CATHAO RLEACH Members, could I have your attention please? Before we start the meeting I would like to congratulate, we have four new cathaoirligh in the district municipalities --

CLLR. LAVZESS: Sorry, Cathaoirleach? We can't hear you, Cathaoirleach. Sorry.
CATHAO RLEACH We have four new cathaoirligh in the municipal authorities. I would like to congratulate Miriam Murphy I congratulated her last month, Nicola Lawless in Greystones, Tommy Cullen in the west, and in Wicklow Town Daire Nolan. I would also on our behalf, I am sure you would all agree with me, that we send a letter of congratulations to the new Commissioner of the Garda to wish him well in the future. Now we have one vote of sympathy. Go ahead. MS. GALLAGER: Yes, Cathaoirleach, for Patsy o'Toole, our colleague, in the Greystones area.
CATHAO RLEACH okay. Anyone else any other? okay. One minute silence. [One minute's silence was observed]. Before we start, Councillor o'Connor has asked to address the meeting. Councillor o'Connor?
CLLR. O CONNOR: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I have been 14:01 honoured to have represented the people of Bray, Kilmac and Enniskerry as a Sinn Féin Councillor but unfortunately I have had to inform the party that I am no longer in a position to continue this role so $I$ will
be resigning my seat and this will take effect on the 15th or 16th August where I will give my two weeks notice.

The reason for this is that $I$ have a job, a full-time job, as a solicitor. I have recently set up practice on my own. Previously I had been in a partnership and that had allowed me more leeway for the Council work. I also have some personal and family issues which are eating into my ability to do my Council work. Something had to give and I decided that my other commitments were not allowing me to represent the people of north Wicklow as well as I should.

So in close consultation with the local party in Bray and with wicklow Sinn Féin, $I$ have taken the decision to withdraw from the Council. We have had a selection convention and Dermot O'Brien will be replacing me at the September meeting. Dermot will be a fantastic champion to deal with wicklow, and especially with the young people of wicklow.

I would like to thank everyone who works for the Council for their help over my time as a councillor. I would also like to thank most of my fellow Councillors who have all been helpful to me during my time. I am especially grateful to the Sinn Féin Group leader, Nicola Lawless, and to Councillor Mary McDonald. I believe Republicans have much to offer the people of

Wicklow and hopefully we will continue to grow in their strength. I would also like to express my thanks to John Brady TD and Sinn Féin in Wicklow and Bray for their help and understanding my position.

I will remain as active as $I$ can in the party in the future, albeit in a less public way. I am very much committed to a bright future for the county and the county and will continue to do what I can. So thanks for putting up with me over my time as a councillor and 14:03 I am sure $I$ will run into some of you again over the years in any future role I play. It has always been a honour, sometimes a pleasure and the odd time a pain, but all in all I have enjoyed my time here and hope that I have improved the situation for some people in the county. Go raibh maith agat.

CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Fox?
CLLR. FOX: We11, chairman, I am very sorry to hear this news and I just would like to pay a tribute to Councillor o'Connor and wish him the very best. As we
all know that it is very difficult to juggle a
full-time job and be a member of the Council here. But certainly I have always had a very good working relationship with Councillor o'Connor and I wish michael the very best.
CLLR. O CONNOR: Thanks, Chris.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Tommy Cullen?
CLLR TOMM CULLEN Chairman, I would like also to wish Michael o'Connor all the best in the years ahead
in his career. He is a very good councillor and he offered his legal advice freely and was very measured in that advice and he was great assistance to all the colleagues here in the Council and he will be missed. Certainly I have to say from my point of view he was a very are professional, a very honourable councillor, and I wish him all the best and the very best in his retirement from the Council.

CLLR O CONNOR: Thanks, Tommy.
CATHAO RLEACH Thank you, Councillor.
Councillor Lawless?
CLLR. LAVLESS: Yes, thanks, Cathaoirleach. Yeah, I want to wish Michael well as well in the future. we are going to miss him here sitting beside us. He was a great asset to us here as a councillor and we worked very well together. Although, as he said, he is not going away, we will still have him by our side but not so publicly here on the Council level. It is a shame, you know that matters in life get in the way. As we all know, being a councillor is a full-time job and, you know, sometimes it is a hard to juggle. So I just want to wish Michael all the best in his future but we are also looking forward as well for Dermot o'brien coming in. I think a lot of you know Dermot o'brien or "Daisy", he has been in the Chambers a few times as well with Comhairle na nóg. So we are looking forward to having him here and seeing what he brings to the table in the future. Thanks.
CLLR O CONNOR: Thanks, Nicola.

CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Fortune?
CLLR. FORTUNE: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. Yeah, just on behalf of the Independent Group I would just like to Councillor o'Connor the very best in whatever he does in the future. I can understand what he is saying with various pressures and how busy a councillor can be. So I just, from our group, I just want to wish Michael the very, very best.
CLLR. O CONNOR: Thanks, Tom.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Behan?
CLLR. BEHAN Yeah, Chairman, just also to wish Michae1 O'Connor all the best in the future. I certainly was impressed with all of the contributions he made, both in Bray and the District Chambers. For somebody who kind of came on to the Council during the term of office I think he got to grips with the issues very quickly and he was always very clear and strong in his views and he expressed them very clearly. It is a pity that he can no longer be in the position but it does take courage I think to acknowledge that and to make a decision such as he has made, and I am sure it was a very difficult one for him. I do sincerely wish him all the best in the future.

I also want to sincerely welcome the news that Dermot O'Brien will be joining this body. Because Dermot O'Brien is one person as far as I am concerned who has contributed an enormous amount to the community life of Bray and in County Wicklow 1aterally when he
was working with Comhairle na nóg. I am certainly looking forward to working with him as a public representative for the duration of this Council and maybe into the future as wel1. Thank you.
CLLR. O CONNOR: Thanks, Joe.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Walsh?
CLLR. WALSH Yeah, Cathaoirleach, like the previous speakers, I just want to wish Councillor o'Connor the very best of luck in the future and I want to acknowledge the way he went about his business in this Chamber, he was always very fair and concise and he presented his case in a fair fashion. So I know that it is a difficult decision to make, it is a big undertaking as a councillor and all the pressures. So, good luck, I wish him all the best and thank you for his contribution over the last three years or so. CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Ryan?
CLLR. RYAN Yeah, Cathaoirleach, I would like to concur with the other councillors and wish my best to Councillor O'Connor. Obviously Councillor O'Connor came on to the Council to replace Councillor Brady at the time, John Brady TD, and the one thing I noticed straightaway was that the meetings went an awful lot faster so I would like to thank Michael for that. But, quite honestly, I think his contributions were very good succinct and definitely he was very straightforward in terms of actually dealing with him, as another Councillor of another party, I found him to be an absolute pressure.

Good to hear that Dermot O'Brien is coming on to the Council. I have served on a lot of different committees with Dermot and I know him to be a very passionate guy and given us a lot of insight into the psyche of the young people. We would all like to be aligned with, but some are better than others, in terms of understanding them and I think that is important for this Council to have that. But good luck, Michael, in the future. Thanks.
CLLR O CONNOR: Thanks very much. CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Sne11?
CLLR SNELL: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. Yeah, I'd like to just concur with previous speakers and wish michael all the best. I have only known michael since he come on the Council here and I think he shone brightest on the Housing Strategic Policy Committee. I know he has a young family and I wish him and his family all the best. I know it is very hard to juggle such a job that Michael has, being a solicitor, so I wish him and the his family all the best.
CLLR. O CONNOR: Thanks very much.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Timmons and then I'm going to the CE.
CLLR TI MMONS: Just briefly, Chairman, I would just like to add my sentiments to what the others have said.
I found michael a very intelligent business-like, very direct, he contributed a lot to this Council and I am very sorry that he is actually leaving the Council and I wish him all the best.

CLLR. O CONNOR: Thanks very much.
CATHAO RLEACH Now the CE.
MR. CURRAN Thanks Cathaoirleach. Just on behalf of myself and the staff, I would like to thank
Councillor o'Connor for his contribution. He was always professional and courteous and pleasure to deal with from our point of view. I wish him all the best. CATHAO RLEACH From my own point of view, Councillor o'Connor, I am sorry to see you going. I think you did make a very valuable contribution and certainly reasonable contribution as well. So it is always a sad time when people for various reasons have to go and because it is very time consuming, this particular job that we have, and it is understandable that people need to move on with their priorities and in this case that I can understand well that your priorities and that. So I want to wish you well and wish your family well.
CLLR. O CONNOR: Thanks, Pat.
CATHAO RLEACH Thanks for your contribution in Wicklow and Bray during that particular time. okay. Now we are moving on to the first item on the agenda.

CLLR. O NEILL: Just through the Chair on a point of order, do you know what I mean, we have all been graced with these books --

CATHAOI RLEACH Councillor, it is not the point of order, I am moving on. I am moving on. We have an item on the agenda --
CLLR. O NEI LL: Can I not --

CATHAO RLEACH Listen, I am handling the agenda now, right. I am not allowing anyone bring up anything now other than I am going into the agenda --
CLLR. O NEI LL: (Inaudible) magazine.
CATHAO RLEACH I am sorry, I am going into the agenda. 14:10 CLLR. BEHAN Chairman, I have a proposal for suspension --
CATHAO RLEACH I am going into that now, right. okay. Right, Councillor.
CLLR. BEHAN Thanks, Chairman.
CLLR. RYAN It's a great picture, it's a fabulous picture.
CLLR. BEHAN Chairman, I want to propose the suspension of the standing orders to discussed the revaluation of commercial rates which is happening in the county at the moment. We did get previous notice about this but in fact it is starting now to hit home to commercial rate payers in the county, and in particular in Bray, what are going to be the implications of this revaluation. Councillors may or may not be aware but certain businesses have been selected and I want some information from the top table when we do discuss this as to how the selection was done. But certainly in the case of two businesses that I am aware of they are extremely concerned about what they are hearing back from the valuation office. In one case a proposed one hundred per cent increase in the ratable valuation of their property, and this is in the middle of Bray, a town which has certainly
struggled for the 1ast 20 years. So I think it warrants a bit of a discussion, Cathaoirleach, I won't go on any longer about it now, but I do want us to discuss it later, Cathaoirleach. Thank you.
CATHAOI RLEACH Is there a seconder?
CLLR. BLAKE: I second that, Chairman.
MS. GALLAGER: Seconded by Councillor Blake. CATHAO RLEACH Okay. Just in regard to suspension of standing orders it is my intention to bring it before the Protocol Committee today in regard, I am disturbed at the amount of suspension of standing orders that are coming before the Council here. Technically speaking, they always need to be something that warrant emergency situation that needed to be discussed in an urgent type of business. I want to bring it before the Protocol and get some direction in regard to what is acceptable and what is not in regard to suspension of standing orders. Because I have a fear that in the final year of the Council that we will be overtaken with suspension of standing orders where the normal business 14:12 of the Council hasn't been transacted here, and also the Notice of Motion that are there before the Council as well that they are taking precedence over items like that as well.

But just in this case if there is agreement on Councillor Behan's suspension of standing order I will take that but I just want to make Councillors aware that I will be looking for some sort of policy
direction from the Protocol that will come before the meeting in September in regard to how suspension of standing orders will be handled in the future, okay. Is there agreement on Councillor Behan's proposal?
COUNCI LLORS: Yes.

CATHAO RLEACH No, listen --
CLLR. BEHAN we have the right to do it, no matter what you think about it in election year or not in election year.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor, if you are listening to me, 14:13 as Cathaoirleach, I am entitled to bring this before -CLLR BEHAN You can bring it, yeah, that's right. CATHAO RLEACH Yes, right.
CLLR. BEHAN But we are entitled to --
CATHAO RLEACH Are you challenging my right to bring
it --
CLLR BEHAN No, are you challenging my right to propose a suspension.

CATHAO RLEACH No.
CLLR. BEHAN Thank you.
CATHAO RLEACH No, sure I have already said it.
CLLR. BEHAN That's fine and they won't be stopping.
CATHAO RLEACH And I said in regard to this one and I expect that I will bring in September a proposal --

CLLR. BEHAN To stop us?
CATHAO RLEACH A proposal before the members --
CLLR. BEHAN Chairman, I am surprised at you, I mean you are a commercial operator in Bray yourself, you have to be aware of how urgent this matter is -CATHAO RLEACH Listen, 1isten, I am not arguing over --

CLLR. BEHAN And you're giving a sermon then about this isn't urgent, it is urgent.
CATHAO RLEACH You are getting the suspension -- you are getting the suspension of standing orders so you needn't make a case for it now. I am just saying the overall policy on it I think there is general agreement that we need to look at this with the majority Members of the Council and that is what is going to happen. And if you decide or other members, the majority of members decide, in another case that we will go on the way we are going, that's fine, I will accept the democratic view of the Members of the Council, right. There is another suspension of standing orders, Councillor Thornhill, sorry, go ahead.
CLLR. THORNH LL: Yeah, Cathaoirleach, go raibh maith agat. Cathaoirleach, as a retired member of the Garda Síochána I feel that this item is very important and that is the reason why $I$ am calling for $a$ suspension of standing orders in relation to the appointment of the new commissioner to the Garda Síochána, Mr. Drew Harris. The reason why I am bringing this up is because $I$ think it is a defining
moment in Irish history for Irish North/South, you know, after the Good Friday Agreement 20 years ago this is something which should really help, you know, keeping North and South and I think it is something that we should discuss because I mean things have happened in the past above in the North and I am sure that this new commissioner, Drew Harris, could help with legacy issues in relation to matters that have happened in the past. One thing I would just mention as well in relation to Drew Harris, he has had some misfortune as well, and $I$ know his father --

CATHAO RLEACH Sorry, Councillor, would you read out what your proposal is?
CLLR THORNHLL: Yeah, okay. Cathaoirleach, yes, thanks very much. Go raibh maith agat. Well my proposal is simply -- there's no negativity in it -- it is simply we note the appointment of Mr. Drew Harris as the new Commissioner of An Garda Síochána and we wish him well in his new position. In the interest of the State and its citizens that this Council would request that Mr. Harris would place at the State's disposal all relevant information that he may have to resolve the outstanding investigative issues to the Dublin/Monaghan bombing, 1974, and the Miami Show Band Massacre, 1975. I think that this man now is in a great position to help both communities and to move things on and, you know, like it is something that we should be thinking about for the future. I mean there's an awful lot of things above in the North, and I was recently talking
to someone that is very close to these talks, he didn't want his name mentioned, and he said --
CATHAO RLEACH Sorry, all I want to do is deal with what your proposal is.
CLLR THORNH LL: Yes, well that -- yes.
CATHAO RLEACH Is that finished now?
CLLR. THORNH LL: Yes.
CATHAO RLEACH That's finished, right, okay. CLLR THORNH LL: Yes, but I would like --
CATHAO RLEACH I will move to the floor in regard to this. First of all, I am going to let in Lorraine on this particular one.
MS. GALLAGER: Cathaoirleach, can I just say it is a matter for the elected members --
CLLR. WNTERS: we can't hear you.
ME. GALLAGER: -- in relation to the suspension of standing orders. That's covered in --
CLLR MELOUGLIN Lorraine, we can't hear you.
M. GALLAGER That's covered in paragraph 41 of standing orders which basically says:
"For the Elected Menbers to consi der suspensi on of standing orders if there is not full agreement at least two-thirds of the Menbers present vote in favour".

But just in relation to Councillor Thornhill's motion, and that's covered by paragraph 14 which says that:
"No Notice of Mbtion should be set down on the agenda
for any meeting unl ess such Notice of Mbtion shall be del $i$ vered to the meetings admini strator at least one cal endar month before the date of such meeting".

So like other elected members comply with this
paragraph and submit their Notice of Motion in advance and it is listed on the agenda as an item, and I did mention that to Councillor Thornhill this morning, that what he is proposing really falls under the Notice of Motion, that he should comply with that.

CATHAO RLEACH In regard to -- Councillor winters? CLLR WNTERS: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. I don't know if he has got a seconder?
CLLR BEHAN I '11 second it.
CLLR. WNTERS: Well I just think that this is Wicklow County Council, we have a big agenda, we have so many things to -- Garda matters are Garda matters, there is meant to be a separation between the policing force and what happens in the political circles, and I don't think that it is our place to discuss that.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Blake?
CLLR BLAKE: I was at the JPC meeting this morning, I did bring up the issue of the appointment of a young Garda Commissioner and wished him well on behalf of the JPC. It is my understanding I think that he asked that 14:19 he come to our JPC meeting in the future. So I think we have addressed that at the Council in that regard. You, yourself, at the outset, I mean you did offer your congratulations. So I think we have done whatever we
can do in regard to this at the moment and hopefully he will come before our JPC meetings and I wish him well in that regard.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor cullen, Tommy cullen? CLLR TOMY CULLEN Yes, Chairman. well it is a relevant matter because we are tied into the policing Committee so I think Councillor winters is incorrect when she says that it has nothing got to do with Council because we have Policing Committees, JCP Committees, on the Council so it is quite relevant. The Council are ver deeply involved in policing in this county so the matter of who the police commissioner and Garda Commissioner is, is very relevant.
CATHAO RLEACH okay.
CLLR TOMM CULLEN Chairman, the other thing I would say is that I think everybody in this chamber would be in agreement with the sentiment of what
Councillor Thornhill is proposing. It is not alarming, the matter is straightforward, I heard the same arguments on the RTÉ News there on Saturday.

The other thing I would say, Chairman, is this; that I would wish him well with the aspiration of it because we would all like to see that cooperation being given. But I am sure Mr. Harris is bound by the official giving any such information, and I am sure that was discussed --
CATHAO RLEACH Listen, I am not going to discuss it
now --
CLLR TOMM CULLEN I am sure that was discussed with their Government before --

CATHAD RLEACH Councillor Cullen --
CLLR. TOMM CULLEN -- he was taking up the job here. CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Cullen, I am not discussing it now, we are discussing what --

CLLR. TOMMY CULLEN We11, Chairman, I would ask Councillor Thornhill could we get an agreement on it.

CATHAOI RLEACH No asking, Councillor Thornhill has put 14:20 that proposal before us and there is other people want to come in on this as we11, and I want to move on with Councillor Walsh

CLLR. WALSH Thanks, Cathaoirleach.
CATHAO RLEACH And then Councillor Fitzgerald, and if we decide to go for a vote we are going for a vote on this.

