated he would make inquiries from the Department of a Local Government and Public Health as to the prospects of money being DEC 1945 available for the purpose of the Acts at a low rate of interest. In reply to inquiry by Councillor P. McCarthy, the County Secretary read the following report received from the County Surveyor regarding remedied. Arklow Rock Water Supply:-

#### 1st December, 1945. ARKLOW ROCK WATER SUPPLY.

I have submitted plans to the Department of Local Government for the supply of water to the Arklow Rock District. Estimated population—50. Although the scheme is a small one, a considerable time has been Dear Sir spent in investigating the possibility of a gravity supply, and the quantity of water available from a convenient source.

The only available water convenient source. The only available water convenient to the district in any quantity is a small well giving a minimum supply of 1.000 g.p.d. This water would be collected through slow sand filtration and stored in a tank of 7,000-gallon capacity (one week's supply), pumped once a week to a high level reservoir tank of equal capacity. The estimated cost of the work would be £1.385.

If the Department would give a grant of 30 per cent., the cost to the rates would be £970.

I am not altogether satisfied with the proposal as it stands, on account of the cost and having regard to the small number of people to be served, but after long consideration, I feel that it is the best which can be done under the circumstances.

## WEEKLY PAYMENTS TO ROAD WORKERS.

In connection with the proposal to substitute weekly payments to Road Workers in lieu of the present system of fortnightly payments, a number of important considerations have to be taken into account.

number of important considerations have to be taken into account. In the first instance, the making of weekly payments would result in a substantial increase in the work requiring to be discharged by the County Council's Accounts Department. In fact, it would mean that the clerical and accounting work would be doubled, and it is reasonable to assume twice the present clerical staff would be requisite. The additional cost to the Council of weekly payment arrangement, as far as intern office staff is concerned, would be approximately £300 to £400 per annum. In addition, the County Secretary, would have to devote more time to this feature of the County Secretary would have to devote more time to this feature of the Council's work,

The weekly payment system would involve considerable additional work for the Assistant Engineers and the County Engineer, and also for the office staff employed in the County Engineer's department. A special report on this aspect of the matter has been furnished by the County Engineer, and submitted to the Council for its information. In this report the County Engineer pointed out that three additional clerks would be required for his department, and, in addition, it would be necessary to make over-time payments to Overseers, and extra travelling expenses would be claimed by Engineers. Furthermore, there would be increased expenditure on postage, wages sheets, paying orders, and other stationery sequirements. The additional cost in the County Engineer's department has been estimated by him at £1,400 per annum.

It is evident, therefore, that the inauguration of the weekly payment system to Road Workers would, under all headings, result in an increased annual expenditure of approximately £1,800, which is equivalent to 11d. in the £ on County Rates.

The County Engineer in his report has directed attention to the amount of the Engineers' and Overseers' time which, even under present arrangements, requires to be devoted to checking pay sheets, and other work of a clerical and accounting nature. He has emphasised that wen

It must be borne in mind that, quite apart from the clerical work involved in connection with the keeping of the records required for working of wages payments there has been a continuous from the clerical work involved in connection with the keeping of all tourised in required for vouching of wages payments, there has been a continuous expansion in recent years, in other duties of a clerical nature devolving on the Council's Engineers:—the preparation of plans, estimates, and speci-fications for works; reports on works in progress; carrying out of special inspections; repairs to Council's houses and other Council property; repairs and improvements to water supplies, pumps, and severage services; turf and improvements to water supplies, pumps, and sewerage services; turi-production records; A.R.P. Scheme arrangements and records—all these have resulted in additional administrative and clerical work requiring to be discharged by the Engineers. If there were any further encroachment on the time of the Engineers and Overseers, it is evident that insufficient time would be available to them for the purpose of supervision of works and ensuring that such works are being administered with due regard to economy and efficiency and efficiency

