## 2. Heritage Appraisal

A Heritage Appraisal of the County Development Plan 1999 was undertaken in conjunction with The Heritage Council. This appraisal highlighted areas that were adequately dealt with in the 1999 Plan, and advised on areas that should be strengthened in a revised Plan in order to safeguard the conservation of heritage.

## 3. Vision

The Council will seek to conserve, protect and enhance Wicklow's built and natural heritage and landscape where possible. The Council will facilitate the production and implementation of a County Heritage Plan in association with the Wicklow Heritage Forum, as a mechanism to achieving this aim.

## 5. Strategy

The natural environment of the County contains areas that are particularly sensitive, unique or rare. The designation of such areas is intended to provide protection for such habitats. The wooded appearance of County Wicklow is an important component of its distinctive landscape. Tree preservation orders are an important mechanism used by the Planning Authority to protect trees and woodlands.

The built environment of Wicklow is an important part of the County's identity and character. Wicklow has a unique archaeological heritage that is of County as well as National importance. This is reflected in the abundance of archaeological sites and monuments found in the county ranging from Early Bronze age right through to Christian and Medieval eras. The later built architectural heritage includes demesne houses and associated features as well as a rich vernacular heritage, closely linked to Wicklows' stone-cutting tradition.

The Council recognises that County Wicklow has a unique and valuable heritage. It is the aim of the County Development Plan to conserve and protect this heritage, and enhance it. The Council is committed to working with other statutory and non-statutory bodies with the aim of conserving the natural and built heritage of the County for the benefit of all.

The following principles guide the Council's heritage objectives and policies set out in the County Development Plan.

- Avoid negative impacts upon heritage.
- Promote enhancement of heritage as a key principle to every development.
- Ensure that all developments include adequate provisions regarding mitigation of impact upon heritage.

## 6. Policy

### 6.1 – NATURAL HERITAGE

#### 6.1.1 – LANDSCAPE CATEGORISATION

County Wicklow has been categorised by landscape. Having regard to vulnerability, assimilative capacity and development pressures these categories have been organised into development control landscape zones. See Map 3 A – F and Schedule 10.1.

##### a) Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty Zone

The A.O.N.B. zone encompasses those areas which are most vulnerable and sensitive, and which are considered to be of greatest scenic value. These areas tend to be under severe development pressure. It contains

- the central mountain area including the Wicklow Mountains National Park
- the Great and Little Sugarloaf Mountains and Bray Head in north-east Wicklow
- the Glencree and Glencullen river valleys in north-east Wicklow
- the Poulaphuca reservoir area adjacent to Blessington
- the entire coastal area of the County.

The central mountain area extends from the County Dublin border in the north to Aughrim in the south and from the Glen of Imaal in the west, to Roundwood in the east. One of the main characteristics of this area is its mountainous topography, with its deep U-shaped valleys, lakes and glacial topography.

The northern hills category relates mainly to the Great and Little Sugarloaf Mountains and to Bray Head. The summits of the Sugarloaf Mountains are conspicuous by the absence of any significant vegetation cover, but otherwise, heather, bracken and grasses predominate.

The Poulaphuca reservoir area category generally relates to the area around Poulaphuca Reservoir and extends into Sorrell Hill. The reservoir zone is dominated by the lake, views onto and from the lake and by lake type vegetation. To the east and south, land is more mountainous with attractive views and montane vegetation.

The Glencree and Glencullen valleys about the County Dublin border. The category is based around the valleys of the Glencree, Glencullen, Cookstown and Dargle Rivers and the surrounding road network.

The coastal area category covers, for the most part, the area of land between the sea and the road nearest the coastline. South of Wicklow town are the main sandy beaches such as Brittas Bay and Clogga Beach.

For Bray Head refer to Table 10.1. below which indicates acceptability levels for any land use in the greenbelt area. The extent of the Bray Head Greenbelt Area is shown on Map No. 12.

