Item No. 2—Application For Loan in Respect of Re-construction of Vested Council Cottage at Killincarrig.

The County Secretary stated that Mr. John Noble, 1, Castlefield Terrace, Killincarrig, was carrying out repairs and improvements to his cottage, which were estimated to cost £712, and a State Grant of £140 and a Supplementary Grant of £140 had been paid to him. He had applied for a Loan of £400, but the maximum which could be paid under the terms of the Council's Scheme was £380. The balance remaining in the present Loan raised by the Council for the purpose was £330.

(b) **At Tober, Dunlavin—Tenant-Purchaser: Daniel Masterson.**

In regard to the proposed sale of Vested Cottage No. 125/2 at Tober, Dunlavin, by the tenant-purchaser (Mr. Daniel Masterson) to Mr. Jas. O'Hara, 19, Church Terrace, Dunlavin, for the sum of £400, it was decided, following discussion on the matter, to defer consideration of the application for further inquiries.

(c) **At Kilpoole Hill, Wicklow—Tenant-Purchaser: Mrs. Elizabeth Murphy.**

In regard to the proposed sale of Vested Cottage No. 7/11 at Kilpoole Hill, Wicklow, by Mrs. Elizabeth Murphy (tenant-purchaser) to Mr. Michael E. Herbst (farmer) for occupation by one of his farm employees, for the sum of £500, the desirability of consenting to the sale of a Vested Cottage to a farmer even though it were to be used for the accommodation of his worker, was discussed by the Council. Councillor J. J. McCrea, expressed the opinion that the selling of Vested

Cottages to farmers was not desirable.

Resolved—That we refuse consent to Mrs. Elizabeth Murphy to dispose of her interest in Cottage No. 7/11 at Kilpoole Hill, Wicklow, to Mr. Michael E. Herbst, for occupation by one of his farm employees.

Item No. 5—Application For Consent To Subdivision of Vested Cottage Plot at Ballymoney, Arklow.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Quigley;
Seconded by Councillor H. B. Hipwell;

Resolved—That subject to the sanction of the Minister for Local Government we hereby suspend the operation of the Statutory Condition under Section 16 of the Labourers' Act, 1936, in relation to portion of the plot attached to the Vested Cottage occupied by Wm. O'Reilly, "St. Jude's," Ballymoney, Arklow, so as to allow portion of the plot to be used for the erecting thereon of an additional cottage.

Passed unanimously

Item No. 6—Applications For Provision of Cottages For Patrick T. Salmon, "Somerton," The Bawn, Greystones, on Portion of Vested Cottage Plot at Carrig Villas, Killincarrig, and for Patrick J. Lawless on Lands at Red Lane, Kilmurray.

The Council, having noted the Report of the Council's Architect that the site at Carrig Villas, Killincarrig, was unsuitable for the erection of a further cottage because it would not meet the density requirement of one-eighth of an acre and was also affected by a high-tension power line which crossed the suggested boundary between the two sites, indicated that they were not prepared to approve of the proposal.

In the case of the application of Mr. Patrick Lawless the Council noted that Mr. Lawless was the occupier of twenty-eight acres of land and that objections had been received to the proposal that the Council acquire a plot from Mr. James Kelly as a site for a cottage at Red Lane. The Council decided not to accept the offer of Mr. Kelly to sell the plot to the Council.

Item No. 7—Notice of Motion in names of Councillors J. Temple, E. Byrne and H.B. Hipwell:— "That In View of the Terms of the Housing Bill at Present Before The Dail We Instruct the County Medical Officer To Prepare A Fixed Priority List of Tenants Seeking Houses In View of the Dissatisfaction of the System At Present Operating."

In proposing the Resolution Councillor Temple stated that he sought the agreement of the Council in principle to the proposal that a priority list of tenants be prepared. The proposal was seconded by Councillor E. Byrne. The County Secretary stated that Section 60 of the Housing Bill at present before Dail Eireann provided that it would be the duty of a Housing Authority to make within one year from the commencement of the Act, and thereafter from time to time as they thought fit, a Scheme determining the priorities to be accorded to categories of persons specified in the Scheme in the letting of dwellings provided by the Council. In preparing a Scheme

the Council were obliged to have regard to the following primary objectives:

- (a) The repair, closure, or demolition of houses which were unfit in any respect for human habitation;
- (b) The elimination of overcrowding;
- (c) The provision of adequate and suitable housing accommodation for persons (including elderly or disabled persons) who, in the opinion of the Council, were in need of, and were unable to provide such accommodation from their own resources;
- (d) The segregation of persons suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis.

Any Scheme made under this Section had to be approved by the Minister and the Section also provided that the Minister could from time to time require a Housing Authority to vary a Scheme in a manner directed by him. It was provided also in the Section that for the purpose of determining the order of priority to be followed in the making of lettings to persons in accordance with a Scheme the Council must obtain and have regard to a Report from their Chief Medical Officer. The making of the Scheme was a reserved function. The County Manager pointed out that the new Bill seemed to provide for a system of priorities, but not for a priority list. The Council utilised such a system at present and various matters had to be taken into account when lettings were determined. He felt it would be premature to anticipate what form the system of priorities would take and that it would be preferable to await the coming into operation of the Bill. Councillor Temple agreed to withdraw his Motion if the Council accepted the idea in principle and the Council agreed that the matter of preparing a Scheme be deferred until the Bill was enacted.

Item No 8—Applications For Loans Towards Purchase of Houses—Bentley Park, Bray, Etc.

A Notice was handed in by Councillors H. J. Byrne, H. B. Hipwell and Edward E. Byrne giving notice to the County Manager that it was intended to propose the following Resolution at the Meeting of the Council on the 10th January, 1966, in accordance with Section 4 of the City and County Management (Amendment) Act, 1955:-

"That we, the Members of Wicklow County Council, hereby instruct the County Manager to issue Loans to the value of £2,175 per house in respect of houses being erected at Bentley Park, Boghall Road, Bray, as unanimously agreed at the County Council Meeting on Wednesday, 15th December, 1965."

Housing Sites At Dunlavin.

The County Secretary stated that as had been agreed by the Council at the previous Meeting offers were made to three land-owners at Dunlavin for the purchase of sites. Mr. Edward Flood had replied indicating that he had recently sold the site to another person and Mrs. D. Coghlan indicated that the site was not for sale. Mr. Laurence O'Reilly (through his Solicitor, Mr. Millett) had indicated that he would accept the Council's offer of £100 for the site, but asked that the Council discharge the vendor's costs in the matter. The site contained one rood approximately and was suitable for the erection of two single-storey houses. The Council agreed that the site be acquired.

Item No. 9—Repairs to Cottages Carried Out During Month of December, 1965, and Cottages to be Repaired During Month of January, 1966.

The Council noted the list of Cottages repaired during the month of December, 1965, and of those to be repaired during the month of January, 1966. Councillor J. Everett, T.D., complained of failure to carry out necessary repairs in the Wicklow Area and handed in particulars of cases where persons claimed to have been waiting several years for repairs to their cottages. Councillor Quigley complained of the condition of a cottage at Threewells, Aughrim, and urged that repairs be carried out. Councillor Miss M. Walsh referred to the cottage of Mrs. P. Cullen at Ballanagh, Avoca, and stated that this cottage had been affected by the recent flooding. She asked that repairs be carried out as a matter of urgency.

Water Supplies—Ennis's Lane.

Councillor J. Temple complained again regarding the matter of a water supply for residents of Ennis's Lane, Greystones. Mr. R. L. Farrell, Chief Assistant County Engineer, stated that the only source of supply available was from the Templecarrig Reservoir and that there was insufficient water to supply Ennis's Lane. Councillor Temple contended that the amount of water needed was negligible as some of the tenants already had supplies. It was agreed that a Report on the matter be submitted to the next Meeting.

Water Supply For Cottages At Redford.

Councillor E. Byrne inquired concerning the water supply for cottages at Redford and it was agreed that a Report on the matter be submitted to the next Meeting.

At the request of Councillor H. B. Hipwell it was agreed that a Report in regard to the Carrigoona Group Water Supply Scheme also be submitted to the next Meeting.

Cottages At Boghall—Defective Sumps.

Councillor Temple complained of what he regarded as defective sumps at the cottages at Boghall. He asked when the matter would be remedied. The Chief Assistant County Engineer stated that the Contractor responsible for the extension of the water supply to the cottages had carried out his work satisfactorily, in accordance with the Specification, and this did not require him to carry out any work in connection with the sumps. It was intended that the sumps would be drained into an adjoining stream and arrangements would be made to have this done.

Refusal of Planning Permission.

Councillor Hipwell asked that a copy of the letter from the Council to the Minister for Local Government in regard to a Resolution passed by the Council requiring that permission be given to Mr. Reginald Heatley, Little Newtown, for the erection of Three Bungalows, be supplied to him, and stated that he intended to raise the matter at the following Monday's Meeting.

In accordance with Notice given to the County Manager under the provisions of Section 4 of the City and County Management (Amendment) Act, 1955:

Seconded by Councillor H. B. Hipwell:

Resolved—That we, the Members of Wicklow County Council, hereby instruct the County Manager to issue Loans to the value of £2,170 per house in respect of houses being erected at Bentley Park, Boghall Road, Bray, as unanimously agreed at the County Council Meeting on Wednesday, 15th December, 1965.

Passed unanimously.

In proposing the Motion Councillor H. J. Byrne stated that he felt this to be a most important matter and that it concerned the happiness of twenty-five young families. He did not consider the County Council was running any risk in granting Loans of the amount

proposed. Councillor H. B. Hipwell, seconding the Motion, and the other Members for the Bray Electoral Area expressed similar views. In reply to Councillor A. H. Hadden, who stated he was not objecting to the Loans being granted, but wished to know the reason why the County Manager had not been inclined to approve of the Loans, the County Manager stated that the amount of the Loan normally depended on the valuation of the house and in the case of a new house the County Manager was guided by the valuation determined by the County Engineer, who had valued each house at £2,500. This figure was lower than the valuation of £2,830 accepted by the Members.

The Council agreed that the proposal to take over the road be submitted to the Members of the Council for the Arklow Electoral Area when the Road Works Programme for the coming financial year was being considered.

Item No. 6—Traffic Lights at Quiraboro' Road/Main Street Crossing at Bray—Report of County Engineer.

The County Secretary stated that this matter originally came before the Council in 1961 when the Superintendent, Garda Síochána, Bray, had recommended that traffic lights be provided at this junction. The former County Engineer had estimated the cost at about £3,000 and provision had been made for the work in the Estimates at that time. It was not possible, however, to obtain the equipment and the money allocated was diverted to work on footpaths in Bray. The Council agreed that provision be made in the Estimates for submission to the Members of the Council for the Bray Area in the Road Works Programme for the coming financial year.

Re: Flooding at Dargle Road, Bray: Boundary Wall at Miss Barton's.

Dear Sir,

Reference has been made at recent Council Meetings to a broken and damaged boundary wall at Dargle Road, Bray, alongside the Dargle River.

It has been stated which is indeed true, that in flood, the river water passes through the breaches in this wall, with consequent flooding at Lower Dargle Road.

The position, however, is that the wall and the land between the river and wall are the property of a Miss Barton. Consequently, the Council had no direct function in the maintenance of this wall. There is also a gateway in the wall which, of course, would allow water through in any event, and always did.

However, it could well be that if the Council were to build up this wall and these openings, that the result would be flooding of other people, either by causing flooding to a greater degree to others, or causing flooding where it did not occur before. If this were to happen there would not be much doubt about liability.

The solution here is not the building up of walls, but the execution of a proper scheme. A drainage scheme from the Bray Harbour to say, within $\frac{1}{2}$ mile of the Silver Bridge, would appear to suggest itself. An investigation of catchment area, run off, etc., would be a necessary prerequisite of such a scheme, and the experience of the Office of Public Works in this matter would be helpful.

The Council are not a drainage authority in the context of being responsible for the drainage of land or damage caused by flooding from drainage areas, unless they are responsible for the maintenance of the waterways.

The problem here is of an arterial drainage nature. Apart from the fact that the Council have not got the Staff to carry out the necessary survey, I consider that the Board of Works, who have specialised in this field, and were in fact established for this purpose, are best suited to tackle and assess the problem, from an engineering and economic point of view.

The question as to who will provide the funds and carry out the drainage scheme also arises. It would be a waste of money, time and effort, unless there is some assurance as to the likelihood that funds would be forthcoming from some source to carry out the work.

The County Secretary stated that the Council's Solicitor had advised that no one could be made responsible for damage caused by an "Act of God," and flooding came under such heading. He stated that the Council were not entitled to compel the owner of property to do work that might be necessary to prevent flooding in future. The Council's Solicitor pointed out that the wall at Miss Barton's property was not a retaining wall to the road and that the Council

could not compel her to reinforce the wall and that, furthermore, if the Council repaired the wall there would be a possibility of the risk that flooding would take place at some further point, which would involve the Council in liability.

The Council noted the terms of the County Engineer's Report and the Law Agent's Advice on the matter. The County Secretary stated that the Department of Local Government had informed Bray Urban District Council, in reply to that Council's request for financial assistance in repairing four separate damaged walls, that there was no objection to two of the walls being repaired provided the County Council agreed to divert moneys from either their Main Road or Arterial Road Fund Grant. The two breaches concerned were: (a) at the end of the People's Park, near Riverside Tce.—Estimated Cost, £1500; and (b) near Park Lodge—Estimated Cost, £300. The two breaches did cause flooding on the Main Road on November the 19th. It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Temple:

Seconded by Councillor Mrs. M. Ledwidge:

Resolved—That we approve of the Scheme for the repair of breaches in walls along the Dargle River (a) at the end of the People's Park, near Riverside Tce., Bray, at an estimated cost of £1500; and (b) near Park Lodge, Bray, at an estimated cost of £300; and authorise the defraying of the cost of these works from Road Fund Grants allocated to the Council.
Passed unanimously.

In reply to inquiry from Councillor Temple regarding the carrying out of an Arterial Drainage Survey for the Dargle River the County Secretary stated that a letter had been addressed to the Board of Works immediately following the Council's Meeting in December and conveying the Council's request that the Board undertake Surveys immediately with a view to preparing Arterial Drainage Schemes for the Dargle, Slaney, Avonmore and Avoca Rivers, with a view to preventing a recurrence of flooding from these rivers. No reply had yet been received. The Council agreed to the suggestion of Councillor Temple that the Board of Works be asked for an immediate reply to the Council's request, and failing that, they be asked to receive a Deputation in the matter.

Woodenbridge Golf Club.

The following letter addressed to the Chairman and Members of the Council was submitted:—

Woodenbridge Golf Club,

Avoca, Co. Wicklow.

Dear Mr. Chairman, Ladies and Gentlemen,

You will already know from the papers that our Golf Club and course were seriously damaged in the recent floods. The old Club-house and part of the new Club-house and bridge approaching the course were washed away and considerable damage was done to the course itself. The course is situated in one of the most beautiful parts of the County and is a great amenity both for Wicklow people and visitors. Last year we entertained 4,000 visitors, at least a third of whom were from abroad.

We are trying to re-build the bridge, restore the Club-house and course to their old condition and are trying to do it from our own resources, but we may need additional help. We understand that we may get some help from Bord Failte but for this would need the good-

will of the County Manager and the Members of the County Council. We would be very grateful if we could have this co-operation and that the County Council would say that our aims are worthy of support if and when we need help.

The Captain and all the Members of the Club would be very thankful for your help in this matter.

Item No. 8—Engineering Staff—Report of County Engineer.

The Council noted the details circulated by the County Engineer in regard to the Engineering Staff and their respective duties.

Item No. 9—Main Road Realignment at Kilpedder and Newtown—Costs of Acquisition of Lands.

Details of the payments made by the Council in respect of acquisition of lands for Road Improvement between Kiltimon and Kilpedder had been circulated to the Members. Councillor H. J. Byrne, Chairman, stated that the figures had been circulated and did not call for any further comment. Councillor Gregory complained that the new section of roadway between Newtownmountkenedy and Kilpedder was dangerous and that there had been a number of accidents on that section. He asked if it would be possible to re-surface the road with a material which would give a better grip for tyres. It was agreed that the County Engineer report on the matter.

Item No. 10—Water Supply for Cottages at Ennis Lane, Near Redford—Report of County Engineer, and

Item No. 11—Water Supply for Cottages at Redford — Report of County Engineer.

The County Secretary stated that the tenants of ten cottages at Ennis's Lane had agreed to pay an additional 1/9d. per week towards the cost of having the water supply installed in their cottages. In December, 1964, the County Engineer had reported that the cost of providing a water supply to the cottages would be £950 and the Council had approved of documents being prepared for the purpose of obtaining sanction to the raising of a Loan to have the work carried out. So far, due to lack of Engineering Staff, it had not been possible to complete the documents. In regard to the cottages at Redford the tenants of the sixteen cottages had agreed to pay an additional 1/9d. per week as a contribution towards the cost of the work, but an estimate of cost was still required. The County Manager stated that the Council had been having difficulty regarding water supply extensions as it had not been possible to recruit a Temporary Engineer to replace the Engineer who had been previously engaged on this work. Councillor J. Everett, T.D., suggested that the Temporary Engineers who had been engaged on preparing Plans for Road Works might be assigned temporarily to complete these Water

Schemes. The Council asked that the necessary documents be available for the next Housing Meeting of the Council.

It was

Proposed by Councillor Mrs. M. Ledwidge;

Seconded by Councillor J. Temple:

Resolved—That we approve of engagement of Consultant to prepare documents for Ennis Lane and Redford Water Supplies.

Passed unanimously.

Water Supply in North Wicklow Area.

Councillor Temple stated that a serious position existed in the Northern Area of the County in regard to water supply as Dublin Corporation were not agreeing to grant any new supplies and were insisting that the Council should provide their own water supply for the Area. He inquired if the Council had employed a Consultant and when they could expect a Report from him. The County Secretary stated that Mr. J. B. Barry, Consulting Engineer, had been engaged by the Council to investigate the matter of providing a water supply for the Northern part of the County and was arranging to see the City Engineer in regard to the matter. Councillor Timmins stated that Kildare County Council had made representations directly to the E.S.B. for a water supply from Poulaphouca and he understood that they had obtained a supply. He asked that inquiry be made from the E.S.B. as to whether a supply could be made available from Poulaphouca for Hollywood and other parts of West Wicklow. It was agreed that an inquiry be addressed to the E.S.B. on the matter.

Item No. 12—Water Supply for Three Council Cottages at Ballinapark, Avoca.

The Council noted the Report of the Assistant County Engineer that there was no public supply to which these cottages could be connected and that the new supply to Avoca would not serve them as they were at a height of about 450 ft. The Council agreed with the recommendation of the Assistant County Engineer that a Group Water Supply be organised for these three cottages from a deep well operated by an electric pump.

Item No. 13—Carrigoona Group Water Supply Scheme.

In reply to the inquiry by Councillor H. B. Hipwell the County Secretary stated that the Group had an Engineer engaged for the purpose of preparing a Scheme and had been in touch with the Department of Local Government on the matter, but the Scheme was not yet finally approved. When the Scheme was approved it would be submitted to the Council.

Item No. 14—Notice of Motion in Names of Councillors M. J. O'Neill and G. Timmins—"That the Council extend the Water Supply at Stratford to Council Cottages at Winetavern and Randalstown."

Proposed by Councillor M. J. O'Neill;

Seconded by Councillor G. Timmins:

Resolved—That the County Engineer submit a Report and Estimate of Cost of extending the water supply at Stratford to serve Council houses at Winetavern and Randalstown.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 15—Report requested by Councillor Quigley as to best means of granting a Water Supply to Cottages at Kilqueeeney and Ballymoneen, Avoca.

The County Secretary stated that the Assistant County Engineer had reported that the best means of providing a water supply for these cottages would be a short branch from the proposed new supply from Avoca. The Council noted the position in the matter.

Item No. 16 — Report requested by Councillor Quigley regarding Boundary Fences at Greenane Cemetery.

The Assistant County Engineer reported that the walls at Greenane Cemetery had crumbled and in many places there were large holes in the wall where concrete blocks had completely disintegrated. In his opinion this had been caused by frost action on the blocks, which were not sufficiently dense to resist water penetration. He stated that a sum of £50 would help to restore some of the blocks so as to leave the wall safe and not create an eyesore by indiscriminate patching. On the proposal of Councillor Quigley, seconded by Councillor R. Miley, the Council approved of the Assistant County Engineer's recommendation.

Item No. 17—To authorise additional Expenditure in excess of the amounts provided in the Current Year's Estimates in respect of Council Services.

