> ESTIMATES FOR FINANCIAL YEAR ENDING ON THL 31st MARCH, 1955.

Mr. Chairman and Gentlemen,

In the attached tables details are given of the Estimates of Expenditure and Receipts for the year ending on the 31st March, 1955. The Estimates will be considered at the statutory Estimates Meeting which this year will be held on Tuesday, 30th March, 1954.

The total expenditure for the coming year is estimated at £31646 and total receipts at £13789. The net amount to be levied from rates, therefore, is £17,857.

The expenditure under the four main accounting headings is given hereunder, with the corresponding figures adopted for 1953/54 shown in parenthesis:-

Credits of £471 are available and after the application of these the net amount required is reduced to £17386.

A rate of 1d. in the £ would produce £41. 4. 4. in the coming year and the net requirements of £17386 would require a rate of 35/2d. in the £, which would be an increase of 2/- over the rate for the present year which is 33/2d.

Whilst the increase in the Estimated Expenditure for the coming yea. is explained in detail later, it is found that the main item responsible is the County Council Demand. This Demand shows a rise of $\pounds 529$ which is equivalent to a rate of 1/1d. in the \pounds , Some of the other items causing the increase are:- Housing Repairs $\pounds 100$; provision of new sewerage outfall at Harbour $\pounds 78$; provision of new watermain at Harbour $\pounds 39$; Increase in Burial Board Demand $\pounds 27$; Additional public lighting $\pounds 25$; Water safety contribution $\pounds 40$.

ROADS: In the attached estimates the same provision as last year has again been made for the Council's contribution to Employment Schemes. viz: £75. In the present financial year a state grant of £350 was notified in October last. Later, however, the Department of Local Government indicated that an additional grant of £700 would be given provided that the Council contributed £70 extra. The Council agreed to make the additional contribution in order to avail of the latter grant. With the original grant the Council decided to carry out the following works:- Improvements to Convent Road, Cooper's Lane and Castle Street. The second grant was assigned to the following works:- -2-

Footpaths at Castle Street and High Street; improvement of corner at Castle Street; provision of road gullies at Monkton Row and Castle Street; drainage at Kilmantin Hill and improvements at Morton's Lane/Fitzwilliam Road.

For ordinary Road Maintenance the provision made is £579 which is similar to that allowed in the present year. This outlay is included to cover the cost of ordinary road repairs. In recent years the Council has allowed £280 for Special Works on roads such as tar spraying and re-surfacing, and the same amount has been included in the attached Estimates. The Town Surveyor, however, has submitted an estimate under this heading amounting to £1557. The list of works he has recommended is as follows:-

In submitting this list he states that the condition of certain roads in the Urban District is bad, owing to the fact that insufficient funds had been available to keep them in good repair and he has stressed it would be necessary to provide tar surface dressing for them as otherwise there would be danger of serious deterioration.

If, however, the Council were to provide from next year's rates the entire sum shown by the Town Surveyor the increase in rate would be very substantial; a rate of 2/6d. in £ would be required, in addition to the sum of £280 which is being included in the Estimates. It is suggested that, as in previous years, the Council might examine the foregoing list of works and determine the items which should be given priority, and be carried out by means of the £280, together with such Government Grants for Employment Schemes, as may be obtained.

The loan charges to meet the cost of improvement to St. Patrick's Road amount to £205; this is a slight reduction on last year's figures (£212).

Last year £134 was allowed to meet loan charges on the new concrete road at the Murrough. This, however, would only cover such charges for a half year on the Capital cost of £1750. Later, however the County Council agreed to give a contribution of £600 towards this work and this has resulted in a reduction in the loan charges. Consequently the loan charges for this Scheme in the coming year willbe £129, which, in fact, is somewhat slightly less than the provision made last year.

A member of the Council's staff retired in the present year and provision is to be made for a retiring allowance of £71, under the Local Government (Superannuation) Act, 1948.

