1 COUNCILLOR WHELAN: Present. 2 MS PURCELL: Councillor Caroline Winstanley? 3 COUNCILLOR WINSTANLEY: Present. 4 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Helen, for everything. 5 So colleagues, we have a three-item agenda of which I am going to oversee the first 6 one. Just before I carry out my last duty as Cathaoirleach --7 COUNCILLOR DUNNE: Cathaoirleach just before you start there, do you mind if I 8 come in for a minute? 9 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Dunne, yeah, good to hear you. 10 COUNCILLOR DUNNE: Thanks. I think you hear a lot from me. 11 I would just like to congratulate Wicklow Rovers on winning the quadruple yesterday. 12 They won the Wicklow cup. I think it was a great honour for the club, the players and 13 the management, and I would like to take this opportunity to wish them well for the 14 future. I would also like to congratulate Wicklow on beating Westmeath yesterday in Aughrim. We are now in the semi-finals of the Tailteann Cup against Limerick in 15 16 Croke Park next week. And finally, Cathaoirleach, I'd like to thank or congratulate 17 the ladies' football team in Wicklow. They beat strong Monaghan team yesterday by 18 a point. It wasn't that long ago Monaghan were in All Irelands and a special to 19 (inaudible). So thank you. Cathaoirleach, I wasn't trying to take your thunder there. 20 I appreciate you letting me in. 21 CATHAOIRLEACH: No problem. Thank you very much, Councillor Dunne. 22 We'll all echo those sentiments. Please pass on our congratulations. 23 Colleagues, just before I carry out my last duty as Cathaoirleach and oversee the 24 election of a new Cathaoirleach, will you please bear with me for a little bit longer as I 25 say a few words before I depart the stage. 26 27 So I would like to start by thanking Councillor Stephen Stokes, Councillor Silvester 28 Bourke for proposing and seconding me at last year's AGM and to all my fellow 29 councillors who voted for me on the day. I would also like to genuinely thank all the 30 Elected Members here, whether you voted for me or not. I want to say thank you for 31 being so polite, courteous and respectful towards me, not just in the chamber, but any 32 time I met you in your district and beyond. Because you worked so well with me 33 during the year and the respect you showed me, we got through our Council meetings with minimal fuss and I am proud to hand over a clean slate to my successor. We managed to get through the LPT meeting, the budget and two Local Area Plans as and from this morning, plus all our Council meetings, as I say, with minimal fuss. Now, I'm not saying we agreed on everything, but we certainly worked well as a unit and carried out our duties in a polite and professional manner which made my job so much easier. As we all know, though, last year's AGM was particularly difficult, especially for Councillor Dunne, his family, my family and myself. There's no secret that Councillor Dunne and I are great mates and our families know each other going back generations. Even though he was disappointed with the outcome, Councillor Dunne rang me after the AGM and offered me his wholehearted congratulations and said I had his full support and if I ever needed any advice he would be there for me. True to form, Councillor Dunne gave me great advice throughout the year, sometimes when it wasn't even sought. Gail, I know this has been a difficult year for you personally, but I just want to say thank you for all that invaluable advice but more importantly thank you for being a true friend. I know the Chief Executive cannot be here today, but I know I speak for all of us when I wish her a full and speedy recovery, and we look forward to seeing her back in this chamber at our next meeting. I want to pay tribute to the Chief Executive who pledged her full cooperation when I

was elected and to the entire Executive who have worked tirelessly with us all
throughout the year. It is a pleasure to work with such a positive, progress, dedicated
Council.

And anyone that knows me knows I like to finish on a 26 quote, so as Nelson Mandela once said: "Do not judge me by my success, judge me 27 by how many times I fell down and got back up again." 28 Thank you very much. 29 (Applause.) 30 Councillor Stephen Stokes 31 COUNCILLOR STOKES: Thank you, Cathaoirleach, for those very excellent 32 words. And thank you for your outstanding service. At all times you carried 33 yourself with great distinction and represented County Wicklow with honour at so

many functions. Of course you also made a wonderful opening chess move at last 2 year's Bray Rapid Play Championships. And, you know, the meetings here were 3 usually seamless, which is a credit to you, because sometimes the best referee is the 4 one that isn't seen. And I believe that is a testament to your leadership.

