7 Monday 11th January, 2015. Wicklow County Council meeting.

8
9 CATHAOIRLEACH: Members, good afternoon, and happy New Year to each and every one of
10 you. Hopefully 2016 will be a happy and healthy year for everybody around this table. And a
11 happy and productive one. We start with a number of apologies.

12 SPEAKER: We have apologies from Cllr Timmins, Cllr Bourke and Cllr Whitmore.

13 CATHAOIRLEACH: And sympathies.

14 SPEAKER: There are a number of votes of sympathy, the death of Kenneth Conlon, the father
15 of our colleague sorry, Carton, father of our colleague Gavin. Julia Byrne, mother of our
16 colleague Margaret Connolly. Tommy Mason, a former employee of Wicklow County Council
17 and Wesley Burrows, the playwright and writer of Glenroe fame who lived in Bray.

18 CATHAOIRLEACH: Anybody wanted to come in with any sympathies themselves. Cllr
19 Fitzgerald.

20 Cllr FITZGERALD: I just want to -- Cllr Murphy can't be here today, I want to give apologies
21 from Councillor Miriam Murphy.

22 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Snell?

23 Cllr SNELL: Thanks Cathaoirleach, yeah sympathies. In connection to the late Frank Byrne
24 from Glendalough, and I know you like to take sympathies from people who are associated with
25 the Council, as opposed to the general public. And I suppose Frank would have been involved
26 in -- probably everyone in the Chambers would be familiar with Frank at some stage. He was
27 heavy into statisticians and tallies and particularly on count day down in the Shoreline, and just
28 on behalf of myself and my colleagues, to Frank's family, his friends and more so his good
29 friends in the Fianna Fail party in particular Councillor Pat Casey I know was a very, very good
30 friend of Frank's and indeed Pat Kennedy there as well.

31 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thanks thank you. Cllr Thornhill.

32 Cllr THORNHILL: I would like to move a vote of sympathy in relation to Betty Sutton on the
33 Putland Village on the Vevay Road, Bray. Betty died at 74 years of age and I must say a person
34 that has given a great amount of community service to the people in the Bray area and not alone

1 in Bray, but throughout Ireland. And has also been abroad. It would be in relation to COPD,
2 people suffering from this disease where they have to get oxygen and which ever. She has
3 formed support groups and has been on television and a person that we should all aspire to, and
4 give someone like that would give hope to the future, people suffering from this disease.

5 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Tommy Cullen.

6 Cllr Tommy CULLEN: Chairman, I would like to pass a vote of sympathy for the late Margaret
7 Carroll of Church Terrace, Dunlavin. Madge was a great community worker for the community
8 of Dunlavin and put in many, many years of hard-working community service and the large
9 attendance at her funeral in Dunlavin would give credit to the huge amount of work she did on
10 behalf of Dunlavin for various groups and organisations. She will be sadly missed.

11 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Casey?

12 Cllr CASEY: I just want to be associated with the words about Frank Byrne. He was a personal
13 friend of mine, and has indeed, involved with me since I got involved in politics and played a
14 huge role in my political life. Equally to Madge Carroll as Cllr Cullen has outlined there would
15 have been originally a native of the Glendalough area. I want to be associated with both of them
16 two votes of sympathy.

17 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Shay Cullen.

18 Cllr Shay CULLEN: I want to propose a vote of sympathy for the late Tom Mulligan
19 Roundwood area, heavily involved in the IFA, Ploughing Championships, GAA and indeed his
20 son Fergal gave a presentation to this Council in the last number of months with regards to
21 upgrading the Broadband. He will be sadly missed in the area. Thank you.

22 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Fox.

23 Cllr FOX: Thank you Chairman, I would like to offer my sympathies to the White family on the
24 death of Joe, of course he is known as the proprietor of Lawless' Hotel in Aughrim but would be
25 originally from the Kilmacanogue area and my sympathy to Joe's family Sylvia and the family.
26 And I would also like to be associated with Tommy Mason's -- a vote of sympathy to Tommy
27 Mason's family, his wife May and daughter Catherine. I know he worked for the Council but
28 probably best known in Bray for being the bell ringer in Christchurch, and rang the bells for 60
29 years. They named the bell tower after him, so my sympathies to the Mason family as well.

30 CATHAOIRLEACH: If there is no other sympathies, we will stand.

31
32 (A minute's silence)

33
34 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Casey.

1 Cllr CASEY: Chairman I had written in requesting a suspension of standing orders to discuss
2 the Murrough, but seeing as there is an agenda item on number eight in relation to flooding, I
3 would defer it to that point but I would like it to be discussed as an item on its own rather than
4 being mixed in with the general flooding because I think it's an individual issue of great concern
5 to the community here in Wicklow Town.

6
7 And secondly, I would also like to suspend standing orders today to discuss the condition of the
8 N11 this morning and the number of accidents and the tailbacks, as to the reason why that
9 happened is of vital importance to find out how these things happen.

10 CATHAOIRLEACH: I am happy to take the first one, as it's a sub item under the flood and the
11 second one about the traffic issues on the N11 this morning, are members happy to suspend for
12 that. Is that agreed? Cllr Mitchell.

13 Cllr MITCHELL: I would like to suspend standing orders for an issue which there has to be a
14 submission made by councils in relation to the community gain to Irish Water, community
15 benefit, by 3rd of February and I would like the Council to make a submission, this is stated to
16 be in relation to the Shannon. But actually Wicklow has received a community benefit since -
17 for about 150 years with free water for Bray and Greystones originally, I'll go into it in more
18 detail, but I think it's important we discuss this. The sums should be significant and I think we
19 should make a good case why we should get a community benefit for this county from Irish
20 Water for supplying Dublin with water.

21 CATHAOIRLEACH: Is that agreed by members? Okay. Cllr Fortune.

22 Cllr FORTUNE: Thanks Cathaoirleach, just going back to item 8, I would in particular when it
23 comes to that item like to discuss the flooding situation in Holywell in Kilcoole which caused a
24 lot of trauma for a number of families -- maybe when we get to that point if you permit me to
25 outline the background to it.

26 CATHAOIRLEACH: Sure, okay. Great, so that's it. So what, will we suspend at 4.30? Is that
27 okay? For both of those items. It's 30 minutes. I think it will be okay. I think so. If we get
28 through the agenda faster today, we can move on to it earlier. Cllr Casey, do you want to come
29 in again.

30 Cllr CASEY: Just to express our congratulations to all the schools who participated in the BT
31 Science Exhibition over the weekend. I think it was the best year for Wicklow and I think we
32 should extend our congratulations to Mr John O'Brien from here in Wicklow Town who won the
33 excellence educator of the year award at the competition.

34 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay, Cllr O'Neill.

1 Cllr O'NEILL: On a point of clarification, are we going to go through the motions, the motions
2 of notice today? We talked about it before the last meeting, that we set a time for 3.30 that day,
3 and we still didn't get to it. I just wonder are we going to discuss the Notices of Motion today?

4 CATHAOIRLEACH: Yeah, I'll be led by the members, I mean I know it was the protocol's
5 view to actually try and get on to them the last day and that didn't happen. Should we -
6 regardless of what happens, will we start those at 4 o'clock? Would that be reasonable? Yeah,
7 okay, all right, okay. Item number one to confirm and sign the minutes of the Ordinary Meeting
8 of the Council held on 2nd November. Can I have a proposer please? Cllr Snell and a seconder
9 please? Councillor Gerry O'Neill.

10
11 Item number two, "To consider the filling of the casual vacancy arising from the passing of
12 Councillor Pat Kavanagh...(Quote)." Cllr Fortune?

13 Cllr FORTUNE: Thanks Cathaoirleach, I would like to propose we defer this particular item
14 until our March meeting. Reason being - the reason being that Cllr Kavanagh's sad passing is
15 only a short few weeks ago and the family are really not over that trauma yet and are going
16 through continuous heartache on that. I think in the interests of giving them time to mourn and
17 to consider what they want to do, I think we should do that. In the meantime, if they want to
18 come back to us sooner, we can bring it forward but I would propose we defer it until our March
19 meeting.

20 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay, are members happy enough with that? Okay. Item number three,
21 "To consider the disposal of the freehold interest in 7 Urban Villas, the Murrough Wicklow
22 ...(Quote)", we just propose that. Proposed Irene Winters and seconded by Cllr Casey.

23
24 Item number four to consider the disposal of - proposed, great, okay, seconded, Cllr Fox and Cllr
25 Vance. Great.

26
27 Number five, "To consider the disposal of the land contained that folio being the Singing
28 Kettle." Can I have a proposer for that. Proposed by Pat and seconded by Mary.

29
30 Number six, "To consider the disposal of hectares of land in townland adjacent to Ashtown in
31 Roundwood." Shay Cullen and seconded by Pat Casey.

32
33 Number seven, "To consider the disposal of hectares including way leave in the Council land of
34 Ballinalea Ashford in Wicklow", proposed by John Snell and seconded by Shay Cullen. Are all

1 those agreed?

2 Cllr FORTUNE: What's the size of the piece of ground in item five?

3 SPEAKER: It's 0.0338 hectares.

4 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay, item number eight is the report on the flooding events in December
5 2015 and January 2016 we are joined by Michael Geaney.

6 MR GEANEY: Thanks very much. I would like to - before I start I would like to wish a happy
7 New Year to one and all, I hope we have a successful one. Now Mr Aidan Dempsey the Chief
8 Fire Officer, Mark Devereaux, Aidan Dempsey will outline various issues that the Fire Service
9 answered over the period. Mark Devereaux will outline the CFRAMs and how it affects
10 Wicklow and also Michael Richardson, Civil Defence officer, will give us a presentation on
11 what work the Civil Defence carried out over the period of the flooding.

12

13 I referred to a report that I got circulated last Friday, which I am sure the members will have at
14 this stage. I'll just go through in summary basically that report. Now on the 4th of December, a
15 red storm warning, red storm rainfall warning was issued for the whole of the country - sorry for
16 the West of the country. Now this did not affect basically, did not affect Wicklow, although the
17 Council made plans at the time to open County Buildings on 5th and 6th of December, should
18 the need have arisen. Now thank God that was not the case.

19

20 Now regarding the CFRAM, the closing date for the flood risk assessment and management was
21 the 23rd of December. Now Mark Devereaux will go into that in greater detail as to how the
22 CFRAM affects Wicklow and what areas will need further assessment under that programme.

23

24 Just to go on then on to storm Frank, and I'll outline what happened from the 29th of December
25 to date. What I haven't the report - what I have in the report is up to Friday the 8th of January.

26

27 Now storm Frank gave us - from Wicklow, it gave an orange rain warning to the South of the
28 country basically, and included in that was the county of Wicklow. Now Wexford wasn't
29 included, Dublin wasn't included but for some reason Wicklow was included in that orange rain
30 warning that issued in or around 28th I think it was, or maybe the 27th of December. Now
31 having studied that, the Council felt that the areas of Arklow and the area of Baltinglass would
32 have been at risk. So there are plans put in place to alert staff in the relevant areas. And the
33 crisis management team met in County Buildings from the 30th of December and including over
34 the weekend of the 2nd and 3rd of January, in order to monitor and to co-ordinate the Council's

1 response and the other agency's response to any possible flooding events and to anything that did
2 occur.

3
4 Now I'll just outline and you have it in the report in the various Municipal Districts, the various
5 flooding events that occurred or the various damage that occurred. There were weir damage at
6 Ashford, landslide at the church bank in Wicklow, the Murrough there was very serious damage
7 there, including an issue really where the railway line was under threat at one stage. Brittas Bay
8 access to the beach and flooding on the road between Brittas Bay and Arklow; ash down
9 reservoir, pumps had to be hired to reduce the water levels and gulleys and drains in Bridge
10 Street had to be sorted out. You had issues as well in the Bray Municipal District in Enniskerry.
11 There was erosion as well along the seafront in Bray, there was at that collapsed wall at the
12 Dargle River adjacent to the People's Park. And a slippage near the Silver Bridge on the N11.
13 And you had garden floodings as well in Monastery Cottages in Enniskerry and Ballywaltrim
14 Lane and also in Kilmacanogue.

15
16 And in the Arklow Municipal District, the Veil Road had to be closed. The
17 Woodenbridge/Aughrim road had to be closed. And in more recent times, it was on the 6th of
18 January, the Rathdrum to Woodenbridge Road had to be closed and that road is still basically
19 partly closed anyway because works are ongoing. The Rathdrum to Glenealy road had to be
20 closed. Aughrim reservoir, the entrance was washed away on a couple of occasions. On the
21 30th, you had high tide in Arklow coupled with an east wind which caused flooding on the South
22 Quay, South Green and other areas of Arklow, as outlined in the report.

23
24 And you also had a flooding along the Dublin Road separately, and you had flooding as well
25 along the South beach near where Roadstone to the lifeboat station. Now that flooding was
26 ameliorated by the works that had been carried out just before Christmas, beach nourishment
27 scheme, along the South beach on - in Arklow.

28
29 Then in the Baltinglass Municipal District you had road flooding in Sally Gap, Burgage, and
30 flooding in Quarry Street in Shillelagh from the Derry River, and also in Baltinglass, the River
31 Slaney, the level on that was rising at a quick rate, and recent works there that were carried out
32 in recent years protected Baltinglass and the pump that had been installed worked and so on and
33 so forth.

1 In the Greystones Municipal District, you had flooding on the Sea Road in Redford Park and on
2 the 6th and 7th of January, there was also flooding in Holywell in Kilcoole. Just to say the Fire
3 Service which Aidan Dempsey will go through in a few moments, they're up to the 4th of
4 January, they had 14 flood calls in total, and including four calls in which they assisted in Co
5 Kildare. And the Civil Defence, Michael Richardson will go through issues that he responded to
6 himself.

7
8 Just to say, just to give an idea of the activity that was being carried out by Wicklow County
9 Council, the Fire Service, and the Civil Defence, as at the 31st of December: We had
10 approximately 5,000 sandbags had been either filled or distributed. And we had created just
11 about or just over 50 staff working on the flood relief works and there was also about eight
12 machines that had been on hire from private contractors and so on.

13
14 Now separately, works that are ongoing at present, now Declan Murnane has - is on the mobile
15 at the moment, so he is going to join us as soon as he can. Coast protection works on the
16 Murrough now, Declan will go into this in greater detail. The Council has been allocated
17 funding towards the cost of coast protection works at the Murrough and this work is scheduled to
18 commence at the end of this month, weather conditions permitting. This will have to be
19 designed now taking into account the works that were carried out by Iarnrod Éireann from the
20 1st of January.

21
22 Other works that were carried out, that are being carried out at the moment were cleaning up of
23 flooded areas, repairs, roads, drains and so on. There is a water main - now I know it's the
24 responsibility of Irish Water, but Wicklow County Council staff are involved in this, because if
25 this water main breaks, we will have an issue on the N11. So the water main at Silver Bridge
26 has been isolated, and in the event of a further issue on the N11 at that point, the water main - a
27 burst on the water main should not contribute to further damage. And that particular slippage on
28 the N11, there are - works are being developed at the moment by Transport Infrastructure
29 Ireland, which formerly was the NRA. Repairs are being carried out at the moment as well on
30 the Aughrim to Woodenbridge Road. Works on the South Quay in Arklow are ongoing today.
31 Works on Shillelagh, Quarry Street, to reduce flooding there, works will have to be carried out
32 there on the Derry river and we will have to talk to the OPW and so on in order to get that work
33 fast tracked.

1 And then in Greystones on the night of the 6th of January, there was flash floodings at Redford
2 park, St Crispin's Delgany Wood, Newcastle village and Charlesland and also junctions 12 and
3 13 on the N11. There were also houses flooded in Kilcoole that night on - in Holywell. A total
4 of eight houses were flooded. Updates are being prepared at the moment and whatever damage
5 is there to roads and bridges and an update will also have to be prepared on what work is needed
6 to reduce the slippage at the old landfill in Bray. And works are ongoing as well on the
7 Rathdrum/Woodenbridge Road.