In the near future, it is to be expected that there will be an expansion In the near future, it is to be expected that there will be an expansion in the duties to be discharged by the Council's Engineers. Post-Emergency Schemes costing substantial sums have already been formulated, and the Council's Engineering Staff must be in a position to carry them out when instructions to this effect are received. In addition, it is reasonable to expect that monies will be available from the Road Fund for road improve-ment works. It would be altogether undesirable that the carrying out of much works. It would be altogether undesirable that the carrying out of such works, which will give additional employment in the County, should

be adversely affected in any way. The Road employees were, in accordance with the wishes of the Council, asked for their views on the proposed introduction of weekly wages payment system. It is noted that in the replies received 58.66 per cent. favoured the introduction of the system, while 41.34 per cent. saw no objection to the present system. It is evident from these replies, therefore, that a substantial majority of the present employees of the Council does

that a substantial majority of the present employees of the Council does not demand the introduction of the suggested change. Taking into account all the foregoing circumstances, to each of which due weight has been given, the County Manager is of the opinion that it would not be in the interests of the Council to alter the present system of payment. The adoption of the proposal would, in the first instance, involve substantial additional cost to the Council's funds. This aspect of the matter is one of considerable importance when viewed in the light that the annual charge of £1,800, to which reference has been made, would be the annual charge of £1,800, to which reference has been made, would be equivalent to Loan Charges on essential public works costing £24,000—Capital costs repayable over 20 years. The Council in the immediate future will have to make the necessary provision for desirable and urgent public health works, and for housing requirements. The carrying out of such works, whilst essential in the interests of the community, will also give much needed additional employment. It seems, therefore, that, in view of the Council's obligations in this respect, it is undesirable that additional expenditure, the necessity for which is not conclusively evident, should be incurred. incurred.

Moreover, as already indicated, it is undesirable that there should be any further encroachment on the time of the County and Assistant Engineers in order that it may be ensured that the required standards of efficiency in connection with the Council's works should be maintained. Finally, it is not evident that any undue hardship arises under the present system of payment.

For a considerable number of years Road Workers and Carters employed icklow County Council have been completely dissatisfied with the very by Wicklow County Council have been completely dissatisfied with the ver-low rates of payment which they received. Since 1939 the cost-of-line Incex Figure has risen 173 to 294. In the same period the wages of work referred to have been raised by only 2/6. It must seem very obvious to ver-as it does to members of the Council, that the present rates of 39/- to 10/60for Read Workers and 13/6d, per day for Carters bear very little relation to the high cest of the necessities of life. In pre-war years these workers were regarded by most people as being harshly treated. Their condition, at the moment, is infinitely worse than it has ever been.

The Council has on more than one occasion, and again quite recently in support of a resolution which I moved, expressed its unanimous wish to see the wages of road workers and carters increased. Our efforts have always been thwarted by the invoking of obscure and ill-considered Emergency regulations.

Now, Sir, we have a new development. The Minister for Industry and Commerce has recently admitted that the cost of living has again risen, and he has increased the permissive Emergency Bonus by 4/-. Everybody knows that this pronouncement is overdue and the amount insufficient, but it does mean that thousands of industrial workers, whose wages already are far in excess of roadmen's and carters', will have their payments augmented further further.

Surely, it would be no more than Christian justice that the road workers and carters should, even at this late stage, be given consideration also. They, tco, in common with Urban and City dwellers, must wrestle with problems of high prices for food, clothing and she'ter.

I would be glad if you would place this letter on the Agenda for the next Council meeting, so that you will be enabled to see that the full support of the Council will be forthcoming for the proposal contained herein. Yours faithfu

## PROVISIONAL ROAD WORKS SCHEME.

Item No. 4 .- Reference was made by several members to the large increase in the cost of the Provisional Road Works Scheme as submitted to the meeting and they expressed the views that a Special Meeting should be called to deal with the matter.

The County Manager read a letter, dated 15th December, 1945, received from the Department of Local Government and Public Health in which the Minister strongly advised local authorities to take advantage of the improved supply conditions to carry out surface treatment of roads to the fullest extent possible, and stated that it was very desirable that a great effort should be made in the coming year to prevent any further deterioration in the roads. The County Engineer was

directed to prepare as quickly as possible estimates of the various classes of works necessary for the surface treatment of roads.

The County Manager directed special attention to the last paragraph of the letter which read as follows:--

"It is most important that this work should be planned so that it may be carried out with the maximum speed possible with the plant and labour likely to be available. The aim should be to complete the work in two years and in the larger counties in three years. Considera-tion should be given to the possibility of accelerating the speed of the work by the employment of public works contractors to supplement the activities of the County Engineer's organisation.

