The Medical Officer of the Workhouse saw the patient on his admission, and also attended him for about an hour before his death which took place before 5 o'clock the same day.

An Inquest was held by Mr. Jones forner, on Monday when the following verdict was given—That John Keogh died in the Shillelagh Hospital on the 25th June 1882 from inflammation of the lungs in three hours after his admission and no blame is attributable to any person.

Letter read from the Local Government Board with reference to a Resolution passed at the meeting of the Board of Guardians on the 22nd Instant to request that they may be informed for what reasons the Guardians do not consider it at present necessary that Blinds should be supplied for the Fara Hospital and Infirmary of the Workhouse.

With reference to the subject of the foregoing letter the Guardians desire to observe that considering the Windows appear to have been hitherto without Blinds & no apparent injury to the patients they consider

it unadvisable to supply them now, especially so, from the present low financial condition of the Union.

Letter read from the Local Government Board for Ireland to state that they have had before them the Abstracts of Rates collected and lodged in the Shillalah Union to the 23rd Ultimo, from which they observe that the attendance of the Collectors for the examination of their accounts is still very irregular; and that the Board must again call the Guardians' attention to previous correspondence on this subject and must request them to be so good as to give specific directions to each collector to submit his books to the Clerk of the Union for examination "not at the latest in every fortnight" as required by Article 47th of the General Regulations. The failure in this point

of any Collector to attend upon the date upon which he may be required to do so, should be reported by the Clerk to the Board of Guardians at their next meeting following, and such report and the Resolution thereon entered on the Minutes of the Guardians' Proceedings.

It appears that Collector Burke made no lodgment during the week ended the 2nd, 9th, and 16th Ultimo respectively, but retained in his hands a sum of £87, during that period in direct violation of the requirement of Article 47th of the General Regulations and in disobedience to the express directions which have been given by the Guardians, in reference to the lodgment of Rates collected in the Union; and the Board have again to call the Guardians' attention to their letters of the 11th January and 18th April last on this subject.

As regards the state of the Collection, although the time allowed for its completion expired on the 22nd March last, a sum of £884, or more than two-fifths the entire Rate remained outstanding on the 23rd Ultimo, Collectors Doyle and Feil having collected only £582 and £642 out of £855 and £1018, the amounts of their respective Warrants; and in view of the fact that there is a balance of £571 against the Guardians at foot of the Treasurer's account, the Board must request the Guardians to require the Collectors to bring the Collection to a satisfactory state without any further delay, should there be any continuance of the neglect hitherto manifested. The Guardians should consider the propriety of instituting proceedings against the Collectors, who may be guilty of such neglect, upon their bonds.

With reference to the subject of the foregoing letter the Social Rate Collectors having attended before the Board received directions in accordance therewith; and Collectors Doyle and Feil have since lodged £582 and £642 respectively.

A letter was read from Mr. Epps to state that during the absence of Mr. Epps she had received a letter from the Board and saying that at present she could not go over his accounts and was unable to arrive at any settlement, but that she would be personally responsible for anything which may be due to the Board until all arrangements as to costs are settled.
