16 COUNCILLOR BEHAN: Sorry, Cathaoirleach, I am sure Helen will probably be
17 proposing a vote of sympathy for the late Bryan Doyle who cortege we stood
18 attention to this morning outside County Buildings. So I just want to offer my
19 sympathy to Brian's wife Mary, and his family, and all of his former colleagues here
20 in Wicklow County Council, those who are still here and those who are retired, on
21 the sad passing of Bryan. I remember him very, very well arriving to Wicklow
22 County Council as the last County Secretary that we had in this Local Authority
23 before the system changed. He was an absolute gentleman in every respect, an
24 extremely hard-working council official but very mindful of the role of councillor
25 and public representation generally and always did his best to be of assistance to
26 members of the public and also Elected Members of the Council. We all know he
27 has been ill for some time and it's been a very difficult time for him and his family
28 and friends, and all I can say is that I offer my heartfelt sympathy to Mary, and his
29 family, and all of his colleagues today. Thank you.

30 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Gerry O'Neill.

31 COUNCILLOR O'NEILL: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. Yeah, I'd just like to join with
32 Councillor Behan in sympathies for Bryan Doyle. I know when I started here 13, 14
33 year ago Bryan was a helpful type of individual. I know he was manager here for
34 some time. This tragic illness. He was a great man. And I knew him also through

1 the GAA and his role with St Patrick's, and myself as chairman in Lackan Football
2 Club, but he was a lovely individual. May he rest in peace.

3

4 I'd also like to mention a dear friend of my own and the people of West Wicklow,
5 May Nolan of Knocknadroose who passed away this morning. May lived in a very,
6 very old house in the hills of Wicklow, and a historic house. It was well-known that
7 the last person who died in the Civil War was shot in this particular house by
8 Plunkett. She leaves a large family behind her. So I offer my sympathies to May
9 this morning.

10 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Gail Dunne online.

11 COUNCILLOR DUNNE: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I am sorry I am not there
12 today. I am actually en route to the funeral, so apologies about that. It's well-known
13 in the chamber with the staff that myself and Bryan had a unique friendship, and
14 over the last 29 years I'd say we'd more cups of tea more times together. Oh, we had
15 great times together. And just thinking about Mary, Ciaran, Sorcha and Katie. A
16 great GAA man, a great St Pat's man. I really enjoyed his company. I lost a very
17 good friend last Friday. Thank you.

18 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Dunne. Councillor Tom Fortune.

19 COUNCILLOR FORTUNE: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. Yeah, I'd just like to be
20 associated with Councillor Behan's remarks. Bryan, I dealt with Bryan for many,
21 many years, and he was always very, very fair. Also Bryan, as Councillor Dunne
22 said, was a big GAA man and was very good in the community outside of his role
23 here in the Council. So commiserations to Mary and all the family at this very sad
24 time.

25 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Pat Mahon.

26 COUNCILLOR MAHON: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Yeah, I'd like to be
27 associated with that vote of sympathy there for May Nolan from Knocknadroose,
28 Ballymount. May was my next-door neighbour. What an incredible neighbour she
29 was all her life, and a great family friend and a great neighbour. I would like to offer
30 my sympathy to her family. Thank you.

31 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Patsy Glennon.

32 COUNCILLOR GLENNON: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Yes, I'd like to be
33 associated with the untimely death of May Nolan as well. A decent woman and a
34 fine family. I'd be friendly with a son of hers, Michael, well-known in GAA circles,

1 Michael nicknamed The Badger and many other family members as well. They
2 suffered tragedy as well during Covid with someone dying with Covid, a grandson of
3 May's.

4

5 I would like to offer condolences to the family of Jim Fitzmaurice of Baltinglass.
6 Jim was a guard in Baltinglass for many, many years and he was buried during the
7 week. Thank you.

8 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Pat Fitzgerald.

9 COUNCILLOR FITZGERALD: Yeah, I was in touch with Bryan over the last 25
10 years. He was a man I had great time for. Actually he dealt with Arklow Municipal
11 District. He dealt with the whole of the district. I didn't realise that when I got a call
12 that he was so ill, but he was a great man. I was there yesterday at the wake and
13 there were so many tributes being paid to Bryan. I was talking to his wife and
14 family, and it is a sad day for everyone.

15 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Silvester Bourke.

16 COUNCILLOR BOURKE: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Yes, on behalf of the Fine
17 Gael group I'd just like to offer our sympathies to the Doyle family as well on the
18 passing of Bryan. And like Councillor Fitzgerald, I have known Bryan since 1999,
19 since I was first elected, and worked with him on the Arklow district as manager. He
20 was really good; he had great vision and a great many of his projects came to
21 fruition, and he has left plenty of legacies around our district. We have missed and
22 we will miss him in the future as well because he was a gentleman and one of those
23 rare people that you could really work with and understood the other side of the
24 argument. So may he rest in peace.

25 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Can we all stand for a moment's silence, please?
26 Sorry, sympathies.

27 MS PURCELL: In addition to extending our sympathies to the family of our former
28 colleague and friend Bryan Doyle, husband of our former colleague and friend Mary
29 Doyle, I also wish to add our former colleague and friend Marian Canavan who is
30 mother of our colleagues and friends, three of her children work in the Council,
31 Michael, Christopher, and Georgina Canavan. Thank you.