The County Manager stated that the Estimates as submitted would require an increase of approximately 5s, in the rates for the com-ing year. If the amount provided for improvements were reduced to the neuron minimum a varia of 7a 2d months will be been approximately for the provided to the very minimum a rate of 3s. 3d. would still be required.

I would like to add that at the time of Mr. Doyle's appointment in 1922 it was decided by the then Wicklow Council to transfer Kilmacanogue to my collecting district, but the Local Government Board refused to sanction same on the grounds that Mr. Doyle had already been sanctioned for the whole area. Doyle had already been sanctioned for the whole area,

The following is a detailed statement of the respective valuations of the two districts:-

No. 8 District: Enniskerry £5.552; Powerscourt £3,147-Total £8,699. No. 7 District: Greystones £12,410; Delgany £4,779; and Kilmacanogue £9,794-Total £26,983.

If the proposed change were made to equalise the two districts it would leave Enniskerry, Powerscourt, and Kilmacanogue £18,493 and Greystones and Delgany £17,189. The lower total valuation would carry the most rates because the Greystones and Delgany area would be very slightly affected by the Agricultural Grant where as the other three Electoral Divisions would be very much affected.

I therefore request that you place my proposal before the County Council for their consideration at the forthcoming meeting on the 14th inst.

The County Manager gave particulars of the number of vouchers allocated to County Wicklow, and explained the method of allocation. The Council requested the Manager to make represen-tations to the Minister for Local Government and Public Health for an increased allocation to the County, and to ask the Minister for Industry and Commerce to allow retailers to sell footwear which they at present hold in stock at present hold in stock.

#### Bray Hospital Scheme.

Councillor Dunne inquired the present position of the Hospital Councillor Dufine induired the present position of the Hospital Scheme as regards Bray Area. The Secretary stated that in October, 1944, the Committee for the Area had investigated proposed sites for new Hospital, accompanied by the County Manager and the Chief Officer, and they agreed that it would be preferable to utilise St. Columcille's Hospital and Loughlinstown Hospital for patients from the Bray Area, that Hospital being substantially enlarged and im-proved. The Estimate submitted by the County Engineer provided for a total expenditure of £130,276 as compared with expendi-ture of £52,000 allowed by the Council for the current year, 1945/1946. The County Engineer pointed out that in the coming year it is necessary to provide for the surfacing and tar-dressing of roads in order that they might be brought to a reasonable standard as soon necessary to provide for the surfacing and tar-dressing of roads in order that they might be brought to a reasonable standard as soon as possible, and he emphasised that if such work were not carried out, there was the danger that there would be grave and rapid deterioration in the condition of the roads, especially the main roads. The estimate for Main Road Repairs prepared by the County Engineer was £61,515; in the current year the total sum allowed by the Council for main road remains was 624.317. It was indicated that the estimate

The estimate for Main road repairs products in allowed by the Council was £61,515; in the current year the total sum allowed by the Council for main road repairs was £24,317. It was indicated that the estimate for the coming year in respect of main roads includes the first part of a three years' programme of works for the re-surfacing and talling of roads.
The following Resolutions were passed by the Council, and I "as instructed to submit them for the consideration of the Minister for Local Government and Public Health:—

(a) Proposed by Councillor J. J. McCrea;
Seconded by Councillor C. W. Hudson;

Resolved: "That we call on the Department to indicate immediately what are the prospects of funds being made available to carry, out the large scale road improvements, plans for which are pow being prepared by a staff of special Engineers over a considerable period. If the Department is unable to indicate any definite proposals in this respect, this Council will be unable to decide on the amount to be raised in 1946/47 for the maintenance or improvement of the County Road System. County Road System.

"In addition, we require an indication as to the rates of wages which the Minister will agree to sanction for Road Workers engaged on Council's Road Schemes in the coming financial year."

(b) Proposed by Councillor S. Dunne; Seconded by Councillor C. M. Byrne:

Resolved: "That consideration of the Road Works Scheme for 1946/47 be deferred to a Special Meeting to be held when the Minister's reply has been received to Councillor McCrea's resolution." Passed unanimously.