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SANITARY SERVICES:

Water Supply: The provision made for the waterworks corresponds to that allowed for 1953/54. The Town Surveyor considers that it will be necessary to continue the special pumping arrangements from the stream at Marlton and a sum of £240 has been again included to cover the cost. As mentioned when submitting the Estimates last year it was necessary to have recourse to this arrangement in order to overcome the difficulties of water shortage, which would otherwise arise. It seems moreover that this is an arrangement which will have to be contined until the proposed Regional Scheme will be available to augument the insufficient supply from the existing source. As indicated to the Council at recent meetings it was not possible to make definite progress with the installation of the Regional Water Supply as the E.S.B. contemplated using Lough Dan for hydro-electric development. Recently, since definite information could not be obtained from the Board as to the date by which they would proceed with their Scheme, the Council's Consultant, was asked to prepare a modified Regional Scheme based on Vartry River, which could later be linked up with Dough Dan if the E.S.B. did not carry out their Scheme, or could be connected with the Storage Resevoir provided by the E.S.B. in the event of the hydroelectric development being undertaken. The designing of the Regional Scheme has become a complex matter owing to the many difficulties in-

Scheme has become a complex matter owing to the many difficulties involved, but it is hoped that it may be possible to make definite progress with the Scheme in the coming financial year. It will be appreciated that the resolving of the many difficulties which have been met has entailed much delay.

WATER SUPPLY TO HARBOUR: During the present year the Harbour Commissioners asked that a water main might be installed at the Harbour for the purpose of providing supplies for ships. The Council had some doubt as to whether this should be regarded as their responsibility, seeing that it was intended only to provide a facility for the Harbour Commissioners. It was decided to defer the matter until the Estimates Meeting and in the Estimates provision now has been made for an outlay of £78, subject to a contribution of half the cost (£39) from the Harbour Authority. It should be mentioned that there will be no commensurate yearly income to the Council which would offset the cost of this installation if it be approved.

SEWERAGE: The provision for ordinary maintenance (£77) is the same as in the present year, but £78 has been included to meet the cost of a new outfall sewer at the South Quay. This is a matter which was under consideration by the Council some time ago and it was decided to defer it until the Estimate Meeting.

DOMESTIC AND STREET SCAVENGING: The sum included is £640 which corresponds to the amount approved for 1953/54. In the Estimates no provision has been made for a General Domestic SCavenging Service, which again has been recommended by the County Medical Officer. It will be recollected, however, that the provision of a general household refuse collection service was very fully considered by the Council about two years ago and it was found that the cost to the rates would be about 1/6d to 2/- in the £. In these circumstances the Council felt that this provision should be deforred.

BURIAL GROUNDS: The Demand from the Rathdrum & Wicklow Joint Burial Board for the mainteance of the cemetery at Merrymeeting, Rathnew, shows an increase of £27 than that for 1953/54. The amount required for the coming year is £177.

<u>PUBLIC LIGHTING:</u> Under this heading $\pounds 46$) is again provided for the existing service. During the year, however, the Council considered that it might be mecessary to provide some additional lights. For this purpose an additional outlay of $\pounds 25$ is shown and this would enable the Council to provide five additional lamps at situations which the members would think they would be most essential.

HOUSING: The nett cost of the Housing Service for the coming year is estimated at £1792 as compared with £1684 in the present year. The difference is due to additional provision made for Housing repairs.

For 1953/54 the Council allowed £650 for repairs. It has been found, however, that this sum is not at all adequate. Consequently it is felt that for the coming year the provision under this heading should be increased by £100.

The number of houses owned by the Council is 266; the loan charges show no appreciable change on the amounts allowed for the present year.

In July of last year the Department of Local Government outlined, for the convenience of Housing Authorities, the minimum terms and conditions under which they thought Urban Council houses might be disposed to occupying tenants. A Special Scheme was then prepared and was examined by the Council some months ago. Later the details of the Scheme were circulated to the tenants with a request that they might indicate if they were interested in purchasing the houses which they occupiedbe So far no information has been received as to whether they would/interested in purchasing, but it should be mentioned that it was not possible to supply definite information as to the legal costs which would arise in connection with the purchase. In accordance with the terms of the Scheme the Capital value of 198 of the houses for purchase purposes would vary from £240 to over £400, depending on the date of erection. The houses erected in recent years would be valued at £1040 for the purpose of the Purchase Scheme.

