CARRAIG EDEN WIN MAJOR HOUSING AWARDS

Carraig Eden which provides transitional, supported accommodation to those at risk of homelessness in Greystones has won two Irish Council for Social Housing (ICSH) awards.

The ICSH Allianz Biennial Community Housing Awards showcase the innovative and sustainable social housing projects that approved housing bodies members and local authority partners continue to deliver for communities across the country.

The first award is all about collaboration and this began all the way back in 2016 when Tiglin came to Wicklow County Council for help when the Carraig Eden site was put up for sale and which could have potentially resulted in putting the 30 residents at risk of homelessness.

Wicklow County Council collaborated with the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage and funding was secured to purchase and upgrade the dilapidated building into high quality, modern, independent living accommodation, while at the same time providing them with support from the Tiglin community through the shared living facilities and access to the support team.

Carraig Eden also won the first ever Public Choice Award. This award gives an opportunity for members of the public to stand-up and applaud the project that puts a broad smile on their face, that's awe-inspiring or that makes them feel hopeful about the communities we're building for a more sustainable future.

GREYSTONES SENSORY GARDEN OPENED

Greystones sensory garden was officially opened, in Burnaby Park, Greystones.

The garden is specifically designed as a place of peace and tranquillity with a variety of colours, textures and surfaces to provide visitors with a wide variety of sensory experiences in ways that may not usually be encountered. It provides numerous opportunities to stimulate all the senses and will be of particular benefit to those with sensory processing issues.

ARKLOW MUNICIPAL DISTRICT AWARDED FUNDING FOR ABBEY LANE REGENERATION PROJECT

Arklow Municipal District has been awarded €81,000 from Failte Ireland under the Local Authority Weatherproofing and Outdoor Dining Infrastructure Scheme which will be used to enhance the outdoor dining experience in Arklow.

Abbey Lane was identified as an area of opportunity to become a much-needed outdoor community space within the town centre. It is hoped to transform this under-utilised space into an all-day family friendly, vibrant socialising hub by including a sheltered dining area with lighting and heating, murals, various greening options and some sit and chat areas.

A small decking area will also be introduced for buskers, street performers, poetry recitals, heritage and cultural talks. Local artists and craft designers could also make use of this space creating another venue for tourists and locals. This area is ideally located for this project as it is well lit and very accessible for all.

Potential units

Wicklow County Council currently has agreements in place for 43 units in Delgany, Bray, Rathnew, Wicklow, Baltinglass, Dunlavin and Enniskerry with delivery ranging from 2021-2023. This includes the 25 units listed above. WCC is in negotiations in respect of over 90 further units with delivery dates yet to be confirmed.

Wicklow County Council is currently holding discussions with a number of developers at preplanning and planning stage. There are over 100 potential Part V units with planning permission but it's difficult to determine whether they will all proceed or even on what timescale.

- Negotiations are ongoing with a number of Developers and AHB's in relation to acquiring further Turnkey units.
- Approval has recently been received from the Department in respect of 2 Turnkey units in Baltinglass. Units have not commenced construction.



- Approval received from Dept. for 5 Turnkey units in Tinahely. 2 Purchased in October 2020 2 purchase in Quarter 1 2021 with 1 further unit due in Quarter 4 2021 (listed above).
- 2 further Turnkey units have been allocated in Ballinaclash.
- A new call for Turnkey units has been advertised with a closing date of 30th September 2021
- Approval has recently been received from the Department in respect of 3 Turnkey units in Roundwood. Expected delivery is 2022.
- Approval recently been received from the Department for 13 turnkey units in Rathdrum.

Capital Advance Leasing Facility (CALF)

The Approved Housing Bodies are actively pursuing a number of potential CALF projects and are liaising closely with the Council on a regular basis. The members will be kept updated.

- Construction completed on 40 units (including 4 Part V) via CALF Turnkey in Dunlavin.
- Construction ongoing on 28 units in Arklow.
- Acquisition by AHB of 16 Turnkey units via CALF in Baltinglass with a further 48 units (including 4 Part V units and 8 CAS units) to be completed in 2021.
- Construction ongoing on 28 units in Wicklow (including 3 Part V) due for delivery in 2022.

Capital Assistance Scheme (CAS) Wicklow County Council is continuing to support acquisitions under the Capital Assistance Scheme with Dublin Simon, Circle Housing, Ark Housing and Peter McVerry Trust.

Expressions of Interest – Social Housing on Council lands - A preferred proposal has been identified.

Housing for Older People - Age Friendly Schemes

During recent works on Casual Vacancies/Relets, the Council fenced large sections of existing social housing gardens this resulted in three infill sites to develop Age Friendly schemes in Greystones. It is proposed to build small A rated units, specifically designed for the older tenant, which will be offered to eligible tenants in the local area, who wish to downsize. The larger property will return to the council for reletting to a family, and the tenant will benefit from being able to remain in their community, in an age friendly designed home with high comfort and low utility costs.

Vacant Homes Scheme

There are now 10 CPOs underway on long term vacant houses around the county.

Oral Hearings

- 108 Charnwood, Bray Determination by An Bord Pleanála due on 30th November following oral hearing on 17th August.
- 6 Ashleigh, Ashford objection submitted to An Bord Pleanála this will result in an Oral Hearing (date yet to be notified to us).

Negotiations are also ongoing to purchase some of the houses currently under CPO, by agreement. Further long term vacant properties have been identified for future batches of CPOs.

There were 2 reports relating to Co Wicklow on www.vacanthomes.ie in Sept 2021 – both were investigated. So far in October, there have been a further 3 reports via the website.

Housing Maintenance - Heating Upgrade Programme

C. 65 gas and oil boilers have been replaced in Council housing stock in 2021 at a cost of over €150,000 54 were replaced in 2020.

New oil / gas heating has been installed in 28 houses so far this year with a further 2 pending.

Homeless HAP

The Homeless HAP Placefinder provides assistance in:

- seeking out potential properties suitable for households currently identified as homeless or at risk of homelessness;
- liaising with specific households to establish their specific needs;
- establishing relationships with local property agents and landlords; and,
- supporting those homeless households to (a) prevent the necessity to enter emergency accommodation or (b) to exit emergency accommodation and secure a tenancy.
- ➤ To date, 358 households (265 families & 93 singles) have been assisted under the Homeless HAP Scheme in Wicklow County Council from the inception on 1st October, 2018 to 30th September, 2021. (161 homeless cases, 190 prevention cases to date and 7 direct provision). 115 properties were sourced by WCC.

Addressing Homelessness in partnership with Approved Housing Bodies

Homeless Supported Temporary Accommodation - Kilmantin Hill, Wicklow

There are 11 clients supported in the Kilmantin Hill facility, operated by Dublin Simon, with continuing transition by the clients to suitable, alternative accommodation.

Homeless Family Service - Fitzwilliam Road, Wicklow

Dublin Simon are the successful tenderer to operate and manage the facility at Fitzwilliam Road, Wicklow as a Family Homeless Service. - Refurbishment works on the facility are complete and snagging is under way and it is anticipated that the facility will be fully operational by end of November 2021.

The family service envisaged is a 6 month STA(Supported Temporary Accommodation) with key working support to enable family's transition from homelessness into Homeless HAP or alternative longer term accommodation.



Homeless Supported Temporary Accommodation - San Remo, Bray

A key focus of Wicklow County Council in addressing homelessness was to identify and provide a high supported, temporary accommodation unit in Bray/North Wicklow to address the accommodation and support needs of a particular homeless cohort. This cohort was identified from the presenting population and those currently known to and accessing homeless services in Bray/North Wicklow.

The acquisition and upgrade of a former nursing home in Bray has completed and the facility opened to clients in October. The facility, operated by Dublin Simon, incorporates a service model where there are a number of emergency/cold weather Beds (restricted during Covid) and Supported Temporary Accommodation Beds (STA) There is on site key working support linking in with clients.

The Neighbourhood Liaison Committee is now operational and meets monthly.

Homeless Supported Accommodation - Carraig Eden, Greystones

The Department of Housing, Planning, Community and Local Government (DHPCLG) approved funding to upgrade the building to provide 35 ensuite bedrooms within the existing building, with associated kitchens and common areas, as well as the upgrade of Fire Protection.

The refurbishment completed in March and the facility is fully operational. Wicklow County Council are making arrangements with the AHB to run and in-reach service with the clients in the service to support them as they continue their journey.

Other Homeless Supported Accommodation

Wicklow County Council owned properties in Wicklow, Bray and Arklow, leased to AHBs, provide 12 units of low to medium supported accommodation targeted to the particular support needs of the clients. There continues to be a number of move ons from these properties, signalling the success of this model.

Housing First

Housing First recognises that a stable home provides the basis for recovery in other areas.