### **b) Special Amenity Zone**

This landscape zone encompasses those areas which, whilst not as vulnerable nor as sensitive as those areas in the A.O.N.B. zone, are still subject to pressure for development which could result in a serious deterioration in the landscape quality. The sensitivity of these areas is made more pronounced by the fact that they act as an effective “gateway” to the more remote and wild upland areas and because the more ameliorative nature of the landform ensures that there is greater development pressure. It contains the North Mountain Lowlands, the South Mountain Lowlands, the Baltinglass Hills and the Southern Hills.

The rolling undulating terrain of the hills around Baltinglass distinguishes the Baltinglass Hills category. Possibly the greatest source of pressure affecting this category relates to the existence of important archaeological remains and monuments. This archaeological wealth must be protected for its heritage value as well as tourism potential.

The southern hill area differs significantly from the other mountainous sub-zones. It generally follows the 300 m. (1000 ft.) contour line and is in three distinct areas, namely

- (a) the mountainous leg from Moylisha running north-west of Shillelagh, Tinahely and Aughrim,
- (b) the Croghan Mountain area south of Aughrim and Woodenbridge and
- (c) the Kilgavan Gap and Hillbrook area.

### **c) Rural Area Zone**

Mainly the area of land lying under the 130m. (400-ft.) contour line determines the rural area landscape zone and the landcover associated with it. It is located along the western and southern extremities of the county. The western segment is adjacent to County Carlow and extends from south of Baltinglass to Ballyconnell. The southern segment is adjacent to County Wexford and extends from Raheengroney to Coolboy and inland to Aughrim. Whilst the landform, to some extent, corresponds to that found in Carlow and Kildare, it differs considerably in that, relative to their elevation, this land can be described as gently rolling and undulating and could really only be described as low-lying when compared to the rest of the terrain in Co. Wicklow. The area is very rural and is characterised by only a few small towns and villages.

### **d) Access Corridors Zone**

This landscape zone covers the main access corridor areas of County Wicklow. The boundaries generally follow what is considered to be the areas upon which the greatest influence is exerted by these access routes. These routes, for the most part, run through the more low lying and accessible tracts of land and connect the major towns. There are two distinct areas, each with their own different attributes. The Eastern Corridor relates mainly to the lowland area of influence of the N.11 road. The Western Corridor is focused on the N.81 road from Dublin, through Blessington on towards Baltinglass. These corridors are under intense pressure from residential and other sporadic development.

**Policy HL1:** The Council will ensure that the development of Wicklow takes full account of the Designated Landscape categories and the protection of their amenities and assets.

In particular when considering planning applications the Council will take full account of the objectives set out in relation to residential, tourism and other rural development set out in Chapters 3, 11, and 12, of the Plan.

## **6.1.2 – LANDSCAPE CONSERVATION**

The landscape of Wicklow is a reflection of past and present natural, physical, social, and economic activities. Due to settlement patterns and proximity to large urban populations, the landscape particularly in the North East of the county may be deemed vulnerable to development pressure, which threatens its intrinsic character.

**Policy HL2:** The Council shall support efforts to identify and designate vulnerable landscapes in the county as Landscape Conservation Areas in order to safeguard their character. The Council supports the designation of Bray Head as a Special Amenity Area Order (SAAO).


## **6.1.3 – DESIGNATED WILDLIFE AREAS.**

County Wicklow has a rich and diverse natural landscape containing such habitats as upland bog and heath, fen, woodland, rivers, lakes, cliffs, dunes and coastal areas, many of which are recognised as being of local, National and E.U importance, and are designated under National and/or E.U legislation<sup>28</sup>. In total County Wicklow contains 1 National Park, 15 Special Areas of Conservation (SAC), 5 (proposed and candidate) Special Protection Areas (SPA), 34 proposed Natural Heritage Areas and 6 Nature Reserves. See Schedule 10.2, 10.3, 10.4 and 10.5 and maps 5, 6 and 7.

**Policy HL3:** The Council will have regard to the designated areas for wildlife that are located in the county including any additional or alterations that occur to these designations throughout the lifetime of this plan. The Council will facilitate the protection of these areas from any development that would adversely affect their conservation value.