Recently & grant of £40 per annum, for a period of 10 years, has been made under the Housing Act, 1948, in respect of a house which has been built for letting. Whilst in the Estimates £40 has been included it will be noted that there will be State recoupment of £26 so that the net cost to the Council is £14.

Small Dwellings (Acquisition) Acts: The total number of loans thus far made by the Council under these Acts is 15. The loan charge payable by the Council are recouped in full from the repayment made by borrowers.

GENERAL URBAN PURPOSES:

Tourist Development: For the present year the Council allowed £40 as a contribution to the local Tourist Development Association. A similar sum has been included for 1954/55. The Council felt that better publicity and tourist arrangements for contacting visitors could be made if such work were left to the local organisation. It was found, however, that special sanction from the Department of Local Government would be necessary to any such arrangement. Recently the Department pointed out that central publicity arrangementswould be likely to be more beneficial than individual publicity efforts by local authorities and indicated that a contribution to a local organisation should be conditional on no diversion of any part of the funds which the local authority might otherwise have made available to the Tourist Association, being made. In these circumstances it is felt that for the coming year the Council would require to obtain special Department approval before assigning the rate levied under this heading to the local association.

Foreshore Maintenance: For maintenance work at the Foreshore, £150 is again included. It will be recollected that when seeking grants in recent years for Foreshore Works the Central Authorities drew attention to the necessity for provision each year for maintenance of the existing protection works. The Council has been pressing for special grants for urgent protection works for many years past, and when it was indicated that special grants might be made to local authorites from the National Development Fund the Council's application was again renewed, in fact it was urged that special priority might be given to this type of work. Tree Planting: A sum of £38 is again included. During the present year the local association has continued with the planting schemeswhich were started a few years ago, and it is expected that in the coming years the effect of these measures to beautify the town and surroundings will be extended. It should be mentioned that the Council's con-tribution has only met in part the cost of the work which has been under-taken by the local Voluntar; Organisation and that much assistance has been received from other sources and the donors are to be commended for their civic spirit.

BAnd Performances: Last year the Council allowed £35 as a contribution towards the cost of maintaining the local Band which during the tourist season has given performances at the Sea Front. The same amount has been again included for the coming year.

An Tostal Decorations: Local Authorities may incur expenditure of the decoration of the districts for An Tostal. In the event of the Local Authorities may incur expenditure on Council deciding to make any special arrangments of this character, a sum of £40 has been included.

SCHOOL MEALS: The provision made under this heading corresponds to that allowed in the present year. The total cost of School Meals is £232 of which £80 is recouped from State Funds. The average number of children availing of meals is 90.

The outlay on Allotments is £298, is almost recouped in Allotments: full from State Grants. The number of allotments in the present year is over 50.

Cheap Fuel Scheme: The expenditure on the supply of fuel for nec-essitous households is again estimated at £1050. Practically the entire cost is recouped from State Funds and by the County Council (the latter Body meets the cost in respect of Public Assistance receipients) The number of households benefiting under this Scheme vary from 180 to 200 per week.

Acquisition of Derelict Sites: For this purpose £50 is being include It is proposed that Derelict Sites might be acquired for housing pur-For this purpose £50 is being included poses wherever possible, but if the Council proceeds with a Scheme for the clearing of unsightly areas there will be some sites which could not be used for housing and consequently the cost of acquiring them could not be charged against a Housing Scheme. No provision under this heading was made last year.

<u>County Council Demand</u>: The Demand for County Services again shows a steep rise. The increase is \pounds 529, which is equivalent to a rate of 1/1d. in the \pounds . Last year the Demand went up by 2/2d. in the \pounds . The following table shows how the Demand for 1954/55 compares with that for the present year. Demand: the present year:-

It will be noted that the major increases in the Demand are ander the headings of Health Services and Beparate Charges. The additional outlay on the helath service is due to the necessity to make provision for new schemes under the Health Act, 1953, in the coming year.

The rise in separate charges is mainly due to the costs of a malicious injury claim. The Court award in this instance is leviable as a County At Large charge. The loan charges on the new Vocational School at Wicklow also accounts for part of the rise in the cost of Separate Charges.

