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CATHAOI RLEACH: Members, could I have your attention please? Thank you for your attendance. This meeting 19:05 was called specifically in regard to discuss the RSES. If you remember a couple of weeks ago, Cllr. Timmins asked me to put it on the agenda and I gave an indication then that if the Draft Plan was out that we would have a meeting last Monday but obviously the 19:05 Draft Plan wasn't out so I cancelled, obviously, that meeting and proposed that we go ahead today. reason you haven't got the information before you is that I was told that this was a private document and that it wasn't for public distribution. Only four 19:06 Members and the Manager has it, but I still decided to go ahead with the meeting and the one reason for this is that we are due to have - by "we" I mean the Members of the Regional Assembly are having a meeting on Friday and that effectively, a decision could be taken and I'm 19:06 saying could be taken at that meeting to go for public consultation on this plan. I was unhappy about voting to go out for public consultation on the plan that 28 Members of the Council hadn't seen it or didn't have a rough idea of what it is about. 19:06

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This plan is 210 or 211 pages and I can tell you now if you have problems sleeping at night now it would be worth a read. It is hard reading, to say the least.

1	But I took out a lot of what I felt were the important	
2	issues in regard to this and I'm going to go through	
3	them today. I'm going to open it up to the floor as	
4	well today and I'm going to try to give, between myself	
5	and the four Members of the Regional Assembly,	9:0
6	Cllr. Cullen, Winters, Mitchell and myself and between	
7	us and between the Executive up here that we'll answer	
8	as many questions as we possibly can.	
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LO	I just want to give you a flavour of what has happened 18) : O
L1	in the meantime from the time we had that meeting	
L2	because there has been changes to the original draft	
L3	prior to this.	
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L5	Just to give people an update on how it started. It	9:0
L6	started with a launch in February 2017, the National	
L7	Planning Framework was launched in February 2017. And	
L8	it was presented there was a Draft Plan presented to	
L9	Wicklow County Council in November 2017 and Wicklow	
20	County Council made submissions on 10th November in	9:0
21	2017 and the National Planning Framework was published	
22	on 15th February 2018.	
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24	There was key elements in it: 50% of all new	
25	population and employment was in the five cities, as	9:0
26	defined by the Census District Office; 40% of all new	
27	housing in the built up parts in the cities, towns and	
28	villages, and brownfield sites and 50% in cities and	

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30% in other towns. Anyway, the east and midlands

regional population growth was proposed at between 490,000 and 540,000 and the employment growth was plus 320,000. Now, the National Planning Road Map was published in July, National Planning Framework in July 2018 and this is a very significant element of the planning process because this contained the population figures for the County. And this is the key element of the National Planning Framework and it's what most people are focusing on is the element in that. In that they were talking about a population of 155- to 157,000 in 2026 and up to 2031 the population of 164,000. And that was going to against the County Development Plan of 178,000 and 185,000 by 2031. I'll get to that now in a couple of minutes in regard to that.

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Now, people that mightn't know the Regional Assembly, that wouldn't be familiar with it, they're a 37-member group. Meets once a month in Dublin City Hall. During 19:10 the consultation process there was a lot of working groups in it and there was 11 sessions between January and June 2018 and there was area meetings as well, there's three areas in the assembly, the eastern area,

Framework and the RSES as well.

the midland area and the Dublin are as well. We're obviously on the eastern area as well. And there was a working draft that was produced in 2018 and the Assembly meeting met on 5th October. We had been asking, up to 5th October we weren't getting any 19:10 information from the Department in regard to specifics. The specifics were population growth in the Metropolitan Area. How did the figures come about? Were they CSO figures? Were they ESRI figures? was a lot of discussion and a lot of information that 19 · 11 was withheld, in our opinion, by the Department from this and we requested that officials from the Department would come and address the meeting on 5th October, which they did and they clarified, quite significantly, a lot of the questions that we asked at that particular time.

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Now just to move on a bit from that and I don't want to bore people with figures and that, but in our County Development Plan, up to 2031 we had the amount of units we had to build as 35,000 units. In the National Planning Framework the recommendation for that period of time was 25,000 units. So in this pre-draft that we go - and this was the cause of a lot of consternation among people in the Council here that knew about this - 19:12 there was actually 10,000 of a drop that obviously would have required significant down-zoning of 10,000 houses by 2031. Now, there was a massive campaign carried out by Members of Wicklow County Council, and

other counties as well that were suffering the same	
thing. There were similar problems in Meath and	
Kildare and lessor ones in Louth as well. There was a	
fairly strong campaign carried out and on 5th October	
there was clarification given that it was something	19:1
that we were working for, for a long time is that in	
regard to, to contain our attitude to the	
Metropolitan Area was that if Bray was going to be in	
the Metropolitan Area and Greystones, that effectively	
the figures for the growth in the Bray area should be	19:1
contained in the Metropolitan Area. Effectively that	
was a separate area within the plan. And up until that	
date we were told that these figures would be contained	
in the County Plan, there would be no movement at all	
on that. And we got significant movement in regard to	19:1
that, which effectively means that Bray now, the Bray	
growth figures is going to be contained in the	
Metropolitan Area, which means that that 7,000 out of	
the 10,000 figure, there's only 3,000 left in regard to	
this. Now, that is contained in the new draft, as we	19:1
see it, but effectively you have to copper fasten that	
on Friday at the meeting in regard to that on Friday.	

But the key element in this: Bray was always going to be grow at that type of rate and Bray has got significant, in the sense that it is the number, it is one of the growth towns in the Metropolitan Area, along with Maynooth and Swords, which means that a significant amount of infrastructural development,

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planning, will go into those three towns to contain the growth as well. So we're talking about land use, we're talking about transport and all that type of infrastructure will be geared towards those three towns in the Metropolitan Area.

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One of the main problems in the plan, as I say, a number of weeks ago, before this meeting in October was that we were told that Wicklow Town, despite having 100 million of infrastructure built into it, was only 19 · 14 going to be allowed to grow to 17,000, whereas we in our Development Plan had it at 25,000, which would have meant between household sizes and various things like that, between 4- and 8,000 units would have to be deleted out of Wicklow Town. We fought that very 19:15 significantly in regard to, it made no sense to us in a housing crisis where you had a situation where you were going to be forced into down-zoning in a housing crisis and particularly when Wicklow Town had all the infrastructure built in, 100 million of infrastructure 19:15 I think it made no sense to anybody and it was fought very hard and it was conceded by the Department last Friday that in actual fact they said, no, that the figures would be contained in the Metropolitan Area, which this eased an awful lot of the 19:15 pressure, as we know, in regard to the County Plan. still left 3,000 out there. And we also got guarantees from the Department that there would be absolutely no pressure on us to down-zone in any shape or form

1	throughout the County.	
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3	I also got from them as well, I was concerned about	
4	Arklow, because Arklow, I felt hadn't got the proper	
5	designation in the Regional Plan, the reason being $_{\scriptscriptstyle 1}$	9:1
6	obviously because the infrastructure is deficient in	
7	Arklow but it's on its way and it will be delivered	
8	within a couple of years and that I felt that that	
9	would be a desirable area obviously for growth as well.	
10	They agreed with that and they said that they would not ${\scriptscriptstyle 1}$	9:1
11	be restricting any towns that are ready and able to	
12	develop quickly, that there would be no restrictions in	
13	that. But in Wicklow Town now there's no restriction	
14	there so there's no figure there in regard to Wicklow	
15	Town and obviously the Bray situation helped that	9:1
16	enormously.	
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18	Now, there's a number of just to go on, just to let	
19	you know there's other small towns that are mentioned	
20	in this, 5,000 to 1,500 and they are Newtown,	9:1
21	Baltinglass, Enniskerry, Kilcoole and Rathdrum and the	
22	settlements plus 1,500 Ashford, Aughrim, Carnew,	
23	Dunlavin, Tinahely, Avoca, Donard, Kilmacanogue	
24	Roundwood, Shillelagh, Newcastle as well.	
25	1	9:1

Could I just stress as well, for Members here that are, obviously there's a lot of interest in rural areas and rural housing and that. Rural housing really doesn't come into this. This is generally in the small towns

and villages because that will be contained in the County Development Plan and the County Development Plan will designate the numbers in regard to that and how that is operated. It doesn't get that prescriptive in regard to rural towns and one-off housing, and stuff like that.

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Also, there is deficiencies in it as well that I've identified as well and one of them is really that the only road scheme that's listed for Wicklow would be the 19:17 N11 and that would from Loughlinstown to Kilmacanoque and I think we should be fighting for that to go to Covne's Cross. I think that's the long-term version of that, but certainly from my point of view that that's what we should be doing as well. 19:18

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There's absolutely no mention of what I think is a strategic road from Dublin to Rosslare. If people would remember the Euro Route used to be always from Belfast down to Rosslare. For some reason or other, in 19:18 the National Planning Framework that road from Dublin to Rosslare was taken out and just the one that was left in, which was called an economic corridor which was Dublin to Belfast, which included the towns of Drogheda and Dundalk as economic corridors. effect, I think is a major, major one in it. And given that we have Brexit coming up as well, and effectively if it is a bad Brexit like some people think, effectively I think Rosslare will be the one area that

1 you'll going straight into Europe from, you wouldn't be 2 going from Belfast. So to me it makes sense that that should be included in it as well. 3 4 5 There's no mention of the N81 either which I think most 19:19 people agree needs attention. There's no inclusion of 6 7 any regional roads scheme in Wicklow. 8 Now, there is a reference to the continuation of DART 9 services to Greystones but there's no indication of any 19:19 10 11 improvement and there's no mention of the improved rail 12 services south of Grevstones as well. 13 Cllr. Mitchell will probably be talking about this. 14 And there's a reference to new park-and-ride in 15 Greystones, they have a park-and-ride there so I don't 19:19 16 know what that reference is in regard to that. 17 18 But there's other issues that I think in this as well 19 that need to be brought up and talked of today is that 20 they haven't addressed in this plan the extant planning 19:19 permission. That's planning permissions that have 21 22 already been granted and that's something that I think 23 we, as a Council, we don't know exactly the figure, 24 it's probably 3- or 4,000 in the figure that have 25 already planning permission existing out there and they 19:20 seem to be wanting to count them in the overall 26 27 figures. And my reason for this is that they shouldn't

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be, they should be external to that and effectively if

that came in, if that came in and we could get that,

then effectively that would mean that we were working on the County Development Plan figures so we'd be back to square one. So it would be very acceptable from our particular point of view.