During the discussion prior to the adoption of the foregoing Resolutions, it was represented by members of the Council that recoupment of 40 per cent. of the cost of Main Road maintenance would be altogether inadequate in view of the very heavy and increased commitments which the Council were being asked to undertake in respect of Road Works in the coming year, and the view was expressed that since the works now requiring to be undertaken, while of an abnormal nature, and quite distinct from the type of maintenance which the Council hitherto in the years prior to 1939/1940 would have been required to carry out, the State should allow increased Grants towa.ds a special Three Years' Programme of Road Works, which were intended to restore as soon as possible the Road System to a satis actory condition.

A Chara. The position of the Road Fund does not yet justify the resumed issue of improvement grants, and the Council should therefore proceed on the basis that the I position in regard to improvements is the same as in the current year.

It was pointed out in the Department's letter of the 15th ultimo that it is likely that tar and bitumen products are likely to be in normal supply in the coming year, and that local authorities should therefore arrange for the carrying out of surface treatment of roads to the fullest extent possible. The prevention of further deterioration of the roads, particularly the main roads, is of prior urgency, and the Council should plan to overtake the war-time deficiencies in surface treatment in the manner suggested in the Department's letter referred to. This will not be possible without a substantial increase in expendi-ture by the Council. It is to be remembered that owing to the war-time rise in wages and costs generally, the amount of effective work which can be done  $\pounds$  for  $\pounds$  has declined sharply as compared with pre-war years, and this trend has been accentuated by the fact that less money has been provided by the Council for maintenance works every year since 1941-42. 1. The Council considered the following Statement prepared by the County Manager, and which was circulated to each Member regarding the amounts which, in his opinion, would be required to be raised for the service of the financial year ending on the 31st March, 1947. To: The Chairman and Members

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen, Estimates of expenses and receipts for the year ending 31st March, 1947, together with Tables giving explanatory details, are attached.

The increase, therefore, in the nett amount requiring to be raised in the coming year is £11,853. The Estimates now submitted will require a rate levy of 15/11d. in the £.

The Agricultural Grant, which at present amounts to £42,831, cannot be taken into account when determining the rates in the  $\pounds$ ; the Grant is applied towards the relief of Rates on Agricultural Land when the rates on each agricultural holding are being assessed. The Primáry Allowance on foot of the Agricultural Grant at present is equivalent to an abatement in rates of 5/9 d. in the £.

The Estimates submitted at this time last year provided for a rate of  $15/6\frac{1}{2}d$ . in the £. The Council, however, decided to raise a rate of  $13/6\frac{1}{2}d$ . The balance had to be found by the application of credits. These credits represented sums which were held for the purpose of meeting the cost of maintaining the Council's services until moneys became available by means of current rate collection. Consequent on such credits having become exhausted, the Council in the present year has had to avail of Bank Overdraft. Such Bank Over-draft in the year 1945/46 will cost approximately £300. In the coming year this accommodation will cost £500, which is equivalent to a rate of 1d. in the £. It is not advisable to incur an interest charge of this nature, but since the rate levy for the current year required an appropriation of credits, temporary accommodation had to be procured from the Council's Treasurer. All available credits have now been exhausted and Estimates now presented for the coming year cannot be reduced by such a means.