<u>GENERAL</u>: The Estimates now submitted for your consideration would require a rate of 35/2d. in the £, which in an increase of 2/- over that levied in the present year. As already mentioned, however, the major item responsible is the County Council Demand which accounts for 1/1d. of the increase. The details have been given of a number of new items which the Council may consider should be amended or deferred.

It is only fitting that I should pay tribute to the manner in which the Town Clerk (Mr. O'Connor) and all the other officials of the Council have discharged their duties in the past year. They have all given excellent service which is resulting in a satisfactory standard of performance generally. Once more I would wish to convey to the Chairman and members of the Council my sincere appreciation of the assistance and advise they have afforded in connection with all aspects of administration during the present year.

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

MINUTES

ANNUAL ESTIMATES MEETING:

HELD ON 30TH M.RCH. 1954.

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Present: Councillor Wm. Clarke (Presiding), Councillors W. W. Hudson, J. Everett, T.D., J. Rourke, and P. Doyle.

In attendance: The County Manager, Mr. M. Flannery, Town Surveyor, Mr. J. T. O'Byrne and Town Clerk, D. J. O'Connor

EXAMINATION OF ESTIMATES: On the suggestion of the Chairman it was agreed to examine each item on the Manager's Explanatory Tables, copies of which had been circulated, as was the procedure in previous

<u>Roads:</u> Following a detailed examination of the recommendations of the Town Surveyor, the Council decided to carry out the following special roadworks:-

KIOSK AT EAST PIER: The following letter from the Wicklow Harbour Commissioners was read in regard to the application of Mr. E. Kavanagh for permission to erect a kiosk at East Pier :-Dear Sir,

Referring to your letter of the 4th inst. in connection with application of Mr. Ed. Kavanagh, Castlefield, Wicklow for permission to erect a wooden kiosk on his holding at the Quarry near East Pier, Wicklow.

It was unanimously agreed to permit of the erection of a temporary structure during the currency of the summer months of the present year provided that the proposed erection is executed to the satisfaction of the Council.

LETTING OF BUILDING SITES TO MR. A. FINLAYSON AT DUNBUR ROAD: Lease Wicklow U.D.C. to Andrew D. Finlayson dated 27th May, 1952, was placed before the meeting. The County Manager explained to the meeting that it had been mistakingly thought that the provision in the lease, whereby a rental of £4. 7. 6. became chargeable in respect of each of eight building sites contained in the plot, as endorsed on the lease, in lieu of 1/- per plot as presently obtaining, had become operative. It had since been established, however, that this provision would not take effect until 25th March, 1955. The County Manager detailed the circumstances attending the transfer of these sites and mentioned that the Council at a meeting in April, 1952, rescinded a resolution passed in April, 1951, which, in fact, occasioned this present oversight. He pointed out to the members that the dwellings should be completed within a period of three years dated from 25th March, 1952, in accordance with the terms of the lease, and that to date no such commencement had been made.

At thisstage Councillor Everett intervened to state that no indication had been given that interference with property adjoining the "Bog Field" would result from this letting and he strongly opposed such interference. It was explained that the map endorsed on the lease did indicate the inclusion of land tenanted by Miss D. Wall. Councillor Everett then moved that the resolution of 1/4/1952 granting this lease be rescinded and that the plot known as the "Bog Field" alone should be leased. The motion, however, was not seconded. A lengthy discussion ensued, during which the Chairman reiterated that in accordance with the provision of the lease the dwellings must be completed on or before

OLD GUNS AT MURROUGH: The undergiven letter from Hammond Lane Metal Co. was read:-

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Dear Sir,

Further to the writer's visit and conversation with your yesterday regarding the Old Guns at Wicklow, we would be pleased to know if you want to dispose of these.

A hara,

As you may know, an ChomhairleEalaion, which was set up under the Arts Act, 1951, has as its objects the stimulation of public interest in the Arts, the promotion of the knowledge and practice and the improving of the standards of the Arts in Ireland.

At a recent meeting the Council decided that very great results would accrue if the Public Authorities, in the first instance, set a good example and furnished those portions of the interiors of their public offices which are most frequented by the public with good pictures by present-day Irish artists. As a practical help towards the carrying out of this Policy, the Council decided that it would bear half the cost, up to £51 on its part, i.e. up to a total cost of £100, for the purchase of an approved picture by an Irish living artist for the furnishing of the rooms and offices of any Public Authority as stated. It is the view of the Council that a ricture must be considered as much a part of the furnishing of a house or office as any of the other more utilitarian objects.