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In regard to, also the film industry I don't think gets the mention that it should and I think they're talking about clustered development in that regard to bringing different areas together, businesses together and I think we should make a strong case in regard to a film cluster obviously between Ashford and Bray in regard to that. There was an element early on in the draft that was absolutely downgrading film in Wicklow and that was fought extremely hard and certainly there was a type of reference in it that would have meant that they were gearing the film towards Limerick rather than Wicklow. As we all know, Wicklow has been for the last 50 years the premier filmmaking county in the country.

There's very little about offshore wind in it as well and greenways. There is greenways mentioned in it but there's no greenways in regard to Wicklow mentioned in this as well.

Also, in regard to the Fassaroe development, they have the Fassaroe development down as medium term and that is something that we in Bray would not agree with, that we want that in phase one because we made specifically in the Development Plan that 50% of the housing in the Fassaroe area would go into the first phase and certainly from that point of view I think certainly I would be fighting that on Friday.

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Also, I think the economic zone they have in Greystones, the IDA land in Greystones which is going to be designated, along with Bray, as being a growth centre in the Metropolitan Area, Greystones as part of that cluster is going to be designated as a zone, a special economic zone in regard to that.

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So really there's lots more in it really. You could talk about this for hours on end but they're the key issues as far as I'm concerned. We can obviously answer any questions here that anyone wants to put, if 19:22 we can to do so.

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The system now that's operating this is that this will come up on Friday. The Committee will either decide or not decide to let it out to public consultation. 19:22 it will go out, like the normal planning process, it will go out for a number of weeks to public consultation. In that time I intend bringing back and the planners here will make, will obviously go through each and every line of that in regard to Wicklow and we 19:23 will make a submission in regard to the plan down for -- and it will be after Christmas, I think, again that will be handled as well. And any changes then, like a normal planning process, any other changes major would

have to go out for other public consultation. So it's going to be coming close, as I see it, to the election next year before this could be decided, given that everything would go fairly smoothly in regard to this.

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Now, there is consternation in some counties in regard to what's happened. It hasn't been a smooth process, to say the least. It's been very badly handled and I must say mostly from the Department that they could have brought it up at a much earlier stage, in my opinion, than what they have done. We are here now at this stage now and it seems to be all systems go. I think everyone's keen on trying to get agreement in regard to letting this go out to public consultation.

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I'm going to let it out to members now. Cllr. Fox. CLLR. FOX: Thank you, Chairman. First of all can I thank you for having the meeting. As you said, you feel that the process has been handled poorly by the Department. It absolutely has been handled dreadfully by the Department. To keep local Councillors in the dark is an absolute disgrace. I mean only for you coming today to give us these proposals, I mean we're here, we're going to talk on this subject, we have nothing in front of us apart from what you have told us. I mean the lack of transparency is absolutely dreadful.

Just to follow on from what you have said, I mean

1	there's obviously huge concerns, particularly, first of	
2	all, in the settlements and the difference in the	
3	population targets in our own County Development Plan	
4	and what has been suggested in this National Planning	
5	Framework. I know the time scales of the Development	19:25
6	Plan and the National Planning Framework are slightly	
7	different but there are tens of thousands in the	
8	difference. The first figures you gave, there was 23-	
9	to 28,000 of a difference in the County Development	
10	Plan and the National Planning Framework. So it is	19:25
11	imperative that, I suppose, you and the other regional	
12	members would insist that no de-zoning is not just a	
13	commitment but it is stitched into the text because $\ensuremath{\text{I'm}}$	
14	not a big fan of gentleman's agreement and verbal	
15	agreements and verbal commitments. The plan is the	19:26
16	plan and the plan will be interpreted by different	
17	planners in different local authority areas so it is	
18	absolutely imperative that if there is to be no	
19	de-zoning that that is stitched into the text.	
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21	My first question, I suppose, is: Will this document	
22	require us to reopen a whole County Development Plan	

23 process? Have a rethink or a new look at our core

strategy and the whole Planning Sections within our

Development Plan? 25

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You say one-off housing is not significantly addressed in the plan, however, I have huge concerns from what media reports have circulated in relation to the plan

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and its impact on one-off housing. I feel if what has	
been stated in the media is correct and the creation of	
shadow areas from large settlements, it will have a	
huge impact on one-off planning in County Wicklow. As	
I say, I have huge concerns already about the direction	19:27
that one-off housing has taken and this will be the	
final nail in the coffin for one-off houses in County	
Wicklow. And I, for one, feel that the brakes have to	
be put on any policy that takes away from local	
democracy. For me the document that should be relevant	19:27
for one-off rural housing is the County Development	
Plan because that is the plan that Councillors around	
this Chamber feed into and that is local democracy at	
work, and we should be deciding on one-off planning	
permissions based on our own County Development Plan.	19:28
This is an attempt to cut local Councillors out of the	
whole system and it is wrong and certainly I would have	
huge concerns about it. Thank you, Chairman.	
CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay. Cllr. Ruttle.	
CLLR. RUTTLE: Yes, Cathaoirleach, again, thank you	19:28
very much for calling a meeting and for organising all	
this for us. It's very difficult on you in the absence	
of any documentation which you want to present what the	
findings are so far and where you think we're going. I	
suppose I have to say, it represents a bad performance	19:28
by the Department again at an inopportune time. You	
get the feeling that the Councillors are still at the	
wrong end of the business in this. I have to say it	
sounds very official and maybe and expert-led in a	

T	certain way. We re relying greatly on the four	
2	representatives we have from this Chamber to go forward	
3	I think your meeting is Friday, is it?	
4	CATHAOI RLEACH: Yeah.	
5	CLLR. RUTTLE: To get things back on track. And	19:29
6	basically like, in the time of a national housing	
7	crisis we need more houses not less and a huge impact	
8	on that. We certainly don't want to start de-zoning	
9	land at a time when people are crying out for it.	
LO		19:29
L 1	Like my colleague here, on the issue of the one-off	
L2	rural houses, I'm very suspicious again, there's an	
L3	element on the loose probably in the Department, they	
L4	don't want us out there at all, that we're not needed	
L5	out there and that it will lead to a situation where in	19:29
L6	the end any house that comes on the market in the rural	
L7	area, all you have to do is kill planning off for a few	
L8	years, any housing with a premium price, it is	
L9	unbuyable, it's unpurchasable and it completely defeats	
20	the situation where young people can go forward and	19:29
21	build upon their own land or in their own locality. By	
22	and large the rural people and the farming people have	
23	been the custodians of this land in this County for	
24	hundreds of years and by and large we have done a good	
25	job of it. I worry, sometimes, when I see a situation	19:30
26	like this, how long more can we continue to be	
27	appreciated in that?	
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It also disturbs me, there's no mention of the N81 at

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all. If you're going to strike balance in Wicklow, there's the N11 on the east coast and there's the Euro Route which is an overarching issue of the N11, but there's also the N81 in West Wicklow which is hugely important and very important to people from a social point of view, from a business point of view, from a safety point of view and we would need to see that back in there.

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There's another major project at Blessington and I 19:30 don't know whether it's mentioned at all and that's the Blessington greenway project. That is not just an issue for County Wicklow, it's an issue for many, many -- the whole of Leinster, you might say, it's the finest, longest proposal for a walkway/greenway 19:30 anywhere in Ireland with the most amazing background. I was on the proposed route myself at the end of last week and what we have on offer there as against what we had, say, at the time some of us went to the walkway in central England, we have the backdrop of a mountain, 19:31 we've a lake, we've aspects of view. We have something that's very good for the environment, well organised and where we have the agreement of the one landowner we're only dealing with, I would love to see that mentioned as a major, as a major issue in a strategy 19:31 like that. And I would ask you, all of you, to press those two issues, the development of the N81 and the recognition of the significant regional importance of the proposed Blessington greenway. Thank you,

2	CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Cllr. Whitmore. I'll take
3	a group of questions and then I'll go to Sorcha, the
4	relevant officials and the CE and Sean Quirke up here
5	and then I'll move on again. There's a good few people $_{ m 19:3}$
6	who want to come in on this. Cllr. Whitmore.
7	CLLR. WHITMORE: Similar to Cllr. Ruttle and Fox I'm
8	really concerned about this process and it seems to
9	have already started in a very, very, you know, sort of
10	secretive manner and the fact that Councillors have not 19:3
11	been involved, other than the four reps, you know,
12	we're not getting any information here so it's very
13	difficult to have a conversation in the absence and in
14	a vacuum of information and that does greatly concern
15	me, particularly as it will have such an impact on the 19:3
16	County going forward.
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18	I would like to thank, I see Pat Casey is there today
19	and I would like to thank him for going along I can't
20	see any of the other TDs here.
21	FROM THE FLOOR: John Brady.
22	CLLR. WHITMORE: Okay. Thanks to John Brady as well.
23	It is this is a hugely important issue and I think
24	we're going to need our TDs behind us on this and
25	making sure that Wicklow is being represented correctly 19:3:
26	and that the process is being operated correctly.
27	
28	Just in relation to the County Development Plan
29	process, did you say that it was a 26-week period was