**Policy HL4:** The Council will ensure that any development proposal in the vicinity of, or affecting in any way a designated area, provides sufficient information to show how its proposals will impact upon the designated area, and will include proposals for appropriate amelioration. In all such cases, the Council shall consult with the National Parks and Wildlife Section of the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government (DOEHLG).

The Council will have regard for any changes to the boundaries of these sites which occurs during the lifetime of this Plan and include proposals for appropriate amelioration (in accordance with articles 6{3} and 6{4} of EU Habitats Directive). The Council will consult with National Parks and Wildlife section of the DOEHLG and Eastern Regional Fisheries Board on any such ameliorations proposals considered appropriate.

### **6.1.4 – WICKLOW MOUNTAINS NATIONAL PARK**

The Wicklow Mountains National Park, one of six in Ireland, was established in 1991. It is managed by the National Parks and Wildlife Section of the DOEHLG, and occupies approximately 20,000 hectares of the county. The National Park is covered by SPA and SAC designations.

**Policy HL5:** The Council recognises the natural heritage, and amenity value of the National Park, and shall consult at all times with National Park management regarding any developments likely to impact upon the conservation value of the Park, or on issues to do with visitor access.

### **6.1.5 – VIEWS AND PROSPECTS**

**Policy HL6:** It is the policy of the Council to preserve views and prospects as identified in schedule 10.6 / 10.7 to protect the natural beauty of the County.

### **6.1.6 – GEOLOGY**

The Council recognises the value of identifying and protecting sites and features of geological importance, which are non-renewable elements of Wicklow's heritage.

**Policy HL7 Sites of Geological Importance:** The Council will protect the Sites of Geological Importance as listed in schedule 10.9. from inappropriate development that would adversely affect their existence, or interpretation, and shall ensure that where development is allowed, its effect on the listed site is minimised through the retention of an appropriate buffer zone.

**Policy HL8 Geological Natural Heritage Areas:** It is an objective of the Council to protect Geological Natural Heritage Areas (NHAs) that become designated during the lifetime of this Plan.

**Policy HL9 Proposals involving significant ground excavations:** The Council will consult with the Geological Survey of Ireland as it deems necessary, when dealing with any proposals for major developments which will entail 'significant' ground excavation, such as quarrying, road cuttings, tunnels, major drainage works, and foundations for industrial or large buildings and complexes.

**Policy HL10 Geo-Tourism:** The Council will support efforts by the Geological Survey of Ireland, and other interested bodies regarding promotion of the interpretation of geological heritage in Wicklow, and will encourage the development of a "Wicklow Rock Trail", Geopark or other similar geo-tourism initiatives.

### **6.1.7 – SPECIES PROTECTION OUTSIDE OF DESIGNATED AREAS**

**Policy HL11:** The Council shall seek to identify, protect and conserve, in co-operation with the relevant statutory authorities and other groups, vulnerable, rare, and threatened species of wild fauna and flora and their habitats.

Regard will be given to species listed in National and European legislation, and processes, international conventions, agreements and processes. Furthermore regard will be given to other available information such as the Important Bird Areas (IBAs) Inventory available from Birdwatch Ireland.

### **6.1.8 – HABITAT PROTECTION OUTSIDE OF DESIGNATED AREAS**

**Policy HL12:** The Council shall seek to identify, protect and conserve, in co-operation with the relevant statutory authorities and other groups a representative sample of the county's wildlife habitats of local or regional importance, not otherwise protected by legislation.

**Policy HL13:** The Council will seek to protect and enhance wherever possible wildlife habitats such as coast, cliff, dunes, rivers, streams, lakes, bog, fen, marsh, scrub and woodland, field boundaries (hedgerows, ditches and stone walls) which occur outside of designated areas. Taken as a whole, such features form an important network of habitats and corridors which allow wildlife to exist and flourish.