8
9 Now all during this time, regular daily updates were sent out to the members of the Council, and
10 to the National Emergency Co-ordinating Committee in Agriculture House in Dublin. Cost for
11 the period, up to the 4th of January now, I don't have costs after that, submitted to the
12 Department were in the order of 450,000. And there are still costs to be identified. And there is
13 overtime and payroll costs still, are still not available.

14
15 That's the information. I would just like to hand you over now to Aidan who will give some
16 further detail on exactly what work the Fire Service carried out. And I would like to thank him
17 as well for all the work they did and the Civil Defence and others over the period. Thanks very
18 much.

19 MR DEMPSEY: The table on the screen at the moment just gives an overview of the spread of
20 incidents that occurred over the period. Each time a crews called out, a fire crews called out,
21 they would have dealt with more than one incident as they would have dealt with the primary
22 incident and any other incidents they encountered in the area.

23
24 So there was a spate of incidents on the 30th of December and a further spate on the night of the
25 6th/7th of January. And I'll give some details on some of the more major incidents.

26
27 Our first flooding was back in mid December where the 21 bends became waterlogged due to
28 issues around drainage and we responded in association with the local authority, and we assisted
29 in helping to clear the road and to make it passable again for Local Authority traffic. And at that
30 stage, Wicklow was not suffering the brunt of the storms that had been - that the rest of the
31 country were suffering in that period and up to Christmas.

32
33 Around New Year's, our first call was to the area around Kilmacanogue where a house was
34 suffering -- the garden of the house was suffering from flooding. We tried pumping, we tried

1 sandbags, but the inflow of water was greater than what we could deal with. But by the time we
2 left, the water wasn't rising, there was as much coming in as going out. And -- but we were back
3 a couple of days later at night when the lady of the house discovered that she felt that water
4 levels were rising from the flow. And again we assisted as best we could and kept any damage
5 to the property to a minimum.

6
7 In Redford Park, we were there on two occasions over the period. Again trying to divert water
8 away from properties using sandbags and also trying to clear any drains that we thought might
9 have been contributing, and where necessary pumping water around properties. And to the best
10 of my knowledge, while properties were threatened there, there was no damage to the inside of
11 properties in that area.

12
13 On the same night, the Charlesland, the road at Charlesland was blocked by a flash flood, which
14 again we secured the area, prevented traffic driving into it, warned -- used signs to warn
15 approaching traffic, and then in conjunction with the area office found where the problem was,
16 and got the road open again.

17
18 Similar, the flash flooding in Delgany heights on the same night, any small blockage or even
19 drains that were clear would - the flash flood would wash material into the drains and that would
20 cause what you can see on the screen there. And again we would do what we could. We would
21 try to prevent an accident occurring and then the Local Authority, the area office staff would
22 when they arrived would have the local knowledge to know where a blockage might be or what
23 other works could be done to alleviate.

24
25 On the 30th, there was flooding of the South Quays in Arklow. Fortunately again I believe the
26 level of the water didn't impinge on the inside of any properties, and with the distribution of
27 sandbags through the area office, it was possible to reduce the effects of the flooding and as far
28 as I know, there were no properties, internally damaged by the water at that time which has as
29 much -- is caused as much by water levels in the sea and tidal factors as it is by the heavy
30 rainfall.

31
32 On the night of the 6th/7th, the Main Street in Rathnew flooded. Again we responded, prevented
33 motorists driving into the area until such time as the local authority staff were able to reduce the
34 quantity of water present.

1
2 And the worst flooding then was in Holywell in Kilcoole on the morning of the 7th of January.
3 There is a stream which rises in Kilpedder flows through the estate and there is a bridge and a -
4 levies on either side. The water rose above the levies, above the bridge and proceeded to flood
5 what we calculated on the night to be eight properties. And the cars that were in the properties.
6 That's probably the most vivid photograph that we have of the effect of flooding inside. And it's
7 the quality of that water that is of particular concern. We have been in touch with the residents
8 since. We are providing them with the necessary paper work for their insurance and then they're
9 carrying out the works in line with the recommendations of the insurance surveyors.

10
11 And as well there was flooding at Ballintekin halting side. It didn't impinge on any of the
12 properties. Fortunately the lowest mobile homes were still above the level of the water. The
13 water - again there is a bridge into the halting site. Rubbish from the site got washed into the
14 drain, blocked against the bridge and the following morning then when we returned the work had
15 already commence today clear - commenced to clear that and to prevent a reoccurrence and to
16 return water levels to the level they'd been at before. The most serious and dangerous incident
17 from a road user point of view was on the Rathdrum to Avoca road where a section of the road
18 slipped down into the valley of the river. There is a drain or a river running down from right to
19 left as you look at that photograph which goes through a deep culvert. And it would appear that
20 part of that culvert collapsed, taking out the section of the road up to the road surface itself.
21 Again immediate the road was closed. The Local Authority took over in terms of increasing the
22 barriers, and again by the following day, they were already - there were already contractors and
23 Local Authority staff on site who were repairing major water leaks to the blue water main visible
24 in the photograph. And initiating the process of getting the road back open again, which I
25 believe has not as yet taken place due to the difficulty and the depth of the erosion that is evident
26 there.

27
28 And then we have been numerous occasions to a single property close to Dunlavin in Co Kildare
29 where Co Kildare have asked us to respond whenever there is a problem reported. So the
30 number of responses is roughly four to six as of today. And it's just to try and keep the water
31 level below the level of the floor for this elderly widowed lady who lives at Colbinstown in Co
32 Kildare.

33 CATHAOIRLEACH: Michael? Mark Devereux next, okay, sorry.

34 MR DEVEREAUX: Councillors thank you, and Cathaoirleach. I don't have lovely pictures and

1 I haven't had the misfortune to be out in all that whether weather. I wanted to explain to you all
2 how the recent events, how they fit in with the CFRAM process. I have forwarded some of the
3 photographs and details of the flooding in Greystones and Kilcoole to the OPW. They're
4 currently in the process of taking all the data that they get on flooding events nationally, all over
5 the country and feeding that into the studies that they've done as part of the CFRAMs. The stage
6 the CFRAM is at, they're at a public consultation stage, statutory, with the mapping. And that is
7 that they've modelled and as far as the OPW are aware, they've now got a handle on what areas
8 will flood and the likelihood of flooding. That's all being drafted and is on maps on their
9 website, www.CFRAM.ie. If you follow the links to the various areas and the various different
10 CFRAMs around the country you can see the mapping. I understand the flooding in Kilcoole is
11 there or thereabouts in line with what they predicted would happen in that general area.

12
13 Now there is detail to be assessed at this stage. That is that the OPW themselves will go and
14 visit the site or their consultants will visit the site in Kilcoole. Bear in mind they're getting
15 thousands of similar pieces of information from all over the country arising out of the flooding
16 events in the last couple of weeks. So I haven't - to be honest I haven't had a response from them
17 yet, but I have sent on the details to them. The first thing they'll do is any information they get
18 either from ourselves, from the records that we have, from the fire services, or from our outdoor
19 staff, and they'll feed that into the process and just see whether there is something new they've
20 learned from that to adjust the mapping that they've got. But it also happens that the second
21 stage of the CFRAM process which is to take the information on areas that are likely to flood or
22 prone to flooding, and look at solutions and look at whether there are simple and straightforward
23 solutions to some of the problems. That's -- the OPW refer to that as optioneering. Some of the
24 information they get from me or my colleagues will help them with that. In fact there is a
25 meeting this coming Friday which I have been timetabled since before Christmas to go and
26 attend with the OPW staff who are working on the CFRAMs in County Wicklow or in Wicklow
27 area. And they were going to show me at that meeting where they, where the CFRAM study is
28 suggesting that areas will flood, what possible solutions they might put in place. Now bear in
29 mind it's a National Study and process, so while they might show me potential solutions to some
30 of the problems, all that data will be assessed and collated by the OPW and fed into a national
31 programme of flood risk assessment and management. The management being the last part of
32 the CFRAMs acronym. It just happens a lot of the information that my colleagues have
33 collected over the last couple of weeks and have had to deal with will be fed into the OPW and
34 I'll be working with them. If they come up with solutions, I'll bring those solutions possibly to

1 the district engineers, if they look like they're significant enough solutions.

2
3 In relation to Arklow, the Arklow flood alleviation scheme is in the process. We are finalising
4 the options for that and are hoping to have progress on that in the coming months.

5
6 And as I think it was -- Aidan was saying that the tidal factors are a factor there, and that's
7 known at this stage. And part of our solutions that we are looking at is solutions to flooding on
8 South Green and of course River Walk and other areas that were under threat last week.

9
10 So I don't have any formal presentation for you, but just to say that all the information that's been
11 collated by my colleagues dealing with the issue will be fed into the OPW as part of the
12 CFRAM. It was programmed to be fed into them anyway, but there was a series of events that
13 will be fed into the OPW. Any solutions will be fed into a national programme so fingers
14 crossed we will get some funding following that national programme and some of the solutions
15 discussed over the next couple of weeks will form part of the solutions that we will be part of the
16 implementation of. It's thought that the OPW will want partners, hopefully they'll consider us
17 for other future schemes.

18 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thanks Mark. Michael.

19 MR RICHARDSON: Good afternoon everyone. As a result of the weather warnings that we
20 were getting from email through the Council, I put the Civil Defence members on standby on
21 Tuesday 29th at 11am in the morning. The response is as a result of a text messaging alert
22 system that we have, and I had 30 members available to respond. Later that evening at about
23 2100 hours, I had a call from the Chief Executive suggesting that I make contact with the area
24 engineer. There was flooding in the Sea Road area of Newcastle, to which we responded. We
25 had 18 members turned up at our training centre in Greystones, and we responded with some
26 jeeps and some sandbags that we got from the area depot in Greystones and sandbagged some
27 properties on the Sea Road. During the night I was getting emails in from different sources
28 within the Council, and which then - we then moved to Wentworth Place and Bridge Street area
29 probably at 2.30 on the morning of the 30th. We deployed sandbags in the area of Wentworth
30 Place to a particular few properties that were showing a threat of maybe they could get breached
31 by flood waters. And also from previous experience at the Bridge House and the Bridge
32 Bookshop.

33
34 Later that morning of the morning of Wednesday 30th, having met here in County Buildings to

1 discuss the situation with some of my colleagues, we visited the area of South Green in Arklow
2 and having discussed the flooding in South Green, with the area engineer and looked at the tide
3 which was at full tide between 12 and 12.30, it was considered that we bring some of the Civil
4 Defence members down and some of the pumps to try and alleviate the flooding as the water
5 level in the river was subsiding because of tidal at this stage. As the crews responded from
6 Greystones and arrived on site, the water had receded and as Aidan mentioned and showed in his
7 photographs, there was no threat of the water actually entering the houses because it got to a
8 particular level, and the flood - sorry the tidal level in the river wasn't rising anymore, so the
9 water subsided very quickly.

10
11 However, the members contacted me, and the officers in charge of the units at the time back to
12 Greystones and I suggested that they, rather than coming back to Greystones, that they drive
13 around the area and investigate any other flooding that might be threatening buildings. And they
14 got to the area of the lifeboat station where there is a Gains petrol factory I believe. So they
15 brought in pumps to that area and pumped for about two and a half hours and alleviated the
16 threat to that factory and other properties of that area.

17
18 There was no activity on - sorry, moving on then to New Year's eve, we were filling sandbags.
19 The crews came in, because they were all on Christmas leave, etcetera, etcetera, and had got
20 used to turning out so much from the previous Tuesday that they turned in on New Year's eve
21 and filled sandbags at different locations around the county; brought sandbags to our training
22 centre in Greystones and had them ready to be deployed.

23
24 On Friday 1st, there was no activity at all as the flooding had subsided from the Wednesday and
25 Thursday.

26
27 Moving on, on the weekend of the 2nd, we brought the crews in on the Saturday and there was
28 flooding on the main road between the Kilcoole road, just outside Kilcoole village to which we
29 sandbagged. At that stage the Council here, County Buildings was open and the reception was
30 manned from 9 o'clock in the morning and we were linking in with the switch board throughout
31 the day and report came of possible flooding to cottages at Jubilee Road in Aughrim. Crews
32 deployed to there in some jeeps and again got sandbags from the local depot from one of our
33 area supervisors and we in consultation with the residents, they didn't want the sandbags
34 deployed, but what we did do is one resident gave us access to a garage or property, and we put

1 quite an amount of sandbags into his shed and made all the residents along that row of cottages
2 aware that there was sandbags available in this gentleman's property, so they seemed satisfied in
3 the area that sandbags were readily available should the need arise.

4
5 On Sunday 3rd, there was a risk of Ashtown reservoir out near the Rugby club here in Wicklow
6 Town, and in conjunction with one of our engineers here in the Council, we looked at the site
7 there, and it was considered that some pumps would be put in place on Monday 4th.

8
9 Monday 4th, we had some calls from members of the public for isolated sandbagging in the area
10 of Kilmacanogue, on the Old Long Hill, and also a property in Bray in Albert Avenue. Sorry I
11 am jumping away. That was back on 31st. There was an old lady whose adjoining commercial
12 premises, an excessive amount of rain was coming off these properties and they were closed for
13 Christmas holidays, and she was very concerned that it was flooding the back of her house to
14 which we responded to and sandbagged those properties.

15
16 Moving on to the Wednesday the 6th, probably around midnight, we were called to assist with
17 sandbagging, and at that stage 15 members turned up to our training centre in Greystones. We
18 send them out to the area of Holywell which has been spoken about by Aidan and assisted the
19 Fire Service in sandbagging all the properties out of the water level. At that stage the Fire
20 Service were pumping and the water was receding. We further got a call during the night,
21 probably about 3 o'clock in the morning, to assist in pumping with Wicklow Fire Service just
22 outside north of Newcastle village, a large residential property on the right had side had quite a
23 lot of water in it.

24
25 After that, we replenished our sandbags all day Thursday, so the guys came in probably around
26 7.30 in the morning from the property in Newcastle and we were recalled back there about 9.30
27 to assist Greystones Fire Service and we pumped that property until probably about 2.30 in the
28 afternoon so quite a lot of pumping went on there to no effect that the water was refilling from
29 surrounding farm properties.

30
31 So at this stage, our members are still on stand by, probably at most I had 18 deployed and
32 probably 20 more available to turn in. And we have replenished all our stock of sandbags and
33 have them in storage at our building in Mill Road in Greystones. That's it.

34 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay Michael, thank you very much. So I suppose members just on your

1 behalf I would like to formally thank the staff here at the Council. The Fire Service, Michael's
2 crews there in the Civil Defence and the flood volunteers in Bray, who I think did a fantastic job
3 over the period. I remember we were up in Laragh with Civil Defence giving out the awards just
4 before Christmas and we were hoping for a quiet Christmas. That didn't altogether come our
5 way. But I think I spent most days with the Chief Executive about three times a day talking
6 about what was happening, and also thanks to Aidan and his crew for taking me around a
7 number of places including Holywell in Kilcoole.

8
9 I mean it's just when you go into houses as I know other members were there too, and you just
10 see what devastation the water causes and the flooding causes to people's lives, it's just heart
11 breaking. So I think a number of issues have been highlight and thanks to everybody for your
12 presentations, just to let us know the issues that we face. I think there is a lot of strategic issues
13 that we need to deal with as a Council. Thank heavens we had the text alert system in place.
14 There is over 1,000 people who have signed up to that so it gives us an easy way to
15 communicate with people in particular areas. And it's good to know that we have made the
16 submission to the Government to get funds, 450,000 to me in my head seems a little bit light but
17 I know that was only up to a point, so I am sure there will be more requisitions put in for more
18 money. And on top of that obviously, yesterday we had snow in the Wicklow Gap and the likes.
19 I think the weather issues are going to be things that are going to be affecting us for a long
20 period of time, so I think we are going to have learn the lessons so that we can actually become
21 even better at responding to these things. Because obviously Wicklow compared to other parts
22 of the country didn't suffer quite as badly, but I think we really have to have a system that's in
23 place that can really deliver to the people of the county.

24
25 So I'll open it up to members, Cllr Fortune. You want to come in first.