1 MS PURCELL: May their souls and the souls of all the faithfully departed, through
2 the mercy of God, rest in peace.

3 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Before we start on the agenda of today's meeting
4 I just want to take a few moments just to reflect on my year as Cathaoirleach of
5 Wicklow County Council, and on the immense pride it has brought to both me and
6 my family.

7
8 This time last year I sat in this very seat feeling very anxious about taking on the
9 role, and I asked myself all the questions that many people do when faced with a new
10 challenge: Could I do it? Would I do the position justice? Did I have the
11 confidence to lead this Council? And in my end I told myself something very
12 simply: Feel the fear and do it anyway. And that's what I did. And that became my
13 mantra throughout the whole year whenever things became challenging, and it
14 served me well.

15
16 I want to sincerely thank all of you for your cooperation, your support and patience
17 throughout the year. It has been a fantastic experience and a year filled with firsts. I
18 have had the privilege of travelling across every corner of County Wicklow meeting
19 communities, organisations, volunteers and residents, and everywhere I went I
20 received a warm welcome and a great respect for the office of Cathaoirleach. I tried
21 to attend as many events and visits as possible, and I thoroughly enjoyed every
22 opportunity to meet people and hear their stories. One of the greatest privileges of
23 this year has been seeing the incredible community spirit that exists throughout
24 County Wicklow, whether it was attending community festivals, opening new
25 facilities, celebrating sporting achievements, recognising volunteers or supporting
26 local initiatives, I was constantly reminded of the dedication and pride that people
27 have in their communities. Some of the most memorable moments from the year
28 will stay with me for a long time. It was a pleasure hand over prizes at the
29 Community Games Event and seeing the excitement and achievement on the faces of
30 so many young people. Attending the Tinahely show was a wonderful reminder of
31 the importance of our agricultural communities and the rich traditions that remain at
32 the heart of country life. And I was honoured to attend the Michael Dwyer
33 Commemorations, reflecting on such an important part of our county's history and
34 heritage. And hosting the Cathaoirleach's Reception for Lara Gillespie and

1 recognising her outstanding achievements on the world stage was another very
2 special occasion and a very proud moment for Wicklow. I have greatly enjoyed
3 attending events at the Local Enterprise Office, and meeting so many innovative
4 entrepreneurs, businesses and community enterprises that continue to drive our local
5 economy forward. Spending time with the Older Person's Council was equally
6 awarding, listening to their experiences and seeing the valuable contribution they
7 make in helping to shape a more age-friendly county. Representing Wicklow at the
8 LAMA Awards and the Pride of Place Awards was another highlight, particularly
9 seeing communities from across the county being recognised for their hard work,
10 dedication and pride in where they live. These awards showcase the very best of
11 what Wicklow has to offer and the remarkable people who make our community so
12 special. And of course, leading the Wicklow Association in the St Patrick's day
13 parade is something I will never forget. It was an incredible honour to represent our
14 county on such a significant occasion, surrounded by people who share a deep pride
15 in Wicklow and all that it stands for. As Chair of the LCDC Committee it was also
16 wonderful to see so many projects come to life across the county, seeing the ideas
17 become reality and witnessing the positive impact they have on local communities
18 has been one of the most rewarding aspects of the role.

19
20 I have to say despite all the friendly rivalry between east and west, the award for the
21 best cake in County Wicklow definitely goes to the people of Hollywood. I had the
22 pleasure of sampling their baking on several occasions this year, and I can assure you
23 the standard never dropped. You'll be glad to hear that now.

24
25 I'd also like to thank all the staff of Wicklow County Council. Your professionalism,
26 support and kindness throughout the year has been greatly appreciated. It's been a
27 very busy year, but your assistance has made my role so much easier. We faced
28 some challenging meetings along the way; last September's Presidential Elections
29 nominations were not easy, and we dealt with a number of variations and difficult
30 decisions throughout the year but we got through them because we all worked
31 together. And I have always tried to ensure that everyone had their opportunity to
32 speak their three minutes and I thank you all for working with me in that spirit.

33
34 As I mentioned, it was a year of firsts. Being called unladylike was certainly a first

1 for me but thankfully I don't hold grudges. And there are some things I will
2 definitely miss. I will miss the wonderful opportunities and experiences, but if I am
3 completely honest I will also miss having my own car parking space and never
4 having to worry about where to park the car.

5
6 Most importantly, I want to thank my family; my husband who stepped up
7 magnificently this year and became an exceptional cook, to my daughter and the
8 boys who finally discovered where the washing machine was. And to all my friends,
9 thank you for your support and I will give you back the clothes that you lent me over
10 the year.

11
12 Serving as Cathaoirleach has been one of the greatest honours of my life, and I am
13 deeply grateful for the opportunity, for the friendships formed and for the
14 experiences shared. Wicklow is blessed with remarkable volunteers, community
15 leaders, Council staff and Elected Members who give so much of themselves to
16 make this county a better place and meeting those people and seeing their work
17 first-hand has left a lasting impression on me and made me even more proud to call
18 Wicklow home.

19
20 Finally, I would like to wish the incoming Cathaoirleach every success for the year
21 ahead. It is a unique privilege and an incredible opportunity, and I know they will
22 enjoy every minute of it just as I have. So thank you all for making it such a
23 memorable year. (Applause.).