### **6.1.9 – WATER QUALITY AND DEVELOPMENT**

The Council recognises that a high quality natural environment is needed to protect and enhance groundwater resources, and to ensure a high quality water supply for the future.

**Policy HL 14:** The Council will discourage proposals for development that are in, or would interfere with the natural flood plain.

### **6.1.10 – BIO-DIVERSITY ENHANCEMENT AND DEVELOPMENT <sup>29</sup>**

The impact on bio-diversity, of proposals for large developments, particularly those in Greenfield sites, or in environmentally sensitive areas will be assessed. Any such developments where they do occur, will include measures for the enhancement of bio-diversity.

<sup>29</sup> Biodiversity means the diversity, or variety, of plants and animals and other living things in a particular area or region.



**Policy HL15:** The Council will ensure that the impact of new developments on bio-diversity is minimised, and will seek to include measures for the enhancement of bio-diversity in all proposals for large developments.

### **6.1.11 – INTEGRATING BIO-DIVERSITY INTO COUNCIL ACTIVITIES**

The Council will consider, in accordance with The National Bio-diversity Plan (2002), the integration of bio-diversity into all Council activities.

**Policy HL16:** The Council will produce a County Bio-Diversity Plan during the lifetime of this Plan.

### **6.1.12 – TREE PROTECTION**

The Council will seek to preserve and enhance the amenity and natural beauty of the County by preserving in so far as possible, that part of its appearance attributable to trees, woodlands and hedgerows. The Council will discourage the felling of mature trees to facilitate development, and will encourage tree surgery rather than felling where possible. (See Schedule 10.10 – existing tree preservation orders and map 10 and 11).

**Policy HL17:** The Council will promote the protection of trees, in particular native and broadleaf species, which are of conservation, and/or amenity value. Development that requires the felling of mature trees of special interest, even though they may not be listed in the Development Plan, will be discouraged.

**Policy HL 18:** The Council will consider the making of Tree Preservation Orders (TPOs) to protect trees of high value, where it appears that they are in danger of being felled.

### **6.1.13 – HEDGEROW AND STONE WALL PROTECTION**

**Policy HL19:** The Council will encourage the protection of hedgerows and stone walls which are important features of traditional farming practices, which provide a unique corridor habitat for wildlife and which contribute to the visual amenities of the countryside. In particular the Council will expect all new developments to comply with the requirements for the protection of hedgerows and field boundaries and the inclusion of same within the overall development in Chapter 5 Design and Development.

### **6.1.14 – LEGACY OF DEMESNE PLANTING**

A sizeable proportion of the forestry estate in Co. Wicklow consists of the remains of old demesne planting. In addition to being a forestry resource these are also of significant amenity value.

**Policy HL20:** The Council will safeguard the legacy of demesne planting in the county. While it is recognised that some of these deciduous woodlands are managed on a commercial basis, it is nevertheless desirable to resist the clear felling or felling to a scale which subjects the remaining trees to windthrow or prevents their regeneration.

### **6.1.15 – NATURAL HERITAGE EDUCATION**

The Council has a role to play in promoting initiatives aimed at raising awareness of natural heritage.

**Policy HL21:** The Council shall promote initiatives aimed at increasing knowledge and awareness of wildlife species and habitats in the County.

### **6.1.16 – ACCESS TO AMENITY AREAS**

\*The Council is committed to ensuring that access by the public to amenity areas is retained.

**Policy HL22:** The Council will protect and preserve access routes to amenity areas generally.

**Policy HL23:** The Council will encourage the provision of access routes to amenity areas with consultation with National Parks and Wildlife service and in co-operation and agreement with landowners and will protect such areas from inappropriate development infringing upon accepted access routes.

### **6.1.17 – COMMONS AND SIMILAR HILL LAND**

**Policy HL24:** The Council will preserve the open character of commons land and similar hill land and secure access over paths and tracks through consensus with local landowners, particularly in mountain areas.