In the year 1937/'38, prior to outbreak of war, the rate levied In the year 1937/'38, prior to outbreak of war, the rate levied was  $12/0^{3}$ d. in the £. There were reductions in the years 1938/'39 and 1939/'40, and in the years 1941/'42 and 1942/'43 it reached approximately. 13/- in the £. In the year 1943/'44 the Council levied a rate of  $14/2^{1}$ d. in the £, but in the following year it was reduced to  $12/10^{1}$ d., whilst in the present year it is  $13/6^{1}$ d. If the rate for 1943/'44 has been considered necessary to meet requirements for that year, then in the subsequent two years at least a similar rate in the £ should have been required. In any appraisement of the different rate levies, it must be borne in mind that there has been a continuous increase in the past three years in the cost of the services to be maintained by the past three years in the cost of the services to be maintained by the Council owing to the rise in prices of supplies, which has occurred in the meantime, and the cost of emergency bonuses payable to the Council's staff and employees. In this connection it should be mentioned that emergency bonuses were not payable at the date of determination of the rate levy for the year 1943/'44: Price indices of commodities and the cost of living index figures confirm the evidence as to rising costs shown by the Council's accounts. For example, the cost of supplies for institutions has continued to increase each year; in 1943/'44 the cost of food, etc., was £7,677; for the coming year the estimate is £8,830. Emergency bonuses to Council's staff and employees did not become payable until the end of 1943; in the coming year the cost under this heading will be £6,200. A further item to be considered in comparing the Estimated Rate for the coming year with the rates levied in previous year is that costs hitherto met by means of Separate Charges are now charged over the entire County Health District. These costs in the coming year represent a flat rate over the County Health District of almost 10d. in the £. The rate of 14/22d. in the £ in 1943/'44, taking this latter consideration into account, would represent a rate for the County Health District of 15/01d. in the £.

In the details given hereunder comparisons are shown between the costs in the coming year and present year, and in previous years. ROADS: The amounts included for Main Roads in the coming year are:

Towards the cost of repairs a Government Grant of £13,552 (40%) will be available, which leaves the amount to be borne by Rates at £25.227.

The nett cost of Main Roads defrayable from Rates in the present year is £18,290, and the increased provision for Main Roads in the year 1946/47 is approximately £7,000.

The cost of County Roads for the coming year is estimated at £24,786; in the present year the amount provided was £23,894. The increase under this heading is £802.

The Road Estimates prepared by the County Engineer have been very carefully examined, and it will be noted that substantial reduc-

25 FEB 1946 tions have been made in the figures submitted by him. It has been strongly represented by the County Engineer that if the deterioration in Main Roads, which has resulted from the inability to maintain them in recent years, is not checked without delay, the cost of reconditioning them at a later date will be altogether greater.

conditioning them at a later date will be altogether greater. The extra expenditure now provided for does not allow of the completion of anything like one-third of the programme originally outlined by the County Engineer; the sums allowed will merely cover the cost of very urgent resurfacing of selected sections of the roads carrying exceptionally heavy traffic. In any assessment of the results which at present may be achieved from expenditure on road works, it must be taken into account that wages in recent years have in-creased by about 30%, whilst the cost of Tar has shown an increase of about 250%.

PUBLIC ASSISTANCE: Mention already has been made of the progressive increase in recent years in the cost of County Institutions. These increases may be illustrated by comparison of the costs under the following headings for 1938/'39 and estimates in the coming year:

Whilst the cost of Home Assistance has not shown a marked increase in recent years, the Council, however, has had to contribute from the Rate Fund the sum of approximately £1,400 to the Supple-mentary Allowance Scheme, under which vouchers for food are made available to necessitous persons. In addition, the Council has to contribute annually the sum of £350 towards the Footwear Scheme. The cost of hearding out children has improved in worset week contribute annually the sum of £350 towards the Footwear Scheme. The cost of boarding-out children has increased in recent years— in 1939/'40 it was £1,690; for the coming year it is estimated at £3,050. The cost of main of the coming year 1946/47 the estimate is £7,400. The minimum of patients sent for treatment to such Institutions has shown a ter incy to increase, but the main cause of the added cost is the rise in weekly wages charges.

cost is the rise in weekly wages charges. **HEALTH CHARGES:** Consequent on the coming into operation of the Fire Brigades Act, 1940, it was necessary for the Council to chablish its own Fire Fighting Service. This is 4 very essential Service, but its costs have to be defrayed completely from the Rate Fund. At present the Council's Engineering Staff is endeavouring to bring this Service up to as high a standard of efficiency as possible, and the Estimates for the coming year include provision for the purchase of additional equipment, etc. The cost of the Service is roughly equivalent to a rate of 13d. in the £. As already mentioned, the costs of Public Health Services, which formerly were defrayed by means of Separate Charges, now are being met from the general rate levy on the County Health District Services included under this heading are—Water Supplies, Sewerage Schemes and Public Lighting. It is scarcely necessary to mention that in the