CLLR. MALSH I wish to agree that we should indeed congratulate the Commissioner and wish him well on his appointment. I would concur with Councillor winters in 14:21 that these are not matters to be discussed in this Chamber. They are open-ended investigations into the incidents referred to by Councillor Thornhill still ongoing, even though it is back in the 70s, and the new commissioner wouldn't have been a member of the police force obviously during that time. But certainly there was a message put through the JPC meeting this morning to congratulate him and he was invited to Chambers to0 attend the JPC meeting.

CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Fitzgerald?
CLLR. FITZGERALD Yeah, I don't agree with what Councillor Thornhill. You were at the JPC, you were invited to the JPC but did you turn up this morning?
That was the place to raise it this morning at the JPC meeting, you were appointed to it recently, were you there this morning, did you raise it?

CATHAO RLEACH Councillor, I am not going to -CLLR. FITZGERALD But the point is both of them, both of them are still under investigation, one happened in '74 the other one around the same time in '75, and I am sure that the new commissioner doesn't need a direction or a motion from wicklow County Council to investigate anything and I think Councillor Cullen is right, as I understand it, he is bound by English regulations, or whatever you want to call it. So I don't think sending anything up to the Commissioner at this stage is going to bring any results and I am totally against it. I don't think, we are spending so much time here talking about stuff out of our realm, it is ridiculous. We are 14:22 talking about national stuff that should have been decided in Dáil Éireann, we are talking about stuff that has nothing to do with the people of this county and I don't agree with that motion or whatever you'd like to call it.

CATHAO RLEACH Councillor O'Neil1, and then I am going for a vote on this.

CLLR. O NEILL: Yeah, just briefly there, I mean I agree with Councillor Thornhill. I mean it is a very
light endeavour, it is congratulating a man on the job but also to ask him to maybe to look at the mass murders we had in Dublin/Monaghan bombings. That is not a big deal, $I$ can't know how anybody can get really exited about that.
CLLR THORNH LL: Cathaoirleach?
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Timmons, just briefly now because I am going for a vote on it.
CLLR. TIMMNS: You know I will be brief, Chairman. The most important thing on the agenda today is the Manager's report and Item 7 about delegating stuff to the municipal districts. We probably won't get to discuss them today, we have already spent about ten minutes talking about this item. So, to me, to put this ahead of more important matters in our agenda is a mistake, we shouldn't be discussing them.

CLLR THORNH LL: Cathaoirleach, I just --
CATHAO RLEACH No, no, you made your case.
CLLR THORNH LL: Cathaoirleach, no, it has nothing to do with the case --

CATHAO RLEACH You are not coming in again.
CLLR THORNHLL: No, Cathaoirleach, I would just like --

CATHAO RLEACH It is before the Members --
CLLR. THORNHLL: Cathaoirleach, I just want to make one point?
CLLR. MTCHELL: Vote.
CLLR. THORNH LL: I just want to make one point. CATHAO RLEACH I am going to ask the Members to put it
to a vote.
CLLR. THORNH LL: It is in relation to
Councillor Fitzgerald's remarks, I won't be --
CATHAO RLEACH we are going for a vote.
CLLR. THORNHLL: It has nothing to do with this.
CATHAO RLEACH we are going for a vote.
CLLR. THORNHLL: And show a bit of respect. Thank you. Go raibh maith agat.
CATHAO RLEACH what the vote is for this to be, for the suspension of standing orders or against the suspension of standing orders.

MS. GALLAGER: Yeah, that is what the vote is whether you want to ask discuss the standing order or not. CATHAO RLEACH Discuss it, for, or against it. Yeah, okay. [Vote taken].
MS. GALLAGER: Okay, that's eight for, 19 against, two not present and three abstaining, so motion defeated. CATHAO RLEACH Okay, we will move on please. We are moving on to the agenda. Proposer and seconder for Item 1 on the agenda? Councillor Dunne?
CLLR. DUNE: Yes, I would like to propose this Item 1. CATHAO RLEACH Okay, could I have a seconder for that? Councillor Shay Cullen. Is that agreed?
COUNCI LLORS: Agreed.
CATHAO RLEACH Item No. 2, I propose that. Does
somebody wants to second that?
CLLR. FOX: I do.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Fox seconds that. Is that agreed?

CONNCI LLORS: Agreed.
CATHAO RLEACH okay.
MS. GALLAGFER That is the disposal of the freehold interest in the property of 34 Wolfe Tone Square North, Bray, Co. Wicklow to Thomas O'Reilly, personal representative in the estate of Mrs. Margaret O'Reilly, deceased (as per notice previously circulated).

CATHAO RLEACH Now Item 3 there is a presentation made by Michael flynn in regards to the Part 8.

MR. FLYNK Good afternoon. I just want to give a brief presentation on the proposals for the N11 at Kilmacanogue. First of all, I would like to thank the Members for their engagement and their contribution to the report and to the work that we are doing on the N11. You have been certainly of help bring the N11 forward in plans and we are making good progress on dealing with the issues on the N11.

Just on a point of information, this project has been managed by the NRDO and been progressed also by Roughan \& O'Donovan Consulting Engineers. I would like to welcome, the Design Team are here with us today, Gillian Connolly and Eimear Keane from the NRDO, and Eileen O'Neill and Hugh O'Sullivan from Roughan \& O'Donovan Consulting Engineers.

Just if you can see that, just so you are all aware of what we are talking about in this Part 8 , we are talking about southbound lane at the Topaz, or the
circle K as it is now, garage and dealing with the issues, primarily the safety issues, at that location.

Just by way of background this project has arisen from
the M11/N11 corridor study produced by TII and published in April 2017. You will have seen over the last two years various submissions on that. Arising from the Meath study, two schemes have emerged. The first one is the overall main scheme which is from the M50 Junction 4 al1 the way to Junction 14. The one, the Part 8 that we are dealing with today is a safety scheme, a localised scheme, at Kilmacanogue. But it is part and it will form part of the overall solution on the N11. Just to give you an overview of the corridor, it is a 22 km corridor, and there's 3.8 kms of that in Dun Laoghaire, the rest is in Wicklow.

Just dealing with what we are proposing at Kilmacanogue, it is primarily a safety scheme so as to deal with the safety concerns at Kilmacanogue. We are providing a protected $50 \mathrm{~km} / \mathrm{h}$ parallel service road. This is funded under the TII Safety Improvement Scheme. We have been allocated for 20182.15 million and, subject to your approval today and to everything else going well, we expect to have that project on the ground this year and works commencing before year end.

This is just the technical drawings just Junction 7 to Junction 8. That is the overall aerial shot. You will
see at the end there the Topaz garage. So the southbound lane on this side here is what we are talking about, dealing with the issues on that. what might be most helpful here, the two photographs, on the top is the existing situation at Kilmacanogue and underneath we have the service station on the N4 at Lucan. The scheme that is proposed at Kilmacanogue is very similar to what has already been put in place at Lucan. Essentially what we are doing is providing you will see there, there are kerbs and bollards protecting 14:30 the service road from the mainline traffic. That has been in place now for a number of years and it is working very, very well.

So essentially what we have, we have a scheme that we can progress within the existing road reservation so we don't know need to go for land acquisition and all the other issues and concerns we have to deal with which would, you know, put the project back a couple of years by the time we get through all of those. So we can deal with it within the existing road reservation and it is to cater for all the accesses from the lavender field right through to Topaz. There is a new merge/diverge. The service road speed limit will be $50 \mathrm{~km} / \mathrm{h}$ and the main7ine will increase to $100 \mathrm{~km} / \mathrm{h}$. That 14:31 is just another shot of the one at Lucan which is very similar to what we hope will be in place at Kilmacanogue as soon as we get everything through. Just in terms of the submission, we had 14 written
submissions and I suppose there were three main themes, recurring themes, arising from those, the first one was questioning the safety, the overall safety, of the scheme, is this the right scheme. Just to assure members, this has been designed in accordance with the current standards and it has been progressed by Roughan \& O'Donovan which are one of the foremost engineering firms. The other thing we do is we come onto a scheme that has worked, it has worked already so we are not trialing something. This is a scheme that has dealt with a very similar situation and was done very successfully.

The other two concerns, and I might go back to the aerial shot, were provision for pedestrians and cyclists. At the moment there is no proper link between Kilmacanogue and Bray for pedestrians or cyclists and we have instances of people walking along the hard shoulder. To address that we have done some preliminary design on a road at the back of this here. so it is a cycleway and a greenway. You have already in your Bray Municipal Plan provided a corridor which would provide a cycleway/greenway. We have initial discussions with the NTA and we have had a very positive response from them in terms of they will support us if we can progress that project.

I suppose the final issue which is raised in a number of submissions was the option, why do we not look at
providing a road to the back instead of providing one along the mainline. A number of issues in our view precluded that option. The first was a number of the properties would be landlocked so the road we were providing wouldn't actually have direct access to the properties. Also, at the Topaz end of the thing, the old existing roadway, or the level differences we don't believe we can achieve a proper link for the garage and we don't believe it would accepted there anyhow. Quite apart from that, it would delay the project going through all the archaeological, environmental and all the other issues and land purchase. So in order to get the thing progressed, and progressed speedily, we believe that this is probably the best option.

Just the motion before you today is to seek the approval and to progress the project in accordance with the plans that have been put before you. Quite apart from dealing with the safety issue, we have managed to put the N11 with your help and all the lobbying you have done, we have managed to get the N11 scheme right to the forefront and we would be hoping we would bring, not just this safety scheme but the overall scheme through. But this is just the first step in it. So we are asking for your approval here today. Thank you.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Fox?
CLLR FOX: Thank you, Chairman. And thanks, Michael. First of all, can I thank the engineers and the officials who are involved in this scheme and the
design. This proposal does have some positives. As you know, there has been a lot of concern in
Kilmacanogue for many years following the N11 upgrade and I suppose the way that the road was left, it is not a glowing tribute to the previous designers the way that, particularly the garage, exits on to the N11 was left, left in a most unsatisfactory condition. I sincerely hope that this is phase 1 in rectifying some of the issues in Kilmacanogue on the N11 and further south.

On the Part 8 itself I have to say I am extremely disappointed that the inclusion of a service road to the east of the residential properties, as Michael showed there on the Google map, that the residential properties are still going to access the N11 directly. This was an ideal opportunity to close off the direct access on to the N11 for the houses. Now I understand that the commercial properties, the Topaz garage, Oxygen Care, Kelly Recovery, it is not feasible for those properties to exit a road to the rear given the lay of the land and the type of vehicles that would be exiting those properties. I do see the third lane as a preferential option for those HGVs and large vehicles. However the residents, the houses, to the north of those commercial properties who currently have to access directly on to the N11, and accessing on to a road with a high volume of traffic travelling at high speed, are now been asked to access on to a third lane
with potentially traffic even closer to their accesses and exits. I cannot for the life of me see how it wasn't part of the solution, how closing these access wasn't part of the solution. Can I ask why the closing off of direct accesses on to the southbound lane on the 14:36 N11 is not included? why is it not included?

CATHAO RLEACH we will get that. Councillor winters? CLLR. WNTERS: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. As somebody who uses that road every single day, I am delighted to see the safety measures that are being proposed. The petrol station actually poses a real hazard every single evening and we have been exceptionally lucky that there hasn't been a more serious incident.

Taking on board what Councillor fox is saying, I do feel sorry for the houses that are northbound of those commercial premises and I do think that maybe we could look at extending the cones further back so that maybe that when they are exiting that there isn't the same speed of traffic. What we are looking at now for those 14:37 houses is that they go from $60 \mathrm{~km} / \mathrm{h}$ now to $100 \mathrm{~km} / \mathrm{h}$ and it actually becomes more dangerous. At the moment traffic know approaching that area that they are coming into a slow zone on a 60km, when it goes back to 100 it will be much more difficult for those houses. But
overall I still think we have to do something with that garage and that junction and I am delighted to see measures being taken.
CATHAO RLEACH Okay. Councillor Mitchel1?

CLLR. M TCHELL: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. We11 I welcome the bringing of this proposal and the funding. There was a proposal many years ago to do something a little bit similar which I think faded when it wasn't part of an overall scheme. And it was felt that if one 14:38 put in countermeasures that they would subsequently get ripped up or it might block an overall scheme for improving the M50/N11. So I very much welcome the fact that there has now been a long-term study, it has been completed and it now appears to be actioned both in the 14:39 short-term and in the long-term.

Some years ago I became very concerned about the N 11 , that the whole of East Wicklow is going to come to a stop, and I'd be very anxious to get something done. In 2014 I met with Councilior Ryan and Leo Varadkar, then Minister of Transport, and Simon Harris and Andrew Doyle to press the case for a study to be done by the NTA of this as nothing seemed to be happening. But at a subsequent meeting I am delighted to say that the study was produced about a year ago and this now appears to be actioned and it is absolutely vital for East wicklow that this is done. This Council also met Shane Ross with the delegation in 2016 also pressing this case. So it is good to see action is taking place.

But strictly on this scheme I would have some sympathy for the residents of Kilmacanogue who will be coming
out, it will be a 50K lane that they are coming out into, but I would very much like to see that the long-term plan which I think may involve compulsory purchase of land would therefore would take some time, I would be very keen to see that it is done in due course. But that we get on with this and we would start work this year and hopefully have it done by at least this time next year, the safety aspects at Kilmacanogue.

So I would be very keen for this to go ahead but I would like to a commitment from the engineers and from NTA that they would go ahead with this other road of those houses in terms of the -- I don't think we are debating the overall scheme yet --

CLLR. M TCHELL: -- but certainly in terms of this $I$ am very much in favour of it.

CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Matthews, and then Councillor Behan.

CLLR. MATTHEVG: Cathaoirleach, thank you, and I want to thank our Roads Department and our consultants and the CTII investment for starting at last on the N11 because we have been promised it for quite a while and we know what the issues are. This is obviously the first small step but it's an important step. At the very outset its aim was to improve safety and it does achieve that to a certain extent.

Councillor Fox, I share a lot of concerns that he has and I include them in my submission and they have been adequately answered so $I$ won't go through them again here today. I would have thought the rear access would have been the better option and I suppose the safety management principles would be to eliminate the hazards in its entirety but this is a Part 8 so we are limited to accepting or reject or modifying it slightly, not to do a complete redesign.

I do take some comfort in the response to my submission though that Wicklow County Council commits to a full design and planning and land acquisition in order to put that service road into the rear. And obviously one of the other bonuses that we are looking at here is that that service road could also then form a connection for a greenway for a cycleway, a pedestrian route, from Kilmac to Bray and it is a very important piece of infrastructure, both for Kilmac and for Bray, that at the moment there is no way to get from Kilmac to Bray except by bus or by car. So pedestrians and cyclists completely need it there.

So with that in mind, and it is a safety issue, it is going to address the safety concern there. Wicklow are 14:42 committed to looking at that service road to the rear to improve things further in the future.
Cathaoirleach, I would have to propose this Part 8. CATHAOI RLEACH Councillor Behan?

CLLR. BEHAN Yeah, Cathaoirleach. First of all, just to deal with that issue that Councillor Fox raised and Councillor Matthews as well. I mean you would have to agree with what they say that a safer access for particularly the residents, if you like, would be a rear access.

Just, you know, before I say the rest of what I want to say $I$ just want to query what the engineer there said with regard to we might be able to look for funding for a greenway and a cycleway but I didn't hear him saying we are going to look for funding for the access road at the back. So I am wondering is there kind of a distinction in the minds of the officials here that although we put it in a Development Plan you, as the Executive, are not really interested in progressing that particular aspect, because it was something that councillors felt would be very important and there is no doubt it would add to safety. So I specifically would like to hear the answer on that one.

CATHAOI RLEACH okay.
CLLR. BEHAN Could I pay compliment to all of the team, the roads people and their advisors, the consultants, $I$ think the public consultation process was carried out extremely we11, I thought it was exemplary. There were initial meetings where we were able to attend and ask questions, and so on. I also welcome the fact that the individual submissions were given to us so that we could read them. So many times
when public consultations go on in this Council we don't get to see them unless we travel down here and we are handed a box to read through them ourselves. It was great to actually see them scanned in and available to read with the e-mail that came forward with the proposal, and I want to welcome that.

Obviously I welcome the fact that there are $€ 2.5$ millions now going to be allocated to fix the very first part of what is going to be a very major reconstruction job on the N11/M50. You know, this is the first sign of relief for the tens of thousands of people who are travelling on that route from 4 o'clock to 8 o'clock particularly everyday that finally they won't have this slow down that they have got at Kilmacanogue which causes the tailbacks back to Fassaroe effectively. And I think many, many motorists from County wicklow, all parts of County wicklow, use the N11 will welcome it and I certainly welcome it.

There is one aspect though that I raised at the public consultation and I just want to raise it again and hear the engineer's reply on it. The construction of this section of road is going to be very, very disruptive because effectively, as I understand it, the median is going to have to be built on first and there will be traffic reductions and there is certainly going to be a slow down in traffic. I can visualise chaos on that section of road for the duration of construction. I
want to make a plea that the work should be done in the evening and at night and weekends. Weekends are probably busy anyway but certainly not in the hours from 3:00 to 7:00 because that is the crucial time for traffic going home. If the construction could be organised in such a way at that particular time that there is more free movement, I think that would greatly help the whole situation but there is no doubt it is a welcome development. But I would see it as phase 1A and phase 1B for me would be the access road that Councillor Fox is talking about, and I think it is essential that we tie the two things together in the vote that we take here today, Cathaoirleach. Thank you.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Shay Cullen?
CLLR. SHAY CULLEN Yes, Chairman. First of a11, I wil1 certain7y welcome what is before us today. I suppose, as somebody that uses this junction on a daily basis, it has taken a long time to get to this point but I certainly welcome it.