1	being given? Even statutorily is that giving us enough	
2	time? Because I know there's quite significant	
3	CATHAOIRLEACH: Within 26 weeks.	
4	CLLR. WHITMORE: I think public consultation is ten	
5	weeks.	19:33
6	CATHAOIRLEACH: You start the process within 26 weeks.	
7	It doesn't mean you have to have completed in 26 weeks.	
8	CLLR. WHITMORE: It's not completed. Okay. That deals	
9	with that because I think the pressure that it would	
10	put on the Council is going to be huge.	19:33
11	CATHAOIRLEACH: It couldn't happen in that time.	
12	CLLR. WHITMORE: But even within the 26 weeks, I mean	
13	to actually restart that process again and all on the	
14	knock-on effects and the pressure that it would put on,	
15	that would be quite significant.	19:33
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17	Primarily the concern is really about the lack of	
18	information that has been given to Councillors here	
19	today.	
20	CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay. Cllr. Winters.	19:33
21	CLLR. WINTERS: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. I suppose I'd	
22	like to start by thanking Cllr. Vance for the work that	
23	he has put in into trying to help make sure that	
24	Wicklow doesn't come out the wrong side of this	
25	process. I'd also like to thank Sorcha and Sean Quirke	19:34
26	and Frank for the work that they've put in also in	
27	highlighting the possible pitfalls in the document.	
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If we go on Friday and we're presented this document

1	and it's 210 pages and it's going to be a correction of
2	what was a truly inaccurate document at the meeting I
3	went to in September, once we put it out for public
4	consultation it is like the County Development Plan:
5	We have accepted the draft copy. So then it's only
6	going to be tinkering and amendments. So I haven't
7	seen the 210 pages of this amended, I know you say we
8	have access to it, but I didn't receive it.
9	CATHAOIRLEACH: You haven't got it?
10	CLLR. WINTERS: No. I haven't seen it. So I would 19:3
11	actually be really interested to know what our own
12	Planning Department think of the changes that are
13	proposed and what possible pitfalls they would see from
14	the amended plans so that we can go on Friday and put
1 5	the best case forward for Wicklow and for people who 19:3
16	aren't familiar with the process, some of the figures
17	that were in the original plan, not just for Wicklow
18	but for other counties, were ridiculous. Like they
19	were saying that Naas could grow to, I think it was
20	90,000, there's over 90,000 people there already. So 19:3
21	basically that was it, they should just not build
22	another house until 2030. I mean it was mad stuff,
23	absolutely mad stuff and it wasn't for the want of the
24	planning departments of all of the local authorities
25	that were involved giving them information because 19:3
26	Wicklow did and Louth, Meath, all of the local
27	authorities' planning departments were sending in
28	submissions. And basically the Department were either
29	sidelining them or not reading them or using

1 alternative figures so whereas we based our County 2 Development Plan on the CSO, they seemed to be using 3 figures that came from the ESRI and they were just at total variance with each other. Unless it's changed 4 5 remarkably between what I saw in September and what's 19:36 going to be here on Friday, I can't see it going out on 6 7 public display for a long time. But I would be 8 interested to hear what Sorcha thinks the possible pitfalls would be. Thanks. 9 Cllr. Mitchell. CATHAOI RLEACH: 10 19:36 11 CLLR. MI TCHELL: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Having been at all of the meetings of this body and representing 12 13 the Council, it's certainly disturbing how this has 14 arisen. I think one has to look at this, so far as the civil servants are concerned, this is a national plan 15 19:36 16 for the population of whole the country. You also, on 17 this body, Wicklow is but one of nearly ten counties, I 18 think, many of which are bigger than County Wicklow. 19 So we're only but a small group in the four Wicklow 20 Councillors. But the similar issues to Wicklow occur 19:37 in Kildare and Meath, all of way have taken enormous 21 22 growth. Now, a huge reason, a huge thing behind this 23 National Plan and this document is that they want to 24 fit an awful lot more people into Central Dublin - and 25 certainly I think at least twice the amount of people 19:37 should live between the canals in Dublin than do at the 26 27 moment. They have many more times than that in Copenhagen, I think it's nearly five times as many live 28 29 in that area. That is a good concept and that is what

they're trying to achieve. However, the first draft, as the Cathaoirleach said, would mean something like 10,000 or so houses, as I read it, might have to be de-zoned in Wicklow, which during the seriousness of the housing shortages makes no sense. Now, when questioned the officials from the Department seemed to suggest that maybe the Planning Department here made a mistake in suggesting that. I don't think that's the case at all. I think however these figures were derived - by the ERSI I'm told - it just didn't seem to make sense in terms of the details of the towns being clear.

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However they have changed. The meeting when the senior officials from the Department of the environment came along, they have said that there is scope for some growth in the wider Metro Area, subject to agreement, this could further add to Kildare, Wicklow and Meath population on account of that. Now, in Wicklow, nearly 40%, 45% of the County is covered by the Metro Area. The growth which is envisaged in Bray is around 4,000 Greystones is basically hardly listed at all in this document. The growth there could have been around 2,000 or so. So there's around about 6- or 7,000 could be taken out and used. That still leaves a problem with Wicklow Town where the money has been spent putting in the roads system at considerable expense and a sewage system and those houses are not being built and that seems a rather nonsensical thing to do.

would have concern about that.

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However, I do also have a concern about the growth of Grevstones at the moment. Since the census about a thousand houses have been built or are being built 19:39 which means that Greystones is catching up with the population of Bray and the infrastructure to support that, apart from the sewage works, has not been built in. The roads which were planned in 1989 have not been There are no jobs, even though we thought we built. 19 · 40 had a legal agreement with some of the developments, it turns out that that agreement was invalid. There seems no way of refusing planning permission because we have the lowest job ratio, the lowest number of people working in any town in Wicklow within the town and 19:40 possibly of any town in Leinster and there's no extra maintenance money to cater for all of those extra people which have come since the census.

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So I am not in favour - and this would probably be a later subject - of any significant expansion of Greystones than what is there at the moment because the Council, or whoever is responsible, is not prepared to upgrade the infrastructure in a timely way.

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Also, the recent changes to the railway system have provided the worst service to Greystones and to Wicklow, south of Bray and the further plan for the railway is to provide an even worse service in the more

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1	distant future. So that is a considerable problem.	
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3	So we need also to get the change to point out the fact	
4	that there should be an improved rail service for	
5	Greystones and South Wicklow.	19:4
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7	Also, the park-and-ride I think is an issue about	
8	expanding the present park-and-ride and that is a	
9	concept worth mentioning. I believe those things need	
10	to be done.	19:4
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12	I would certainly appreciate assistance from the	
13	Planning Department here about how the current	
14	document, as distinct from the previous document,	
15	relates to the figures and, also, how in discussion we	19:4
16	could raise amendments to this plan on Friday, or	
17	before Friday. But it is very difficult in a group so	
18	wide to get one's amendment actually through, unless we	
19	really get together with people in Meath and Naas. I	
20	mention Naas because apparently the planning	19:4
21	permissions in Naas actually far exceed the stated	
22	population in the document, so they would have to tell	
23	people to leave Naas if they are to meet the targets.	
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25	It is a very complex document. It is very difficult to	19:4
26	get it amended. Cllr. Vance has certainly been very	
27	strong in assisting at these meetings that these public	
28	servants will change it. They have changed it somewhat	
29	and I'm concerned it's not enough.	

1	CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr. Timmins, could I apologise to
2	you. Cllr. Timmins, you would well know from being up
3	here, the screen that gives the rotation on it, I
4	believe you were one of the first of it but the side of
5	the screen with the rotation is not working so 19:43
6	CLLR. TIMMINS: I forgive you on this occasion.
7	CATHAOIRLEACH: I apologise for you in that I should
8	have let you in a lot earlier.
9	CLLR. TIMMINS: Thanks. First of all, thanks very much
10	for holding this meeting I really appreciate it and 19:43
11	thanks as well for your help and your efforts to
12	support Wicklow in getting its fair share of this
13	document and recognising this document.
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15	I just really have a few simple questions: First of 19:43
16	all, when would we actually get a copy of that Draft
17	Plan that you're talking about? Would we get a copy of
18	it this week or before Friday?
19	CATHAOIRLEACH: No, you can't get it before Friday. It
20	will be after Friday when the Regional Assembly members 19:43
21	have discussed it. And I'm absolutely disgusted that
22	two Members here today still haven't received that but
23	I'll make sure in the morning that that will be sent
24	out to you.
25	CLLR. TIMMINS: In terms of amendments, you will be 19:44
26	voting when to put it on public display. Can the
27	population numbers be changed after Friday? Could we
28	just establish that?
29	CATHAOIRLEACH: Yeah. To my knowledge we may or may

1	not be voting to allow the plan to go out on Friday. I	
2	have a feeling, but I'm not exactly sure, I don't think	
3	there will be a vote to put it out on public display	
4	because I think there would be a lot more work to be	
5	done. There might be amendments brought forward that	9 : 44
6	they'd have to address and maybe come back with a	
7	further meeting. But I'm only saying what I think	
8	might happen.	
9	CLLR. TIMMINS: Another question: Will it come back	
10	from the Dáil to be ratified or does it have to be	9 : 44
11	ratified by yourselves?	
12	CATHAOIRLEACH: well, before the Dáil?	
13	CLLR. TI MMI NS: Yeah.	
14	CATHAOIRLEACH: I'm not aware. No, it's the	
15	responsibility of the Regional Assembly in regard to	9 : 44
16	this now. It's gone through the Dáil and it has been	
17	approved, the actual planning framework has been	
18	approved by the Dáil. So to my knowledge it won't.	
19	There's ongoing discussions in regard to the	
20	Sub-Committee and the Dáil that is chaired by	9 : 45
21	Pat Casey, Deputy Casey. He's very much involved in	
22	this as well and has been in contact all the time with	
23	regard to that and Pat has been very helpful in regard	
24	to getting the changes as well on that. He's on that	
25	Committee as well but it's the Regional Assembly that	9 : 45
26	approve it. That's their responsibility. It's been	
27	handed down in the National Planning Framework in	
28	regard to that.	
29	CLIR TIMMINS: A couple of other points. The key	

thing is that the population guidelines on this document mirrors our Development Plan because this Development Plan, as we know, a lot of work was put in here, we were all happy with it here two years ago and for this document to come along and supercede it and undermine it I think would be horrendous. Again, as Cllr. Fox and other Councillors have said, this undermines our democracy here.