Item No. 18—Services for the Aged—Report of Chief Medical Officer on (a) Provision of Health Services to the Aged; and (b) Investigation of Patients in St. Colman's Hospital (County Home), Rathdrum.

Copies of Reports of the County Medical Officer on (a) Provision of Health Services to the Aged; and (b) Investigation of Patients in St. Colman's Hospital (County Home), Rathdrum, had been circulated to the Members of the Council. The County Manager stated that arising out of the recent letter from the Department of Health on the matter of improving Services to the Aged the County Medical Officer had carried out a special investigation in regard to the patients in St. Colman's Hospital, Rathdrum, and in regard to Health Services for the Aged generally. In recent years there had been a reduction in the numbers in the County Home, although the total number of old persons in the Home had increased. In order to deal with the problem of the aged the District Nursing Services were being extended and at a recent Meeting the Council had approved of the creation of two additional posts of District Nurse. It was intended that the District Nurses in their Areas would give special attention to old people who were living alone. It was considered desirable that where possible old people should be helped in their own homes rather than in Institutions and that the co-operation of Voluntary Aid Societies would be of great value in dealing with this problem. If the Council agreed it was proposed to call a Meeting of Representatives of the Voluntary Societies who were already dealing with the problem of the aged with a view to seeking their co-operation with the Council in the improvement of the Services for the Aged. The Council agreed that the County Manager and County Medical Officer arrange to meet the Representatives of the Voluntary Agencies.

The Council adjourned the remaining items on the Agenda to a Meeting to be held on Monday, the 17th January, 1966.

With reference to your letter of the 17th instant.

It is recommended that the lowest Tender received, that is, of Messrs. C. Byrne and Sons, Hacketstown, be accepted in the sum of £13,810. I am satisfied from previous experience of this contractor, that he is capable of carrying out the work satisfactorily.

It should be noted that while the Contractor's Tender is only £120 less than that submitted before, the specification on which the recent tender is based, includes the following works, which were not covered in the previous tender:—

1. Approximately 100 yards of site boundary wall, as recommended by the Council.
2. To tarmacadm road and footpaths.
3. A contingency sum of £300.

It is estimated that the cost of these three items would be in the region of £700. It can be seen, therefore, that the tender now submitted is approximately £800 less than that previously rejected.

Resolved—That we approve of the payment of a Supplementary Grant of £275 to Mr. John F. Davin, N.T., in respect of the erection of a house on site at Blessington.
Passed unanimously.

Item No. 9—Reports of County Engineer on Water Supplies for Cottages at Ennis's Lane, near Redford, and for Cottages at Redford.

The County Secretary stated that the County Engineer had reported that the estimated cost of providing a water supply for ten houses at Ennis's Lane was £1,336 and for seventeen houses at Redford was £1,217, making a total of £2,553. The estimates included for providing sinks in the houses with soak-pits and subsoil drainage to take effluent from sink wastes. The water extensions would be taken off the Council's existing 4" diameter main, which got its supply from Dublin Corporation mains. It might be necessary to get permission from the Dublin Corporation for the supply of the extra water, which was estimated to be 2,400 g.p.d.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Temple;

Seconded by Councillor E. E. Byrne;

Resolved—That subject to approval of Department of Local Government we approve of Tenders being invited for the provision of water supplies for ten houses at Ennis's Lane and seventeen houses at Redford (in accordance with Plans and Specification submitted by the County Engineer).

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 10—Drainage for Cottages at Boghall—Report of County Engineer.

The County Secretary stated that the County Engineer had forwarded a Report of the Chief Assistant County Engineer, with which he agreed, regarding the drainage of twenty-seven houses at Boghall. The Chief Assistant County Engineer stated that these houses were supplied with water, the sink in each case discharging into a soak-away. The soakage of the ground was poor, but at the time of installation a Sewerage Scheme for the area was in the hands of a Consultant Engineer and it was understood that in a year or two the waste from the sink would be connected to the new Sewerage Scheme. As a joint Sewerage Scheme with Bray Urban District Council was now being arranged this meant that the original proposals had been completely altered. To alleviate the existing flooding around the soak-away pits he suggested that drains be run to the nearest stream and it was estimated that the cost would be approximately £30 per house, or a total of £810. Councillor Temple stated that when the Scheme was originally being installed he had told the Council that the system being adopted would not be satisfactory. He asked who would meet the cost of the extra expense involved and would the tenants have to pay. The County Manager stated that there was no question of the tenants being asked to pay any extra money.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Temple;

Seconded by Councillor E. E. Byrne;

Resolved—That we hereby authorise expenditure of £810 in excess of the amount provided in the current year's Estimates to defray the cost of drainage for twenty-seven houses at Boghall Road.
Passed unanimously.

Item No. 11—Notice of Motion in Name of Councillor Mrs. M. Ledwidge: "That the Council provide a proper Water Supply for Council Tenants at Ballybawn, Kilmacanogue."

Councillor Mrs. Ledwidge stated that eighteen Council tenants living at Ballybawn had to depend on a pump that went dry during the Summer and that they had to go a half-mile to obtain water

from other people. At present the water was very discoloured. The County Secretary stated that the County Engineer had submitted a Report on the matter and the Council decided to refer consideration of the Report to the Meeting of the Members of the Council for the Bray Electoral Area to be held on the 16th February, 1966.

The Council noted the list of cottages repaired during the month of January and of those to be repaired during the month of February, 1966.

Alteration in Date of Estimates Meeting.

The County Secretary stated that the Council at the previous Meeting had fixed the 21st February as the date for the Estimates Meeting for the current year. The County Engineer had some difficulty in compiling the Roads Estimate due to the damage caused to roads by the recent flooding and he suggested that the Council might agree to defer the date for the Meeting to the 28th February. It was

Proposed by Councillor E. E. Byrne;

Seconded by Councillor J. Temple;

Resolved—That we defer the date of the Estimates Meeting in respect of the financial year 1966/'67 to 28th February, 1966.

Passed unanimously.

Employment of Clerk/Typist at Newcastle Mental Hospital.

The County Secretary stated that the Council had deferred any decision on the recruitment of Nursing Staff for Newcastle Mental Hospital pending the receipt from the Department of Health of their views in regard to the eventual accommodation which could be provided at the Hospital. A Clerk/Typist had been employed temporarily at the Hospital and he suggested that since there was no doubt that one Clerk/Typist would be essential at the Hospital the Council might consider approving of the creation of a permanent post of Clerk/Typist. Councillor Temple stated that while he agreed that a Clerk/Typist was necessary he did not feel that the Council at this stage should approve of a permanent appointment until the decision of the Department of Health on the eventual bed complement was received.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Temple;

Seconded by Councillor H. B. Hipwell;

Resolved—That we approve of the creation of an additional temporary post of Clerk/Typist for Mental Health Services. Passed unanimously.

Application for Reception of Deputation.

The Chairman stated that he had received a letter from the Blessington Development Association stating that at a Meeting in Blessington between Members of the Council and Officials of the Association it had been suggested that a Deputation should seek a Meeting with the County Council before the Estimates Meeting. The Association asked if the Council would receive a Deputation from the Association at the Meeting to be held on the 14th February. It was stated that the Deputation would consist of Mr. Brendan O'Riordan, Chairman of the Association, and Rev. Fr. McGillicuddy, C.C. The Council agreed that the Deputation be received at the Meeting to be held on the 14th February.

Water Supplies in North-East Wicklow Area.

Councillor J. Temple stated that the position regarding water supplies in the North-Eastern part of the County was very serious in that the Dublin Corporation was not allowing any additional connections from its supplies. In consequence building had now stopped on the erection of twenty-five houses in Bray, which were urgently needed to meet the demand for houses in the area.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Temple;

Seconded by Councillor H. J. Byrne;

Resolved—That we request the Minister for Local Government to receive a Deputation from this Council in regard to water supply from Dublin Corporation to area adjoining Bray. Passed unanimously.

The Council agreed that the Deputation would consist of the Chairman, together with the Members of the Council for the Bray Electoral Area, the County Engineer and the Bray Town Engineer.

Flooding at Bray.

Councillor Hipwell inquired if the Council intended to carry out any works on the section of the Dargle River in the County Council area. Councillor H. J. Byrne inquired as to the possibility of purchasing the piece of land known as "The Slang" and stated that there was a gateway on this land and if the River rose the water flowed out through the gate on to the public road. He saw that some metal sheets had been placed against the gate and sand put there to close off the gateway. He suggested that the Council might purchase the land and build up the gate. He also mentioned that there were tree-trunks and an accumulation of stones and gravel in the bed of the River and that if the land at this point were acquired the River could be cleaned out and these obstructions dumped on the bank. The County Manager stated that the matter of acquiring this plot of ground had been considered some years previously, but that the price sought by the owner was regarded as unreasonable. He stated that a full Report in regard to the matter of the flooding would be submitted to the Council at the next Meeting.

Ambulance Service at Bray.

Councillor J. Temple submitted a letter received from Messrs. P.

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Savage and Co., Ltd., in regard to the Bray Ambulance Service, which was provided by the firm, giving particulars of the Service which was provided and stating that it was regrettable that a Private Company such as theirs should have been singled out for attack in the newspapers by Civil Defence Officers and stating that no telephone call had been received during the period referred to, although their phone had been manned at all times. They stated that what they described as the "unwarranted attack" had brought forward the decision of the Directors that unless the Service could carry itself they would withdraw it from public use as from 1st March, 1966. Councillor Temple stated that he considered the attack was an unwarranted one and felt that the matter should be investigated. He proposed that Mr. Savage, together with the persons referred to in the letter published in the paper, be asked to attend at the Meeting of the Members of the Council for the Bray Electoral Area to be held in the following week so that the matter could be fully investigated. Councillor Edward Byrne supported Councillor Temple in his remarks. The County Manager stated that the County Secretary had received a letter from a member of the Civil Defence Service in Bray complaining that the Civil Defence Ambulance had to answer two calls during the night because of the fact that the ambulance of Mr. Savage's firm was not available. On the same morning, before it was possible to examine the letter in detail or discuss it with the County Manager, the County Secretary had received a telephone call from a Newspaper Office stating that it had received a similar letter and asking for the Council's observations. It appeared that it was claimed that efforts were made to obtain the ambulance on Sunday morning, the 30th January, but that no reply was received to the telephone calls and in consequence the Gardai called out the Civil Defence Ambulance. In another instance an ambulance was obtained from Loughlinstown Hospital. The County Manager stated, however, that Messrs. P. Savage and Co., claimed that they had received no telephone call and that they were available if a call had been received.

The County Manager stated that the Ambulance Service in the County cost about £15,000 in the current year and would cost about £18,000 in the coming year. The Council had four ambulances, three of which were always in commission and one in reserve. In the present year the Council had two new ambulances on order and it was proposed to order another in the coming year. Normally ambulances were only stationed where there were Hospitals and the Council's ambulances were stationed at Wicklow, Rathdrum and Baltinaglass. There were hired ambulances at Arklow and Bray and the Civil Defence Ambulance in Bray was also available in the event of emergencies. The County Manager agreed that the matter could be investigated by the Committee of the Council for the Bray Electoral Area and a full Report then given to the Council. He stated that the Members probably would also wish to discuss reviewing the present Service in Bray and the question of paying a retaining fee in respect of the ambulance there. He stated that the matter of the Telephone Service was being taken up with the Post Office Authorities. The Council agreed that the matter be examined by the Members of the Council for the Bray Electoral Area.

Glenealy Water Supply.

Councillor Haughton inquired as to what progress was being made in preparing a Water Supply Scheme for cottages at Drumdangan, Glenealy. The County Secretary stated that he understood the Plans were not yet available, but that the matter would be looked into.

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Erection of Houses at Cooldmoney.

In reply to Councillor Miley and Councillor Timmins (who stated he had handed in a Motion in the matter some three years previously) the Council's Architect stated that he expected to have the Plans in respect of these houses ready within about ten days.

Protection for Workers.

Councillor Whelan asked that some form of protection be provided for workers in the Tinahely area who had to travel to work in an open lorry. It was agreed that the matter be inquired into.

Dispensary Doctor at Rathdrum.

Councillor Haughton raised the matter of there being no resident Dispensary Doctor in Rathdrum and inquired as to whether there was any hope of a Doctor being appointed in the near future. The County Manager stated that the new Health Legislation would affect the matter and that at present no further appointments of District Medical Officers were being made as it was understood that the present system might not be continued in future. Councillor Haughton pointed out that the nearest temporary Doctor was resident in Wicklow and that this was a retrograde step. The County Manager stated that the Council had endeavoured to obtain a temporary District Medical Officer who would reside in Rathdrum, but had not been successful. It was agreed that the position be advertised again.

The following Notices of Motion were handed in and accepted by the Chairman:—

In the name of Councillor Mrs. Mary Ledwidge: "That I, or someone for me, will move a Motion asking the Council to consider building an extra twenty houses in Gratian Park, Greystones, in view of the number of applications received in the Greystones area, and that the Council enter into a Contract with the present Contractor to build extra houses."

In the name of Councillor J. Quigley: Requesting a Report on the possibility of providing a right-of-way to the cottage at Preban, Aughrim, occupied by Thomas Hayden.

In the name of Councillor J. Quigley: "That I, or someone for me, will move that the Council request the Government to introduce legislation granting Travelling Allowance and Subsistence Allowance to all Jurors summoned, similar to that allowed to County Councillors."

Item No. 2—Notice of Motion in name of Councillor J. J. McCrea:—
“That the County Engineer be asked to Provide an Estimate of the Number of Roads Handed In By Councillors for the Arklow Area with a View to Having the Proposed Roads Improved and Moneys Allocated from the Road Works Estimates Submitted for the Arklow Area.”

Councillor McCrea stated that he wished to have available for the Meeting of the Members of the Council for the Arklow Electoral Area when considering the Road Works Estimates for the coming year particulars of all roads which Members of the Council in the Area had asked to have taken over as Public Roads together with an estimate of the costs involved, so that the Members of the Committee might consider allocating moneys and taking over certain of these roads. The proposal was seconded by Councillor Miss Walsh and approved.

Item No. 3—Report of County Engineer Regarding Knockeen Lane.

The County Secretary stated that the County Engineer had reported in regard to the Notice of Motion handed in in October by Councillor Miss M. Walsh in relation to flooding which occurred on Knockeen Lane and stating that the laneway fell away very steeply from the County Road and that the longitudinal drain was turned into the adjoining land so that the only water which caused damage was rainwater falling on the junction. Due to the fact that the laneway was so steep and straight the rain if it continued for a prolonged period, would cause a considerable amount of scour and damage to the lane. The Assistant County Engineer believed that if the side drains on the laneway were opened and sufficient inlets made through the ditch the flow of rainwater could be taken off the lane before it gathered momentum and caused damage. As the laneway was private the Council appeared to have no responsibility in the matter. The Council decided to refer the matter to the Members of the Council for the Arklow Electoral Area for consideration in connection with the Roads Estimates for the coming year.

Item No. 4—Notice of Motion in name of Councillor J. Whelan:—
“That the Council Take Over One Mile of Killabeg Lane And Put It In Proper Repair And That The Council Also Take Over The Bawns Lane Which Runs Between Knockanna and Rathduffmore.”

The Council agreed to refer this matter to the Roads Estimates Meeting of the Members of the Council for the Arklow Electoral Area.

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Item No. 5—Notice of Motion in name of Councillor J. Quigley:—
“That the County Engineer Alter Drainage and Camber of Cappagh Road, Aughrim.”

The Assistant County Engineer informed the Meeting that this work had been carried out.

Item No. 6—Notice of Motion in name of Councilor H. W. Hopkins:—
“That I, or Someone For Me, Will Propose that the Council Remove Concrete Base in the Bed of the River at the Brittas Bridge and so Remove the Continuous Flooding of the Surrounding Land.”

The County Secretary stated that the District Officer of the Land Project had informed the Council that to facilitate land drainage work at Sallymount, Arklow, it was necessary that the invert level of the bridge at that point be lowered by 2.5 ft. and had asked if the Council would give an estimate of the cost of the work for carrying out by the Council under the arrangements for the recoupment of the cost by the Land Project Office. The County Engineer reported that he considered it unwise to interfere with the bridge and that if it were necessary to drain the place a pipeline at the required level could be sunk across the road near the bridge. This information was supplied to the Land Project Office. Subsequently the Council notified the Land Project Office (in reply to their inquiry) that the cost of laying a pipeline across the road would be £180. In reply to a further inquiry the Land Project Office was informed that the estimate was for a pipe 30" in diameter. On the 21st of January the District Officer of the Land Project stated that he was not satisfied that a 30" diameter pipe would be sufficient to drain the catchment area and that he estimated that it would require the equivalent of a 72" diameter pipe to cater for the amount of water in the stream and he asked for an estimate of the cost of placing a pipe line equivalent to that size across the road. The County Engineer replied that he considered it would not be practicable to lay a pipe of 6ft. diameter across the road at Sallymount and even if it were practicable the cost would be about £800. This information was supplied to the Land Project District Officer on the 8th February. It was the view of the Assistant County Engineer that if the land below the bridge were drained it would help to drain Sallymount Bog. The Council noted that the matter was being dealt with by the Land Project Officer.

Item No. 7—Damage to Roads by Flooding:— (a) Letter from Parliamentary Secretary Re Application to Commissioners of Public Works to Undertake Arterial Drainage Schemes; and (b) Report of County Engineer on Tenders Received for Temporary Bridges.

I have to refer to your letters of 16th December, 1965, and 17th January, 1966 regarding damage caused by flooding in the Wicklow area.

The functions of the Commissioners of Public Works in relation to arterial drainage works are derived solely from the Arterial Drainage Act, 1945. Following the passing of this Act the catchment areas throughout the country which were thought to be most in need of drainage were listed in order of priority. Of the rivers you mention only the Slaney (including the Derry) is so listed—it is No. 28 on the priority list of major catchments, i.e., those exceeding 100,000 acres in area.

The national drainage problem is being tackled as energetically as possible and both the survey and operations staff are fully committed on very urgent works throughout the country. I regret that in the circumstances it would not be possible to accede to your request to undertake the surveys mentioned.

I am loth to put your Council to the trouble of sending a deputation to Dublin since there is little more I could add to this.

Councillor J. Temple stated that the letter must shock the Members of the Council because it seemed that the Dargle River was not included in the list of Rivers considered to be in need of drainage and in respect of which Surveys were to be carried out. He proposed that the Council still press for the reception of the Deputation. The proposal was seconded by Councillor Mrs. Ledwidge and approved by the Council. Councillor Quigley pointed out that there was a problem of flooding also in Aughrim. Councillor J. J. McCrea, Chairman, stated that the flooding caused by the River Dargle was the most urgent matter before the Council and that it was essential that some action be taken concerning it. The County Manager stated that there seemed to be some general misunderstanding by the public in relation to the position of the Local Authorities in the matter of flooding. Local Authorities endeavoured to do all they could to minimise the effects of flooding when it occurred, but it was not their statutory responsibility to ensure that flooding did not occur because of the overflowing of a River. In regard to Surveys carried out under the Arterial Drainage Act as far as he knew Surveys had not been done for the purpose of preventing flooding which might occur at times in towns and villages but were primarily for the purpose of the drainage of lands. The Council did not have the specially skilled staff required to carry out such surveys. The engagement of special staff to do such work and to make recommendations to prevent flooding of a River would entail heavy expense, which would be beyond the resources of the normal Local Authority. The Co. Manager stated further that he thoroughly agreed with the Council that representations should be made to the Minister to ensure that something was done. The County Secretary submitted a letter received from the Little Bray Residents' Association in regard to the flooding at Little Bray and the Members of the Council decided to refer the matter for consideration by the Members of the Council for the **Bray Electoral Area** at their Joint Meeting with the Members of the Urban District Council in relation to flooding.

The County Engineer informed the Council that while he had not completed the full Report on his examination of the Tenders for the supply of Bridges to replace permanent Bridges damaged in the recent flooding he wished to submit a verbal Report on the matter. Documents in relation to the Tenders had been issued to sixteen Contractors but only seven Contractors had tendered giving in all nine Tenders. Only four of these were complete and only portion of the work was tendered for in the remaining Tenders and consequently it was impossible to assess the final price to make a comparison. The most suitable Tenders appeared to be the following:—

Tender of Acrow (Engineers) Ltd., Dublin—For the supply and delivery of FIVE Bailey Bridges, capable of carrying a 10 ton load, for the sum of £18,015. These Bridges would be available for use at Ballard (1), Ballisland (2) and Stratford (2). The estimated cost of preparing sites to take the Bridges and supplying labour for their erection was £1,075, making a total cost of £19,090. This Tender was for new Bridges.