Peter McVerry Trust has been appointed as the Housing First Programme Implementer for the Mid East Region and Wicklow County Council is committed to working with them to achieve the targets identified in the programme. Properties will be provided by both Wicklow County Council and Peter McVerry Trust for the programme.

Wicklow County Council has, to date, successfully accommodated 7 clients under Housing First. Other clients proposed for Housing First have been assessed by the team and are availing of key support work pending finalisation of sourcing of accommodation.

Covid 19 Update

Wicklow County Council has put a number of arrangements in place to provide, among other things, services to previously un-serviced sites which will facilitate better sanitation and social distancing.

Welfare facilities were provided at a number of unauthorised sites.

Three families from unauthorised sites were provided with housing units.

Hygiene packs were distributed to all authorised sites and further facilities provided in March.

9. Energy Efficiency

Solar Panel Carport – Enerpower have commenced on site and last for a duration of 9 weeks.

Energy is to be supplied over a 20 year period at a fixed unit rate

Enerpower are planning on installing additional EV Car Chargers within the system also.

Energy Efficiency Fabric Upgrade Phase 1

Lot 1 88 houses in Bray and Greystones - completed.

Lot 2 90 houses in Arklow, Wicklow and West Wicklow commenced in December 2020 and works are ongoing

Energy Efficiency Fabric Upgrade Phase 2

Works on 20 properties in Wolfe Tone Square West, Bray, nearing completion.

Works have commenced 23 properties in West Wicklow and Rathdrum

Works on the remaining 34 properties around the County will commence in the near future.



County Wicklow Library Services

Opening of Wicklow library & County Archives

Wicklow County Council was honoured with the visit of 2 ministers to perform the official opening of Wicklow library & County Archives + Local Studies on August 30th. Ministers Heather Humphreys (DRCD) & Darragh O'Brien (HLGH) performed the joint task of officially opening the library. In order to ensure Covid restrictions were adhered to, the launch proceedings took place in the grounds of Wicklow Gaol. It was then followed by organised visits to the new library & archives in pod groups. The library opened to the public the following day, with a great response from its users.





Mending Workshops Bray Library

In a world of fast fashion, mending favourite garments is a practical, accessible and enjoyable way to engage with the ethical path of repairing, reusing and recycling. Bray Library hosted three Zoom workshops in early September, each one focussing on an aspect of mending. Included were the practices of visible mending, darning and slow stitch.

Neuro-divergent Webinar Series, Bray Library

Wicklow County Council Library Service, in partnership with Healthy Ireland hosted a series of webinars on the topic of "Parenting Neuro-divergent Children". The facilitator was Claire O'Neill who is a coach with 'Thriving Autistic', a Deputy Principal, an autistic person and a parent to autistic children. Claire's broad range of experience shone through each evening, as she answered questions from parents with compassion, humour and insight.

Dúchas Schools Collection, Dunlavin Library

The Dunlavin Dúchas Collection is now available for viewing in its entirety in Dunlavin Library. It launched during Heritage Week and is bound to be a valued part of the Local Studies Collection. This really interesting collection of stories and folklore is available online but due to the effort involved in downloading each essay, is often overlooked. Having this collection in physical form allows the work of the 1930's teachers and students to be fully appreciated.

Junior Explore Walks at Dunlavin, Blessington and Baltinglass Libraries

Family nature walks which are being funded through DRCD "Dormant Accounts Funding" are beginning to be organised at various locations in the county. The first three have taken place in Dunlavin, Baltinglass and Blessington. Children and their parents or guardians, led by environmentalist Patrick Hunt were brought on a guided Nature Walk around their locality. Patrick described the flora and fauna encountered on each walk and engaged with the children, answering a myriad of questions and encouraging them to show their various finds. Each child received a Junior Explorer Kit containing a butterfly net, reference booklets to do with trees, flowers, birds and butterflies, a notebook and an insect magnifier/viewer. This project was designed with the aim of encouraging families to be out and about experiencing their natural surroundings.

Mobile Library Visit to Rathmore Direct Provision Centre

The Mobile library recently visited families living in Direct Provision at Rathmore, Ashford. The theme of the day was Nature and Biodiversity. Librarian Karen Downes, delivered a story time based on this theme and Susie Fortune of White Doodle art engaged with the children, giving an excellent painting workshop in which the children were inspired to create insect paintings. The weather was beautiful, allowing this event to happen safely outdoors and the children each received a Junior Explorer Kit, complete with booklets, an insect viewer and a Butterfly Net.

Seed Ark extending to all County Wicklow Libraries- Heritage Week

All libraries in the county now have access to an operational Seed Ark. A Seed Ark is a self-sustaining collection of open pollinated or heirloom seeds that is free for community use. Gardeners "borrow" seeds



from the library and then at the end of the growing season, they save the seeds and return a portion of the seeds to the library. These seeds can then be borrowed by any Wicklow library member, they just need to email their seed needs and the librarian will arrange to have the seeds ready for collection.

New Wicklow Library update + national statistics

Since opening to the public on August 31, the new Wicklow library is being greatly appreciated by the public, both in person and on social media. This is reflected in the following stats for the new library:

Visits for September: 8,290

Items checked out: 7,340

Total membership of Wicklow Town: 3,339 – (751 of which are new members since August 31).

In total, 2,001 of the 3,339 borrowers used our library services since August 31.

Although library usage has not yet returned to the high stats of 2019, our county compares well with the national statistics - Wicklow Co Co had an issue figure of 29,896 for September. The national figure was 608,337. This reflects 4.9% of national total statistic, whereas Wicklow's population is just below 3% of the national total.

Wicklow Co Co Library Service and Healthy Ireland were delighted to host renowned sex-educator Sarah Sproule for a Zoom webinar on "*Embracing the Awkward - talking to children in your care about sex*". Sarah gave a fantastic and engaging presentation, before answering a wide range of anonymous questions from caregivers to children of all ages. Thirty five participants attended. Those who couldn't attend will receive a link to view her presentation in the coming weeks. We are currently creating a reading list for attendees of the talk, which will supplement advice given by Sarah and include her recommended reads.

Wicklow County Council library Service is delighted to contribute again this year to **Wicklow Naturally's October Feast** programme of events. This year we hosted Santina Kennedy and chef Tadgh Byrne for a series of culinary related library interviews. The team will visit Ballywaltrim library, Blessington library and culminate in a live event in the new Wicklow library on October 26 as part of their quest to find out more

about cooking local dishes & growing your own vegetables.

Culture Night - Dunlavin Library Events

Despite ongoing Covid restrictions, Dunlavin Library staff used their initiative in availing of the enclosed public park right across the road from the library, in conjunction with Wicklow Arts office, to provide some family events for Culture Night. First up was a Bodhrán Buzz workshop with Robbie Walshe. There were 36



bodhráns to try out and every single one was in use. County Wicklow Archives and Genealogy Services

Wicklow County Archives & Local Studies Services welcomes school groups



Now located at the new Wicklow Library & Archives, Wicklow Town – we were delighted to welcome the first of the school groups to visit our services. The students from Wicklow Educate Together Secondary School were introduced to Wicklow archives collections such as Wicklow Town records from the 1600s, workhouse registers from Famine times, and school group photographs from the early 1900s. They learned about the

importance of records for the study of history and the work of the archivist in preserving them and making them accessible. They also learned how to start researching their family tree. The Local Studies librarian showed the children special collections such as the early newspapers featuring adverts and photographs, Wicklow map resources, postcards anda wide array of sources for the study of Wicklow local history.

The archives and local studies services are planning a comprehensive schools programme to include school visits, projects and resources to assist at Junior and Leaving Certificate work levels. This will introduce the students to Wicklow sources and support their work as part of the history curriculum, particularly in relation to the emphasis on the use of primary source material in history project work.

LECP UPDATE September 2021

Goal 1: Develop community capacity in disadvantaged communities and engage in urban and rural regeneration

Town & Village Funding Scheme to Revitalise Towns and Villages 2021

The Town and Village Scheme objectives are being refocused to align with commitments within 'Our Rural Future – Rural Development Policy 2021-2025'. The 2021 Scheme will prioritise the objectives of this policy such as tackling vacancy in towns and villages, remote working and supporting town centre living. Other projects which will be welcomed include regeneration projects that support active and vibrant town or village centres, upgrading shopfronts and street facades, and green spaces and parks, etc.