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Another thing I'm very concerned about as well is the rural planning, because only today I was reading an An Bord Pleanála report on refusal in rural and in West Wicklow and it quoted national documents and didn't — it more or less took more cognisance of the national documents than the County Development Plan and it talked about areas being under urban pressure, this is even in rural West Wicklow. I'd be very concerned that this document could be used by An Bord Pleanála to overrule our County Development Plan where planning has been granted to planning permissions on the basis of our County Development Plan and then this document then is quoted by An Bord Pleanála, or whatever, to actually refuse the planning permission. So I do have a deep concern that it could be used in that respect.

So I would ask that that point be addressed by the Members on Friday that is there stuff in here that is going to undermine our Development Plan or what sections of it cover rural planning and what exactly

are they saying about rural planning? I know my colleague here beside me, Cllr. Shay Cullen, has issues on that as well that came up here before. That's something that is of concern, again, not only in terms of population of villages, towns, large towns, small 19:47 towns, small villages, that our County Development Plan has been hugely undermined by this document and additionally that the rural planning, in a much more subtle way, will be undermined and used to stop people from getting rural planning permission.

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Finally, then just to say the lack of mentioning of the N81 is really disappointing as well. It's a major artery out of Dublin. It hasn't been developed. investment has been put into it over the last many decades while all the other arteries have been. extraordinary that it hasn't been mentioned, especially in light of the fact that everyone knows the N7 is overburdened at the moment. It's practically half shut down for the next two years, I think December 2020, more and more people are actually using the N81 as a result of that. It is a good extra access out of the city to take the pressure out of the busiest road in the country, the N7, and that that road hasn't even been recognised in this document is really short sighted and I really wonder where people are coming from. Thank you.

28 CATHAOI RLEACH:

Cllr. Snell and then Cllr. McLoughlin.

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29 CLLR. SNELL: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. Again, like

previous speakers, I want to commend you for holding a	
meeting there tonight. In my opinion potentially it	
has an unmitigating disaster for the people of County	
Wicklow in regards to the future of not just housing	
units, but you touched on an awful lot in regards to	19:48
the IDA lands, our travel infrastructure. But an awful	
lot of work went into our County Development Plan here	
and particularly our housing strategy and a lot of it	
was based on the housing yield of zoned land and also	
service land. I just feel from Shillelagh to Bray and	19:49
from Blessington to Wicklow Town, you know, everybody	
is going to be affected here and I hope that the four	
Members - and I assume they are - are all singing off	
one the one hymn sheet here for County Wicklow and I	
commend them for the work that they've put in. As I	19:49
say, it certainly was an awful lot worse than it could	
have been by getting Bray into the Metropolitan Area	
and securing the 7,000 units within the Metropolitan	
numbers. I commend the four Members here for their	
vision and obviously for fighting that good fight. But	19 · 49
I'd like to point out that if 3,000 units are proposed	
and after Friday that you don't get your way, 3,000	
units, I certainly won't be supporting the de-zoning of	
even one unit let alone 3,000 units and I think that	
every member here would share those sentiments.	40.50
every member here would share those sentiments.	19:50

I hope to God that common sense prevails in regards to the Assembly and your meeting of the 37 Members. Could I get a breakdown, at some stage, in regards to the

1	make up of the 37 Members? I assume that because we	
2	have four Members perhaps Louth, Meath and Kildare will	
3	also have the same type of numbers?	
4	CATHAOIRLEACH: No. Roughly Meath and Kildare would	
5	have because we have a ministerial, I think	19:50
6	Government appointment, Cllr. Winters we have an extra	
7	one on that, Dublin City Council have very similarly,	
8	each of the Counties. So in actual fact it doesn't go	
9	by population because Dublin City Council would have	
10	way more than anybody else, it goes by just the amount	19:51
11	of members. I can't go through the whole breakdown but	
12	there's 12 local authorities; four Dublin and nine	
13	counties involved so you can work the figures out from	
14	that.	
15	CLLR. SNELL: I hope, Cathaoirleach, that you and your	19:51
16	fellow colleagues here in the Chamber are able to get	
17	common sense into the other local authorities out there	
18	because I believe that everything is geared towards	
19	Dublin and the Greater Dublin Area and unfortunately it	
20	seems to be at the expense of all the neighbouring	19:51
21	counties.	
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23	In regards to the road network, and I know	
24	Cllr. Mitchell would be an advocate of fighting for	
25	better road services in and out of this County, and	19:51
26	that obviously includes the M50 and the M11, but I'd	
27	ask the question in regards to the N81 and as we all	

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know, the N81 is a very important infrastructure for

West Wicklow, and all the way down to South Wicklow,

had the Members an opportunity to discuss that, the four Members and make that case previously before this document? And, again, like yourself, Cathaoirleach, I would be very concerned that, you know, a number of Members don't have the documents before this very, very 19:52 important meeting on Friday. I think it's unacceptable that they would get the document at this late stage that has such a vast amount of information in it. But, once again, I can't let it go without commending you for holding this meeting. I feared coming in here not 19:52 having anything in front of us that perhaps, you know, what were we going to have, what were we going to discuss? You have outlined in regards to the huge importance of what's been going on. This is a lot of work that none of us would have known about in this 19:53 Chamber.

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In regards to the Dáil Members, perhaps it might be appropriate if we could, with your acceptance, perhaps TD Pat Casey could outline his involvement in this? You said he was involved at a huge stage of this document because, it's the first that I've heard about a lot of information that's in this, I think it's hugely important. It's not political. This is for the greater good of the people of the County Wicklow and I don't care what party, or none, but if people know and have more information perhaps this is the place that it should be shared. And once again, I just want to commend the four Members. Thanks, Cathaoirleach.

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1 CATHAOIRLEACH: Just in regard to Deputy Casey, he told 2 me that he only could be here for a brief period of 3 time but I talk to him on a regular basis in regard to free flow of information in regard to that and he has 4 5 done significant work in regard to this. cllr. Matthews. 6 7 CLLR. MATTHEWS: Thank you, Cathaoirleach, thanks for calling the meeting. I was looking through the 8 evidence baseline that was presented that would have 9 10 informed that and you can see that Wicklow is pretty 11 average in a lot of regards. Which is good news. It's good to be average in this case, it means we're not an 12 13 outlier. We don't have severe difficulties to deal 14 with. 15 16 Two things that stood out in the evidence baseline, one of them I don't see how it's going to be addressed in 17 18 the RSES, but they do state that childcare in Wicklow 19 is the second highest in the State. It is using the 20 document, but I'd be interested to know how that might 21 22 be addressed in the document. 23 24 The second thing that we have got to look at in Wicklow 25 and this is the serious issue that we face is the jobs 26 ratio.

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19:54 evidence baseline, I don't know if it's anywhere in the 19:54 19:54 If you look at the figures: There's 58,000 people resident in Wicklow that work; 32,000 of those work in Wicklow but 26,000 leave the County every day to go to work and that's why the N11 is gridlocked and

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1 lack of investment in public transport is not helping 2 that. 3 In terms of the process, the process seems to be 4 5 criticised by a number of people here. I don't really 19:55 have a huge problem with the process that was followed 6 7 here, it's quite similar to the County Development Plan 8 process in that there was an issues paper, there was a public consultation. The evidence, the baseline 9 evidence, the CSO figures, that's what informs a lot of 19:55 10 11 the Draft Plan. Remember, our Draft Plan is done by 12 our planners. It's not done by us. We're presented 13 with a Draft Plan and then we vote on it. So we've 14 elected three representatives from here and 15 Cllr. Winters and I trust you guys to go in there, as 19:55 16 our elected reps. We're elected, we elected you, you 17 go in there and you fight the case for us. 18 19 So I don't think the process has to be too criticised. 20 While I would criticise the planning, over the years, 19:55 there's nobody can dispute this, there's been too much 21 22 political interference with planning and that's one of 23 the reasons we have poor planning in this country. 24 like to see less political interference in planning and 25 more evidence-based planning because that will get us 19:56 out of the hole that we're in. 26

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Cathaoirleach, you said we're going to be back to

square one here: No change. I'm sure every county is

looking for that. If you look at the National Plan, the growth in the east was to be restricted and there was to be massive growth in Cork, Galway and the West. So they probably welcomed that but no doubt they're fighting to retain what was promised to them in their 19:56 Development Plan. So those two assemblies are going to So if everybody comes back with no fight for that. change, back to square one that's not good enough. The planning in this country has let us down. We have too much urban sprawl. We have congestion. We have a loss 19:56 of productivity. We have a lack of efficiency. And we have a dysfunctional transport system because of that because it can't address how we've built.

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Unfortunately in planning there has to be some unplatable decisions taken and short-term they will be painful for people, but in the long-term it's that will accrue from that. At some stage people are going to have take the difficult decisions in planning for the long-term.

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I mentioned when the EMRA officials came in here, that climate change was covered in about two paragraphs. I haven't heard it referred to by anybody here. If planning can do anything it should be to address the issue that we have on carbon emissions and transport is one of them and how we build our houses is the other one.