- 14 COUNCILLOR BOURKE: Cathaoirleach, on behalf of the Fine Gael group I would just like to offer our deepest gratitude and thanks to you personally for the tremendous 15 16 work that you did in representing not just us but everybody in the county over the past 17 year. You were very fair and objective and got through your agendas very, very 18 efficiently and we salute you for that. You represented extremely well, not just at 19 home but abroad, and we witnessed that in Würtzburg on a couple of occasions during 20 the year. I think that everybody could unequivocally say that they were very proud to 21 have you as their Cathaoirleach. So we wish you the very best for the future and 22 thank you for all your hard work and great achievement. Thank you.
- 23 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor. We will go online, Dr Dermot 24 O'Brien.

25 COUNCILLOR DERMOT O'BRIEN: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. I just want to 26 congratulate you on the year. As I watched from the wings, the biggest take away for 27 me would be the skill that you have shown, the facilitation of the role to facilitate 28 meetings and work through an agenda, and I think I saw somebody who was able to 29 navigate moments of tension, moments of passion, moments of conflict. And what I 30 would say is that the through line of the whole year was you were committed in 31 principle to everyone having their say, and I certainly felt that and experienced that 32 myself. So you have my gratitude for that and my congratulations for the year that 33 you've had. Thanks very much.

1 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor. Councillor Tom Fortune. 2 COUNCILLOR FORTUNE: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. Can I just say on behalf of 3 myself and the Independent group, really congratulations on a really, really good year. 4 I think you did everything very, very professionally and very fair. You gave 5 everyone, you know, a fair thing. And as you say yourself, you gave the role your all. 6 I have had the experience of joining you on a number of occasions at different 7 functions and different things, and I must say you always represented both yourself 8 and your role in the county extremely well and for that I say thanks very much. So on 9 behalf of the group, best of luck in the future, and well done on a really, really good 10 year. 11 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you very much. Councillor Gail Dunne online. 12 COUNCILLOR DUNNE: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Thanks, Cathaoirleach. On 13 behalf of the Fianna Fáil group I would like to thank you for all the work you put in 14 this year. In fairness the nicest thing is how the meetings ran, you had your 15 homework done, before every meeting you were prepared and ready to go and you 16 finished all of the meetings on time. On a personal level, I'd like to thank you for all 17 the help that you have given me for what has been probably the most difficult of my 18 life, and even the fact you brought me to the hospital and brought me home which I 19 very much appreciated. So I wish you, Paul, the very best and remember there's an 20 old saying you're only as good as your last thing. Best of luck going forward. Thank 21 you. 22 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor. Councillor Winstanley. 23 COUNCILLOR WINSTANLEY: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. On behalf of the 24 Social Democrats group we would like to thank you, Paul, for your excellent work as 25 Cathaoirleach. You carried out the role with fairness, professionalism and a genuine 26 commitment to the community. We appreciate the time, energy and care you brought 27 to the position and we wish you the best for what's next. 28 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor. Councillor Lourda Scott. 29 COUNCILLOR SCOTT: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. I want to add to the 30 congratulations on a great year you've had as Cathaoirleach. Councillor O'Brien, it 31 will be great to have you here on the backbenches with us. I want to commend you 32 really on your handling of yourself and your position during the year and particularly

the way you chaired the meetings. You did it with ease and made a very, very

1 difficult role look very simple and very easy. We all know, I think from our 2 experience sitting around here, it is far from that. I know any time I have met you 3 either outside of the chamber on a personal level or at official functions, you've always 4 been incredibly approachable, you've made your point to talk to everybody that's been 5 present, and I would say certainly would bring no airs and graces to the role and that's 6 a good thing. So thank you for all of your hard work. Thank you for steering the 7 meetings so well, particularly when there were points of contention, and I wish you all 8 the best in the future years.

9 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you very much, Councillor. Councillor Graham10 Richmond.