Tender of Acrow (Engineers) Ltd., Dublin—For the supply of FIVE Reconditioned Bridges instead of new Bridges, which would effect a saving on their Tender for new Bridges of about £4,341, making the Tender for these Five Bridges £14,750.

The County Engineer stated that the firm were willing to guarantee the Bridges and that they were structurally equal to new Bridges. They had sufficient conditioned units on hands to do all the Bridges. The County Engineer stated that if it was decided to purchase Bridges he would recommend the acceptance of the Tender of Acrow (Engineers) Ltd., for the supply of the Reconditioned Bridges. The County Engineer stated that Tenders had been received for the Hire of New Bridges from Ascon Ltd., Clonsilla, in the sum of £13,400 and from Cullen Bros., East Wall, Dublin, for two sites being for three Bridges, one at Ballard and two at Ballisland in the sum of £8,260. These figures were for hire based on a twelve months hire period. Tenders had also been received for Footbridges from Ascon Ltd. for Five Footbridges in the sum of £7,600 and from Portarlinton Engineering Products Ltd., in the sum of £17,908. No Tender had been received for the Hire of Footbridges. The County Engineer stated that he felt that the prices received for the hire of temporary Roadbridges was not an economical proposition when compared with Tender for outright purchase and that it was quite likely that the period of hire might be even longer than twelve months.

Resolved—That we approve of the acceptance of the Tender of £14,750 for the purchase of Five Reconditioned Bridges and request a Grant from the Department of Local Government to defray the cost of the Bridges.

The County Secretary stated that the Council had already agreed to the County Engineer's proceeding with any necessary repairs following the recent flooding but that it would be necessary to pass a Resolution authorising the expenditure as direct provision for such work had not been made in the Estimates. In addition following a more up-to-date assessment of the expenditure on Health Services and Assistance and General Purposes, it was found that there was a likelihood of expenditure being incurred in excess of the Estimates under certain headings and details were supplied to the Council.

Item No. 8—To Receive Deputation from Blessington Development Association Regarding Swimming Pool for Blessington.

The Council received a Deputation from Blessington Development Association consisting of Rev. C. McGillicuddy, Chairman, and James Power, Secretary. Mr. Power thanked the Council for receiving the Deputation and stated that the Association had been set up for the purpose of promoting the economic and social development of Blessington, which they felt had great potential because of its natural attractions and proximity to Dublin. They felt that a Swimming Pool was one of their greatest needs. The Department's Standard Plan for a Swimming Pool would cost £16,000 of which £8,000 would be given by way of Grant from the State, and the Development Association were prepared to contribute £1,000 of the balance. He asked that the Council give their best consideration to the Association's application for a Grant from the Council to meet the balance of the cost. Fr. McGillicuddy also stressed the need for a Swimming Pool at Blessington on account of the growing population, expanding Technical School, and the likelihood of a Secondary School being available shortly. The Chairman stated that the Council had already agreed to discuss the matter in the course of the Estimates Meeting.

Item No. 9—Report of County Engineer on Proposed Regional Water Supply Scheme For Carlow Which Could Serve Area in County Wicklow.

A Chara,

Some time ago, I was requested to attend the office of Messrs. Nicholas O'Dwyer Son and Partners Consulting Engineers, 6 Burlington Road, Dublin 4, to discuss the practicability of serving part of Wicklow from the Carlow Regional Scheme which is at present being designed.

Present at the Meeting were the Consulting Engineers, represented by Mr. O'Riordan, Professor Purcell, Mr. Harding Department Inspector, Mr. Bernard, Carlow County Engineer, and Mr. O'Donoghoe, Kildare County Engineer.

I enclose copy of Consulting Engineer's Report, together with Plan, showing area which would be served from this scheme in County Wicklow. The scheme would serve a total, approximately, of 13,500 acres, comprising the Electoral Divisions of Rath, Money, Aghowles and Killinure, serving approximately 300 houses, at a total cost of £116,000.

I consider the scheme a practical and economical one, and recommend it for approval. If the Council agree to go ahead with the Scheme it would be necessary to get in touch with Carlow County Council and make application to them for the water. An agreement would, I presume, have to be reached eventually as to what charge Carlow County Council would require for the service by way of an annuity payment or on a 1,000 gallons used basis.

The entire scheme need not proceed immediately. It would, however, be necessary, if it is agreed to accept the Scheme to contribute £12,000 towards the capital cost and works so that the pipes, head works and treatment works constructed by Carlow County Council, would be sufficiently large to supply County Wicklow's eventual demand.

It has come to the knowledge of our committee that Messrs. Philips of Ballyfree Farms, Glenealy, intend to erect a number (probably 9) of Poultry Houses on their lands at Drumdangan, Glenealy.

To the best of our knowledge no notice of intention has been published in the Press, or on the lands. Yet already a site for three houses has been prepared in close proximity to certain dwellinghouses occupied by members of this Association and we have reason to fear that a further site also is to be located close to dwelling houses.

As many of our members already have suffered and continue to suffer grievously as a consequence of the earlier erection and operation of similar poultry houses at Ballyfree, and from the highly objectionable stench caused by the disposal of the excretia from these houses, we intend to lodge a vigorous objection to permission being granted to erect further houses at Drumdangan.

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Would you please inform us if you have, as yet received any application for permission to erect these Poultry Houses.

Dear Mr. Brangan,

I have to thank you for your letter of the 20th January in which you refer to complaints from residents in Glenealy in regard to the disagreeable smells resulting from manure spread on my lands.

In the operation of an activity such as ours, very large quantities of poultry manure must be disposed of by spreading them on the lands which benefit as a result of the manurial value. I appreciate that under certain conditions a very disagreeable smell results from this activity and I can't do other than sympathise with the local residents. When we planned our current operation a great deal of thought was given to the problems of manure disposal and I made visits both to America and the U.K. to study methods employed for the disposal of slurry without causing undue nuisance to people living in the vicinity. This is a matter which has posed problems of a very severe nature in the U.K. where very large flocks are maintained under intensive conditions on a relatively small acreage. In such circumstances the operator has had to spread his manure daily in very large quantities over 3/4 acres because alternative methods of manure disposal were not available. We decided, however, to go to a considerable expense in building enormous underground tanks, each holding up to 25,000 gallons, into which the manure could be stored for periods of up to four months. This arrangement has the advantage of enabling us to spread the manure under the most favourable conditions, that is to say when the wind is blowing in the most favourable direction, and when the weather is humid. The arrangement also has the advantage of enabling us to spread all the manure produced over a period of approximately three days each month. Thus, if any nuisance is caused due to a change in the wind or excessively dry weather, it is limited to the very short period of three days per month, whereas without storage tanks it would have been continual.

We are also experimenting with a new chemical by May and Baker—C.P.M.—55—X (Alamask). The makers claim that the chemical acts as an odour control and will either cancel out the original manure odour or leave a pleasing neutral odour in its place. Supplies are not currently available to us but arrangements are being made for the importation of supplies from the U.K.—where we understand the chemical has given valuable results. We have acquainted the local Residents' Association with this proposal and when supplies are received we will invite them to a demonstration in order that they may see that we are doing all we can to assist with the problem.

I feel I must add that although I would admit the smell is disagreeable, it is not sufficiently intensive to justify widespread complaint. Glenealy is a very spread out village and whereas the residents of one or two houses might notice an objectional smell it is highly unlikely that all the residents would notice it at the same time having regard to the dispersed areas where the manure is spread—and the prevailing wind.

We are in the course of building up a very large undertaking which is to the benefit of the community as a whole. Over the past year, something over £23,000 has been paid in wages and feeding stuffs in excess of £55,000 were purchased from the local Co-Op. We very much regret that there should be a certain amount of nuisance to the local residents but there are considerable compensating factors. It is interesting to note in this respect that no complaints have been raised by any of the many families who derive employment from our activities. If, in the course of time, other possibilities present themselves of abating any of the nuisance that it is alleged we cause, we will certainly take advantage of them.

I trust the above gives a clear answer to your letter and if there is anything further by way of information I can give you do not hesitate to let me know.

It is interesting to note that we have been spreading in the village area for the past three days (wet and humid) and there has been NO smell.

The County Secretary stated that two of the Poultry-Houses at Glenealy were "Unauthorised Structures" under the Planning Act and would have to be removed. In reply to inquiry from Councillor Miss Walsh as to whether there was a public health problem involved the County Secretary stated that he understood that there was no danger to public health, but a disagreeable smell did exist. Councillor Haughton agreed that there was a most unpleasant smell which arose when the manure was being spread on lands and that while he had sympathy with Mr. Phillips since the industry was an asset to the community he considered that there should be some other way of dealing with the manure so as to avoid this offensive smell. The Council noted that Mr. Phillips was arranging to use chemicals which he considered would avoid the nuisance from the smell and deferred action to see if these steps would prove effective.

Item No. 15—Report of Councillors Miss M. Walsh and Mrs. M. Ledwidge on Visit to Peamount Hospital.

As Councillor J. Everett, T.D., who had raised the matter, was absent due to illness the Council decided to defer consideration of the Report to the next Meeting. Councillor Miss Walsh asked that the County Secretary convey thanks to the Authorities of Peamount Hospital for the courtesy and help afforded to them on their visit.

Item No. 16—Health Services—Letters from Department of Health Re Supplementary Health Grant Being Made Available for Year 1966/67.

The County Secretary stated that a further letter had been received from the Department of Health in regard to the Supplementary Health Grant which was being made available for the coming year. The Supplementary Grant would apply in respect of expenditure in 1966/67 in excess of the expenditure actually incurred during the year 1965/66. It had been pointed out by the Department, however, that while additional expenditure arising from circumstances outside the control of the Council, or from a decision of the Council approved by the Minister, would be included in the calculation of Grant, any other expenditure arising from departures from revised Estimates for 1965/66 and preliminary Estimates for 1966/67 furnished by the Council to the Department would be excluded.

Newcastle Mental Hospital.

The County Manager stated that a lengthy letter had been received from the Department of Health in regard to Newcastle Hospital, in which was set out the Department's views as regards the eventual total accommodation to be provided in the Hospital. The Council agreed that a copy of the letter be circulated to the Members and considered at the next Meeting.

Clerk/Typist at Newcastle Mental Hospital.

Councillor E. Byrne raised the matter of the Clerk/Typist at Newcastle Mental Hospital and stated that it would be unfortunate if the Clerk/Typist at present filling this post, and who resided in Bray, and had been transferred from her previous post at Baltinglass Hospital, should have to return to the post in Baltinglass. The County Secretary stated that a difficulty did arise in connection with the post at Newcastle, which was not a permanent one. On the proposal of Councillor E. Byrne, seconded by Councillor Mrs. Ledwidge, the Council passed the following Resolution:—

"That we approve of creation of a permanent post of Clerk/Typist for Newcastle Mental Hospital."

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 17—Loan for Purpose of Defraying Expenditure on Purchase of Generators for Hospitals—Letter from National Bank, Ltd.

The County Secretary submitted a further letter received from the National Bank Ltd., regarding the Council's application for a loan of £2,000 to defray the cost of the purchase and installation of electrical Generators in Hospitals in the County, in which it was stated that the Board of the Bank did not consider the proposal a suitable banking transaction, particularly in the existing difficult credit conditions, and regretted that they had to adhere to their original decision in this matter. The Council noted the decision in the matter.

Item No. 18—Presidential Election—Letter from Eoin O Mathghamhna, Uas., Seeking Nomination for the Presidency.

The following letter from Eoin O Mathghamhna Uas., was submitted to the Council:—

Friday, 14th January, 1966.

The Chairman and Members of the Wicklow County Council.

Gentlemen:

The Presidency of Ireland becomes vacant this year and you with two other County Councils can nominate a candidate. In a Democracy I feel strongly that every position in the gift of the people should be contested so that there should be life and healthy rivalry. For this reason I urge you to exercise your constitutional rights and nominate a candidate. Should you honour me by considering my name among others I am willing to allow my name to go forward and risk defeat at the hands of the Electorate. I would be a strictly non-political candidate.

If, however I should be successful I should willingly be prepared to forfeit all chance of permanent academic employment in the United States so that I might have the honour of discharging my duties faithfully and well. I think that I know my country as thoroughly as any man or woman living and I fain would serve her well.

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Should you be willing to give me audience I should be glad to appear before you at any time which is convenient to you and your staff.

Item No. 19—Golden Jubilee of 1916 Rising.

The County Secretary stated that this item had been included on the Agenda at the request of Councillor J. O'Toole, as approved by the Chairman. The following letter received from Mr. Cearbhall O Dalaigh, Chief Justice, was submitted:—

I would like to suggest for your consideration and for that of the Council that some suitable memorial (a plaque in Irish and English or, perhaps, something more fitting) might be erected at Kilcoole in this, the jubilee year of the 1916 Rising, to commemorate the Kilcoole 'gun-running' of Sunday, August 2, 1914. This event and the landing of arms at Howth on the preceding Sunday, July 26, were the sine-qua-non of the Rising.

Rev. Professor F. X. Martin, O.S.A., who edited the work **The Howth Gun-running and the Kilcoole Gun-Running** (Browne and Nolan, 1964) has sent me a copy of a letter (which I enclose) from Mr. Harry Nicholls, one of the surviving Volunteer officers who helped at the landing, identifying the spot on the beach where the landing took place. Wickiow deserves to have the place where the arms were landed marked and commemorated.

Although, as you say, I was working in the dark on the night of the gun-running, I can identify the stretch where the guns were landed.

There is a road at right angles to the railway line at the old Station of Kilcoole and the landing took place along the shore immediately to the north of this—in fact along the shore for about 100 yards.

I think this should identify the place—the charabanc into which most of the stuff was loaded was on the road close to the railway.

Hoping I have made myself clear.

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In reply to inquiries from Members the County Secretary stated that this was not the function of the Council, but that if there was a Committee dealing with the matter in the County the letter might be forwarded to them. The County Secretary stated that Comdt. M. Kavanagh, Arklow, had previously suggested that a plaque be erected on the wall of the former gaol in Wicklow and that the Council had agreed to this proposal. Councillor Mrs. Ledwidge stated that there was an old I.R.A. Committee in Bray and suggested that the letter be forwarded to them. The Council agreed that the matter be forwarded to the Secretary of the Bray Chamber of Commerce, who was forming a Committee in connection with the celebration of the Golden Jubilee of the 1916 Rising.

Item No. 20—Seeds and Fertilisers Supply Scheme for 1966.

The County Secretary submitted the draft Seeds and Fertilisers Supply Scheme for 1966 which was on similar terms to the Scheme operated in 1965. The County Secretary stated that the Scheme was not being availed of to any great extent in recent years as there were only five borrowers in 1964 and three in 1965.
It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Quigley;
Seconded by Councillor A. H. Hadden:

Resolved—That we hereby adopt Seeds and Fertilisers Supply Scheme under the provisions of the Seeds and Fertilisers Supply Act 1956, in respect of the year 1966, in accordance with the Draft Scheme as submitted to this Meeting.

Passed unanimously.

Dunlavin Courthouse.

Councillor Deering referred to the recent fire at Dunlavin Courthouse which caused considerable damage and expressed appreciation of the speedy attendance of the Blessington and Baltinglass Fire Brigades and of their work in preventing further damage to the building. He suggested that Bord Failte should again be approached in regard to assisting in work of restoring the building. Councillor Miley stated that the Gardai had done very good work in assisting the Fire Brigades and stated that they should be complimented on their valuable assistance.

Wicklow County Council

The Estimates Meeting of Wicklow County Council was held at the Council Chamber, Kilmantin Hill, Wicklow, at 2.30 p.m. on 28th February, 1966.

The following Members attended:—

Councillors John Quigley, Alan H. Hadden, James Whelan, G. Timmins, Mark Deering, James Miley, M. J. O'Neill, Seamus Ua Tuathail, Miss Mary Walsh, Mrs. Mary Ledwidge, H. J. Byrne, Edward Byrne, Hugh B. Hipwell, John Temple, J. Everett, T.D.; Roger Miley, J. Gregory and H. W. Hopkins.

In the absence of Councillor J. J. McCrea, Chairman, due to illness, Councillor H. J. Byrne, Vice-Chairman, presided.

The County Manager, County Secretary, County Engineer, Chief Fire Officer, and Chief Assistant County Engineer R. L. Farrell attended.

The Council proceeded with the examination of the Estimates in detail, commencing with the Roads Estimates.

The County Manager indicated that the provision for Maintenance of Main Roads showed an increase of £1,656 and the figure for Maintenance of County Roads an increase of £8,530 to cover the estimated extra cost of Maintenance in the coming year due to the damage to Roads caused by the flooding in November, 1965.

The County Manager stated that the Department of Local Government had indicated that a Grant of 75 per cent. of the cost would be made available for works of restoring Bridges on Main Roads, but as the Council were aware, the greater part of the damage caused by the flooding occurred on County Roads and County Road Bridges. To date over £20,000 had been spent on restoring County Roads. The Council agreed that the Department of Local Government be asked to agree to the costs of repair of flood damage, whether on Main or County Roads, being charged against Arterial Road Grants and Main Road Improvement Grants. The Council considered further that the additional cost of Maintenance for Main and County Roads in the coming year, consequent on the damage caused by flooding, should also be charged against Road Grants and, accordingly, the figure for Main Roads Maintenance was reduced by £1,656, being a net reduction of £828 on account of 50% Maintenance Grant, and Maintenance of County Roads by £8,530. The Council decided to reduce the provision for Snow Clearance on Main Roads to £2,000, representing a net reduction of £1,000, having regard to the provision made for 50% Grant, and to strike out the provision of £1,000 which had been made for Snow Clearance on County Roads. In reply to inquiries from Members of the Council the County Secretary stated that the effect of the alterations made in the Roads Estimates represented a reduction of about 9½d. in the £.

HEALTH SERVICES.

In regard to the recent letter from the Department of Health concerning the Mental Hospital at Newcastle, Councillor H. J. Byrne, Chairman, inquired as to how the cost of the erection of the proposed extension would be met. The County Secretary stated that the cost of extension and alterations at Newcastle Mental Hospital would be met in the first instance from the sum of £100,000 compensation receivable by the Council in respect of their share of the Assets in the Dublin Mental Hospitals and any additional cost would be met from State Grant. The County Manager stated that it was expected that

as a result of the Council providing better services through the Mental Hospital at Newcastle a reduction in the number of patients to be maintained in the Mental Hospital would be effected.

In reply to Councillor J. Miley, the County Manager stated that in view of the proposed changes in the Medical Services, as indicated in the White Paper recently issued by the Department of Health, it would not be possible to proceed with the proposal for the erection of a Clinic at Blessington.

In regard to the Ambulance Service the County Manager stated that negotiations were in progress with the Contractor for the Ambulance Service in Bray with a view to arranging for payment by way of retention fee, together with a mileage rate, but agreement had not yet been reached on the matter.

The Council approved of the Estimates for the Health Services as submitted.

ASSISTANCE.

The Council approved of the provision made in the Estimates for Public Assistance.

Councillor Temple, supported by Councillor Hipwell and others, asked that Meetings of the Public Assistance Committees quarterly be resumed. The County Manager explained that the number of new cases arising for Public Assistance was very limited and that quarterly Meetings of Committees would hardly be necessary. It was agreed that the matter be looked into.

SANITARY SERVICES.

Councillor Gregory urged that provision be made in the Estimates for a Scavenging Service at Newtownmountkennedy. The County Manager stated that it would be necessary to determine the area to be served by the Scavenging Service and invite Tenders in order to arrive at the cost of this Service. It was agreed that a Report be submitted to the Council in regard to the provision of the Service.

In reply to Councillor J. Miley, the County Manager stated that provision had not been made in the Estimates for a Grant towards the cost of a Swimming Pool at Blessington because no estimate of the cost had yet been obtained and he felt that there was little likelihood of obtaining a Loan to meet the cost of a Grant in respect of the provision of a Pool. It would appear that the loan charges and maintenance of a Swimming Pool would cost in the region of £1,000 per annum. Councillor J. Miley pointed out that the local Development Association was prepared to contribute £1,000 towards the cost of the Pool and:

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Miley;

Seconded by Councillor J. O'Toole:

Resolved—That we provide £1,000 towards the cost of loan charges and maintenance for a Swimming Pool at Blessington.

Councillor H. J. Byrne, Chairman, suggested that it was not an opportune time to consider providing moneys for Swimming Pools having regard to the amount of the Estimates as submitted to the Council. Councillor Hadden pointed out that in view of the present credit restrictions there did not appear to be any likelihood that moneys could be made available by way of Loan to meet the cost of a Grant for this purpose.

