The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board, and directions given thereon, as follows:

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, (or, Orders made on them respectively, as follows:)

A Letter was read from the Commissioners enclosing a Form to be signed by a Majority of the Guardians consenting to the disposition of £1000 by the Poor Law Commissioners in building a new Hospital, which Form was duly signed and the Clerk was instructed to inform the Commissioners that the House was intended to contain 100 patients and that they would adopt the plans supplied by the Commissioners.

A second Letter was read from the Commissioners calling the attention of the Guardians to the report made by the Architect of the repairs required to be done in the Workhouse the Clerk was ordered to receive tenders for improving the Slating.

A third letter was read from the Commissioners instructing the Clerk ~~to~~ not to sign cheques for Relieving Officers whose appointment has not been sanctioned by the Commissioners

^{4th} letter was read from the Commissioners sanctioning the appointment of Mr John Barth as Relieving Officer for the Wicklow District and stating that they could not sanction the appointment of Messrs William Manning Robert Manning and Pitt Moran in consequence of their holding land. Those officers were brought before the Board and satisfied the Guardians that they had disposed of their lands by letting and otherwise and that they have now no occupation but that of Relieving officers.

The Guardians then instructed their Clerk to write to the Commissioners requesting the sanction of their appointment.

It was proposed and seconded that notwithstanding the reading of the Minutes of the last day's proceedings the papers applying for admission ~~to~~ should be disposed of.

Provisional Admissions into the Workhouse, and applications for admissions were considered and decided on, as set forth in the Application and Report Book.

The Bonds and other securities in force were laid before the Guardians by the Clerk, together with his Report thereon, as follows: (this on the second Meeting after the Annual Election in every year.)

Mr Fitzwilliam's agent Robert Chalmer Esq attended with a Commission of the Board and fixed upon a piece of Land to be rented to the Guardians for a Burial ground to be attached to the New Hospital, being an addition of about a quarter of an acre to that purchased obtained for the New Hospital.

Mr Michael Byrne brought forward his resolution of which notice had been previously given to the Guardians of the Union, that the Government Valuation be adopted for the levying the Poor rates when an Amendment was proposed by Mr Simon Munn seconded by Mr Suter that in order to effect a more equitable adjustment of the rate that the present Poor Law Valuation be reduced ~~25~~ 25 per cent the amendment was put, and carried by a large Majority.

Proposed by Mr Geo Cunningham seconded by Mr H McKeown that under the Authority of the 6th Section of the Irish Poor Relief Extension Act 10th Vict. Chap. 31 The Guardians of the Electoral Divisions of the New Castle & Hilliskey being Six Miles from the Union Workhouse are hereby authorized to form a distinct Board in their own Electoral Division subject to the usual Regulations.

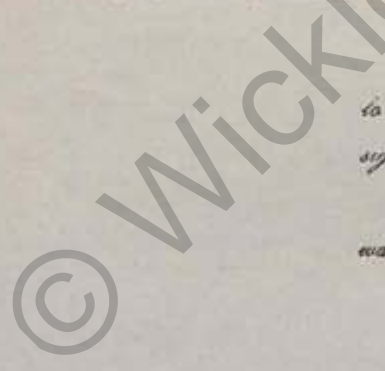

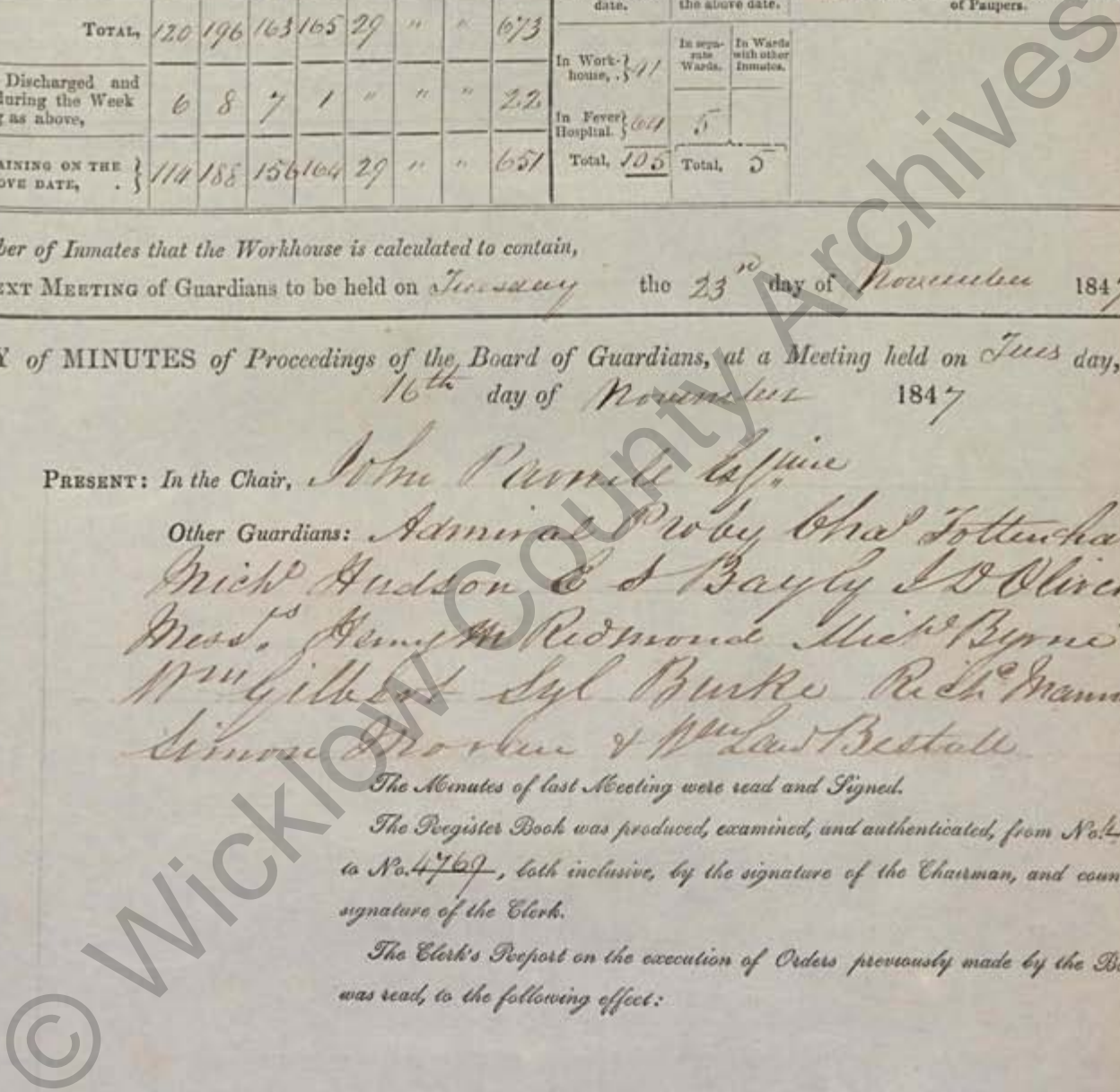

That in some of the Electoral Divisions the travelling weekly to the Union Work House as required by Law cannot be estimated at less than 4s. a week.