and Public Lighting. It is scarcely necessary to mention that in the and rubite highling. It is scarcely necessary to mention that in the past 15 years there have been considerable additions to these Services, and there is a growing and insistent demand for further expansion. It must, however, be pointed out, that Schemes such as Water Supplies, Sewerage, and Public Lighting yield scarcely any revenue towards the Severage, and Fubic Lighting yield scarcely any revenue towards the meeting of capital charges and maintenance costs involved. Every additional Scheme, therefore, must inevitably lead to an increase in the rate levy. Whilst it probably is correct to say that Wicklow is in odvance of most other Counties in the provision of such essential Public Health Services, it must not be overlooked that their provision has resulted in an increase in the rate demand.

JOINT DISTRICT CHARGES: For the coming year the amount to be provided for the County Tuberculosis Scheme is £526 in excess to be provided for the County Tuberculosis Scheme is £526 in excess of that provided in the current year. This increase is due to the necessity for providing for Fodd and Clothing for T.B. patients. The Tuberculosis and Schools Medical Schemes are two services in which there has been considerable expansion during the past ten years. Whilst 50% of the cost of these Schemes is recouped from State Funds the amount to be met from Rates, however, will be appreciably higher in the coming year than was the case a number of years ago.

HOUSING CHARGES: The amount to be levied under this HOUSING CHARGES: The amount to be levied under this heading is £19,708, which compares with £18,349 required in the current year. The Housing Deficit which has to be met from the Rate Fund is equivalent to a rate of 1/8d. in the £; ten years ago the rate required for this purpose was 7d. The number of cottages at present owned by the Council is 2,695; 15 years ago it was 958. These figures are evidence of the progress made in rural housing in the intervening years. The cost of repairs for the coming year is estimated at £4,000. The increase in recent years in housing costs is due to: (1) Necessity for subsidising from rates the rents of the houses built by the Council:

houses built by the Council;

(2) Increased outlay on repairs.

The increase in the prices of materials is reflected in the charges The increase in the prices of materials is reflected in the charges for repairs; timber and other supplies nowadays cost more than twice as much as they did six or seven years ago. In view of the high rate at present required for housing, and, since it is to be expected that in the coming year's capital expenditure on new housing schemes will make further demands on the County Rates, it is felt necessary to refer to the desirability of cottage tenants co-operating with the Council in ensuring that repairs are not due to wilful damage or neglect.

GENERAL PURPOSES: In the coming year provision of £230 has been made for 3 University Scholarships. Secondary Scholarships show an increase from £1,175 to £1,595. The Demand for Grangegorman Mental Hospital shows an increase of £3,000, and that from the County Committee of Agricul-ture is higher by £554.

ture is higher by £554. There has been a progressive increase in the cost of Reformator-ies and Industrial Schools. In 1938/'39 the amount necessary was £681; in the coming year the sum of £1.800 is required. Sheep Dipping Expenses include provision for new Baths. The sum provided for this purpose is £200. The foregoing items which represent a substantial part of County Expenditure are taken as representative of the tendency towards increased costs in the services to be maintained by the Council. It will be appreciated, moreover, that such increases are influenced by factors outside the Council's control, such as the general increase in price levels and wages since 1939.

Net Amount to be Levied .. ..

In this survey of the Council's Services reference has been made to the items which account in major part for the increase in the rate levy in recent years. It may be instructive, however, to institute a comparison between the rates leviable off Agricultural Land in the past comparison between the rates leviable on Agricultural Land in the past 20 years. In the year 1925/'26 the average poor rate in the County was 8/3d. The Agricultural Grant for that year, which then was applied at the same rate to all lands irrespective of valuation, was equivalent to a rate of 1s. 4d. in the £. The net rate payable on agricultural land, therefore, was 6/11d. Every item in the Estimate now submitted has been carefully checked and reviewed, and it is considered that the minimum rate which it will be present to leave in order to maintain the County