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1 I don't think it's good enough for us all to go back to 2 I think there does need to be some changes square one. 3 to that. I look forward to seeing the Draft Plan. Thank you, Cathaoirleach. 4 5 CATHAOI RLEACH: Before I go to Cllr. McLoughlin, 19:57 Cllr. Matthews, I did mention it. Through every 6 7 programme is the paragraphs on climate changes. It's 8 very significant in this plan but I couldn't, because it was just a brief synopsis of what was in it, but 9 climate change is very significant. Cllr. McLoughlin. 10 19:58 11 CLLR. McLOUGHLIN: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I have to 12 say congratulations to you and the team for coming 13 together tonight. But I do think that it is quite 14 appalling that we have nothing in front of us. 15 understand completely that you are excluded from doing 16 so and I have faith in the four people around the table, but when we have a situation that two of them 17 18 haven't even got a copy of the Draft Plan what does 19 that say? In fact we're talking about what we think we 20 heard you say about five minutes ago. Even if we had a 19:58 synopsis of that in front of us it might be easier to 21 22 get clarity. 23 24 Just a couple of questions I have. 26	Members so where are the extra 3,000 going to be made	
27	up? Wicklow Town you say 17,000 instead of 25,000?

1	Just to get back to Greystones, in particular and the	
2	growth there. We have seen, I think Cllr. Mitchell	
3	referred to 1,000 new houses have been delivered in	
4	recent times and there's another thousand to 1,500 in

6	We mentioned there is reference to the N11 road scheme,	
7	the CO might just bring us up-to-date there. Is that

10	Traffic problems in the morning. Transport issues in 2	0 : 0

12	addressed. It has been exacerbated recently by	
13	population growth. Issues with the DART. You	
14	mentioned Greystones there. You said there is	
15	reference to a park-and-ride and yet there is no	0:0
16	reference to the rail or DART services.	
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18	People's quality of life is affected here by traffic	
19	jams. People are leaving earlier and earlier in the	
20	morning to get to work. Theres issues at the Southern $_{ ext{ iny 2}}$	0 : 0
21	Cross roundabout. There's issues at Blacklion in	
22	Greystones and it's become so frustrating and that's	
23	not to mention what's happening on the N11. So there's	
24	a lot to be worked on, a lot to be figured out.	
25	2	0:0
26	Again, there's no reference to film. We should be	
27	putting more emphasis on the film industry, greenways,	
28	offshore wind, stuff like that. And of course the IDA	

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lands in Greystones is a key one there, as you say,

that's a special economic zone. If we got something up and running there then we're looking at reversing the commute straightaway. The skill sets are there. I know there's a survey being carried out shortly in relation to commuters so that should tell us a lot.

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Again, the plan itself displays a lack of understanding that the role of infrastructure generally and transport connectivity in particular. Thanks, Cathaoirleach. CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr. Bourke, then Cllr. Cullen. CLLR. BOURKE: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. First of all, thank you very much for taking the time and trouble. We owe you a great debt for the efforts that you put into reading that document in detail and presenting to us.

You mentioned the special economic zone there in Greystones, which is great to see coming along. You didn't mention, it may be in the planning but you didn't mention the thousands of people that get into the cars at 5:30 in the morning, say, from Gorey, Tinahely, Aughrim, Arklow and Wicklow to travel the N11 to find employment in Dublin and I think more needs to be done to relocate businesses south of the County, down to Wicklow and Arklow to create conditions for employment to reverse the commute, as Cllr. Walsh just mentioned there so people can have a better quality of life. The quality of life for people who have to do that every morning must be dreadful and the impact it

T	has on their family and children. It's shocking and I	
2	think that we really should definitely leave some	
3	legacy for future generations and address that and deal	
4	with it very strongly in this plan, if it can be done	
5	at all possible. You would be doing our community a	20:04
6	great service.	
7	CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Cllr. Fortune.	
8	CLLR. FORTUNE: Thanks, Cathaoirleach, and thanks for	
9	calling the meeting I think it's very, very important.	
10	I must say this is just more the same from the point of	20:04
11	view Councillors, I would agree with a number of	
12	Cllr. Fox's opening remarks. The whole process is a	
13	real serious issue with this. It's great that you	
14	called the meeting and all that, but we're here with	
15	two hands tied behind our backs. There'll be a	20:05
16	document or something produced after Friday and we	
17	still won't have had any input into it. There's too

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Have the TDs been involved, for example, to date in any part of the process and if they have what has their input been for that?

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Cllr. Mitchell talks about all the time the traffic on the N11 and if you look at the numbers moving out of the County, the whole thing is a disaster. So to say that Wicklow, you know, not to be dramatic, it could be potentially shut down depending on how this thing is 20:06 ratified around the table at the Regional Assembly. bottom line on this is that we're all public representatives, all elected democratically. We should be involved in this. 27	I suppose I would have serious concerns, as other	
28	speakers have, over the whole rural planning situation.	

I think in an earlier suggestion or draft the whole

area of the social and economic need in a rural area was causing a lot of concern. I suppose I want to make sure that that has been addressed because at one stage they were taking out the social need to live or get planning permission in a rural area, that you would only have to have an economic need and that certainly would rule out a vast number of rural applicants when it comes to rural planning.

20:09

To bring that a stage further, I feel that there is
more and more barriers being put on rural planning
applications and it really is down to interpretation
and it's a very frustrating process for Councillors and
applicants alike. So I certainly would like to see
that whole area of rural planning being taken more
seriously because I think there's a lot of, a lot of
issues there that are simmering away and that we need
to deal with them.

With regard to Wicklow Town. I'm trying to work out
the rationale of why they would suggest a growth
population of 17,000 when we would have had 25,000 in
our County Development Plan? Considering the
infrastructure spend that we have in Wicklow Town it
just doesn't make sense. It seems like they have just
plucked the figure of 17,000 out of the sky but like,
you know, again, I would like to know where did they
come with the 17,000? They seem to have rode back on
that and agreed to 25-. Why would they come back with

1	17- when we had 25- and the infrastructure in place?	
2		
3	The deficit of 3,000 units, that seems to be the figure	
4	now we're down to 3,000, I mean how do we achieve that	
5	without de-zoning land? I certainly am against any	: 10
6	de-zoning of anyone's land, but, again, I'm just not	
7	clear on how you can achieve this without de-zoning	
8	land. So it's something I think we should be fighting	
9	for at least parity that, you know, we stick with the	
10	guideline that is we have in our County Development 20:	: 10
11	Plan.	
12		
13	I suppose areas along the N11, Newtownmountkennedy,	
14	Ashford, where do those villages come into play? We're	
15	currently working on a new Town Development Plan. 20:	: 11
16	Again, a lot of uncertainty around that. A lot of	
17	planning permission that has already been granted in	
18	Newtown. I certainly wouldn't want to see that in	
19	jeopardy. In actual fact with the services that we	
20	have in Newtown it's somewhere where we should be	: 11
21	possibly increasing our population area.	
22		
23	The whole area, as we mentioned, is the transport	
24	situation, particularly the rail service improvement	
25	for Wicklow Town. I'm not sure what the position is	: 11
26	with that?	
27		
28	I know greenways were mentioned briefly but we're	
29	looking at a greenway from Greystones to Wicklow and I	

1	would like to see if there's any reference made to	
2	that?	
3		
4	But I suppose just to come to an end, Chairman, I	
5	suppose my personal view on this is I don't believe	20:11
6	there has been enough thought put into the whole	
7	process. I think there's a lot more work can be done	
8	and I'd like us, as Councillors, to have a bigger input	
9	into the future on this. Thank you.	
10	CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr. Dunne.	20:12
11	CLLR. DUNNE: Thank you, Chairman. First of all,	
12	Chairman, again thanks for all of your hard work that	
13	you put in this and also the Regional Assembly members.	
14	I know personally that you've put a tremendous lot of	
15	work in this, as your presentation this evening has	20:12
16	said.	
17		
18	Just, I suppose, you know, I just can't believe the	
19	process the way it's took place. We seem to be in the	
20	dark about knowing figures about the numbers, how the	20:12
21	process went ahead and tonight is probably the first	
22	time we had this opportunity to listen to you to tell	
23	us how it went. But, you know, most of the Members	
24	around here are finding it difficult to come to terms	
25	with what has happened.	20:12
26		
27	Just, I have a very straightforward question really:	
28	You know, if we have to put out the County Development	

Plan again for public display, you know, in Wicklow and

Greystones like the Wicklow and Rathnew Environs Plan	
probably should be up and running at this stage and we	
should be making presentations to the planners now at	
this stage but, you know, we can't because of this	
plan. I just want to know when do they envisage this	20:13
plan, the Wicklow Rathnew Environs plan going ahead?	
There's local elections in May or June so will it go	
ahead before then or will it be after that? Obviously	
people are coming to us wondering what's going on and	
we can't tell them. Maybe I could get that question	20:13
answered? Thank you, Chairman. Thank you.	
CATHAOIRLEACH: cllr. oliver o'Brien.	
CLLR. OLIVER O'BRIEN: Go raibh míle maith agat,	
Cathaoirleach. My question basically would be how	
credible this plan is? It's 2031 and I'd say there a	20:13
lot of people out there that could be very cynical	
about this plan. They'd say we don't have a credible	
plan for sorting the present housing crisis out at the	
moment. Is it just something paper, basically	
speaking, with vision and stuff that's all in this	20:14
plan? Is it just a plan over plans? I mean when you	
put a plan in place you surely have to move it with all	
the force that will result in the implementation of	
this plan? That's my major concern. I also have a	
concern that Cllr. Fox mentioned there about the local	20:14
democracy and taking the dynamics out of local	
democracy when everything has been imposed there from	
central idea. As you can see, there are major, major,	
major, major faults, in particular in relation to rural	