As an amendment:

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Temple;

Seconded by Councillor H. B. Hipwell:

Resolved—That County Engineer proceed with Plan and Estimate of Cost of Swimming Pool at Blessington.

Councillor J. Miley deferred to the views expressed by other Members and agreed to withdraw his proposal, with the consent of his seconder. The amendment in the name of Councillor J. Temple, seconded by Councillor H. B. Hipwell, was accepted.

HOUSING SERVICES.

Councillor H. J. Byrne, Chairman, suggested that the estimated figure of £14,240 provided for Cottage Repairs might be reduced. Councillor Quigley pointed out that the necessary repairs to cottages could not be carried out by the County Engineer if sufficient funds were not made available and the County Manager indicated that in the present year the Council would be spending over £14,000 on Repairs to Cottages. Councillor Hipwell proposed that the figure for Cottage Repairs be reduced to £12,000 and Councillor J. Miley seconded the proposal. Councillor H. J. Byrne, Chairman, proposed that the figure be reduced to £10,000 and Councillor A. H. Hadden seconded. Councillor J. Whelan suggested that the Council agree on a figure of £11,000 as a compromise. A vote having been taken on the proposal that the provision for Repairs be reduced to £11,000 it was found that the Members present voted as follows:—

In Favour—Councillors J. Whelan, H. J. Byrne, M. Deering, A. H. Hadden, H. B. Hipwell, H. W. Hopkins, J. Miley, R. Miley, M. J. O'Neill, J. O'Toole, G. Timmins and Miss M. Walsh—Twelve.

Against—Councillors E. Byrne, J. Everett, T.D.; J. Gregory, Mrs. M. Ledwidge, P. McCarthy, J. Quigley, P.C., and J. Temple—Seven.

The Council agreed to a reduction in the Estimate for Cottage Repairs of £3,240 to leave the amount provided £11,000.

At this stage the Council adjourned further consideration of the Estimates to a Meeting to be held on the 7th March, 1966.

The adjourned Estimates Meeting of the Council was held at the Council Chamber, Kilmantin Hill, Wicklow, on 7th March, 1966, at 2.30 p.m.

The following Members attended:—

Councillors P. McCarthy, John Quigley, Alan H. Hadden, James Whelan, G. Timmins, Mark Deering, James Miley, M. J. O'Neill, Seamus Ua Tuathail, Miss Mary Walsh, Mrs. Mary Ledwidge, H. J. Byrne, Edward Byrne, Hugh B. Hipwell, John Temple, J. Everett, T.D.; Roger Miley, J. D. Houghton and J. Gregory. In the absence of the Chairman (Councillor J. J. McCrea) due to illness, Councillor H. J. Byrne presided.

The County Manager, County Secretary, County Engineer, Chief Fire Officer, and Chief Assistant County Engineer R. L. Farrell attended.

The Council proceeded with the examination of the Estimates for General Purposes.

In reply to Councillor J. Miley regarding the Estimate for Libraries the County Manager explained that efforts had been made to arrange for the provision of a Library in Blessington and it had been proposed to include the Library with the new Dispensary. As had been indicated at the previous Meeting, however, there appeared

to be no possibility of proceeding with the provision of the Dispensary at present.

In regard to the provision for Planning, the County Manager pointed out that he had urged on previous occasions that a Grant should be made available from the Road Fund towards the costs of Planning. It was clear, however, that no Grant would be available to meet the costs arising under this heading. The Council was obliged under the Local Government (Planning and Development) Act, 1963, to prepare a Development Plan for the County and for Greystones/Delgany and Rathdrum and it was essential to have the necessary staff for this purpose.

On the suggestion of Councillor J. Miley the Council agreed to strike out the provision of £3,000 for Local Elections.

In regard to provision for Sheep Dipping the Co. Manager pointed out that the increase under this heading was due to the new Regulations in respect of double-dipping of sheep and resulting increase in the remuneration of Sheep Dipping Inspectors and the recommendation of a Special Committee appointed by the Council that an increased payment be made to owners of Private Baths in respect of sheep (other than their own) dipped in these Baths. The County Secretary stated that he understood that it was the Committee's intention that the previous rate of payment of 1d. per sheep dipped in Private Baths be increased to 1½d. in respect of each dipping, which would be equivalent to 3d. per sheep double-dipped. On this basis the Estimate might be reduced by £500. The Council agreed to reduce the Estimate under this heading by £500.

REPAIRS TO COURTHOUSES.

Councillor Mrs. Ledwidge and Councillor Temple urged that in view of the Council's Resolution on the matter that the Department of Justice should be responsible for the maintenance and repair of Courthouses that the provision made under this heading be struck out. The County Secretary pointed out that there was a legal obligation on the Council to meet these costs and if the Council failed to comply with their obligations necessary works of repair could be carried out by the Department of Justice and the cost recovered from the Council. On the suggestion of Councillor J. Everett, T.D., the Council agreed that the provision under this heading be reduced from £1,200 to £600.

In regard to the increased provision for Overdraft Interest the County Manager pointed out that in view of the amount of the Credit Balance which had been absorbed during the past two years it had been necessary to resort to overdraft accommodation and the authorised overdraft for the present Quarter was £250,000.

In reply to inquiries from the Members of the Council the County Secretary stated that the effect of the alterations made by the Members in the Estimates was a reduction of approximately 1/4d. in the £. Councillor M. J. O'Neill proposed that the Estimates be determined at a figure representing 52s. in the £. Councillor J. Quigley seconded the proposal. As an amendment it was proposed by Councillor J. Everett, T.D., that the Estimates be determined at a figure involving an increase of 5s. in the Rate only and that the balance be met by borrowing over a period of years. Councillor J. Haughton seconded this proposal. In reply to Councillor Timmins the County Manager stated that the excess of Assets over Liabilities of the Council at the 31st March, 1965 was £151,102 and that Credits had been applied in the previous year's Estimates of £75,656, while, in addition, there had been excess expenditure during the year of £37,200. The net balance at the 31st March, 1966, was estimated, accordingly, at about £40,000.

Councillor Haughton proposed that Credits be availed of to effect a reduction in the Rate proposed by 3/4d. Councillor H. J. Byrne felt it would not be prudent to adopt Councillor Haughton's proposal and pointed out that the Council were feeling the effects of the use of Credits to such a large extent in the previous year and he now felt that the Council had been unwise in availing of Credits to that extent. If Credits had not been availed of in the previous year the increase in the coming year's Estimates would have been only 4/-. Councillor Hadden pointed out that he had been the only Councillor who had disagreed with the use of Credits to reduce the Estimates in the previous year and it was clear that the Council's present difficulty would be the matter of the Bank Overdraft, on which Interest would have to be paid. Councillor M. Deering, having seconded Councillor Haughton's proposal, which had been accepted by Councillor J. Everett, T.D., in lieu of his original proposal, a vote was called for on the proposal to avail of Credits to effect a reduction in the Estimates equivalent to 3/4d. in the £. The voting resulted as follows:—

In favour—Councillors E. Byrne, M. Deering, J. Everett, T.D., J. Gregory, J. D. Haughton, J. Quigley and Miss M. Walsh—Seven.

Against—Councillors J. Whelan, H. J. Byrne, A. H. Hadden, H. B. Hipwell, Mrs. M. Ledwidge, P. McCarthy, J. Miley, R. Miley, M. J. O'Neill, J. O'Toole, J. Temple and G. Timmins—Twelve.

The amendment in the name of Councillor J. Haughton was declared defeated by twelve votes against to seven votes in favour.

Councillor J. Temple proposed that Credits be availed of to reduce the increase in the Estimates over the previous year to one of 9/- and this proposal was seconded by Councillor Haughton. Councillor O'Neill stated that he would withdraw his original proposal for an increase of 10s. In reply to inquiry from the Chairman the County Manager stated that he did not think it would be wise to avail of Credits to the extent proposed, but that it was a matter for the Council. In view of Councillor O'Neill having indicated his wish to withdraw his original proposal Councillor H. J. Byrne stated that he would propose that Resolution himself and the Resolution was seconded by Councillor Hipwell.

The following amendment in the name of Councillor J. Temple, seconded by Councillor Haughton, was submitted to the Council:—

"That we determine the Estimates on the basis of an increase of 9/- in the General Rate to bring the Rate for 1966/67 to 51/-."

A vote having been called for on the amendment, the Members present voted as follows:—

In Favour — Councillors J. Whelan, E. Byrne, M. Deering, J. Everett, T.D.; J. Gregory, A. H. Hadden, J. D. Haughton, Mrs. M. Ledwidge, M. J. O'Neill, J. Quigley, J. Temple and Miss M. Walsh—Twelve.

Against—Councillors H. J. Byrne, H. B. Hipwell, P. McCarthy, J. Miley, R. Miley, J. O'Toole and G. Timmins—Seven.

The amendment was declared carried by twelve votes in favour to seven votes against. The amendment having been put as a substantive motion the Council passed the Resolution on the same voting. It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Temple;

Resolved—That we hereby determine, in accordance with the Estimates of Expenses (as amended), the Rates set forth in Column 13

The following Statement of the County Manager on the Estimates had been circulated to the Members, together with the attached Table giving details of the Estimates:—

WICKLOW COUNTY COUNCIL

Kilmantin Hill, Wicklow.

17th February, 1966.

ESTIMATES FOR FINANCIAL YEAR 1966/67.

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In the attached Tables details are given, under the principal Service headings, of the Estimates of Expenses and Receipts of the County Council for the year ending 31st March, 1967.

The total expenditure for the coming year is estimated at £1,543,844. (In this amount the outlay described as Materials Expense Account and Machinery Expense Account at the end of the General Purposes Table is not taken into account. It is required under the Public Bodies Order to show expenditure and receipts in respect of Material Expense Account and Machinery Expense Account—the receipts in fact correspond to the outlay. But it would be a duplication to include them under Expenditure and Receipts for estimating purposes as in reality the outlay on Plant and on Road Materials is costed for the various Works and the recording of the details of these two

Accounts in the Estimates is, consequently, merely a pro forma accounting detail necessary in order to conform to statutory requirements. Likewise the receipts appearing under these two headings are not taken into account). The total Receipts come to £773,276, leaving the net amount to be raised from Rates £770,568. In the present year the amount raised from Rates was £703,636. The increase, it will be seen, is £66,932. In the present year the total Expenditure provided for in the Estimates was £1,488,120 and the Receipts were taken at £784,484, leaving a net Outlay of £703,636. However, in determining the Rate in the £ the Council took into account Credits of £75,656. This was equivalent to a reduction in the Rate Levy of about 6s. As a result the Rate struck for the present year did not reflect the true costs for the period. The Rate levied in the present year was 42s. in the £ and for the coming year the Estimates now submitted would require a Rate of 53/5d. The increase of 11/5d. is undoubtedly an unusual and very steep one but 6/- of it is due to the decision to use Credits last year. In the absence of applied Credits the Rate for the coming year would automatically have to be higher by 6/-.

Briefly the increase in the Rate which would be required could be broken down as follows:—

Roads	8½d.	Rise mainly due to provision which has to be made to restore damage to road surfaces by floods.
Health	2/7d.	Attributable to excess outlay in present year—mainly on hospital costs—which will not be met in full from the new Supplementary Health Grant in the coming year.
Assistance	1½d.	Due to Superannuation charge.
Sanitary Services	1d.	Arises from loan charges on new Water Supply Schemes.
Housing	6½d.	It is necessary to make additional provision for loan charges—mainly on Loans for Improvement and Reconstruction of Private Dwellings—and an extra of £2,000 is included for Repairs. There will be a decrease in Rental Income of about £2,400 due to the number of tenants availing of Tenant Purchase with consequent automatic reduction in their rents.
General Purposes	7/4d	Here the application of Credits last year, which represented 6/- as a Rate, will leave the Rate in the coming year higher by a corresponding amount. The reduction in the Council's Credit Balance has meant that there has had to be almost continuous resort to overdraft accommodation from the

Bank and this will mean that new interest charges, representing a Rate of 4d. in the £, will have to be met next year. The Demand of the Committee of Agriculture is up by about 3½d. and additional provision to be made for Planning and Development accounts for 4½d., whilst the Public Libraries will require an additional 2d. For the Diseases of Animals Acts (sheep dipping) an extra 3d. will be necessary. Provision to be made for General Purposes would even be higher if it were not for some reductions in Expenditure under a few headings and some increases in Receipts.

ROADS.

The Rate required for Roads is 11/11d. which compares with 11/2½d. in the present year—this, as already mentioned, is an increase of 8½d. The amount required for Roads, in all, comes to £395,368 and of this it is expected that £216,925 will come from the Road Fund, which is derived from Motor Taxation. For Main Roads £136,170 is included in respect of Special Grant Works. These Grants are nowadays assigned in greater part to improvements on the two "Arterial Routes" in County Wicklow, these being the road from Bray via Rathnew and Barndarrig to Arklow and the other Route in the Western part of the County which runs through Blessington and Baltinglass. The amount of £136,170 is the same as that which was allowed by way of Grants for Special Works on Main Roads in the present year and of this £78,200 was assigned to the "Arterial Routes" and the balance of £57,970 to other Main Roads in the County.

Grants are made from the Road Fund also for the Improvement of County Roads and the amount included (£30,910) corresponds to the sum which was received in the present year. In the past few years there have been progressive small deductions in the amounts allocated from the Road Fund for County Road Improvements and this can be ascribed to the progress which has been made with the Programme for reconstructing County Roads.

For the Maintenance and Reconstruction of Main Roads the Council last year allowed £92,534. One-half of the cost in this instance is recouped by the State from the Road Fund. For the coming year the County Engineer has indicated that £94,190—an increase of £1,656—will be required. His reason for including a somewhat larger sum is that damage to road surfaces by floods in the present Winter will require special restoration works.

Again in the case of County Roads the amount allowed by the Council last year was £79,033, but for the coming year the County Engineer has recommended that £87,563 be provided. Extensive damage was done to County Roads, especially those in the mountainous parts of the County, in recent months by flooding and because of this it is considered that additional provision of £8,530 should be included for restoring damaged road surfaces. Whereas one-half of the cost of the additional sum included for Main Roads will be met from the Road Fund no recoupment from that source will be obtainable towards the cost of County Roads. The additional sums which would have

to be provided for Road Maintenance and Reconstruction from Rates would be: Main Roads £828 and County Roads £8,530.

Last year the Council agreed to provide £3,000 for Winter Employment Schemes. A similar amount is included in the present estimates and of this £1,500 is being assigned to Main Roads and £1,500 to County Roads. With these moneys it is possible to give employment during the period of the year where it is usually found that workmen may be laid off in other employments because of bad weather and such-like causes.

For Snow Clearance £6,000 was included when presenting the Estimates last year, but it was decided not to make any special provision under this heading. During the present Winter, however, it was necessary to take special measures to clear some roads from snow and, in addition, precautions against dangers from frost had to be taken. In the coming year £4,000 is being provided under this heading for Main Roads and £1,000 for County Roads. As no provision was made last year, consequently, will be seen that the Estimate in this respect is up by £5,000.

There are some variations in the amounts included under the various other headings in the Roads Estimates, but some slight increases in some instances are counter-balanced by reductions in other cases and the only substantial increase is in the provision which is to be made for Superannuation of Workmen and this is up by £895.

During the present year the Council continued the Programme of improvements on the Arterial Road (T.7) from Bray via Rathnew and Barndarrig to Arklow. The new Works were at Timore and on the stretch between Kilpedder and Newtownmountkennedy. It is felt that the completion of these two sections on this Route should lead to an easier traffic flow. At the beginning of the year the section at the Southern end of the Glen O' Downs was also completed.

During the coming year it is intended to proceed with large-scale new road realignment on the stretch between Kilmacanogue and Bray. In this section provision is also being made for a new bridge across the Dargle River near St. Valerie. Much difficulty has been found in acquiring the necessary land in this area, but as a result of protracted negotiations it is now expected that agreement will shortly be reached for obtaining all the land which is required. In this instance sufficient land is being acquired to permit of the construction of a dual-carriageway. It is also proposed to construct a new length of roadway between the Southern end of the Glen O' Downs and Kilpedder for a distance of about one and three-quarter miles. The total cost of completing these two sections of new roadway would be, if constructed on the basis of a dual-carriageway in each instance, up to about £520,000.

Traffic Counts taken at a number of points on Main and County Roads some months ago showed that the density of traffic on Main Routes is rising rapidly. It is evident that the number of vehicles on the roads nowadays is much in excess of that which had been forecast seven or eight years ago when work was first being undertaken on the Arterial Route T.7 in East Wicklow. Whereas it had been expected that the number of motor vehicles might increase two-fold in a period of ten years it has been found that this has happened in a much shorter period. To cope with the rapidly increasing traffic on this Route it is now considered that a roadway of dual-carriageway type would be required between Bray and Rathnew.

During the present year the work of widening the road bridge at Arklow was completed. Having regard to the heavy traffic which this bridge has to carry this improvement has helped to ease conditions on the approach to Arklow, but the County Engineer is of

the opinion that the congestion which occurs in the centre of the town, and which slows up long-distance vehicles and makes shopping and other pursuits difficult and almost hazardous, will only be relieved eventually by the construction of a new By-Pass Road and bridge upstream from the present road bridge. Whilst this should be a costly undertaking it seems that it will in time have to be faced if the needs of through traffic, especially the many heavy lorries which nowadays pass through Arklow, are to be met.

The Programme of Reconstruction Co. Roads continued during the present year and at 31st March, 1965, had reached the stage where 83% of the total mileage of County Roads had been completed. It is expected that by 31st March, 1966, the total mileage of County Roads so reconstructed will reach 84.5%.

HEALTH SERVICES.

As in all recent years the cost of the Health Services again shows a steep rise and in the coming year will require an additional Rate of 2/7d.

The total Outlay on the Health Services, including Mental Hospitals, for the coming year is estimated at £758,122. After deducting Receipts of £410,592 the net Outlay is £347,530. This latter figure compares with an amount of £322,399 provided for the present year. The Rate struck for the Health Services for 1965/'66 was 19/8d.; for the coming year the requirement is 22/3d.—an increase of 2/7d.

Supplementary Health Grant.

Up to the present year one-half of the cost of the Health Services, excluding loan charges and capital items, was met from State Funds. Local Authorities continuously had submitted that the level of Rates was being very much affected by the rapidly rising cost of the Health Services and that in consequence further subventions should be provided by the State. Recently it was indicated by the Department of Health that as from the beginning of the coming financial year Supplementary Grants to meet the costs of the Health Services would be forthcoming. With the aid of these Grants it was intended to stabilise the Rate for Health at that which would represent the expenses of this Service for the present year (1965/'66). This means that the Rate will be stabilised at a higher figure than that which was in fact struck for the present year and which was 19/8d. In assessing costs and arriving at the Rate applicable to the present year regard must be had to any additional expenditure over and above that which had been provided for in the Annual Estimates for the year. Every Health Authority has had to meet additional costs, especially in respect of hospital treatment, in the present year. These costs could not be foreseen when Estimates were being prepared or when the Rate was being determined. In some cases new rates of charge for Extern Hospitals were notified after the beginning of the financial year and, in addition, it was found that the number of admissions to hospitals continued to rise. The effect of the rising costs in the present year is that the expenditure which has to be met for Health will exceed that provided in the Estimates. The ultimate stabilised Rate for the Health Services will be known after the actual costs for the current year have finally been determined.

General Medical Services.

The cost under this heading is estimated at £59,400 and in it provision is made for the Dispensary and Domiciliary Services provided through District Medical Officers for patients who are included in the

General Medical Register and are eligible for all Health Services free of Charge. The Estimate does not vary much from the provision made in the present year.

At present the proportion of the population registered for free services in County Wicklow is 34.8% and it is found that this is higher than the average for the country as a whole.

County Institutions.

The amount required for the Council's own Institutions, these being the District Hospital, Wicklow, District Hospital, Baltinglass, and St. Colman's Hospital, Rathdrum (County Home), is £95,350 and is almost similar to the provision included in the Estimates for the current year.

Extern Institutions.