Grant Levels:

For the 2021 Scheme, the minimum grant which is available is €20,000. The maximum level of grant funding available is being raised to €500,000 in respect of one application from each Local Authority. A maximum of €250,000 will apply in respect of 2 applications and €100,000 in respect of 4 applications. **2 applications must** be in respect of Towns/Villages that have not previously received funding under the Standard Town & Village Renewal Scheme

Announcement of the Rural Regeneration Development Fund Category 2

The Minister for Rural and Community Development, Heather Humphreys TD, on May 12th, announced the third call for Category 2 applications to the €1 billion Rural Regeneration and Development Fund. This fund is for projects that will drive economic growth and footfall, combat dereliction, regenerate town centre and heritage buildings, develop pedestrian zones and outdoor spaces and make rural towns more attractive places to live, work and raise a family.

The €1 billion Fund is also part of the Department's Rural Development Investment Programme, which is funded under Project Ireland 2040. Projects that will be funded under Category 2 are those that require significant development before they reach the stage of being shovel ready.

Goal 2: Promote Active Citizenship and Public Participation to improve governance, participation and enrich decision making

Age Friendly Programme

The national Age Friendly Primary care centre guidelines were launched in June. These guidelines were compiled by Kildare and Wicklow Age Friendly Programme managers. Walkability audits are to take place in a number of locations.

The Arklow Age Friendly Befriending Service is to launch soon following the final garda vetting process. This will be of huge benefit to the population of Arklow.

Regarding housing, we are looking into making Rathcoran Estates in Baltinglass an Age Friendly Estate. It was built by and will be run by Respond.

Comhairle na nÓg

The Comhairle na nÓg, through the Coordinator, are taking part in the COVID-19 Community Response Forum, bringing the perspective of young people to the table. They are also taking part in the Time Machine project which is an intergenerational project.

Funding has been secured from DCYA to continue to support the Comhairle na nÓg. Tablets were purchased for use by the Comhairle in each Municipal District, to help them to keep the youth council going during the COVID-19 restrictions.

Goal 3: Strategic Direction – Develop high quality integrated services, available to all communities, in particular, disadvantaged communities and vulnerable groups

1. Healthy Wicklow Strategy

Round 3 of Programme is underway but implementation has slowed down because of COVID-19. An extension to 31st December 2021 has been granted.



In 2021 the Healthy Ireland Programme has focused on the Keep Well Campaign which is coming to an end. The final round of reporting is being completed at present.

2. Slaintecare Healthy Communities Programme

The Slaintecare Healthy Communities Programme is a new initiative led by Slaintecare and Healthy Ireland in partnership with Wicklow Local Community Development Committee and other local stakeholders. The goal of the programme is to improve the long term health and wellbeing of people living in the most disadvantaged communities in Ireland. The programme is based in the Bray are of Wicklow. This is a holistic approach to health and wellbeing incorporating the physical and social determinants of health, that is, the conditions in which people are born, grow, work, live and age, and the wider set of forces and systems that shape the conditions of daily life. The programme will implement targeted initiatives to tackle these challenges from within these communities. This will be achieved through the provision of dedicated services to build sustainable improvements in the health and wellbeing of all those living in those communities.

A local implementation team will be formed in each area led by a SHCP Local Development Officer to be employed by Wicklow County Council.

3. County Wicklow Food & Beverage Strategy - Food Poverty and Sustainability

The County Wicklow Food & Beverage Strategy contains aims and objectives to tackle food poverty and food sustainability in the county. This is a long term issue but was highlighted through the work of the Community Response Forum during the COVID-19 pandemic.

A subgroup has been formed to work on this issue. Research has already been undertaken to establish the extent and nature of food poverty and the responses to this. Further research is now ongoing with a view to the development of a working plan going forward.

Goal 4: Develop a vibrant and innovative community and social enterprise sector

Social Enterprise Grant Scheme

Minister Humphreys launched on 6th of September 2021 a €1 million fund to be allocated nationally to the Dormant Accounts Fund Social Enterprise Capital Grants Scheme 2021. This scheme is to be rolled out by Wicklow LCDC. Wicklow has been allocated €28, 515.90. Grants can be applied for in the range of €2500 to €5000.

The scheme is now open and will close for applications on the Wednesday 6th of October. Applicants will be assessed and shortlisted by Wicklow LCDC. This list will be sent to the Minister for Rural and Community Development who must approve each project before funding is awarded. Wicklow LCDC will inform successful applicants in November and final drawdown will be at the end of February. All applications must be completed in full, include three quotes and a copy of the Organisations Article of Association.



Bray Area Partnership

In addition to the ongoing work being undertaken by BAP in supporting the operation of social enterprise activity in the Bray and north Wicklow areas, some key developments to note are as follows:

- A market research and feasibility study report is nearing completion with respect to the establishment of a social enterprise employing individuals having had interaction with the Probation Service and criminal justice system. Collaboration Ireland has been commissioned to undertake the report with funding being provided through the Probation Services Kickstart grants scheme and supported by the Dormant Accounts Fund.
- 2. As part of a collaboration involving BAP and two neighbouring LDCs, a support initiative, SEED 2, has been developed to work with social enterprises in the Bray/north Wicklow, Dun Laoghaire Rathdown and South Dublin areas. SEED 2 will cover Strategic Planning; Income Diversification and Governance guidance and supports using group training, individual mentoring and networking sessions. This work is being resourced by the Covid 19 Social Enterprise Regeneration Programme through the Dormant Accounts Fund and will run for six months, commencing in September/ October coming.
- 3. Work is continuing on developing the Care and Repair Action social enterprise initiative aimed at providing home supports to older people living in the Bray and north Wicklow areas.



Economic Development, Planning and Infrastructure

1. Local Economic and Community Plan (LECP) (Economic)

The Economic Development Unit of the Enterprise and Corporate Services Directorate is charged with implementing the economic actions in the Local Economic and Community Plan (LECP).

Retail

Bray Central

Due to Covid-19 there has been some impact on the works and program. These impacts have been assessed over the last few weeks and the main contractor has commenced back with works on site. The overall works are coming to a close and practical completion is anticipated to be before the 31st of January 2022. The crane removal has marked the end of large elements of the construction work. Heads of terms have gone out to several new retail and leisure tenants. To date, there is excellent interest from a number of operators for the smaller retail units.

Town Teams

Town Teams in Arklow, Blessington, Bray, Greystones and Wicklow continue to meet virtually where possible to progress various projects. Activity, particularly engagement with stakeholder groups has been curtailed due to Covid restrictions.

Arklow Town Team

Arklow Town Team has successfully secured €3,500 from the Town and Village Streetscape Enhancement Scheme. We are hoping to engage an Artist for a mural project along Main St and to remove unnecessary clutter from the Main Street.

The painted playground project at Kynoch's Park is progressing well. Rachel Tyrell and her team of volunteers have begun working on the project and it looks fantastic already. The painted playground has really uplifted this disused space. We are looking forward to seeing the final results. Well done to all.

The Harbour to Headwaters –Biodiversity Trail is in the final stages. In 14 locations across the region from the Harbour in Arklow right up along the river catchment to the Headwater of Glenmalure, you will find information panels specific to each of those points on the river network. In addition to this and online interactive resource will provide more information on local biodiversity with the option to take part in citizen science activities. The project team are now looking into developing a water, wildlife,



Warrior/Viking theme for the project and creating a mascot around it to make it more fun and interactive for children. This project will be a great base for the starting of future projects to promote our wonderful waterways.

Bray Town Team / Bray Town Recovery Team

The Bray Town Recovery Team will have its inaugural meeting following discussions with the Cathaoirleach of Bray Municipal District. The members of Bray MD have agreed the Terms of Reference.

Blessington Town Team

Blessington Tidy Towns continue to work in the back ground enhancing the local community. A number of new planted areas have been added throughout the town, and most recently over 3500 spring bulbs have been planted in various locations to brighten up our community in early 2022, all new bulbs are also pollinator friendly. Several new planters are being added at various locations as well to enhance the towns public realm. The group are also partnered with Blessington Community College and working with TY students on a number of projects. Other activities include the removal of weeds along the main street and other approach roads, and the cut back of verges and grass in a number of areas. The group have also added composters locally and created a number of leaf mulch collection areas.

Blessington Town Square

Baltinglass MD received €95,000 funding from the NTA Additional Outdoor Infrastructure measure fund, in June 2021. This funding has been used to pedestrianise a large area in the town square which is now open to the public. The works completed consists of the following:

- paving a large area of the square
- provision of public lighting in the square
- back light of the monument
- age friendly seating
- planters
- big belly bin

Shop Local / Support Local

Baltinglass Municipal District launched a shop local/support local campaign which commenced mid-June and will run until the end of September with the aim to support local businesses as they reopen following the recent Covid restrictions. This initiative is being run in partnership with the Blessington and District Forum and Blessington Town Team. West Wicklow Youth Project was invited to design a logo for the



campaign and the winning designer was presented with a hamper at Baltinglass Municipal District office on Monday 12th July. The winner of the July and August draws have been announced and prizes presented to the winners.