1	development, and maybe that indicates that the	
2	over-centralisation of the plan has serious problems	
3	because of that because we're not relying anymore on	
4	local democracy to develop. That's my concern and I	
5	wonder is that concern shared by anybody on the top	20:14
6	table.	
7	CATHAOIRLEACH: That's grand. Thank you.	
8	Cllr. Kavanagh.	
9	CLLR. KAVANAGH: Thank you, Chairman, and thanks for	
10	holding the meeting. I just want to make one or two	20:15
11	meetings. Basically the one thing that strikes me	
12	about this whole process is how haphazard it is. It's	
13	is almost like there are designers out there who want	
14	to make a suit to fit the country but they have some	
15	tailor working from one design and some tailor working	20:15
16	from another design and at the end of the day they're	
17	hoping that it's all going to marry up and it's all	
18	going to fit. The problem is that we're working with	
19	two completely different sets of plans.	
20		20:15
21	Now how can that happen? What is the point of the	
22	County Development Plan if it's going to be rushed all	
23	over? Like when I started here, what two-and-a-half	
24	years ago, the County Development Plan was the thing	
25	that everyone was working on. There was a huge amount	20:15
26	of work that went into it. It went backwards and	
27	forwards, changes, meetings, we had special meetings,	

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we had everything and eventually came up with something

that everybody was happy with. Do these planners not

speak to other planners? Or is that a kind of outlandish suggestion? Surely at the end of the day we're looking at the future of this country? We can't have different sets of figures and different sets of statistics and different plans with one group taking precedence over another. None of this makes any sense to me. It's almost like the lunatics are gone mad in the asylum. There's nobody in control here.

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So the other comment I would make is that if we're unhappy then I would imagine that Councillors in other counties are also unhappy. I'd imagine if their County Development Plans are being ridden over and with new figures being drafted in, I would imagine they would be very unhappy as well. I'd say that the Wicklow reps will get a lot of support at the meeting on Friday. They won't be going solo on this.

With regard to the actual meeting, I don't know what the mechanics of the meeting are on Friday, but can people just agree that they're not going to vote to adopt this plan on Friday? In other words, without any time, without any reference to all these Councillors here and in the other counties, I assume as well, can people just say: Look it, this is just not all marrying people just say: Look it, this is just not all marrying up together, we need more time. We need more input. We need to go back to our Councillors, we need to see what they want because they're the ones who came up with the County Development Plan and suddenly we have

1	these two plans and they're completely at odds with
2	each other. How can they suddenly decide that a
3	population growth is going to drop from 25,000 to
4	17,000? Like has somebody got a crystal ball there
5	that they're looking into and has decided that, you 20:
6	know, they're going to, they know how things are going
7	to be in 2040? It's just plucking figures out of the
8	air.
9	CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay. Thank you. Cllr. Kennedy.
10	CLLR. KENNEDY: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. First of 20:
11	all, I agree with everything that has been said around
12	the table over a lot of the things, especially the
13	rural planning. But I have three questions,
14	Cathaoirleach, that I'd like to ask: What would be the
15	effects be on Arklow where €30 million has been spent 20:
16	on a waste water plant? That's question number one.
17	What will the effects be on the likes of Rathdrum and
18	towns of similar size on the County? That's my second
19	question. And my third question would be: You
20	mentioned the year 2031 earlier on in your opening 20:
21	presentation, so what will the financial effects be on
22	the County over the next 12 years and how will the
23	shortfall be addressed and what services will be cut
24	because we'd have a shortfall in funding. That's going
25	to have a knock-on effect right around the County. I'm $_{20}$:
26	just wondering in terms of finance what will it be over
27	the next 12 years. Thank you, Cathaoirleach.
28	CATHAOIRLEACH: There's allegedly a massive amount of
29	funding to back up this National Planning Framework but

I'll get more answers on that. Cllr. Dermot O'Brien,	
and then Cllr. Cullen and then we'll go to the top	
table there to see if we can get some answers.	
CLLR. DERMOT O'BRIEN: Thanks a mil, Cathaoirleach,	
thanks again for hosting the meeting. I'm fascinated,	20:19
if you will indulge a newbie who is sitting here,	
fascinated looking at these processes and wondering	
when I see the County Development Plan and the	
collective imagination of the people in this room and	
in this building and those around the County, the	20:19
collective will, the collective expertise presents a	
plan that we're accountable for, that has integrity	
written all the way through it. And I'm fascinated	
that we have to send four people from Wicklow somewhere	
else to battle for its survival and its integrity. So	20:20
I'm wondering who are we battling with? You know, on	
Friday who is where are the counterproposals coming	
from that say Wicklow should be this, against the	
people from Wicklow who are saying: This is our vision	
for Wicklow. And who's informing the counterproposals?	20:20
We have expertise within this building that informs all	
the work that's proposed. I wonder who the experts are	
on the other side that have counterproposals and I'm	
fascinated to hear what our experts think about that.	
I'm really wondering, you know, where do you draw the	20:20
line between when we go out to face the public and we	
are talking about the vision for Wicklow and we have to	
explain and be accountable for the fact that it's being	
changed by outside forces. Thanks.	

1	CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you very much. Clir. Cullen and	
2	then the last man, Cllr. O'Neill after that.	
3	Cllr. Cullen.	
4	CLLR. TOMMY CULLEN: Chairman, first of all, like	
5	Cllr. Winters I didn't receive the document so	20:21
6	hopefully tomorrow I might get it so I'm restricted.	
7		
8	Chairman, I think it's wrong to suggest that the	
9	Members didn't bring this back to the Council. This	
10	has been discussed here in this Council Chamber at	20:21
11	least three times in the last year and it certainly has	
12	been discussed at the Planning SPC at virtually every	
13	meeting, in detail. So it's wrong to say that this	
14	wasn't brought back to people. I don't know.	
15	CLLR. McLOUGHLIN: we don't get any reports from it.	20:21
16	CLLR. TOMMY CULLEN: The other thing is, Chairman, I	
17	want to thank Sean Quirke and Sorcha Walsh for the	
18	advice they have given us on this. It has been very	
19	informative advice and very good advice.	
20		20:22
21	Chairman, we have done our best, yourself and the	
22	Wicklow Members, all the Wicklow Members have done our	
23	best with the limitations of our numbers, it's a very	
24	big body and we have put very strongly the case for	
25	Wicklow and for maintaining the Wicklow Development	20:22
26	Plan and the zoning figures contained therein. We have	
27	acted in unison there both at the planning committees	
28	and at the general body. So we have been putting the	
29	case for Wicklow very, very strongly with one voice and	

I think that has to be said.

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The issues are involved, there seems to me to be three counties really in the front line in this, this is Kildare, Wicklow and Meath and perhaps parts of 20:22 County Louth. And I mean I think I have been speaking to colleagues from those counties and I think what -- I think the door would be open, perhaps, that we would have a joint meeting of those local authorities, maybe we could hold it at the Naas County Council buildings 20 · 23 there and bring together the Councillors there from those three our four front line counties and the TDs from those counties which would be 22 or 23 TDs, it would be a very strong lobby group to protect interests of the residents of those counties. I would formally 20:23 propose that we would write to those local authorities to seek such a joint meeting going forward to see can we come together with a united front and that will be a very, very strong unitary bloc. Because ultimately I think this will come down to the Dáil Deputies and how 20:23 many people are in it. If we have a bloc of 22 or 23 Dáil Deputies from those four constituencies, because there's two constituencies in County Meath and I think they would have a significant say-so. I would propose that we would look to have a joint meeting with those 20.24 four front line authorities that are most affected by I think we will get, if that would be agreed to -- I suspect it would e agreed to.

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1 The other thing is, Chairman, nobody wants to see the 2 de-zoning of lands. I think Cllr. Fox is guite correct in his concerns about one-off housing because it's like 3 a pint of mil, if you fill up a pint of milk, you can't 4 5 put any more milk in that bottle and that's it, it's 20:24 6 finite and population is finite and you're restricted to that. 7 8 Someone mentioned, I think it was Cllr. Kavanagh there 9 about these population controls and it reminds me of 10 20.24 11 the Chinese Government one child per house policy. 12 That's effectively what this is being proposing, that 13 each household will be restricted to the amount of 14 children effectively that it will. Because if you say 15 you have to control the population, and people say, 20:25 16 well, actually I want to have as many children and I 17 can't but how do does the Government enforce a one child per house policy? I mean that's effectively what 18 19 we're being asked to do. 20 CLLR. RUTTLE: It's very difficult. I accept that. 20:25 It is very difficult. If you put 21 CLLR. TOMMY CULLEN: 22 a population cap on a county, it's the first time, this 23 is unique as a proposal that a Government body or 24 department is proposing the restriction of the 25 population growth. The way China has done it is the 20:25 26 one child policy. 27 CLLR. RUTTLE: They're reversing that, too. CATHAOI RLEACH: 28 Come on. Come on now. Come on now. 29 we're just getting to the end now. We have to be

1 serious about this. 2 CLLR. TOMMY CULLEN: Hold on, Chairman. The omission 3 from the N81 in this document is very, very concerning but, as I said, earlier as at previous meetings, 4 5 perhaps the Department, Mr. Ross, when he was making 20:26 6 this decision to downgrade not to upgrade the N81, he 7 knew about this document and what the figures were 8 coming out that the population in these areas were going to be restricted and we're not going to be 9 10 needing this road. So perhaps that informed the making 20:26 of this decision. 11 12 13 Chairman, I just have a concern about rural policy, but 14 probably it won't be voted on Friday. There may be a 15 deferral. But I think in that period, Chairman, that 20:26 16 we really need to get our act together with regards to 17 liaising with and forming an alliance with the other 18 four counties that are affected, particularly the three 19 and bring in, and I think the TDs should work on this as well to get these together and that's where we 20 20:26 should show our united front in a major bloc. But this 21 22 is far from over and we're still at the preliminary stages, to some extent, and there's still a lot of 23 24 fight and a lot of campaigning. But the fact that 25 these changes have been made --20:27 26 CATHAOI RLEACH: Very significant. 27 CLLR. TOMMY CULLEN: -- that shows the effectiveness 28 that the Wicklow Members have had, that our voice has