You are requested to have this matter considered at your earliest convenience.

<u>RESOLUTION FROM TRALEE U.D.C.</u> Resolutions from Tralee U.D.C. in connection with (a) the introduction of legislation to terminate the use of travelling shop and (b) the holding of a Parliamentary Investig-ation into the management of the allocation of monies by An Bord Failte for the promotion of tourism, were both noted.



Apologies for non-attendance were received from Councillor C. W. Hudson and J. T. O'Byrne, Town Surveyor.

In attendance: Mr. M. Flannery, County Manager and J. J. Hurley, Acting Town Clerk.

CONFIRMATION OF MINUTES: Minutes of meeting of 12th April, 1954, were taken as read and adopted and signed by the Chairman.

BUILDING SITES - BOG FIELD: Read following letter dated 4th May, 1954, from Messrs Finlayson Bros:-Dear Sir.

Arising out of the minutes of themeeting of the Council held on Monday, 12th April last, I wish to refer to the discussion which arose, relative to the lease of the building sites on the Bog Field, Dunbur Rd., granted by the Council to me in 1952.

One Councillor made very definite objections to the terms of the lease and the Chairman intimated that had he been aware that portion of adjoining land had included in the site granted he would not have signed it.

It would be a matter of extreme distaste to me to go ahead with my plans to building on this site and feel, as a contractor and as a Councillor, that I had not the good will of my fellow townsmen and Councillors.

I had made my application for the building site and I had accepted the terms laid down by the Council in that lease in good faith. The pease with map attacked, was accepted, signed and sealed unamimously.

I would be greatly relieved to know so far as my dealings with the Council and my project to add eight more houses to the town are concerned, if I had as public an exp ression of my fellow Councillors' good will and acceptance of the lease as was given to the objections at that meeting.

It would make it extremely difficult and unpleasant to proceed in face of the objections which have been given such wide publicity when all through in this business I had acted in perfectly good faith.

Yours faithfully, etc.

The Council stated it was under a misapprehension when the lease in this case was completed as, if it had been understood at the time that Miss Wall's lease was affedted it would not have granted the lease to Messrs Finlayson Bros. In the meantime the Council assured Mr. Finlayson that any comments made at theprevious meeting were not directed towards him for the acceptance of the lease and that the matter now rested in his hands as to whether he would proceed to occupy the plot in question. Meantime, if Mr. Finlayson uses the plot, Miss Wall's agreement to be adjusted accordingly.

LITTER BASKETS:Read letter 3/4/1954 from Electricity Supply Board enclosing licence (in duplicate) in connection with fixing of litter baskets to the Board's poles in the Wicklow Urban District.

It was proposed by Councillor J. Everett, seconded by Councillor J. Rourke and unanimously resolved:-

"That the Seal of the Council be affixed to Licence from Electricity Supply Board authorising the erection of waste paper baskets on the Board's poles in the Wicklow Urban District". The Council's Seal was affixed to the Licence (in duplicate).

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<u>BIST OF ATTENDANCES</u>: As requested by the Council at its previous meeting the Town Clerk submitted a list of attendances at Council meetings over a period. When perusing the list the attendance of the following members where noted:-

<u>incillor J. Brennan:</u> Councillor Brennan had attended none of the 21 meetings listed but it was pointed out by the Town Clerk that his reason for non-attendance was accepted by the Council at a meeting on 1st December, 1953 "with an exhortation that Councillor Brennan submit this reason in writing". Although requested by the Town Clerk to do so Councillor Brennan had not written.

Councillor E. Kane: It was noted that Councillor Kane had been absent from seven meeting (including Annual Estimates Meeting in March) from and including October, 1953, to March, 1953. Councillor Kane had, however, attended the April monthly meeting.

It was decided to obtain legal advice in both cases.

FILLING OF CASUAL VACANCY: It was proposed by Councillor P. Doyle seconded by Councillor J. Rourke and unanimously resolved:-
