RESOLUTIONS
Respecting Public Business, entered in County Book.

Lent Assizes, 1784.

RESOLVED Unanimously, that we will not hereafter present any sum to the high constables of this county for collecting the public cesses, unless each high constable shall give a transcript of the treasurer's warrant, containing a recital of every presentment therein, to each of his petty constables, and do also indorse on the back of every petty constable's warrant a list of all the petty constablewicks in his district, with the several sums to be collected off of each.

Lent Assizes, 1797.

RESOLVED, that it is proper that the sheriff and gaoler of the county shall, on the first day of each assizes lay before the Grand Jury a list of all bolts, shackles, and padlocks, in his or their custody on that day, as also, a list of all such bolts, shackles, and padlocks, as were delivered to them by the preceding sheriff.

AND, that we recommend it to every future assizes grand jury to reject every application of every sheriff and gaoler who shall not have presented such lists at such assizes, verified by an affidavit or affidavits sworn before some magistrate of this county.

Spring Assizes, 1800.

RESOLVED, that it is the opinion of this Grand Jury, that all sums presented previous to lent assizes, 1798, which shall not be accounted for at the next summer assizes, be then re-presented for public purposes.

Summer Assizes, 1800.

RESOLVED, that all applications for presentments of money for fees, support of prisoners, rents, &c. with the proper documents, be given to the Clerk of the Grand Jury before the second morning of the assizes, to be by him entered in a list, and then laid before the Grand Jury.

Spring Assizes, 1801.

RESOLVED, that it is the opinion of the Grand Jury, that in future the gaoler shall, at the end of every week, make out an account of the number of prisoners in his custody, for the week preceding, distinguishing the number in custody on each day, and also, of the quantity of bread distributed to such prisoners, and the fuel, blankets, and other necessaries, furnished for the use of the prisoners in that week, and, that such account shall be verified upon oath, copies of which account shall be returned weekly to the inspector of the gaol, and the original returned to the Grand Jury at each assizes.

RESOLVED, that whenever the expences for bread and other necessaries shall appear, by the accounts and affidavits before required, to exceed the sum presented for the said purposes, the treasurer be, and is hereby requested, from time to time, when requested by the said inspector so to do, to advance money to the inspector to reimburse such exceeding, provided the sum to be so advanced, shall not amount in the whole to more than the sum of fifty pounds.

RESOLVED, that the gaoler of Wicklow is required to produce to the Grand Jury at every assizes, and at every sessions, an exact list of the blankets in his custody, distinguishing the length and width of each blanket, and that he keep an exact copy of every such list, and produce that book at every assizes to the Grand Jury.

RESOLVED, that it is the opinion of the Grand Jury, that the gaoler of Wicklow, at the first day of each assizes, lay before the Grand Jury a list of all bolts, shackles, padlocks, in his or their custody, or that day, at the first day of each assizes, and padlocks, as were delivered to them by the gaoler, in the county of Wicklow, and that he keep an exact copy of every such list, and produce that book at every assizes to the Grand Jury.

Spring Assizes, 1800.

RESOLVED, that it is the opinion of the Grand Jury, that all bills and accounts, previous to the assizes, which shall not be accounted for at the next assizes, be returned to the Grand Jury at the assizes, and that the original be returned to the Gaoler.

Summer Assizes, 1800.

RESOLVED, that all applications for payments of money for the support of prisoners, with the proper documents, be laid before the Grand Jury, and that the Grand Jury before the second meeting of the assizes, lay before the Grand Jury, and that the original be returned to the Gaoler.

Spring Assizes, 1801.

RESOLVED, that it is the opinion of the Grand Jury, that in future the gaoler shall, at the end of every week, make out an account of the number of prisoners in his custody, for the week preceding, distinguishing the number in custody on each day, and also, of the quantity of bread distributed to such prisoners, and the fuel, blankets, and other necessaries, furnished for the use of the prisoners in that week, and that such account shall be verified upon oath, copies of which account shall be returned weekly to the inspector of the gaol, and the original returned to the Grand Jury at each assizes.