### **6.1.18 – COASTAL ZONE MANAGEMENT OBJECTIVES**

**Coastal Zone Management Plan:** The Council will control development in the coastal zone in accordance with the objectives set out in the Coastal Zone Management Plan. (See Maps 35A and 35B and Appendix 1).

**Sand and Gravel Removal:** It is a control objective of the Council to ensure that there is no removal of sand dunes, beach sands or gravels through application of the provisions of the Foreshore (Amendment) Act, 1992, in close co-operation with the Department of the Marine.

**Land Reclamation:** The Council will ensure that no reclamation of estuary land or coastal marshland occurs which would damage coastal habitats.

**Development Close to Soft Coastlines:** The Council will protect both public and private investments by prohibiting any new building or development (including caravans and temporary dwellings) within 50 metres of 'soft shorelines' as defined by Map 35B.

**Development Close to Sea Level:** The Council will ensure that no new habitable structures shall be permitted below 3 metres (O.D. Malin) in the interest of public safety and the protection of property and residential amenity

*\*Wicklow County Council established an Interim Committee to deal with the issue of Public Rights of Way and Access Routes. This Committee reported back to the elected members in June 2005. The members adopted the report and recommendations proposed by the Committee. These recommendations are to be incorporated by way of variation to the County Development Plan – the proposed variation was advertised on 14/07/05.*

## 6.2 – BUILT HERITAGE

### 6.2.1 – ARCHAEOLOGY

County Wicklow has a rich and varied archaeological heritage, consisting of monuments, structures, groups of structures and moveable objects as well as their contexts, whether situated on land or under water. The Council will ensure that features or items of archaeological interest, and recognised areas of archaeological potential are protected and preserved from inappropriate development that would adversely effect and/or detract from the interpretation and setting of these sites.

#### Recorded archaeological monuments and places

**Policy HL25:** The Council will have regard to the Record of Monuments and Places (RMP) in dealing with planning applications for development or threats to items recorded. No development in the vicinity of a recorded feature will be permitted, where it seriously detracts from the setting of the feature or which is seriously injurious to its cultural or educational value. In all such cases the Council shall consult with the National Monuments Section of the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government (DOEHLG).

#### Archaeological assessment requirements

**Policy HL26:** The Council will ensure that proposed developments that may due to their size, location, or nature have implications for the archaeological heritage, are subject to an archaeological assessment. Such an assessment will ensure that the development can be designed in such a way as to avoid or minimise any potential effects on the archaeological heritage. In all such cases the Council shall consult with the National Monuments Section of the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government (DOEHLG). Proposals for development which are likely to have an impact upon archaeological heritage, for example those in riverine, intertidal and sub-tidal environments shall be subject to archaeological assessment.

#### Archaeology and development

**Policy HL27:** When dealing with proposals for development that would impact upon archaeological sites and/or features, the Council will promote a presumption in favour of the 'preservation in situ' of archaeological remains and settings, in accordance with government policy.

Where permission for such proposals is granted, the Council will require the developer to have the site works supervised by a competent archaeologist. In all such cases the Council will consult with the National Monuments Section of the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government (DOEHLG)

#### Areas of archaeological potential or significance

**Policy HL28:** The Council will have regard to the Areas of Archaeological Potential or Significance when dealing with planning applications for development. Where permission is granted, the Council will require the developer to have the site works supervised by a competent archaeologist. (See map 13, schedule 10.13).

The Council will seek advice from the National Monuments Section of the DOEHLG regarding the identification of archaeological landscapes, where there appear to be areas containing several recorded monuments.

#### Major Sites of Archaeological Importance for Wicklow in State Ownership or Guardianship.

**Policy HL29:** In considering all applications, the Council will ensure the preservation of all National Monuments which are in state ownership and guardianship in County Wicklow, and all monuments which are the subject of Preservation Orders. (Schedule 10.14).

#### Unknown archaeological sites and objects

**Policy HL30:** The Council will ensure that provision is made through the development control process, for the protection of previously unknown archaeological sites and features where they are discovered during development works. In all such cases the Council will consult with the National Monuments Section of the Department of the Environment, Heritage and Local Government (DOEHLG).