COUNCILLOR RICHMOND: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Just I suppose as a
 member of the Wicklow Municipal District, it's just again to echo those

congratulations, and they're deserved. And the one thing, it's the humanity and
fairness you took at every meeting, the fact it was well prepared. And like, the fact
that everyone is saying it was controlled or whatever. But to be honest there was no
need because you set the tone. Thank you. And let's see what you do next. All
right. Thank you.

18 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor. Councillor Peir Leonard online.

19 COUNCILLOR LEONARD: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. Can you hear me?

20 CATHAOIRLEACH: Yeah.

21 COUNCILLOR LEONARD: Good. No, I just want to thank -- sorry about my 22 audio problems earlier on, but I just again want to echo what everybody said about 23 you. You were always very pleasant and fair in the role. It is a tough job up there, 24 but you made it look really easy and I wish you well for the next year. I know being 25 in that position, it takes away from a lot of work on the ground, but you covered a lot of 26 the county and it is important to see and gain that knowledge of what goes on around 27 the county. I know we met and spoke about that the other day. I want to thank you 28 again and wish you the best for the next year. You can relax a little bit.

29 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor. I wish. Councillor Mulhall.

COUNCILLOR MULHALL: Yeah, thank you. I'd just now like to wish you all the
best as you finish up your term as Cathaoirleach. It's been a real pleasure working
with you over the last year. I think as a new councillor, I found you to be fair,
approachable and always willing to share your time and insight. I think qualities that

1 made a real difference. So well done on a great year. Thank you. 2 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor. Councillor Peter Stapleton. 3 COUNCILLOR STAPLETON: Yeah, likewise, as a new councillor I suppose I had 4 no one to judge you against but I imagine like so many other firsts in life, you'll never 5 forget your first, and I'll definitely remember you with very fond members and 6 admiration for the role that you paid up in the chair and also the kindness, I suppose, 7 you showed first-time councillors and the guidance you gave us often times 8 professionally but also professionally in the challenges that the role may present and 9 how we can best work to fulfil our role as councillors. So just a nod of appreciation to 10 that and congratulation on the year and best of luck joining us back here. 11 CATHAOIRLEACH: I'm glad I was your first. But anyway. Councillor Shane 12 Langrell. 13 COUNCILLOR LANGRELL: Cathaoirleach. Paul, a good friend. We came 14 across each other about 20 years ago. You were on the pitch refereeing, I was the 15 manager on the sideline, managing Roundwood AFC, and for whatever reason, I don't 16 know, Paul put me out on the road. He sent me off. So that's the first time I came 17 across Paul. We became good friends, Paul, through a good friend of ours, the late 18 Paddy O'Toole. I suppose I arrived in here, we hadn't spoken for a couple of years 19 due to me stepping away from football and I came in here a year ago, and I have to say 20 you've been an amazing Cathaoirleach. I suppose as Peter says, we can't compare 21 you to anyone else, but anyway. But, Paul, you have been an amazing friend to me 22 this year, to my wife and children as well. Thank you for the support and keeping me 23 on the straight and narrow. That's all I can say, and the very best of luck. Thank 24 you. 25 CATHAOIRLEACH: Very much appreciated. Thank you. Councillor Louise 26 Fenelon Gaskin. 27 COUNCILLOR FENELON GASKIN: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Like all the 28 others have said, as a new councillor I very much appreciate everything and the 29 guidance during the year. I can't say enough thanks for it. And I very much 30 appreciate the AGM last year when you came to me at the end of it and reassured me 31 the year would be a good one, and the year has been a good one and I appreciate 32 everything. And especially I did get to go to Würzburg in March when you couldn't 33 go and it was an honour to do that for you, and your guidance for going on that trip and