24
25 Thank you. So Councillor Tom Fortune

26 COUNCILLOR FORTUNE: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. Yeah, I'd just like to say well
27 done on your year. I think you were an excellent Chair. I think you were very fair.
28 Everyone got their chance. The three-minute situation, yeah, we'd all debate from
29 time to time, but I think you had a good year and I think you have contributed greatly
30 to the role. The game or the occupation that we all participate in in the chamber is
31 probably one of the most competitive activities going, even worse than sports
32 sometimes, so I would just like to say a big, big thanks and well done on behalf of
33 the group I am part of it.

34 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Danny Alvey. Sorry, Councillor Paul

1 O'Brien.

2 COUNCILLOR O'BRIEN: Sorry, Councillor Alvey, you'll get to talk in a few
3 minutes I'm sure. Cathaoirleach, thank you very much for allowing me in. I've
4 always took great pride in addressing you as Cathaoirleach. You have been an
5 absolute trojan worker and an excellent Cathaoirleach. You've carried yourself with
6 such class, dignity and professionalism. You have been a great ambassador
7 throughout not just the county but the country, and internationally as well. You were
8 very fair in your dealings with everybody. There was no one got preferential
9 treatment from you and that was obvious, and I echo what Councillor Fortune said as
10 well, you were very by partisan in your approach as Cathaoirleach. I have to say
11 though that for me the meeting that stands out for me is the presidential meeting
12 because it was a tough meeting to Chair, but I have to say you done it superbly and
13 very professionally. The only thing I'll say to you now is enjoy the break. You will
14 miss that parking spot when you start having to do a few loops around to find a
15 parking spot. But job well done. You should be very proud of yourself and I wish
16 you well in the future. Thank you.

17 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Now, Councillor Danny Alvey.

18 COUNCILLOR ALVEY: Thanks, Cathaoirleach, and I am sure you won't miss all
19 those technical gremlins. I want to thank you on behalf of the Social Democrats
20 group for your year as Cathaoirleach. You have been an excellent Cathaoirleach for
21 this chamber and first citizen of this county. I always admire how calm, cool and
22 collected you are even when the debate in here gets heated at times, and you also
23 ensure everyone has their say. You have also been so approach to all of us. If ever
24 there was an issue we wanted to raise or discuss you have always returned the phone
25 call. It has been a challenging year at times but I think you have done a really
26 excellent job navigating us through some tricky variations to the Development Plan
27 and a whole range of positive and more challenging developments that have come
28 along for the county. You've also been such a great role model for other women to
29 get into politics. Indeed our first all-female leadership team has been great. I will
30 finish up by saying from myself and the three of us, thank you for your service,
31 Melanie. We have no doubt after your term you will continue being a really valued
32 and important member of this Council.

33 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Silvester Bourke.

34 COUNCILLOR BOURKE: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Just on behalf of the group

1 over here, the Fine Gael group, I just want to thank you very much for the wonderful
2 job that you did as Cathaoirleach. I think I introduced or proposed you last year a
3 person from a great family of tradition of representing people of County Wicklow,
4 and you have certainly left a great legacy for the future. I think I might have
5 mentioned that you were a (inaudible), a phrase I brought back from Würzburg,
6 which you certainly lived up to that because of the way that you handled the
7 meetings, and you were very firm with everybody. You were probably too nice to a
8 couple of people but we won't go into that. But I do think that you have set a great
9 example and again we are very proud of your achievement and the hard work that
10 you have put in. Thank you.

11 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Peir Leonard.

12 COUNCILLOR LEONARD: Thank you. I'd just like to also congratulate you on
13 your year. I think it is a year that you should be really super proud of. You carried
14 out your duties with a lot of real important values; respect, kindness, honesty. And I
15 think that is true to who you are as a person. I especially want to thank you for all
16 the support for the Arts and the Made in Wicklow campaign in Powerscourt. I know
17 you were there holding Evelyn's hand all along the way and she appreciated that
18 support, and on her behalf I just want to say thank you for that. And thank you for
19 all the times that you answered me in difficult circumstances. There was never any
20 party politics involved, and I think that's the key thing that we all need to work
21 together and you did that and thank you. And that rippled out into the wider
22 community. There were lots of comments, as I relayed to you before, people saying
23 how kind and nice you were, and you made them very so comfortable. So thank you.

24 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Peir. Yeah, I didn't realise sitting for five hours to
25 have a portrait painted was going to be included, but that was a highlight, with a stiff
26 neck. Thank you. Councillor Lourda Scott online.

27 COUNCILLOR SCOTT: Yeah, thank you, Cathaoirleach. I just want to
28 congratulate you on having a fantastic year representing the county. You're
29 incredibly hard-working. As Cathaoirleach myself over my district the last year our
30 paths crossed several times at the events. You always turned up with a smile coming
31 from somewhere else and going on to another engagement. You always had time to
32 talk to ourselves and the constituents. You had a genuine interest in people and your
33 willingness to engage with people has served you really well. Despite some of the
34 comments thrown your way at meetings I think you held yourself with great dignity

1 at the Council, and you do represent the values we get read out to us. I would like to
2 say on a personal matter, following the Presidential candidates meeting, which you
3 referred to here, I had abuse following that meeting and your support was very much
4 appreciated at the time. You were always at the end of a phone and I felt that was
5 really, really useful to me at that time. So I just want to echo all the other comments
6 that people have said. You've had a fantastic year, you are an incredible role model
7 not just for female councillors but for all councillors in the way that you have held
8 and conducted yourself through chairing the meetings and through representing the
9 county. I wish you all the best and look forward to having you back circling the car
10 park with the rest of us. Thank you.