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been heard, to an extent. We're not satisfied to the

1	extent but we will keep fighting. But I think we do	
2	need some coordination with other Councils. Thank you,	
3	Chairman.	
4	CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr. O'Neill and then I'll go to the	
5	top table here.	20:27
6	CLLR. O'NEILL: Thanks, Cathaoirleach, and thanks for	
7	organising tonight's meeting. I will be brief. I just	
8	wonder exactly what our input, our four reps' input	
9	into the Regional Assembly is? At the outset we said	
10	the one-off housing isn't part of this, you know, so	20:27
11	I'm just wondering how hard our reps I know on the	
12	Planning SPC that I've argued all along here that	
13	one-off housing is an issue that I deal with quite a	
14	lot. I just wonder what effort has been put in to get	
15	the powers to be to listen to it?	20:27
16		
17	The other issue, on the N81, we all received an e-mail	
18	this morning following a question we put to the TII. I	
19	proposed a letter would be written to the TII here at	
20	the September meeting and the TII in response this	20:28
21	morning, which we all got a copy of, said there would	
22	be no sense in meeting the Members of Wicklow County	
23	Council because the N81 is not part of the National	
24	Plan. So, again, I just wonder, you know, what	
25	argument we have put to the National Assembly to have	20:28
26	these on the tar. Go raibh maith agat.	
27	CLLR. TOMMY CULLEN: Chairman, just a point of	
28	correction. As you know yourself, Chairman and	
29	Cllr. Winters, at every meeting of EMRA we have been	

1 raising the issue of one-off housing and the N81. So 2 rest assured --3 CLLR. O'NEILL: You yourself you haven't gone too far with it, Cllr. Number 24. 4 5 CATHAOI RLEACH: I think there's general agreement that 20:29 6 there's a huge amount of rural Councillors on EMRA and 7 they bring it up all the time. It's a huge issue in 8 the rural areas. Throughout that, not alone in Wicklow but obviously the other counties as well. 9

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Before I bring in Sorcha that she answers a few of the queries in regard to that, could I just say, I'll say it again: I have been informed from an official that there will be written confirmation that there will be no de-zoning in regard to this. I've told them time and time again from my point of view is that I will not vote for de-zoning in any shape or form in regard to it. And I believe that will be confirmed before the meeting on Friday in regard to that.

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Just before I bring in Sorcha, like a number of people have referred to it and I want to refer to it as well, this has been a long drawn out process and there's been a huge amount of meetings involved in it as well. I have attended every single one of them and really I couldn't do it without the information that I got from the Planning Section here. It was unbelievable the information and how thorough it was and how confident I was in the figures that I was given in regard to that

1	to allow us to go and fight our particular corner in
2	regard to this. I'll just say from my point of view it
3	was tremendous and I want to thank Sorcha and the
4	Department there for their help in regard to this
5	because we wouldn't have got the concession that we got $_{20:30}$
6	without that type of back up type material that we had
7	in regard to that.
8	
9	Could I just say that it wasn't only in Wicklow but
10	there was a number of planners that were involved in 20:30
11	the other counties as well and they're still involved
12	as well, that have been given their Councillors the
13	information in regard to it. Be know ourselves that
14	we're not planners and we have to rely on good
15	up-to-date information and we have to be confident 20:31
16	about delivering that as well and I think I was very
17	confident about that with the confirmation, with the
18	information I got from Sorcha. Sorcha, can you come in
19	there and then anything Sorcha misses it will be handed
20	to the top table. She won't miss very much, I can tell $_{20:31}$
21	you.
22	MS. WALSH: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I'm not sure
23	where to start there. I might come in at the beginning
24	just to talk to you about the process a little bit.
25	20:31
26	Since 1999 we've had a framework of planning emanating
27	from the national level down to the regional level down

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to the County level. We've had a National Spatial

Strategy in 2002, but before that we had Strategic

Planning Guidelines for the Greater Dublin Area which	
were in 1999. And so we are in a cycle for nearly 20	
years now of having national plans and regional plans	
change out of sync with our County Development Plan.	
As a plan changes, we do have to amend our County	20:32
Development Plan. But in the past it has been the case	
that if a higher order plan changed there was no	
particular pressure to amend your plan straightaway,	
you just amended along the same cycle that you were	
following anyway, your six-year cycle. So you could	20:32
have a County Plan that was maybe four years out of	
sync, say, with a Regional Plan if it got adopted	
around the same time, which happened quite often. So	
we've always had to deal with this problem that we've	
sometimes had to play catch up and that our figures	20:32
might have been different from new figures that have	
come from up above. In fairness to you, the Members,	
you've always dealt with that very well. You've always	
accepted it. You've tried to input into the processes	
that were above you in any way that you could. If any	20:32
new figures and policies came from above, you talked	
them through and you implemented them into County	
Development Plans. It was all done reasonably	
painlessly. I can't even remember an occasion where it	
caused a huge problem.	20:33

This is just another example of this. I don't think we need to blow it all out of proportion. We have a new National Planning Framework and we're going to have a

new Regional Plan and we will be amending our County
Development Plan and we will go through the stages in
the process and have lots of conversations about it and
workshops and working groups and SPCs, and so on, and
we'll come out the other end and wonder what the fuss
was. But at the same time we just need to make sure we
protect our assets when we have the opportunity to do
so.

So you have already made a submission to the Regional Plan that was earlier on this year so there has been presentations by both myself and the regional team to you here, and when the plan is adopted as a draft, you will get another presentation, perhaps from myself and perhaps from the regional team, and you will need make further submissions before this is adopted. If there are amendments, again, you'll get an opportunity to make submissions there.

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I suppose the new thing that's different is the Planning Act was amended in August this year and as Cllr. Whitmore was referring to, within 26 weeks of the adoption of a new Regional Plan we have to start the process of either varying or reviewing our County Development Plan. And all Councils will have to do that. So now all the County Development Plans will be aligned and running along the same timeline so that when there's a new Regional Plan in seven years' time from now, we'll all go through the same process again

1 and it will be nested one following the other. 2 is a big change that actually officials from this 3 Council have been lobbying the Department hard for a number of years and finally we see that. 4 5 20:34 6 The Act requires that we either vary or review our 7 Now, as all of you know, we'd County Development Plan. be, it will be 2020 when we will, in the normal course 8 of events, have to start the review of our 2016 9 Development Plan because it happens at year four. 10 11 likely that we will recommend to you that you start the process at the end of 2019, within six months of the 12 13 adoption of the Regional Plan, rather than varying a 14 plan that within one year you then have to review 15 So we will have to do a new core strategy. 20:35 16 there are new population figures to integrate into the plan, we'll have to do all of that, but we'll do that 17 18 as a Council and we'll work our way through that. 19 20 So that's the process that's going to come about and 20:35 but look, it's timely that you are involved in the 21 22 Regional Plan so that we don't face any insurmountable 23 problems later on. 24 25 Just in terms of the nest of planning and the plans 20:35 that are above us. There's two things going on here 26 27 which is the National Planning Framework and the Regional Plan and I suppose they've overlapped and 28

that's probably causing a bit of confusion.

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National Planning Framework was made by the Government in February this year and then in July this year they published a ministerial addendum to that, which was population figures. Now, the higher level population figures were already in the February document but the 20:35 July document included the County population figures. So the Regional Team and the Regional Assembly can't look behind those figures. They're adopted figures and they can't change those figures. It's not within their gift to do that. They have to prepare a regional plan 20:36 that is consistent with the National Plan. A question was raised: Can we change these County figures? They're not up for change, they're the policy of the Government that have been set now. So the Regional Authority and Regional Team have to work with those 20:36 figures and move through them and try to develop a regional plan based around those figures.

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The same goes for rural housing. There's nothing in the Regional Plan about rural housing because the Regional Plan doesn't have a gift to bring in any policies with regard to Regional Plan. The Government policy on rural housing is as set out in the National Planning Framework and the Ministerial Guidelines that already exist on rural housing. So if the Regional Plan includes any chapter or paragraph on rural housing, all it could do would be to restate what's in the National Planning Framework, which is already adopted. So there's no scope for bringing in tighter

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1 or looser controls, or any different types of controls 2 in the Regional Plan compared to the National Plan 3 because that has already been adopted. It would probably be just as easy for the Regional Team to 4 5 exclude any reference to rural housing, if they wish, 20:37 because they have no role in setting rural housing 6 7 policy. 8 I just want to flag that for you. I know it's a very 9 important issue in County Wicklow but I suppose it's 10 20:37 11 important we don't get sidetracked with issues that the 12 Regional Plan can't address at all. 13 14 I suppose going back then I'll just address one of them 15 which is the population figures which is what I suppose 20:37 16 a lot of people have hit on. 17 18 The National Planning Framework gave Wicklow County a 19 target population figure and that's 164,000 for 2031. 20 So those of you that know your County Development Plan 20:37 very well will know that our current target for 2028 -21 22 so three years short of that - is 178,000. people not houses. So that's a difference in 14,000 23 24 people. The idea behind this is the National Planning 25 Framework are trying to change the trajectory or 20:38 pattern of population growth round the country so that 26 27 we can refocus on our cities. And by focusing