1 what I had to do in your place. So thank you for that as well. 2 CATHAOIRLEACH: Danke schön. Councillor Miriam Murphy. 3 COUNCILLOR MURPHY: Thank you, Chair. Again, echoing what the other 4 councillors said, I think your pleasantness breaks down the barrier for people who are 5 nervous sitting up looking. But I think your willingness to be open is something that 6 we all need to have and I think being chair, Cathaoirleach, is an honour whether at 7 district or county level and you're representing people who value what you do and your 8 work ethic. And again through your agendas you researched it, which is very 9 important and I wish you every bit of luck back on the backbench again. Thank you. 10 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor. Councillor Orla Finn. 11 COUNCILLOR FINN: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I just want to reiterate what 12 everybody else has said and say thank you very much. It's been great working with 13 you throughout the year. I have met you at numerous events, those in Greystones and 14 different parts of Wicklow actually, yeah, and, look, it's been great. Any event you've 15 been at has obviously been very well done, very professional, speeches have always 16 been amazing and, yeah, it's just been great to work with you all year. So thank you 17 very much. 18 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor. Councillor Gerry O'Neill. 19 COUNCILLOR O'NEILL: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. Yeah, just briefly, Paul, I want 20 to wish you the very best. We didn't see eye to eye some of the time, but however I 21 think maybe one word would sum you up I think, I found you very helpful. So no 22 matter whether we were agreeing or disagreeing, you were helpful all the time. And 23 even at today's meeting and before it. So the best of luck. 24 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor. Okay. So we will go on 25 now -- sorry, Michael. 26 MR NICHOLSON: Cathaoirleach, just on behalf of Emer O'Gorman, our Chief 27 Executive, myself, the management team and all the staff at Wicklow County Council, 28 indeed the entire Wicklow community, I want to thank you for your year as 29 Cathaoirleach and your management of the meetings, and on the numerous occasions 30 you represented the county and the Council and for the great working relationship 31 throughout the year. I want to assure the new Cathaoirleach, whoever they may be, of 32 the same cooperation working relationship in the year ahead. Thank you very much. 33 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Michael. Just before I go on to the agenda, can I

just say thank you very much for those kind words. As politicians we don't always
 hear them and when we do we get a little bit excited, so thank you very much. I very
 much appreciate it.

So now I go on to my last duty, that's item number 1: The election of a Cathaoirleach section 36 of the Local Government Act 2001, as amended. I am now looking for a proposer for Cathaoirleach. So Councillor Silvester Bourke.

8 COUNCILLOR BOURKE: Cathaoirleach, it is my great honour and privilege to be 9 here today to propose an outstanding councillor, an outstanding woman for this role as 10 Cathaoirleach, I would like to propose Councillor Melanie Corrigan. Melanie is, as 11 you know, into her second term on Wicklow County Council. She's very highly 12 regarded amongst the full Council, particularly so amongst the nine Fine Gael 13 councillors and we would be delighted to see Melanie being elected to the chair of 14 Wicklow County Council. I noticed when I was visiting in Würtzburg during the 15 year a phrase on the election posters of one of the candidates, a female candidate, and 16 it said, "Powerful woman who knows how to get things done." So that could apply 17 just as equally to Councillor Melanie Corrigan as to any of our German counterparts. 18 So I would formally propose Councillor Melanie Corrigan for this role. I think she

19 will be excellent. Her experience and the esteem that she is held in by her

20 community, which I have observed at first-hand at public events in her own districts,

21 reassures me that she will be able to smoothly transition from councillor to

22 Cathaoirleach and continue the excellent work that you have been doing,

Cathaoirleach. And I would imagine her life experience as well will stand us all in
good stead as we conduct business of Wicklow County Council over the next year.
Thank you.

26 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor. Looking for a seconder now.

27 Councillor Lourda Scott.

COUNCILLOR SCOTT: Yeah, thanks, Cathaoirleach. I would be absolutely
delighted to second Councillor Corrigan for this role. I had the pleasure of both
sitting in the chamber with Melanie for the past six years, but also I have served with
her on the DISC Committee and on the Women's Councillor Caucus. I would say
having got to know her a little bit, I would say she is probably not somebody who is
particularly interested in titles. She's very focused on getting results and she's