11 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Pat Kennedy.

12 COUNCILLOR KENNEDY: Melanie, on behalf of the Fianna Fáil group I want to
13 thank you for the work that you did during the year. You were very fair to all of us
14 in this chamber. You treated everybody with respect and I hope that you felt that we
15 respected you in that chair as well. You're an excellent public servant, Melanie,
16 there's no doubt about that, so it was no wonder you were going to be an excellent
17 chair and ambassador for Wicklow, not just right around this county but when you
18 travelled overseas as well. So we do appreciate the work you did for that. I also
19 want to thank you for taking the time to attend the Michael Dwyer event in
20 Glenmalure. You certainly made an impression there, not just on the people from
21 Wicklow and beyond but also on the visitors from Australia. So you made an
22 impression, Melanie, right around the world in your chair which not many of us ever
23 get to do. So thank you for all you did for this county in the year gone by, and I
24 know you will be back here working as hard as ever from tomorrow on. Thank you
25 for everything you did for everybody, not just for us as councillors but for the
26 citizens of the county as well because I know your phone never stopped ringing
27 when I was talking to you at one stage. So I wish you well and have a good rest.
28 Thank you.

29 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Malachai Duddy.

30 COUNCILLOR DUDDY: Cathaoirleach, go raibh mile maith agat. I would just like
31 to add my few words to what has already been said. As Cathaoirleach you've always
32 been impeccable in your politeness and kindness to everybody in the chamber I
33 think. And I think you knew just how long a piece of string should be allowed go, so
34 your measure was excellent. I think you're a credit to the Bray Municipal District

1 and of course to Enniskerry, and if we have an equivalent here to the Magistrates'
2 Court like they have in other places you'd make a very, very fine judge. Go raibh
3 maith agat.

4 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Gerry O'Neill.

5 COUNCILLOR O'NEILL: Thank, Cathaoirleach. I just want to wish you the best. I
6 know we were up and down over the past 12 months, and that, but you did mention
7 in your address there that you held no grudges, and I noticed in the trips out west,
8 and I met you there on a few occasions, and you certainly held no grudges and I
9 commend you for that, and all the best.

10 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Gerry. Thank you, members, for all your lovely
11 words. That's very, very kind and much appreciated. So we'll go on to the -- sorry,
12 Chief Executive.

13 MS O'GORMAN: Very briefly. It'd be remiss of me not to thank the first citizen of
14 the county for her hard work and leadership over the years. It's been a very difficult
15 year at times, a lot of challenging decisions to be made by the Elected Members in
16 the chamber and I think you have carried off your duty superbly well, a calm head,
17 very measured. I think I would have lost the plot at times if I was in the chair and
18 thank God I'm not. So I think anybody that is elected to that position there's a great
19 weight associated with it, but I think you shouldered that weight incredibly well and
20 I just want to thank you on behalf of the team here. You have been very helpful with
21 us, working with us, not always agreeing on everything, and that's the way it should
22 be, but we have always been able to carry out our work in a professional and I
23 suppose timely manner. Thank you for that. We have a small presentation to make
24 to you. We have a little leather bound book of photographs of your year as
25 Cathaoirleach. Thank you very much. (Applause.)

26 CATHAOIRLEACH: A lot of borrowed clothes. Luckily I have friends who are tall
27 as well, so very handy. Thank you. That is very sweet.

28

29 Now we will move onto the agenda: The election of the Cathaoirleach under section
30 36 of the Local Government Act 2001. So I would like to ask a call out for any
31 nominations for this position. Thank you. Councillor Mark Barry.

32 COUNCILLOR BARRY: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I wish to propose Councillor
33 Caroline Winstanley for the role of Cathaoirleach of Wicklow County Council.

34 Caroline has been a councillor for just over two years and in that time she has shown

1 real commitment and leadership. As Leas Cathaoirleach, she brought fairness,
2 balance and respect to the role. She also serves as Chair of the Social and
3 Community Development SPC, she sits on the Disability and Inclusion Steering
4 Group and is the Wicklow coordinator for Comhairle na nÓg. Her work in Bray and
5 across the county has been widely recognised, particularly in community
6 development, disability inclusion and youth engagement. She works across parties
7 and with all councillors and staff to get work done for the people of Wicklow.
8 Caroline is hard-working, grounded and deeply committed to this county. She has
9 already shown she can lead, collaborate and deliver. And so, I would like to
10 nominate, propose Caroline Winstanley.

11 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Danny Alvey.

12 COUNCILLOR ALVEY: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I am absolutely delighted to
13 second Councillor Winstanley for the role of Cathaoirleach. A fantastic candidate. I
14 hope she won't mind me saying this, but Caroline never intended running for office
15 at all but after she joined the Social Democrats and we got to know her we became
16 more and more convinced she would actually make an excellent representative
17 especially for her beloved home town of Bray. She brings a phenomenal range of
18 career and life experiences to this role, not least her life-long commitment as an
19 advocate for inclusivity and people with disabilities. I am sure any of you who are in
20 the Bray district or are on the Community and Social SPC, or any of the committees
21 across the Council, will know that beneath her mild mannered tone and gentle voice
22 she has an incredible well of strength, determination and compassion, and it is these
23 values that I know she will bring to this role and why I am honoured to second her
24 for the role of Cathaoirleach of Wicklow County Council.