The provision which has to be made for General Hospitals again shows an upward trend, the requirement being £170,000 as against £157,500 for 1965/'66. Maternity Hospitals at £33,000 show an increase of £1,900 and Homes for Mental Defectives, Deaf and Dumb, etc., show a rise of £4,300. An examination of the records in the present year shows that the main reason for the increase in Extern Hospital costs is the rise in the number of admissions. Generally it is the experience that whereas the stay in hospital may be for a shorter term there is increasing resort to hospital treatment. Having regard to the very varied range of specialist services which the larger hospitals now can offer, and also to the methods of diagnosis obtainable through a stay in hospital, it could be expected that admissions would show a tendency to rise. The following details for General Hospitals will provide evidence as to this trend:—

As already mentioned, the cost of Maternity Hospitals at £33,000 will be up by £1,900 in the coming year. As in the case of the General Hospitals the number of admissions to Maternity Hospitals in Dublin also continues to rise, the figures for the past three years being:—

Mental Hospitals.

For Mental Hospitals the total amount required is estimated at £208,919; the provision made in the present year was £152,100. After the beginning of the present financial year the Council were notified of increased costs for the maintenance of patients in the Dublin Health Authority Mental Hospitals and this is reflected in the amount included for 1966/'67, which is £119,250, being £42,650 more than was provided for the present year. For the Council's own Mental Hospital at Newcastle the sum included is £89,669 and in this provision is being made for the cost of accommodating patients in the two Front Units of the Hospital buildings. It is expected that about

eighty patients can be accommodated in these two Front Units and that in the Main Block, as a result of some alterations, it may be possible to accommodate about a further sixty-four patients. Recently a letter has been received from the Department of Health in which it has been urged again that the Council would agree to proceed as soon as possible with the proposal to use the two Front Units and also saying that the Minister would be prepared to consider a proposal for the erection of a new 60 bed Unit.

Maternity and Child Health Services.

The cost here is intended to cover medical care and hospital treatment for mothers and children and the sum included is £31,500, which is £3,590 greater than the provision (£27,910) made for the present year. The rise in cost is mainly due to the revision in the fees payable to medical practitioners who provide maternity services on a "choice of doctor" basis.

Tuberculosis and Other Infectious Diseases.

The costs under this heading are estimated at £12,050, which is a slight reduction on those for the present year (£12,275).

Dental, Ophthalmic and Aural Services.

Here the Outlay is estimated at £8,330, an increase of £552 over 1965/'66, which is attributable mainly to the additional provision being made for Dental Services. It is proposed in the coming year to appoint a Senior Dental Officer who will be mainly occupied in connection with the Schools Service. It is not expected, however, that he will take up duty until some time well after the beginning of the financial year.

Specialist Services.

There is a rise of £1,750 under this heading and this arises from the increasing number of patients who are resorting to the Specialist Services provided through Out-Patient Clinics in Dublin Hospitals.

Rehabilitation and Maintenance of Disabled Persons.

Each year has shown an upward trend in the cost under this heading, but undoubtedly the payment of Special Allowances to persons who suffer from disabilities has resulted in their being retained in their homes rather than being sent to Institutions. Not only is it better that these persons should remain in the community rather than be sent to Institutions but, in addition, the cost of institutional maintenance would certainly be much greater. For the coming year the cost is estimated at £29,500 as compared with £22,000 last year. A large number of persons at present are receiving these Allowances, but the provision now being made also takes into account the recent upward revision in such Allowances.

Ambulance Services and Transport of Patients.

For a number of years past the Ambulance Services have been rising in cost. At present the Council has three ambulances (attached to the Hospitals at Wicklow, Rathdrum and Baltinglass) in continuous service and one other ambulance is held in reserve. In addition to having a number of permanent drivers for these ambulances reserve drivers, who work at week-ends and during holiday periods, etc., are also available. In Arklow two ambulances are hired by the Council from Contractors and paid for on a mileage basis. The Bray area is served by an ambulance hired from a Contractor in Bray. The

provision being made in the coming year under this heading is £17,500 and this is £4,250 more than the Estimate for the current year. In the coming year it is intended to purchase another ambulance and this is the main cause of the rise in costs, but, in addition, it is intended to provide a radio-telephone system for the ambulances. At present negotiations are taking place in relation to the Ambulance Service for the Bray area and it is not unlikely that the outcome of these may be additional costs for that district.

Contributions to Societies.

At present five Nursing Associations (in Arklow, Bray, Delgany, Enniskerry and Wicklow) are assisted by special subsidies from the Council. In the coming year the cost of these subsidies will come to £3,000, which is somewhat more than £500 over the Outlay in the present year.

PUBLIC ASSISTANCE.

The cost of Public Assistance at £26,625 is £2,475 greater than the amount which was allowed for the present year. The rise in cost here is due to some additional provision which is being made for Home Assistance Allowances, but in the main is attributable to Superannuation.

SANITARY SERVICES.

The gross amount required for Sanitary Services is £57,299, which is an increase of £2,424 over that allowed for 1965/'66. The Receipts are estimated at £11,940. The net requirement will be £45,359 which compares with £43,610 for 1965/'66. The increase in the Estimate is almost altogether due to loan charges, but provision also has to be made for additional payments to Dublin Corporation for water supplied from the Vartry System to Council houses to which connections were made in the past year or so.

Water Supplies and Sewerage.

A number of small extensions to existing water supplies were carried out during the present year, the two main undertakings which were completed being at Rathnew and Knockroe, North of Kilcoole. A number of Group Schemes were also given assistance.

Further progress was made with some of the large-scale Schemes which the Council had approved. A start was made with the new Water Supply for Blessington and a Tender for the Laragh/Annamoe Supply was accepted. At present sanction to the Loan for this latter Scheme is awaited. The former Scheme will cost £42,000 and the Laragh/Annamoe Supply £56,920. The final Plans for the Regional Scheme to serve Shillelagh, Tinahely and Carnew districts were received some time ago and were submitted for approval. When approval is received Tenders for the work can be invited. It is expected, however, that this will be a very costly Scheme involving an Outlay much in excess of any Scheme undertaken by the Council previously. Of late there have been negotiations with Carlow County Council for the extension of one of their Regional Supplies to serve an area in South-West Wicklow. It is contemplated that this extension would serve up to three hundred houses and again the total cost would be considerable, probably reaching about £120,000.

For some time past considerable difficulty has been found in obtaining water supplies for new developments in North-East Wicklow. This area had been served by the Dublin Corporation Vartry System, but of late the Corporation has been informing persons who propose

to carry out new housing development that owing to the demands on their resources they would be unable to afford to give supplies in places outside of Bray Urban District. A few years ago the Council carried out a special Survey with a view to ascertaining the water supply needs of North-East Wicklow over the next fifteen years. It is intended that this Survey should serve in determining how the requirements of future years might be met. A consultant was engaged by the Council to examine possible sources of supply and he also has had discussions with Dublin Corporation. From the information derived it seems that the needs of North-East Wicklow, if it be accepted that Dublin Corporation either would not find it possible to meet an expansion in demand or would not be under an obligation to do so, could be met by taking a water supply from the Dargle or Glencullen Rivers, or, alternatively, by taking a supply from Lough Dan. The latter would be a source which would not only be able to meet all foreseeable future requirements in North-East Wicklow, but could also augment existing supplies in the Metropolitan Area. The views of the Department of Local Government in relation to these alternative sources recently have been sought.

Domestic Scavenging and Dumping Grounds.

Last year a Household Refuse Collection Service was introduced in Greystones district and in the present year a similar Service is being provided for the Delgany area and also for the Boghall/Ballywaltrim district outside Bray. In the coming year it is intended to provide a Scavenging Service for Enniskerry and the necessary amount is included in the attached Estimates.

It should be mentioned that there have been some changes in the classification of Expenditure under the heading of Sanitary Services for the coming year as compared with the classification used in the Estimates for the current year, but this, however, does not affect the comparative costs involved. As already mentioned, the increase in the net cost of the Sanitary Services is £1,749 and this is almost altogether due to the additional provision being made for water supplies under the two headings of Loan Charges and Payments to Dublin Corporation in respect of Water Supplied to Council Cottages.

HOUSING.

The gross cost of Housing is £142,364 and after deducting Receipts of £76,900 the net amount to be met from Rates is £65,464. This would require a Rate of 5/2d. which is 6½d. more than the Levy for this year.

Repairs.

Last year an Estimate of £14,240 was submitted for Repairs to Council Houses, but it was subsequently reduced by £2,000 to £12,240. Nowadays the money provided for Repairs is almost altogether used in repairing cottages for which applications to purchase have been received from the tenants. The sale of cottages to tenants has been proceeding at a fair speed in the past ten or twelve years. This year the amount for Repairs having been found inadequate the Council agreed to vote another £2,000. In view of this experience it has been felt that the minimum provision for next year should be £14,240.

The total number of cottages vested for ownership in tenants up to the present is 2,142 out of a total of 3,324. This progress with cottage purchase can be regarded as quite satisfactory having regard to the fact that for a period of almost twenty years after the coming into operation of enabling legislation practically no vesting whatever was arranged.

New Housing Projects.

Recently a number of new houses were completed at Laragh and Carnew and at present building is going on at Blessington, Kilcoole and Kindlestown (Greystones). Arrangements are being made for the building of more houses at Kilgarron Park, Enniskerry, and at Ballywaltrim, near Bray. In addition negotiations for the acquisition of lands are proceeding with a view to building houses at Newtownmountkennedy, Ashford, Baltinglass, Dunlavin and Tinahely, whilst it has been recommended that a fairly large area of land should be acquired in the vicinity of Bray so as to meet housing needs for an expanding population in this district. It is also considered that this land should be acquired prior to the Council carrying out a Sewerage Scheme which would enable building development at an urban density to take place there.

Housing Grants for Private Dwellings.

The Council is assisting the provision of private housing accommodation in two ways: (a) by giving Grants for the Improvement, Repair, or Reconstruction of Private Houses; and (b) by making Grants to persons who are building houses for their own occupation. There is no income limit applicable in the case of Grants for Improvements, Repairs, or Reconstruction, but such a limit applies where persons seek Grants from the Council for New Houses.

So far 1,298 Grants have been allocated for Repairs and Improvements to Private Houses and the total amount involved is £130,000. Of these 1,168 already have been paid, bringing the Capital Outlay in this respect to almost £120,000. These Grants, it should be mentioned, are in addition to those which are paid by the State. In addition, moreover, Supplementary Grants are being provided by the Council for the installation of Private Water and Sewerage for Dwellings. So far 609 such Grants have been allocated and the cost comes to £25,000. For the erection of new houses 55 Grants have been made and it involves Outlay of over £12,000.

In the Estimates now submitted provision is included for a half-year's loan charge on a new Loan of £45,000 which will be required to meet allowance of Grants at present being made and also for new Grants during the coming year. The yearly Outlay on Grants nowadays runs at about £25,000 and judging by the number of applications which continue to be received it seems as if expenditure at this rate may be expected for some time to come.

The Grants for the Improvement of Private Dwellings undoubtedly have made a very worthwhile contribution towards preserving in good condition the existing stock of houses throughout the County. They also have been used for the purpose of providing facilities such as laid-on water, sewerage and bathrooms which have improved living conditions for many people in towns, villages and rural areas. The loan charges arising on these Grants will reach £13,300 in the coming year, which is almost £1,700 more than the Outlay for 1965/'66. It means that a Rate of 1/- in the £ is required to meet the loan charges on these Grants and this could be regarded as being in the nature of a subsidy from the Rates to private housing. It must also, of course, be borne in mind that private housing is subsidised from State Funds.

Loans for Private Dwellings.

The Council has for years past been making Loans to persons building their own houses. The total amount raised for this purpose so far is £210,000. The loan charges in the coming year are expected

to reach £7,500, but they are offset by a corresponding Receipt. The borrowers re-pay in full the advances made to them by the Council and, consequently, no charge falls on local Rates.

Housing Income.

The Rental Income from Council houses shows a decrease of £2,425. For 1965/66 it was estimated at £41,525, but it is now evident that this amount will not be realised. Having carefully examined the matter it is now concluded that the maximum Rental Income for which credit can be taken in 1966/67 will be £39,100. It has often been mentioned that the Rental Income would be bound to decline as a result of the continued vesting of Council houses, as rents are automatically reduced by one-half when vesting takes place. In the last two years over five hundred houses have been vested and it happens that many of these were houses carrying rents at the higher levels. Seeing that by this time over 64% of Council houses have been vested it could inevitably be expected that the income from rents would decline. Furthermore, it can be expected that this decline in Rental Income will continue as vesting proceeds.

GENERAL PURPOSES.

For General Purposes, which includes a large number of items such as Scholarships, Demand of the Committee of Agriculture, Public Libraries, Fire Brigades, Blind Welfare, Electoral Lists, Elections, Coroners and Inquests, Reformatory Schools, Weights and Measures, Conveyance of Prisoners, Diseases of Animals, and Courthouses, the net charges, after deducting Receipts, are: Chargeable to County—At-Large (including Urban Districts)—£36,542; Chargeable to County Health District—£84,975. The corresponding charges in the current year's Estimates were £31,822 and £71,299.

In determining the Rate last year it was decided to take advantage of the Council's Credit Balance to the extent of £75,656 and this made a very big reduction in the Rate to be levied for General Purposes. If the Rate for the current year had been directly related to the Expenditure which had to be made then it would have been 7/7d. But bringing in a Credit of £75,656 was equivalent to reducing the Rate by 6/- so that the actual Levy was only 1/7d. When arriving at the Rate for the previous year (1964/65) substantial Credits amounting to almost £40,000 were also applied and the Rate for that year was thereby reduced by 3/2d. It will be seen, consequently, that in the past two years Expenditure which might have been met directly from Rates has instead been met to the extent of £115,356 from Credits. At the same time the Council's Credit Balance was also used for the purpose of meeting rather heavy excesses over the provision made in the Estimates, which were due in the main to rises in hospital costs.

The Rate required for General Purposes in the coming year, and which will be one representative of the actual expected Outlay during the period, would be 8/11d. which is 7/4d. more than that in the current year.

Elections.

It has been indicated that Elections to Local Authorities will be held in 1966 and it is necessary to meet the cost of them. Consequently £3,000 is included for this purpose. It should be mentioned, however, that this is an item which only recurs every five years.

Committee of Agriculture.

The Demand of the Committee of Agriculture is up by £3,897. For the coming year it is £16,238 as compared with £12,341 for 1965/66.

Public Libraries.

The Estimate for Public Libraries is higher by £2,216-£9,316 for 1966/67 as compared with £7,100 for 1965/66. This Estimate has been carefully reviewed by the Library Advisory Committee and has been submitted by them for the approval of the Council. The principal items accounting for the rise in costs are Repairs to Greystones Library—£350; Heating—£200; and Remuneration of Branch Librarians—£241. In addition it will be necessary to purchase a new Van in the coming year as the present one has been almost twelve years in commission and is now regarded as being at the end of its useful life.

Planning and Development.

Last year the amount allowed for this purpose was £2,000. In the coming year, however, the costs will reach £7,000, an increase of £5,000. It is obligatory on the Council to complete a Development Plan for the County within three years from 1st October, 1964, and a special Planning Staff is already engaged on this. Originally it was hoped that some measure of recoupment from State Funds towards the costs of Planning might be available, but it is now clear that this will not happen.

Scholarships.

Nowadays special assistance towards the provision of Scholarships is given from State Funds. In the coming year the total Outlay on Scholarships—both Secondary and University—will be £12,210 and of this £6,752, or somewhat more than one-half, will be met by the State.

Diseases of Animals—Sheep Dipping.

Some time ago the Council decided to review the arrangements for sheep dipping. A Special Committee was set up to examine the matter and they recommended that additional remuneration should be allowed to the Sheep Dipping Inspectors and that a number of new Baths be provided. In addition they recommended that an increase in payments to owners of Private Baths on the basis of number of sheep dipped should be made. An increased Outlay will also arise from the fact that double dipping is now prescribed. In all it is expected that the revised arrangements for sheep dipping will cost £3,216 more in the coming year—for 1966/67 the cost would be £5,270 as compared to £2,054 in 1965/66.

Courthouses.

For Repairs and Maintenance of Courthouses £700 extra is included for the coming year.

Overdraft Interest.

To meet interest on overdraft, which has to be resorted to increasingly because of the absorption of Credit Balance, £1,500 was allowed last year. The experience, however, has been that the Outlay on overdraft interest will be much in excess of this sum and has reached £4,700. In the coming year, however, the temporary borrowing commitments of the Council to meet current Expenditure can be expected to be much heavier and, consequently, the provision for overdraft interest has been increased to £6,000.

It should be mentioned that the net Outlay under the heading of General Purposes would have been greater but for an increase in the income from the Bounty in lieu of Rates and Contributions to Superannuation.

SEPARATE CHARGES.**Vocational Education Committee.**

The cost of Vocational Education is defrayed by means of a Separate Charge on the County, exclusive of Bray Urban District—Bray Urban Council operates its own Service. In the coming year the gross cost of Vocational Education will be £40,426 as compared with £35,925 in the present year. The Receipts are estimated at £6,514 (£6,053 in 1965/'66), leaving the net charge on Rates at £33,912. The Rate Levy for this purpose next year will be 2/2d. which is about 1d. lower than that required last year; this is due to the existence of a Credit Balance on this Account.

Malicious Injuries.

It is found that the provision to be made for Malicious Injury Decrees will be much greater at £2,797 compared with £311 in the present year. This will be leviable off the County-At-Large. It is disturbing to find, moreover, that there have been many further Awards in the Courts recently which will have to be met in the following year. The number of Decrees covered by the Levy for 1966/'67 is thirty-one.

Rathdrum and Wicklow Joint Burial Board.

The charge in respect of the Rathdrum and Wicklow Joint Burial Board for maintaining the Cemetery outside Wicklow at Merrymounting is levied on Rathdrum Rural District and Wicklow Urban District. The amount required in the coming year is £335.

Level of Costs for the coming year.

As mentioned at the beginning of this Statement the major item affecting the Rate to be levied for the coming year is the Credit which was applied in 1965/'66. At the time the Rate for 1965/'66 was being determined it was pointed out that the process of applying Credits on a large scale towards the reduction of the Rate could not go on indefinitely and that in consequence it could be expected that the Rate for the following year would show a marked increase. Last year's Rate, if Separate Charges be excluded, was 42s. in the £ and it was the lowest in the entire State, except for County Meath. The average level of Rates last year, taking the country as a whole, was well over 50/- in the £. The Rate of 42/- was only determined after a very large sum had been applied from Credits.

As local Rates are only paid in any volume towards the end of each half of the financial year, that is, say, in August and September and from January to March, it is necessary to have available in reserve moneys which will obviate the necessity for resorting to special Bank accommodation. In a way this sort of provision could be looked on in the nature of what is termed in business "Working Capital." Roughly it could be taken that if heavy charges for overdraft interest were to be avoided an amount approaching one-sixth of the Outlay of a Local Authority should be available so as to enable the Authority to carry on during the months of April to July and November, December and January, without having to borrow temporarily to meet current expenses. In former years it was the practice of the Central Authority to draw the attention of Councils to the inadvisability of borrowing on a large scale to meet current expenses. In consequence Local Authorities endeavoured to acquire modest Credit Balances which would enable them to tide over the period during which the Rate Income would not be expected. The existence of such Credit

Balances meant that not only was overdraft interest avoided, but, in addition, ratepayers were not pressed to pay Rates on the dates set out in statutory prescription, which in fact were on the dates Demand Notes were received and the 1st of October in each year. But there is another aspect of this matter which seems to be overlooked and it is that the keeping of such modest Credit Balances with local Banks meant that the latter were enabled to make Credits available to persons requiring temporary advances for business and other activities. At a time when for various reasons there may be some restriction on Credits generally the position can become more complex if Local Authorities' Credits be absorbed in the endeavour to reduce Rate Levies. In the final analysis the disappearance of Credits will involve Local Authorities in eventually having to make further provision in Rates to meet charges resulting from temporary borrowing.

Whilst the effect of the Supplementary Grants towards Health costs which were announced some time ago will be to stabilise the Rate for Health as from 1966/'67 onwards it is not possible to keep the Rate for this Service to that which was struck for the present year. The reason for this, as already explained, is that the actual Expenditure in the current year, because of rising hospital costs and some other Health items, exceeded the provision made in the Estimates to the extent of about 1/3d., expressed as a Rate, and the consequent Debit Balance, together with a correspondingly increased provision for 1966/'67, results in the increase of 2/7d. over the provision made in the present year.