I am directed by the Minister for Local Government and Public Health to state that he has under consideration the making of grants to County Councils from the Road Fund in the coming financial year The condition of the roads has deteriorated considerably during the The condition of the roads has deteriorated considerably during the emergency period owing to the inability of County Councils to obtain the necessary materials for carrying out the normal maintenance of roads by surface dressing. In the present year bituiminous materials for road surfacing are again available and the Minister is anxious that the County Councils should use such materials to the greatest extent possible. It is extremely important that this be done in order to restore the roads to a proper standard and also to prevent further deteriora-tion where the existing road surface is showing signs of weakening. As there is a reasonable prospect of obtaining road materials this year the County Surveyor should be asked to state if his estimate of road expenditure provides for the maximum amount of restoration work that could be undertaken in the coming year. Where possible his estimate should be increased to provide for the maximum amount being estimate should be increased to provide for the maximum amount being

To restore the roads to a proper standard will involve consider-able expenditure and in order that the position may be dealt with adequately in the present year by County Councils, the Minister as a purely temporary measure limited to the financial year commencing on the 1st April, is prepared to offer to County Councils special assist-ance out of the Road Fund o nthe following basis:—

AUDITOR'S REPORT FOR PERIOD ENDED 31st MARCH, 1945:-The Report of the Local Government Auditor for the period ended 31st March, 1945, which had been circulated to the Members of the Council was marked "Read," it being agreed that there was not any item therein which called for comment from the Council. The Manager mentioned that appropriate action had been taken in connection with certain routine matters of administration referred to therein.

EXTENTION OF REGULATION UNDER THE DOGS ACT, 1906. The Council decided to adjourn consideration of communication from the Chief Superintendent, Garda Siochana, Bray, regarding the extension of Regulations for the prevent on of Dogs Straying during the night.

ASSISTANCE, HEALTH AND HOUSING. ARKLOW CEMETERY:

Councillor McCarthy mentioned that consequent on representa-tions made to the Manager, it had been agreed to allow overtime pay to the Caretaker for burials on Saturday (half-day), and Sundays, such work being outside of normal working hours. He stated, however, that the Manager in his Order on this subject had directed that such over-time payments should be recouped from undertakers or persons ar-ranging burials on Saturdays and Sundays, and he (Councillor McCarthy) objected to th's arrangement. The Manager agreed to give the matter further consideration.

# BLESSINGTON HOUSING SCHEME:

Members referred to the delay in the completion of Housing Scheme o nsite at Blessington, and the delay in occupation of such houses by the tenants to whom they had been allocated. The Manager explained that delay had occurred in the making of water and sever connections owing to the refusal of a land-owner to allow facilities for laying of pipes. The matter had been receiving expecial attention and it was expected that the houses chould be especial attention, and it was expected that the houses should be ready for occupation within a further 10-14 days. HOUSING SITE AT TINAHELY:

Reference was made to the possibility of procuring an alterna-tive site for cottages at Tinahely. The site which it was proposed to use was required as a sports field, and Members represented that, if possible, an alternative site should be procured. After discussion it was decided that the Council's Engineer and the Tinahely Committee should have been superstitute for the procure of the time set. should have joint consultations for the purpose of investigating the possibility of obtaining an alternative site, PUBLIC ASSISTANCE:

The Manager undertook to investigate a number of matters re-lating to Public Assistance which were brought to his notice by the Members.

EMERGENCY BONUS TO BUILDERS' LABOURERS AND PAINTERS: Councillor J. Everett, T.D., enquired as to the delay in allowing an increased emergency bonus to builders' labourers and painters in the employment of the Council. The Manager stated that this matter had been under consultation, and that a decision would be taken at an early date.

## HOSPITAL SITES:

In reply to enquiries, the Manager stated that thus far no report had been received from the Architect engaged by the Council on the sites for the proposed new County Hospital and County Fever Hospital. The Architect had again been reminded of the matter, and had been asked to submit his report without delay.

FENCING OF COTTAGE PLOTS, ETC.

The Manager Stated that consideration would be given to repre-sentations made by Members regarding the fencing of cottage plots, and the provision of allotments. TURF PRODUCTION:

Councillor P. P. O'Reilly referred with dissatisfaction to rates of pay allowed by contractors engaged by the Council for the produc-tion of turf, and other Members referred to complaints regarding the quality of the turf supplied to Grangegorman Mental Hospital. The Chairman stated that it appeared that turf supplied to Grangegorman Mental Hospital was mainly produced by contractors, and suggested that if the Council's own workmen were employed, production might be more satisfactory.