I suppose a couple of questions for michael in that on the north side of the garage, of the Topaz garage, where do the bollards and kerbs start, is that above Holfeld or where exactly are we talking there?
Secondly, obviously when you exit the garage you go up the slip road, $I$ just want confirmation that it's up the slip road and down the other side, I take it that's the way it works when you exit the garage. Because, as

I say, it is just the pure speed on that road it is incredible to see on a daily basis as a lot of accidents and near accidents that are there everyday. It is certainly something that $I$ think is important that we are getting to the point of trying to resolve this issue. And, as previous speakers have said, it has taken a long time but from a safety point of view it is badly needed.
CATHAO RLEACH Okay. Councillor Ryan?
CLLR. RYAN Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Again thanks to 14:47 everybody involved in bringing this proposal to us. It is good to have it. I mean when you look back at the original works that were done in this area, the people who were involved in it made an absolute dog's dinner of it and we have got probably the dodgiest bridge in Ireland over that road. Kilmacanogue is a village completely divided, actually divided, and I think they must be the most patient people in Ireland, the people of Kilmacanogue, to have accepted what was done to their village.

Obviously we have been talking about this at the Local Area Committee for the last ten years and we have been very well aligned on what is required here. We did put forward this proposal and we were told it couldn't be done. So it is fantastic to see that things have been done and it actually now can be done. So I think it is the first step, as everybody else has said, and it is safety at its core because that intersection is an
absolute accident waiting to happen. I don't know how there hasn't been deaths there to be quite honest because it has been so bad. But I completely concur with the other members who want to have that service road to have those residences exiting at the back. And 14:48 also I think we are also one hundred per cent aligned in regard to there needs to be that greenway for pedestrians and for cyclists to get from Bray Southern Cross through to Kilmacanogue.

The works obviously, as we have been discussing and obviously we have been working as hard as we can to try and bring political pressure to this, and Leo Varadkar at the time we met him was Minister for Transport and now obviously is Taoiseach, that is how long it has taken to put pressure on this.

But I really do believe that it is essential that we get that N11/M50 merge right because it could be a disaster. We are going to get one shot at this and we really need to make sure that it is right for the misery that people are going through every single day. We are taking times, hours, days, weeks, years, of their lives away by them sitting in traffic and that is just a misery to, not only the people sitting in the traffic, but to the families that they are staying away from.

It also effects the productivity and the economy of

Wicklow because companies just won't want to come onsite here if they see that there's this misery for people trying to get to them they will go onsite somewhere else. So this is absolutely critical to our economic and social development as a county, so a big push on that, but I would be happy to support this Part 8. Thank you.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Fortune, you are the last speaker now.
CLLR FORTUN: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. Yeah, I very much welcome this proposal, I think it is an essential piece of infrastructure. I would be on the same page as Councillor fox on this. You did a survey there, as many have been done, everybody that uses the filling station would say, why can't we go over the slip road. I mean it is a no-brainer. I was involved in -- well this is many years ago -- and it was a key discussion then of why it wasn't done.

I do think though that the point that Councillor fox was making about the residents and the houses, I mean that is nearly as every bit as essential. So I think, as Councillor Behan said, if that can be prioritised instead of some other stages it should be looked at because it is essential. But I think the proposal to do what is being proposed I think is very welcome, it is long overdue.

CATHAO RLEACH okay, I am going to finish up with Michael then to answer a few questions and then I am
going for a vote.
MR. FLYN: yeah, just in relation to the service road --

CLLR BEHAN Microphone, Chairman.
MR. FLYN: Yeah that's better. What was presented today in the project that is being progressed by TII which is essential on the mainline. So the road to the rear is a project for wicklow County Council to progress themselves and we are committed to doing that.

Just the first question was why weren't the accesses closed off and until we have a road through there, or some form of access, we have got to maintain the access out in front. As I mentioned in the presentation some roads are landlocked to any road we might put at the back. So for the time being we have got to maintain access onto the N11.

But this access will now be in a protected lane, a lane with a physical protection, as opposed to coming out into the traffic and reemerging at the moment. It is also going to be coming into traffic at a lower speed limit and it is a much narrower carriageway with it as well. So the expectation and the experience, as in Lucan, that that will become a safer situation for direct access.

But perhaps I didn't cover perhaps properly in the presentation. when I said we will put in a greenway
from Kilmacanogue to Bray, the first section of that is the old kilfenora Lane and it is our intention and our commitment that we will look for $600 / 700$ metres of that which will serve all those properties to the rear and we will bring that up to a reasonable standard road so we can road access as well as a greenway. But that is also into a separate part 8 and when we have our plans advanced we will come back to you on that and present that to you. That will then provide the access road that you have requested and we will also start off the greenway and pedestrian access.

## In terms of Council meetings concerned with

 construction, we have discussed that at length with our consultants. The expectation at the moment is that we won't need to close the lane which, you know, people would have thought perhaps that would be necessary but at the moment the plan would be that we won't close the lane. That some of the more disruptive works may be undertaken at night but the concern is because it is so ${ }_{14: 53}$ close to the residential properties we don't want to disturb people so that they can't get a night's sleep. So I mean we will be working to minimise disruption to the road because there's enough disruption in the place without adding to it. But I mean, you know, everything ${ }^{14: 53}$ will be done to try and get two lanes of traffic flowing there at all times and try and minimise disruption, maybe some speed restrictions, but we would hope beyond that that would be the limited disruptionto it.

In relation to the extent of Councillor Cullen's, in relation to where it starts and finishes, the slip road at the exit, yes, that is the intention, traffic going back out onto the protected lane will go up over and exit from the slipway in a proper fashion.

The start of the cones will be back past the lavender field. I will show you exactly where it is. So I think that deals with the questions, chair.

CATHAO RLEACH Okay. Councillor Fox, and then I am going for a vote on this.
CLLR FOX: Well, first of all, I wasn't talking about closing the access before we had the road going in the back, okay. Well certainly I would welcome the fact that Wicklow County Council is committing to a road to the rear. I feel TII are abdicating in their responsibilities to a certain degree given the benefit of this is to close access on to a national primary route which is TII's brief, okay. But certainly where TII have failed wicklow County Council seem to be stepping up to the mark in fairness. So, look, if there is a solid commitment there from wicklow County Council I am happy to support the Part 8, okay. So I will formally second Councillor Matthews.
CATHAO RLEACH Yeah. Just from my point of view as well that I wouldn't have voted for this unless there was commitment from wicklow County Council in regard to
the rear of that particular road because I think it is absolutely essential from a safety point of view to protect those people on it. I can't, like yourself, understand why TII wouldn't have seen this as part of a safety programme on the N11 as well. But there is a commitment from wicklow County Council in regard to progressing this as quickly as we possibly can and it is contained with this proposal as well, okay. So we will go for a vote on this I think.

ME. GALLAGER: Okay, Elected Members, proposed by Councillor Matthews and seconded by Councillor Fox to proceed with development as circulated and presented. [vote taken]. That's 27 for and five not present. CATHAO RLEACH Thank you very much. Thank you, Councillors. We are moving on to 4 . First of all, can 14:57 I now on behalf thank our staff in regard to progressing this to this type of level and hope that it is speedily done as well. Michae1 Flynn has done a tremendous amount of work with regard to this, under michael Heaney as well. So our staff I think has to be ${ }_{14: 57}$ congratulated, and like what Councillor Behan said, hopefully that this is first phase of a major development and major improvement on the N11 in the coming years. Now we move on to 4. 4?
CLLR. RYAN Propose.
MR FLYNK Yes, Chairman, this is a report on a proposed Section 85 agreement on the M11/N11, Junction 4 M50 to 14, Coynes Cross, project. Basically as our client for the previous Part 8 the N11/M11 project
needs to proceed. Now the total project is 22 kms in length of which 18.2 kms is in County wicklow and the rest of it is under the administrative area of Dun Laoghaire/Rathdown County Council. Now we have the Section 85 is also on the agenda for, this big table today, at the Dun Laoghaire/Rathdown County Council meeting.
CATHAO RLEACH Does it mean that we are the lead agency; isn't that correct?
MR. FLYN: That's correct. So the Transportation,
Water and Emergency Services Department of wicklow County Council is of the opinion that it would be more efficient and effective if wicklow County Council delivered the project and powers, functions and duties of Dun Laoghaire/Rathdown County Council in respect of the options, selection and preliminary design statutory orders and the construction of this particular scheme within the administrative area of Dun Laoghaire/Rathdown County Council to be performed by wicklow County council.
CLLR. RYAN I propose that.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Behan goes first, sorry. CLLR BEHAN Chairman, could I just say that this is one of the most welcome proposals I have seen at this Chamber for a long time and I am certainly happy to seconds it, but it should be passed.
The reason I welcome it is for too long we have been hiving off responsibilities to other local authorities,
waste management going to one particular local authority, other road sections going to Kildare County Council. Now at least we are getting control of the most important piece of road infrastructure that effects the vast majority, the most number of people in 15:00 this county, and that is N11/M11, M50. So I will certainly welcome it, Cathaoirleach.

Can I just get an assurance that there is no involvement by Kildare County Council on this? This is 15:00 going to be our project, we will be managing it from beginning to end, Cathaoirleach. On that basis I propose it. Thank you.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Fox?
CLLR. FOX: Yeah, I too would welcome this. Just there 15:00 was one point I needed clarification on, and I know the vote is on a Section 85 agreement, but within it, it says that:
"There is no i mmedi ate needs for additional junction capacity improvements on the N11 bet ween Junction 8 Kilmac and Junction 14 Coynes Cross based on the current operation".

But it says:
"However, to bring this section of the corridor up to the requi red standard, exi sting direct accesses left on and left of $f$ junction shoul $d$ be closed or
reconf i gur at ed".

Now I know we had a proposal a few years ago which we discussed in Bray Town Hall where they were restricting movements onto the N11 at certain junctions and it was a sort of a single exit onto the N 11 . What does that statement mean exactly? Just I would just like to get clarification on it?
CATHAO RLEACH Just one second, Michae1.
Councillor Mitchell?
CLLR M TCFELL: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Yeah, just I say I am delighted that we have this. This really is the first step towards the formal design process of the road and I think it is very important that we move forward with this. There is an awful lot of work to be done to get this road done, as I understand it, with the best will in the world we probably won't start digging until 2022, there are so many procedures, designs, purchases, et cetera, to be done. The overall project cost is probably in the region of 100 million so it is a massive investment to County Wicklow that this is starting off.

I just have two points about it, apart from welcoming it, that is this is $I$ accept the short way into meets the beginning of this at the north end? This will become a third lane road, I think that is the plan. Secondly, the preliminary information for the
what we just passed in relation to Newtown has said some things about a third lane on the road and has about three major objectives but it doesn't have anything to do with improving the access for express buses. I think it is absolutely vital because Irish Rail does not plan to improve, in fact it plans to disimprove the railway south of Bray, it is important that we have priority for express buses on whatever road is designed and that they are adequately treated. We have important services in Greystones, Newcastle, the $84 x$, and we also have other buses, such as the 133, and wicklow and wexford buses, and they need priority to get through and onto these junctions and through this and this isn't listed as part of the objectives of the scheme. Thank you.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Tommy Cullen?
CLLR TOMM CULLEN Yes, Chairman, I am here today and, sorry --
CATHAO RLEACH It is gone.
CLLR TOMMY CULLEN Sorry, okay.
CATHAO RLEACH It is on.
CLLR TOMM CULEN Right, Chairman, thank you. I am just here today and I'm a bit bemused by what I am hearing. I fully support but the last two items on the agenda is spending hundreds of millions of euros for
N11 and I am representing an area where the N81, we have just been told there's not a penny.

CATHAO RLEACH Councillor, I know -CLLR. TOMMY CULLEN No, no, hold on now.

CATHAO RLEACH Listen, we are talking on this particular thing, you can bring up your area -CLLR TOMM CULLEN $N o$, no, Chairman, I will make it, it is a fair point.
CATHAO RLEACH with due respect, with due respect, we are talking about an agreement between Dun Laoghaire and wicklow County Council on the N11. We are not talking about the N81.
CLLR TOMM CULLEN Chairman, chairman, you may not like what I am saying --
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor, refer to the N11 please. CLLR TOMM CULLEN But please afford me the opportunity to say it. You may not like what I am saying, Chairman, but please afford me the opportunity to say it.
CATHAO RLEACH Listen, it is nothing about me liking it or not. I am asking you --
CLLR TOMM CULLEN I am entitled to say it. CATHAO RLEACH I am affording you the opportunity -CLLR TOMM CULLEN If you want a row, we'11 have a row.

CATHAO RLEACH I am affording you the opportunity to talk about the N 11 .
CLLR. TOMM CULLEN If you want a row, we'11 have a row. I am entitled, I am entitled Chairman --
CATHAO RLEACH You can talk about the N11.
CLLR. TOMM CULLEN Chairman, you are not going to -Chairman, I raised it, I have raised a legitimate point.

CATHAO RLEACH Ta7k about the N11.
CLLR TOMM CULLEN we have just been told here that there is 100 --

CATHAO RLEACH Listen, listen --
CLLR TOMM CULLEN Chair, there is 100 miliion.
CATHAO RLEACH Listen, you'11 find another forum to talk about the N81.

CLLR. TOMM CULLEN There is another 100 mil1ion just been allocated for this --

CATHAO RLEACH But we are moving on.
CLLR. TOMM CULLEN There was another 100 million allocated for the last item, that's 200 million, and we haven't got a penny for the N 81 .
CATHAO RLEACH Could I have a proposer and seconder?
CLLR. RYAN Guys, I second it.
CLLR TOMM CULLEN Now that is a fair point for me to raise, Chairman, and it appears to me that the priority of this Council is for the N11 where all the senior officials live --

CATHAO RLEACH Is this agreed? Members, is this agreed?

COUNCI LLORS: Agreed.
CLLR TOMM CULLEN -- at the expense of the people of West Wicklow and South Wicklow who have the N81, and that is a fair point for me. Now, Chairman, if you are 15:05 going to continue this here, we will continue into a lot of other places.

CATHAO RLEACH we are moving on. okay, we are under number 5. Number 5.

CLLR TOMY CULLEN we will continue into a lot of other places and you are not going to shout me down. so if you start it off this way, you are dealing with the wrong man, just get that into your head.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor, you deal with what is on the agenda and you will get a fair hearing.
CLLR TOMM CULLEN I will deal with -- you are dealing -- we are talking about roads funds and that is what we are dealing with.

CATHAO RLEACH Your bullying won't get on with me now. 15:05 CLLR. TOMM CULLEN No, you are trying to cut across me having my say and representing the people I represent. We have just been cut 200 milli ion for the N81 and we have just been told here today that was another 200 million for the N11. That is a fair point to me to make and I will not be afraid to speak up for the people I represent here.

CATHAO RLEACH Councillor o'Neill?
CLLR. TOMM CULLEN Councillor O'Neill's rattling, he is like a big spoiled baby, a big rattler.
CLLR. O NEI LL: Did you attend the proposal meeting? CATHAO RLEACH Councillor O'Neill, please we are moving on. Lorraine?
MS. GALLAGER: Yes, Cathaoirleach. Members have been circulated with a letter from David Cromie, financial management accountant, there before the meeting. I e-mailed the Elected Members on Friday just to advise them while this matter wasn't listed on the agenda in accordance with paragraph 16 of the standing orders:
"A motion for the purpose of dealing with urgent busi ness, notwithstanding any ot her provisions of these standing orders, a motion may be proposed without notice for the purpose of dealing with urgent busi ness rel at ed to a function of the local authority subject to 15:06 the requi rement that not less than maj ority of menbers vote in favour".

So to consider this matter, and the matter is the borrowing of money for Rebuilding Ireland Home Loan. am going to have to take a vote to consider it. So if the Members will bear with me, if you are agreeable to consider it, say "for".
CATHAO RLEACH Okay, all right. [vote taken].
MS. GALLAGER: That's 24 for and six not present. So now we can deal with the matter that's in front of us which is, as circulated to you this afternoon, wicklow County Council subject to the approval of the Department of Housing, Planning, Community and Local Government sanction the borrowing of the sum of
10 million in respect of Rebuilding Ireland Home Loan.
Is there a proposer and a seconder?
CLLR BLAKE: Sorry, Chairman, can I ask a question in regards to this?
CATHAO RLEACH Yes, of course you can.
CLLR. BLAKE: The problem with the whole thing is that for the price of housing in wicklow we are experiencing a situation where the loans that are available to people are not sufficient. Can I ask here what
actually is the position of people getting that particular loan and being sufficient to be able to purchase a house, particularly in the North wicklow area, but even in South wicklow we are finding a situation where they are a lot cheaper than they are in 15:09 Bray or Greystones, but the money available to them is not sufficient to purchase a house.

MR. CURRAN Yeah, Cathaoirleach, the value of the loan, the maximum is up to 320,000 but a lot of the problems are around affordability and people having commitments. We have 91 applications to date, 37 of those were declined. It goes to our Credit Committee here and it goes to the Housing Agency at national level to do the full checks and come back with a recommendation. 23 were approached which is what we need to get the approval for here to drawdown the loan in relation to that. But if people get the maximum loan they come within they can't afford a house but the unfortunate thing is that they have to have, you know, no more than 35 per cent of their income has to be spent servicing the loan, sometimes a standard prudent way of approving loans, and they have to have the deposit as well. We are doing everything we can to provide as much information as we can, we listen to them, but sometimes if people don't have the payment there is nothing we can do about it. We have 23 approved already and we will be working with.
CLLR BLAKE: Sorry, Pat, just I certainly support the 23 approvals anyway, I am surprised that there is so
many people who have had their deposits -- I just wonder are they primarily in the less expensive areas, those 23?
MR. CURRAN No, no, they are right around the county. 320,000 will buy you a house in the upper east part of the county as well, there is a good distribution.

