



WICKLOW COUNTY ARCHIVES

The Wicklow County Archives Service, located in Wicklow Library, Wicklow town, offers a rich resource for researchers of wide and varying interests - students, history teachers, local and family historians, academic researchers and those interested in the story of County Wicklow, the history and development of the county, of local communities, and the authorities who served them. Among the jewels of the collection, which includes workhouse registers and private collections, are the 17th and 18th century Wicklow Borough records. These early minute books offer a snapshot of life in Wicklow from the mid-1600s. The county archives also hold the records of the Grand Jury, which was the precursor of Wicklow County Council, the Boards of Guardians of the poor law unions and the boards of health, rural and district, town and county councils as well as private papers of families, businesses and organisations.

"Resolved—Whereas R. C. Barton, T.D., was savagely sentenced to a term of penal servitude in an English prison by a Court-martial of the English Army of Occupatiou in Ireland, and, whereas the offence with which he was charged was an alleged speech of which certain units of the English force gave evidence, by stating that they took a "mental note" of the words alleged to be uttered,

"We, the members of the Wicklow County Council, at this our initial meeting, as a protest against this inhuman treatment, and as proof that the Irish patriot in an English prison is ever dear to his people, hereby confer on R. C. Barton the highest honour it is our gift to bestow, that of Chairman of this Council.

"Further, we ask the justice loving people of every land to note that R. C. Barton fought in France for the freedom of small Nationalities, and that England, the 'Champion of Small Nations,' rewards him with a convict cell for seeking to free the oldest of the small Nations—Ireland."

Wicklow County Council Minutes - 18th June 1920: The Council protests against the imprisonment of RC Barton T.D. and make him Chairman of the Council. Barton would later be a leading participant in the Treaty Negotiations, 1921.

WICKLOW ARCHIVES' RSR PROJECT

The Leaving Certificate History *Research Study Report* is an important element of the examination, accounting for 20% of the overall marks in the exam. It is completed by students in advance of the final examination, generally in 5th or 6th year, and submitted to the State Examinations Commission (SEC). Although the requirements for the RSR are relatively demanding most students achieve good marks in their final presentations. The final RSR document is presented as a research paper on an historical topic selected by the students. A key component of the paper is that it demonstrates a student's capacity to carry out research, to assess the usefulness of the source material and to compose an essay which demonstrates good historical understanding.

Topic selection and the identification of information sources, to support your chosen topic, are a key component of the research process. Wicklow County Archives and the Our Wicklow Heritage website hold an enormous amount of information on the history of the county, its people and places. While a good deal of the information is local in its nature, the county did not exist in isolation of important national and international events. From the 1798 rebellion, the famine, the struggle for votes for Catholics and later women's enfranchisement, 1916, World War I, the War of Independence, through the Civil War, the establishment of the state and industrial and economic development, the people and places of Wicklow all had a role to play.

The purpose of this guide is to make teachers and students aware of the history around them in County Wicklow and its impact locally, nationally and internationally. It also outlines the kind of historical information available in both the Wicklow County Archives and the Our Wicklow Heritage website and how that can be used in supporting topic selection for the History RSR.

PRIVATE COLLECTIONS

The County Archives hold private collections relating to families, businesses and organisations in county Wicklow. The periods covered by these collections are the 18th and 20th centuries.

The Frizell Estate Papers

Charles Frizell moved to Wicklow in around 1776 and over about twenty years he built up substantial land-holdings in Annamoe. Both Charles and his younger brother Richard Frizell made names for themselves as reputable land surveyors, serving the needs of their aristocratic clients in the counties Kerry, Roscommon, Dublin, Cavan, Meath, Westmeath, Kildare, Laois, Galway, Wexford and Wicklow. Charles also served on the Wicklow Grand Jury. The collection of letters, maps and other materials provides a unique insight into their lives and careers.