Greystones Town Team

Greystones Town Team are in the final stages of forming and registering a company limited by guarantee (CLG) and updating their organisational structure. In the meantime members are preparing a list of priority projects and investigating sources of funding which the new CLG can endeavour to secure funding for.

Sub-committees have been set up to progress a number of interests and initiatives, including further development of website and social media channels and a new business network, which is currently working with other members to organise Christmas street lighting and activities for the holiday season, including an event to turn on the lights.

Wicklow Town Team

The AGM of Wicklow Town Team was held on the 29th September. Full reports from the Chairs of the working groups were circulated which outlined the various projects undertaken since the last AGM

The achievements during the year were highlighted which included the:

- Opening of Wicklow Towns Heritage Trail
- Successful application for funding to enhance outdoor dining
- Completion of feasibility study for Theatre (Oct 2021).
- Application for feasibility study for community power
- TII, NTA and WCC are progressing the Town Teams proposal for priority bus lane and park and ride
- Successful lobbying for action on Wicklow Court House,
- WTT worked very closely with WCC to bring all parties together for a successful outcome on the development of the Abbey Grounds.
- WCC together with WTT applied for funding to Failte Ireland under Animation Town, unfortunately this funding application was not successful.

Projects in progress for the coming year include the:

Commitment to pursue funding for the EIS for the East Coast Greenway



- Proposals for improvement to gateways to the Town (Dublin road, Ashtown / Marlton, Glenturn)
 in conjunction with Wicklow Tidy Towns
- Connectivity from Quays to Town Centre application for funding from Town and Village Renewal in conjunction with WCC
- Progress proposals discussed with the Minister for Higher Education Simon Harris TD to make
 Wicklow Town the Centre of Excellence for Renewable Energy.
- Final conclusion and decision on Theatre site.
- Solution to Wicklow Court House
- Continue to support and help Codling Wind Park and promote Wicklow Port as their preferred location.
- Work with the relevant parties to secure a Digital Hub for Wicklow Town.
- Seek funding to preserve Rocket Cart (Coastguard Lifesaving Cart)

The Town Team welcomes new members and would be particularly interested in those in the age group of 18-40 to come forward. It is vital that this age group has a strong voice on the Town Team and has a say in shaping the future of the town.

Outdoor Dining

Fáilte Ireland earlier this year announced funding for Outdoor Dining:

Part One of the Scheme - Outdoor Seating and Accessories - supports individual hospitality businesses with grants of up to €4,000 for seating, tables and outdoor accessories. This scheme which is fully funded by Fáilte Ireland is administered by the Local Authorities. Where the tables and chairs are located in a public space, the business must apply for a Section 254 licence, if the equipment is located on private property, planning permission may be required. 120 applications have been received to date

Closing date for receipt of applications was extended from September 30th 2021 to the October 8th 2021.

All Local Authorities were invited to apply to Fáilte Ireland for funding under Part Two - Local Authority Weatherproofing & Outdoor Dining Enhancement Scheme - to develop streets and public spaces to facilitate outdoor dining in urban tourism centres, enabling access to outdoor seating for extended periods throughout the year.

Wicklow County Council applied for and was awarded funding for Outdoor Dining and Weatherproofing for Market Square in Wicklow Town (€119,000) and Abbey Lane in Arklow (€81,000).



Streetscapes

Six towns/villages in County Wicklow have been selected to participate in the Streetscape and Shopfront Enhancement scheme. The areas selected are Arklow, Baltinglass, Blessington, Enniskerry, Kilcoole and Wicklow Town.

The Streetscape Enhancement Initiative is a key part of the Government's 'Our Rural Future' and is designed to make our rural towns and villages more attractive colourful and vibrant places to live, work and visit.

Types of projects funded include: refurbishment of traditional shop fronts, artwork, murals, lighting, planting etc. The closing date for completed applications was extended to 14th September with the completion of works deadline also extended from 22nd October to 31st December 2021.

Urban Animation Scheme

Wicklow Town's application for Urban Animation funding to enhance the links between the Main Street, Market Square and South Quay was unsuccessful however an application has been made for Town and Village Renewal funding for a similar but smaller project.

Tourism

Tourism Strategy and Marketing Plan 2018-2022

The strategy sets out a number of challenging but achievable priorities along with a series of detailed actions to be implemented over the next 5 years

The Key Priorities are:

- 1. Develop New Accommodation
- 2. Develop Key Towns as Visitor Hubs
- 3. Develop a Masterplan for Glendalough
- 4. Grow Thematic Experiences
- 5. Market our County by Developing A Common Narrative

EcoTrail Wicklow 2021 took place on 25th of September with more than 1500 registered. Feedback from participants has been extremely positive and this event is set to become an annual success.

We have produced more than 5000 photos and an array of video footage which will help showcase Wicklow as an outdoor destination not only the domestic market, but to the overseas market through the EcoTrail network of events and Tourism Ireland offices around the world.



The objective for 2022 is to increase the number of participants and bring back the international visitors to Wicklow.

Wicklow Passport Throughout the spring and summer, around 2500 passports sold and more than 10,000 distributed through a growing network of participating local tourism businesses.

The Wicklow Passport was heavily supported by Fáilte Ireland as one of the key tourism projects in the region and further joint promotional efforts are underway.

Efforts will be made in the coming months to introduce the Wicklow Passport to local schools. Also, there are plans to make the Wicklow Passport a training tool for all staff operating within the tourism industry in Wicklow.

Trail Digitisation: All trails featured on <u>visitwicklow.ie</u> website have now a digital Google map, with option to download a GPX file for people that want to use the track on their preferred walking app.

We are now working with the County Council to develop an online map to list and locate all the Wicklow walks. The map will come with sorting options were visitors can choose walk by length, location, difficulty, etc.

Tourism Itineraries: Wicklow Itineraries blog entries for <u>visitwicklow.ie</u> have been created. The objective is to record and package experiences and present various ways to 'do' Wicklow. Blog itineraries also offer a fantastic opportunity to generate content for social media and optimise <u>visitwicklow.ie</u> on search engines. Over the coming months new itineraries will be introduced with the opportunity to the local tourism trade to suggest and create their own itineraries.

Destination Town Funding: An application to Failte Ireland on behalf of Wicklow Town was made in respect of Destination Town Funding and funding has been awarded to develop visitor amenities in the Abbey Grounds. Mosart, a local architect team which specialise in architecture, landscape and urban design, have been appointed to design the Abbey Grounds project with a view to increasing visitor numbers to Wicklow while maintaining this important oasis at the heart of Wicklow town. Work is underway to lodge a planning application for this development under the Part VIII process.

Glendalough Masterplan and Wicklow Visitor Orientation Study

This is a Fáilte Ireland funded project led by FI with strategic partners NPWS, OPW, Coillte and WCC. The Plan covers visitor attractions and activities available in the area and the first stage of stakeholder engagement has been completed.



The consultants team led by Consarc have prepared a draft plan and are now engaging with some of the key landowners to assess the feasibility of developing additional off road trails between Laragh and Glendalough and provision of additional parking. The process has identified a number of issues: congestion at key sites, concerns over security, capacity and quality of car parking and visitor services, issues with local access, and erosion and degradation of the environment.

Visitor Experience Hubs have been identified around the county where there is a particular focus of visitor attractions. Development of these hubs will build capacity, help disperse visitors across the county, encouraging longer stays and greater investment in the area. The team is developing detailed plans for walking, mountain biking, off road family cycling.

Measures have been taken this year to introduce additional temporary parking and to use traffic counters to improve parking management and signage. Traffic counts carried out on the June Bank Holiday Weekend demonstrate that 100k+ visitors visited Glendalough between 4th and 11th June. Other works that have been completed is an upgrade to the toilet facilities.

Rural and Urban Regeneration Development Fund Grant Applications

The following applications were submitted under the Rural Regeneration Development Fund Grant Scheme for Category 2 Funding;

Shillelagh/Carnew/Tinahely: Developing the villages for the eventual arrival of the Greenway – purchasing some of the old station buildings linking in with the Tinahely Trails and other tourist venues including the Tinahely Farm shop and the Orchard Farm.

Blessington: Redeveloping and resubmitting the proposal to design and develop the Square for when the N81 is re-routed and to make the town greenway ready to be able to cater for the large influx of visitors expected.

A call for Category 1 (shovel ready) proposals is to be made later in 2021.

URDF: Urban Regeneration Development Fund

The Wicklow Town URDF Project for the development of the library at the old Ulster Bank Building and the redevelopment of Fitzwilliam Square has been completed. Total cost for the development of the Library was €6 million, with €3 million funded via the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage URDF and €1 million from the Department of Rural and Community Development. €2 million matched funding was committed by Wicklow County Council.