CLLR. BLAKE: Thank you very much.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor cullen on this?
CLLR TOMY CULLEN Yes, Chairman. The problem, as I see it, is the inordinate delay in getting sanctioned because when I came on the Council first the loan application took approximately three weeks for it to be applied for and sanctioned. In three weeks the person knew whether or not they were going to qualify for their loan. This now has to go before a credit Committee in this Council which may meet once every six or seven weeks and then they have to make a recommendation, then it goes up to Dublin, up to the department in Dublin for their approval, that takes another long time. And the problem is that in the meantime the houses could be sold by somebody who has got from a private lending institution a house that they were looking for. So I think that there should be a target of no longer, no more, than four weeks from the date of applying for a loan application to the date 15:11 of a decision whether or not to grant it to give a letter of approval because it is simply not fair on the Applicants that to go through all the paperwork then just having the auctioneer then sells the house to
somebody else because somebody else simply got their money before them. And I would ask to see what is the time limits on getting these loans approved because certainly from what I am experiencing that there does seem to be an inordinate time delay in getting loans approved. I think the whole system is very cumbersome and I think there should be one evaluation committee for the matter, for the application, and it should be most likely here. Thank you, Chairman.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Timmons?
CLLR. TIMONS: Just briefly clarification on this: Is this the cheap loan that was announced by the Government in January where you can get fixed loans for 25 years at two-and-a-half per cent -- or 25 years at two-and-a-half per cent and 30 years at two per cent, is that the rates around that, that is what we are referring to here, is it?

MR. CURRAN Yes, yes.
CLLR TI MMONS: Well I certainly think it is a really welcome initiative and there are a lot of people will qualify based on the income rates that are in place. Thank you.

CATHAO RLEACH Okay, I am letting Joe in now.
MR. LANE: okay. we recently had a Housing Agency down just to check our practises, particularly about the Committees and the way we were doing things. Our time periods would be roughly within practises, and four weeks isn't possible at the moment. Many times, and the Housing Agency is quite clear on this, many
applicants aren't coming in complete and it takes sometime to engage with them, just to make sure for information. The Housing Agency then provides a service checks all that and makes sure we stay within guidelines. So we do endeavour to get things done as quickly as possible but it does take a while to get through these. We are also in a situation where we are trying to get people through and you can see by the numbers. But at the same time we are trying to be fair to the whole process in ensuring that there is affordability regarding the loans going forward. So again we do our best in the timeframe for four weeks, bearing in mind how complicated the whole process is, and the involvement (inaudible) Housing Agency just wouldn't be possible because we couldn't commit to that 15:14 amount.

CATHAO RLEACH Okay. I am moving on.
MS. GALLAGER No, that's it.
CATHAO RLEACH That's it, okay. Proposed and seconded, okay. We are moving on. Okay, 5, the Kildare and Wicklow ETB.

MR CURRAN Yeah, Cathaoirleach, I have distributed the legal advice which we got from our own law agent and he is advising that there is a Garda investigation ongoing here, that we need to proceed with caution. :
> "It is important to realise that the primacy in our system of I aw is gi ven to the criminal process. The reason is because of the importance of a fair trial,
needl ess to say, and the risk of the criminal process that can occur if there is unrestrained public controversy and debate about an issue in advance of a criminal trial".

He also mentioned about the most important feature of a criminal trial is the swearing in of an impartial jury:
"And any adverse pre-trial publicity can result in a trial being del ayed for a significant period of time until publicity has died down, and in extreme cases can result in a trial never occurring. It is very i mportant that a jury can be sworn in".

What he is saying there is that we don't want a
controversial debate about this and publicity that might affect people becoming members of a jury. He is also saying that it is possible there are a number of persons connected with the Council may be involved in these proceedings:

[^0]Any official who is a menber who has any invol vement with the KWETB may well feel constrained at a Council meeting if they remain silent and they are in somewhat
an invi di ous position at such a meeting as they will not be in a position to debate the matter or def end their position at this time".

He is saying:
"It is a legitimate of course for the Council to ask the KWETB for updates".

That's his point there really that, look, it is an ongoing Garda investigation, we shouldn't really comment. We got correspondence also from KWETB's solicitor who is saying:
"I confirml amacting on behal f of KWETB in rel ation rel ating to procurement of financial issues. KWETB is fully cooperating with same. As it is a live investigation it is not appropriate to comment further on it.

I can confirm゙ --

He is saying --
"t hat if menbers of $\mathbf{W}$ ckl ow County Council have inf ormation that might assist the investi gation they shoul d contact Detective Superintendent Gerry WAl sh at 01-6663700" .

I will distribute that. But that is it, Cathaoirleach, it is just an ongoing Garda investigation and we have to be extremely careful in relation to any comments. CATHAO RLEACH From my point of view I am in the Councillor's hands in regard to this. I have an opinion on it but I mean if Councillors wish, if the majority of Councillors wish to go ahead and discuss this, I will certainly go ahead with a discussion on it. But we have the legal advice there on both counts and it is up to the Members to decide what we do today. Councillor O'Neill?

CLLR. O NEI LL: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. Again going by our own law agent he has advised in his reply:
"In that regard the Council Members are perfectly entitled to seek an update".

So that's really what I am going on. What is the update? This is going on, and on, and on, and the world knows that there are several wicklow County Councillors involved in the committee of the KWETB and they have voted to remain silent over the last 12 months. I raised the issue here on the procurement IN Dunlavin School 12 months ago and both myself and Councillor Behan, Joe Behan, were concerned about how the school will run and we got no answers from anyone, including the KWETB Board. So it is really on the grounds that there are a lot of people, a lot of people, asking me and asking the public representatives
what's the story with the KWETB. It is public money and the sooner the better we can answer it or we can give them a satisfactory answer. But I think for members of the KWETB, especially the Members of this Chamber here that remain silent, this is going on 12 months, I don't think that is good enough. There has to be some questions that we can ask, and I think the sooner the better, because the longer it is left that people are not answering, are not coming with any sort of answers the more the public will be concerned. So I 15:19 would fully support these people here in pointing out that the Members of the Council are perfectly entitled to seek an update, and that's what I'm asking for.
CATHAO RLEACH Okay. Councillor Fox?
CLLR. DUNE: Chairman, I would like to be excused from 15:19 the meeting please?

CATHAO RLEACH okay.
CLLR. FOX: Chairman, a couple of points: I think given that it has progressed onto a Garda investigation, the last thing we want to do is
compromise an investigation. I think it is very dangerous territory to start talking when there is a live investigation. Because if there is a financial impropriety the last thing anybody in this Chamber wants to do is compromise that investigation that those 15:20 persons would escape justice, or escape prosecution I should say.

But there is a couple of points, if there is a debate,
and I feel we hadn't shouldn't necessarily have it at this particular point, but if there is the board members of the KWETB who probably know more facts than anybody else in the chamber can't participate in the debate. You know, because it is clearly says in the legal advice that they shouldn't participate in it. So certainly I would, like I said at the last meeting, would urge the Minister to produce the report. The report is a draft, it is currently a draft report, I think submissions were -- I could be wrong in this -but I think the board members could make submissions. So the draft should be published, it should be done, an actual report, and then at that stage if the investigation is concluded we can have a debate on it, a discussion on it. But I think it is very dangerous territory to discuss it today when there is a live investigation with An Garda Síochána.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Cullen?
CLLR. TOMY CULLEN Yes, Chairman. We11, first and foremast, the manager said if there is a trial, a criminal trial. I am not aware, perhaps Mr. Curran has information that I don't have, I am not aware that anyone has been charged and maybe Mr. Curran will clarify that, obviously he must have some information that he is referring to, a criminal trial. I am not aware of any criminal trial. If there was a criminal trial obviously he would have a point but Mr. Curran obviously has information that we don't have. CATHAO RLEACH I think he said "criminal
investigation".
MR. CURRAN I think what it says there is quite clear, it is an investigation which may ultimately lead to.
CLLR TOMM CULLEN which "may".
CATHAO RLEACH "may".
CLLR. TOMM CULLEN May then is may or may not. So there is no trial so, we can discuss it.

The other thing is, Chairman, let's be clear, members of the board of the KW have gone on national television, on Prime Time Investigates, and openly gave interviews discussing these matters. Members of this Council have gone before the PAC Committee in the Dáil and taken questions and answered questions about this matter so there is no prohibiting factor there. So if it can be discussed on international television and the PAC Committee there is no restrictions on the board members, who are our delegates, from giving us a report here today and I would ask them to do that. There is absolutely no restriction why they cannot.
Chairman, I can speak I suppose, I raised this matter over the last week and looked to have this on the agenda today, and I did so because I was, I think it was the 27 th September last, I actually attended that infamous or famous KW board meeting when they decided to go into secret meetings and subsequently held secret meetings for the next almost six months discussing this matter, banning the press and removing the press and the public from the public galleries. This was a
public body discussing public education meeting in secret. What shocked me at the time one that one of the strongest advocates for going into secret meetings was Councillor Jennifer whitmore. I know she is not here to defend herself here today.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor, I would prefer if you didn't use any councillor's name when they are not here to be fair to her, you know.
CLLR TOMM CULLEN well, chairman, let's be clear here about this, Chairman, the first meeting in July every councillor knows there is a County Council meeting and they would have known that for over 12 months. There was two weeks notice given back in June this was on the agenda today. We have all had to come back from holidays and all to attend meetings here, special meetings, I have had to do it and I am sure other councillors have had to do it, so that's quite normal, and particularly when it is relating to an issue where Ms. Whitmore was a director of the board and was one of the strongest advocates to go into
secret meetings and I think she should be here to explain that here today.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor, that's your opinion. CLLR TOMM CULLEN It is my opinion and I have said that, Chairman.
CATHAO RLEACH That is not fair.
CLLR TOMM CULLEN And I think because ultimately this is about transparency and accountability. This is involving the education of over 14,000 children,
secondary children in the school, and thousands of primary children who are waiting to go into school. Now we are in a situation where there has been almost six months of secret meetings of a public body. That
is not acceptable in any democracy. I don't believe that kw board should behave like that. There should be nothing hidden about a public board, it should meet in public and carry out its duties and functions in public. I am just finishing, Chair.
CATHAO RLEACH Yes, please do.
CLLR. TOMM CULLEN we have discussed here loads of times issues that are under investigation but there is no one charged that I am aware of at the moment but this has fundamental impacts on children's education about proper procurement and procedures. We have all seen the Prime Time Investigates programme, we have seen the various serious matters raised in that programme, and as I have been told there is a lot more still to come.
CATHAO RLEACH We don't know that either.
15: 25

CLLR TOMM CULLEN We11, Chairman, I believe, I would ask that, and I would agree with Councillor fox that the Minister would immediately publish the full Thorn report. We asked for the chief executive of the kw to come here to give a presentation, she has obviously declined to do so. That is disappointing. We have asked for the Thorn report here today, we haven't got that. So here we are here today, we are the body representing the children education in this county.

As far as I can see, this experiment of the joint education between wicklow and Kildare has failed and it is not working and the whole process has now fell into disrepute. I think we should be looking for now is to return to a wicklow VEC where Wicklow is independently accountable for its own secondary education, which we had been for the previous 60 or 70 years and we never had these types of issues being raised. Because clearly, Chairman --

CATHAOI RLEACH Can you finish now?
CLLR. TOMM CULLEN -- this thing has collapsed in on itself, everybody is running for cover, nobody wants to be accountable, and at the end of day parents are at home, they don't know what is happening with their schools, we have heard all the things as I said, and I recal1, Chairman, that we would return to the system of old VEC where Wicklow now would have its own VEC back. But I think the members of that KW board should be here today and should give us answers, and in particular Councillor whitmore should be here today to answer why she was supporting these secret meetings. Thank you, Chairman.

CATHAOI RLEACH Councillor Walsh?
CLLR. WALSH Thanks, Cathaoirleach. I would be inclined to agree with Councillor Fox's comments in that looking at the legal points $I$ think we need to take cognisance of the legal advice where it states:
"I amaware that there is a substantial criminal i nvesti gation on the part under way".

There may not have been anybody charged at this point but in time but it is a possibility that somebody may be charged in the future. So if we do go ahead to discuss the issue then we will very much so restricted from what we can and can't say. So I would be inclined to maybe go for the update on the current position.
CATHAO RLEACH Council1or McLough1in?
CLLR. MELOUGLIN Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I would agree, I don't think they should be discussed today. I do however think it is not correct to mention any one councillor, I think that is appalling, particularly when there are others who are not here either but who were in chair and whatever and had different roles to play. So to single out one individual $I$ think is pretty appalling.
But what I do think we can do while this investigation is taking place, I would like to see a root and branch audit of all matters of governance in the KWETB and I Wicklow County Council should write to the new CEO and ask her to start that forthwith.

I have to say I do agree with Councillor cullen with regards to wicklow going back to the VEC structure. As a member of the board at that time and also as a member of the audit committee which my colleague was the chairman, we didn't have these issues. We most
certainly had very, very detailed reports every two months when we met and we knew exactly what was going on with wicklow where it was governed in an effective and appropriate manner.

But one of the things that did come about in the audit committee of the KWETB was that when they were looking for reports they were told there wasn't enough money in the system to actually pay for it. So I think we should be very strong in our letter to Deirdre Keyes and I think we should be saying that sufficient resources are allocated and a root and branch throughout the whole of the KWETB is looked into and any discrepancies should be fixed forthwith. Thank you.
CATHAO RLEACH Okay. Councillor Fortune?
CLLR FORTUN: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. I take the CE's point about the cognisance of the advice we got from the law officer and that's what $I$ intend to do, the contribution I make, I will read the paragraph where it says:
"Having said all of the above, it is perfectly legitimate that the Elected Menber should be concerned with the public monies and expenses in an appropriate fashi on in accordance with the rel evant rul es and protocols applicable in the particular ci rcunst ances"...

And therefore we are entitled to ask questions and that's what I want to do and I am sure some of the existing members of the board would probably want to say something as well. So my questions are based around the role of the board in relation to how the board is selected, the corporate governance matters, the relationship in regards to how they interact with the audit committee, the tender opening panels, who selects them, who sits on them? And also, which is in the public domain and as discussed in many forums, the legal advice that the chairman got from Philip Lee solicitors and was he advised to give that to all board members and did he do it? Can the members confirm this, why was it not circulated and why didn't chair resign? what schools in wicklow are affected by this? I have heard one or two schools mentioned. Also the matter for the board of the appointment of SNA, what is the situation around all that? In regards to tenders --
CATHAO RLEACH Sorry, just to briefly, just for a second, Councillor Fortune. We are discussing whether we should discuss this or not, right.
CLLR FORTUNE: I am asking questions.
CATHAO RLEACH So I mean if we decide to discuss it, I will let you in then.
CLLR. FORTUN: $N o$, no, I just want to finish, I won't be long.

CATHAO RLEACH okay. CLLR. FORTUNE: Tenders who selects the --

CLLR. WNTERS: Chair, can we use the microphones please?
M. GALLAGER: we are using them.

CLLR. FORTUNE: Yes, so am I. I am actually sitting into it.

CATHAOI RLEACH He is, yeah.
CLLR. FORTUN: who selects the opening panels and how are they selected, who has the signing authority approval regarding agreements and leases in the KWETB? And how is our law officer aware of the legal advice when the board was not and the meetings in camera, I would be seriously concerned about.

To finish, Chair, and I will wrap up with this, I am calling for an independent investigation of the process of member selection in 2014 from this authority to that particular board. You will be well aware from both our presence in this Chamber that $I$ have continually asked that question since 2014. If I was being ultra cynical I would say that, my God, why was that meeting
conducted the way it was, why was I cut off --
CATHAO RLEACH we are on to something else.
CLLR. FORTUN: I am asking that question, so I am asking, Chair --
CATHAO RLEACH KWETB.
CLLR. FORTUN: Please let me finish and then $I$ will be finished.

CATHAO RLEACH Stick to that please.
CLLR. FORTUN: Yeah, I will. I am calling for an
independent investigation of the process of member selection from this authority to the KWETB in 2014. CATHAO RLEACH okay. CLLR. FORTUN: Because I feel I was mistreated. CATHAO RLEACH Okay. Councillor Lawless, and then we $15: 33$ are going to make a decision on it.
CLLR LAVEESS: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. As a member of the board of KWETB I think it is only right that I do kind of answer as such some of the questions that the Council have put forward and have some input. This ${ }_{15: 33}$ has been a very difficult time for the board in KWETB and we have continually been asking questions, looking for investigations, and I have know some councillors say we have remained silent on it. In somewhat we have remained silent here in these Chambers but there has been public meetings where we have not remained silent and our meetings have taken up the majority of the time on this particular subject and we have grilled and requested and looked for answers upon answers upon answers about this investigation. we have asked for the Minister to publish that report as soon as possible. We want that report. We want to get this sorted as soon as we possibly can.

I do think it is right, as a board member, that we should bring back some information but we do have to be careful if there is an ongoing investigation that we don't prejudice it if somebody is being investigated. But I think the stuff we have seen in the public, you
know, there is no issues about talking about that, yes, there was a Prime Time programme. As a board member, I wasn't aware that there was going to be a Prime Time programme. I did find out afterwards that the three ladies in question were very restricted in what they could actually speak on as well because of legal issues.

I certainly did not advocate for any meetings in secret when this was going on. I would have been one of the ones in the forefront that wanted this publicly out in the arena because it is public money. There is issues around the legal bill which Councillor Tom Fortune has brought up, and I grilled the CE last week on numerous questions of this. We also set up a subcommittee of the board as well to go through the legal documents ourselves and to ask questions why certain things haven't been done.

Now the KWETB executive have also started their procedures as well by looking at their governance, their policies, their procurement policies and everything is being reviewed and going forward they are hoping that this situation wouldn't happen again.

There is questions, Councillor Fortune, you have asked and I probably cannot answer them today but I am sure of them are fairly straightforward of who opens the tender openings and, you know, stuff like that. That
is straightforward information and I don't see why we couldn't give the policy and procedures around how that is actually done. That is not going to infringe on any investigation, it is just a policy matter.

But, yes, we have sat here I suppose in the Chambers quietly listening to what has been going on but it has been an extremely, extremely big investigation and it has made a massive impact as well. But I want to assure the Members here that we are as a board trying our utmost to rectify what has happened but we are also trying to make sure that we get the answers that we want to make sure that a situation like this does not happen again. As I say, our concern is for the education and welfare of our students with all our colleges and schools that we have, and also the staff and teaching staff as well within the KwETB because it has affected them as well. So, look, you know, if the questions maybe want to be written down because I couldn't take note of them all and maybe we could request that the KWETB send some kind of report back in for the September meeting.
CATHAO RLEACH Okay, grand. Councillor Behan?
CLLR. FORTUNE: Chair, sorry, can I get a clarification point just very quickly? very quickly.
CATHAO RLEACH Just on that, yeah.
CLLR FORTUNE: Yeah, just clarification. Can I just clarify with Councillor Lawless did the members get a copy of Philip Lee's advice?