26 Cllr FORTUNE: Thanks Cathaoirleach. First of all can I think the two Michaels and Aidan and
27 Mark for their overview and presentation and also to thank the Council for the information alerts
28 that they've sent us over the last month and a half basically of what's been going on.

29
30 Also on behalf of the Holywell residents, I would like to sincerely thank the Fire Service and the
31 Civil Defence for their prompt action on the Thursday morning in Holywell. I became aware of
32 the problem later on in the morning and attended - before I attended it, because there is a river,
33 just to give you a quick background of it, I am not convinced that the problem in Holywell was
34 basically the cause of the weather, obviously the water contributed, but I think there is a reason

1 for it other than that. There is a river that as Aidan said rises in Kilpedder and comes down
2 through Kilcoole. It flows through a number of housing estates, Hazelwood, Riverside,
3 Beechdale and down at the Holywell and then on down towards the sea.

4
5 I looked at all those estates that morning, and while the river was flowing fast, there was no
6 problem in any of them other than Holywell and when you come into Holywell, it's fine until it
7 gets to the crescent where you have a bridge and there is a culvert. And the problem is that the -
8 as the river flowed, it wasn't able to basically go under the bridge as I could see it, so
9 consequently it had to go somewhere. During the construction in the particular housing estate,
10 it's my understanding that the river, parts of it was redirected and the bridge was built new. It's -
11 I am not an engineer, but it's possible when the water then had to find a home, it found its
12 original home and the end result that was eight houses got badly flooded, about three or four
13 worse than others. As you said Cathaoirleach, it wasn't a pretty sight. There was a lot of
14 annoyance, a lot of devastation. I attended there on Thursday morning as did Cllr Brady was
15 there that morning as well and I know subsequently other Councillors were there afterwards. I
16 met the residents again on the Thursday night with Minister Harris, to review the situation again.
17 I was there again on the Friday morning where the contractor turned up to do a temporary job
18 and I would say at this stage in case I forget to say it that the work he done is great but it is
19 temporary. An issue arose because there was one particular resident, a couple of residents were
20 very distraught with what had happened. Weren't happy with what they saw happening. In one
21 case, one of the residents had their car destroyed and she just confirmed to me before I came into
22 the meeting that her car has been written off, a car worth 18,000 euro. So there was a lot of
23 annoyance and I think it got a little bit difficult. So the guards ended up being called. So I went
24 up and spoke to all concerned and we got it resolved and the work was done, the contractor was
25 there all day Friday up until lunchtime on Saturday and they seemed to scope out the river and I
26 checked it again on Saturday and again yesterday and everything seemed to be okay.

27
28 What I would say is that - it's my belief and if I am proved wrong that's fine, but it's my belief
29 that the problem in Holywell was not got to do with storm Frank or storm whoever. It was got to
30 do with, I think, I believe, with the way the work was done in the estate. Now I think also the
31 houses where they're located on top of the river, ideally they probably need to be a metre and a
32 half higher than they are. So that needs to be looked at and investigated why they would be
33 allowed to be built the way they were. And again the CFRAM situation is good and great and
34 obviously there is a lot of work being done, I just don't think that the problem in Kilcoole is in

1 that category. So what - just to put it in context, I believe what's happened is that the way the
2 work has been done in the area, when you get the bit of heavy rain in the river, the river at that
3 location is not capable of flowing the way it should flow and as a result on Thursday morning,
4 the water took off and we have what we have. Now there is serious issues arising out of that I
5 think as well. One is, obviously people's insurance. I think it is unfair to put it lightly, and
6 totally wrong that people will have to deal with that in a situation where, as I said already, I said
7 it twice already, I don't believe the problem should have happened at all for the reasons I have
8 said.

9
10 I think it's very, very important going forward and I would propose that the Council from here on
11 in do not build any houses or do not permit any houses to be build on top of a river or beside a
12 river or on a flood plain. And I do think that the Holywell situation does need to be properly and
13 fully investigated, because I do know that the residents and there is a very, very good residents
14 committee there, have over a long time submitted loads and loads of correspondence about this
15 particular issue and other issues, but - and the issue we are talking about, so what they've asked
16 for and what we have asked and obviously I'll get a response, I did put it in writing, that there
17 needs to be an urgent meeting held that would involve the residents, would involve the County
18 Council, would involve the developer, and ourselves, because it does have to be resolved.
19 Because it would appear we are going to get loads of rain with the way things are happening,
20 even though we are going to come into the spring or summer, we could still get loads of rain. So
21 rather than the rain having gone maybe temporarily and we all hoping the thing is gone away, I
22 think we need to now continue and act on this and get it will sorted.

23
24 It's very, very important, I know I am making a point that some elements of the groupings
25 mightn't agree. What I am saying is that the situation in Holywell should not have happened. I
26 think it happened for other reasons other than the weather even though there was loads of rain. I
27 am repeating it because I think it needs to be emphasised. There is a lot of annoyance in that
28 area, and the question does have to be answered and does have to be dealt with, why you would
29 build houses on top of a river. And I would like the proposal that I put forward as a resolution to
30 be adopted, because I think it's very, very important going forward. But really as I said the
31 services were great, I know the engineer was there at three or four o'clock in the morning as well
32 and he is on the ball, he is excellent. But we do need to look at how we are doing all this. We
33 do need to take into account - bear in mind that the residents in this particular estate, a lot of
34 them have bought those houses at the top of the market. The market has burst as we all know

1 and now they're faced on top of that with their houses being flooded where they can't get
2 insurance. There is a whole moral issue here as well and I want this thing addressed sooner
3 rather than later. The meeting we asked, we asked to have it today, I know that was a bit
4 unreasonable, but the point I am making is that meeting needs to happen now, not in three
5 months or six months' time.

6 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Snell.

7 Cllr SNELL: Thanks Cathaoirleach, yeah, I would like to start off on a positive and actually
8 commend everybody involved in - who were involved in the emergency response, and bearing in
9 mind that it come at the most difficult time for everybody over the holiday period, the response
10 was excellent. And on my years in here in the Council, I have never seen a response as well
11 co-ordinated by all the groupings. I thought the text messages and the emails was keeping
12 members of the public updated as well as public representatives. Mark spoke in regards to
13 CFRAM and the flood risk that's under process within the county. And I think local knowledge
14 is the key to all of this. And unfortunately it seems to be the same areas keep flooding year on
15 year out. And I suppose we have a role in regards the Municipal District, like some of the items
16 that I would like to discuss probably would be more appropriately discussed at a Municipal
17 District level such as a couple of housing estates, one in particular Rosehill upper, and
18 emergency response was put in place there, and the residents are thankful. But again like the
19 previous speaker, there is no house insurance available to the people living on that road there due
20 to previous floods and previous years. And then we had business premises, a lot of business
21 premises was in touch with me over the Christmas period looking for sandbags, and again I
22 would like to thank the outdoor staff of Wicklow County Council. Not just in me own
23 Municipal District of Wicklow, but throughout the whole county. As most Councillors know
24 you get phone calls, when people are desperate they ring whatever number they can get up in
25 front of them and I had phone calls from various other areas as well and the response was good.
26 But just like the gentleman who spoke from the Civil Defence and outlined in regards to having
27 a central location in that case, it was somebody's home for sandbags, I think it's something that
28 we should pursue. Because I do know that a lot of people that I was in contact with, I was able
29 to get sandbags myself for them through the Council. Some were prepared to go and fill
30 sandbags and I know they don't last long, so it's not something you can fill and they'll be there
31 for next year, they do unfortunately, they don't stick the test of time, they do disintegrate, the
32 bags themselves once they're filled.

33
34 But I would like to point out in regards to areas where - like on the Ashford road from Ashford

1 to Rathnew to get you to the N11, we have two spots there that flooding happens, it doesn't have
2 to be extreme weather conditions, we have Rose Anna which was most people would describe it
3 as the bad bends there, very serious black spot down through the years. And we now have a
4 situation where cars are having to come out on to the opposite side of the road to bypass these
5 two areas which are within one kilometre of each other. And I know it's on the agenda later on,
6 there was a serious accident just down from one of these areas I am describing now. So it's
7 something that I'll pursue with the area engineer and his staff.

8
9 Also in Miltown North, we have a family there which consistently since the Apple Green was
10 built, consistently that family home is under threat and has been flooded on two or three
11 occasions and they're really at their wits end at this stage. And as I say, through all the good
12 work that the Fire Brigade, the Civil Defence, the senior management of Wicklow County
13 Council, and more importantly our outdoor staff, I know they can't protect every property and
14 they can't protect every roadway and for pedestrians and motorists alike. But it is frustrating
15 when it is areas that as I say year in year out, and they're the ones that I would like to see in this
16 flood risk assessment through the county, they're the ones I want to see actually listed and
17 named. We need to be working on them areas now, rather than waiting until the next storm.

18
19 But if I could just thank whoever made the decision to open the office lines over the course of
20 the holidays here. And whether it was the acting Chief Executive or his directors, it was an
21 excellent decision, and it was something that gave a lot of reassurances to the citizens of County
22 Wicklow. So as I say a lot of my issues will be at local Municipal District and I'll talk to
23 engineers, but I just want to finally thank everyone for their input and I look forward to the
24 discussion on the Murrough when the engineer comes to it and I hope to have a chat on that.

25 Thanks Cathaoirleach.

26 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Brady.

27 Cllr BRADY: Thanks Cathaoirleach. Like the other speakers, first of all I want to thank all the
28 staff from all the agencies from the Council, both indoor and outdoor staff who done Trojan
29 work over the last number of weeks and the Fire Service, the fire fighters who, as the Chief Fire
30 Officer outlined there, carried out Trojan work. Not just here in Wicklow, but also in our
31 neighbouring county as well. The Civil Defence, to thank Michael and all the volunteers and to
32 stress that word "volunteers", these people go out and give up their time freely to help their
33 fellow citizens here within the county. So I think the work they do, you know, is so
34 commendable, it's unbelievable. I think they really are the unsung heroes here, the fact that they

1 are volunteers. So to thank everyone that have played their part and I know the preparation in
2 advance of the storm is going out cleaning gulleys and the likes, it's unbelievable. And to hear
3 the figures there in excess of 5,000 sandbags being filled in preparation and distributed.
4

5 It has to be said thankfully we didn't come anywhere near some of the other counties throughout
6 the State, particularly along the Shannon estuary, who unfortunately have been devastated. So I
7 am not going to say we got off lightly, certainly we didn't because that's of no consolation to the
8 residents in Holywell or anywhere else within the county that did actually flood. I think you are
9 leaving the issue of the Murrough, we are going to come back to that separately.

10
11 So just a couple of areas there, Cllr Fortune I think outlined in great detail the issue there in
12 Holywell. And certainly I was down there and spent a considerable period of time there talking
13 to the residents and listening to their ongoing concerns with the developer, with the Council.
14 Not just in the preceding months but the preceding years with the developer there, highlighting
15 the serious issues. They had a close call about 18 months ago I think it was where thankfully no
16 houses were flooded at that stage. But it certainly was a warning shot to the residents and
17 everyone else concerned. I am not going to quote Michael - or Mark Devereaux when he was
18 talking about the CFRAMs, but I think he used the word predicted or something like that when
19 he was talking about Holywell, that it was an area that something like this was predicted. If that
20 is the case, it does raise the question as to if it was predicted, why did we have to wait until the
21 event actually happened to have sandbags, etcetera, in place? And the fact that it had - the water
22 had broke its banks 18 months previous. And the engineers both here and within the County
23 Council, officers here in Wicklow and in the Municipal District are very, very aware of the
24 issues there now. I am not sure as to whether it's a planning enforcement issue or not, but as a
25 lay person looking at the situation on the ground there during the flooding and its aftermath, to
26 me the obvious issue is the construction of the bridge. I am not sure as to whether that bridge
27 was constructed fully in accordance with the planning permission that was given or whether
28 there are planning enforcement issues there. Either way, it is a serious, serious problem. It acts
29 as a damn. It stops the water getting down into the sea as quickly as possible. And the concern
30 there is that there is not just one bridge, there is two bridges there. There is one within the estate
31 itself. And there is one under, effectively under the roundabout as well. So if the talk is about
32 addressing the issues at that particular bridge, I don't think that will suffice. The two bridges
33 there need to be looked at because they're both of similar construction and both acting as a dam.
34 If you clear the first blockage, it's just going to move it down less than 50 yards to the second

1 bridge. So that needs to be looked at.

2
3 I think we are not obviously going to solve all the problems here, I think there has to be ongoing
4 reports on this. Because speaking to the residents there, all residents, irrespective as to whether
5 there was six inches in the first house, or one of the last houses that was flooded, there was
6 maybe one or two inches in it, they were all flooded, they were all badly, badly affected. But
7 one resident in particular who has no house insurance, and can I ask the officials as to what
8 mechanisms are there, is there any national grants that that individual and I am sure there is other
9 individuals throughout the county in similar situations, whether it was because the insurance
10 company wouldn't insure them because they were in a flood risk area or what; is there provision
11 there to help out residents such as that, that flooded and unfortunately have no house insurance?
12 So just on the Holywell, can we find out if this was an area that was predict today flood? If so
13 why were no precautions taken? And when exactly - I know the CFRAM goes back to 2011,
14 and this estate, you know I am not sure exactly when it was constructed, maybe 2008, 2009 I
15 think it was, how it was allowed be constructed in an area like that if it was predicted to be a
16 flood risk area.

17
18 Just a couple of other issues there, just in relation to Bray, and Dargle view, which thankfully no
19 houses did flood in that particular area, but it came very, very close, and again this is an area
20 that's flooded a number of times previously and considerable damage carried out a number of
21 years ago. And residents there have been critical for a number of years, because this is a river
22 that flows into the Dargle, and the residents live over - as the name suggests Dargle view, they
23 look at the ongoing works in the River Dargle, the flood protection works, which are brilliant,
24 but their homes haven't been protected.

25
26 Now I know a lot of pressure has come on from myself, from some of the officials on to the
27 OPW, and I believe that consultants have, or are in the process of being appointed to put in place
28 a proper flood protection scheme there for those houses. So maybe if we could get an update on
29 that, to see exactly where it is, and look I am not sure what the ultimate solution is, but there is
30 concern there that when the golf club, Dun Laoghaire golf club moved up on to Old Conna
31 Avenue, that's when these problems in that area first arose. They weren't there forever and a
32 day. It was since that golf club was constructed and the residents there have showed me white
33 sand that is being washed down off the golf course and being deposited in their gardens on the
34 river banks during and after floods. So it is a cause of concern. Again we are not going to solve

1 it all but if we could get some answers around the appointment of consultants and that.

2
3 The other issue there --

4 CATHAOIRLEACH: Just there is a large amount of people waiting.

5 Cllr BRADY: Just quickly, the old municipal dump in Bray, again I raised it at the Municipal
6 District meeting there last week, and I know Michael Geaney has been looking at that over the
7 last number of years so again can we get a more extensive report on that because it's of huge
8 environmental concern to have up to 200,000 tonnes of domestic refuse being washed into the
9 Irish Sea there in that location. It's not sustainable. We need a long-term solution and just the
10 final point just on the Dargle River flood protection scheme, I know there was a slight accident
11 there late last week when one of the workmen, the digger in which he was driving went into the
12 river and thankfully, thankfully that contractor, the worker there managed to get out of there
13 safely. So again it just highlights the dangers that people, ordinary workers out there working to
14 protect us, they're actually putting their own lives at risk and that's a point that none of us should
15 forget, whether it's contractors, fire fighters, members of the Civil Defence or our own staff here
16 in the Council.

17 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thanks John. Cllr Mitchell.

18 Cllr MITCHELL: Thank you. I'll just be brief. Certainly I express my concern about the
19 Holywell situation. These houses are very new, as has been said by other Councillors. And it
20 strikes me as completely somehow something has gone wrong with the system that we have new
21 houses which have been constructed, whether it's the planning approval, the design of them or
22 the implementation of dealing with the river, I don't know what's wrong. But certainly we need
23 to find out so we don't - first of all to ensure that we don't allow houses to be built in a similar
24 situation again and secondly we need to see how we can - more urgently, we need to see how we
25 can help the people in these houses, so that this river doesn't flood again. But it shouldn't have
26 happened to houses which have gone through the full planning system, and full control system.