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population growth in the cities what goes hand-in-hand

in that is a slow-down, not an elimination of growth

but a slow-down of growth in other counties, particularly counties surrounding the cities because they see this is causing a problem in our cities and we've got sprawl, we've got commuting problems, we've got congestion. So if we refocus on our cities what goes hand-in-hand with that is a slow-down in growth. As Cllr. Cullen correctly pointed out, the Counties that are being hit in our area particularly are Wicklow, Kildare and Meath. But the same is probably happening around the other cities in the other regions. 20:38

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So they want us to go on a different path growth, so it is to slow down our rate of growth. It looked earlier this summer when we got those figures that that was going to result in a very, very significant reduction 20:39 in our housing growth target. This 164,000 compared to the 178,000. So it would be a reduction in our housing over the next ten to fifteen years, so a slow-down by about 30%. Now, through the meetings and the negotiations and discussions that our representatives 20:39 on the Regional Assembly have had - and they've got been working very hard on this - they have got agreement from the Department and from the Regional Team that the population growth in Bray will come out of a different pot. It won't come out of the County 20:39 Wicklow growth pot. It will essentially come out of the Dublin City pot, which is the Metropolitan Area So it would mean that our housing growth pot. slow-down in Wicklow would be more in the order of 10%

rather than 30%. So that's to put it in a bit of context, the concession, I suppose, they've managed to negotiate. Again, that was something that if that proceeds we'd have to integrate into our County Development Plan. Now, that does not necessarily 20:40 equate to de-zoning, it's a reduction in housing growth target and how that is dealt with would be a matter for you in your County Development Plan, but there will be principles that you will have to apply in reaching Now whether that comes to fruition or not we 20 · 40 have to wait and see because the process, we have to follow through the process. But that's the kind of level that we're talking about changing from a 30% reduction now to a 10% reduction. Those of you that have read the NPF, you know that's the kind of route 20:40 they want us to go down.

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Again, earlier this summer a figure emerged for Wicklow Town which was around 17,000 and our current population in Wicklow Town is around 14,000, whereas our growth target was 24,000. The source of this figure, I think somebody asked where did this come from? It's a principle in the NPF that unless a town is a very, very strong town with lots and lots employment, full infrastructure, loads of schools, loads of playing pitches, has everything ready to go, you shouldn't be growing a town by more than 30%. If you can't tick all those boxes, 30% is the kind of growth rate you should be planning. So that's where the 17,000 came from.

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That raised a lot of concern because of the amount of money that had been invested in infrastructure in Wicklow. It might still have some deficiencies but a lot of the deficiencies have been dealt with by this investment, so it was felt that it was a waste of resources and a waste of this investment.

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The latest version of the Regional Plan that figure, that target, that cap, whatever you want to call it, for Wicklow is gone. There's no reference to it at all. However, those principles that a town should have all it needs to grow are still there, they're still embedded in the National Planning Framework, but it will be for you to tease out in the County Development Plan process. And the same will go for all the other towns, somebody has mentioned Cllr. Cullen mentioned Newtown, Ashford and so on. They'll have to put be through the same test to actually look at, well, is it right that this town should grow by 200% or should it only be 50%? We have to look very carefully at our decisions about how a town should grow. I'm sure there's some of you representing towns that you'd like to see more growth and there's probably plenty of you representing towns that would like to see less growth. So there's probably a bit of give and take there and again that will be for the County Development Plan to resolve in the future.

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They're the main issues that I think I can hit on. I

1	might pass you over to Sean and see does he have
2	anything else. Thank you all.
3	MR. QUIRKE: Not sure I can follow that, most of the
4	big issues have been dealt with there. I'd like to pay
5	tribute to the Cathaoirleach who has put an awful lot 20:4
6	of work into preparing his issue paper there and I have
7	no doubt that it will be well represented with himself
8	and our other three Members on Friday.
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10	I think the important thing from our point of view and $_{20:4}$
11	what took the pressure off us from August was the
12	removal of the Bray growth into the mass area. Now,
13	from what we've seen so far I think it's very important
14	that this is nailed down that it's clear and
15	unambiguous that we're not going back to the National 20:4
16	Planning Framework to see what does that mean and so
17	on. So that will take the pressure off for the rest of
18	the County.

21	is there will be no down zoning required and again that
22	takes a lot of pressure off yourselves, off ourselves
23	and allows, will allow the County to develop in the way
24	that it should.

28	be important as well and if we can get those in we are.

The RSES isn't going to end up as a 12 shopping list which you have to have everything written 13 on, but there are some big items that we do want in 14 there such as the M11/N11 corridor down to Rosslare;' 15 the big greenway in the west; the N81 and so on. 20:44 16 think if we should get those in there we should be a 17 lot more comfortable with our position after Friday or 18 whatever date it turns out to be. Okay. 19 CATHAOI RLEACH: The Chief Executive. 20 MR. CURRAN: Cathaoirleach, I would just like to thank 20:45 the Cathaoirleach in particular and the other Members 21 22 because he was directly influential in that change for 23 the population for Bray to go into the Dublin area. 24 That made a big reference. He was also fairly 25 influential, I think, in removing that target of 17,000 20:45 from Wicklow, which would have a huge affect on 26 27 development and also in relation to Fassaroe and to the

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Bray Golf Course lands, that they were given priority.

1 If I was to say the priorities for Friday, I think one 2 is the clarification on 20% in Bray. That's important 3 because there are some caveats in the plan but we can't have any caveats. And the issue of no de-zoning and 4 5 extant permissions, if we just get clarity on that. 20:45 6 7 The N81 definitely needs to go in there. I know it's 8 not in the National Planning Framework but if we get it in there. 9 10 20:46 I think 11 Fassaroe Phase 1 needs to go to short-term. 12 that might be an error and we need to change that. The 13 film cluster is very important to Wicklow so that needs 14 to be in there. Blessington greenway definitely. 15 means greenways but it doesn't mention Blessington 20:46 16 which I think is very unfair. 17 The Belfast to Rosslare route. They're going from 18 19 Belfast to Dublin but it needs to go right the way down 20 to Rosslare. It would have an impact on Wicklow. And 20:46 the improved rail service. So that's six or seven 21 22 items that I think we should put in on Friday. 23 you. 24 CATHAOI RLEACH: Cllr. Mitchell. 25 Thank you. I just have a query about CLLR. MI TCHELL: 20 · 46 26 what was said there. My understanding was the growth 27 of the Metropolitan Area of this County would be taken off potentially what had been the County Dublin figure 28

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and that it wasn't just Bray, but it's also Greystones.

1	CATHAOI RLEACH: No.	
2	CLLR. MITCHELL: That's what the slide said. The slide	
3	said the Metropolitan Area would be included. The	
4	difference is significant. If you look at the	
5	projection growth figures for Greystones, which I urge	20:47
6	are too high, but it does show that over the census	
7	figure there would be another 4,000 houses. Certainly	
8	even if there's two or three thousand houses it's still	
9	significant in terms of that. Because I think in Bray	
10	the figure they are talking about is 4- or 5,000. So	20:47
11	my understanding was that it was the entire	
12	Metropolitan Area which is essentially Greystones.	
13	CATHAOIRLEACH: My originally understanding of it was	
14	that was the case but it's only in the last few days	
15	that I understood that it's in the Bray area. And also	20:47
16	because Bray is designated with Maynooth and Swords,	
17	that's where the greater, the population is going and	
18	that's where it's going to be, not so much in	
19	Greystones. The major population growth in the three	
20	towns in the Metropolitan Area that have been	20:47
21	designated with superior status and the other ones are	
22	Bray, Maynooth and Swords. But my understanding is	
23	that the growth figure is the Bray figure.	
24	CLLR. MITCHELL: Right. That was not the case at the	
25	meeting I was at.	20:48
26	CATHAOIRLEACH: we can ask for clarification.	
27	CLLR. MITCHELL: I want clarification. If the rest of	
28	the County I think the Greystones figure	
29	CATHAOIRLEACH: I'll get clarification on that tomorrow	

1	but I think I'm right in what I say. Yeah, I think I'm
2	right. Cllr. McLoughlin and then we're going to wrap
3	up.
4	CLLR. McLOUGHLIN: Just very briefly. What impact,
5	Sorcha, will this have on the Local Area Plan for 20:48
6	Greystones? The next one is 2019. So technically we
7	should be starting work on it shortly. I imagine this
8	is going to put it back, will it?
9	CATHAOIRLEACH: Yes. It will put it back. If it has
10	to be reviewed the Local Area Plan will take a backseat $_{20:48}$
11	and the County Development Plan will take precedence of
12	that.
13	CLLR. FORTUNE: Just a comment.
14	CATHAOIRLEACH: Just briefly, please.
15	CLLR. FORTUNE: I'm just asking or assuming that all 20:48
16	the comments that came from every member will be
17	obviously taken into account at the meeting on Friday
18	because while the CEO and Sorcha and Sean have
19	CATHAOIRLEACH: Absolutely. I've taken a list of this
20	and the list of priorities as well. 20:49
21	CLLR. FORTUNE: I will have a concern when we start
22	talking about putting certain places into the
23	Metropolitan Area when we're operating in the District
24	system if you know what I mean.
25	CATHAOI RLEACH: Yeah. 20:49
26	CLLR. FORTUNE: I don't want that dismantled.
27	CATHAOIRLEACH: To date, I have to say there's been
28	good co-operation between the four Members from Wicklow
29	in regard to this. We're Members of different

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political parties as well, we talk to our colleagues there. We talk to our colleagues there, get agreement on this and I can tell you we've a very substantial majority then if everyone agrees to it. I think what we're asking for in regard to what could be reasonable 20:49 enough that if we get them there, I think they're priorities that we all have and certainly I agree with them as well. Certainly we'll endeavour to do this and we'll get back to you. Thank you very much for your attendance.
