I beg leave to inform your Board that the three cases of Scarlet Fever I reported last month there has been one death two having quite recovered. There is one fresh case remaining in Hospital. The Township otherwise is free from sickness of an infectious nature. I wish to bring under your notice the state of Coates Lane it would require repairing as the sewer that runs through it is exposed for want of covering. The Water Tank on Ballyquile road require some protecting work to be done to the man hole in the roof of it so as to prevent it being made a place of deposit for all sorts of filth. The pump opposite the jail is out of order it would require some trifling thing to be done at the Lower Puckes. The Public pumps were well attended to during the month. The Scavenger was attentive to his duty I inspected a number of houses and premises and served five notices under the Public Health Act.

The ordinary monthly meeting of the members of the Board took place here this day at 12 noon. Present Messrs. T. Delahunt presiding. P. Law. Mr. McCabe. P. O'Brien. J. McCarroll. A. Doolittle. J. Hamilton. Garrett Byrne. D. Kennedy. C. Murray. Gerald Byrne. W. J. Shryne. J. Chapman.

Mr. Thos. Gregory having subscribed to the Statutory Declaration subsributed for oath required by Act 9. Geo. the 4th and taken his seat at the Board.

Mr. McCabe enquired the area of the Wicklow Urban Sanitary district and if it included Rathnew as he was under the impression it did and he desired to call the Urban Sanitary authority to the disgraceful condition of the Cemetery there and trusted that the Commr. as the urban Sanitary Authority would when in a better financial position ~~will~~ take action to provide a new Cemetery suitable for Wicklow & Rathnew. The Chairman having informed Mr. McCabe that the village of Rathnew was in the Rural Sanitary district and having undertaken to bring the question before the Rathdown Board of Guardians who were the Rural Sanitary Authorities at an early date the matter dropped.

Read report from Mr. Hallinan referring to the dangerous condition of a chimney of a house occupied by Mr. Mills & Mrs. Parke Abbey St. and recommending its being repaired or removed.

Resolved that ~~Lord~~ ~~Gibson~~ the owner be written to concerning it.

The Medical Officer of Health also drew attention to a defective sewer at College St. and directed to report the matter to the Managing Committee.

Read Sub-Sanitary Officer's report which ran as follows.

I beg. leave to inform your Board. that the Township is free from sickness of an infectious nature. As the time for putting out the Seats on the Marborough is approaching and as they require painting I would ask your Board for an order to have it done under the direction of your Chairman. During the month the Public Lamps were well attended to and the Scavenger was attentive. I inspected a number of houses &c. and served 5 notices under the Public Health Act. I served the Medical Officer with the usual notices. I have handed 8 to your Secy. for Marborough

The Contractor of the Waterworks reported that the water in the reservoir had gone down six feet 9 m. while this time last year there was one inch of an overflow. After consideration it was decided to have water turned off each night at 6 P.M. and turned on at 6 a.m.

Read Anderson report as follows. Dalkey 26 March 1887

Gentlrs. I have the honour to report to your Board that I have audited the accounts of the Town Commr. of Wicklow for the year ended 31st Decr 1886. I transmit an abstract of the accounts which shows that there was 9..12..8. in the Town Clerk's hands for Petty Cash purposes at the beginning of the year and that the Commr received during the year 1690..3..0 making together 1639..15..8. It also shows that the Expenditure under the various heads of account including balances due to the Treasurer and the amount at the end of the preceding year amounted to 2169..18..1 leaving at the end of the year under audit a balance of 14..2..3. in the Town Clerk's hands for Petty Cash purposes and balances on the Treasurer and the Agents a/c's amounting to 574..14..8