27
28 Secondly just to say about the flooding that certainly I appreciate the work which has been done
29 by the various staff and the information which came to Councillors was very thorough, and was
30 a help in terms of knowing what's happening. Thank you.

31 CATHAOIRLEACH: Great thank you. Cllr Fitzgerald.

32 Cllr FITZGERALD: Just living in Arklow, I would call myself a veteran of floods...

33 CATHAOIRLEACH: Could you just hit your microphone then.

34 Cllr FITZGERALD: I thought you were putting me out there. No, just in every sense of the

1 word, I have been a veteran, we have seen so many floods over the years. But I have to say that
2 I have never seen as good a response as I seen over the last two weeks. I have to interrupt this
3 for a second to take a call here, I have to go on the radio, so I'll continue in a minute!

4 CATHAOIRLEACH: At least we know where our priorities are! We will just wait for you Pat!

5 Cllr BRADY: He could have done the interview from the Chamber here and it could have been
6 a first!

7 Cllr Tommy CULLEN: Sorry, Chairman, Chairman, first and foremost, I was coming down
8 here today to this meeting and I have heard the Government announce that they're going to bring
9 in this insurance house home insurance levy for flooding on householders. And that it's going to
10 be a heavy levy on householders. Well if you put that on top of property tax and water charges,
11 will anyone be living in any houses, can they afford to be living in houses? That's an utter
12 disgrace and I hope this Council joins with me in letting the Government know that we strongly
13 oppose the introduction of a flood levy on people's home insurance. I think it's an outrageous
14 decision.

15
16 I would also pay tribute to the Council staff for the work they did in trying to help people with
17 the flooding and in fairness, the Council staff have always been very good. I speak for my own
18 area. They arrived down, monitored the situation in areas and thankfully the waters were high,
19 but they didn't break their banks. But then you have to take into account that whereas we got
20 about 25 millimetres of water here in Wicklow and most of Wicklow, maybe a bit heavier in
21 different places, other parts of Ireland in the South and East got 90 millimetres of water. So we
22 got about a quarter of the water that fell in this district. But I am told that if we had got another
23 ten millimetres of water as much as 1,000 houses could have flooded in the north-east of
24 Wicklow. And that's a staggering figure.

25
26 I note that the CFRAM report has been done, but I took to read it and particularly in the
27 Greystones area, it makes astonishing reading, and you know, it would indicate that there is, that
28 there is - an area of Greystones actually defies gravity and they've now put Newton's theory of
29 gravity, they've set aside and appears to be according to CFRAM, these draft reports, some kind
30 of a geological anomaly in the Greystones area, whereas that water appears to run up hill. Now
31 whether it's an error, I presume it is an error, but I have looked at a number of reports, and I
32 think anybody who studies the CFRAM report and matches it to other reports would have to
33 come to that conclusion; that water, it's a scientific break through and the report was issued by
34 Minister Harris, and I have been in touch with him about this, and I am sure if this report is true,

1 Greystones will be inundated with scientists from all over the world to see how water runs up
2 hill...

3 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Cullen, continue with the point.

4 Cllr Tommy CULLEN: Chairman, you didn't interrupt anyone else, Chairman, Chairman I am
5 talking, Chairman, you may not like to hear what I am saying, but I would respect you give me
6 the opportunity without interruption of saying it.

7 CATHAOIRLEACH: I don't have a problem but just stick to the point.

8 Cllr Tommy CULLEN: You didn't interrupt anybody else. Now Chairman it might be a bit
9 politically embarrassment for you, but that doesn't mean to say that what I am saying - now
10 Chairman, unlike others, I have seen all the documents. I have all the reports. And I have seen
11 the CFRAM report. And it does suggest that in Greystones water runs up hill. Now if that is an
12 error, then it's a very serious error. Because it puts people's homes and lives at risk. In my
13 lifetime Chairman, I have seen two children drown on a flood plain where Local Authority
14 houses have been built. I have seen three children rescued from the same flood plains. Because
15 children are attracted to water. And some of these flood plains can be up to three to five metres
16 high. Some of them are as high as this roof. And so therefore it's not something of a joke Ryan,
17 when a body, consultants which are commissioned by the Council come back and suggest in a
18 report something that is such extraordinary that it defies the laws of gravity. That's exactly
19 what's in the CFRAM. I have to ask if they've made an error in this draft report, what other areas
20 have they also made errors in? I think that's a very serious situation. I think the Council staff
21 involved should go back to these people and ask them just exactly what they're talking about and
22 I think Minister Harris should make a statement because if 1,000 houses are going to flood in
23 Greystones if we get ten millimetres more of water, then it's not unreasonable that we look for
24 this report that is supposed to identify this.

25
26 Now I could go into an awful lot more detail, but I am holding that back for another day. But I
27 just think we are - this is a very serious situation.

28
29 But Chairman, I believe that - and I fully support Cllr Fortune, we should not be building houses
30 of any description or construction on flood plains because all that does is diverts the flooding to
31 another area of the town and if you build on one acre of a flood plain, the statistics are you flood
32 four acres more of other residential land. So if you build on one acre of a flood plain, that puts at
33 minimum of four acres of other residential houses under threat. So that's the statistics.

34

1 Chairman, I think we should take flooding extraordinary serious, because with global warming
2 and what have you, it's only starting and it's not going to go away. But I reiterate my strong
3 opposition to the Government's proposal to put in a flood levy on people's household insurance,
4 and I want to condemn it utterly and I'll ask other Councillors here to join me in support of that.
5 People are paying enough bills now without having this flood levy that we heard on the radio
6 here on RTE today brought out by your party Chairman.

7 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Blake.

8 Cllr BLAKE: Thanks Chairman and first of all thank the staff for the presentation here today.
9 Thank the outdoors staff for the wonderful work they did as well and it probably brings home to
10 us the unfortunate reduction we have had in staff over the last few years as well, the outdoor
11 staff in particular. So I think it's something we need to have a look at it terms of how stretched
12 the outdoor staff were over the last number of weeks and that we actually should have a position
13 where we do probably need to start recruiting outdoor staff in this Local Authority. Yes there
14 was a lot of flooding but there was also some success. Probably the Baltinglass area was one
15 area that a number of years ago was flooded to quite an extent. The River Slaney came down the
16 Main Street of Baltinglass on occasions in the past but the workload done over the last few years
17 has been a great success in the area and there was certainly no serious flooding on this occasion.

18
19 Equally so in 2009, we had a level of flooding in the Ballinglen area. While there wasn't a huge
20 number of houses damaged, nevertheless even one house being damaged is a serious issue, and
21 work carried out there by Jack Kelly with local knowledge as well proved a success on this
22 occasion.

23
24 My main concern is the fact that in Shillelagh on this occasion, there was substantial flooding in
25 Shillelagh. And my main concern is the fact that in the CFRAM proposal, there is no mention of
26 Shillelagh and I brought it up here at the last meeting when they gave a presentation here that
27 they didn't include Shillelagh in their proposal on that occasion. Even in Baltinglass, with the
28 project team, they didn't see fit to include Shillelagh in the actual proposals to have work carried
29 out there. I welcome the fact that Michael Geaney himself has acknowledged that here today
30 and that he has proposed that we do engage with the parks and wildlife and the Office of Public
31 Works towards endeavouring to alleviate the problem of flooding in quarry street in the
32 Shillelagh area in that regard. There has been good work done, but obviously there is always
33 more to be done and I think we need to work with the staff and work with the particular agencies
34 to ensure that where there is flooding and I am just looking at my own area in that regard, in

1 Shillelagh, that we do carry out the necessary works to alleviate flooding there in the future.

2 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Gerry Walsh.

3 Cllr WALSH: I had occasion to visit the West of Ireland during Christmas and saw first hand
4 the utter devastation caused there by the flooding. I was in Holywell on Thursday afternoon and
5 again over the weekend and spoke to the occupants of the houses affected there. Can I just say
6 it's a hugely stressful event for persons there whose homes are damaged, destroyed and their
7 sense of security suffers with the loss of personal possessions. And you have psychological
8 effects that can be devastating. The stress involved here can take its toll on a person's physical
9 and mental health so the with the effects extending long after the flood waters have subsided.
10 They suffer anxiety with rainfall warnings that will lead to anxiety with the thoughts of return of
11 the floods. The clean-up operation can be exhausting, homes uninhabitable for many people this
12 is not the first time. Really we have no longer these are 100 year events. They're going to be
13 more common. We have insurance issues going forward which needs to be addressed. Victims
14 in this case need practical and concrete help as well as professional and psychological and
15 emotional support. So they're not feeling forgotten and isolated and left to cope alone. With our
16 changing climate, it's a problem we all need to work together to manage. Cathaoirleach there is
17 a time to learn from our mistakes in the past, not engage in blame games and come up with
18 solutions, engage with the CFRAM process and can I say only for the intervention of the
19 supports on the night of 6th January, the fire services, the Civil Defence, the Local Authority, the
20 local engineer was out in areas of Delgany, Redford and Charlesland, the situation would have
21 been far, far worse and I just want to acknowledge that.

22 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Casey.

23 Cllr CASEY: I'll be fairly brief. I just want to also put on record my thanks for the presentation
24 today but equally to the Fire Service, the Civil Defence and indeed our own outdoor staff. I just
25 want to maybe raise one or two issues. This is becoming more a frequent occurrence of this
26 flooding and it has been identified around the county that some of our drainage network is not up
27 to taking this level of water. And I am just wondering is there any way we can sit down and
28 actually look and see can we improve the surface water network in some form, to deal with the
29 types of flooding that we are having at the moment. And I think it is disappointing in relation to
30 the community of Annamoe who were promised drainage works last year, that it didn't happen
31 because the money was diverted elsewhere. That road is lethal now because the water is running
32 continuously across the road on a very steep incline into a 90 degree bend that's frozen
33 permanently now because the water is running on it.

1 Thankfully we are getting the roads done, but the problem is we are building the roads' height up
2 all the time which is leading the driveways of houses exposed to flooding because the water is
3 running off the road and down into people's houses. But I want to pay my thanks to all the staff
4 over the Christmas period for the work they've done.

5 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Doran.

6 Cllr DORAN: I have no phone call to make, I won't be long.

7 CATHAOIRLEACH: You will stick with it, will you?

8 Cllr DORAN: There is more lights flashing around here than was around our house at
9 Christmas!

10
11 Anyway, I want to endorse what Cllr Blake had to say about our area. Especially the Shillelagh
12 area, the river was cleaned up about ten years ago from Shillelagh to Balisland and it done the
13 job. It will have to be done again, and it wouldn't worry me what's in the river, I want it cleaned
14 up. We can't have the land and houses being flooded. If we want to go at it tomorrow, it
15 wouldn't worry me too much who was complaining about what's in the river and what's not in
16 the river. We want to look after the people before we look after everything else.

17
18 The other thing that Cllr Blake mentioned as well is I think we have about three men in our area,
19 and I am talking about this for the last number of years. We haven't got anybody with the shovel
20 or with anything else to let the water off the road and that's where the real problem is. Every
21 time you have a flood, the water now is running, it's not running the dykes, it's not going
22 anywhere, it can't get off the road, and I think we have three or four people now in the Carnew
23 area and another three or four in Tinahely. And that's all we have. So until we go and recruit
24 and be allowed to get somebody else, somebody to work on the road, we are always going to
25 have this problem. And to get the water off the road and keep the water off the road. It's just a
26 river running along the side of the road now is what we have. It's taken the sides out of the road,
27 and it's dangerous a car coming along is in the water and then he slips into the dyke. So what I
28 want to see is some help given to the Local Area Engineer and some money given to him, not by
29 promising money. We are talking about money next year, we are talking about money in five
30 years time. We want money now for to make the roads safe. Thank you.

31 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Kennedy.

32 Cllr KENNEDY: Thank you Cathaoirleach, again I just want to thank the Civil Defence and the
33 fire services and the outdoor staff and the engineer, especially in the Arklow Municipal Area.
34 But we do have a problem in the South. We have a lot of damage done. In Avoca, we have

1 eight houses that the water came within feet of getting into those houses Cathaoirleach. A few
2 years ago, that river was cleaned out. It only takes 100 metres T took a week's work, a track
3 digger and two dumpers and it cleaned out that river. I agree with Cllr Doran, it's not what's in
4 the river. I am more concerned about the residents than brown trout to be honest with you.
5 That's just in Avoca. It needs to be done and looked at and I agree with what Cllr Snell said
6 earlier on, a lot of these issues need to be dealt with at municipal level.

7
8 In Aughrim, there is people being flooded there for the last 30 odd years and it hasn't been
9 addressed. This problem has to be addressed so it does. Between 30 and 40 tonne of gravel was
10 washed out in Aughrim on four occasions over Christmas. I am not sure whether it's a County
11 Council problem or an Irish Water problem, but it needs to be resolved. To see people in their
12 70s out brushing water at 2 o'clock in the morning is scandalous so it is. Again what Cllr Doran
13 said about the sides of the road being washed away up in Clone, both sides of the road is gone.
14 It's absolutely ridiculous. I would ask the roads department could they issue us with an update in
15 relation to where the road has collapsed between Rathdrum and Avoca as soon as possible.

16 Thank you Cathaoirleach.

17 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Winters.

18 Cllr WINTERS: Thanks Cathaoirleach. Just I want to thank all of the staff that did work so
19 hard over the extended bad weather period. I know we are going to be speaking about the
20 Murrough separately and just to say that I don't always agree with Cllr Cullen, but in this
21 instance, I did hear Minister Howlin suggest that there was a possibility that an insurance levy
22 would be made on all householders, and I actually think that that would be extremely unfair.
23 Some of the places that are flooded are flooded because particular local authorities granted
24 permission to houses that shouldn't have been built. They got the development levies. The
25 developers got the profits. And yet again I suppose the people that should have been the
26 watchdogs weren't doing what they should have been doing to make sure that that didn't happen
27 or tried their best and didn't succeed. And I don't see why all of the members of the public
28 should have to pick up the tab for that. And I would be very much opposed to an insurance levy
29 to cover up the mistakes and the costs of this. I also think that it's about time we started to make
30 people accountable. And we should go back and see - look at those files where planning was
31 granted on flood plains, and see who signed off on them, and let them justify it as to why they
32 actually thought it was going to be a good idea to actually do this. And like, I sat last week on
33 the Murrough and we were told we couldn't do beach nourishment, not that we couldn't but it
34 would be one of the things that would be an ongoing maintenance thing and I think when they

1 were granting permission on flood plains, did they not realise there would be a constant
2 maintenance where they have in Athlone where they have sandbags up since 4th December. I
3 want it not just to be talked about, I actually want people to actually be made responsible for it
4 and for them not to keep the positions that they have, not to keep the salaries and the pensions
5 and everything that they enjoy when they have caused so much hardship to so many people and
6 they've just all walked away Scott free. Thank you.

7 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Vance.

8 Cllr VANCE: Thank you Chairman. Could I just endorse what everyone else said about the
9 voluntary services, that they were provided by the voluntary committees all over the county in
10 regard to the services they provided and our own Local Authority staff as well in regard to this.
11 And like what Cllr Winters was saying there, Cllr Cullen, in regard to a levy, I find it difficult
12 now to take Minister Harris seriously when he is talking about putting a levy in regard to
13 insurance levy. When the Minister in his own area here left 14 million in his Kitty in 2014 and
14 didn't spend it. There was an underspend. And effectively the flooding issue is being dealt with
15 in Bray, when there is all in South Wicklow, we have had traditionally a problem with flooding
16 and I find it very difficult that there was an underspend in his department for 14 million and his
17 own constituency needing that type of money and also there has been an underspend up to the
18 time we had the problem for 2015 as well. And that's really very, very hard to take.

19
20 In regard to the flood plains, I have been listening to Councillors from all parties all over the
21 country talking about building on flood plains, and wrong planning and everything else. I think
22 it's ironic to say the least. What I would like - Irene Winters was saying there about checking --

23 Cllr BRADY: You voted for...

24 Cllr VANCE: Could I just say that, Cllr Brady, Cllr Brady, if you listen to what you said, the
25 river scheme which I wasn't going to bring it up, is a brilliant scheme. You went to England to
26 stop that scheme.