The County Engineer gave details of the weekly rates of pay to workmen employed by the County Council and by contractors. The wages payable by contractors had to be stabilised on the basis of wages wages payable by contractors had to be stabilised on the object of wages paid by the County Council to the workmen employed on direct labour. The Engineer also gave details of deliveries to Grangegorman Mental Hosp'tal in the past year. Of 8,000 tons delivered, only 570 had been rejected as unsuitable. He stated that the complaints of the Grange-gorman Committees were based not on the presence of moisture in the turf, but on the grounds that turf from County Wicklow was not of a unsufficiently high coloring and with supplies from also sufficiently high calorific value as compared with supplies from else-where. The question of calorific value was one which could not be altered by a change in the methods of production; calorific value depended on the nature of the turf deposits, not on moisture content, merely

# WICKLOW COUNTY COUNCIL.

#### UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIP SCHEME, 1946.

Wicklow County Council offer for competition three (3) Scholar-ships value Seventy Pounds (£70) each annually, tenable for three years at the University College, Dublin (National University of Ireland) only, subject to the following conditions:-

1. Candidates, who shall not be more than nineteen (19) years of age, nor less than sixteen (16) years of age, on the first day of January, 1946, must be children of parents or guardians, who have resided continuously in the County of Wicklow for five years previous to the 1st January, 1946.

2. Competition for these Scholarships shall be confined to children whose parents or guardians

(a) occupy agricultural land the annual Poor Law Valuation of which does not exceed:— (i) £100 in the case of families of 3 children or less

(ii) £110 in the case of families of 4 children

(iii)  $\pounds$ 115 in the case of families of 5 children (iv)  $\pounds$ 120 in the case of families of 6 children or more;

(b) derive an annual income from all sources not exceeding
(i) £300 in the case of families of 3 children or less
(ii) £320 in the case of families of 4 children

(iii) £340 in the case of families of 5 children ('x) £360 in the case of families of 6 children or more.

Children referred to in this clause must be under 18 years of age.of 3. These University Scholarships will be awarded by Wicklow County Council on the recommendation of the Academic Council of University College, Dublin, on the results obtained by candidates for such Scholarships at the Leaving Certificate Examination to be held in 1946, subject to the following conditions:

(a) Candidates must pass the examination generally, and in addition must

(1) pass in the subjects required for Matriculation in the National University of Ireland; (2) pass in the subjects required for Matriculation for the faculty in which they intend to pursue courses for a degree.

(b) Candidates must present five subjects for the examination and

(1) must take at least three Honours Papers, one of which shall be Irish;

- (2) must obtain Honours in two subjects at least (one of which subjects shall be Irish); (3) must obtain a Pass in the other three subjects.
- (c) Candidates, as prescribed under conditions (a) and (b) must take the Honours Paper" in Ir'sh and obtain Honours in that subject, and the marks obtained in such subject shall be taken
- into account in determining the allocation of the Scholarships (d) The three Scholarships will be awarded to the candidates Mathematics, when they will be divided by three. When this has been done the marks obtained in Irish will be added to the highest marks of those obtained in four other subjects.

6. The sum of £5 will be advanced to the student, through the Bursar of the College, at the beginning of each Session. 7. The County Council will pay over 50 per cent of the Scholarship

in November of each year to the Bursar of University College, Dublin, and the remaining 50 per cent. in the following February, to be disbursed by him. The Bursar will deduct from the Scholarship the fees due to the College, and will pay the balance to the holder in three instalments, one in each term.

8. Applications for the renewal of the payments in respect of the Second and Third Year shall be made by each Scholarship holder, and no payment will be made in respect of the Second Year in the case of a Scholarship Holder who fails to produce a Certificate that he or she, has passed the first University Examination, and also a Certificate from the College, or the duly authorised Officer thereof, of good conduct and satisfactory progress during the previous year, and no payment will be made in respect of the Third Year in the case of a Scholar who fails to produce such a Certificate of satisfactory conduct and progress in respect of the year previous to the application for renewal.