25 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Peir Leonard.

26 COUNCILLOR LEONARD: Thank you. As an independent I am part of the
27 independent -- a very diverse independent group but I think it is very important to
28 provide choice. We live in a very diverse country, and it's important to bring
29 everybody's voice to the table. And in that case I want to support Councillor Joe
30 Behan in going forward for Cathaoirleach of County Wicklow. Throughout the
31 years of public service Joe has demonstrated extensive knowledge in Local
32 Government and he has a wealth of experience in representing the people of County
33 Wicklow. He has consistently shown a deep understanding of Council procedures,
34 community needs and responsibilities of the elected office. Above all Joe is widely

1 respected for his fairness and integrity, treating all councillors, regardless what their
2 political point of view is, with equal respect. His commitment to upholding the
3 democratic process, encouraging constructive debate and ensuring that every voice is
4 heard makes him exceptionally well suited to serve as Cathaoirleach and to represent
5 the Council with dignity, impartiality and professionalism. The independent group is
6 a diverse collection of councillors with a broad range of views and perspectives.
7 While we do not always agree on every issue we share a commitment to respectfully
8 engaging in the democratic principles. We are able to discuss difficult and
9 sometimes contentious topics openly and honestly while respecting different
10 opinions and working constructively together. Joe has always embodied this
11 approach, fostering an atmosphere where debate is encouraged, all viewpoints are
12 considered and decisions are made through a fair and transparent democratic process.
13 These qualities make him an ideal choice to lead the Council in the year ahead. The
14 most important thing I think about Councillor Joe Behan is his honesty and integrity,
15 and I think we all agree in that. Thank you.

16 CATHAOIRLEACH: Do we have a seconder for Councillor Behan? Councillor
17 Malachai Duddy.

18 COUNCILLOR DUDDY: Go raibh mile maith agat, Cathaoirleach. Yes, I am very
19 happy to second the proposal to nominate Councillor Behan. I think it is fair to say
20 that Joe Behan is salt of the earth. He is one of the most decent people in Irish
21 politics and not just on a local level, having served in the Dáil I think he
22 demonstrated his commitment and his calibre at national level. He has served the
23 people in one way or another since 1985, and his experience is most obvious when
24 you see him in action. I think to echo the compliments that have been made here, the
25 words fairness, just, and democrat are surely bywords with Councillor Behan. So I
26 am very happy to second that proposal. Go raibh mile maith agat.

27 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Have we any other nominations? Councillor
28 Winstanley and Councillor Behan, do you accept the nominations?

29 COUNCILLOR WINSTANLEY: Yes.

30 CATHAOIRLEACH: I will go to Helen for a vote then.

31 MS PURCELL: Okay. So item number 1 on the agenda is the election of the
32 Cathaoirleach. Councillor Winstanley is proposed by Councillor Barry, seconded by
33 Councillor Alvey. Councillor Behan is proposed by Councillor Leonard, seconded
34 by Councillor Duddy. If you wish to vote for Councillor Winstanley please say

- 1 'Winstanley'. If you wish to vote for Councillor Behan please say 'Behan'. I will
2 now go through the roll call. Councillor Danny Alvey?

- 34 (Applause.)

1 CATHAOIRLEACH: I would like to invite Councillor Winstanley, the new
2 Cathaoirleach of Wicklow County Council, to take the chain.

3
4 * * * *

5
6 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, everyone. I want to start by thanking Councillor
7 Melanie Corrigan for her year as Cathaoirleach. Melanie chaired our meetings with
8 calm and fairness, worked well across all groups and gave this Council a steady year.
9 Even when Melanie was very busy she always was generous with her time. Thank
10 you, Melanie. Thank you to Councillor Mark Barry and Councillor Danny Alvey for
11 their kind words and for proposing and seconding me. I would not be sitting in this
12 Chair without their support and encouragement, and to the Elected Members who
13 supported my election today I do not take your trust or granted. Thank you to my
14 husband, Noel, and our children, Robin and Freya, they support everything I do and I
15 am aware of what that costs them in time and patience. Thank you also to my
16 father-in-law Clive and his partner Sue for making the trip here today. It means a
17 lot. And I know my parents are very sad that they couldn't be here today. Thank you
18 for to Deputy Jennifer Whitmore who encouraged me into politics when it wasn't on
19 my radar and has been a good friend to me throughout this journey. I want to take a
20 moment to express my thanks to Emer, to the Directors and to all the Council staff
21 who have given me such tremendous support since becoming a councillor. I want to
22 acknowledge the work that goes on behind the scenes often unseen and
23 underappreciated. I would like to welcome members of the Social Democrats
24 branch, and Sabrina from HQ, thank you for coming today.

25
26 I entered politics because I believe we deserve better than the divisive rhetoric that
27 has crept into public life. I have watched a brand of politics that thrives on othering
28 and pointing fingers at all groups of people and casting them as the enemy gain
29 ground and I knew I couldn't stand on the sidelines. The truth is that blaming people
30 doesn't fix potholes, lower the cost of living or improve our schools, and a
31 community that turns on itself never moves forward.

