Donelan M.P., enclosing letter received by him from the Secretary of the Admiralty regarding the case of Mrs Hannah Byrne, Ballymurtagh, whose husband, a stoker in the Royal Navy, had been missing for some months, and who, when the Admiralty allowance had been discontinued to her, had been obliged to apply for outdoor relief. The Local Government Board pointed out that eggs, which had increased from 100 % to 200 % in price, were a most uneconomic article of diet. Butter was another article which had greatly increased in price and for which a cheap and excellent substitute could be found in dripping or good margarine. They further suggested the substitution of ~~bread~~ potatoes for bread in the dinner meal of the inmates, and the reduction of the quantity of sugar from 1 oz. to  $\frac{3}{4}$  oz per pint of tea, coffee or cocoa in the dietary of healthy inmates, and the substitution on Fridays of some other dinner from the printed list of rations in cases where eggs are at present allowed. 