The €2m Fitzwilliam Square refurbishment project, funded by an amount of €1.5m under the Department of Housing, Planning & Local Government URDF scheme, has created a multi-functional space, improving accessibility and enhancing the presentation and public realm of the Town Centre at Fitzwilliam Square. A new outdoor venue for community events, performances and exhibitions, and outdoor dining is now available. The Halpin monument which was concealed is now made more visible and contributes to tourism and the town's maritime heritage. The newly created space is also now responding to the recent health and safety challenges associated with the COVID-19 pandemic and will go towards helping to support the recovery of the tourism and hospitality sector.

Part 1 of the Arklow URDF Project the refurbishment of the Courthouse and the development of an Enterprise Space in the former Town Council offices. Part 2 of the project the public realm works are currently underway.

Bray Public Transport Bridge

Submissions under the Part VIII process closed on Monday 6th September 2021, with over 150 submissions received. All the data received is being collated and reviewed, with the intention of preparing a report for the elected members.

As this is ongoing, An Bord Pleanala are reviewing the application and will determine whether an EIS is required.

Bray Harbour Area Integrated Regneration

Funding of €7.14m has been announced for the Bray Harbour Area Integrated Regeneration Project from the Urban Regeneration and Development Fund (URDF) and this funding has the capacity to unlock the great potential of Bray Harbour and surrounding area. The harbour, its piers and adjacent lands are a major asset for Bray and this funding will facilitate an integrated scheme to develop the harbour and associated public realm works to provide a vibrant waterfront area with excellent connectivity between the promenade, the town centre the Dublin Road area and beyond. Wicklow County Council is in the process of appointing consultants to carry out additional survey work as part of the design process.

Work is ongoing to further develop the unsuccessful applications for Wicklow and Arklow Harbours. A meeting with the Department of Housing URDF Team has taken place, this will inform the resubmission of these applications. It is likely that the next call for URDF funding will be late 2021/early 2022.

Maritime

There are a number of Offshore Wind Energy projects proposed off the coast of County Wicklow

- Dublin Array Bray and Kish Banks
- Cailleach off Bray Head
- Codling Wind Park between Greystones and Wicklow



- Arklow Bank between Arklow and Wicklow Head
- Shelmalere just south of Arklow

Arklow Bank

SSE Renewables has submitted a planning application to An Bord Pleanála for the development of the landfall for two offshore export circuits underground high voltage connections, a new sub-station and transmission compound along with a 220kV overhead power line connection from Shelton Abbey to the transmission network.

SSER is planning to make its application to Wicklow County Council in respect of the O&M base at Arklow within the coming weeks.

Codling Wind Park

The Codling Wind Park has published its Onshore Infrastructure Scoping Report which covers the land-based elements of the Codling Wind Park project, such as the point at which the cables will come ashore (landfall), the routing of onshore cabling and any electricity substation(s) that may be required to connect the project to the national grid. It also describes how the operations and maintenance base for the project, which will be located at a port along the east coast, may be considered in the EIA.

The Codling Wind Park is expected to announce its decision regarding the development of an operations and maintenance base by the end of October.

Benefits to the local economy

- Each O&M base is likely to employ 80 people. There will be thousands employed during the construction phase this will benefit wide range of local companies in the supply chain.
- Both Codling and SSE are engaging with companies interested in participating in the supply chain.
- There will be extensive training and educational opportunities.
- Wicklow is in discussions about developing training facilities at Clermont
- There will be a substantial Community Contribution Scheme

Key Milestones

The enactment of the Marine Area Planning Bill, 2020 is expected in 2021

The Renewable Energy Support Scheme (RESS) Auction whereby the companies bid for a grid connection is expected in 2022

Food and Beverage Strategy

Funding of €175,000 has been secured via the LEADER Food Programme for a Food and Beverage Coordinator role for Wicklow Naturally CLG and a tender for the supply of event costs for the period 2021 -2023 in support of Wicklow Naturally's Promotional Activities Plan. Wicklow Naturally will contribute 5% from subscriptions and it is proposed that Wicklow County Council will contribute €35,000 over the two year life of the project.

September/October 2021 Activities

- The September Network of Entrepreneurial Women network meeting took place via Zoom
- Applications are open for Showcase 2021 (craft industry wholesale exhibition Jan 2022), in conjunction with the Design and Crafts Council of Ireland and LEO Wicklow.
- The 'Stimulus' and 'Green for Micro' consultancy programmes are in train, offering expert guidance to approximately 50 growing LEO client businesses in 2021.
- The Owner Manager Development Programme commenced, with 21 participants.
- The LEO is continuing to help clients work through their customs queries with a further customs training course and one to one clinics scheduled for the autumn to help companies adapt to new regulations following Brexit.
- There continues to be a high level of demand for business advice clinics which are currently being run remotely. Additional Clinics are being provided to ensure that demand is being met.
- Fornightly newsletter is circulated to clients on supports, training courses, events and other relevant information.
- Social media and LEO website updates are carried out a number of times a week to raise awareness and promote the LEO supports.
- Applications for the Trading Online Voucher Sheme continue to be submitted with 116 approved to date for 2021, at a value of €245,630). The grant has now reverted to 50% from 1st January 2021.
- The LEO national #LookforLocal campaign continued to support the re-opening of the economy and showcasing local businesses in order to stimulate investment in local economy through digital marketing channels and e-newsletter. A #LookforLocal digital promotional day took place Friday 10th September while campaign is now wound down.
- An extensive Export Development programme has been developed for role out in partnership with LEO Kildare in Q3/4 2021 to assist first time exporters get ready. Seven Wicklow businesses are registered to participate. This event is part of our strategic focus on assisting longer established clients to successfully develop new markets.
- LEO Wicklow and Kildare are taking the lead on organising one national virtual event for National Women's Enterprise Day to take place on Thursday 7th October. An events co-ordinator has been appointed to project manage the event on behalf of the LEO network. The programme features a strong line up of female entrepreneurs and workshop sessions covering topics such as internationalisation, competitiveness, digitalisation, sustainability and inspirational case studies of LEO clients. The event was launched on 8th September with the theme #Build the Future.
- LEO Wicklow is the lead LEO for the East region Food Academy Programme with 10 food producers
 from the east region booked on. First workshop took place in July and is continuing throughout the
 remainder of the year with another 4 workshops and a Supervalu buyer pitching session. A number of
 Wicklow producers are participating in an online Food Starter training programme led by LEO
 Limerick.
- LEO Wicklow (together with LEO offices in Clare, Leitrim, Kildare and Fingal) is participating in a
 LEO Pilot programme in conjunction with Chefs Network and UNIFY ORDERING which aims to
 connect local producers with Foodservice Outlets in the local area. Recruitment of 4 Wicklow
 suppliers for the Pilot programme to participate in the project to take place in the coming weeks.
- The Student Enterprise Programme is in full swing in second level schools around the county with in class sessions being delivered by the Student Enterprise co-ordination team. LEO Wicklow are



running an extra competition focused on Idea generation with a prize being awarded per school in November.

Forward Planning

County Development Plan Review

Notice to review the current County Development Plan 2016 - 2022 and prepare a new County Development Plan 2021 - 2027 was given on the 6th November 2019. Closing date for submissions was Friday 10th January 2020. 156 submissions were received.

The First Chief Executive's Report was issued to the Elected Members on Friday 12th June 2020. This Report forms part of the statutory procedure for the review of the existing plan and the preparation of the new plan. Its purpose is to report on the outcome of the statutory consultation process and to set out the Chief Executive's opinion on the issues raised in the submissions received.

At Council meetings held on the 10th and 17th May, the Members voted to amend the proposed draft plan.

The draft Plan as amended by the Members and associated environmental reports is currently on public display since the 4th June for 12 weeks plus 2 week extension. The Draft Plan and associated documents was available to view and download from the consultation portal to Monday 30th August 2021 (2 week extension as per decision of members at meeting held on Tuesday 27th July 2021). Submissions or observations regarding the Draft Plan and the associated Environmental Report were invited from the public and interested bodies.

Section 9 A (5) of the Planning & Development Act 2000 (as amended) - Extension to period of review of County Development Plan –

At Council meeting held on Tuesday the 27th July 2021 it was agreed by the members as follows:

That Wicklow County Council under section 9A(2) of the Planning and Development Act 2000 (as inserted by the Planning and Development (Amendment) Act 2021), having regard to the extraordinary circumstances arising from the risk to public health posed by the spread of Covid-19 and the disruption to the completion of the review of the development plan and the preparation of a new development plan caused by restrictions introduced in response to the Covid-19 pandemic, that a further period of one year (12 months) is necessary to complete the review and to prepare and make the new development plan in particular having regard to the need to ensure adequate time to complete the remaining stages of the plan process, including providing adequate opportunities and time for the public to engage with the process'.