**Awareness of, and access to archaeological heritage**

**Policy HL31:** The Council will seek to increase awareness, appreciation and enjoyment of the archaeological heritage, through the provision of information to landowners and the community generally in co-operation with statutory and other partners.

**Policy HL32:** The Council will facilitate public access to National Monuments in state care and to those in Local Authority ownership.

**Graveyards**

Many graveyards in County Wicklow are of historic and/or archaeological importance.

**Policy HL33:** The Council will seek to protect archaeological sites and objects where they occur in graveyards.

**6.2.2 – ARCHITECTURAL HERITAGE**

Wicklow has many structures and features, which may not be Protected Structures, but may nonetheless be of value for visual, historic, cultural and/or artistic reasons, and hence are worthy of protection. The Council will seek to identify and protect these buildings and to have them included on the Record of Protected Structures or in Architectural Conservation Areas as appropriate.

The architectural heritage of Wicklow forms an intrinsic part of the character of towns, villages and rural areas, and consists of buildings, structures and landmarks. The Council will seek to protect architectural heritage from inappropriate development, enhance existing areas of high architectural value, and promote good design standards at all times.

**6.2.2.1 – RECORD OF PROTECTED STRUCTURES**

A protected structure is a structure that a Planning Authority considers to be of special interest from an architectural, historical, archaeological, artistic, cultural, scientific, social or technical point of view.

The Council will implement Part IV of the Planning and Development Act 2000 relating to Protected Structures, in accordance with Government policy and guidelines<sup>30</sup>, in keeping a register of Protected Structures and will make additions/deletions to this register as appropriate, in consultation with the National Inventory of Architectural Heritage (NIAH).

In relation to a protected structure or proposed protected structure, the meaning of the term structure includes the interior of the structure, the land lying within that curtilage and their interior, all fixtures and features which form part of the interior or exterior of that structure. The protection also extends to any features specified as being in the attendant grounds. The record of protected structures is illustrated in Schedule 10.15 and maps 14A and 14B

**Policy HL34:** The Council will seek to acquire further information about the architectural heritage of the county, and will make use of this information to inform future RPS and ACAs in the County.

**Policy HL35:** The Council will keep a record of protected structures in the County, and will make additions/deletions to this list as it deems appropriate during the lifetime of this Plan.

**6.2.2.2 – STRUCTURE**

**Other buildings and structures of architectural merit**

Wicklow has many buildings and features, which, although not given Protected Structure status, are of high visual, historic, cultural and/or artistic interest, and are hence worthy of preservation. Such structures contribute significantly to the character of towns, villages and countryside.

**Policy HL36:** The Council will encourage the protection, appreciation and appropriate revitalisation of the architectural heritage of the county.

**Policy HL37:** The Council shall encourage the retention and development of the traditional skills base in County Wicklow, in particular the stone cutting tradition.

**The Military Road:** Ireland's only purpose built Military Road transects the county, originally running from Glencree to Aghavannagh. The road dates from 1800 and is a unique feat of engineering, much of it remaining intact.

**Policy HL38:** The Council will have regard to the historic significance of Military Road and associated features when planning for any developments likely to effect the roadway, or the carrying out maintenance and repair work.

**6.2.2.3 – DEVELOPMENT AFFECTING PROTECTED STRUCTURES**

Planning permission is required for any alterations which affect the architectural, historic (or other) features of the structure or building, or for any proposals to demolish a Protected Structure.

**6.2.2.4 – ALTERATIONS TO PROTECTED STRUCTURES**

**Policy HL39:** The Council will ensure that alteration to, or extension of, protected structures will only be permitted if the proposal is in keeping with the character of the structure.

### 6.2.2.5 – CHANGE OF USE OF PROTECTED STRUCTURES

**Policy HL40:** The Council will require sufficient information to be submitted in order to facilitate a full consideration of the potential impacts of proposals for the change of use of Protected Structures.