1	focused on making a difference for people in her community. And that's what I think						
2	would serve Wicklow county very, very well in her role as Cathaoirleach.						
3							
4	I really respect her as a councillor, particularly as a female councillor, and I see her as						
5	somebody who brings people together. She very much listens and respects different						
6	views and will look for common ground to work with people on. I would say, also, I						
7	welcome another female Cathaoirleach in the role, sitting in your own position,						
8	Cathaoirleach. I think bringing that perspective is really important and bringing that						
9	diversity and perspective is really important and sends an important message to the						
10	wider people in the county. So I am absolutely confident that she will do an excellent						
11	job in the role. As I said, I am very honoured to second her.						
12	CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. I don't see any other lights coming on. So I						
13	have to ask, Councillor Corrigan sorry, I beg your pardon. Councillor Gerry						
14	O'Neill.						
15	COUNCILLOR O'NEILL: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. Yeah, I'm coming in here 11						
16	year now, elected 11 year, and it's the same action every year, year in year out,						
17	Tweedledee and Tweedledum, Fine Gael, Fianna Fáil. I know Fianna Fáil are						
18	dwindling in a big way, I think there's four of them, and Fine Gael are hard winning so						
19	much. But I honest to God think that, you know, as a Council we should start						
20	thinking a little bit different. That there are genuine people in here, genuine people						
21	who are good people and are quite capable of doing, of chairing Wicklow County						
22	Council. And I think it's time that we						
23	CATHAOIRLEACH: Sorry, Councillor, are you going to propose someone?						
24	COUNCILLOR O'NEILL: I will in a moment.						
25	CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you.						
26	COUNCILLOR O'NEILL: I think we have a chance here of making a change today.						
27	And, you know, whatever about you have the Fianna Fáil, Fine Gael thing every year,						
28	but the hangers-on there that prop them up, they're the people that should really						
29	examine their conscience.						
30							
31	So I am proposing John Snell here. John is in the chamber here 16 year and he has						
32	been a friend of mine. I don't always agree with John said either at times, but anyway,						
33	I think John is a very fair man. I think John does deserve a crack of the whip here. I						

1 would formally propose John Snell. 2 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor. Councillor Joe Behan. 3 COUNCILLOR BEHAN: Yeah, Cathaoirleach, I want to formally second 4 Councillor O'Neill's proposal for Counsellor Snell. He has been a very effective 5 councillor over many years, very popular in the Council and in the community 6 generally. I think he has earned the right to serve as first citizen of this county and I 7 would be very happy to support his nomination. I also want to take the opportunity to 8 congratulate you and thank you for the excellent chairmanship you gave to this 9 Council during the last year. I certainly appreciated your courtesy to me and your 10 understanding of issues and how you tried to resolve them, and I want to say well done 11 to you. I am happy to second Councillor Snell. 12 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Behan, for your kind words and for 13 seconding, Councillor. I have no one else coming online. 14 Councillor Corrigan, you were first up, do you accept the nomination? 15 COUNCILLOR CORRIGAN: Yes. 16 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay. Councillor Snell, you've also been proposed. Do you 17 accept it? Sorry, Councillor Snell, go ahead. 18 COUNCILLOR SNELL: Yeah, thanks, Cathaoirleach. As councillors will know, I

19 didn't speak to any of them in regards to looking for this position. It's a number of 20 times over 16 going into 17 years that this would have happened and on every 21 occasion I would withdraw my name from the Cathaoirleach because I always felt 22 that, you know, I have great respect for the families that are here in the chamber, the 23 Corrigan family. I know Melanie very, very well, and I know she will make an 24 excellent Cathaoirleach. And I spoke at length at last year's AGM, I sort of -- I made 25 my feelings known of how dissatisfied I was that a contest for the chair at last year's 26 AGM. It's something that I never encouraged, even at municipal district level. I 27 believe that, you know, people have served their term as vice chair to go in as 28 Cathaoirleach, or whatever the desired Council, be it full council or municipal. And 29 coming in today I had no intentions of allowing my name to go forward. And I am 30 sort of in a dilemma because I know the outcome. We all know the outcome. But at 31 the same time, I come from a background where, you know, if people felt that they 32 were defeated before they even started you wouldn't get out of bed in the morning. So 33 we know the result. And I think for democracy's sake, it's probably no harm to allow