The consultation period ended on 30th of August 2021. The next stage will be issuing of the Chief Executive's Report on draft development plan following consideration of the submissions received during the consultation period. This is currently anticipated to be at the end of November.

Wicklow Heritage & Biodiversity Office

Community Monument Fund (CMF). Wicklow county council has received a funding allocation of €65,000 for Wicklow archaeology projects under the CMF2021 from the Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage. The seven successful projects are as follows; Baltinglass Hillforts, an assessment of archaeological significance; Whitfield Graveyard access improvements; Wicklow Town Community Archaeology Initiative; Dunganstown Castle conservation advice, Kilbride archaeological investigations, Arklow Castle conservation report and the development of Conservation Management Plans for historic graveyards (Ballymacroghue, Mullinacuffe and Whitefield). All projects are underway and are being coordinated by Heritage Officer. Final reports and recoupment due 19th November.

Protected Structures Grants: Heritage Office is co-ordinating these on behalf of planning section. There are two successful projects under Historic Structure Fund (HSF); Killruddery Clock tower repairs approved for €50,000 and Conservation works to the 'weir' at Russborough House approved for €50,000. A total allocation for county of €72,000 received for projects under BHIS (x 10 individual projects). Five BHIS projects complete others underway. Heritage Officer is carrying out inspections and monitoring progress on all projects. Next progress report due to DHHLG 17th Sept and final recoupment is due on 26th November.

Wicklow Heritage Forum meeting on 8th Sept to oversee implementation of County Heritage Plan programme. Heritage Plan allocations received from The Heritage Council for the implementation of the County Wicklow Heritage Plan actions in 2021 (€27,000). Next meeting scheduled for 10th November.

Digital Upskilling course for individuals involved in community heritage projects and activities due to commence on 22nd October. This is a free, course run over seven online workshops and is co-funded by the Heritage Council and Wicklow County Council through the County Heritage Plan.

County Wicklow Geology Publication, currently being edited by HO and GSI. Based on County Geological Sites audit, this will be a coffee table, user friendly format for general release and sale. Co-funded by the Heritage Council and Wicklow County Council through the County Heritage Plan.

Glendalough Community Archaeology Project: WCC supported a 2 week community excavation 3rd – 13th Aug in association with UCD and the Glendalough Heritage Forum. 50 +participants. Online archaeology talk held for Heritage Week. HO working with the Glendalough Heritage Forum on production of a Lego model reconstruction of monastic city project, funded by the Heritage Council.

Wicklow Biodiversity Action Funding of €29,950 allocated under the National Biodiversity Action Plan fund based on application submitted by Heritage Officer. Three projects are being funded to enhance conservation management of council owned properties, 1 at Brittas Bay , 2 at selected historic graveyards and 3 at Kilmacanogue marsh. All projects commenced June- July with botanical, bat and invertebrate surveys. Public open event held on Sat 18th September at Brittas Bay. Access improvements planned in Kilmacanogue Marsh in association with Bray MD in Oct. Recoupment and Final reports due in November.

Biodiversity Awareness programme: Coastwatch community workshop held in Wicklow Town 29th Sept. HO is co-ordinating this volunteer citizen science survey for County Wicklow. Programme of nature themed zoom evening/ lunchtime talks (8 in total) held in partnership with Wicklow Library Service held from Feb- July. Other activities include production and free distribution of publications (Wicklow Wildlife posters and Gardening for Wildlife booklets and other Wicklow habitat guides)

County Wicklow Swift Project; Survey work and public engagement elements complete. To date swift boxes have been deployed through this project to 17 towns and villages around county Wicklow, a



total of 36 individual locations. The total number of boxes involved is 72, of three types: single, double (Zeist plywood), and triple (Genesis, magnesium board) boxes. Of Council owned properties, nesting boxes and calling systems have been installed at the following libraries; Tinahely, Arklow, Wicklow Town, Baltinglass and Dunlavin, while they have also been installed at County Buildings, Wicklow Town, Arklow Municipal District Offices & Depot and at Arklow Courthouse.

Our Wicklow Heritage: 'Daoine agus Áit – Connecting our communities'. Joint project, co-funded with Healthy Ireland, in partnership with National Museum of Ireland, Clare and Galway county council's heritage offices. 19 Community groups (45 persons) participated in photography and creative writing workshops to produce bespoke postcards for their local area. Postcards produced and distributed for Heritage Week along with short videos from each group.

Anti-Dumping Initiative (ADI)

Seven projects were completed during August and September as part of the ADI 2021 funded by the Department of Environment, Climate and Communication. These comprised three hazardous waste collections, two mattress amnesty collections, one waste clean-up project and a bike-for-Africa project. The total expenditure was c. €77,000.



Whitestown Remediation Project

Wicklow County Council has employed Fehily Timoney & Company to advise on the remediation of the site at Whitestown, in accordance with the judgments of Mr. Justice Humphreys

- Draft remediation plan was lodged with Brownfield restoration Ireland Limited (BRIL) on 27th November.
- Following the receipt of submissions from a number of prescribed bodies, the High Court instructed WCC to incorporate the requests contained in the submissions into the draft plan and to commence surveys required for an Appropriate Assessment.
- Surveys of the qualifying interests, as agreed with NPWS are ongoing and due to be completed in December 2021.

Recycling Centres

A review of all of the Recycling Centres in line with the National Review document recently published on the DECC website is underway to assess how these Civic Amenities are operating with respect to both the service provided and VFM.

Climate Action

The annual return on progress of the actions in the Climate Adaptation Strategy to CARO was completed.

Following tender process, Consultants are being appointed to undertake a base line study for the Arklow Decarbonisation Zone and to assist in drawing up a draft Decarbonisation Zone Implementation Plan before the end of 2021.

LA Electrification of Fleet and EV charging - A Guidance Document was published on 17th August. One of the key recommendations from this guidance document is for each LA to prepare an EV and EVCP Strategy for their administrative areas to progress the fleet transition and implementation of suitably located EVCPs.

The draft Tree Management Policy was presented to the members of the Climate Action and Biodiversity SPC and discussed at the SPC meeting on the 9th September. Submissions have been received from the members of the SPC and are being addressed. A revised policy document will be discussed with the SPC on 22nd October.



Upper Avoca Catchment. Funding for this has still not been sourced and we are awaiting a call for Climate Action Fund Applications.

Energy

BEC 1121 application as set out below have been approved and with the support of 3 Counties Energy agency all projects are being progressed.

All paperwork for submission to SEAI to claim the grant is being collated with a deadline of 15th October.

Sustainable Energy Committees

Work continues on the Energy Master Plans, EMPs for Newtownmountkennedy, Greystones/Delgany, Wicklow and Blessington. Greystones/Delgany and Newtownmountkennedy are almost complete.

Glenmalure has completed its EMP. The committee is now focused on identifying projects to implement. Laragh Energy Master Plan is also complete and has been presented to the Community. Payment was made and a claim for reimbursement from SEAI has been submitted.

The grant application for an Energy Master Plan by Enniskerry SEC has been processed and a grant agreement signed between Wicklow County Council and SEAI. Work by consultants has started.

A new application for a grant to undertake an energy master plan was received from High Park SEC with St Patrick's Missionary Society in Kiltegan. The application has been submitted to SEAI who have approved the EMP.

A new SEC group was formed in Arklow. The application is now complete and due to be submitted to SEAI.

Environmental Awareness

Judging has been completed in the annual Tidy Town, Estates and sustainable development awards. This year the awards referenced the sustainable development goals. Waiting for results from national competition to complete list with award for best in national competition.

A new Tree nursery project has been started. Training is being provided to community groups in Baltinglass, Laragh, Bray and Greystones on the production of trees locally from seed in a nursery bed.

The annual Tree Grant has been advertised with a closing date for the 8th of October. Grants of up to 75% are provided for trees planted.

The Relove Fashion competition 2021/2022 has been launched using a new web portal for entries allowing for the participation of schools across ten local authorities.



Teacher training is being provided on Green School on the 21st of October. 14 schools have now been awarded Green Flags.

A new containers has been installed in Arklow recycling centre for the Bikes to Africa project to allow bike be collected from all our recycling centres for repair and shipment to Africa with the Rotary Club.

Work is ongoing on an EPA funded project to develop composting solutions for the management of the high levels of grass production which must be lifted when green space is being managed for pollinators. Three Tidy Town communities have been selected for the project and started site selection and training. They are Greystones, Blessington and Grangecon. The project has been extended to include Hollywood, Delgany and Newtownmountkennedy.

Wicklow County Council is one of three local authorities involved in an EPA funded pilot on separate collection of textiles which will test different approaches for improving the collection of textiles.. Donegal and Clare will test new collection systems while Wicklow will use a communications campaign to increase use of existing textile disposal options. The communications campaign will target one town, for which we will use Arklow, focusing on the charity shops in the town and the recycling centre.