The rents received during the year amounted to £1134..4..8 being a falling off to the extent of £136 on the average receipt of the preceding three years. A large portion of this sum upwards of £100 has however been received since the 1st of July last and will go to increase the current year's income. The Commr. made a rate in December 1885 at 1/- in the £ which with £16 payable by the Chemical Co. for the year 1886 amounted to 420..19..4. The arrear of previous rates outstanding at the beginning of the year amounted with £15 due by the above Co. to £17..9..5 the two sums making £38..8..9 of which there was collected and lodged with the Treasurer £466..10..8 leaving outstanding arrears on the 31st Decr last amounting to £1..18..1. The Commr. should at an early date scrutinize the list of outstanding arrears of each rate from the making of the first rate on the Town and ascertain the arrears which for good and sufficient reasons cannot be recovered and so declare by resolution on their minute Payment of the remaining arrears those deemed collectable should be obtained by the present Collector who appears to be an active and efficient officer. I have again to refer to the absence of security for the Collector and to point out that in case of default which I think it only right to state I have not seen any reason to anticipate the Commr. would be personally liable to make good the amount sec. 30. & 9th sec the 4th Cap. 82 leaves no room for doubt on this point. The Collector's Bond when obtained should be deposited with the Treasurer or the Town Clerk for safe keeping. I have in former reports suggested the propriety of obtaining security from the Town Clerk for money entrusted to him for Petty Cash but nothing has been done in the matter. I disallow as illegal a charge of £100..16..0 made by the Treasurer as interest on advances to the Commr. for

over-drafts for current <sup>ordinary</sup> expenses and debited against them on the account. The Treasurer the National Bank should place that sum to the credit of the Comms. in the Bank Pass Book and thereby render unnecessary further action in the matter. The accounts of the Town Clerk and the Agent were kept and presented for audit in a satisfactory manner.

Reference was also made to a statement appearing in the Wicklow News letter respecting the reduction of rents offered by Mr. Gregor, <sup>rejecting the reduction of rents offered by Mr. Gregor</sup> that the creditor had considered that the Comms. had not acted legally in granting the reduction but the matter resulted in ratifying the resolution adopted on the 7th March. That Miss Gregor obtain an ~~allowance~~ of 25% on the years rent due and ending the 25th March 1884 and on the understanding that the Agent act in conformity with that resolution. Applications for reduction of rent were ~~sent~~ from Messrs. Pearson & Drury, Glynn & Garrell & Son and Mr. Ellen Kavanaugh Market Sq. and were referred to the Managing Committee to inspect buildings as well as holdings coming into possession of the Comms.

Read letter from the Comms. of Irish Public Works in reference to Railway organization & Extension which was also referred to the Managing Committee.

Read managing Committee's report for previous months as follows

Wicklow 24 March.

The Managing Committee met this afternoon and inspected Coats Lane the defective fountain on the quay and made the following recommendations thereon. That the Sub. San. Officer execute temporary repairs to Coats Lane and that the Sec. be directed to communicate with the County Surveyor respecting the necessity of constructing a paved channel through High St with reference to the fountain the Committee are of opinion that the pipes at present lying in the County Hotel be utilised to carry off refuse water to the River and regarding the tank at Ballyquile they authorized the Sub. San. Officer to report more fully by next meeting on the matter. On the motion of Mr. Amilton the report was adopted and order made that fountain referred to be repaired.

Read proposal from P. Breen to clean the streak for the ensuing month for the sum of £3. 10.-0. On the motion of Mr. Carroll his services were accepted.

Pursuant to previous notice Mr. Strype drew attention to the very arbitrary manner in which the grand jury had thrown out the presentment for a new bridge across the river Liffey and instead directed the County Surveyor to patch up the old bridge at an expenditure of £600. He considered that they were simply throwing away the ratepayers money and some steps should be taken immediately to prevent them destroying the navigation of the river and the future progress of the Township. After discussion it was resolved now on that we protest in the strongest manner against the decision of the grand jury to expend £600 of the ratepayers money in an experiment of holding up the stone bridge by piling and paving across the river which would be most injurious to the prospects and fishing industries

of Wicklow and this in the face of the direct opposition to the wishes of the Townspeople. Expressed by the resolutions of the Town Commr. and Public Meeting. And further we call on the Harbour Commr. as the Custodians of the Harbour to prevent the decision of the grand Jury being carried into effect. Copies of this resolution to be sent to the Harbour Commr. and County Surveyor