1 the name to go forward, irrespective. And as I say, it's going against every principle I 2 ever had because I would much prefer to have contested the vice chair, the Leas 3 Cathaoirleach, because, as I say, it is very disingenuous to the family that's here. I 4 know some of the faces there. I've seen Melanie's kids grow up, having been 5 managing teams that contested against them and I know it's not going to ruin the day. 6 I certainly hope it doesn't ruin the day, Melanie, because I think that, you know, I'd 7 serve under your chairmanship on an SPC. I think you're an excellent candidate and a 8 decent person, you come from a highly respectable family. And you're saying why 9 are you allowing your name to go forward; you're talking up the other candidate? 10 Because we know it is a done deal. But, I suppose, if we don't have some level of 11 democracy after what happened last year, last year was probably the lowest point in 12 my 16 years in Wicklow County Council at the AGM. But life goes on. Nobody's 13 fell out. Nobody has died. We will get on with it. And I will certainly work with 14 the new Cathaoirleach of Wicklow County Council. So regrettably I will be leaving 15 my name in, unfortunately. 16 CATHAOIRLEACH: That's your right. Sorry, can I have Councillor Leonard, do

17 you want to propose someone?

18 COUNCILLOR LEONARD: Sorry, no, no, I just wanted to come in and support 19 Councillor Snell. I just wanted to wish Melanie the best. This absolutely isn't 20 personal. Melanie knows I have the greatest of respect for her personally and in her 21 work ethic personally, but just, I just feel it is important that on behalf of the people 22 that I represent I need to make clear why as an independent councillor I can't support 23 any person who aligns themselves with the current political parties and government. 24 While there's certainly things done right in our country that are working well, we can't 25 ignore the many issues that continue to harm the most vulnerable, from the worsening 26 housing crisis to the growing struggles faced by many in our communities who are at 27 most in need. I believe that real change requires independence from party politics 28 and a focus on people over party. That's the commitment I have made to those that I 29 represent and I will be supporting John Snell. Thanks.

CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay. We have two nominations, both have been accepted.
We're going to go to a vote which, by the way, is good because we do live in a
democracy and no matter what is said here today, the majority of democratically
elected councillors will have a say in who is the next Cathaoirleach of Wicklow

1 County Council. Can I call upon Helen to call a vote please. 2 MS PURCELL: So we have two candidates, Councillor Melanie Corrigan proposed 3 by Councillor Silvester Bourke, seconded by councillor Lourda Scott. And 4 Councillor John Snell, proposed by Councillor Gerry O'Neill and seconded by 5 Councillor Joe Behan. 6 If you could say the name of the councillor that you wish to vote for, so when I call 7 your name if you say either "Corrigan" or "Snell" or if you won't wish to vote, you can 8 abstain. Thank you very much. Councillor Corrigan is deemed elected. (Applause.) 10 COUNCILLOR PAUL O'BRIEN: It gives me great pleasure to invite the 11 Cathaoirleach who has received the most votes and the most diverse vote in the history 12 of Wicklow County Council to come up and prise this chain off my neck. 13 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you everybody. And just before we start, I just have a 14 few words I would like to say. Fellow councillors, Deputy Chief Executive, officials, 15 staff, members of the public, family and friends both online and in the gallery, and 16 thank you also to Councillor Burke and to Councillor Scott on their lovely words and 17 kind endorsements for me, proposing me and seconding me. 18

19 It's a huge honour for me today to become Cathaoirleach of Wicklow County Council 20 and I want to thank you all for the support and for putting your confidence in me. I 21 want to assure you that I am committed to working collaboratively with you all in the 22 chamber and everyone across County Wicklow to ensure fairness and inclusivity in 23 our Council and county. I am deeply proud of the county where I was born, where I 24 have grown up and where I have chosen to raise my family and I am proud to represent 25 the people of my community and of Wicklow. I am especially grateful to my family 26 who are here today to support me, my husband Liam, my daughter Rebecca, and two 27 of my sons Billy and Dan, we're missing Eoghan. Thank you for keeping me 28 grounded and always being there for me. My sister Sharon and my father and 29 father-in-law, Harry and Eugene, who have been remarkable role models for me in 30 always working hard for the community, for charity and for being such strong 31 characters. Though my mother-in-law can't be here today, she's always a hundred 32 percent behind me encouraging me. My late mother Muriel who loved politics and 33 would have loved to have been here today. She loved to see women getting more