CATHAO RLEACH Philip Lee's advice. Listen, I don't want --

CLLR. FORTUNE: No, no, I am not getting into it, I am not getting into it.

CATHAO RLEACH I think it is unfair --
15:37
CLLR. FORTUN: No, I am not getting into the advice, I just want to know did they get a copy of it.

CATHAO RLEACH I want to let Councillor Behan in.
CLLR. LANLESS: We11 --
CATHAO RLEACH Sorry, sorry --
CLLR. LAVZESS: Oh, sorry, he was just directing a question to me, Cathaoirleach, sorry.
CATHAO RLEACH You are not being interrogated as far as I'm concerned.
CLLR. LAVZESS: I know that.
CLLR. BEHAN If Councilior Lawless wants to answer it, that's fine by me. Do you want to answer it?
CLLR. LAVLESS: No, you go ahead there.
CATHAO RLEACH No, no, no, listen, Councillor Behan, go ahead.
CLLR. BEHAN It just if she wants to take it up there, that's all.

CATHAO RLEACH I don't want dialogue going between two councillors across the table.
CLLR. LAVLESS: No, no, I want proper procedures,

CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Behan, please go ahead.
CLLR. BEHAN I am trying to.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Behan, go ahead.

CLLR BEHAN Right, Cathaoirleach, the last statement that Councillor Lawless made I think is the most worrying thing of all, which is that so much time of the KWETB board has been spent discussing this issue instead of what they should be discussing, which is the 15:38 educational welfare of the students under their management throughout the County of wicklow and obviously the County of kildare.

The second fact that we must all remember is that the Minister for Education sought a report on certain matters, again we don't know specifically what they are, but on receipt of that report he immediately sent it to the Gardaí. That's a fact.

The third fact we have from our law agent is that there is a substantial criminal investigation underway which means that this is an extremely serious matter that a number of public representatives of wicklow County Council have been given responsibility to oversee. The 15:39 law agent I think has been very clear in saying that we, as the other Members of the Council, are entitled to ask questions about the expenditure of public money because that's what the public education system or educational training boards is there for, it is a
democratic body. The people who are elected as councillors have a remit to ensure that public money is spent properly. So therefore it is quite legitimate, as the law agent has said, for us to discuss this
matter and to seek information.

I would agree with Councillor Lawless when she says that the questions -- I am sure they have been noted, they will be noted by the stenographer, I am sure it has been noted by Ms. Gallagher and Gillian as well -those questions should be submitted, not to the CEO, but to the chair of the KWETB, the current chair, for discussion at their next meeting and answers should be supplied by the KWETB board. Not a new CEO that has just come in in the last month, the board members should be answering the questions that have been put and they have been listed there quite clearly by previous speakers. I am not going it to go into them again.

But I would agree with, finally, two other things that have been proposed here, and if they need to be seconded I am certainly happy to second them. One is that the Minister for Education be asked immediately to 15:40 publish the Thorn report so that we can all see what is in this report, that led to a substantial criminal investigation. The people of this county and the people of County Kildare, as well as the people of Ireland, the taxpayers of Ireland, are entitled to know 15:40 what is in that report. That is point number one. Point number two, I want to second Councillor Fortune's proposal that the procedures that were used in the selection of members from this body to be on the KWETB
in 2014, that they be subject to an independent investigation so that we can discover exactly how members were selected at this body and what was the legitimate validity of the choices that were made at that particular time. I think he has proposed that that be investigated and I am certainly seconding that, Cathaoirleach. Thank you.
CATHAO RLEACH Right, there is nobody else coming in? CLLR THORNH LL: Cathaoirleach?

CATHAO RLEACH Okay, go ahead.
CLLR THORNH LL: Go raibh maith agat.
CATHAO RLEACH You only indicated now, you hadn't indicated before that. Go ahead.

CLLR. THORNH LL: Cathaoirleach, go raibh maith agat. Cathaoirleach, I would just like to say just briefly that I would concur with a lot of the points that are being made here but I would just like to make a point, I recently attended a KWETB meeting here in wicklow and I observed what was going on at the meeting. To be quite honest, I was shocked what was going on because we were talking earlier on about suspending standing orders and other work not being done. But what I am saying here, what I can see here with this is there is an awful lot of talk about procedure, grievance procedures, and other matters like that. As

Councillor Behan, Councillor Fortune and Councillor cullen are saying, the education of the youngsters is suffering and this should be the main issue.

But one other thing that I would just like to say and it came up in the Prime Time programme by one of the members of the KWETB was the disconnect between the CEO, the top board, and the board members, there didn't 15:42 seem to be any cohesion. It is something that should be looked at because at the end of the day the education of children in Wicklow and Kildare is at stake and it is being missed completely. We are going round the houses and we should get this thing sorted out once and for a11. Go raibh maith agat, Cathaoirleach.
CATHAOI RLEACH okay.
CLLR. TOMM CULLEN Chairman, just one brief question. would Councillor Lawless please answer the question, did you receive the legal advice from Philip Lee, yes or no?

CATHAO RLEACH Councillor, you know quite well, I am moving on.
CLLR TOMM CULLEN Yes or no?
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Lawless, please I don't want banter between two counse1, I don't want you to answer that.

CLLR. LAVLESS: We11 I think, Cathaoirleach, it is a reasonable question, he is asking --

CATHAOI RLEACH Listen, you go through the Chair here, the fact of the matter is if you want to answer it, answer it briefly. If not, $I$ mean $I$ am not having dialogue between councillors and investigation of
councillors in regard to questions. That's not going to happen in here.

CLLR. LANLESS: Legal advice was given to the three chairs in July but we were not told about the legal advice until September. So, no, we didn't get to see it and we are still under investigation about the legal advice. Councillor Thornhill was at that meeting, he seen the questions. So it is a report that was read into the public records, so you can look at that report, and it goes through the statements of the legal 15:44 advice and how it was given out. So that is in the public minutes of the KWETB meeting and he can certainly ask about that. That's all I can add, that is the straight answer.
CLLR. TOMMY CULLEN Chairman, just briefly --
CATHAO RLEACH No, you are not, we are moving on. CLLR. TOMM CULLEN Chairman, that's a shocking revelation that the legal advice was withheld from the board members. Chairman, just for record, I attended and Councillor Lawless voted against --
CATHAO RLEACH Ms. Gallagher is in now.
CLLR. TOMM CULLEN Councillor Lawless voted against holing the meetings in secret.

CATHAO RLEACH Right, okay.
CLLR. TOMM CULLEN I have to give her her credit for that.

CATHAO RLEACH Just for your information.
MS. GALLAGFER Elected Members, just there is a proposal to write to the Minister and ask the Minister
for Education \& Skills to publish the report. Just to recap, that we did write on behalf of the Elected Members to the Minister for Education in December 2017 and then as recently as the 19th June last. So we did receive a letter, which was circulated, from the Department of Education at the time, and that was in February, and it said:
"As you are aware, Mr. Ri chard Thorn was appoi nted by the $M$ ni ster for Education \& Skills under Section 40 of the ETB Act, 2013, to carry out an investi gation into the performance of the KWETB board, its functions, and particularly in rel ation to the public procurement i mpropriety matters. As a process of the investigation and reporting is still underway it would be i nappropri ate for the $M$ ni ster to comment further at this junct ure".

We wrote to them again on the 19th June:
"The Elected Menbers wi sh to di scuss the matter at the next council meeting" --
which is today --
"and passed a resol ution that the Department for Education \& Skills publish the final draft of the report of Mr . Ri chard Thorn, that same be provided to Wickl ow County Council i mmedi ately with any I egal
advi ce the KWETB have recei ved".

So there isn't a response to that. I can certain7y write again if you so wish?
CATHAO RLEACH Is it agreed we write again? COUNCI LLORS: Yes.

CATHAO RLEACH we write again, okay.
MS. GALLAGER: Just in relation to that, we wrote to the CE, Dr. Deirdre Keyes of Kildare and wicklow Education Training Board on the 21st June, advised her that the matter would be discussed again at the Wicklow County Council scheduled for Monday, the 2nd July and that the Elected Members requested that the Council write to you inviting you to attend this meeting, again outlining the background. There is a letter from the KWETB on behalf of the chief executive dated the 20th June just advising that the CE is currently on leave and she asked to convey her apologies as she is unable to attend at the meeting. Just to update the Members in respect of that correspondence.
CATHAO RLEACH Anything else?
CLLR TOMM CULLEN Chairman?
CATHAO RLEACH wait there now.
M. GALLAGER: There is also a proposal by Councillor Fortune seconded by Councillor Behan that 15:47 Council initiate an investigation into the processes of the selection of the representatives to the KWETB back in 2014. Is that agreed?
CATHAO RLEACH This is nothing got to do with what we
are talking about here today in regard to the KWETB. If Councillor Fortune wants to put that down on the agenda, $I$ will take that on the agenda at September's meeting.

CLLR. FORTUN: It has everything to do with it, Chair. 15:47 Chair, it has everything to do with it.

CATHAO RLEACH It is not appropriate to take it today. CLLR. FORTUN: It has everything to do with it and you know it.

CATHAO RLEACH In regard to this, this is something that --

CLLR. FORTUN: It has everything to do with it and you know it.

CATHAO RLEACH That was a democratic decision that was taken by the Members at that time.

CLLR. FORTUN: It has everything to do with it and you know it.

CATHAO RLEACH Is there anything else?
CLLR. FORTUN: It has everything to do with it and you know it and so do other Members in this Chamber. You know damn we11, Chair.

CLLR. TOMM CULLEN Sorry, Chair, before you move on. CATHAO RLEACH We have had the discussion, we will move on.

CLLR. TOMM CULLEN Hold on now, Chair, before you move on this is a very serious debate. There is 14,000 children --

CATHAO RLEACH Listen, listen, we are moving on we have had a debate.

CLLR. TOMM CULLEN we have had the statement from Councillor Lawless that critical legal information from Philip Lee was withheld from her and the rest of the board members.
CATHAO RLEACH Wicklow County Development Plan, we are 15:48 onto 6.

CLLR TOMM CULLEN Surely that should send shockwaves through this Council that the legal advice paid for by the taxpayer was withheld from the board of the KW. If that does not cry out for independent and proper investigation.

CATHAO RLEACH Sorry, 6, I am on 6 now..
CLLR. TOMM CULLEN And it is a pity here that the people who should be answering these questions have ran out of the chamber here again today.
CATHAO RLEACH Sorry --
CLLR. TOMMY CULLEN This is the second time.
CATHAO RLEACH We are on 6 now.
CLLR. TOMM CULLEN And I would give credit to Councillor Lawless --

CATHAO RLEACH we are on 6 now.
CLLR TOMM CULLEN -- she was one of the few
councillors that stood up in this and voted against the six months of secret meetings of the KW --
CATHAO RLEACH we are on 6.
CLLR TOMM CULLEN -- and I give the lady full credit.

MR. CURRAN Just in relation to number 6, the No Fry Zone, we gave the rationale behind the planning
decision the last day in relation to how it complied with the Development Plan in terms of the time restrictions and the policies in relation to neighbourhood centres, et cetera, so that was done, that was dealt with, and Sean can go through that again 15:49 if we want.

The question was asked then was in relation to Section 44. Now again we provided a legal opinion in relation to Section 44 . That really relates to applications or permissions that are granted that no longer conform with the development plan. In other words, permission was granted but there was a change in the Development Plan and, therefore, the planning permission can be revisited. Now that doesn't apply in 15:49 this case because there hasn't been a change in the Development Plan. That is the advice that is given there by the law agent.

In relation to the application itself, I understand there has been one application to An Bord Pleanála for leave to appeal it. We are not sure about the others but we are trying to get that information, where there has been statutory bodies have appealed or there has been other applications for leave to appeal, there has certainly been one, and that is still open to people to apply to An Bord Pleanála. But that is the situation, Cathaoirleach.

CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Fortune?

CLLR. FORTUNE: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. Yeah, I read the law officer's letter. It is debatable the content of it because it is kind of maybe this and maybe that. But what is very, very important is that the decision by An Bord Pleanála in regards to Wexford in November 2016, the Bord Pleanála officer said that the rationale for the decision they took was based on the fact that they said that the No Fry Zone area was more appropriate for a post primary school, they were dealing with the primary school. So that's a very significant rationale in that decision. That logic that was put forward by the ABP confirms that the decision taken by this Council in our Development Plan, which is in our Development Plan should stand and does stand. Okay, as the CE has said there is an appeal gone in but $I$ don't think it is fair and right to say that the Wexford decision is precedent, it is not. There was a rationale for it.

That's why, among other things, we said here at the last meeting when we were discussing it that the residents in the general area just can't understand what the local authority is doing because there does not appear to be a fair rationale to the decision. All this talk about section 44 and everything else, I mean, 15:51 okay, my view is that would need to be gone into in a lot more legal depth than what we have currently been told because it is not clear at all on my reading. CATHAO RLEACH Okay. Right, Councillor Mitchell?

CLLR MTCFELL: Thank you. Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I just want to say that, as I said before, it is unfortunate this decision was made. The planning staff has explained their rationale behind that but I think it is a pity it wasn't granted permission and then the owner could have appealed to An Bord Pleanála who could have made the superior decision.

Now after the decision I wrote to the HSE because this is a health matter and they are statutorily entitled to $15: 52$ object as a prescribed body under the Planning Act in relation to health matters. I wrote to the HSE and asked them to object to this decision to An Bord Pleanála because nobody in Greystones did object to it at the time because they assumed that the No Fry zone would be triumphant over any other matters in the Development Plan. I haven't yet got a response from the HSE as to whether they are going to object.

However, the Bord Pleanála has agreed to accept an
objection from somebody else associated with the campaign I think. So the matter will be teased out before An Bord Pleanála which I think is the right decision, so I am glad that that is happening. I hope that the HSE, this is a health matter, I think the Lough1instown Obesity Unit has been very much to the forefront of trying to raise national awareness about the dangers of obesity, and indeed the health plague we are going to get from the diseases associated with it
nationally. Also I accept the award from the group, which is very much associated with that Loughlinstown obesity group -- anti-obesity group I should say -from them. So I think I would like to see them objecting as well. Thank you.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Behan?
CLLR. BEHAN We11, Mr. Chairman, look, the fundamental issue is that we made a policy and the Executive changed it. Now I want to read out the latest addition of the Fine Gael newsletter -- no, I mean the Countywise magazine -- you might be mistaken for thinking it is a Fine Gael newsletter when you look at the front page. But however inside it states the following -- this is coming from this Council -- this is what it says:
"Wickl ow County Council has been recognised for being the first Council in Irel and to incl ude an objective in its County Devel opment Plan excl udi ng any new fast food takeaway outlets from being built or fromoperating within 400 metres of schools or play grounds".

That came from this body. So somebody wrote it in the newsletter even for the people of Wicklow. And poor Derek Mitchell was sent off to collect an award about it and other people in this organisation, namely the Chief Executive, Director of Planning, Senior Planner, decided to overrule the Executive Planner who was doing her best to abide by the Council policy, and they
decided to overturn it. And at the same time they are putting out this propaganda saying that, look at what we did, we put it in our Development Plan. It's a farce. And how any official of this county can still proceed to defend it is beyond me. We shouldn't have to be worrying about Bord Pleanála depending on somebody to go and appea1. The Executive should have the decency to admit that they have got it wrong and revoke their planning permission, as the law agent has pointed, if that can be done. It absolutely can be done because you have completely disobeyed the policy decision of the Elected Members of this Council. So yet again I ask the Chief Executive change the decision, withdraw that planning application, and do the decent thing by the Members of the Council, but more importantly the people of County wicklow.

CATHAO RLEACH Councillor walsh?
CLLR. WALSH Yes, just on the same point as Councillor Mitchell made, it is to be welcomed that an Bord Pleanála have accepted an appeal in this case and they are the adjudicators at this point, and subject to their deliberations, I think when we come to review our County Development Plan, we need to come back to that subject again and see if we can make it more robust and tie it down. I think we should let An Bord Pleanála be 15:56 the adjudicators now and let that take its course and await that outcome.

CATHAO RLEACH Councilior Kavanagh. CLLR. KAVANAGt Thanks, Cathaoirleach. Yeah, I have
to say I was absolutely shellshocked when I heard that a decision that we made here in these chambers was completely turned on its head. We sat here for a long, long time discussing it, an awful lot of people spoke it on the day, if memory serves, spoke about the advantages of it, developments of it, how we would be a leading light in the obesity challenge, the battle against obesity in this country. We were being lauded for the decision that was made in the papers afterwards and it had headlines, Greystones received an award for it. Suddenly, all of a sudden, all bets are off, it is not going to happen, it has been overturned. It has made the Council look absolutely ineffective. what did we all sit here for hours for and discuss everything, the ins and out of it, the economics of it and then the ${ }_{15: 57}$ to suddenly have the decision overturned by senior planners? It actually defies belief. So I would certainly like to, along with Councillor Behan, call for the decision to be rescinded that they overthrew our decision and recognise the democracy of these Chambers.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Matthews?
CLLR. MATTHEVE: Chairman, first of al1, it is very worrying to hear two Councillors call for us to overrule the planning, section 44 doesn't apply in that ${ }_{\text {15:58 }}$ case. But if we go back to the Development Plan, as far as my memory serves me, the recommendation was not to proceed with RT17, am I correct in saying that, and we overruled the manager's decision on it, as far I can
remember now. That highlights the dangers of going against the planners' expertise and the manager's recommendations in a Development Plan. I was one of the ones who voted not to proceed with it because I supported RT17 principle. I think what it was trying to do in principle was the right thing. However, you have to be conscious when you put in a policy that's been recommended not to proceed because it is difficult to comply with, or difficult to apply to a planning decision, you need the planners in a situation where if they were to refuse permission based on RT17 the applicant is open to appeal it to the Bord. Or if they uphold it or if they refuse, as they have done in this case, then others can appeal to the Bord. But it is very, very difficult. That is a very, very difficult policy to apply because it is not as tight as it needs to be. I think Councillor Walsh suggested we should go back to the Development Plan and tighten that up and see if it is possible to do. But it is a very, very difficult one to apply. I know it applies to takeaways 15:59 but the principle in it was to try and prevent exposure for school children to foods that are high in fats and sugars, et cetera. But there are so many shops out there that have all those things available to them and it would seem you are penalising one and not the other. 16:00 So really I think it high1ights the dangers of not taking the planners' advice on the Development Plan and possibly we need to return to that policy and tighten it up if that's the Members' decision.