There has been much criticism of the existing Health Services, but perhaps the public generally may not realise, or may conveniently overlook, the extent to which they are being availed of each year. The figures which have been given, however, in this Statement will serve to show that the admissions to hospitals continue to rise and the Specialist Services available through both Hospitals and Clinics are being increasingly sought. The effect of the Health Services provided through the Council may in some part be measured by the progressive decline in the incidence of infectious disease. Diphtheria, which some years ago could be such a menace to youth, has now practically disappeared, whilst tuberculosis has shown quite a remarkable decline—the number of patients now undergoing institutional treatment for this disease is only eleven. In the past twelve months a Campaign for the elimination of poliomyelitis through vaccination was launched and the response was quite encouraging. Apart from the crippling effects which may follow from contracting this disease the giving of treatment can be very costly. During the year, over 17,000 young persons were provided with first and second course oral vaccine and almost 15,000 came forward for a third course. The number of persons in receipt of Disability Allowances continues to rise and at present it is 282, but the existence of these Allowances undoubtedly helps towards keeping persons in their own homes, which is much preferable to consigning them to Institutions. The inspection of school children and the provision of special treatment for those found to be suffering from defects was carried on during the past year and B.C.G. Immunisation and other measures aiming to maintain the health of the young continued to be carried out.

The unprecedented flooding in November last caused much damage in this County and has involved the Council in costly repairs to roads. Consequently the County Engineer found it necessary to ask for sums representing an additional Rate of 8½d. for this purpose. But, unfortunately, this does not reflect the full cost and the construction of new bridges will cost up to £80,000. The Council, however, has asked the Department of Local Government to meet these

latter costs from State Funds and having regard to the extraordinary character of the Expenditure it is hoped that this application will be successful.

The Rate for Housing, which is up by 6½d., would be 5/2d. if approved and this represents the extent of the subsidy which is being afforded by the Council towards public and private housing. The provision for Housing Repairs was increased because it was felt that having regard to present experience a larger sum should be made available so as to proceed with repairs required preparatory to the vesting of ownership in tenants. The Grants which are being given by the Council towards both the improvement of existing dwellings and the erection of new houses will cost £1,700 more in loan charges next year, but with their aid much useful work is being done and there is no doubt but that most of the people who are being assisted through these Schemes would not have proceeded with essential repairs and improvements, or have built their own homes, if help from the Local Authority had not been forthcoming.

Living conditions for many people have been improved through the laying on of water for their homes and in some cases by the provision of sewerage. It is hoped to make further progress with the provision of these amenities in the next few years, but, inevitably, the costs will be reflected in the level of Rates, especially when loan charges on the larger Regional Schemes come to be met. Demands for other special amenity services such as Scavenging also are being acceded to by the Council and in a number of towns and villages Household Refuse Collection already has been arranged or will shortly be introduced.

The increased Outlay on a Service such as Sheep Dipping is intended to help the farming community and it will be noted that additional funds are being provided next year for the Committee of Agriculture. As frequently mentioned when submitting the Estimates the voting of additional moneys in successive years for the Agricultural Grant has helped very much to cushion the impact of Rates on agricultural holdings.

Through Vocational Education new Schools and better opportunities are being provided for young people and in time the effects of the building of new Vocational Schools at a number of Centres in the County will be readily seen; the result should be to serve to equip the community the better to deal with the technological needs of the present era.

The data required for the Estimates has been carefully compiled by the Council's staff and mention must be made of their application, especially the County Secretary, in the administration of Services which nowadays require attention and application of unusual quality. The Estimates Meeting of the Council will be held on Monday, 28th February, 1966, and any further information required in connection with them will then be supplied.

Once again in presenting the Estimates opportunity is taken of conveying to the Chairman and Members of the Council sincere appreciation and thanks for their assistance in administering the Council's Services during the year.

Passed unanimously.

Funds for Housing in Coming Year.

The County Manager stated that it appeared from preliminary information supplied to the Council by the Department by telephone that the amounts of Capital which would be made available to the Council by way of Loans in the coming year would be limited. From the preliminary information given it seemed that the Council might not be in a position to proceed with all the Housing Schemes which had been planned or proposed for the coming year and that sufficient funds might not be available to enable the Council to meet all applications for Supplementary Grants for Repair and Improvement of Houses, in respect of New Houses, and Provision of Private Water Supply and Sewerage Facilities, nor to meet applications for Loans for the Purchase of Houses. It had been indicated to the Council that the maximum amount which was likely to be made available in the coming year for the purpose of making Loans to persons wishing to build their own houses would be only £30,000. The Council had received sanction to a Loan of £20,000 within the previous few weeks, but it was not clear whether the £30,000 indicated as being available in the coming year would be in addition to the £20,000 recently notified. In consequence it seemed that sufficient funds would not be available to the Council to meet in full all applications for Loans for the purpose of the purchase or erection of new houses. The amount which the Council had been expending on Supplementary Grants for Repair and Improvement of Houses had been increasing each year and in the current year £12,931 had been paid and applications on hands amounted to £17,000. A Loan of £30,000 had been sought to meet these applications, but so far sanction had not been received. In consequence the Council agreed that any approvals to payments of Supplementary Grants would have to be made subject to the condition that the necessary moneys were available to the Council to defray the cost of such Grants or Loans.

Item No. 2—Housing Scheme at Kilgarron, Enniskerry—Recommendation of Members of Council for Bray Electoral Area on Leasing of Sites.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Temple;

Seconded by Councillor Mrs. M. Ledwidge;

Resolved—That we approve of the Layout and House Plans for the development of the remaining part of the Council's Housing Site at

Kilgarron, Enniskerry, and note that the documents will be submitted for the approval of the Department of Local Government. We approve also of the leasing of sites on the Scheme to suitable applicants wishing to erect houses for themselves with the aid of Loans and Grants (where appropriate) from the Council and of these applicants availing of the Council's House Plans, and of a charge of £10 per annum being made by way of Ground Rent in respect of the proportion of the cost of the site and development.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 3—Housing Survey.

Particulars of the Housing Survey carried out during May and June, 1965, with the recommendations as to the likely housing needs for the various areas in the County over the next five years, had been circulated to the Members. Councillor J. Everett, T.D., expressed disagreement with the Report and pointed out that at least ten applications had been received from persons in Rathnew living in overcrowded houses and that the figure of eight houses for Rathnew was inadequate. He considered also that the estimate in respect of Newtownmount-kennedy was also too low. Councillor Miss Walsh pointed out that no separate provision for additional houses in Avoca was included and Councillor Temple pointed out that there were seventy-three applicants for nine houses at Grattan Park, Greystones, and that there appeared to be a much greater demand for houses in that area. The Council decided to refer the matter of the Housing Survey for examination by the Members of the Council for each Electoral Area at separate Meetings. Meetings were arranged to be held at Blessington on Thursday, 10th March, at 7.00 p.m.; at Wicklow on Tuesday, 15th March, at 3.00 p.m.; and at Bray on Tuesday, 15th March, at 7.30 p.m. It was agreed to defer fixing a date for the Meeting for the Arklow Electoral Area until Councillor J. J. McCrea, Chairman, could be available. The Council agreed that the County Medical Officer attend at each Meeting.

The following Report of the Housing Survey had been circulated to the Members:—

**HOUSING SURVEY
ASSESSMENT OF NEEDS**

As a result of an examination of housing needs carried out in May and June, 1965, the following details were compiled:

Unfit Dwellings.

It is estimated there are 48 unfit dwellings in the County Health District, of which 18 are capable of repair and improvement, leaving 30 to be dealt with as completely obsolescent. Of the latter 20 are occupied by farmers.

During the five year period, 1960 to 1964, 64 unfit houses were dealt with under the Housing (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act, 1931. 41 houses were ordered to be demolished and Repair Notices were served in 23 cases.

On the basis of these figures it would appear the Council will require to build 8 houses each year on the grounds of obsolescence or 40 houses over the next five years.

An estimate of the number of houses which will become unfit due to obsolescence in the period to 1970 is subjoined.

Population Growth.

The census of population taken in 1961 can hardly be relied upon to give population trends which could be applied to the present year, but it might be noted that whilst almost all areas showed a reduced population as compared with 1957, the following areas showed increases:

Analysis of Applications for Vacant Houses.

The following information has been derived from lettings of existing houses in recent years and the applications for them when advertised:

(a) The number of houses which became available for letting in 1960 was 76 and the average number of applicants per house was 2.9; whilst for the first six months of 1965 only 10 houses became available for letting and the average number of applicants had increased to 7.8 per house.

(b) A house let at Grattan Park, Greystones, in January 1960 produced 13 applicants, and three of these, or 23 per cent., were married persons under 30 years. A house recently advertised for letting at Kindlestown, Greystones, produced 38 applications and 23 of these, or 60 per cent., were from married persons under 30 years. The inference to be drawn, apart from the increase in the number of applications, would appear to be that the marriage age, in this area at least, is considerably lower.

In reference to the proposal of Councillor Mrs. Ledwidge that the Council accept the Contractor's offer the County Secretary suggested that it would be wiser to await the decision of the Department of Local Government as to what moneys would be available for Housing in the coming year. The Council agreed to defer a decision on the matter to the next Housing Meeting.

Item No. 2—Housing Scheme at Laragh—Proposed Erection of two Additional Houses.

The Council agreed to defer consideration of this proposal to the next Meeting pending information from the Department of Local Government in regard to the moneys which would be available for Housing in the coming year. Councillor R. Miley complained that the tenants of the new houses were unable to get a car or truck into their houses and that a back entrance would be necessary. It was agreed that the matter of providing a rear entrance would be examined.

Item No. 3—Acquisition of Plots at Oldcourt, Bray, for Housing.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Temple;

Seconded by Councillor H. B. Hipwell;

Resolved—That we approve of offers of £100 per site being made to tenants at Oldcourt, Bray, in respect of acquisition by the Council of portion of their plots for housing purposes.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 4—Housing Sites at Ashford.

The County Secretary stated that the Council's Architect had suggested that two sites at Ashford (owned by Mr. Cannon and Mr. Fitzpatrick) might be acquired, as each site would cater for five houses. The owners of the sites, however, were not prepared to sell and the Council would have to acquire the land compulsorily. The County Secretary stated that the County Medical Officer had reported that there was only one qualified applicant for housing at Ashford and suggested that it would be advisable to provide houses at Rathnew, where all services were available. The Council referred the matter for further consideration by the Members of the Council for the Wicklow Electoral Area.

Item No. 5—Provision of Rural Cottages.

It was

Proposed by Councillor G. Timmins;

Seconded by Councillor M. J. O'Neill:

Resolved—That subject to the sanction of the Minister we approve of Tenders being invited for the erection of houses on agreed sites at (a) Ardinary, Brittas Bay; (b) Moylisha, Clonegal; (c) Ballard, Kilbride; (d) Coolmoney, Donard (2); and (e) Lemonstown, Dunlavin.

We hereby authorise the borrowing of a sum of £21,900 from the Commissioners of Public Works, re-payable over a period of fifty years, to defray the cost of the erection of these six houses, together with the cost of erection of houses at (f) Eadestown, Stratford; (g) Johnstown, Arklow; and (h) Bawnogue, Baltinglass (2).
Passed unanimously.

Item No. 6—Sites for Private Houses at Blessington.

The County Secretary submitted a revised Site Plan prepared by Council's Architect for two private houses to be erected on sites 'C' and 'D' at Blessington. Councillor J. Miley suggested that the two sites for private houses should be located at the entrance to the Scheme instead of in the position suggested by the Architect and he suggested also that a site could be made available for two additional Council houses. It was agreed that the Architect would visit Blessington to examine the Scheme and to consider the proposals put forward by Councillor Miley.

Item No. 7—Vacant Allotment at Tomnaskela, Aughrim.

It was

Proposed by Councillor Miss M. Walsh;

Seconded by Councillor J. Quigley:

Resolved—That we approve of the letting of allotment at Tomnaskela, Aughrim, to Richard T. Woods, "Tallyho House," Aughrim, he being the only applicant for this tenancy.
Passed unanimously.

Item No. 8—Notice of motion in name of Councillor J. Quigley requesting "Report on possibility of providing a right-of-way to Cottage at Preban, Aughrim, occupied by Thomas Hayden."

The County Secretary stated that the Assistant County Engineer had reported that this cottage (which was built for the Hayden family in the old farmyard) had access from a lane which had been in existence for many years. The lane had fallen into disrepair, but it was not the responsibility of the Council to maintain it. The cost

of constructing a new right-of-way from the cottage to the roadway for a distance of approximately 150 yards would be considerable. An estimate of the cost had been submitted some years previously, but the work was not approved.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Quigley;

Seconded by Councillor Miss M. Walsh:

Resolved—That the Council repair the existing right-of-way.
Passed unanimously.

Item No. 9—Vacant Cottage at Moneyteigus, Aughrim — Report of Assistant County Engineer on Repairs Required.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Quigley;

Seconded by Councillor Miss M. Walsh:

Resolved—That having considered Report of Assistant County Engineer we approve of the necessary repairs to cottage at Moneyteigue, Aughrim, and of the repairs required to the approach lane to the cottage.
Passed unanimously.

Item No. 10—Supplementary Grants for provision of Private Water Supply and Sewerage Facilities—To authorise borrowing of £15,000.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Temple;

Seconded by Councillor H. B. Hipwell:

Resolved—That we hereby approve of the borrowing of a sum of £15,000 from the Commissioners of Public Works, re-payable over a period of twenty-five years, to defray the cost of Supplementary Grants for the Provision of Private Water Supply and Sewerage Facilities, and approve of the continued operation of the Council's Scheme for a further year to 31st March, 1967, subject to the necessary moneys being available to the Council for the purpose of meeting the cost of the Supplementary Grants.
Passed unanimously.

The County Secretary stated that it would be necessary for the Council to consider whether they would continue to operate the Scheme for payment of Supplementary Grants for the Repair and Improvement of Houses and for the Erection of New Houses for a future year. He suggested that if the Council decided to continue the Scheme it would be necessary to do so subject to the condition that the necessary moneys were made available to the Council to meet the cost of the payment of the Grants.

It was

Proposed by Councillor E. Byrne;

Seconded by Councillor G. Timmins:

Resolved—That we approve of the continued operation of the Council's Scheme for the payment of Supplementary Grants for the Repair and Improvement of Houses and for the Erection of New Houses for a further year to 31st March, 1967, subject to the necessary moneys being available to the Council to meet the cost of the payment of such Grants.
Passed unanimously.

Item No. 11—Labourers' Act, 1965—Letter from Department of Local Government re Provisions of Act in relation to Sale of Labourers' Cottages.

LABOURERS ACT, 1965.
SALE OF LABOURERS COTTAGES.

A Chara,

1. I am directed by the Minister for Local Government to enclose a copy of the Labourers Act, 1965, which became law on the 3rd November. This circular letter does not purport to contain a comprehensive review of the provisions of the Act, which should be studied in detail by the appropriate officers of the housing authority.

2. Section 17 of the Labourers Act, 1936, provides that a vested cottage (which, in this context, includes a plot) shall not, during the period for the payment of the annuity, be alienated otherwise than by devise or by operation of law or by sale with the consent of the housing authority. The section also provides that a cottage shall not be subdivided or used otherwise than for the accommodation of an agricultural labourer and his family.

3. Section 21 of the 1936 Act provides that a vested cottage may not, during the period for the payment of the annuity, be mortgaged or charged.

4. These provisions were designed to ensure that cottages provided from public funds would continue to be used for the accommodation of agricultural labourers and their families notwithstanding the sale by housing authorities of the cottages to their occupants. With the passage of time the provisions have been found to be unduly restrictive. Section 2(1) of the Labourers' Act, 1965, provides for some relaxation by enabling a housing authority to consent to the mortgaging, charging, alienation or subdivision of a cottage. The relaxation is not intended in any sense as a general departure from the policy that cottages should be used as far as possible for the accommodation of persons in need of housing.

Mortgaging or Charging.

5. In accordance with this general objective, a housing authority should normally consent, under section 2(1) of the Act of 1965, to the mortgaging or charging of a cottage or plot only where the mortgage or charge is intended to secure a loan for the reconstruction or improvement of the cottage or for some other housing purpose.

Refusal by Housing Authority of Consent to Sale of Cottage.

6. Similarly, section 2(2) will strengthen the powers of the housing authority to refuse consent to the sale of a cottage by a vested owner if they consider that the sale would not be in the best interests of housing policy. Before the enactment of the provision there was doubt as to whether an authority could refuse consent to a sale solely on the grounds that the proposed purchaser was not an agricultural labourer. It was also doubtful if they could refuse consent even if the proposed sale would leave the vendor or his family without accommodation—thus, perhaps, again throwing the responsibility for housing them on the authority. Section 2(2) gets over these difficulties by providing specifically that a housing authority may refuse consent to the alienation of the cottage if they are of opinion that—

- (i) the person to whom it is intended to alienate the cottage is not a person in need of housing, or
- (ii) the alienation would leave the vendor or his dependents without suitable housing.

Consent by Housing Authority to Sale or Subdivision of Cottage or Plot.

7. These two criteria should, therefore, be applied by a housing authority when a request for their consent to the sale of a cottage is received. If the proposed purchaser is a person in need of housing but not an agricultural labourer as statutorily defined, the Minister would be prepared to consent to the suspension by the authority of the conditions of section 17 of the Labourers Act, 1936, which require that the cottage shall not be used except for the accommodation of an agricultural labourer and his family. Similarly, if the purchaser is a farmer buying the cottage for the accommodation of a workman, the Minister would not object to consent being given by the authority where no other eligible purchaser is forthcoming who would be willing to use the cottage for his own accommodation. In all cases where the consent of the authority is sought to the sale of a cottage to a person who is not in need of housing, the authority should consider if purchase by them to meet an ascertained housing need would be justified.

8. Where the sale or transfer of a cottage is proposed and the housing authority are agreeable, section 2(3) of the Act of 1965 enables them, before consenting, to require the annuity to be redeemed. Alternatively, they may, under section 2(5), consent without requiring redemption of the annuity. If the plot or part of the plot held with a cottage is being charged, mortgaged or subdivided, the authority are required, under section 2(4), to apportion the annuity and, where a sale or transfer is involved, to require to be redeemed the part of it which relates to the land being divided from the cottage.

(1) Cessation of Statutory Restrictions.

9. When an annuity or apportioned part of an annuity is redeemed in full, all the restrictions on the sale of the property to which the annuity or part relates, the uses to which it may be put, and on mortgaging, subdivisions, etc., will, under section 4 cease and the property could, for instance, be used without reference to the housing authority for business purposes or re-sold by the purchaser at a profit. The Act also permits of the redemption of part of an annuity on a cottage. Where this happens, the restrictions will cease to apply to such extent as the authority may, by order, determine.

10. An amount for the redemption of the annuity based on a purely mathematical calculation of the present value of the annuity, which is generally small, would yield a figure disproportionately low in relation to the benefits to the purchaser of having the property freed from the existing restrictions. Accordingly, the amount which the Minister will be prepared to approve under section 3, for the redemption of an annuity, will be assessed on the basis of the current market value of the cottage (or, if appropriate of the plot or part of the plot) at the date redemption is proposed, due allowance being made for the number of years for which the annuity has been paid on the cottage. For example if a cottage has a market value free from annuity and other statutory conditions of £800 and the annuity has been paid for 15 years out of a total payment period of forty years, the purchaser should get credit for 15/40ths of the market value, i.e., £300, so that the amount which he should normally be required to pay for redemption would be £500. Where, following subdivision, a

bona-fide sale or transfer of a plot as a housing site for a member of the family or of the household of the vested owner is proposed, the authority may accept in redemption only the present value of the part of the annuity apportioned by them in respect of the plot.

(2) Retention of Statutory Restrictions.

11. Where a housing authority wish to ensure that the statutory restrictions will continue to apply to a cottage which the vested owner proposed to sell, and, at the same time consider that they should get some benefit from a transaction which their capital and work made possible, they should require payment to them of an amount under section 2(5). The amount which the Minister would be prepared to approve for the purposes of this subsection will normally be not less than one-third of the current market value of the interest being sold, subject to the proviso that, in general, the amount paid to the authority should not exceed the price that would have to be paid under subsection 2(3) for the redemption of the annuity (and consequent freeing of the cottage from the statutory conditions). Where, however, a bona-fide transfer or assignment to a member of the family or of the household of the vested owner is proposed, the authority should not require any payment to them as a condition of their consent.

Redemption of Annuity.

12. Section 3 provides that an annuity or any part of an annuity may, if the housing authority think fit, be redeemed by the person liable to pay it. Thus, the purchaser of a cottage could, independently of any question of sale or transfer, redeem his annuity if the authority agreed. The amount for redemption of which the Minister would normally be prepared to approve in these circumstances is as set out in paragraph 10.

13. Individual cases under paragraphs 10, 11 and 12 should, until further notice, be submitted for the approval of the Minister.