The Wicklow Grand Jury - Virtual Record Treasury of Ireland

The Grand Jury was the highest authority in the county until the county councils were established in 1898. A panel of major landowners, the Grand Jury was established in each county to make decisions on legal matters, their remit gradually expanding to local public works such as roads, bridges and public buildings, including gaols, courthouses, etc. A precursor to modern local government, the Grand Juries had a detailed and intimate connection with their local populations.

Wicklow County Archives collaborated with the Virtual Record Treasury of Ireland in this special project "People, Place and Power: The Grand Jury System in Ireland". SPECIAL PROJECT: COOLATTIN LIVES

A collaboration between The Courthouse Arts Centre, Tinahely; Trinity College Dublin, the National Library of Ireland and Wicklow County Archives.

The Coolattin Estate covered 85,000 acres in south Co. Wicklow. Generations of families rented farms and cottages from the Fitzwilliam family (later Wentworth-Fitzwilliam). As progressive landlords, the Fitzwilliams kept careful records of their tenants. Between 1847 and 1856 the estate assisted hundreds of families to emigrate to Canada. The estate's emigration list contains details of over 6,000 individuals, giving their name, age and relationship to other members of their household, the location where they lived, and a record of their departure from Ireland.

County Wicklow Heritage

County Wicklow Heritage (*https://heritage.wicklowheritage.org*) is the county-wide heritage archives coordinated by Wicklow County Council's Heritage Office, Library Service and County Archives. This initiative is supported through the Irish Community Archive Network (iCAN), a National Museum of Ireland initiative delivered in partnership with Wicklow County Council. This living archive is constantly growing as more material is contributed. Currently there are over 600 articles (including podcasts) from locations throughout the county on a wide variety of topics. The site is arranged in three main sections – "People", "Topics" and "Places". The content of the site is being continually updated by local historians, the County Archives and the Heritage and Library services.

People section

In 'People' you will find articles on individuals who feature in the history and cultural life of County Wicklow. This section also includes the *Our Wicklow Women* project, featuring the stories of notable Wicklow women who have contributed to their local areas, or played a role on the national or international stage.

Places section



In 'Places' you will find heritage content relating to over 32 places in the county. 

Topics section

THE LEAVING CERTIFICATE HISTORY RESEARCH STUDY REPORT

The Research Study Report accounts for 20% of the marks allocated for the Leaving Certificate History examination. It is generally completed, in 5th and/or 6th year, over a period of months with reviews and input from teachers.

The breakdown of marks is as follows:

For the majority of students the idea of carrying out research will be a new and for some, a very challenging experience.

There are two main questions you should consider in selecting the topic for your research study. The first is *"Am I interested in the topic?"*. Choosing a subject you would like to know more about will help keep your enthusiasm up as you begin your project. The second thing to think about is *"How easy is it to find the information I need?"*. Selecting a topic on which good historical information is readily available will make it easier for you to find out what you need. Later in this guide, we will list out a range of potential research topics on which there is a great deal of information available from the Wicklow Archives and its related resources. While these resources will relate to Wicklow it is important to remember that Wicklow, like any other part of Ireland, was influenced by and had influence on issues of both national and international importance. In addition, it has the benefit of being about the people and the places that you know.

Once a topic has been chosen, the RSR requires that students must undertake research using primary and secondary sources. Research - Primary & Secondary Sources

The RSR requires that students identify primary and /or secondary sources for the information they present in their submission. Secondary sources have to be specialist sources, for example, *"Wicklow and the War of Independence"*. At Higher Level, students are expected to have at least **three** sources. Ordinary Level students need to have at least **two** sources, but there is no harm in using three.

Primary sources are records that were created at the time of the event or direct records of people who had experienced the event.

Secondary sources are from a later date created after the event or time being studied.

WHAT MAKES A GOOD TOPIC

You can research any part of history for the RSR – e.g., political, sporting, military, local, women's, scientific, warfare, etc. **BUT the topic must be historically significant!**

In working out if the topic is historically significant they must meet at least one of the following criteria:

1	Remarkable
2	Remembered
3	Resulting in Change
4	Revealing