CATHAO RLEACH Okay. Councillor Tommy Cullen?
CLLR. TOMMY CULLEN Yes, Chairman, it was a bizarre decision, bizarre is a mild word, for the decision to go ahead with the grant of this planning permission. Because I draw a comparison to refusals from one-off rural housing. Recently a person, a farmer, who has submitted his baptismal certs, where he went to school, a11 for over ten years, his father's farm, generations, I think put in about 250 years. In fact my great aunt was his mother's schoolteacher so the connection was there for many years. The manager said, well, can't overrule the planners. So one person for a one-off rural housing would clearly qualify. The reason he was refused ultimately was he didn't supply a long birth certificate, he supplied a short birth certificate. When did that ever come into the County Development Plan? So there seems to be one rule for big business, and I am talking about big business, and another then for one-off rural houses and it is something that is going to have to be looked at very, very carefully. Because if you are going to overrule planners for one issue like this and then say you can't intervene for people who are being refused permission on their own farm, that's given 150 years of dwelling in the area, then that's a problem. That's a problem in the plan, that's a serious problem in the planning process.

Now I am surprised at Councillor Matthews he seems to, I don't know, he certainly knows Déirdre de Búrca, I
think he doesn't seem to follow Green policy here in this Chamber.

CLLR. MATTHEVG: There are many in this Chamber. CATHAO RLEACH I don't know if she followed it either. CLLR TOMM CULLEN Not much she did in fairness. But 16:02 Councillor Matthews certainly is no Déirdre de Búrca. CLLR. RYAN It's a compliment.
CLLR TOMM CULLEN There is arguments both sides but the Executive Planner recommended in accordance with the plan to be refused. The Executive overturned our recommendation and granted it, and at the same time there is no intervention to overrule very unreasonable planner refusals for one-off rural houses. That is inconsistent, it can't be sustained, and it is not sustainable. So I think there has to be a root and branch review of what is going on in the planning of this county because there is certainly problems everywhere.
CATHAO RLEACH I am letting the manager in now. MR. CURRAN Okay. Sorry, I don't think the Executive Planner was recommending refusal but like, as I said the last day, and it was pointed out to the Greystones Members the policy was taken into account in that there was a planning restriction put on the property. Also on the takeaway element, also in relation to the policies in relation to neighbourhood centres, that was a11 taken into account, and smarter travel and all the policies in the Development Plan.

Now something, as Councillor Walsh has said, that can be looked at, it can be looked at as part of the Greystones Local Area Plan in relation to tying that down in neighbourhood centres. So that's something we can look at into the future. As I said earlier, I don't think Section 44 applied. It is a live planning application and it is before An Bord Pleanála now so so we will have to see how that pans out.

CATHAO RLEACH okay. We are moving on. It is a live planning application, the Bord have to decide on it at this particular stage.

CLLR TOMMY CULEN Chairman, in regards to Councillor de Búrca, she may be back.
CATHAO RLEACH Okay, we are moving on. okay, 7. MR. CURRAN Cathaoirleach, this again came from
Councillor Matthews who was looking at the Part 8s and whether they can be dealt with at the municipal district level and we outlined the last day that we had a look at that as we had a look at everything that is in Schedule 2 of the Local Government Act, 2014, which sets out functions that can be dealt with by either a Municipal District or County Counci1.

Now it is not as straightforward as everything can be dealt with at municipal district. There are some items 16:04 that can be done at municipal district and some that need to be done at the main council. There is legislation governing that, the Local Government Performance and Reserved Functions in respect of
municipal district and there are two Department circulars that set out when you go to the municipal district and when you go to the main council.

Now Lorraine has done a lot of work on this and she has 16:04 prepared, based on what Members said the last day at the meeting, she prepared a policy document on it, that has gone to the CPG, and the CPG Executive bring it back here. I might ask Lorraine now just to give a short presentation on what we are recommending based on the legislation and on the Department circulars.

CATHAO RLEACH In regard to that, if we look at the presentation, we have a question and answer session on it. Then, as far as I am concerned, it goes back to the municipal authorities to discuss this again. If necessary, Lorraine will go to the municipal authorities to answer any particular question on it before any recommendation coming back from the municipal authority, the meeting then here a month later than that, okay. There will be a full discussion at the municipal authorities after this meeting as well taking back what the recommendations are.

ME. GALLAGER: Okay, thank you, Cathaoirleach. well Members have been circulated with a draft policy. I am just going to run through the contents of that policy. So the purpose of that policy. So the purpose of the policy and what it relates to is to a degree a set of circumstances where the reserved functions set out at Part 2 Schedule 14A are to be exercised by the
municipal districts of wicklow County Council for the Plenary Council. The policy document relates only to the reserved functions set out in Part 2 of schedule A and they are listed 1 to 24.

Now, as we all know from our discussion at the last meeting, the functions set out in Part 2 do not have to formally assigned. However, it is necessary to determine in each case in accordance with the relevant provisions whether a function is to be performed by the 16:06 MD of or the Plenary Council. Outside of all of this there is also the proviso that the performance of these functions is subject to budgetary provision and procedures which are the subject of other separate legislative regulations and guidance. Also it is just worth remembering that the functions set out of in Part 2 of Schedule A are performed by the MD only in respect of the municipal districts.

So moving on, the reserved functions set out in Part 2 are depending on circumstances exercisable by either the Plenary Council or by the MD members in respect of a municipal district. Now the circumstances in which these functions should be performed by the Plenary Council are governed in the Regulations SI 231 of 2014 and the two sets of ministerial directions issued as part of Circular LG in October 2014 and in May 2014. so it is important to say that the policy that you have been circulated with has been crafted in accordance
with the legislative requirements and guidelines that were circulated.

So what guidance do the circulars provide? The need for consistency with policy, strategy, programmes or plans to the local authority:
avoidance of unnecessary duplication, requirements on the Elected Council of the local authority to perform a function where it is to be performed in every MD.
a right of 'call in’ by the local authority in circumstances where the performance of certain MD functions could have significant implications for the administrative area of a local authority or other municipal district;
and performance of certain delegated functions in particular instances by the Elected Council of the Local Authority;

For the resolution of differences and disagreements. Just in relation to delegating functions, they are the functioned contained in Schedule 3 Part 3 which we are not considering today, it is simply the functions 1 to 24 in Part 2.

So there are a number of areas to consider drafting the policy, and particularly in relation to the
recommendations. So Regulation 5(1), and that is at appendix page 7 of the policy document. In the case of any reserved function specified in paragraph 5,6 or 7 of Schedule 14A and Part 2 of Schedule 14A to the Act of 2001, which in a particular instance is to be exercised and performed in respect of every MD in the administrative area of a local authority, such function shal1, in that instance be performed only by the Elected Council of that local authority.

If you look at Appendix 2 on page 8 of the draft policy document, the functions set out thereunder at reference $5,6,7,8,9,19$ and 21 should only be performed by the MD members insofar as they relate to the district and for any doubt the CPG is to be consulted. Regulation 5(2) talks about functions specified in the schedule (and identified from Part 2 of Schedule 14A), these are set out at Appendix 3, page 9 of the draft policy document and that states that those functions shall be exercised and performed only by the Plenary
Council where the exercise and performance of the function in a particular instance in respect of a municipal district could have implications for the administrative area of the local authority or an MD of the local authority other than the district of which the function is to be exercised and performed.

So in relation to resolutions of differences, what happens if there are differences: The draft policy
provides for a resolution process having regard to the regulations and these refer to two areas, one of them is in relation to the inconsistency or unnecessary duplication. Regulation 4 sets out a process so where the MD members propose to exercise or perform a reserved function and the CE, the Chief Executive, following consultation with the Cathaoirleach or Leas-Cathaoirleach of the municipal district forms the opinion that the exercise and performance of the function in that instance would give rise to inconsistency or unnecessary duplication, there is to be a resolution process.

Also Regulation 8(1) talks about where the Chief Executive following consultation forms an opinion that accords with the provision of the Act of 2000, the regulations or any guidelines received from the Department that the function should be exercised and performed or should be in that instance be exercised and performed by the Elected Council of the local authority rather than the MD members, then the Chief Executive shall advise the MD members accordingly and the following provisions shall apply.

So the draft policy sets out a resolution process which has had regard to the regulations of 2014 and the following is proposed, the following shall apply: The MD members may, by resolution, decide to refer the matter to the CPG for consideration and the MD shall
not proceed with the exercise and performance of the function unless the CPG indicates that in its view the performance of the function would not involve any inconsistency or unnecessary duplication. Or where Regulation 8(1) applies unless the CPG indicates that 16:12 in its view the function should, in that instance, be performed by the MD.

So in general I just to mention the prohibition and the exercise and performance of reserved functions as set out in Regulation 9(1). The MD shall not perform a reserved function which by virtue of the Act of 2001, the 2014 Regs or any guidelines is a function to be performed by the Elected Council only or should be performed only by the Elected Council in a particular instance. Likewise, the Elected Council shall not perform a reserved function which by virtue of the above should be performed only by the MDs.

In relation to the exercise and performance of reserved 16:13 functions generally the Elected Council and the MD should execute and perform reserved functions in accordance with the Act of 2000 these regulations and any guidelines. Any resolution purporting to be adopted for the purpose of the exercise and performance 16:13 of the reserved function which is not in compliance with the above shall be deemed to be invalid and have no effect.

So just in relation then to getting down to the nitty-gritty of the proposals for a policy document set out in the draft policy circulated, the proposed policy for the carrying out of reserved functions under Part 2 by the MDs:

Functions shall be performed in a manner that is consistent with the policies, strategies, programmes and plans of wicklow County Council;

Any unnecessary duplication in the performance of functions between the MD members for each of the MDs in the Wicklow County Council area between the MD members and wicklow County Council for that area will be avoided;

Functions shall be performed subject to relevant budgetary provisions and procedures which are the subject of separate regulation and guidance;

Functions shall be performed in accordance with the Local Government Act, 2001, the Regulations of 2014 and any and any guidelines which issued from the Department. These are all set out at the appendices.

So the proposed functions to be considered by the Plenary Council in relation to Part 2 reserved functions:
where in a particular instance a function is to be performed in respect of every municipal district in County wicklow, that is Compliance Regulation 5(1);

Where the matter that is to be dealt with could have significant implications for the local authority or the County Council as a whole, even if the function is only being performed in respect of a particular district;

Where the matter could have significant implications
16:14 for an MD other than the MD in which the particular function is to be performed in that instance;

Where the matter is of strategic importance to the county as a whole, for example, the provision of sheltered accommodation or accommodation under the Traveller accommodation programme;

Where the matter being considered and if the decision to be taken would have wider implications for the county as a whole, for example, where a decision to grant planning permission in respect of a local authority own development was considered to have potentially significant implications beyond the district in which it was proposed;

Consideration of development under Section 179 of the Planning and Development Act, 2000, to be considered by the MDs only if the proposal relates to a development

Within that district. If the development impacts on two or more districts, or if it is deemed to be of county importance, the proposal shall be referred to the Plenary Council for consideration, for example, a major housing development;

A major housing development in general consisting of 20 or more housing units;

Where the nature of the reserved function is such that could not reasonably be performed other than by the Plenary Council;

And, 9, any function (e.g. certain byelaws) which involve a combination of generic matters should be decided by the Plenary Council to apply uniformity to all districts. Any specific local provisions can be decided by the MD.
so set out on the slides, and I am not going to go
through them, but if the Members wanted to have a discussion on them, Appendix 1 sets out paragraphs 5, 6 , 7 of Schedule 14A. Appendix 2 sets out the functions referenced at $5,6,7,8,9,19$ and 21 of Part 2. Then Appendix 3 are the functions that are contained within the regulations as a schedule and they are contained at Appendix 3. So that concludes the presentation, Cathaoirleach.
CATHAO RLEACH Now does everyone understand all that?
(Laughs).
CLLR. MRPHY: Once you do.
CATHAO RLEACH I am taking questions now here but I really think that it probably should be put in plain

English exactly what function we can take over and rather than various, you know, numbers and appendices, and various things like that. And maybe if there is obviously question and answer here but I think that is something that could be done on the municipal authorities to say exactly what functions we can actually take over and functions that are for the main Council as wel1. Because I think the presentation there is in quite particular type stuff, gargle, that is written by a civil servant in legal terms. But Councillor Cullen is first in. Councillor?

CLLR TOMM CULLEN Chairman, first and foremost, may I just say this reflects a great success of the municipal authorities. I think it is a pity they weren't there when you and me were younger men. CATHAO RLEACH I wouldn't tend to agree with that now. 16:18 CLLR. TOMMY CULLEN Certainly they have transformed local government and they have been a great success and I compliment the staff of the municipal districts for that success. They are working but I think the devolution of powers that we are talking with here are 16:18 to be -- but I do think that the issue -- I think would you mind, Chairman, if I asked perhaps, Councillor Timmons, he has an issue that I would share. CATHAO RLEACH I am sure Councilior Timmons is coming
in next, or after Councillor Murphy, and I wouldn't mind, I don't want anyone going over the table.
CLLR TOMM CULLEN well I would let Councillor Timmons maybe --
CATHAO RLEACH He is well capable of handling that I am sure anyway.
CLLR TOMM CULLEN We11, Chairman, anyway, look it, there is an issue there that I will be supporting. But perhaps if you would let Councillor Timmons.
CATHAO RLEACH You needn't worry, I am capable of
letting Councillor Timmons in after Councillor miriam Murphy.

CLLR TOMM CULLEN We11, Chairman, I will finish then so. Well anyway, Chairman, there are issues about the certain powers which had to be devolved. Now I think one of those has to be about rural planning, we have to devolve powers for rural planning, because there is no point in saying that our planning are not the same planning concerns as Bray or Greystones or Enniskerry, we have a lot more different needs and I think there should be a devolution of power. I know
Councillor Timmons has done a lot of work on this and perhaps he will be better able to expand on this matter. But I think, Chairman, that is this going back now to the municipal authorities?
CATHAO RLEACH It is, yeah. Well as far as I am concerned if it is agreeable here it goes back to the municipal authorities fr further discussion on it and we need to tease this one out now. Because as far as I
am concerned I am very supportive of getting as much functions to the municipal authority. But I was appalled really at some of the major functions that I would have required going into the municipal authorities under the legislation cannot be done. I think it is fair that members around the Chamber should realise what they are in plain and simple terms. There are certain functions that can be done and there are certain functions under this legislation that cannot be done. So it is not a case of transferring all the function that we would like to see, municipal authority under this legislation cannot be done. I think that needs to be made very clear in the municipal councils. That is why I have asked Ms. Gallagher here that if she would go to the municipal authorities, if necessary, and obviously and also meet with the area administrators as well to bring them up to the scratch and what functions can be transferred and what functions can't, so that there is a full discussion at the next meeting of the municipal authorities in regard to this and recommendations in regard to that what could be done and what functions can be transferred to them. I am very anxious that as many functions as possible can be transferred. But $I$ am also conscious of the fact as we11 that if you transfer functions and there are staffing issues as well that they have to be dealt with as well. So we can transfer all the functions we like but unless they are backed up with staff, which are a problem in some municipal areas.

CLLR TOMMY CULLEN Chair, I wil1 just finish. I want to concur with what you have said there as outlined. But, Chairman, there is issues for instance like water and sewerage and stuff like that and that we really do need local input. But I am going to leave

Councillor Timmons, he has done a lot of work on this, about rural planning and he has some good ideas.

CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Murphy?
CLLR. MRPHY: Yeah, thank you.
CATHAO RLEACH Then Councillor Timmons.
CLLR. MRPHY: Yeah, I think I agree with you. I think the numbers and the powers that we need to sit down in plain English, and especially to the laws here we need to be in English what it is. Also one point I just want to ask in the section where it says about the sheltered and Traveller accommodation, why is this ability not included in that?

CATHAO RLEACH Okay, we will get that answer. Councillor Timmons?
CLLR. TIMMDN: Yes, I think there is general consensus in as much as possible that those municipal districts where people know what is going on and where local knowledge is key. Maybe then we can start doing business of county like, for instance, going through the manager's report which I would like to see us discussing today. But in relation to planning Appendix 3 page 9 sets out what planning activities can go down to the municipal districts that are currently with the Plenary Council. So I would certainly look
for those to be moved to the municipal districts. But I mean I read through these documents last night and they probably would be more helpful just to put in summary in and in/out, you know, where the options are, where the options aren't, just a simple foolproof guide 16:23 to what we can bring to the municipal districts and invariably inasmuch as possible into the municipal districts.

The point is also well made about the resources at municipal district level because we need to have resources at planning activity stage carried out there. We may need more local resources to make all these things happen at local level.

In relation to planning, just from reading these documents, there appears to be limits in planning policy, how we can change planning policy at municipal district level. And you can correct me if I am wrong, but from what is set out here I don't think we can make 16:24 big changes to local different municipal districts in relation to planning. But no matter where it is made, if it can be made here then it can be made here, but I think it is clear that in this county we need to recognise that there is differences throughout the county in terms of planning, and I am talking in particular about rural planning and areas that are under urban pressure and areas that are not under such urban pressure. The Regional Planning Guidelines, as
you know, which were presented a couple of months ago show areas of southwest wicklow in kind of a grey area map that are not considered under urban pressure. So it doesn't make sense that the same stringent planning guidelines apply to these areas that apply to areas let's say for example Enniskerry. So I think that we need to look closely at dividing the county in terms of planning rules, whether we divide it in one, two and three regions, I am not quite sure. There is a precedent for this, this is not something that I am just making it up, in kildare the planning rules are different in the south and the southwest and parts of the northwest of the county compared to the parts of kildare closer to Dublin. The planning regulations for rural planning are not as stringent in that part of the 16:25 county. So I think this county is crying out for different rules to be applied to the areas that are not under ordinary pressure. Rather than us, as Councillors, going to the begging poll, like I do like I was even doing earlier today, to try and help people in parts of rural wicklow who are living in what is classified as a large village, like somewhere like kiltegan, you can't move two miles out the road to be beside your family because there is no sites available in the village. The rules that are very, very strict for those large villages are applied equally to areas where there is massive urban pressure to rural areas where you almost have depopulation. So I would like to see how we can integrate that into this new process of
areas, decisions being made locally. Also, I don't know, correct me if I am wrong, I didn't see where the Part 8s or where the burial graveyard policies, where that could be put to the local areas as well, I didn't come across that. Thank you.