14. Moneys received by a council in respect of the redemption of an annuity or under subsection 2(5) of the Act should be used for a housing capital purpose such as the provision of additional housing, the payment of supplementary grants, the redemption of loans, etc. Subsidy will cease in respect of any cottage on which the annuity is redeemed.

15. The Land Registry should be notified of all cases in which annuities are redeemed or apportioned so that they may make any necessary amendments in their records. The details should be given in the form of a simple certificate containing any information necessary for identification of the cottage concerned and for rectification of the register.

16. This circular replaces circular no. H.7/59 of 28th May, 1959, dealing with the sale of vested cottages.

Mise, le meas,

To all County Councils.

The County Secretary submitted a number of applications for consent to the sale of vested cottages, together with proposals as to the terms on which the Council might consent to sales in certain of the cases. Councillor J. Everett, T.D., expressed disagreement with the County Secretary's views as to the manner in which the Circular Letter from the Department of Local Government should be interpreted and proposed that the Council should obtain the opinion of the Council's Law Agent. On the suggestion of Councillor J. Temple it was agreed that the Law Agent attend at the next Meeting of the

Council to advise the Members on queries raised by Members in the course of the Meeting. The Council also decided to adjourn consideration of the applications for consent to sub-division of vested cottage plots to the next Meeting for the attendance of the Council's Solicitor.

Item No. 14—Application for Loan for Erection of New House at Blacklion, Greystones.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Temple;

Seconded by Councillor Mrs. M. Ledwidge;

Resolved—That subject to the necessary moneys being available to the Council we approve of the making of a loan of £300 to Mr. Joseph Hoey, 53, Lower Windgates, Greystones, in respect of the erection of a house at Blacklion, Greystones, subject to compliance with the provisions of the Council's Scheme.

Passed unanimously.

On the proposal of Councillor J. Miley, seconded by Councillor M. J. O'Neill, the Council approved of the making of a Loan of £1,500 to Mr. Jeremiah Kelly, Cryhelp, Dunlavin, subject to confirmation of income and compliance with the terms of the Council's Scheme, and to the necessary moneys being available.

Item No. 15—Water Supply for Houses at Ennis Lane and Redford—Letter from Dublin Corporation re Water Supply.

The County Secretary stated that the Council had been informed by the Corporation of Dublin (Waterworks Section), that as the supply from Roundwood to the City was already fully committed the application for additional supplies in County Wicklow could not be granted. Councillor Temple expressed regret that the Corporation had again refused the Council a supply of water, but pointed out that the County Engineer was meeting the City Engineer during the week in connection with the matter of water supplies and suggested that the Council might await the result of this meeting. The Council agreed to await the result of further discussions with the Corporation.

Item No. 16—Repairs to Cottages carried out during the Month of February, 1966, and Cottages to be repaired during the Month of March, 1966.

The Council noted the list of cottages repaired during the month of February and of those to be repaired during the month of March, 1966.

Item No. 17—Minutes.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Quigley;

Seconded by Councillor A. H. Hadden;

Resolved—That we hereby confirm and sign Minutes of Meeting held on 3rd January, 1966.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 18—Overdraft on General Account for Quarter to 30th June, 1966.

It was

Proposed by Councillor Mrs. M. Ledwidge;

Seconded by Councillor H. B. Hipwell;

Resolved—That we hereby authorise our County Secretary to make application to the Minister for Local Government and to the Council's Treasurer, the National Bank, Ltd., for such financial accommodation by way of temporary overdraft on the Council's General Account as may be required and we hereby determine that the maximum amount for the quarter to 30th June, 1966, shall not exceed £250,000.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 19—Applications for Closing of Roads at (1) Moneymeen/Aughavannagh/Derrybawn, and Laragh/Sallygap on 11th April 1966; and (2) Enniskerry on 30th April, 1966,

In regard to the proposed closing of roads from Moneymeen via Aughavannagh to Derrybawn and from Laragh to Sallygap the County Secretary stated that this application was made by the R.I.A.C. in respect of the Gallagher Circuit of Ireland International Rally. It was requested that the road from Moneymeen to Aughavannagh and to Derrybawn be closed from 5.00 p.m. to 9.00 p.m. on Easter Monday, the 11th April, and the road from Laragh to Sallygap from 5.30 p.m. to 9.30 p.m. on that date. A letter had been received from Supt. Brett, Garda Síochána, Wicklow, who drew attention to the number of houses situated on the road between Laragh and Glenmacnass, the occupants of which would not be able to enter or leave their houses while the road was closed as there was no alternative route. Following a discussion on the matter it was proposed by Councillor R. Miley, seconded by Councillor M. J. O'Neill:

Resolved—That we hereby close to public traffic the roads described hereunder on Monday, 11th April, 1966, for the periods specified after each of the roads and authorise the holding of a Motor Car Rally on these roads while so closed to public traffic:—

County Road No. 129 from Moneymeen to Aughavannagh, continuing by the Military Road (County Roads Nos. 128 and 83) via Drumgoff Bridge to Derrybawn: From 5.00 p.m. to 9.00 p.m.

Military Road (County Roads Nos. 57 and 58), from Car Park at Glenmacnass to the Crossroads at Sallygap: From 5.30 p.m. to 9.30 p.m. Passed unanimously.

The second application was made by the Irish Motor Racing Club, Ltd., for the closing of roads at Enniskerry on Saturday, the 30th April, 1966, from 1.30 p.m. to 6.00 p.m. for the purposes of the Annual Hill Climb. Councillor Mrs. Ledwidge stated that a wall had been damaged in the course of this Hill Climb two years previously and suggested that permission should not be given unless it was confirmed that this wall had been repaired. The Council deferred a decision on the matter for confirmation that the damaged wall had been repaired.

Item No. 20—Notice of Motion in name of Councillor Miss M. Walsh re Taking Over of Roads as follows: (1) About 300 yards of Barrack Road—Kilcassel—as far as County Council Cottages and put in proper repair; and (2) "Berney Road"—from Tyner's of Minmore to the Head of the Berney—for repair and surfacing."

The County Secretary stated that the second road referred to was a County Road and was maintained by the Council, but it was little used except by the Tyner family and by forestry workers. The road was a gravel road and was kept in a reasonable state of repair. The Council agreed to refer the proposals for consideration by the Members of the Council for the Arklow Electoral Area when considering the Roads Estimates for the coming year.

The Council adjourned the remaining items on the Agenda to the next Meeting to be held on the 21st March, 1966.

A Meeting of Wicklow County Council to deal with the remaining items on the Agenda was held on the 21st March, 1966, at 2.30 p.m.

In the absence of the Chairman, due to illness, Councillor H. J. Byrne presided. The County Secretary, County Engineer, Chief Assistant County Engineers R. L. Farrell and P. McGuinness, and Assistant County Engineers J. P. Caffrey, N. D. Farrell and P. T. Hickey attended.

Item No. 21—Application from Bray Urban District Council for Recoupment of Cost of Acquisition of Premises at Bray for Road Improvement.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Temple;

Seconded by Councillor E. Byrne:

Resolved—That we hereby approve of the recoupment to Bray Urban District Council of the total sum of £3,270 4s. 6d. being the cost of purchase of premises at 37, Castle Street, Bray, required for Road Improvement, and authorise the necessary expenditure in excess of the amount provided in the current year's Estimates to meet the cost of the purchase of the premises.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 22—Scholarships Scheme for 1966—Applications Received.

The County Secretary reported on the applications received to compete under the Council's Scholarships Scheme for 1966 and stated that all candidates who applied to compete under Clause 1 (b) of the Scheme, i.e., as being within the income limits, had been accepted, with the exception of six. Details of these candidates were submitted to the Council and the Council noted that in two cases the candidates could not be accepted as being within the income limits, but that in the remaining four where satisfactory proof of income had not been submitted that the applicants be notified that they were not accepted as eligible to compete under Clause 1 (b), but that if they submitted satisfactory proof of eligibility within a specified time the decision could be reconsidered.

Item No. 23—Letter from Bolands, Ltd., Re Jubilee Scholarships Scheme.

The Council noted the letter from Bolands, Ltd., indicating that the Company was instituting a number of Jubilee Scholarships to be awarded to female students who proposed to avail of Secondary Education after completion of the necessary period of attendance at a Primary School. It was noted that the Scheme was intended to commemorate the part played by the women of Ireland in the 1916 Rising. The County Secretary stated that the value of each Scholarship would be £50 per annum and that the Scholarships were renewable for up to four years. Ten Scholarships in all were being awarded but not more than one Scholarship would be awarded in any individual County. The Council complimented the Company on the Scheme.

Item No. 24—Application from Little Bray Residents' Association for Reception of Deputation.

The Council considered letter of 2nd March, 1966, from Little Bray Residents' Association requesting that a Deputation be received by the County Council with reference to flood prevention in Bray and the Greater Dargle Area. Members of the Council for the Bray Electoral Area pointed out that Bray Urban District Council had already agreed to receive a Deputation from the Association and suggested that since five of the six Members for the Bray Electoral Area were also Members of the Urban District Council that the matters being raised by the Association could be dealt with at the Urban District Council Meeting. The Council agreed that the Secretary of the Association be informed that the matters referred to in their letter could be considered when their Deputation was received by the Bray Urban District Council.

Item No. 25—Newcastle Mental Hospital—Letter from Department of Health Re Opening of Hospital and Accommodation to be provided.

A letter of 11th February, 1966, from the Department of Health in regard to Newcastle Mental Hospital had been circulated to the Members of the Council.

Item No. 26—Report of Councillors Miss M. Walsh and Mrs. M. Ledwidge on Visit to Peamount Sanatorium.

Councillor Miss Walsh stated that she had asked at the previous Meeting that the Report of herself and Mrs. Ledwidge be circulated to the Members of the Council. The Council agreed to defer the matter to the next Meeting and in the meantime have the Report circulated.

Item No. 27—Additional Public Light at Lourdes Crescent, Aughrim —Estimate from E.S.B.

The County Secretary stated that the estimated cost of providing an additional light at Lourdes Crescent, Aughrim, was £9. The County

Engineer had suggested, however, that the provision of the light might be deferred until the six new houses had been completed and the Council agreed to this suggestion.

Item No. 28—Notice of Motion in Name of Councillor Mrs. M. Ledwidge: "That a Light be provided between the Village of Enniskerry and Monastery; also an extra Light be provided at Kilgarron Park and the existing one be re-sited."

The County Secretary stated that the County Engineer had recommended that one public light be provided at Enniskerry half-way between Troy's Corner and the Church.

Resolved—That we approve of the provision of one public light at Enniskerry half-way between Troy's Corner and the Church and direct that the E.S.B. be asked to submit a quotation for the provision of this light.
Passed unanimously.

Councillor Mrs. Ledwidge stated that two lights were needed at Kilgarron Park and a further five lights should be provided between Enniskerry and Monastery. It was agreed that a Report be obtained from the County Engineer on this proposal.

Item No. 29—Protection of Greystones Harbour—Letter from Greystones and District Civic Association.

The County Secretary submitted a letter received from the Chairman of the Greystones and District Civic Association asking if the Council would agree to a proposal that the original Kish Lighthouse Base be towed to Greystones and sited at the Harbour in a revised position (as shown on the Plan submitted) on the basis of the full cost involved being met by the Association and other interested residents of the area. The Association also undertook to remove the Base should the Council, following the placing of the Base at the Harbour, be of opinion that it should be removed. At the suggestion of Councillor J. Temple it was agreed that the matter be referred to the Members of the Council for the Bray Electoral Area and that they would meet representatives of the Greystones and District Civic Association in connection with the proposal.

Item No. 30—Presidential Election—Letter from Eoin O Mathghamhna.

The County Secretary referred to the attendance of Mr. Eoin O Mathghamhna at the previous Meeting and his Address to the Council in regard to the matter of the Council's nominating a candidate for the Presidency of Ireland.

The revised Fee would operate for Audit of Accounts for the financial year ending 31st March, 1966, and subsequent years, until further notice. The Council noted the terms of the Department's Letter.

Item No. 34—Inquiries Arising from County Manager's Orders.

The Council noted the particulars of County Manager's Orders which had been circulated to the Members.

Factory Site at "The Murrough," Wicklow.

The County Secretary stated that it was considered in the interests of the Council that negotiations might be entered into with Messrs. Gouldings, Ltd., for the acquisition by the County Council of sites on their lands at "The Murrough," Wicklow, which could be made available for industry. The Council agreed that the County Manager enter into negotiations with a view to the acquisition of these sites.

Item No. 35—Applications for Consent to Sale of Vested Cottages and Subdivision of Vested Cottage Plots.

The Council's Solicitor (Mr. J. H. McCarroll) attended at the Meeting and answered queries from Members in regard to the interpretation of the Labourers' Act, 1965, and the Circular Letter from the Department of Local Government in regard to it. Having heard the Council's Solicitor the Council recommended that where the Council agreed to consent to sales of cottages the Annuity should not be redeemed and the Statutory Conditions should continue to apply. The Council noted that in such circumstances the Council was entitled to require a payment which should be not less than one-third of the market value of the cottage. The Council agreed also that where the selling price appeared to be less than the market value the Council should obtain a Valuation and determine the amount to be paid to the Council on the basis of such Valuation. In regard to the sub-division of Vested Cottage Plots the Council recommended that where plots were being sub-divided for the purpose of enabling a member of the family to provide his own house, and such person would have been eligible for re-housing by the Council, that only a nominal payment be sought by the Council. The Council considered individually the applications for consent to sales of cottages and the sub-division of Vested Cottage Plots and made recommendations in each instance.

A Meeting of Wicklow County Council for the purpose of dealing with Housing matters was held at the Council Chamber, Kilmantin Hill, Wicklow, on Monday, 4th April, 1966, at 2.30 p.m.

In the absence of Councillor J. J. McCrea (Chairman) and Councillor H. J. Byrne (Vice-Chairman) Councillor E. Byrne took the chair on the proposal of Councillor J. Everett, T.D., seconded by Councillor A. H. Hadden.

The County Manager, County Secretary, County Engineer, Chief Assistant County Engineer R. L. Farrell, and Assistant County Engineers J. P. Caffrey, N. D. Farrell and Sean F. Coffey attended.

Deputation from Brittas Bay.

Councillor J. Everett, T.D., asked the Council if they would agree to receive a Deputation from persons concerned with the maintenance of a public right-of-way at Brittas Bay and stated that the matter was of importance. Following a discussion in regard to the procedure normally followed by the Council in connection with the reception of Deputations, which required that the consent of the Council at a previous Meeting be obtained the Council agreed in the circumstances to receive the Deputation. The Deputation consisted of Messrs. Dermot

O'Connell, N.T., Redcross, Liam O'Brien and Michael Kinsella. Mr. O'Connell stated that the Deputation wished to bring to the notice of the Council their concern with the preservation of a public right-of-way to the sea at Brittas Bay and stated that a year ago Mr. Maguire, who is the owner of part of the sand-dune area at Brittas Bay, fenced off an old established right-of-way across the sand-dunes to the sea. Having consulted Mr. J. H. McCarroll, Solicitor, they had been advised that they would be within their rights in removing the fence, but that it would be preferable to take up the matter in correspondence with Mr. Maguire. Following an exchange of letters a gap of 3½ ft. was made in the fence. Some time afterwards, however, a stake was placed in the centre of the 3½ ft. gap to form a stile, presumably to prevent motor cyclists from passing through, but it also prevented anyone wheeling a pram from passing. The landowner also placed a collector at the stile and charged 6d. to persons passing through, though he had informed the Solicitor that no charge would be made to people from the Brittas Bay area. The objectors to the closing of the right-of-way removed the centre stake at the stile on two or three occasions during last year and eventually took it away altogether to prevent it being replaced. About two weeks ago a pole was placed in the centre of the gap and he and a number of other persons removed the pole and also about 8 or 10 ft. of wire. This occurred on a Monday night and the fence was restored by the landowner on the following day. On a Thursday night when they went to remove it again they found that a force of Gardai were awaiting them and threatened them with criminal proceedings for malicious damage to property. They insisted, however, on removing the fencing, as had been done on the previous Monday night, having confirmed with Mr. McCarroll, Solicitor, that they were entitled to do so. The fencing, however, was replaced by the landowner on the Friday and on the Friday night they removed the fence again. The fence had not been put up on Saturday or Sunday. Mr. O'Connell went on to say that he understood that the Minister for Local Government had advised Planning Authorities to pay particular attention to the preservation of rights-of-way and access to beaches and pointed out that the Deputation was not asking the Council to acquire a right-of-way, but to assist in preserving one which was established. Mr. Liam O'Brien of Ballinamona, and Mr. Michael Kinsella of Kilmurray, stated that they had both been using the right-of-way for the past fifty years and that their parents before them had also used it. They stated they used to drive their pony and trap into the sand-dunes and then walk down to the sea and no charge was made. Councillor E. Byrne (Chairman) stated that the Council would note the remarks made by the members of the Deputation and agreed that this was a matter of importance and the preservation of access to beaches was one with which the Council was concerned. The members of the Deputation thanked the Council for receiving them and withdrew.

At a later stage in the Meeting the Council considered the points made by the Deputation and in reply to inquiries from Members the County Manager stated that the Council had been concerned with obtaining access to the beach at Brittas Bay and had asked the landowners if they would sell the sand-dune area to the Council so that it would be in public ownership and available fully to the public. The Council had frequently received representations from persons visiting Brittas Bay that there should be free access to the beach and protesting against being charged for crossing the sand-dunes. It had been the practice of the landowner for some years past to make a charge for the parking of cars on the sand-dune area, but previously no charge had been made for persons walking across the sand-dunes to the beach. It seemed quite obvious that for a great number of years people had been using the access and right-of-way across the sand-dunes without

any charge and it seemed clear from the evidence given by the members of the Deputation that a public right-of-way existed. The County Manager suggested that the Council should obtain the advice of the Law Agent as to what action might be taken to preserve the right-of-way. The Council had for a long time been endeavouring to prevent Brittas Bay from being altered in such a way that it would eventually not be the natural attraction which it was at present. In endeavouring to establish rights-of-way in the past, however, the Council found that persons were rather reluctant to come forward to confirm the existence of a right-of-way at particular places.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Everett, T.D.,

Seconded by Councillor J. Miley:

Resolved—That the Council take the necessary steps to uphold rights-of-way at Brittas Bay and access of the public at this place.

Passed unanimously.

Resolution of Sympathy.

On the proposal of Councillor E. Byrne, seconded by Councillor J. O'Toole, the Council passed a Resolution expressing the sympathy of the Members with the family of the late Mr. Joseph McGrath, who had played such a prominent part in public life and in the industrial life of the country and had been responsible for the establishment of the Hospitals' Trust.

Item No. 1—Housing Capital Allocation 1966-'67—Letter Dated 22nd March, 1966, from Department of Local Government.

The County Secretary submitted details of the letter received from the Department of Local Government indicating the capital funds which could be allocated for housing purposes in respect of the year 1966/67. The allocation for the purpose of making Loans available to persons buying or erecting new houses was £36,000; the amount allowed for Supplementary Grants was £19,000; for the Council's existing commitments in respect of Council Housing Schemes £33,000; and for new works a provisional allocation of £20,000. As regards the allocation for the purpose of making Loans available to persons buying or erecting new houses the County Secretary stated that during the past few years expenditure on such Loans amounted to about £5,000 a year, but during the past year there had been a substantial increase in the number of applications for Loans. Loans had been agreed to by the Council, subject to the necessary moneys being available, in respect of twenty-five houses at Bentley Park, Bray, which amounted to £53,750, while the number of individual applications otherwise was substantial. The amount allocated was sufficient to enable the Council to meet Loans which had been approved by the Council without any conditions, but sufficient moneys would not be available to meet the full amount of Loans in respect of the houses at Bentley Park and four others which had been approved subject to the necessary moneys being available to the Council. In regard to Supplementary Grants £3,300 was required to recoup payments already made; £5,583 to meet applications ready for immediate payment; and further applications on hand amounted to about £17,000. Consequently the Council could not meet from the allocation all the applications submitted to date. It would seem necessary also that the operation of the Scheme for Supplementary Grants be suspended. For the Council's Housing Schemes at Grattan Park, Blessington, Carnew and Laragh, together with two houses in progress at Bawnogue, Baltinglass, and the cottages built at Eadestown and Johnstown, a sum of £34,350 would be required, which was in excess of the allocation to meet existing commitments. The pro-

visional allocation for new works was £20,000 and it would seem that this would have to be used towards meeting the cost of the Kilcoole Housing Scheme. The Members of the Council expressed concern at the position in regard to the financing of housing, as revealed by the figures submitted. The Council asked that a copy of the Department's letter be circulated to the Members of the Council, together with a statement of the position in regard to applications and existing commitments. The Council agreed that the matter be further considered at the Meeting of the Council to be held on the 18th April.