27 Cllr BRADY: That's a blatant lie.

28 Cllr VANCE: You know that because I was there. So you don't talk to me about that. Which is
29 now a brilliant scheme, you brought your consultant, you brought your consultant to England to
30 stop that scheme.

31 Cllr BRADY: The residents of little Bray sent their consultant over to ensure that the works that
32 I secured, that I secured...

33 Cllr VANCE: You secured nothing for Bray. You have done nothing for Bray. All you do is
34 stand about what you are going to do. You do nothing. You have no history of doing anything

1 in the town. Nothing.

2 Cllr BRADY: You voted to resolve the flood plains...

3 Cllr VANCE: I just said it's very interesting when I hear Councillors talking about flood plains
4 and various things like that, as well as Irene Winters was saying checking who signed off on
5 these, it will be very interesting to see what Councillors supported the applications on these sites
6 as well. That would be very interesting as far as I am concerned.

7 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Fitzgerald.

8 Cllr FITZGERALD: Sorry for the interruption there, but Mary Wilson is more important than
9 John Ryan. I might be in trouble after it, but anyway that's the way it works. As I was saying, I
10 was seen a lot of flooding in Arklow, but I have never seen such a concerted effort to alleviate
11 the problems for the public, and I think on the first day we had 2,500 sandbags filled. I seen all
12 the Civil Defence what they did, the Fire Service and especially the Council workers. And
13 importantly members of the public who conveyed sandbags. But there is - on the - when we had
14 the flooding, the first place I went out to see was on the South Beach where we had done the
15 protective armour. And I can say quite clearly if that work hadn't been finished before
16 Christmas, we would have had a huge problem on the golf club and other areas there. So I just
17 want to thank everyone for their efforts, the text service was invaluable.

18
19 In saying that, I always find a problem in Arklow when there is flooding that streets are very
20 slow to be closed off, whether it's the Gardaí, the Council or whoever. And I think there needs
21 to be a decision made who has the authority or who should do it? Because on several days there,
22 as Cllr Annesley knows as well, there were sightseers going through the waters to see what
23 houses were flooded and whatever else. I was in Wexford a few weeks ago there, and the van
24 just pulled up in the road and stopped the cars going through from Wexford County Council. So
25 we need to have somewhere, to stop people driving the water into people's houses as happens in
26 the lower end of the town, there needs to be a clear decision, whoever is going to stop the cars
27 driving through. The same people are going around in circles.

28
29 The other issue I have is the Council put out hundreds, we have five or six areas designated for
30 sandbags and as was relaid to me some people needed 6 sandbags, some took 50 and some took
31 40 and at some stages there was no sandbags in the places while there was dreadful rain and a
32 fear of flooding. As regards no insurance, we have areas of Arklow who are designated as being
33 in a flood area and have had no insurance for 25 years and I think, I just heard the remarks
34 before, I heard them outside there about this levy on people who are paying insurance.

1 Everything that happens in this country, whether it's an insurance company closes or anything
2 else, there is a levy on the people who pay the insurance. I got my insurance quote this morning,
3 there is a levy on it for something else that happened a few years ago. Now we are talking about
4 putting a levy on people who are paying insurance because other people can't get insurance
5 because their houses are flooded, maybe because of wrong decisions made in the past. And I
6 think that's a bit disingenuous of anyone to go to the public who are paying, to increase their
7 insurance. I acknowledge that insurance apparently I am told is gone up 30%. And again I
8 might add, we had just to the extent of the problem in December can't be understated, but it was
9 the worst rain in 130 years according - since records nearly began. The heaviest rain in 130
10 years, and a lot of it couldn't be stopped. You just can't stop it, I just want to commend the staff
11 when the road last Wednesday night, I happened to be coming back, previously the road from
12 Rathdrum to Avoca, the swift action of the County Council and the other authorities when that
13 road subsided and I understand there was a temporary road put in there to get people moving on
14 that road, the swift action that was taken by the County Council and others, Irish Water, was
15 much appreciated, the water was restored to the people in Avoca back that evening. It's things
16 like that that help in these situations. That was a serious situation where people could have been
17 injured. I just want to appreciate the action that was taken on that morning.

18 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Cllr Behan.

19 Cllr BEHAN: Cathaoirleach, I won't delay the meeting just to agree with a lot of what has been
20 said here today, but particularly the praise for the staff and for the communication system that
21 was in place during this whole period and I compliment you Cathaoirleach as being somebody I
22 think has promoted that whole idea of being able to communicate on a more effective basis with
23 the public and I think it's - it was extremely well done.

24
25 A lot of issues have been raised obviously, but I think Cllr Cullen has proposed, well I
26 understood it to be an emergency motion here which I think many of us would agree, but I
27 certainly would agree and I would like to second it that we condemn outright any proposal
28 coming from this Government to add an additional burden on people already paying enormous
29 amounts of money in insurance policies at the moment. If there is a problem here, the State
30 should provide some sort of a solution. It should not be put back on the taxpayers of this country
31 again. And if Cllr Cullen is making that as a proposal, I would certainly like to second it.

32 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay, Declan Murnane is become...

33 Cllr FORTUNE: I want to make a quick comment, just in relation to Holywell, I very strongly
34 want to say that I don't believe as I said in the few words I said that the problem in Holywell was

1 caused by flood plains or anything like that, it was caused by the development the way it was
2 done, and that's very, very important. Because we cannot be allowing the insurance industry off
3 the hook and anything that's said here today is important, so I want that to be clearly on the
4 record that the scenario in Holywell as far as I am concerned and as far as the residents are
5 concerned is not caused by flood plains or anything like that, it was caused by the way the site
6 was developed and the way houses have been put too close to a river and it should not impact
7 them insurance wise. If it does, it's absolutely immoral.

8 CATHAOIRLEACH: I just want to bring in the CEO to talk about a meeting that's happening
9 tomorrow.

10 CE: Just before Declan Murnane comes in, because it was raised by a number of people, there is
11 a meeting at 9am tomorrow morning in the civic offices in Greystones between the developers of
12 the property at Holywell, some of the residents and the Greystones Area Councillors and Council
13 planning staff will be in attendance at that meeting.

14 CATHAOIRLEACH: Great. Declan, do you want to just give us an update on the Murrough as
15 we promised to discuss this.

16 MR MURNANE: We had a meeting this afternoon with Irish Rail and our consultants and Irish
17 Rail have completed their works now, they completed them last week, they did some emergency
18 works over the New Year weekend to put in rock armour as the breach was getting closer to the
19 railway line. The consultants' recommendation now is that we extend the revenant on further to
20 the end of the rock armour put in by Irish Rail and then do the termination, which will deal with
21 the immediate problem but there will be continuing erosion further north of that, which is more
22 long-term thing that will need to be looked at. So the -- probably an extra 150 metres, we need
23 to get that costed and then go back to the OPW for additional funding. But that's the position at
24 the moment.

25
26 The access for walkers is restored, it was open over the weekend. We are just tidying it up
27 ourselves at the moment now, just spreading a bit of stone to clean it up and it will be fully
28 opened for walkers then after that. But once we get our works completed and the area should be
29 widened out again, hopefully close back to the way it was before.

30 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay.

31 MR MURNANE: Can I fill in on Avoca, we had a meeting there as well this morning, with the
32 consulting engineer and structural engineer about that so we are going to get a design, we are
33 hoping to put in an embankment to stabilise the road. But the road was -- as mentioned has been
34 re-opened or should be open today to one-way traffic. We will have traffic lights on it, so it will

1 be shuttle working and there will be a weight restriction on it because there is still the areas - the
2 edge of the road is still unstable, so we have to monitor that closely. If there is any further
3 subsidence, we may have to close the road again. For the moment we will be open to one-way
4 traffic with a weight restriction on it.

5 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay. That's great. Cllr Winters.

6 Cllr WINTERS: Thanks Cathaoirleach, and thanks Declan for the update. Just in relation to the
7 Murrough, and I would like to thank I suppose Irish Rail and the Council for the work that they
8 did until protecting it in I suppose a crisis situation. But the reason we are in that crisis situation
9 is that when the Port Access Road was going built and the rock revenants were put in, there was
10 no transport links put in. We have all known that and seen the erosion over the last couple of
11 years. There was a report done by RPS, sat in here in the Council offices, everybody knew it
12 was there and still the work wasn't done. I don't know how much Irish Rail have spent but I
13 imagine that paying staff triple rates on the 1st of January, on the 3rd of January and double rates
14 on the 2nd of January along with opening up three quarries is a very expensive job and I just
15 wish that people, everybody knew this was going to happen, why people didn't get together six
16 months ago, or a year ago, and do what needed to be done and we would have had a better job
17 and more of the Murrough protected and we just always seem to be in crisis mode and Fire
18 Brigade mode, always just after the event, and it's so frustrating. Everybody knew that this was
19 what was going to happen if we didn't take action. And it finally did. Thank you.

20 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Shay Cullen.

21 Cllr Shay CULLEN: Thank you, just to follow on from Cllr Winters' comments there with
22 regards to the Murrough. I suppose first of all, the Murrough is the most important amenity for
23 the people of Wicklow, and Wicklow Town area. Through our municipal meetings, we were
24 aware that funding was available, or certainly 135,000 euro of funding was made available in
25 October for works to be carried out in January. Now unfortunately it's very disappointing that
26 the storms have caused so much damage to the Murrough in the meantime, but I suppose my
27 point of view is the question has to be asked why have we let this get to this situation? I mean
28 this is an ongoing erosion problem we have had for generations. Indeed I spoke to a family
29 recently who remember horse racing on the Murrough. So to let it get from a stage where there
30 was horse racing on the Murrough, to within two to three metres or five metres of the railway
31 track, I mean it's totally unacceptable. It's something that has been ignored over the years, and
32 it's been put on the long finger and basically we have got to a crisis point at this stage.

33
34 Now whilst Irish Rail did come in and do some repair work on the 1st of January, and 31st of

1 December, I would be quite disappointed with their response, because on numerous occasions
2 they've been contacted by this authority to support this Council to deal with the erosion on the
3 Murrough. And on each occasion they seemed to have failed the request. Indeed 2011, '12, '13
4 and '14, further funding was asked for by the OPW and has always been declined. And as I said
5 earlier, it's only now when we have got to an absolute crisis point is something being done. But
6 while as far as I am concerned it's too little too late, and 135,000 may just about keep the water
7 out for a little while, we are going to need a lot, lot more funding in the future and I would call
8 on this Council to communicate with the Minister and look for further funding as soon as
9 possible to continue the work right up the Murrough and save the Murrough for the people of
10 Wicklow.

11 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Cllr Casey.

12 Cllr CASEY: I think most of what needs to be said has been said already. And maybe just to
13 re-emphasise the role Irish Rail has because Irish Rail nearly became heroes over the weekend,
14 but in fact the Local Authority have been dealing with Irish Rail and have requested Irish Rail to
15 come in on a number of applications for funding and they quite blankly refused to do so even
16 though their line was in jeopardy. I think it is disappointing that the Local Authority has been
17 accused of not being proactive on this and they have been because they applied annually to the
18 OPW to do transition works on the Murrough and have been refused up to this year. A lot of
19 people here were at that public meeting in the Grand Hotel last week where there was over 200
20 people at it and you can feel the anger in the room that the greatest national amenity for Wicklow
21 Town is almost disappeared overnight. I suppose the erosion has accelerated by a 34 year
22 period. The level of erosion there now was not expected to be there until 2050. Now we can
23 look at the Murrough, we can look at Brittas Bay, we can look at the landfill in Bray, we can
24 look at the mining sites in Avoca, Glendalough, Glendassin, we can look at the Wicklow Way.
25 These are all natural amenities that have a huge significance to this county. And I don't think -
26 while we should continue to apply to Central Government for funding, I think equally we will
27 have to find a vehicle within our own mechanisms to try and bolster that funding. And in
28 fairness, we have a county - a county development scheme which I think we could put in capital
29 infrastructure which could help protect these amenities. And I think it's something that maybe
30 we should look at. And we should ask the SPC to look at. Because we can't always be
31 dependent on the Department for the funding. And there is a lot more than coastal erosion going
32 on in the county. And I would be proposing that maybe the planning SPC could look at the
33 development scheme to see can we put in capital works that will actually protect our natural
34 amenities? Because we are spending millions on playgrounds and skate parks and community

1 centres. Why not spend a million or so on protecting the natural amenities we have.

2 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Behan.

3 Cllr BEHAN: Cathaoirleach, I did attend that meeting and as Cllr Casey said, the feeling was
4 very, very angry I think that night from local people at the disappearance of an amenity that
5 they'd valued so much.

6
7 Now I was just wondering, one of the frustrations I think people had on the night was that the
8 Council had money for some time before spending it, and I am not quite sure exactly what the
9 reason for that is and perhaps we might be able to hear from that the officials.

10
11 Secondly Minister Harris made a very big statement that he would give the Council more money
12 if they would only ask him for it. And that to me was an extraordinary statement to make if it
13 was true, that the Council could have got more but didn't ask. Now he was challenged from the
14 top table in fairness that Council officials had not actually agreed with that statement and in fact
15 that the Council had asked for more money. So I think this is the time now to find out for once
16 and for all, did the Council look for more money than actually was allocated? And why was the
17 money not spent when it was received?

18
19 The third point I would make is that many of the people who spoke expressed a desire to be
20 more involved in the process that would follow after this damage, in other words they want to be
21 consulted. They want to be involved. They were talking about going to the public meetings
22 about the new Development Plan, for example. And that's obviously one way of getting the
23 voices heard. But I also think it was such a big issue, such a huge issue for the community that
24 we should make time here at a future Council meeting, the next one if at all possible, to receive a
25 deputation of residents concerned about the Murrough, people from the two organisations that
26 have been set up to defend the Murrough that they should come to this full Council. This is an
27 amenity for the entire county, it affects the entire county. I would like to propose we invite them
28 to do so at our next meeting. Thanks Cathaoirleach.

29 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Brady.

30 Cllr BRADY: I would like to second that proposal there from Cllr Behan that both groups save
31 the Murrough and friends of the Murrough would be invited in here. Like other members I was
32 at that public meeting in Wicklow Town the other night and I had been speaking to both groups
33 prior to that and other concerned Wicklow residents about the Murrough before the meeting.

1 But I think the meeting did show quite graphically how much the Murrough actually means to
2 the people here in Wicklow Town. We know it is there as one member in the audience said, it is
3 their Phoenix Park. It's Wicklow Town's Phoenix Park. There is no other public amenity for the
4 residents here in Wicklow Town and as another person said, if the Murrough was allowed wash
5 away, it would be up to the Local Authority to replace it by opening up other parklands or
6 whatever and that would cost a substantial amount of money to do so. So it's imperative that the
7 coastal protection work is carried out immediate. There was a report carried out as we know
8 back in 2007, and I think the summary of that report probably highlights why no action was
9 taken to protect it. It's because there was no economic necessity as such to protect any of the
10 Murrough down there. In other words there was no expensive infrastructure, buildings, etcetera.
11 And speaking to my former Town Council colleague in Wicklow Town Council, Eamon Long
12 who pushed this issue over many, many years, he said on the Council following that report when
13 it was present today the Town Council, he felt there was a feeling from some that back away
14 from it and let Iarnrod Éireann cough up the money, that the only infrastructure there that was
15 potentially at risk was the rail line. And so I think it is important that it is not just protected in
16 the short-term, but also in the long-term and that report in 2007 spoke - I think there was five
17 different recommendations there as to the long-term protections for the Murrough and ultimately
18 we need to look at that. But in the short-term, this funding that has been allocated and a couple
19 of people have alluded to this and it's actually alarming, alarming that the Minister with
20 responsibility was on all local media, criticising this Council for their inaction, for not
21 progressing this sooner. And it's alarming to hear that applications to the OPW, or Department
22 of the Environment had been made in 2011, 2012, 2013, and 2014 for funding to put in place
23 coastal protection in the Murrough. And no funding was put in place or provided. I find that,
24 and if we can get clarification or confirmation on that, I think that leaves the Minister with
25 responsibility with a lot of egg on his face, that he is passing the buck here and grandstanding,
26 saying everything that he can do will be done, when in fact applications had been in consistently
27 over a considerable period of time only to be turned down.