This year's LAPN funding call from the EPA has been made. Three project applications were submitted from Wicklow. The first will look at circularity in textiles linking too and developing on from the CRNI/CTC textiles research project above. The project will involve workshops on upcycling of clothes and a demonstration project on upcycling partnering with charities in the town. The second project for which funding will be sought will for a Wicklow Naturally webinar or event on the circular economy for food producers. This project will be delivered in collaboration with the Wicklow LEO, highlighting the Green for Micro programme. A third project will link to the Bikes for Africa project and involve delivery of workshops on bicycle repair in the three larger recycling centres.

A Transition Year Climate Action programme to guide schools on engaging students in action at local level is being developed. Partners in the project are Kildare, Meath and Louth local authorities and the CARO office. It will link up with the GAA Future Leaders programme.

Wicklow County Council is working with eight other local authorities to develop a series of short videos on dog fouling for use on social media. The campaign will include six animated video each of which shows the impact dog fouling has on others using a variety of scenarios. We will seek matching gifs which can be shared by residents associations more easily on Whats app groups and will serve as reminders of the main campaign. The videos are currently in production.



Control of Dogs

Dog licences

433 licence reminders were sent out during September for dogs due to have their licences renewed in September or early October. 47 licences were not renewed for September. 411 licences were issued, 382 being yearly renewals and 29 lifetime licences were purchased.

Control of Horses

During September 2 horses were seized whilst straying and subsequently reclaimed by their owner. . 2 horses were rehomed in September 2021.

Beaches

Wicklow County Council asked people who swim at beaches, lakes and rivers to tell them if they think they should maintain existing designated bathing waters designations or give a new official bathing area designation to areas that are commonly used for swimming, but not identified at the moment. 30 submissions were received by 28th August and are being reviewed.

Brittas Bay Carparks

The carpark operator in both Brittas Bay North and Brittas Bay South has ceased operating as the bathing season is now over.

A review of Waste Management and operations at the South Beach is underway with the intention of improving same.

M11N11 Junction 4 to 14 Improvement Scheme

The online non-statutory public display of the Preferred Corridor that commenced on 30 August was concluded on 4thOctober. The initial public consultation period was set at 3 weeks but was subsequently extended by a further 2 weeks.

Engagement with the Project Team will continue throughout Phase 3 Detailed Design.

The Option Selection report will be finalised following the review of submissions received during public display and will then be made available to the public.

Both the project team and the Land Liaison team are continuing to meet virtually with the public and any interested groups.

Environmental Surveys are continuing on site, with field walkover surveys including Bat, Barn Owl, Hydro Surveys, Breeding Birds, to name but a few. Updates on the surveys that are being undertaken can be found on the project website www.n1tm11.ie.

M11N11 Bus Priority Interim Scheme

An interim bulletin update is intended following the public display on the J4 to 14 scheme.

Arup Consulting Engineers are progressing with the development of the Phase 2 (Options Selection) and Phase 3 (Design and Environmental Evaluation).

A Section 85 agreement is being drafted between Wicklow County Council and Dun Laoghaire Rathdown County Council.

N11 Parallel Service Road at Kilmacanogue -

Substantial completion of the construction contract certified for 24 September 2021. Completion of snagging and outstanding works will continue during October. The road works speed limit order was lifted on 01 October 2021, with the exception of the Parallel Service Road which will retain the RWSLO of 50km/h. The speed limit of 60km/h included in the current bye-laws will apply on the N11 mainline. It is intended to amend this bye-law to allow a 100km/h speed limit as intended by the Part 8 for the scheme. This will be further considered as part of the county wide review of speed limits.

N81 Knockroe Bend Realignment - scheme is complete. Some defect remediation works are still outstanding by the contractor on the road surfacing.



N81 Irishtown West, Whitestown Lower, Hangman's Bend and Tuckmill Lower "N81 Four Studies"

Following the completion of the Phase 1 (Feasibility Report) for the N81 Tuckmill Lower, Hangman's Bend, Whitestown Lower and Irishtown West projects (the 'N81 Four Studies'), Wicklow County Council has requested approval from TII to progress the scheme to Phase 2 (Route Selection) in accordance with the TII Project Management Guidelines (PMG).

N81 Pavement Capital Works - Resurfacing works of 4km of the N81 between Blessington and Rusborough House commenced during August and were substantially completed in September 2021.

N81 Capital Maintenance - Resurfacing works from Ballinacrow Upper to Saundersgrove Hill and at Hollywood Lower were completed in July 2021. Pavement repair (patching) was completed in Blessington in July

N81 Energy Reducing Public Lighting -

TII have provided funding for energy reducing public lighting schemes at N81 Lambs Junction & Hollywood Junction

Materials (head units) on order from Airtricity and are awaiting delivery

N81 TII Vehicle Restraint Systems (VRS) Programme 2021

The contract involves 9 complete barrier replacements and 6 barrier repairs. The contract also involves the provision of temporary traffic management at one site to facilitate a VRS survey and risk assessment.

The contract has been awarded to CHM who are current awaiting delivery of materials.

Sustainable Transportation Measures Grant Schemes

Bray Strand Road Cycle Route – Works are substantially complete on the Seafront Plaza with road marking, bollard installation, planting, minor repairs and snagging still to be completed.

Bray Dart Interchange – Atkins Consulting Engineers are currently finalising the detail design for this project. It is anticipated that the detail design will be completed in October.

Greystones Transport Study – The Contract for Consultants to undertake the Greystones Transport Study has been awarded to Ove Arup Consulting Engineers. Work has commenced on the preparation of the Baseline Assessment of the study area.

Arklow Transport Study – DBFL Consulting Engineers have carried out a Baseline Assessment of the study area and are drafting the Baseline Report. They have also commenced work on the Context Report which will identify the transport objectives and issues relating to the study area.

Delgany Village Accessibility Scheme – Tenders were advertised for Consultants to undertake the management of the project from Detail Design Stage to Project Completion. Two tenders have been received and these are currently being assessed.

Pedestrian Access Route Wicklow Train Station AECOM Consulting Engineers have completed the Options Assessment Report. Consultation is ongoing with landowners. Work is ongoing on the Preliminary Design for the scheme.



Bus Priority in Little Bray – Topographical and GPR Surveying work have been completed along with the traffic parking surveys. DBFL Consulting Engineers have commenced work on the concept development of the scheme.

Safe Routes to School – The Greenschools Infrastructure Officer is meeting with each of the three schools that are included in the first phase of the Safe Route to Schools Programme for Wicklow. User surveys will be carried out in each school and Delivery Plans will then be drafted.

Kilmacanogue to Southern Cross Road Greenway – RPS Consulting Engineers are working on the Revised Options Assessment Report. Topographical surveys have been completed and Ecological surveys are being undertaken. Site investigation works are to commence in the coming weeks.

Southern Cross Road Improvement Scheme – Barry Transportation has completed the Feasibility Report and have commenced the Options Assessment Stage. Topographical and GPR Surveys have been carried out.

NTA Active Travel 2021 — There are now 15 schemes listed under the Active Travel 2021 programme with overall funding allocation of €2.077M with Red Lane and Manor Kilbride Schemes now progressing under Active Travel. Gateway approval submissions have been made to the NTA for 12 of the schemes with further submissions anticipated in early October 2021. Construction Works have commenced on 7 of the schemes with further schemes to commence in the coming weeks.

Wicklow County Council Compulsory Purchase Chapel Road Pedestrian and Cyclist Infrastructure Improvement Scheme) No.1 Order, 2021

Wicklow County Council has prepared and lodged CPO documents with An Bord Pleanala in order to upgrade the existing Chapel Road by the provision of pedestrian and cycle infrastructure to improve traffic arrangements and pedestrian and cyclist accessibility.

The upgrade works include the improvement of the Chapel Road/Convent Road Roundabout, the upgrade of footpaths, the provision of cycle tracks facilities, pedestrian crossings, public lighting, traffic calming measures new road signs and road markings, new gullies draining to a new storm water collection system, the provision of a 250mm PE4 Bar main along the extent of Chapel Road, the construction of new boundary treatments, new entrances, and landscaping.

Oral Hearing for this scheme to be held by An Bord Pleanala on the 19th October 2021.

Newtownmountkennedy Town Centre Refurbishment Scheme

A consultant has been appointed to provide Technical Consultancy Services to bring the Newtownmountkennedy Town Centre Refurbishment scheme from Preliminary Design / planning and readiness for application for funding for construction. The scheme intends to undertake works to focus on the enhancement of Newtownmountkennedy town centre to address issues of physical and economic decline with significant levels of vacancy and a lack of focal points in the town centre. Significant traffic management issues have also been identified. At the same time Wicklow County Council intends to provide a relevant and necessary level of community facilities in order to build social cohesion and enable a resilient community.