32
33 To give a bit of context on where I am coming from, I have worked as a speech and
34 language therapist for over 20 years. A lot of the work that I have done has been

1 with children and young people who are non-speaking. People who are often
2 wrongly assumed to have nothing to say simply because they did not communicate in
3 conventional ways. That experience has given me a particular understanding of what
4 it means to have a voice that is not being heard and why it matters that we create the
5 conditions for people to be genuinely included. I have worked in schools, clinical
6 settings and the community, including with travellers and families in direct provision
7 and people from minority and marginalised backgrounds. My doctoral research
8 focused on how people with disabilities experience a move from child to adult
9 services and what structural changes are needed to make meaningful inclusion
10 possible rather than just aspirational. Alongside my clinical work I have also worked
11 as person-centred planner, an approach rooted in rights and in placing the individual
12 at the centre of the decisions of their own life.

13
14 Equality, diversity and inclusion is at the heart of everything that I do professionally.
15 In my time so far as a councillor I have tried to reflect these experiences and values
16 in how I conduct myself as a councillor, represent my constituents and work with
17 others. I always thought myself as more of an activist than a politician but I have
18 come to understand that the two are not as separate as I once thought. Politics shapes
19 the conditions in which people live, and if you care about changing these conditions
20 you have to be willing to engage with it. I think it is better to be involved than to
21 stand on the outside and object. I also want to show Robin and Freya that speaking
22 up is worth doing even when sometimes it is difficult and uncomfortable. Today is a
23 special and significant day, and I am proud to be the first Social Democrats County
24 Cathaoirleach in the country, particularly as a new councillor. I carry this with a
25 sense of responsibility as much as pride.

26
27 As Cathaoirleach I will chair our meetings with fairness and with consistency. I will
28 work collaboratively with councillors across all groups and with the Executive
29 because I believe this is how we are going to get things done for the county. I love
30 living in Bray and I love Wicklow, and I intend to work hard to serve it all to the best
31 of my ability. We will not always agree but I believe we can disagree well and find
32 common ground where it exists. Thank you all. I am looking forward to working
33 with you all over the next year. Thank you. (Applause.)

1 Councillor Behan.

2 COUNCILLOR BEHAN: Yeah, Cathaoirleach. And I'll be the first to congratulate
3 you sincerely on your elevation and your election here as first citizen of County
4 Wicklow. I know from my observation and my experience of you, both here and in
5 Bray, that you will be an excellent Cathaoirleach. I know that you genuinely care
6 about the needs of the people that you represent, and I am quite sure you will be a
7 very fair and open-minded Cathaoirleach of the Council in the coming year, and I
8 sincerely wish you every success in your role as Cathaoirleach.

9

10 And I want to take the opportunity if I can just to pay tribute to Councillor Corrigan,
11 previous Cathaoirleach, for her magnificent work as first citizen of the county and
12 the fairness with which she approached every issue in the chamber on every
13 occasion, and many of them were quite difficult and contentious. So I want to thank
14 you, Melanie, for everything you did in your role as Cathaoirleach as well.

15

16 And I look forward to working with you, Cathaoirleach, in the coming year. Thank
17 you.

18 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Behan. Councillor Fortune.

19 COUNCILLOR FORTUNE: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Congratulations. Very
20 well done. I have no doubt you'll do a super job. My perception of you, interacting
21 with you since you became a councillor, is that you have a genuine caring, positive,
22 constructive attitude and that goes a long, long way. So I really genuinely wish you
23 the very, very best with the role ahead and look forward to working with you,
24 debating with you, maybe sometimes even arguing with you, but I have no doubt that
25 you will do a super job. So congratulations to you and your family. It is a fantastic
26 day for you. It is a very proud moment. So the very best wishes. I look forward to
27 the year ahead with the stuff that will come up from time to time. So
28 congratulations.

29 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Fortune. Councillor Peir Leonard.

30 COUNCILLOR LEONARD: Congratulations to the new Cathaoirleach, Councillor
31 Winstanley. And I think this is a great day for your party and for you as a woman,
32 and I have full faith that you're going to carry out your duties with great capacity. I
33 know we have spoken, we're not afraid to speak honestly to each other, we spoke
34 before these elections, and you know again the diversity, I'm an independent and it is

1 important for me to retain an independent stance but I would have a lot of crossover
2 values with the Soc Dems in relation to the environment and social justice. So I am
3 looking forward to seeing what you are going to do over the next year. I think you
4 will do great things and I am here to support and help in any way that I can. Thank
5 you.

6 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Leonard. Councillor Paul O'Brien.

7 COUNCILLOR O'BRIEN: Thank you, Cathaoirleach, and again I take great pride in
8 referring to you as Cathaoirleach. I have got to know you over the last two years.
9 Our paths crossed unexpectedly two years ago, about this time two years ago, and in
10 fairness to you and your party you stepped up to the plate. I want to congratulate
11 you on this appointment. It is a great honour for you and your family and party.
12 And it is historic, so it is. And it looks like we're going to have another all-female
13 ticket again. It served us well in the year gone by and I am sure it will serve us well
14 going forward. The only advice I would give you is the same advice I gave the
15 outgoing Cathaoirleach last year, enjoy every minute of it because trust me it goes by
16 very quickly. But you can count on my support throughout the year and I look
17 forward to working with you. Thank you.