1	involved in politics. She always said to us growing up: There's no such word as						
2	can't, but to try and keep trying until you succeed.						
3	It was difficult to growing up, but it taught me to work hard and not give up easily and						
4	it is something I tell my own children and hopefully some day they'll thank me.						
5							
6	I want to acknowledge those aren't here present in the Chamber with us today,						
7	including Councillor Dunne and our Chief Executive, Emer O'Gorman. I wish them						
8	both a speedy recovery. And to Councillor Barry, a safe trip home.						
9							
10	I want to extend my gratitude to outgoing Cathaoirleach, Councillor O'Brien for his						
11	exceptional service to the county throughout the last year. His exceptional dedication						
12	has set a high standard for this role and he has left me with big boots to fill.						
13							
14	To Councillor Snell, thank you for putting yourself forward. It's always good to see						
15	democracy and it is not easy putting yourself forward, and we have got to know each						
16	other well over the last couple of years and you're commitment to your Council needs						
17	to be noted.						
18							
19	I am truly looking forward to working with each and every one of you and getting to						
20	know you better and visiting your districts and getting to understand your districts and						
21	the challenges better. Please don't hesitate to reach out to me if there's anything I can						
22	do to assist. As I have already said, it's an incredible honour for me and one which I						
23	do not take lightly, but I am very excited about it and I am looking forward to						
24	promoting our county and working together with both fellow elected representatives,						
25	officials and the community of Wicklow to make an even better place for us all to live						
26	in, work in and visit both now and in the future. Thank you. (Applause.)						
27							
28	So my first duty is to ask for any proposals for the position of Leas Cathaoirleach,						
29	Councillor Stephen Stokes.						
30	COUNCILLOR STOKES: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I don't actually have any						
31	proposals, but I just wanted to congratulate you on your elevation to Cathaoirleach of						
32	the county. I, you know, have come to really respect you as a county councillor and I						
33	have full confidence that you will be a brilliant Cathaoirleach working with						

1 everybody, and I very much look forwarding to working with you. I think it is quite 2 apt that, you know, I think the AILG have circulated an email saying that June is the 3 hundred years of local democracy in Ireland since the foundation of the State, because 4 we had elections in June of 1925, and I must pay tribute to the Fine Gael group because 5 in the last hundred years you have done quite a lot in terms of our democracy in that 6 time. I think that this will be a very hopefully exciting year for you and I want to wish 7 you the very west of success. Go raibh maith agat. 8 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Stokes. Councillor Danny Alvey. 9 COUNCILLOR ALVEY: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I would just like to firstly 10 offer my congratulations to you and best wishes in the year ahead with the role as 11 Cathaoirleach. We are looking forward to working with you in the Social Democrats 12 group for the betterment of everybody in County Wicklow. In terms of nominations 13 for Leas Cathaoirleach, I would like to propose Councillor Caroline Winstanley. 14 Councillor Winstanley has a strong background in disability advocacy having worked 15 with various organisations in this hearing and being a qualified speech and language 16 therapist. Since being elected to Bray Municipal District last year, Councillor 17 Winstanley has contributed very positively to a number of initiatives in her area and 18 worked alongside various community groups. She was also chosen as the chair of the 19 Community and Social Development SPC, currently sits on the CPG and I have no 20 doubt will make a very positive and progressive impact if elected as Leas 21 Cathaoirleach. I think also having an all-female lineup of Cathaoirleach and Leas 22 Cathaoirleach will send a very strong message to the county. Thank you. 23 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Alvey. Councillor Tom Fortune. 24 COUNCILLOR FORTUNE: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Can I just say 25 congratulations and very well done on your election as Cathaoirleach. I think you'll 26 actually be very, very good. And my approach to democracy is that I think it's always 27 very healthy to have a competition. I think that's good. With the role you have 28 ahead of you and the way politics is changing and how the world is changing, you 29 know, it's not an easy role, but I have absolutely no doubt that you will do a super job 30 and you have my full support. 31 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Fortune. Councillor Gerry O'Neill. 32 COUNCILLOR O'NEILL: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. I want to congratulate you as 33 well, but I put my light on I think first there when you mentioned nominations. So I