**Policy HL41:** The Council shall only consider the change of use of Protected Structures, if it can be shown that the structure, character, appearance and setting will not be adversely affected.

### 6.2.2.6 – RE-INTRODUCTION OF TRADITIONAL FEATURES

In areas where limewash or roughcast render are traditional, their reintroduction on listed buildings will be permitted where there is evidence that such finishes previously existed. Likewise, the re-introduction of traditional doors, windows etc. may be considered acceptable by the Council.

### 6.2.2.7 – DEMOLITION OF PROTECTED STRUCTURES

**Policy HL42:** The Council will strongly resist the demolition of any Protected Structure, unless satisfied that exceptional circumstances exist. In cases where demolition or partial demolition of such a structure is permitted, or where permission is given for the removal of feature(s), the proper recording of the building will be required before any changes are made. In all such cases, the opinion of the DOEHLG and other relevant bodies will be sought.

### 6.2.2.8 – ARCHITECTURAL CONSERVATION AREAS

The objective of ACAs is to preserve the character of places, areas, structures or groups of structures which when grouped together are of high architectural, historical, archaeological, cultural, social, technical or scientific interest, or which contribute to the appreciation of Protected Structures.

The Council has established ACA's in the following towns and villages:

**Enniskerry**

**Tinahely**

**Dunlavin**

**and proposes and ACA in Blessington**

ACAs contribute to the revitalisation of the fabric of towns, villages and rural areas by supporting their aesthetic value, giving them a distinctive identity, and thus make a positive contribution to local economies and tourist potential.

The Council will consider the designation of ACAs for towns and villages in County Wicklow, when preparing future Local Area Plans, and as deemed appropriate.

**Policy HL43:** The Council shall ensure that development in Architectural Conservation Areas will be controlled in order to protect, safeguard and enhance their special character and environmental quality.

**Policy HL44:** Within Architectural Conservation Areas, all those buildings, spaces, archaeological sites, trees, views and other aspects of the environment which form an essential part of their character, will be protected.

**Policy HL45:** The design of any development in Architectural Conservation Areas, including any changes of use of an existing building, should preserve and / or enhance the character and appearance of the Architectural Conservation Area as a whole.

Schemes for the conservation and enhancement of the character and appearance of Architectural Conservation Areas will be promoted.

In consideration of applications for new buildings, alterations and extensions affecting Architectural Conservation Areas, the following principles will apply:

- Proposals will only be considered where they positively enhance the character of the Conservation Area.
- The siting of new buildings should, where appropriate retain the existing street building line.
- The mass of the new building should be in scale and harmony with the adjoining buildings, and the area as a whole, and the proportions of its parts relate to each other, and to the adjoining buildings.
- Architectural details on buildings of high architectural value should be retained wherever possible.
- A high standard of shopfront design relating sympathetically to the character of the building and the surrounding area will be required.
- The materials used should be appropriate to the character of the area.

Planning applications in Architectural Conservation Areas should be in the form of detailed proposals, incorporating full elevational treatment and colours and materials to be used.

### 6.2.2.9 – INVENTORY OF ARCHITECTURAL HERITAGE

The DOEHLG has organised the first county wide inventory of architectural heritage to be carried out for Wicklow. It is expected that this inventory will be completed during the lifetime of this Plan, and will provide valuable information to the Council when making planning decisions.

**Policy HL 46:** The Council supports the work of the National Inventory of Architectural Heritage (NIAH) in collecting data relating to the architectural heritage of the county, and in making this information widely accessible to the public, and property owners.

## 6.2.2.10 – INDUSTRIAL AND MINING HERITAGE

Wicklow has a rich legacy of mining and industrial heritage the evidence for which may be found throughout the county.

The Council will consult with such groups as the Industrial Heritage Association of Ireland, and the Irish Mining Heritage Trust with regard to the identification of features of interest.

**Policy HL47:** The Council will have regard to structures, sites and objects which are part of the county's industrial heritage, in particular features which relate to former mining and and/or transport activities.