18 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor O'Brien. Councillor Murphy.

19 COUNCILLOR MURPHY: I would just like to echo what a lot of the other
20 councillors said. And from meeting you two years ago, I knew that you were a force
21 to reckon with in a very positive and breath-taking way. A breath of fresh air. I
22 know that your passion is inclusion which is very much on my top agenda all my
23 life. And I think together and even changing attitudes of people around us, in the
24 chamber and outside the chamber, is very important for inclusion in our everyday
25 life. And I think being a woman here with a disability and being inclusive here has
26 been an honour as well, and I know that you will bring that to the fore every time.
27 And your work on the Disability Inclusion Network has been fantastic, and it's great
28 to have a fresh mind for those people who are there probably too long. But look, I
29 wish you every success, and as Councillor O'Brien said the year does fly by but take
30 it, wear the chain with honour. Thank you.

31 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Murphy. Councillor Burke.

32 COUNCILLOR BOURKE: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Just on behalf of the Fine
33 Gael group I'd like to congratulate you on your election today as Cathaoirleach and
34 we look forward to working with you to make sure that you deliver and keep the

1 measure on the management, to Emer and her team there, to deliver for the citizens
2 of the county. Thank you very much.

3 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Burke. And Councillor Scott online.

4 COUNCILLOR SCOTT: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. And congratulations. I'm
5 delighted to see you take over the chains, and it is great to see one female
6 Cathaoirleach passing the chains over to another female Cathaoirleach. Long may
7 that last. I got to know you, Caroline, I knew you a little bit before you entered
8 politics, but I also got to know you from your work on the Disability Committee.
9 You are somebody that works very hard to get things done. You're not one just to
10 say stuff for the sake of it and then go off and forget about it. You see things
11 through to the very end and you like to achieve results, and that is something that
12 speaks very closely to my heart. I know you will bring enough qualities in the year
13 ahead in your role as first citizen of county, it will stand you in very great stead and
14 benefit you. I look forward to working with you. I am here to offer my help and
15 support as Cathaoirleach until the end of the month and as councillor in Greystones
16 for the next 12 months. Just pick up the phone and shout if you need assistance.
17 And congratulations to yourself and your family again.

18 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Scott. Councillor Pat Kennedy.

19 COUNCILLOR KENNEDY: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. And on behalf of the
20 Fianna Fáil group can we congratulate you today. It is a special day for you and
21 your family. Enjoy it. Today is also a very special day for the people of Wicklow
22 because the representatives in this chamber are the people who represent the people
23 of the county, and today they have decided to pick the first citizen and that citizen is
24 you. So enjoy it. We commit our support to you in the chamber for the year ahead
25 and we wish you very well. Thank you.

26 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Kennedy. Councillor Gerry O'Neill.

27 COUNCILLOR O'NEILL: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. Again I wish to congratulate you
28 on the job, but I do want to register my disgust. This is probably the most horrible
29 meeting we have here every year. And the way these positions are set up, horse
30 trading, to me now it turns me stomach. We have it every time. Almost every year
31 we have it. And I think it is very unfair, when I look around here and see
32 people -- as I said earlier, I have been elected 14 year, 13, 14 year, but I know people
33 in this chamber year many, many years and just because of horse trading they never
34 get a look in the door. And I am particularly bored and sick looking at some

1 members of Sinn Féin playing along with this. You have so-called independents but
2 they're as Fine Gael as you can get, and they should just join up and forget about it
3 because this whole thing of hiding behind independence and not supporting the
4 people we have here. We have good people here like Joe Behan, independent, we
5 have John Snell here more many, many years, Tom Fortune, Peir Leonard, people
6 like that who are around a long, long time, and they don't have a hope in hell of
7 getting in the door. They just don't. It is absolutely disgusting. And on the outside,
8 we're in our little cosy here, we get these phone calls for the last week, a week before
9 this AGM, and it's a pure set-up job. And there's no doubt, I have even heard the
10 sole Labour man in the chamber there admitting that it is going to be another all-lady
11 show this year. That will tell you, give you an idea what way we run the show here.
12 That it is long before the vote is cast now that we have another lady lined up for the
13 job. I just want to -- again I want to register my total -- it's stomach churning every
14 year for this behaviour. And not only do you have it here but you have it in the
15 municipal districts, you know. There's no way -- you know, you can be cornered and
16 left there and that's the end of it, you know. And it's a sad day for democracy. But I
17 mean I suppose that's the way it's going to work here and we'll never be a day better.
18 Go raibh mile maith agat.

19 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor O'Neill. I look forward to working
20 with you.

21 COUNCILLOR O'NEILL: What?

22 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Warren O'Toole.

23 COUNCILLOR O'TOOLE: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. And thanks, Gerry, for always
24 keeping us in your thoughts. If you want to have a conversation, I don't know if we'd
25 have you back but I know, I appreciate everything. And I'd just like to remind you
26 also the way the vote went last year and I fully supported Councillor Snell, and it is
27 very unfortunate that Councillor Behan, I have so much respect for him and he's one
28 of the top councillors in this room and I respect him immensely. But my own
29 experience with Councillor Winstanley is somebody that's a perfect role model for
30 children. Her work on the different groups that I'm on, DISC and the community
31 group, is second to none and I look forward to working with her in the future.