28
29 And the second point and Cllr Behan touched on it there, that again the Minister stated, the
30 Minister stated that 100% funding had been allocated based on the application made. Now
31 friends of the Murrough dispute that. They said they had heard or had information that 50% of
32 funding was only given. Again we need clarification on that.

33
34 Just finally on the work that is going to commence at the end of the month, I think it's important

1 for the residents and users of the Murrough that the area of land that has been lost to coastal
2 erosion, you know whatever work is going to be carried out, that that land is actually reclaimed.
3 That we don't follow the line of rock armour that Iarnrod Eireann have put in. We need to make
4 sure that that land is reclaimed, backfilled and used as an amenity but going forward we need to
5 ensure that this is short-term - as Declan said this is a short-term measure, we need to look at the
6 long-term for coastal protection.

7 CATHAOIRLEACH: Is everybody okay with that, to invite them in to present to the next
8 Council? Okay, grand, that's agreed. Cllr Snell.

9 Cllr SNELL: Thanks Cathaoirleach. Again like other members of our Municipal District, there
10 is a lack ever concern in regards to the Murrough and the general coastal erosion that's taken
11 place. But anyone that lives in the area knows that this is commonplace. This is going on all
12 over Ireland, and particularly down the Murrough for decades and decades. And as I said at the
13 public meeting the other night with the best will in the world, with all the people, and all the
14 Facebook campaigns and public meetings, that goodwill alone won't protect the Murrough. It
15 will take funding. And to actually be there and listen to people describe that Wicklow County
16 Council didn't seek the funding to protect the Murrough is in my opinion a disgrace. Particularly
17 when the people who have applied year in year out were not there to protect themselves. And I
18 made that quite clear that applications have gone in from this Local Authority for many, many
19 years and I listed the years. And no funding has been forthcoming. And it's not a political
20 statement or otherwise. It's simply the truth, irrespective of who is saying it's not. It is the truth
21 that no funding was forthcoming. CIE were also approached in regards to assisting as someone
22 has said there already and they failed to come on board with this Local Authority. They carried
23 out works there as an emergency to protect their own asset, but our assets is the jewel in the
24 crown, which is the natural amenity that the Murrough is. And we all know it's a special area of
25 conservation and a special protection area, but at the end of the day, there is talk that it should be
26 a special amenity area order put in on the Murrough in Wicklow Town. I had mentioned at
27 Municipal District level that it's EU funding because there was obviously a lack of funding
28 forthcoming from successive governments and departments. And 130,000, and I know the
29 Municipal District put a couple of thousand into it, it's 135,000, but it is but a drop in the ocean.
30 It will have no overall long-term effect on protecting the Murrough. It will only protect 50
31 metres. And now with the works that's being carried out by Iarnrod Eireann, we have a situation
32 now where perhaps it will creep up the Murrough another couple of metres because they've car
33 read out some works. But at the end of the day, this is a project that's going to cost millions.
34 Not hundreds of thousands. Millions. And I believe that after the election, my fear is that

1 everybody that's showing an awful lot of interest in this at the moment will all forget about it
2 again, because we had historians at that meeting who could go back 100 years ago where the
3 same concerns were in place. And we all have family members we can talk to who remember
4 farms and the like up the Murrough. And we know all about the race track. But the fact is
5 without money, nothing can be done. And this Local Authority, we are asking to keep asking for
6 that money, because there is indications now that there will be a pot of money there if we only
7 ask. My concern is as a Local Authority we have always been asking, we have always asked and
8 the answer has always been the same: Unfortunately there is no funding. So the message needs
9 to go out loud and clear now here today, that we have asked and will continue to keep asking but
10 this is a major project and it's something that needs to be preserved for the people not just for this
11 generation but the generations coming behind.

12 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Tommy Cullen.

13 Cllr Tommy CULLEN: Chairman, a number of years ago, I think we should recall here today
14 the campaign led at the Wicklow Town Council and by the late Councillor Pat Kavanagh, on the
15 Murrough protection and preservation for many years. I think she was the leading light in
16 Wicklow Town in our campaigns to save the Murrough. I think that should be remembered and
17 recognised here today, the great effort that lady put into it.

18
19 I recall back in the late 90s and early 2000s, over 150,000 of coastal protection rock was
20 transferred from the Rathdrum quarries to Wales, shipped down to Rosslare and shipped over to
21 Wales for coastal protection. And I actually seen some of it in Wales. And it has worked very,
22 very successfully. Where the Wicklow rock was used. And so therefore, the quality of rock
23 required on aggregate required is actually on our doorstep here in the local quarries. So
24 therefore we have the material to protect the Murrough and protect the coast along that area.
25 And I do think given that the railway line is a strategic national asset, that it would be able to
26 benefit from EU funding, as Cllr Snell said, and national funding as well. Because its protection,
27 apart from the walkway, it's protection a national strategic railway asset. And I think that's
28 where we should be going for to look to use the local indigenous rock that would give local
29 employment in the area and successfully protect a long sweep of number of miles of the
30 Murrough. I think it's not a big, big engineering job to do. And the resources are on our
31 doorsteps as the Welsh authorities have proven and it would give a lot of employment in this
32 area. Chairman I would reiterate, I think we should remember Councillor, the late Councillor Pat
33 Kavanagh when we are discussing this.

34 CATHAOIRLEACH: Absolutely, yeah. Let's just you put a proposal forward there, if you

1 would like to just reiterate that.

2 Cllr Tommy CULLEN: Chairman, that this Council would oppose the introduction of any levy
3 on home insurances for national flood protection.

4 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay. Is that agreed, or do we need to take a vote on that. Agreed, okay,
5 fine.

6
7 A lot of members have brought up a lot of questions, do you want to answer any of them or put a
8 report together.

9 CE: I know the members want to move on at four o'clock to talk about Notices of Motion. I
10 have noted all the questions, we probably could have given answers to most of them here today,
11 but we will prepare a report and submit it to the Council within the week if that's okay. So we
12 can move on. And indeed if members, what I would say, at Municipal District level, at your
13 meetings, we should target some of our expenditure towards these hot spots that have been
14 identified and I would appreciate as part of our review that if each Municipal District would list
15 them, and we can examine them. That we did target them over our last period of time, in
16 Greystones we dealt with them as well, so we dealt with in White Bridge, we took gravel out of
17 the river, and we have done work in Baltinglass and done work in Arklow. So I think there is an
18 opportunity, if - working with Mark Devereux, we have talked about it already, about having a
19 concentration of resources towards that area, and we would be looking to the Municipal District
20 to fund a portion of it. I'll prepare that report and submit it to you within the next week.

21 CATHAOIRLEACH: That's fine, thank you for that. I just want to, there is a couple of lights
22 showing, just Cllr Thornhill, very quickly.

23 Cllr THORNHILL: Yeah, Cathaoirleach. Just in relation to a proposal that Cllr Fortune just
24 made just a few minutes ago, I would like to second it. It's in relation to - that the Council nod
25 build or allow houses to be built on the top of rivers or on a flood plain.

26 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay. Cllr Behan.

27 Cllr BEHAN: Chairman is it not possible to get a simple straightforward answer to the question:
28 Did the Council ask for more money than the Minister granted or not? Because he made a
29 statement at a public meeting that he would give the Council anything they asked for but they
30 didn't ask for any more than they got. That's a yes or a no, I don't think we need a report in a
31 week's time to get the answer.

32 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Brady.

33 Cllr BRADY: I asked the question, a simple yes or no, as to whether this Council had put in
34 previous applications to the OPW or the Department of the Environment.

1 CATHAOIRLEACH: Declan.

2 MR MURNANE: With regard to the funding, last year the allocation that was made was what
3 we looked for. That was to build the transition area at the end of the existing revenant. As far as
4 I am aware there were applications made in previous years for funding for ongoing works on the
5 Murrough and I think they're available through the environment section. Somebody is getting
6 details but we can pass that on afterwards what applications were made in the past. They were in
7 previous years, but last year the allocation that was applied for was given, which was to
8 construct the extension to the revenant.

9 Cllr BRADY: Maybe if we get that information...

10 CATHAOIRLEACH: Sure, that's fine, that's fine. Could I ask...

11 CE: Cathaoirleach, we have a big job of work to do, I appreciate the members want an
12 immediate answer, we inherited that situation from the Town Councils. Staff are busy at the
13 moment trying to put costings together. We are going to be competing against other areas who
14 have vastly more problems than we have. The staff I need to focus directly on what we are
15 doing, not get into a political debate on things. I would ask them for the week without chasing
16 us down for individual answers.

17 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor - Director O'Brien, do you want to just come in on the
18 proposal of Cllr Fortune.

19 DIRECTOR O'BRIEN: Cllr Behan once said no-one would vote for me so I am definitely not a
20 Councillor! Is just on flood plains, I think this Council and I say both members and staff have a
21 very good record on flood plains. You have seen up and down the country where councils zoned
22 vast swathes of land in flood plains. I don't think we have been guilty of that. I don't think you
23 will find many housing schemes flooded that were on flood plains. We don't have - you have
24 seen those on your screens in lots of places and generally I think planning staff have been very,
25 very active and proactive in ensuring that development isn't permitted on flood plains.

26
27 The houses that have been prone to flooding in Wicklow, it could be exceptional events. I don't
28 think you can state you won't allow any development beside rivers because all of our towns grew
29 up beside rivers. There is lots of structures beside rivers. If the rivers stay within their banks,
30 then that's adequate. We have turned down - I can think of a couple now I have turned down
31 beside rivers where I thought that the banks weren't very, very high. And I know at the time it
32 was controversial for the people concerned. But obviously there are places where the rivers are
33 well within their banks and it's fine to have permissions granted there to.

34

1 The - I suppose the one that's on everyone's mind at the moment is Holywell and it's something
2 we are going to have to look at, the cross-sectional area of the bridge that did back up was
3 probably twice the cross-sectional areas of the bridges upstream of it and the river has silted and
4 maybe it's going to be something we are going to have to bite the bullet on and start maintaining
5 streams within urban areas. It's something we don't do at the moment, and it maybe something
6 might come out of this investigation of what happened in Holywell. Or it could just be an
7 exceptional rain event. The former town engineer of Bray the other day was telling me and
8 reminding me of an incident in Fairy Hill where houses nearly on top of the hill were very, very
9 nearly flooded. The contributing area of the rainfall would have been about 200 metres, and
10 depending on the intensity of rain you can get floods happening and they might not happen
11 again. It's not something that's cut and dried and simple. But I don't think, I mean we don't have
12 any record here of building on flood plains.

13 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Fortune, I mean do you want to alter that kind of a bit just to say the
14 flood plains or...

15 Cllr FORTUNE: I have outlined my view and I have told you what I think is the case. And I
16 think when you look at the way that section in the estate is built, we don't have to be an engineer
17 to see it's not right. I made a proposal, it's been seconded. I would like it to be put.

18 CATHAOIRLEACH: Could you just...

19 Cllr VANCE: Just for my information, is that not something that should be contained in a
20 Development Plan? You know rather than an ad hoc type of thing like this.

21 CATHAOIRLEACH: Em, it probably is a Development Plan submission.

22 Cllr VANCE: I have a problem with this because of the very nature, it's all embracing, because I
23 mean, the thing about it is it's like what the directors said there, there are places that are built
24 beside rivers and all that and they've never flooded and various things. You don't want to get
25 into a situation - and the same Councillors or similar Councillors around the Chamber here have
26 said it earlier on that may be looking for to represent people to build houses on areas that haven't
27 flooded but maybe construed as a flood plain as well. So I think a bit of thought now has to be
28 given to this. It's not a thing that I think you should be taking now today, a knee jerk reaction to
29 this. I think it needs a bit of thought and I think the place to deal with this is in the review of the
30 Development Plan.

31 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay. Cllr Fortune. Very quickly.

32 Cllr FORTUNE: That last remark of Cllr Vance is one of these things he has plucked out of the
33 air. How dare he infer that I have ever done anything like that, I never have. Can I speak.

34 CATHAOIRLEACH: I didn't take an inference from what Cllr Vance said.

1 Cllr FORTUNE: I always find it very interesting that when we discuss something like this and
2 you make a proposal and the Director is making a comment, it's generally speaking Cllr Vance
3 who comes in and tries to be the expert on everything. This is very simple. There are people
4 suffering badly at the moment because of this and I think what I have put forward is very
5 sensible and it has been seconded. I must say I am surprised at Cllr Vance trying to counteract
6 what I have proposed.

7 CATHAOIRLEACH: I would say I do think it's probably better to take it for the Development
8 Plan, I am just saying what I believe. So I'll put an amendment to your motion to say it should
9 be taken as - I agree we shouldn't build on flood plains, I would be very, very clear about that.
10 So I believe that it should be taken as part of the Development Plan process, I don't know if
11 somebody would second that. You would be happy enough to have it in that. Okay, great. Just
12 before we go in, we promised to go into - before we go into the Notice of Motions that we have
13 been trying to get to for a long time, could I just take items 12 and 13, Helen do you want to just
14 speak into those.

15 SECRETARY: Just to say to the Councillors you each received an envelope today, it had two
16 documents in it: The first document is in relation to the political donations under the legislation
17 that's there. It's the cream form. That must be - you must furnish a donation statement not later
18 than the 31st of January 2015. That's the cream one.

19
20 Then in relation to item number 12, you also, sorry, you also received a white document. That's
21 under part 15 of the Local Government Act 2001, it sets out the ethical framework for all those
22 involved in the Local Government service. It's white form. It's your annual declaration form
23 and it must be completed by the last day of February 2016. Thank you.

24 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay, thank you for both of those. Notice of Motion, item number one --

25 Cllr Tommy CULLEN: Chairman, Councillor and members from the West area had an issue
26 about the burial grounds.

27 Cllr DORAN: Item nine.

28 CATHAOIRLEACH: It's up to you guys.

29 Cllr Tommy CULLEN: Can we have it as a priority for the next meeting.

30 CATHAOIRLEACH: We just said we would go for the Notice of Motions, so we will have it
31 high up on the agenda next week.

32 Cllr RUTTLE: Standing orders at 10.30.

33 SECRETARY: We have ten minutes to get through as many of these. Notice of Motion in
34 number one, the Sinn Fein group should I say, "That Wicklow County Council ensure that the

1 car park at Brittas Bay is opened all year round and not just during the summer months."

2
3 We have received a report from the environmental section, "A full cost benefit analysis was
4 carried out on the operation opening of Brittas Bay car park in recent years. This review
5 identified that resources were unavailable to open the car parks outside the summer season.
6 Costs include payroll, litter maintenance, skips, etcetera. There is little or no return on income
7 outside the summer season and all costs if the car park is opened would still have to be met by
8 the Local Authority. The car park and toilets will remain closed outside the summer season,
9 however pedestrian access to the beach is available at all times, Wicklow County Council will
10 continue to work with any group that's organised a large event and requires the car park to be
11 opened. This can be organised by prior agreement through the environmental section. The car
12 park was recently opened for a period over Christmas 2014, and this resulted in a large amount
13 of dumping and clean-up costs following Christmas. The rubbish left within the car park
14 resulted in numerous complaints. At present an operator is contracted to maintain car parks
15 during designated bathing season only, May to September, an operator staff resource of Wicklow
16 Municipal District is assigned during this period for maintenance of the beach area. This
17 operation is in line with maintaining our Blue Flag status at Brittas Bay Beach. Wicklow County
18 Council has a budget in 2016 for costs of the summer season only". And then just to update the
19 members, this tender has recently gone to tender, and the closing date is the 14th of January
20 2016. And a number of other associated items have also gone to tender. The car park in
21 Glendalough, the food in the car park as I mentioned in Brittas Bay and there is also a tender for
22 Rampere landfill.

23 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Brady. If I could ask people to be really fast on these.