CATHAO RLEACH It wil1 be going back to the local municipal authorities anyway. Could I have a proposal for an extra 15 minutes? I want to clear the agenda today because there is a notice of motion on there for a few months and they haven't been -- and there are two 16:27 presentations there $I$ want to get in today as well that they weren't taken the last time, and we won't be meeting in September.
MS. GALLAGER: It will be 15 minutes.
CATHAO RLEACH 15 minutes and with your cooperation then we can almost clear the agenda and then start off then in September again. A11 right, okay. Next, Councillor Behan?

CLLR. BEHAN Just three quick things: First of a11, can I thank Lorraine for her work and could I ask her circulate the presentation please?

Mb. GALLAGER: Yeah, sure.
CLLR. BEHAN So we would all get it. I would suggest that maybe they should be put on the agendas for the September meetings of the municipal district, it gives us time to think about it.

CATHAOI RLEACH Yes, it will be. Yes.
CLLR. BEHAN On a general point I would say that we should have decisions made at local level, as local as
we possibly can, and if that requires resources, the resources should follow the powers. So if we give powers back to the municipal districts, the resources have to follow the powers, and I think that is going to be an essential part of the bargain as far as I am concerned. So I propose that we get the a copy of the presentation and we discuss it in September then. CATHAO RLEACH Yeah. Councillor Matthews, briefly now, and then I will go into the suspension of standing orders, and then we have the two presentations then. Councillor Matthews?
CLLR. MATTHEVG: Yeah, I am just waiting for the microphone.
CATHAO RLEACH Sorry, sorry, it is my fault.
CLLR. MATTHEVG: Okay, thanks Cathaoirleach. Thanks
for keeping those on the agenda and thanks, Lorraine, fro compiling that into that format. Just in relation to the resolution of disputes, the SI has that, that is to be process for that?
MS. GALLAGER: Yes.
CLLR. MATTHEVE: Our policy suggested that we bring it to CPG?

MS. GALLAGER: Yes.
CLLR. MATTHEVG: The SI doesn't make any suggestion, it just says have the policy to do that, does it?
MS. GALLAGER: I think it does, the Corporate Policy Group is key.
CLLR. MATTHEVG: I won't take up the meeting with that but we can discuss that at the municipal district, and
maybe I will talk to you more at the municipal district. Okay, thanks, Cathaoirleach.
CATHAO RLEACH A11 right, we are moving onto the suspension of standing orders.
CLLR. BEHAN Thanks, Cathaoirleach.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Behan?
CLLR. BEHAN Yeah, I mean I outlined the concerns that I am getting from people who are being reviewed their valuations at the moment, okay. Now I want to ask a specific question of the officials which is; how are these people selected for revaluation? It seems that certain people in different sectors have been picked for an examination but not everybody has. But the decisions that are going to be made for everybody will be based on the specific cases. But in one specific case the RV is being increased by one hundred per cent, which means a massive increase in what they would have to pay in commercial rates, no matter what we decide in terms of rates from year to year.

So I am just flagging it as an issue of concern. These people, all they can do is appeal it to the valuation commissioner. One person I know has done it and has really got very little hearing back from the valuation commissioner. I am wondering are we, as a Council, able to intervene in this situation, can we do anything to assist the many businesses, especially small businesses, in the county who are going to suffer hugely if this trend continues with all the
revaluations throughout the county in 2019.
CATHAO RLEACH okay. Brian?
MR. GEEESON Cathaoirleach, I suppose just to
differentiate the revaluation 2019 process, I suppose
it commenced last October, and at the moment the revaluation office are analysing data and the proposed valuation certificates wouldn't be issued until the first quarter in 2019. So $I$ just wonder in the specific example you are referring us, we can't get into the details, whether it was just an ordinary revaluation? Because as far as I am aware they wouldn't actually have given a new revaluation at this stage, it is going to be early next year.
CLLR. BEHAN Right.
CATHAO RLEACH Maybe if you give the details to Brian and he will get it checked out and get back to you, Councillor.

CLLR. BEHAN So nobody should have got a new -MR. GEEESON Nobody should have got, so I suspect that is kind of just a normal revaluation as to part of the existing process.
CLLR BEHAN Chair, how would that have arisen? Somebody would have asked the valuation --
MR. GLEESON Yeah, if there is a change of purpose or an extension on a premises that a revaluation would have to take place, that's just the normal run of the mil1.

CATHAO RLEACH Councillor, if you get the specifics and we will get it checked out and get back to you?

CLLR. BEHAN A11 right.
MR. GLEESON But you are correct just in relation to normal reval 2019 process, the proposed certs will issue in the first quarter next year. There will be a period of 40 days for representations will be heard from the rate payers. To assist the communication process there will be walk-in clinics arranged in each of the municipal districts and County Buildings, here. And then the final certs won't issue until September 2019 and it will then come into effect in January 2020. 16:31 CATHAO RLEACH Okay, we will get that. Any information then if you give it to Brian we will check it out, right. Okay, Members --
CLLR. BLAKE: Sorry, Chairman, can I just mention -CATHAO RLEACH Oh, sorry, sorry, my apologies, I missed you there, Councillor Blake. Sorry.

CLLR. BLAKE: No, just before the Council meeting up here today, while I have sympathy with the staff here in the Council and with people out there who are experiencing difficulty with it and can I thank the staff here in the Council for their advice, first of all, in regard to it. But my understanding is that people out there are getting quotations from the valuation office, that people who have never been valued in the past have been valuated in regards to it, 16:32 and how people primarily in the agricultural forestry division who are getting, they are being told that there are going to get these rates.

Just one quick example is one person who hasn't paid no rates in the past has now been told they have to pay 20,000 a year in rates. I know maybe the financial powers of the Council will be delighted with that but such an increase on any individual would probably base their business on the fact that they haven't been paying rates in the past because of the activity they were involved but have got a quotation of 20,000 and they are in the process of appealing it. So there is some interaction going on there.
CATHAO RLEACH Maybe we will ask Brian to get that checked out and get back to you on that.
Councillor Timmons?
CLLR. TI MMDNS: Yeah, just briefly, in relation to that could I just ask a question about the collection of
rates. I am concerned that the revenue collection, it is possible that it will pass on to the Revenue Commissioners and ultimately Revenue Sheriff. I hope the Council do the collection and they do, you know, cooperate and make arrangements with the businesses that are struggling. So could you give any update in relation to revenue collection methods, if there is any possibility of them changing to this I would be concerned.
MR. GLEESON Council, as far as I am aware, it will proposed rates legislation there was a proposal for local authorities to use powers of the Revenue Sheriffs to help collect unpaid rates, so maybe that is the area
you are relating to, but the responsibility for collecting the rates would still remain with the local authority.
CLLR. TI MONS: I would just be concerned about that because if the Revenue Sheriff collects money they put bills on people, legal bills, they have quite high charges that people are not aware of. You know, I wouldn't like to see us going down that route.
CATHAO RLEACH Okay. Just we are moving on to 8, the Chief Executive's report, and I want to note that we can't deal with it today. But I think I suppose like a lot of other councillors, that I have been ignoring this for months when they come on the agenda. It is a very substantial document and, really and truly, there is a huge amount of information in it in regard to the cooperation of the Council. It is my intention to move this up after the statutory business at the next Council and subsequent Council meetings for the next year.
CLLR. WNTERS: Yes.
CATHAO RLEACH Because this is where the Council operate at this type of level, this is the information we need to get. It is full and it hasn't really been -- we often say we don't get the information, actually the information is in there, and what I would like Councillors to have a really good look at this and get into this in that because the workings of the Council is contained in the CE's report. I will be moving it up after the statutory business in September
so that we do deal with it, it is one of the most important items as far as I am concerned and to be dealt with at the next meeting and not like what has been -- like it is very difficult to get through the meetings because of various things that are cropping up 16:35 that are less important than this. This is very important and we are going to bring it up there, okay.

In regard to now, I want the two presentations we have, the just from wicklow County Tourism Strategy and then we have the next one, the wicklow Sports Partnership as well.

CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Matthews has issued an urgent question as well so we will have that as well, okay. Okay, Christine Flood?
ME. FLOOD: Thank you very much, Cathaoirleach, again and thank you, Councillors. Can I introduce
Pat ó Súilleabháin. Pat is the Chairman of the County Wicklow Economic Think Thank Tourism Strategic Review Committee. We will get into that, 1 will do a presentation first, and then Pat will talk to you about the tourism strategy.

So the vision developed by the Tourism Strategy Review Group was to make wicklow the number one choice for visitors seeking an idyllic escape that harmonises a wide range of outdoor pursuits in County wicklow's world class natural arena while driving job creation. Our aim is to make wicklow the go-to place for outdoor
activities. As our consultants say, we want to shift from great assets but little impact to great assets and enormous impact.

This slide briefly outlines the process but suffice to say under the County Wicklow Economic Think Tank a tourism strategy group was formed, that strategy group devised an initial statement of strategy and set out the vision. Then we engaged a company through a procurement procedure, we engaged Blue Sail, to develop 16:38 the tourism strategy and marketing plan for County Wicklow. The Tourism Strategy Group have signed off on the tourism strategy and now is before yourselves, it will also go to wicklow County Tourism.

The Strategy Group came up with the following goals: To establish Wicklow as a year-round destination; To capture more overnight tourism, which is an issue for ourselves;
To encourage the provision of accommodation, including alternative forms of accommodation; And again on accommodation to concert day visitors to staying visitors;
To integrate the development of our tourism infrastructure and assets. As the statement initially pointed out we have fantastic assets, it is just we need to make the most of them; and To take a strategic approach to marketing and promotion and to do this al1 in a sustainable way.

So there are some figures before you. In 2016 wicklow welcomed 601,000 visitors and they spent 157 million. This is very healthy but we have set ourselves a target for 2023 of welcoming 750,000 visitors with a spend of

200 million.

Our priority areas, as mentioned earlier, accommodation, developing our towns as key visitors hubs, developing master plan for Glendalough, growing thematic experiences and developing a common narrative. Accommodation was very much an issue when looking at the tourism strategy. We have around three per cent of Ireland's overnights but the spend is equivalent to just two per cent, and that is attributed largely to the high number of, say, camping and caravanning overnight visitors. In wicklow the average spend is €261 per visit and the national average spend is 355 , nearly $€ 100$ more. So we have a below average number of four-star and five-star accommodation or bed spaces. However, you know, the hotels that we do have are absolutely excellent, and the challenge is to improve the supply, particularly at the higher end of the market which will increase our income. So an action outlined under our plan is to develop hotels prospectus and setting out the marketplace to try and attract hotels to the county, identifying suitable sites and working with Fáilte Ireland to market the county.

Towns' visitor hubs, this very much ties into other
work we are doing in relation to the town teams and Fáilte Ireland recognises the importance of what they ca11 "destination towns" and are actually developing guidelines and a toolkit for the development of destination towns using Westport as a model. Visitors comes to towns for accommodation, food and beverage options, entertainment, facilities that if the weather isn't good, weather dependent facilities, the wicklow Gaol or a cinema, whatever, retail experiences and transport links. So the action set out under the strategy would be to work with our town teams to develop the public realm, to develop our festivals and events, and to build a capacity within the towns.

So Glendalough is another critical area. Glendalough
is the jewel in our crown, it is widely recognised internationally, we estimate that it has in excess of a million visitors annually but it is probably up near the Cliffs of Moher figure which I think is about 1.5 million. But the experience at the moment leaves a 16:43 lot to be desired in terms of signage and traffic and parking and literally the capacity. People want to go to go to Glendalough, they want to visit the monastic site, they want to enjoy the beautiful scenery. They also want to spend money, they want to buy food and drink, they want to maybe purchase souvenirs. So we do need to improve the offering and vastly improve the access for visitors and, you know, ultimately we want to, not necessarily increase the number of visitors to

Glendalough, but certainly encourage more overnight staying visitors and spending visitors and to use Glendalough as a means of attracting people to come and say in the county and see other tourism offers.

So another strategy proposed by our consultants was to grow our thematic experiences, you know, to develop our walks, the Wicklow way being one of the oldest walking routes in the country and often referred to as Ireland's Camino and to develop new experiences. The various greenways listed there, the coastal route, Greystones to Wicklow, Blessington Greenway, Arklow, Shillelagh, and indeed the Vartry way which has been established. To continue investment into areas such as Avondale, Powerscourt, all of these have been
established with private investment or, well, in the case of Avondale that's State investment, but to support these projects.

Also to make the most of our screen tourism options, screen tourism nationally and internationally is absolutely huge. The amount of people coming into Northern Ireland for the Game of Thrones is colossal and if we were to make of the most of that, having a fairly broad, very good screen offering, that's another area for us to work on. So the actions proposed are to establish a working group to work on these concepts, including the screen tourism, viking tours, greenways and also what Fáilte Ireland referred to as an
"international gateway garden festival. They are working on this concept and they feel wicklow, with its fantastic garden offering, would an ideal candidate for that project and there would be substantial money invested in that.

The strategy also talks about a common narrative. This is so where our service providers, large and small, can use a shared story, all about County wicklow, from its geology, to its monastic history, to its raiders and rebellions, and all of the fantastic things that have happened in the county over the years. So we are working with wicklow County Tourism, we are developing this narrative, and will be working with wicklow County Tourism to develop a toolkit which will include graphics and videos and logos, and all sorts of information, so that we have a common theme so that we are not, you know -- we are providing quality information so our visitors.

Then marketing; the priority segments identified, these are segments I suppose best described by Fáilte Ireland as culturally curious -- sorry, I have gone too far. I have to go back, sorry about that. Sorry, apologies. But the three segments that Fáilte Ireland tell us we have more disposal income and they are not tied in, they tend to be older couples who take multiple breaks annually. They are not tied into school days and they
have significant disposable income, and Wicklow's offering suits the culturally curious very well. We will leave it. It is just to -- no, no, it keeps jumping.

Then the next group are the "great escapers" and these are the people that generally go to wild Atlantic way but we are hoping that we can get them to stay in Dublin, then move to wicklow, rather than heading across immediately to the west of Ireland. Then finally the "connected families". Families are the backbone of our tourism offered and they spend a significant amount of money. There is a constraint in that they are limited to the school holidays but they are certainly a key part of our tourism clientele.

So come on to channels, again these are recommended in the strategy, we have our website and that tied in with the visitwicklow.ie website and we are further working to integrate those websites. We are working on our digital marketing capabilities, and I have to say Wicklow Tourism are doing a huge amount of work in that area with good results, and providing content and narratives to our marketing partners and to the various tourism providers in the county, and this goes back to the common theme that I mentioned and strengthening the press and the PR of the county. Again wicklow County Tourism are to be commended, they have engaged a PR person and they have increased the amount of coverage,
press coverage, and international media coverage that the county is getting.

So the next steps for the Tourism Strategy and Marketing Plan being considered by Wicklow County Council and Wicklow County Tourism:

We need to form an Implementation Group, and we are hoping that some of the Strategy Group members will remain in place, and we are also looking to recruit new ${ }_{16: 51}$ people to the Implementation Group, particularly people with particular areas of interest and expertise.

Develop an action plan for the implementation of the strategy, and obviously identify budgets and sources of funding. There are various other wicklow County Council projects, and I know we are under time pressure.

CATHAO RLEACH We don't have time unfortunately.
MS. FLOOD So we won't go into those. So I will just ${ }_{16: 51}$ leave you with the list of members of the tourism -oh, I have done it again. But I will hand over now to Pat ó Súilleabháin.

MR. Ó SÚ LLEABHÁ N Thank you very much for allowing us to present this Tourism Strategy. I think it is
probably all very clear to you how important tourism is to the economy, not only the country, but more particularly to this county.

Just maybe by means of introduction, my name is Pat Ó Súilleabháin. I am the operator of the largest indoor visitor attraction in County wicklow and have been involved in wicklow tourism and Bray tourism for quite a number of years.
that in whatever way you can.

So there is widespread support from industry for this strategy and I think if the list had stayed up on the screen you would have seen what a broad representation from industry worked towards developing this strategy. But, not only that, there are members of Wicklow County Tourism and there are some members around the table here today as well.

So I hope that we can get your support for this. Critical to all of this will be the Implementation Group who will not only ensure that the targets are achieved but also ensure that we initiate reviews and updates so that this is not a document that sits on a shelf collecting dust but actually is a living document. So I just would like to thank you for your attention and to commend this strategy to you. CATHAO RLEACH Thank you. Thank you, Pat, and thank you, Christine. Now listen we have the sports
Partnership that are coming on now in a couple of minutes and I would ask, there are a number of members, three members, that want to come on would be as brief as possible so I can get them because they have been waiting for a very long time, two meetings now at this stage. Councillor Miriam Murphy?
CLLR. MRPHY: Yeah, well my note is very short here. First of all, I would like to really welcome the strategy, we have heard about it for quite a while

County wicklow Tourism and the work that has gone into it, I can see why now. we know that there are many areas in that strategy that will improve our towns and villages, and it means also that there is stakeholders there that will have to work together. But whether they be big or small it will still improve the area where we all like to go visit. And also, we know that wicklow is worthwhile for its beauty so, you know, let's improve our tourism profile. We also know that wicklow is very short on hotels and I think that is a strategy that we need to really improve on. But again just we have the document now so I would like to say put it in action, and let's smile and see wicklow at its worst.

CATHAO RLEACH Thank you very much, Councillor.
Councillor Walsh.
CLLR. MALSH Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Thank you, Christine, for the presentation. I sat on the Strategy Group and I must say it was a very worthwhile exercise. I think Pat there hit the chord where he said, you know, we have everything, we have the product. It is a great outdoor recreation year-round destination but there are many, many challenges, accommodation issues, like he said there, the figures are there, there is only two per cent of the spend. The average spend is $€ 100$ less than the national average so that needs to be addressed. There are issues around internal transport to be addressed, we need to work with Fáilte Ireland to market the county.