32 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor O'Toole. Councillor Duddy.

33 COUNCILLOR DUDDY: Go raibh mile maith agat, Cathaoirleach. I would just
34 like to congratulate you on your election. It is wonderful that one way or another we

1 have a Bray person as Cathaoirleach of Wicklow County Council. So
2 congratulations. I am sure you will bring all the sensitivities that have inspired you
3 to engage in public life to this office, and I wish you and your family that are here in
4 the gallery my congratulations on a very special day. Go raibh mile maith agat.

5 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Duddy. Councillor Snell.

6 COUNCILLOR SNELL: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. First and foremost,
7 congratulations to yourself, to your party, and more importantly to your family and
8 friends who are here to witness it here today. I know it's been mentioned in regards
9 to, you know, the length of time people are on the Local Authority, whether it's
10 longevity or short, but the fact remains that you have created history in the modern
11 era of politics within County Wicklow within two short years. I'm lucky enough to
12 sit on an SPC that you Chair, you have been Vice Cathaoirleach of Wicklow
13 Council, you're now Cathaoirleach, you lead all 32 representatives here and I know
14 you will do it to the best of your ability. I believe you're currently the Vice Chair of
15 Bray Municipal District, so when you hand up the chains, things going your way,
16 you'll be Cathaoirleach of Bray next year. And that's in two short years. That's not a
17 criticism, that's an endorsement of the faith that people have in you and it's
18 something that you should be proud of. I just want to give you, from my perspective,
19 I look forward to working with you for the next 12 months. It doesn't really matter
20 to me who chairs Wicklow County Council because I know that the person that sits
21 in that chair is a reflection of all 32 members and that's a hugely important role, and
22 that connection between the Elected Members and the officials. In a weekend that's
23 been very difficult for Wicklow County Council in regards to the loss of two valued
24 members of Council, Marian and Bryan, in the last couple of weeks we've lost high
25 profile members through retirement, and we wish them well, so I suppose it's to get
26 away from all the negative and to focus on the positives and to realise that we are all
27 only passing through here, and God knows what the next 12 months will bring, but
28 it's hugely important that we all work together, and I offer you my congratulations
29 and assure you that I will work with you for the next 12 months.

30 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Snell. Okay. To my first order of
31 business as Cathaoirleach. I would like to ask for nominations for the election of
32 Leas Cathaoirleach of Wicklow County Council. Councillor Langrell.

33 COUNCILLOR LANGRELL: Thank you, Caroline, or should I say Cathaoirleach.
34 Congratulations. Well done. Cathaoirleach, I'd like to nominate my colleague and

1 friend, good friend Councillor Avril Cronin. Councillor Cronin has been a
2 councillor now seven, going into her eighth year. She shows great courage as a
3 councillor, and I suppose the west are very lucky to have her. Two years I'm sitting
4 here now in this seat and one thing is for sure with Councillor Cronin, the west will
5 never be forgotten about in this chamber. She's there supporting them, getting what
6 she can for the people of the west. She's done great work over the last eight years as
7 a councillor. She's a great reputation out the west. Me myself I have to say she was
8 great to me when I got elected here first two years ago, and I'd like to nominate
9 Councillor Avril Cronin, please, Cathaoirleach. Thank you.

10 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Langrell. Councillor Paul O'Brien.

11 COUNCILLOR O'BRIEN: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. As the sole Labour
12 representative here today and for the next three and a half, or three years anyway, I
13 do second Councillor Avril Cronin's nomination as Leas Cathaoirleach but not just as
14 the sole Labour representative because sometimes you have to park party politics,
15 and it gives me great pleasure and an honour today to second my friend Councillor
16 Cronin, because that's what she is. Some people call it skulduggery, I call it
17 diplomacy and democracy. And I have to say Councillor Cronin will make a very
18 good Leas Cathaoirleach. She got elected in 2019 and she has proven herself
19 without doubt. She has been elected in her own right to the Cathaoirleach of the
20 west, and I am sure she will make the west proud as Councillor Langrell said. It is
21 an all-female ticket and it is very welcome because we have been served well in the
22 last year and as I said it'll be served well this year. Councillor Cronin, I wish you
23 well in your role as Leas Cathaoirleach, and do you know what, no skulduggery
24 about it but I look forward to voting for you next year for Cathaoirleach. Thank you.

25 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor O'Brien. Is there any other
26 nominations? No. Councillor Cronin, do you accept?

27 COUNCILLOR CRONIN: I do, indeed. Thank you. (Applause.)

28 CATHAOIRLEACH: And so to now agree the schedule of ordinary special
29 meetings for coming year.

30 MS PURCELL: So the schedule is as circulated to the members and we just need a
31 proposer and a seconder, please.

32 COUNCILLOR SNELL: Proposed.

33 COUNCILLOR MURPHY: I'll second.

34 CATHAOIRLEACH: Proposed by Councillor Snell, seconded by Councillor

1 Langrell.

2 MS PURCELL: Is that agreed? (Agreed.) All agreed? We'd like to invite
3 everybody up to the canteen for the traditional strawberries and cream once the
4 Cathaoirleach finishes the meeting.

5 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. The meeting is now closed and I
6 hope you can come and enjoy the strawberries and cream. Thank you.