24 Cllr BRADY: We tabled this motion a year ago, last January, so thankfully we are getting to it
25 now. This issue was discussed at Wicklow Tourism, at that level, also numerous members of the
26 public came forward asking why is an amenity such as this with a blue flag closed for the vast
27 majority of the year and I know the Municipal District had been dealing with this and I think Cllr
28 Snell wants to speak on it as well. To hear that it's closed because there is no income at that time
29 of the year, I think is the wrong reason. It's a public amenity. It should be open. I think
30 whatever finances need to be put in place should be put in place irrespective as to whether there
31 is ten or twenty cars only parking in it. I was down there over the Christmas period and to see
32 the amount of cars even in the depths of winter down there having to park on the side of the
33 road. And perfectly good car park in on the other side of a fence closed off. I think is wrong, it's
34 sending out all the wrong messages about Wicklow being open for tourism and I think this needs

1 to be looked at and I know it's being discussed extensively at district level and I know they're not
2 happy with the tenders that went out last week without incorporating the changes in the tender to
3 ensure that it does open throughout the 12 months of the year.

4 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Winters.

5 Cllr WINTERS: Thanks Cathaoirleach, very disappointing to hear that when it was opened over
6 Christmas that the public I suppose left so much litter and rubbish behind them. However, I still
7 believe that it - the tender document as it was advertised made it financially unviable for
8 anybody to either do it outside of the summer months and what we had always asked for was
9 that it would be open during the summer months and on fine weekends and that the tender
10 document should have been written in such a way to allow operators to actually open it up on
11 weekends throughout the Winter and Spring and Autumn months, when the weather would have
12 suggested that people would be likely to use it. And that wasn't written into the tender
13 document. And that - it basically made it impossible for anybody to tender in such a way that it
14 would make it financially viable for them to open it outside of the bathing season. And that was
15 against everything that we had asked for and I am just very disappointed in the department of the
16 - in the environment section here within the Council that that's the way they worded the tender
17 document.

18 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Snell.

19 Cllr SNELL: Thanks Cathaoirleach, I'll be brief as well. It's sort of ironic that we have waited
20 almost a year to get to discuss it and then my colleagues in the Municipal District, we have
21 discussed it many times, we have met concerned groups as well. On this issue. And at the end
22 of the day, basically we are wasting our breath. We have little or no say. And it's diminishing
23 our function and our role as public representatives. When we asked for the tender process to
24 specifically include looking at the holidays, at Christmas, Halloween, Easter, not just for our
25 own citizens of County Wicklow, but also for tourists and people coming into the area, and it's
26 very disheartening that not only it was not included in a tender, our concerns as six public
27 representatives at the time, but none of it was taken on board. And we discussed it at our last
28 Municipal District meeting that we wanted the tender to be taken back, although it had been put
29 out on public display and we are now told January 14th is the closing date that it should be re-
30 advertised with what we wanted. Because if we have any sort of role or function here within
31 Wicklow County Council, or any say, surely our concerns should be taken on board because we
32 are only a vehicle for the public to get their message across. And we are relaying what the
33 public are saying to us. And yet it seems that some individuals have put this together, and
34 disregarded everything that's been mentioned and my belief is that it won't be re-tendered and

1 basically everything that we have said is nonsense and won't be taken on board and I just think
2 it's despicable and I think we are all meant to be trying to progress and make our own public
3 amenities better for the public and unfortunately in this case, I think it's ridiculous. I want to
4 know who is pulling the strings here.

5 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay, Cllr Casey.

6 Cllr CASEY: Yeah, listen.

7 CATHAOIRLEACH: That wasn't an answer to your question by the way!

8 Cllr CASEY: Yeah, it wasn't me. Listen, we have been here for several years both as a local
9 area and now as a Municipal District and it is disappointing. The problems in Brittas Bay have
10 been highlighted over the years. And I think it's - it was the most disappointing thing at the last
11 Municipal District was that we weren't listened to. And it was clearly stated at Municipal
12 District meeting that we should put a second tender out to include weekends and weekends only.
13 And not for a full seven day service to be provided in Brittas Bay park during the off-season. I
14 gave the example of Glendalough. 15 years ago the Glendalough car park was closed during the
15 winter. There was a significant campaign put in place to get it opened at the weekend. It's now
16 open seven days a week all year round. Within that tender process, whoever is operating the car
17 park is responsible for the litter in the car park. It is not the responsibility of the Council staff.
18 It's part of the tender process. The maintenance of the toilets in the Glendalough car park are
19 equally part of the tender process. So the tender could have been crafted in a way to deal with
20 the litter problem. We are looking at tourism as one of the key drivers of this economy. Closing
21 Brittas Bay car park for almost eight months of the year is not opening up for tourism.

22 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Shay Cullen.

23 Cllr Shay CULLEN: I just want to concur with my municipal colleagues. This item has been on
24 their agenda for the last five or six meetings, municipal meetings, and we extended an invitation
25 at our last meet to go the environment section to come to our next municipal meeting to
26 obviously discuss this closure of Brittas Bay car park, because it seems from different
27 correspondence that either the environment section aren't listening to us, or they don't understand
28 what we want, but we are willing to meet with them through the Municipal District to obviously
29 outline our concerns, which we have done in the past and obviously to try and get the tender re-
30 advertised to include summer months and winter weekends where possible. And I don't believe
31 that's too much to ask. Thank you.

32 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay, could I ask Helena to come in on this.

33 HELENA: Just to inform the members that the advertisement that went out has split it between
34 summer and winter. The advertisement itself includes an information pack and tender

1 submission documentation that must be submitted. That tender documentation pack splits it out
2 between operation for the summer period every day and for the winter period weekends and
3 bank holidays so all previous issues that have been raised by members in relation to winter
4 opening is included in the tender process.

5 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay, great, thank you very much for that. Notice of Motion number two
6 in the name of Cllr Matthews, "Wicklow County Council initiate a formal public consultation
7 process on the introduction of 30K speed limit in all residential areas...(Quote)"

8 SECRETARY: "New guidelines for setting and managing speed limits in Ireland were issued by
9 the Department of Transport in March 2015. These guidelines recommend the introduction of a
10 special speed limit of 30 kilometres per hour in housing estates. The roads and transportation
11 directorate now intend to recommend a special speed limit of 30 kilometres per hour in all
12 housing estates that are in charge as part of an overall review of speed limits in the county which
13 is currently underway. Public consultation will take place as part of the process to amend the
14 bye-laws. With regard to the Road Traffic Amendment Bill 2015, it should be noted that the
15 guidelines referred to above recommend a special speed limit of 30 kilometres per hour."

16 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Matthews.

17 Cllr MATTHEWS: Chairman are you finishing this Notice of Motions at 4.30 because I think -
18 is it 4.30 you are finishing.

19 CATHAOIRLEACH: That was planned. Why?

20 Cllr MATTHEWS: I think there will be a bit more discussion on this.

21 CATHAOIRLEACH: You are the only one showing at the moment.

22 Cllr MATTHEWS: Oh, I am showing, yeah. Listen, thanks for the report, and look there is a
23 200 page guideline document from the department there at the moment on setting road speeds.
24 It's not a simple issue. This motion was put down purely in the interests of road safety. I know
25 we are looking at residential housing estates but I think we need to expand this into residential
26 areas as well. There is a lot of parts of the towns are residential but are not necessarily
27 qualifying as housing estates, and they're very residential roads and would have vulnerable road
28 users such as school children and elderly people and pedestrians and cyclists, so I am just
29 wondering could we - the members of each district are probably best placed to decide what roads
30 in their areas maybe should qualify for 30K speed limits. I am wondering could we have the
31 Municipal Districts look at proposing roads that they would put up for public consultation for a
32 30K speed limit and then we could return that back to the roads SPC and get a report back from
33 the roads department on whether those roads would qualify.

34 CATHAOIRLEACH: You want this to be taken at Municipal District level.

1 Cllr MATTHEWS: There is no point in me sitting here and saying a road in Baltinglass should
2 be 30K, I don't know the area well. I know Bray well. I am wondering could we take it back to
3 Municipal District and put together a list of roads in our areas, residential roads in our areas that
4 we think would benefit from 30K and return it back to the SPC.

5 CATHAOIRLEACH: You want to bring that to the Municipal...

6 Cllr MATTHEWS: The decision will have to be made at Wicklow, but I think it's better for
7 local councillors to make local decisions is that okay. So we put it on the agendas at Municipal
8 Districts.

9 CATHAOIRLEACH: That's really up to the chairs, but I take it you are going to ask them, are
10 you?

11 Cllr MATTHEWS: I am asking now could the chairs of the Municipal Districts please put that
12 on their agendas?

13 CATHAOIRLEACH: Sean do you want to come in on that?

14 DIRECTOR QUIRKE: Chairman, the - at the moment there are the pilot areas that are being in
15 each Municipal District that were recommended by each Municipal District committee. They're
16 being put in place at the moment and then as an overall review of speed limits within the county
17 to happen during this year. So that will afford the opportunity for each Municipal District to
18 feed into that. I think rather than anybody jumping the gun and getting on and looking at it now,
19 we will do it as part of the overall review during the current year.

20 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay, great, item number three in the name of Cllr Ruttle. "Wicklow
21 County Council calls on the Minister to amend the control of dogs legislation with particular
22 reference to the term effective control. This needs to be strengthened to mean the dog being on a
23 lead in public open space. This would curb attacks on sheep and in some cases humans."

24 SECRETARY: "This matter has been brought up previously and at the last session I attended it
25 was discussed in detail and the Department indicated they have no plans at present to amend the
26 control of dogs legislation at that time. Enforcement of change like this would also be an issue,
27 for example if it was enforced on public lands, who would enforce it on private lands or the
28 uplands? About a year ago we met with the Uplands Council and the IFA and discussed the
29 matter of loose dogs in rural areas and particularly sheep kills. Private landowners must take
30 appropriate measures to control loose dogs. The dog wardens raised their profiles at public
31 car parks and reminded dog owners of their responsibilities ... as soon as the individuals
32 commenced their walks, dogs were normally allowed off leads. Dog wardens cannot insist an
33 individual puts a dog on a lead." (Quoted).

34 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay Cllr Ruttle.

1 Cllr RUTTLE: It's disappointing but just to put it in context, this motion emerged from meetings
2 at SPC level and they wanted to put it at Cllr Mitchell's SPC with regards to dogs worrying
3 sheep and in some cases killing sheep. Those involved in the farming community are acutely
4 aware of what can happen and the savagery of these events where flocks are attacked and those
5 that are killed are killed and those that survive will probably never breed again and are maimed.
6 We are near large urbanised populations where people come out into the lower uplands where
7 greenland ends and mountain land begins. People tend to come, unleash the dog on the hill or
8 those regions and this term effective control could mean that a guy said he can control him with
9 his voice but when they get together in packs or start running around, that won't happen. My
10 motion would request that that would mean when dogs would be in areas like that, they would be
11 on a lead essentially and be controlled. The idea that you can't police something as an excuse for
12 not doing something is defective. It's a great source of concern to people, it affects people's
13 livelihood when dogs attack and in this county there have been a lot of such attacks. We would
14 be under particular pressure because of large proximity of urban areas where dogs would be --
15 the numbers of dogs in this country quite frankly, I know chipping is coming in in July, but the
16 number of dogs in this county and country is absolutely huge. And when they get on the move,
17 the most innocent dog can become a total killer with a pack of other dogs, and leave that
18 situation.

19
20 I think efforts was made there, I couldn't hear fully, but on private land you are meant to control
21 dogs yourselves.? That essentially means that a farmer, if he sees somebody walking on his
22 land, he is meant to A initially request try and get a lead and catch him. At this point and time
23 he has run 30 and 40 sheep around the field or into the ditch. I know on the other side if you
24 find sheep worrying, you are entitled to get your gun and shoot the dog. But that doesn't always
25 work in a context where families could be out. I think that's a bit glib. I think the responsibility
26 should lie with the owners of dogs to control them effectively in an area where they're affecting
27 other people. At the end of my submission there, my motion, I also said that even humans have
28 been attacked. I know a farmer in my own area at Manor Kilbride who met a man who had gone
29 walking in the forestry who had been attacked and was bleeding very badly by dogs on the loose
30 from people who had gone up an hour earlier. That kind of general also large dog, vicious dogs
31 running around. I certainly would look for the support of the rest of the Council that this term
32 effective control would mean that dogs in those circumstances are essentially on a lead to protect
33 - thank you.

34 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Doran.

1 Cllr DORAN: I just want to fully support Cllr Ruttle in that. We have that problem every year.
2 And it's coming up to the time of year now again, we have the lambing season coming on and
3 people are working hard to look after their sheep, and you put them out in the field and then you
4 have this. And as Cllr Ruttle mentioned there, private land, like why should we have to control
5 dogs that are neither licensed nor on leads or anything else, and look after them on private land.
6 I know the way that we look after them anyway, there would be no more problems.

7 Cllr RUTTLE: Two barrels!

8 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you Cllr Doran. Cllr Cullen.

9 Cllr DORAN: I don't think that's the answer and we shouldn't have to do that. It's a very lame
10 excuse.

11 CATHAOIRLEACH: We are finished now.

12 Cllr DORAN: Coming on to private land is a different thing. Shoot the man as well.

13 Cllr Shay CULLEN: I would like to agree with Cllr Ruttle, but I suppose it's try and educate the
14 public is the biggest issue here and as Cllr Doran said, we are coming into a time of the year with
15 lambing over the next few months and I am just wondering would it be wise to try and get some
16 publication into our monthly magazine to - for next month, with regards to the lambing season
17 and control of dogs, and basically just keep the public informed of their responsibilities.

18 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay thank you. Cllr Snell.

19 Cllr SNELL: Thanks Cathaoirleach. Unfortunately, I want to supported this but I think the
20 wording of it's wrong. We just had a long discussion in regards to the Murrough in Wicklow
21 Town and it's a public open space, and but the wording on this would mean that all dogs up there
22 would have to be on leads, which is a bit contradictory to what dog owners would want and what
23 they're effectively using at the moment. I think it all boils down to responsible dog owners.
24 Irrespective, this is more to do with the uplands, and like if you have irresponsible dog owners in
25 the uplands, by and large what's happening to the sheep is there is no dog owners present when
26 the sheep are attacked. So all the signs and motions and everything else in the world will have
27 no effect, because the dogs can't read the signs. It's the dog owners we need to affect. And
28 unfortunately this is going to be right across County Wicklow, so therefore it will have an effect
29 on the beaches, the public open spaces, which Wicklow County Council are responsible for
30 many, many public open spaces and if it's brought in in its current wording, I feel that I couldn't
31 support it. But I would like to support the uplands.

32 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay, great, thanks, Derek I know you are about to go - are you on this
33 now or...

34 Cllr MITCHELL: They certainly seem to have a significant problem and a growing problem and

1 I have tremendous sympathy with them. I think it's dreadful. While it's not an excuse, I think
2 we just don't seem able to control anything with dogs in this country. Very few of them are
3 licensed, it's illegal to have an unlicensed dog. The dog dirt around the place is everywhere.
4 And we don't seem to be able to fine people who do it. I don't know why we can't do it. And so
5 we have a serious national issue about not being able to control dogs and fine people who allow
6 them do the wrong thing. But I would also not like to see a compulsory leads in all public open
7 spaces, certainly in some places people take their dogs for a walk off the lead and maybe wooded
8 areas or something and it's quite reasonable to do so. So I don't think that's the right instrument.

9 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Fox.

10 Cllr FOX: Thanks Chairman, I am conscious you want to move on. Unfortunately a lot of sheep
11 kills are not happening when the owners of the dog are walking with them as well. A lot of them
12 are coming from urban areas unassisted.

13
14 But just do we have an outdoor recreation strategy? A couple of years ago I think this Council
15 put together an outdoor recreation strategy. And in it, it included measures for example where
16 there was signs telling people not to leave valuables in cars, and surely we can in high amenity
17 areas, in close proximity to sheep, we can consider signage urging people to take effective
18 control of their dogs. Because the problem here is this has an impact where we are trying to
19 develop walkways and we are finding resistance and reluctance from landowners. And it's
20 because of this. It's because issues like no control of dogs, and that is what is worrying
21 landowners and then there is opposition to creating further recreational walks and so on. So it is
22 - it's not just an issue about sheep. It has knock-on effects and I know Cllr Matthews and myself
23 were trying to develop a walk newspaper the Sugar Loaf and it's one of the first things that came
24 up with some of the landowners. So it is important, but I would say the outdoor recreational
25 strategy is the tool.