RESOLVED, that whenever the expences for bread and other necessaries shall appear, by the accounts and affidavits before required, to exceed the sum presented for the said purposes, the treasurer be, and is hereby requested, from time to time, when requested by the said inspector so to do, to advance money to the inspector to reimburse such exceeding, provided the sum to be so advanced, shall not amount in the whole to more than the sum of fifty pounds.

RESOLVED, that the gaoler of Wicklow is required to produce to the Grand Jury at every assizes, and at every sessions, an exact list of the blankets in his custody, distinguishing the length and width of each blanket, and that he keep an exact copy of every such list, and produce that book at every assizes to the Grand Jury.

RESOLVED, that it is the opinion of the Grand Jury, that the gaoler of Wicklow, at the first day of each assizes, lay before the Grand Jury a list of all bolts, shackles, and padlocks, in his or their custody on that day, and a list of all such bolts, shackles, and padlocks, as were delivered to the prisoners during the preceding term.

AND that we recommend to every gaoler, that he lay to rest every application or every thing, which he has not presented to the Grand Jury at the assizes, varied by an affidavit, or a return before some magistrate of this county.

Spring Assizes, 1800.

RESOLVED, that it is the opinion of the Grand Jury, that all bills presented previous to last assizes, 1800, which shall not be accounted for at the next assizes, be returned to the gaoler, to be laid up in a book.

Summer Assizes, 1800.

RESOLVED, that all applications for payments of money for the support of prisoners, return, &c. with the proper documents, be laid to the Grand Jury, Grand Jury before the second morning of the assizes, to be by them entered in a list, and then laid before the Grand Jury.

Spring Assizes, 1801.

RESOLVED, that it is the opinion of the Grand Jury, that in future the gaoler shall, at the end of every week, make out an account of the number of prisoners in his custody, for the week preceding, distinguishing the number in custody on each day, and also, of the quantity of bread distributed to such prisoners, and the fuel, blankets, and other necessaries, furnished for the use of the prisoners in that week, and that such account shall be verified upon oath, copies of which account shall be returned weekly to the inspector of the gaol, and the original returned to the Grand Jury at each assizes.

RESOLVED, that whenever the expences for bread and other necessaries shall appear, by the accounts and affidavits before required, to exceed the sum presented for the said purposes, the treasurer be, and is hereby requested, from time to time, when requested by the said inspector so to do, to advance money to the inspector to reimburse such exceeding, provided the sum to be so advanced, shall not amount in the whole to more than the sum of fifty pounds.

RESOLVED, that the gaoler of Wicklow is required to produce to the Grand Jury at every assizes, and at every sessions, an exact list of the blankets in his custody, distinguishing the length and width of each blanket, and that he keep an exact copy of every such list, and produce that book at every assizes to the Grand Jury.

RESOLVED, that it is the opinion of the Grand Jury, that the gaoler of the county shall, on the first day of each assizes, lay before the Grand Jury a list of all bolts, shackles, padlocks, in his or their custody on that day, and a list of all such bolts, shackles, and padlocks, as were delivered to the gaoler, or gaolers, during the assizes.

AND, that we recommend it to every assizes, that the assizes be held every year, at the same place, and at the same time, as in and by the Statute in that behalf made, and the Statute in that behalf made, respectively.

Spring Assizes, 1800.

RESOLVED, that it is the opinion of the Grand Jury, that all bills of exchange, previous to the assizes, 1800, which shall not be returned, for the next assizes, be returned to the assizes, before the assizes, 1800.

Summer Assizes, 1800.

RESOLVED, that all warrants for the apprehension of money for the support of prisoners, and all warrants for the apprehension of money for the support of prisoners, be returned to the assizes, before the assizes, 1800, and then laid before the Grand Jury.