I think the proposed garden festival is something to look forward to. We have the Avondale project, which is another forest project, coming up which is another exciting one, and we have the project at Russborough. There's a lot of stuff going on there in the background, there is a lot to be happy about, to forward to.

So again the Implementation Group will have a lot of important work to do to put this strategy into place. But we have everybody on the one page now, we have the Council, we have the CWETT group, we have the Local Sports Partnership, we have Wicklow Tourism all working together to promote tourism in the county, so that's to be welcomed. Thank you.
CATHAO RLEACH Okay, thank you. Councillor
Shay Cullen?
CLLR. SHAY CULLEN Thanks, Chairman. Yes, obvious7y it is very good to see a strategy on tourism for our county. I think we are making great strides with regards to tourism in our county over the last number of years, primarily to the work that has been done through this Council and through Wicklow Tourism.

I suppose one of my big worries, and I have stated this on many occasions, that we have done a massive amount of work in the whole rural area walkways and, you know, opening up new walks and routes, and so on, but the problem we have, and obviously it's been alluded to
already, is the inadequate number of hotels within our county. And unless we address that issue on the whole tourism area from a point of view of overnight stays we are really in trouble on that point. I mean at our Wicklow Town Team meeting recently it was suggested that a 100-bed hote1 would cost in the region of 20 million to build. I mean it is not easy to get the developers to build hotels. You know, we look at the likes of Westport have 12 hotels, Wicklow Town has a small 30-bedroom hotel, so we have an issue there.

I suppose I know the Chief Executive was at the Wicklow Uplands AGM recently and he heard loud and clear that we obviously have the product but, you know, one of the issues that is a problem in the uplands areas is the whole agri-tourism with regards to relaxing the planning with regards to opening up, you know, beds for people to stay, and I think it is an area that we really have to focus on.

Glendalough was mentioned, the signage and parking. At the moment there is parking issues in Glendalough, as we know, there is only one way in and one way out. We have to look at creating some sort of a loop that people go into Glendalough and drive out a different direction, it is certain7y an issue at the moment.

As I said earlier, walkways within our county are really developing at a great rate to try and connect
all our villages and towns together. Again that will add to the tourism benefit to our county but we need people to open up coffee shops, you know, have the overnight stays available. But we are going in the right direction and I want to welcome this and congratulations both to Christine and Pat. Thank you. CATHAO RLEACH okay. Councillor o'brien, oliver o'brien?

CLLR. O BRIEN Yeah, it's great to see that we are tapping into the Chinese market. A very interesting story is told about a guy over in China and he learned Irish and he came over to Ireland and he was expecting to speak -- he walked into a pub in Dublin and he was expecting them to be speaking Irish and he was shocked that they weren't speaking Irish. Now I was just looking up there, and I brought it up a number of times before, I am seriously worried that I am being ignored again in relation to the Irish language and the culture. As I pointed out here before, if you go back 200 years ago we had everybody in wicklow speaking
Irish and I would hope that that would be incorporated into the strategy, I don't fee1 that's happening, I am wondering why it is not being done. (Speaks Irish). I am looking at a beautiful pen here and it seems to be only delving into half of the culture that's hidden away in this country, it has only the English version and there is no Irish version. We are absolutely one of the most fortunate countries in the world that everybody has two names, we've an Irish name and an

English name, and we need to tap into that. Because what the Chinese want to see when they're coming over here is Irish, not just in English only, slapped over on something like that. So we need to look at that and I would be hoping as well that we could get a few more people in this Chamber to say (speaks Irish) when they're talking but actually interested in promoting the Irish language.

Something else that I would like to point out as well the economy was mentioned by Mr. Ó Súilleabháin and economics and stuff like that. As far as I am concerned tourism is not all about money and I would say a perfect example there in Bray where the knocking down of St. Paul's which would be a sort of building at 17:01 the time which was enlisted at the time was knocked down, and I wonder what sort of strategy we have if that's the kind of stuff that's going on. I would hope that they would be a lot more involved in the strategy than just economics, that it would actually be the experience of people, and people that get looked at here, and that we wouldn't become a rip-off republic trying develop tourism so that we can rip off tourists when they come in, that the experience would be vital first, and that when they leave the country they are absolutely happy with it.

And I am asking the question again; why is it being sanctioned off -- why has the Irish language being
sanctioned off, why wasn't it included in the little logo there with Cill Mhantáin, the Irish language of wicklow, what is wrong with that? There is something wrong with that. And I would just like an answer to that question.

CATHAO RLEACH Okay, Councillor Timmons?
CLLR TI MMDN: Thanks very much, Chairman.
CATHAO RLEACH Sorry please briefly, I mean have asked for people, you know --
CLLR TI MONS: Thanks, Christine, for the presentation 17:02 and thanks to Pat as well. What I would just like to ask you is, is there anything that we can do, as Councillors, to help you, and in particular in the Development Plan? Is there anything in our Development Plan that would improve tourism, for example, the construction of a hotel, is there any general things that you can know you can suggest that might actually help your project?

Also, the whole idea of us sourcing national funding, I 17:03 know for example, (inaudible) house, buildings like that, historic buildings, that are in wicklow that are attractive historic buildings, Avondale House, any things that like that that we should be identifying that could be seen as an attraction to the county and a 17:03 good source of national funding to go develop these products? Thank you.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Thornhill?
CLLR. THORNH LL: Yes, thank you. Go raibh maith agat.

And I will keep it short.
CATHAO RLEACH Yes, please.
CLLR. THORNH LL: I would just like to say that, following on from Councillor o'brien's contribution there about culture and language, I mean there is more to tourism than just walks and everything else but culture and language is very important. After all there is an enormous amount of chinese people coming to Ireland now.

CATHAO RLEACH Sorry, go ahead. Sorry, it is my fault.
CLLR. THORNH LL: Yeah. There is a big interest to have Chinese people coming to Ireland now, and we know that there is direct ties between Beijing and Ireland thanks to Hainan Airlines, and they are coming here but 17:04 one of the things that these people coming from other countries want to hear is they want to hear our culture, our language, and we shouldn't forget about it because there is more than -- you know, it isn't just walkways and fine weather and all the rest, we should be concentrating on what makes us Irish and we should be thinking seriously about it. It can't be just thrown away, it is so important. Go raibh maith agat. CATHAO RLEACH Grand, okay. Christine? And then we are moving on to the Sports Partnership.
M. FLOOD Thank you, Chairman, I will be brief. With regard to, obviously accommodation is the number one priority, we are working on that. In fairness the County Development Plan does support the development of
tourism, as does our local economic and community plan, there may be areas that need to be strengthened but they do. So that's the accommodation issue.

Tá brón orm, Councillor o'Brien, that is totally an oversight on my part. I do actually use -- I have different versions of the logo, Irish, English. I think I gave the English one to the consultant because they didn't speak Irish but, apologies.
Now Councillor Thornhill made a very important point, 17:05 we do recognise the importance of culture, as does Fáilte Ireland, and that is a really important part of our offering in terms of exposing people to, be it our sports or national sports or our music, and that will play an important role in the development. So I think that's it.
CATHAO RLEACH Thank you. Thank you, Christine and Pat. Just in regard to this, this is one thing really that we should be giving way more time to tourists and tourist products in County wicklow, and really not at the end of a meeting like 15 minutes and rushing at the end of the meeting as well, because it is probably the biggest advantage that this county has over most counties, the tourist product. I intend to come at a greater leve1, you know, in the months ahead to have a 17:06 further discussion in regard to tourism because I think it is vital for development and something that we have made the best benefit of. Just there is a question there, and then we are moving onto the sports

Partnership.
CLLR. MATTHEWG: Cathaoirleach, I would taken a written response to --

CATHAO RLEACH It is positive written response.
CLLR. MATTHEVG: Or wait till September, I don't mind. CATHAO RLEACH No, there is a response and it is positive, all right. Thank you, Councillor Matthews, okay. I apologise for keeping you.
MR. NCHOLSON Just, Cathaoirleach, I know all the Members know all about Local Sports Partnership but I think you have never had a presentation previously on the Local Sports Partnership so we thought it was time to give you a presentation on it. The Local Sports Partnership, there is four people involved, Aisling Hubbard, who you probably all have met at various stages, she is currently on maternity leave, she will be the Coordinator, Lorraine Dunne is the Administrator, and we have two Sport Development officers, Denise O'Shea and Andrew McBride. Andrew is going to give a presentation on Local Sports Partnership in wicklow. Thanks very much. MR. MEBRI DE: Yes, so I won't keep you too long. Yeah, as Michael said, the Sports Partnership as you can see up on the slide is made up of coordinator, two development officers and administrator, and then that is supported then through Wicklow County Council through sport Ireland and through its board members as we11. So the board representatives are from all walks of wicklow and, you know, represented by every
organisation that kind of fits the remit of what Wicklow Sports Partnership are trying to set out to do.

Our aim is to kind of increase participation in physical activity in the wicklow area and to ensure that the local resources are used to best effect. So, as Christine was kind of talking about all the different walkways and greenways, and things like that, we love to hear that because that is exactly what we try to do, is to make sure that people are actually making use of those. So, for example, the Blessington Greenway, we would have set up community walking groups out there, you would have a similar plan then for the Vartry Reservoir as wel1, so making sure that people are aware of the different resources that are there on their doorsteps and actually utilising those different areas.

We can do also a lot of other kind of things through club development, volunteer training, enhanced planning 17:09 of sport at local level, local directors of sports bodies and facilities, we work in schools and clubs and communities with the National Government bodies as well, so linking in with those. Increasing the levels of local participation, especially more specific target 17:09 groups. So the likes of the older people, girls and women, people with disabilities, unemployed people and those who live in identified disadvantaged communities. We also link in with the National Physical Activity

Plan as well to achieve all these goals and where those target groups are decided.

So just some of the kind of programmes that we do, so we have a number of programmes so these are our school programmes, so 1 Million Step Challenge. So this years to date, so 25 schools have taken part in the million Step Challenge, so that's when the kids and the teachers will try and reach a million steps within a week. So it's a great way of not only getting the young people active but also the teachers, and there's also an educational aspect of it as well because you can bring in your mathematics into it and how you count up your steps, and things like that, so it is a really great programme that the whole school can kind of be involved with as well.

Primary School Tug of War. So, as mentioned, we work with National Government bodies as well, so we try link in with National Government bodies that wouldn't have a 17:10 huge amount of funding, so the Tug of war would be a great example of that. Again Tug of War is a really good programme, it's very inclusive for kids that generally wouldn't get involved in a lot of organised kind of team sports and things like that, it is a really good one for the shy kids that don't necessarily take part in other sports. So we held two competitions, one in East Wicklow and one in West Wicklow and 12 schools participated in that so it was
quite successful.

We also have school basketbal1, so we had a Blitz again, so over a 180 pupils took part in that one. European Week of Sport is in September so again we really target the schools and a lot of other key areas within that but it is specifically in this case we did a number of programmes within the schools, so multi-sport activity, and we visited five schools that week and worked with over 300 kids that week. We also ran an Introduction to Dance programme as well so we targeted four schools in west Wicklow and four schools in East wicklow, and that was aimed at the kids from five to eight, so really focusing on their fundamental movement skills through dance. So a lot of kids nowadays who are actually not really able to do a forward roll, you know, they find it very awkward to kind of crouch down in a squat position, and things like that, because we would have naturally learned that through play when we were growing up running around and 17:12 climbing on trees and things like that. So a lot of kids' fundamental movement skills are actually declining now because they are sitting down sedentary for a long period of time. So it's to try to kind of target kids through different kind of forms of movement. So in this case it was through dance, it was again very successful with the shy kids and things like that because it was a good chance for them to express themselves in a different kind of way.

Teenage girls. So teenage girls who would predominantly be more dropping out of organised sport. Again that is decreasing as the years are going on because the programmes like this are targeting that target group. So we ran an Introduction to Weightlifting in Loreto School in Bray so 15 girls took part in that four-week programme. Again it was very positive and the feedback from the school was very good as well.

Bike Week 2018 was just at the start of June. So again we visited a number of schools throughout Bike Week and 400 pupils we would have worked with. We also provided two physiotherapists at the wicklow 200 Cycle event as we11 which was again, you know, very, very positive.

So another target group would be the older adult programmes and different events that we do. So through our programmes we have about 106 older adults attending one of our classes that we would have help set up on a weekly basis. So some of the other programmes that we would go for like games and PALS training. As I say, we have mentioned, we have set up community walking groups, we have Active Ageing classes, so Zumba Gold, chair yoga, and adapted exercise programmes. So this is a key target area because everyone is living longer but it doesn't mean they are necessarily living healthier lives. So through these kind of classes we are trying to help people to live more independent
lives and not having to avail of services, like nursing homes and community care, and things like that.

We also disability programmes, so tailored programmes in schools and clubs, through training and education courses, supporting clubs on making their club more inclusive through specific programmes and actions targeting the specific groups, and trying to source specialised equipment. It is something we are in the process of getting at the moment is an accessible beach 17:14 wheelchair and we hope that that will be rolled out on different beaches in the Wicklow area.

We also funded a three-day Easter camp partnering with Wicklow Rugby Club and Leinster Rugby and over 40 kids attended that camp from all parts of wicklow. That is continuing now on a weekly basis and 20 kids attend that on a weekly basis.

We also set up three park runs, wel1 four park runs in 17:15 wicklow. So there is Russborough Park Run in Blessington, Avondale Park Run and Bray Junior Park Run and we also have a closed park run in an addiction centre in wicklow. So that's the first of its kind in wicklow so it is great for us to be associated with that.

Operation Transformation again is another kind of big week for us, well big month for us. So we had three
walks this year in Arklow, Blessington and Bray with over 300 people participating. That was helped as wel1 through our Tús programme. We have partnered with County Wicklow Partnership and they run some of our community walking groups and we have done Couch to 5Ks also.

We do a lot of training and education so we run safeguarding courses. So your Safeguarding 1, 2, 3, provides sports first aid courses, sports leader, coaching children courses, community coaching, walking leader, Buntús and a Disability Inclusion. So we have run a lot of the Safeguarding 1 courses with the new legislation being brought in and people having $t$ have their club children's officer and their designated liaison person, so there has been a huge spike in those his year.

Healthy Ireland was a big source of our funding as well. So last year wicklow would have secured €134,000, that was through SIPSE(as heard) and LCDC. So the ones in red with Healthy Ireland funding, there was a requirement to link in with your Sports Partnership with programmes if you could, so the ones in red are the ones that wicklow LSP were the lead older adults and a few others. So you had the presentation, I know you have been here long enough, so I don't really want to go through them a11. So that
was Round 1 which finished back in March and Round 2 was announced then in May and we have applied to through LCDC for $€ 75,000$ worth and through SIPSE. So again the ones in red are the ones LSP are the lead ones on.

I have a short video, but I think I will leave it because I think you have been here long enough, it is on our Bike Week. It is on YouTube or on our website if you want to have a look at it because I understand you have been here a long time. There are our contact details anyway. We have a great website as well which if you have any questions or you need to refer anyone to our website as it is very up-to-date, it only launched back in December so it is a good source to send people to if they have any kind of questions about, say, our courses or anything like that. They are all up there. And thank you very much for your time.

CATHAO RLEACH Thank you, Andrew. I think that is very valuable really and it is something that I think we need to get Andrew back again in the next few months because the work that is being done there is very, very valuable from the community point of view. It is just a pity that we didn't have much time, we couldn't give as much time as we necessarily need to do in this regard. Councillor Gerry Walsh?

CLLR. WALSH Thanks, Andrew, for the presentation. I sit on the board of the Local Sports Partnership so I
am well aware of the huge amount of work that is being done there. As Andrew said, it is the specific target groups, you have disadvantaged groups, you have the disability, you have the elderly, you know right across
the range there, you have done tremendous work. The park run was hugely successful and the safeguarding courses there have been a great help to a number of clubs. So keep up the good work.
MR. MEBRI DE: Thank you.
CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Oliver O'Brien?
CLLR. O BRI EN Just to congratulate you on the tremendous work that you are doing and to second what Councillor walsh said, I think it would be essential that you come back again because there is an awful lot of ideas, particularly in relation to disability, older 17:19 people, and coordination with the major sporting bodies. Because I have often seen as well the big organisations put on the same camp in the one week and the kids are doing nothing else for the rest of the summer. So $I$ think it is an area that you will
probably need in developing it more, you'd need a representative from all the major sporting organisations of the county so that there could be coordination so that the kids benefit by being able to participate in all sports and not just one. I back again.

CATHAO RLEACH Councillor Sne11?
CLLR. SNELL: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. Again, like
previous speakers, I just want to thank Andrew for the presentation, and indeed all the staff, for the great work that has gone into the Local Sports Partnership. I am disappointed that it was at the end of the meeting and I understand the time constraints. But I do think that there is a huge body of works going on there and I would like this to be revisited at some stage. I know you are looking at the clock, Cathaoirleach, so I won't hold you up.
CATHAO RLEACH No, no.
CLLR. SNELL: But just in regards to the PPNs, I believe there should be more representation probably on the board, I don't think there is enough information filtering back out into the communities. And certainly to the Government bodies of all the organisations, whether it be football, Gaelic, rugby, whatever, there are so many different sports there but I believe the information is not getting back out into the public domain. I know you have an excellent website, but certainly from this Chambers, I would like to see you come back sooner rather than later and I think that you are doing a great job and I want to commend each and everyone one of you.
CATHAO RLEACH Thank you very much for that, Michae1 and Andrew. Thank you very much and we will have you back at a later date. Thank you. Just correspondence and then we are finished.

ME. GALLAGFER Yeah, just finally, Cathaoirleach, just to note that the Elected Members have been circulated
with the Ministerial Direction issued by the Minister in relation to the Arklow and Environs Local Area Plan, and that Ministerial Direction will be published in the local newspapers this week.

CATHAOI RLEACH Okay. For your information. okay thank you very much. Happy holidays if we don't have --

CLLR. BEHAN Ah sure we will be back before september. CATHAO RLEACH That's what I was going say. CLLR. BEHAN I will see you before September. CATHAO RLEACH Yeah, that's right.