26 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay, Cllr Walsh finally.

27 Cllr WALSH: My understanding is the situation as described by Cllr Ruttle is covered by
28 legislation under control of dogs act. And that landowners and - are liable for allowing their
29 dogs to be not under effective control. Maybe it's a matter we could bring up at the next joint
30 policing...

31 Cllr DORAN: We are not talking about landowner's dogs. We are talking about the public's
32 dogs that are let loose and come on to our land.

33 CATHAOIRLEACH: The suspension of standing orders, Derek you wanted to raise.

34 Cllr MITCHELL: I wanted to raise this as a suspension of standing orders. Wicklow supplies

1 80 or 90% of water for Dublin. There is a public consultation thing going on at the moment with
2 Irish Water which ends on 3rd February and I think it's important that this Council makes a
3 submission to - officially makes a submission, I as Chairman of the roads and environment
4 committee will be making a submission myself; but in that, this is - seemingly not about
5 Wicklow, this is about taking the Shannon water and supplying Dublin with water in the future.
6 But there is in that a section where a community gain, where they suggest that the community
7 should gain from the provision of water from the Shannon area to this area or the Dublin area.

8
9 Now we for 150 years have been providing this water to Dublin and we should make a
10 submission demanding that we get community gain for this water. Now if we look at it, going
11 back 150 years from the foundation of the Vartry reservoir, there was a community gain for
12 County Wicklow in this, in that Bray and Greystones got free water from the people who set this
13 up. And that went on for a good 100 years. About 2009, it changed when councils were
14 required by Government legislation to pay for water. We had to pay Dublin for our water,
15 paying about 900,000 a year for Bray and Greystones and maybe some other water. And that
16 lasted until 2014 when the Local Government fund was abolished and replaced by - for the
17 Council in 2015 by the Local Property Tax.

18
19 So it now seems that we are not getting any community gain for the water which we are
20 supplying to Dublin and I think we should lobby quite strongly and in particular get in with the
21 consultation process for the Shannon water scheme where Irish Water publicly acknowledges
22 that a benefit would be needed. If it was applied - the very outline suggested amount there is one
23 cent per cubic metre of water supplied. If that was applied to Wicklow, we would get about 1.8
24 million extra. I suppose it's not realistic to think we would get as much as that, but I think we
25 should make a very strong point to try and get this and lobby the Minister for environment and
26 find out - I am asking the Council officials also to provide the facts about how much our Local
27 Government grant was increased in 2009 or '10 and what's happened that now that the Local
28 Government grant seems to have been abolished.

29 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Behan.

30 Cllr BEHAN: Well Cathaoirleach, I want to compliment Cllr Mitchell on his perception there of
31 noticing that this particular aspect has been included in this Shannon idea of the but Cllr Mitchell
32 made a statement there that for a long time Bray and Greystones were getting the water free from
33 Dublin Corporation. But in fact Irish Water are now getting the water free for Dublin from
34 Wicklow. I know they're processing it but they're actually getting it free as well. And I don't

1 disagree with the thrust of Cllr Mitchell's argument. I just wonder can we extend it and broaden
2 it into an even greater claim for compensation for the fact that this county is providing the
3 natural resource which is then obviously manufactured into drinking water, potable water but in
4 fact the resource is coming, as it from the Shannon, it's coming from Wicklow. So I think - I
5 congratulate Cllr Mitchell on spotting this. I think we could maybe expand it a little bit and
6 could we make an even greater claim than he might already have in mind.

7 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Ruttle.

8 Cllr RUTTLE: I want to compliment Cllr Mitchell again on his forensic work on this. It's a pity
9 Cllr Cullen was gone. It was his Mastermind subject for years! But yeah, I agree with you,
10 certainly it's a huge opportunity, it's an opportunity because if that goes for the Shannon, it must
11 go for Blessington and Vartry as well, two huge suppliers of water. And if could be, as Cllr
12 Behan said, even extended. There are other issues besides the water, certainly in my area, it's a
13 huge impact on the community since 1940 when it happened, there are other issues of isolation,
14 planning difficulties, of roads, land that was taken for forestry value and when people appealed
15 it, they got less and my own family lost a good farm under that lake. So I have personal
16 knowledge of what happened there. But certainly it should be pursued because if the Shannon
17 people, although I think it's quite ironic that when the proposal to take water from the Shannon
18 came up, there was huge protests meeting and very aggressive and when we look at what's
19 happened in the last few weeks, it's amazing that the amount of water would have been taken at
20 that point in time was miniscule in relation to the deluge now. But certainly this is an
21 opportunity, if that is on the table, albeit put in because of a sweetener to try and make it more
22 palatable to those in the Shannon basin they want to take water off, they might have a different
23 attitude now at this point in time, but certainly from the point of view of what happened in
24 Vartry in 1884 and 1940 or so, at Blessington, there is an element there of - maybe you are not
25 talking - we are not talking here about buying water per gallon. We are talking about a rate of a
26 compensatory amount. I don't think you will get to sell it per gallon, but if we can do and
27 extrapolate that Shannon proposal in that scheme on to ourselves, it would have my total support
28 because of the fact that virtually all the Dublin water, except some of the North Dublin water
29 comes from us.

30 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Vance.

31 Cllr VANCE: Chairman, what Cllr Mitchell is saying is correct. Irish Water attended the last
32 meeting of the Midlands East regional authority and they did indicate I think as a sop to all the
33 members, there was 12 counties that are represented in that in regard to this type of scheme that
34 they were talking about, bringing up from the Shannon. Now it's probably slightly different

1 because they're taking it from the Shannon, further down the Shannon. After Ardnacrusha I
2 think rather than before it, which they were doing before, but they did indicate that there was
3 going to be, or there could be community gain and I would suspect that was done for to bring all
4 the local authorities on board. And effectively at that meeting, I can tell you now there was full
5 support. Generally full support for this particular project, because it's going to be servicing all
6 the counties on the way up as well. And it's a totally different scheme than what they were
7 talking about building a huge big reservoir in Offaly as well. That's not going to happen with the
8 new scheme, they say that it's going to be delivered directly cleaned, filtrated just nearly on site.
9 And delivered more or less all along the way up. First of all I agree that we should write and
10 demand that we be included in this community gain for a start. But it would be no harm I don't
11 think that if we could invite a member or members from Irish Water, they did attend the regional
12 authority meeting in this regard, to a Council meeting in this regard as well. But the
13 consultation...

14 CATHAOIRLEACH: So we are all in favour of Cllr Mitchell's proposal.

15 Cllr VANCE: Absolutely.

16 Cllr RUTTLE: Did you actually read the document?

17 Cllr MITCHELL: I did, it's quite big.

18 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Casey, the issue of the car park, on the N11.

19 Cllr CASEY: This is in relation to what happened this morning on the N11. There was two
20 serious road accidents on the N11 -- one was at Coyne's Cross, which was a five car pile-up; and
21 the other was near Ashford where a car was overturned. I believe the weather conditions did play
22 a part in that. I also believe that if this was under our watch, we would be getting slated for it at
23 the moment, but this is now completely privatised. It's my understanding the road was gritted
24 last night at eight o'clock. And was not regritted again until 7.30 this morning. In the meantime
25 there was either a rain shower or a thaw, which froze again on it. If that had happened on our
26 watch, there would be war about it. Now we are dealing with a private firm and a private
27 contractor. Does anybody know exactly what did happen or what was the case in relation to the
28 N11 this morning?

29 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr O'Neill.

30 Cllr O'NEILL: Just on the - are we finished with the Notice of Motions? I got the ball rolling
31 here today, and I have been trying it for a while and I have a motion -- I have a motion number
32 nine there, and I am going to lose me seat very quickly if I don't get it on the agenda.

33 CATHAOIRLEACH: Sean.

34 DIRECTOR QUIRKE: Thanks Chairman. Yeah, as you said Cllr Casey, we haven't been

1 involved in maintenance for winter or otherwise on the N11 since 2013. There were incidents
2 there this morning. We have been in touch with GSJ, who are the maintenance contractor for it
3 who advised us they gritted at 8pm last night and they gritted again this morning at 7.30 I think.
4 This was probably following the incident that it happened. The forecast for last night was for
5 low temperatures between plus two and minus three. So you have got to make a call on that as
6 to when you go out. They made a call they'd go out last night at 8pm. We actually made a call
7 we would go out at 3am. Now we got it more right than they did. The lowest temperatures
8 forecast were plus 2 to minus 3. And were forecast to be coldest inland in the south and the east.
9 So what actually happened seems to have been something different or slightly different from that
10 in relation to the N11. I am not sure what all the factors were, that I am sure temperature was a
11 factor, I think driving habits or driving was also a factor in it, I think the speeds might have been
12 excessive this morning where people should have been taking care. But as I say, we have raised
13 the issue with GSJ and passed on - we actually did get some complaints as well because people
14 still do think that we do the N11 but we don't and we have advised them that we don't and we
15 have passed on the complaints to GSJ and the NRA or TII.

16 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Fitzgerald.

17 Cllr FITZGERALD: Just to make the point that we are coming into a period, if the weather
18 forecast is right of sustained frost and ice and whatever else, and I find it probably incredible that
19 if you put out - you go out at 8 o'clock at night, it was raining in Arklow if I remember last night
20 at 8 o'clock, I don't know what it was like on the N11 and then go back at 8 o'clock in the
21 morning, I would imagine like the County Council used to do it, they were out there before the
22 traffic moved and listening to the people on the radio this morning, there were a lot of aggrieved
23 motorists this morning. One woman described it quite rightly she says I am here an hour and ten
24 minutes in the one spot and people vent their fury wrongly at the County Council because it's the
25 responsibility of the NRA now and the contractor. And that wasn't quite - I mean the weather
26 change - was very changeable yesterday and last night and overnight but I mean I contrast that to
27 what our Local Authority staff did, in the Arklow area they were out there dealing with the
28 matter and other - but I mean I think really they'd want to get it, because as I say we are facing
29 into a difficult period, as I say the weather forecast is not great for the next few days, and they
30 certainly want to get it right tonight because the tailbacks this morning people trying to get to
31 work, now I do take the view that some people go out there and drive at excessive speeds and
32 they think because there is a 120 kilometre speed limit on that road, they do it. I noticed when I
33 was coming up here earlier on this morning a lot of people were driving slower having listened
34 to the radio and people coming in ringing the radio. So look it, it needs to be looked at. I know

1 it's not Wicklow County Council's responsibility but you have an input into it and it needs to be
2 looked at to get it right, because if they don't get it right, there will be a lot of fatalities on the
3 road.

4 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Casey.

5 Cllr Casey: Just a point of clarification, I was lead to believe these roads, I am not talking about
6 local and regional roads, motorways, were fitted with sensors that relayed the temperature of the
7 road back to base. If that's the case, why wasn't the alarm raised?

8 DIRECTOR QUIRKE: Yeah, there are sensors in various parts of the road, but like the forecast
9 had issued last night was for rain showers to be confined in Atlantic coastal areas, that probably
10 didn't happen. It happened here as well. And the temperature that was forecast, the lowest
11 temperature was for 7am this morning. So if you - look I can't, I can't justify what GSJ did one
12 way or the other but it seems to me they made their decision on the basis of the forecast they had
13 and went out at 8 o'clock last night.

14 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr Winters.

15 Cllr WINTERS: Thanks Cathaoirleach, just to ask the Director where do we express our
16 displeasure with the decision that was made? I mean who do we contact in the NRA or who do
17 we contact in the private company to say look you made a wrong call last night and we would
18 like to know how you made your decision and what it's based on and why are we listening to all
19 these very angry people and looking at a five car pile-up at one stage? So who do we go to.

20 DIRECTOR QUIRKE: We have already passed on to TII and to GSJ, we have done that
21 already.

22 Cllr WINTERS: That's you, but how do we as public reps do it?

23 DIRECTOR QUIRKE: Well it's TII and GSJ.

24 Cllr WINTERS: Just send them an email?

25 DIRECTOR QUIRKE: Yeah.

26 CATHAOIRLEACH: I don't think it's a bad idea that we include something in our countywide
27 to let people know it isn't our responsibility, because we get the bad PR when it goes wrong. We
28 have about a minute and a half to go, I am happy to take another Notice of Motion Gerry.

29 Cllr CASEY: Quick Gerry.

30 CATHAOIRLEACH: Item number four.

31 Cllr BRADY: Cathaoirleach, can I propose that we take item number nine there, motion number
32 nine, Cllr O'Neill was anxious to ...

33 CATHAOIRLEACH: Are all members happy that we go to number nine?

34 Cllr WINTERS: Yeah.

1 Cllr DORAN: The only thing that I can see wrong with that, there is two at least Councillors
2 from the West not here.

3 Cllr VANCE: That's their problem.

4 Cllr WINTERS: That's their problem.

5 Cllr VANCE: To be fair now, it's not their problem when we decided...

6 Cllr BRADY: It is, it's before 5 o'clock.

7 Cllr VANCE: Cllr Brady, when we decided the suspension of standing orders was on at 4.30 to
8 five o'clock. So people might have gone home feeling that this, if they wanted to discuss it, you
9 know what I mean, I am just saying, that it wasn't coming back, the Notices of Motion were
10 finished at 4.30. All I am saying to be fair to people.

11 CATHAOIRLEACH: I know, it is a reasonable point.

12 Cllr O'NEILL: To be fair to West Wicklow, I mean there has been important stuff here today
13 discussions, but 99% of them were to do with East Wicklow, and I feel a bit frustrated that we -
14 it's a very important motion there, it's about land that the Cathaoirleach himself visited there
15 some time ago. It's important that we get some agreement on the area, the six acres, there is a 32
16 acre site there which was bought by Wicklow County Council 13 years ago, it's lying there at the
17 moment. There is over 500 kids playing soccer in the town. At the moment they have a pitch
18 out a mile and a half outside the town which is a dangerous stretch of road. There has been two
19 fatalities there over the years and all they're looking there is for an 18 year lease that they can
20 avail of any grants that's around. It's also important that what I would be proposing there would
21 be that it's just a six acre site there of the 32 acres. Also part of that area was known for light
22 industry. There is already land in the area, and it hasn't been taken up on by anyone for sale. So
23 there is no real need there at the moment for light industry. There is plenty of need for housing
24 and I - the plan that I am talking about which I have discussed with (INAUDIBLE) there would
25 be more area for housing the area and also to do the extension of the graveyard. And, so, I
26 would be very anxious that we would agree that that 500 acres, or rather six acres would be
27 given to Blessington AFC on at least an 18 year lease.

28 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay, the response here is actually a very long and detailed response, so
29 if it's okay, we will circulate it to everybody so that that covers the Councillors that aren't here
30 and we can discuss it the next day because it's obviously to do with the Blessington town plan.

31 Cllr O'NEILL: And it will be on this agenda next week?

32 Cllr RUTTLE: That's the 1st of February.

33 Cllr BRADY: Get a push on it so it's an agenda discussion item.

34 Cllr VANCE: Why can't it go on the Blessington Municipal -- why can't they sort it out there

1 and make a recommendation then to the Council here.

2 Cllr O'NEILL: I brought it up several times and I was advised to bring it here. I was informed
3 today we the County Council, we tried to build another 16 houses (INAUDIBLE) Irish Water
4 have put a stop to that recently, they're not going to...

5 CATHAOIRLEACH: Cllr O'Neill, I'll put it on the agenda for next month, is that okay?

6 Cllr RUTTLE: In fairness Cathaoirleach, could we guarantee that it happens on the 1st of
7 February?

8 CATHAOIRLEACH: I'll put it on that agenda and I'll guarantee it happens.

9 Cllr RUTTLE: It can't be Barracuda-ed out like we were the last time.

10 CATHAOIRLEACH: Protocol is on now followed by the launch at 5.15. Thank you members.