A meeting with the local community has taken place to hear their expectations / main issues.



Arklow Parade Ground Public Realm

Under the Urban Regeneration and Development Fund Wicklow County Council received funding for the construction of the Arklow Parade Ground Public Realm. A consultant was appointed to provide Technical Consultancy Services to bring the Arklow Parade Ground Public Realm scheme through all stages. This involves public realm and streetscape improvements to the Parade Ground area and Main Street, amendments to the existing parking arrangements and bus stop on Arklow Main Street.

A contractor has been appointed and the works started in September 2021

Blessington Inner Relief Road

Wicklow County Council is currently advancing on proposals to complete the Blessington Inner Relief Road Project. The completion of the Blessington Inner Relief Road will provide a safer transport facility and will take traffic away from the busy town centre. The project will involve the construction of a northern and southern section, which will tie in with existing sections west of the town centre. A consultant has been appointed for the scheme to bring it through all stages of the design / planning and land access.

High level environmental assessments are currently being carried out of the emerging preferred option.

Arklow Shillelagh Greenway

Wicklow County Council issued letters to all landowners along the above route advising that updated additional environmental surveys are required in advance of planning and environmental reports. These will be carried out in October 2021 and documents for planning updated after that.

Bray Sustainable Transport Bridge

Wicklow County Council held apublic consultation of the Part 8 process for Bray Sustainable Transport Bridge Project.

This process is currently suspended while An Bord Pleanala considers the request that an Environmental Impact Assessment is carried out for the scheme.

Baltinglass Town Centre Plan

Consultants are progressing though the detailed design of this Public Realm improvement scheme with the intention of inviting tenders for construction Q4 2021.

Cunningham's Corner

As part of Specific Road Improvement Funding, realignment of a bend is required on the R755 Roundwood to KIlmacanoge Road (near Djouce golf club) where there have been a number of incidents over the years. Consultants are completing final design option. Agreements have been signed with both affected Landowners. Tree and hedge removal and construction has commenced on site.

Sally's Bridge

Construction has commenced at Sally's Bridge to widen the existing junction to improve sight lines and turning movements. Due to insufficient junction width, the bridge parapet wall is being



continuously damaged. Drainage works are required as part of this project and are substantially complete.

Bridge Crew works

The Bridge crew is currently finishing off re-building a section of damaged parapet at Rednagh bridge, Aughrim. Ballinaclash cappings have been replaced after a strike. Tombreane bridge parapet was repaired after being hit by a vehicle and scour repairs have been completed at Boley Bridge, Shillelagh in September.

Machinery Yard – Working with Climate team in relation to installing EV chargers in Council depots across the county. Nissan and Peugeot Electric Vans have been road tested within the Municipal Districts. The Maxus e deliver 3 and e deliver 9 were on trial in the last few weeks. Feedback from all Departments expected later this week.

The EV charger contractor has been appointed. SEE Airtricity is the preferred contractor. EV chargers to be installed in 6 depots across the county. Works have commenced on site.

Capital replacement programme for replacement of the fleet is currently being worked on and with the Environment Section on the purchase of a new truck for the Pure Project.

As part of compliance with RSA regulations, trial of Fleet Maintenance systems is ongoing in the Machinery Yard.

Pro Works – trial has proved very successful. Pro-Work to roll out to the roads section and Municipal Districts. Tablets have been rolled out to some staff in Roads. Training took place in October.

Surface Dressing: Surface Dressing commenced on the 30th May in the Arklow District, and has moved between each Municipal District as planned. The weather has been favourable for most of the season, except for week ending 25th July when Road temperatures reached 50 degrees and above. Surface dressing was stood down due to high temperatures. Works programme for 2021 complete and after care sweeping has finished also.

PLEEP – (STET) The tender for the appointment of a Consultant to manage the process from Stage (i) preliminary report, Stage (ii) preparation of Tender Documentation including any design works and Stage (iii) Tender for the "Works" (was published on e-tenders on 23 October 2020. 3 tenders received by return date of 24 November 2020. ARUP was appointed. Draft tender documentation issued to WCC for review at the end of June and comments returned. The target for the publication of the tender for the "Works"- Stage (iv)-(V) is the end of July 2021 with tender return at end of October 2021. Award date of Works contract will be mid Q1 2022.

There were 104 incidents attended during the month of September 2021. Individual Fire Stations were mobilised on a total of 117 occasions including 2 incidents in other counties. There was no



occasion during the month when an Incident Commander requested an additional crew above what had been predetermined for the incident type to deal with the incident.

Operational activity for the month of September **decreased by -4% on the preceding month** (August 2021 – 122 mobilisations). Small outdoor fires started maliciously continue to be an issue particularly in the Bray area (approximately 5 per week). They represent 50% of all incidents in Bray and 27% across the county. Of total incidents in the county alarm activations represented 20%.

In spite of the spate of malicious outdoor fires and gorse fires operational activity for the month of September 2021 **decreased by -24% on the equivalent month in 2020** (September 2020 – 153 mobilisations). This is manly accounted for by a decrease in gorse fires, down from 34 to 17 and a reduction in calls to other counties, down from 11 to 2.

- ➤ 10/09/2021 Crews from Bray and Greystones attended a tumble drier on fire in a shed to the rear of the house in Oldcourt, Bray. The shed was adjacent to the plastic oil tank for central heating.
- ➤ 11/09/2021 Crews from Greystones and Wicklow Town attended a 2-vehicle RTC at Monalin on the R765 to Roundwood, 1-person trapped.
- ➤ 12/09/2021 Crews from Dunlavin and Blessington attended a 1-vehicle RTC near Donard on the N81. 1 occupant trapped, air bags deployed.
- ➤ 18/09/2021 Crews from Dunlavin and Blessington attended an RTC on the N81 near the Poulaphouca Dam involving a motorbike and a truck.
- 21/09/2021 Crews from Wicklow Town, Arklow and Greystones (tanker) attended a hay barn fire in Redcross.

Register of Electors

The 2021/2022 Live Register was published on 1st February 2021 in line with statutory regulations. Due to the ongoing Covid-19 Emergency we are limited in the number of areas we can distribute the Register to. The Register is available for inspection in each of the Municipal District Offices and at the Customer Service Hub in County Buildings. The Political Extract was generated and issued to all Council Members, TD's and Senator via email. The total number of Electors on the 2021/2022 Live Register of Electors is 102,346 and there are 206 polling stations in Wicklow.

The Franchise staff will continue to strive for excellence on the Register of Electors database. We are continuing to accept applications from 18 year olds and new residents moving into the county in the event that an electoral event occurs and there is a requirement for a Supplement Register. We will continue to make contact with new housing developments and urban areas where new developments are coming on stream in an effort to get new residents register and have had a good response from new housing developments in the past 2 months.

We will continue to work on areas where there is a lack of Eircodes and dates of birth. Wicklow Co. Co. are now the lead authority in terms of Eircode coverage on the register with over 99% of the electorate having an Eircode attached to their Register of Electors entry. We are continuing to assist the LGMA in their exercise to have other Local Authorities achieve similar Eircode coverage on their own Register of Electors. Approximately 1500 letters have issued to electors for whom we have no date of birth or an anomaly in their date of birth entry. We are also working very closely with the Department of Heritage, Planning and Local Government as one of the lead authorities on the Electoral Register Reform Bill.

We will be commencing a print and social media presence in the coming weeks to seek applications to entry on the Register of Electors along with postal vote applications for the elderly and vulnerable if they wish to have a postal vote. It is hoped still that once Covid restrictions are lifted that we will be in a position to establish voter registration days in schools, shopping centres and libraries.



Twelve Month Rates Waiver: A waiver of commercial rates was applied to specified businesses for the first, second and third quarters of 2021. This 9-month waiver has modified criteria and accordingly is a separate, standalone waiver scheme to the previous 2020 scheme. There was no application process required for this scheme. Wicklow County Council automatically applied a 100% credit in lieu of commercial rates for the quarter periods to eligible properties. An extension to the commercial rates waiver was announced in Budget 2022. This waiver is for Q4 2021 and will be "targeted at the hospitality, arts and certain tourism related sectors."

General Municipal Allocation and Discretionary Fund 2021

The Discretionary Funding allocation for 2021 was decreased in line with the 2021 LPT rate reduction. The 2021 funding provision consists of mainly General Municipal Allocations used to support local groups and initiative etc. There was no public realm funding allocated this year, however unspent monies in this area from 2020 have been made available to Municipal Districts in 2021. The Level 5 Covid restrictions on construction which were in place up to May 4th prevented any public realm works being carried out up to that date.