1 firstly, as I say, I want to congratulate you. But in nominations for Leas 2 Cathaoirleach, I would like to nominate John Snell for this position. It would be 3 sending out that signal to the whole of the county that we're an inclusive group of 4 people and we respect the effort that people put into their work. And I think John 5 with 16 years there, he will get on with everyone in here, I know that. More than I can 6 maybe. If you do -- I absolutely propose John now as Leas Cathaoirleach. 7 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Paul O'Brien. 8 COUNCILLOR PAUL O'BRIEN: Thank you, Cathaoirleach, and I take great 9 pleasure in calling you Cathaoirleach. I want to congratulate you. I know you will 10 do a fantastic job. I left up there making a mistake, because I should have welcomed 11 your family, I know Liam and your family here, it's a very proud day for them. I am 12 sure you will enjoy it later when you get the free strawberries. But I just want to say 13 congratulations. You are going to make an absolutely terrific Cathaoirleach. You 14 made a terrific Leas Cathaoirleach, because you are a lady. You come from great 15 standing. You treat everyone the same. You have a great way about you. I know 16 you won't just represent the councillors in here with dignity, you will represent the 17 entire county as our new first citizen with dignity and I wish you well and you know 18 we're here to support you and congratulations again. 19 20 I'd also like to second Councillor Winstanley for the position of Leas Cathaoirleach. I 21 know Caroline a little bit now in the last year, we've got to know each other and I 22 couldn't think of a better Leas Cathaoirleach for you, and especially what Councillor 23 Alvey had to say. I second Councillor Winstanley. Thank you very much. 24 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor O'Brien, for your kind words and 25 thank you for seconding. Councillor Pat Kennedy. 26 COUNCILLOR KENNEDY: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. On behalf of the Fianna 27 Fáil group we just want to congratulate you. You will be a huge ambassador for this 28 county like the previous Cathaoirleach just gone out, Councillor O'Brien, who was a 29 great ambassador for the county. He led this county with great standing and I have no 30 doubt you will do the same as well. As all the kind words has already been spoken, 31 you carry yourself very professionally Cathaoirleach, and you treat everybody with 32 respect and fairness, and just on behalf of the Fianna Fáil group, you have our full 33 support for the year ahead. Thank you.

1 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Kennedy. Councillor Ian Neary. 2 COUNCILLOR NEARY: Firstly, congratulations. You're going to do a splendid 3 job, a great Cathaoirleach. I would like to second Gerry's proposal of Councillor 4 Snell. John is a man of his word and a man of action and that's what we need 5 nowadays. I would like to second Gerry's proposal. Thank you. 6 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Neary. Councillor Gail Dunne 7 online. 8 COUNCILLOR DUNNE: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I want to wish you the very 9 best of luck in the year to come. It is a busy position and you're going to be very busy, 10 but no better person to take up this role. I am delighted for you and I am delighted for 11 your family. I wish you the very, very best. If I can be of assistance at all over the 12 year, don't hesitate to contact me. Thank you. 13 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Dunne. 29	grateful for the trust you placed in me and I look forward to working with you all
30	genuinely. It is a great privilege in this role and I know I am a new councillor, but I
31	really do want to do my best to represent the Council and I am going to work with
32	fairness and respect for you all.
33	(Applause.)

1 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Winstanley. And Helen wants to 2 come in before we move on to item 3 to agree the schedule of ordinary special 3 meetings for the coming here. 4 MS PURCELL: Just to apologise to the members, the first schedule that went out 5 was incorrect. I had included the LPT meeting in October. The LPT meeting, was 6 agreed by CPG, is going to be part of the July meeting as it is a revaluation year and we 7 have to notify revenue of our decision at the earlier date of the end of August. So 8 there is no LPT meeting in October in that schedule. So just to clarify that issue. 9 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay. So can I ask for a proposer and seconder. Councillor 10 Paul O'Brien and seconded by Councillor Kennedy. So I think that concludes our 11 meeting. Thank you all for coming out today and thank you for the support, and 12 looking forward to working with you all and looking forward to seeing you in July for 13 a very important meeting.