Item No. 2.—Grattan Park Housing Scheme — Proposal That Extra Houses be Erected.

In view of the position indicated in regard to the availability of moneys for Housing Schemes in the coming year the Council deferred consideration of the proposal that extra houses be built at Grattan Park.

Item No. 3—Blessington Housing Scheme—Proposal that Extra Houses Be Provided.

Councillor J. Miley proposed that the Council proceed with the preparation of a Scheme for the erection of additional houses at Blessington and the Council agreed that while the necessary planning could proceed it would not be possible to consider proceeding with additional houses until the matter of availability of the necessary finance was settled.

Item No. 4—Letter Addressed to Chairman of Council by Classic Clothing Co., Ltd., Blessington.

The County Secretary submitted a letter received from the Classic Clothing Co., Ltd., indicating the Company's difficulty in regard to two of their key workers, who at present lived in Dublin and whom they feared would not continue in their employment if they could not obtain housing accommodation in Blessington. The County Secretary stated that both these persons had been applicants for the group of houses at present under construction at Blessington, but had not been recommended by the County Medical Officer as being in need of housing and had not been among those agreed to by the Members of the Council for the area having considered the recommendations of the County Medical Officer. The County Secretary suggested that the Council might make two sites available on the site at Blessington if the persons concerned would be prepared to build their own houses and could obtain the necessary finance. The Council agreed that the sites be offered to the two persons concerned.

Item No. 5—Notice of Motion in name of Councillor J. Everett, T.D.—“That the Council Provide at Least Sixteen Houses at Rathnew in View of the Number of Applications Received in the Rathnew Area and that a Contract be Advertised for Immediate Attention.”

Councillor Everett urged that the Council provide at least sixteen houses at Rathnew having regard to the number of applications received for vacant houses in the area. He could not agree that only five houses were needed in Rathnew. He pointed out that a new factory was likely to be established there and this would give rise to a greater demand for houses. It was agreed that the County Medical Officer be asked to report on conditions of overcrowding in the Rathnew area and also consider the likely future demand for housing in view of the new factory being established.

Item No. 6—Application for Consent to Sale of Vested Cottage at Balinagran Kilbride.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Miley;

Seconded by Councillor M. Deering;

Resolved—That we approve of consent being given to the sale by the Reps. of Mrs. Elizabeth O'Neill (deceased) of the Vested Cottage at Balinagran, Kilbride, to William Brennan, subject to the Annuity being continued to be paid and the Statutory Conditions still to apply, and subject to the payment to the Council of a sum representing 1/3rd x 24/29th of the present market value (as determined by the Council).
Passed unanimously.

Application for consent to Sale of Vested Cottages at Ballynultagh, Shillelagh, and at Griffinstown, Grangecon.

It was

Proposed by Councillor Miss M. Walsh;

Seconded by Councillor J. Quigley;

Resolved—That we approve of consent being given to the sale by John Keogh of the Vested Cottage at Ballynultagh, Shillelagh, to George Hickey, Cronieea, Shillelagh, subject to the Annuity continuing to be paid and the statutory Conditions continuing to apply, and subject to the payment to the Council of a sum representing 1/3rd x 19/20th of the present market value (as determined by the Council).

Resolved—That we approve of consent being given to the sale by Christopher O'Toole of Vested Cottage No. 242/2 at Griffinstown, Grangecon, to Kevin O'Toole, Griffinstown, Grangecon, subject to Annuity continuing to be paid and Statutory Conditions continuing to apply, and subject to the payment to the Council of a sum representing 1/3rd x 40 1/2/47th of the present market value of the cottage and plot (as determined by the Council).
Passed unanimously.

Item No. 7—Cottage Damaged by Fire at Killeagh, Auhgrim—Application to Purchase.

The County Secretary stated that a cottage at Killeagh, Auhgrim, had been severely damaged by fire on the 3rd December, 1965, the tenant at that time being Ernest Jardine. The tenant subsequently left the cottage, having handed up the key. The house was derelict and was not being occupied and the Assistant County Engineer reported that the cottage was not worth putting in order as it had a floor area of only 315 sq. ft. which would be totally inadequate under present conditions. He estimated that it would cost about £900 to add an additional 300 sq. ft. to the cottage and a further £600 to put the present structure in order. The Council had received £440 under the Council's insurance. An offer had been received from Messrs. A. Cullen and Son, Solicitors, on behalf of a client, in the sum of £20 for the Council's interest in the property. Following a discussion on the matter it was agreed to obtain the advice of the Council's Solicitor before considering the offer.

Item No. 8—Repairs to Cottages Carried Out in March, 1966, and Cottages to be Repaired in April, 1966.

The Council noted the list of cottages repaired during the month of March and of those to be repaired in April, 1966.

Item No. 9—Proposed Closing of Roads at Enniskerry — Rep'y from Irish Motor Racing Club, Ltd., Re Repairs to Wall.

The County Secretary stated that the Irish Motor Racing Club, Ltd., had indicated that Mr. Patrick Jordan was interviewed by two members of their Board of Directors and had agreed to re-build the wall opposite the Church which had been referred to by the Council at the previous Meeting, but had informed the Directors that due to pressure of work he might not be able to complete the repairs fully before the 30th April. The letter stated that the Board of Directors were fully aware of their obligations in the matter and would have the repairs completed as quickly as possible at the Club's expense. The Council noted the terms of the letter.

It was

Proposed by Councillor Mrs. M. Ledwidge;

Seconded by Councillor J. O'Toole:

Resolved—That we hereby close to public traffic Main Road No. 6 from Enniskerry N.S. to the junction with County Road No. 7 at Monastery, Enniskerry, on 30th April, 1966 between the hours of 1.30 p.m. and 6.00 p.m. and authorise the holding of a Motor Car Hill Climb on the road while so closed to public traffic.
Passed unanimously.

Factory at Rathnew.

The County Manager informed the Council in committee regarding the proposed sale of the site at Rathnew which had been acquired by the Council for the purposes of a County Hospital to a firm who would be establishing a factory in Rathnew. The firm were seeking a freehold interest in the site, but the County Manager suggested that the sale should be subject to a lease in order that the Council could exercise some control over the use of the site and ensure that it be used only for purposes of a factory, or for a purpose acceptable to the Council. The Council agreed with the County Manager's recommendations.

Industrial Estate at "The Murrrough", Wicklow.

The County Manager informed the Council in committee of negotiations with Messrs. Goulding regarding the purchase of their site at "The Murrrough," Wicklow, and stated that it was expected that the site could be acquired for a sum of £800, but subject to the Council's accepting responsibility for the maintenance of the level crossing. This condition, however, would impose difficulty and the matter of providing an automatic crossing was being considered, but the County Manager felt that if possible the Council should not accept responsibility for maintaining the crossing. Councillor J. Temple stated that he understood from experience that automatic crossings did not give satisfaction. The Council agreed that the County Manager proceed with the proposals for acquisition of the site.

Notices of Motion.

The following Notices of Motion were handed in and accepted by the Chairman:—

In the name of Councillor Miss M. Waish:— "That a Report be obtained from the County Engineer regarding the stoppage of supply of water on the lands of Alfred E. Lawrence at Tallyho, Aughrim."

Councillor M. J. O'Neill stated that the principal objection to the Cattle Mart was the entrance on to the Main Dublin Road but it was not possible to arrange any alternative entrance. The applicants would co-operate with the Council and carry out any instructions given regarding the entrance. Car parking accommodation was being provided on land adjoining and there would be a separate entrance to the Car Park. Councillor O'Neill stressed the importance of a Mart to the area and to the town of Baltinglass. Councillor Timmins, seconding the proposal, expressed the view that the use of the site would not cause any danger to traffic. The County Manager stated that a decision had not been taken on the application as the details submitted were insufficient for the purposes of a decision. A letter had been received that day, however, giving the size of the site as two acres, with parking facilities on another one and a half acres, and indicating the number of cattle expected to be accommodated and the number of persons who might attend at the Mart. It was indicated also that the Company was prepared to provide another toilet for men and to provide tanks as a disposal method.

In regard to the proposal the County Manager pointed out that very few Planning applications were in fact refused, and where a decision to refuse permission was taken it was only after careful consideration and lengthy discussions with the Council's technical staff. The principal reasons for refusing permissions generally were either that a traffic hazard was likely to be created or that it was necessary to preserve scenic values. In the case of the particular application under consideration it was felt that having regard to the character of the district that this particular type of development would not be suited to it. It was felt that if this application were allowed it would be difficult to refuse a second and subsequent applications which would eventually result in quite a colony of houses at this place which might involve the Council in extra expense in providing services.

ITEM No. 3—"Summer Safety Week"—Letter Issued by Minister for Local Government to Lord Mayors, Mayors and Chairmen of Local Authorities in Regard to Road Safety Campaign.

Copy of the letter of 14th March, 1966, from the Minister for Local Government to the Chairman of the County Council had been circulated to the Members. The County Secretary stated that the wall referred to was a private one, and although it may have been built by the Council when carrying out work under the Local Authorities (Works) Act, the Council would not have any responsibility for maintaining it. The County Manager stated that drainage works were carried out under the Local Authorities (Works) Act with the aid of Grants from the State, but there was no provision in the Act as regards maintenance and the Council were not liable for such maintenance. The Council noted the position in the matter.

ITEM No. 8—Dargle River Flooding—Appointment of Consultant.

The County Secretary stated that the Members of the Council for the **BRAY ELECTORAL AREA** had met Members of Bray Urban District Council on the 15th February, 1966, in connection with the flooding which had occurred in Bray in November and it had been agreed at the Meeting to engage a Consultant on behalf of both the Urban District Council and County Council to advise on measures to be taken to prevent further flooding in the Dargle River. The formal approval of the County Council to the appointment of a Consultant was required. The County Manager stated that arterial drainage was the responsibility of the Central Authority and not of the Local Authority. The Council had expressed the view that Surveys should be carried out by the Commissioners of Public Works and Drainage Schemes prepared in respect of the Dargle River and other Rivers which were subject to flooding, but the Commissioners of Public Works were not prepared to do this and, consequently, Bray Urban District Council and the County Council had agreed to engage a Consultant to advise on the matter.

Proposed by Councillor J. Temple;
Seconded by Councillor Mrs. M. Ledwidge;

Resolved—That having considered recommendation of Members of Council for the **BRAY ELECTORAL AREA** we note and approve of the engagement of Mr. J. B. Barry, B.E., Consulting Engineer, 40 Elgin Road, Ballsbridge, Dublin 4, to advise on measures which might be taken to prevent flooding from the Dargle River at Bray.

ITEM No. 9—Housing Capital Allocations—Letter of 22nd March, 1966, from Dept. of Local Government and Report on Requirements.

Copy of the Department's letter, together with copy of a Report of the County Secretary in regard to the Council's requirements for Housing Capital, had been circulated to the Members. Councillor H. J. Byrne, Chairman, stated that the matter was a very serious one and referred particularly to the need for sufficient moneys to enable the Council to meet Loans for twenty-five applicants who were building houses at Bentley Park, Bray. Councillor Temple stated that the Minister had made it clear that he would be prepared to consider exceptional cases and suggested that the matter warranted a Special Meeting and possibly a Deputation to the Minister. The Council decided to adjourn the matter for consideration at a Special Meeting to be held on the 25th April, 1966.

ITEM No. 10—Right-of-Way For Public to Beach at Brittas Bay—Action by Council to Uphold It.

Copy of the letter issued by the Department of Local Government

(dated 29th March, 1966) in regard to rights-of-way to beaches, etc., had been circulated to the Members of the Council. The following letter received by the County Manager from Messrs. Vincent and Beatty, Solicitors, on behalf of Mrs. Philomena Maguire, owner of the lands at Cornagower, was submitted:—

Dear Sir,

We act for Mrs. Philomena Maguire, of "Hillcourt," Highfield Road, Rathgar, the owner of the lands of Cornagower, Brittas Bay.

Our client's attention has been drawn to recent Newspaper reports concerning a deputation which was received by the Wicklow County Council over an alleged right-of-way across our client's land at a spot known as the opening. It was also reported that a Resolution was passed the gist of which was to call on you to take action in order to protect rights-of-way of the public to gain access to the sea.

We wish to draw your attention to the fact that there is no public right-of-way over the lands of Cornagower to the beach and, accordingly, the County Council has been led entirely astray by certain people, some of whom without submitting any claim have on three occasions smashed fencing and have, in addition, openly flouted the Gardaí in the course of their duties. These people have, in short, completely disregarded private property and the rule of law.

We feel sure you will agree that this is no way in which to force issues or grievances, and if tolerated would shake the very foundations of Society as well as giving appalling example to the young people of to-day.

This opening (now smashed open) was sealed off from motor access for upwards of ten years by reason of the unsafe conditions pertaining on seaward side of the road and an alternative access provided a few yards away. It has now been decided to revert to the original opening and improve the surface conditions. This decision has been taken as a direct consequence of these acts of intimidation in order to avoid any further acts of this kind.

Our client is awaiting the result of the bringing of the parties concerned to justice and it is hoped in the meantime that you, Sir, as County Manager, will take no steps which could be construed as assisting these people or condoning these disgraceful incidents. Afterwards our client's representatives are prepared to meet you and any elected representatives and discuss any problems arising out of this Car Park.

We act for Mrs. Philomena Maguire, the owner of the above

lands. Our client's attention has been drawn to a report contained in the issue of the 'Wicklow People,' dated 9th inst., concerning discussions which took place at a recent Council Meeting over the question of preserving an alleged public right-of-way at Bennett's Crossroads which has been traditionally known as The Opening.

We enclose herewith copy of a letter dated the 5th April addressed to the County Manager which sets out facts which will be proved at a time when those responsible for the disgraceful conduct of tearing down fences are brought to justice. This letter, however, omitted to point out that our client and her late husband have been for many years car park operators at this particular junction, and she is in fact rated as a car park owner and pays rates to the Co. Council.

Furthermore, as a car park operator she is responsible for keeping the park tidy and clean which entails regular litter disposal. This service extends over the sand dunes and down to the Beach. A Department of Health Inspector has congratulated our client on the manner in which it is kept. Needless to remark, the tearing down of the fences constituted a direct threat to the continued operation of this park, and it must be clearly obvious that if successful, within a very short time any standard of cleanliness achieved would be swept away.

This entire matter is also singularly unfortunate coming at a time when our client had plans prepared for the erection of Toilet facilities and other improvements and which have now been lodged.

Our client is quite amazed that the County Manager should state in relation to possible County Council purchases, and we quote, "that the Council did not succeed in getting anywhere with the owners." Discussions which took place in Bray Town Hall in 1963 with representatives of our client and officials of the County Council concerned this very matter and embraced the possibility of the County Council acquiring the entire sand dunes owned by our client as well as car parking area at the other side of the road. Our client's representatives made it clear that they would not be adverse to this acquisition provided certain fundamental principles were agreed to: these principles apart from finance, were primarily related to the preservation of the sand dunes and keeping these dunes and the beaches clean and tidy. It is a significant fact that at that meeting the officials expressed an opinion that the present owners had always maintained these dunes and car park satisfactorily, but expressed concern that if the owners sold to somebody else that this might be the position.

This meeting which the owners representatives considered very useful and constructive, has not been followed by any further meetings. No request for such a meeting has been received from the County Council and it is a fact that when the representatives of the owner asked to meet the County Manager concerning a development scheme and any other problems, he refused to meet them.

We have attempted to deal in this letter with only a few of the misconceptions reported. There are many, and in fairness to our client we suggest that the contents of this letter should be brought to the attention of your Councillors. May we also suggest that you should meet with our client's representatives in order to clear all the misconceptions and see how best the problems affecting this particular area may best be dealt with in order to secure the peaceful development for the benefit of the public.

The County Secretary stated that Plans referred to in the letter from Messrs. Vincent and Beatty had been lodged with the Council some days after the previous Meeting. The County Manager, referring

to the letters received from Messrs. Vincent and Beatty, pointed out that local residents had come forward who submitted that there was a public right-of-way to the beach through the land. The Council's Solicitor had been asked to advise on the matter, but he had expressed doubt as to whether the Council would be entitled to intervene on behalf of the persons claiming the existence of the public right-of-way. Councillor Temple suggested that the Council's Solicitor prepare a statement of the full facts and the Council forward it to the Department for advice. He felt that the Council ought not to initiate proceedings directly. The County Manager pointed out that it was only in comparatively recent years that the area had been fenced off from the public road. Previously it had been completely open and persons were able to traverse the area as they wished. In regard to powers under the Local Government (Planning and Development) Act, 1963, the County Manager stated that the Council could prepare a Development Plan in regard to rights-of-way, but, of course, the Plan could be challenged by persons who contended that such public right-of-way did not exist. The Council agreed, on the suggestion of Councillor Temple, that the Council's Solicitor prepare a Statement of the full facts of the matter for transmission to the Attorney-General with a view to seeing if action could be taken by the Council.

ITEM No. 13—Report of Councillors Miss M. Walsh and Mrs. M. Ledwidge on Visit to Peamount Hospital.

The following Report of Councillors Miss M. Walsh and Mrs. M. Ledwidge had been circulated to the Members:

REPORT OF VISITING COMMITTEE TO PEAMOUNT

As appointed representatives of Wicklow County Council to visit Peamount Hospital Incorporated to investigate complaints alleged to have been received by Members of this Council from patients of that Institution, we, the undersigned, herewith submit our impressions

on the conditions obtaining therein as we found them.

Having made the necessary arrangements with the Hospital Authorities and submitted our authorisation to act on behalf of this Council to visit the Institution as a Committee, we arrived at Peamount (by appointment) at 1.00 p.m. on Monday, 31st January. We were met on arrival by the Matron, Secretary, and Resident Medical Superintendent, with whom we spent a considerable time at the outset in a most informative and profitable discussion on the business of our visit.

We were supplied with a list of the names of the (13) thirteen Wicklow patients resident in the Hospital and set out to visit each patient in order to investigate the complaints. It is worthy of note that we spoke to each person in private consultation.

We can truthfully state that we found every one of them perfectly happy and well satisfied with the amenities provided for them. Each patient in turn paid tribute to the kindness and consideration of the Nursing and Medical Staff. When questioned separately as to the quality of the food we did not receive one single complaint.

With regard to their obligation to wash their own cutlery and cup and saucer (or "mug" if they preferred), we found that all the patients with whom we spoke were unanimous in the view that this was a most satisfactory and hygienic arrangement, as it tended to minimise the ever-present risk of further infection which, apparently, is of very serious concern to each of them. In the words of one patient—"We regard this exercise as a form of occupational therapy." On closer investigation of the matter we learned that this arrangement does not at all apply to patients confined to bed, whose utensils are taken away and washed by an "Orderly" of the Ward Staff.

It is true to state that some patients are requested to provide themselves with cutlery, a cup and saucer (or "mug" if preferred) and a hot-water bottle. Clinical thermometers are supplied by the Hospital Authorities, for which a deposit of two shillings is required. This charge is refunded upon return of the thermometer. It has been found that, generally speaking, such equipment is notoriously fragile when provided free.

Since the Wards are all centrally-heated and very comfortable, we feel that hot-water bottles are not a normal need. We are satisfied from the assurance given us by the Authorities that any patient who is unable to provide any of these items has them provided free of charge.

In only two cases did we find any cause for complaint and in each one it was with regard to the undue delay in the supply of clothing. One female patient, who has spent a considerable time there, told us that she made application for clothing to this Council some weeks prior to Christmas and up to the date of our visit she had not even received the courtesy of an acknowledgment of her letter.

The second complaint—from a male patient—stated that clothing for which he had made application more than four months ago had not yet been supplied in full. After further questioning on the matter he stated that the Hospital Authorities had given him the

necessary clothing in the interval.

Following subsequent discussion on the question of the provision of clothing with the Resident Medical Superintendent, it was ascertained that upon receipt by him of a request for clothing from a patient, the application is immediately investigated and authorised by his signature and a Requisition Order made directly by him to the Council concerned. Dr. Logan stated very emphatically that such delays in respect of the supply of clothing are entirely a matter for the County Council concerned.

In conclusion, it is our considered opinion that conditions generally are highly satisfactory at Peamount Hospital; that facilities for nursing and medical treatment are highly comparable and, in fact, in many ways more advanced than in other similar Institutions; and that as far as we could ascertain from our one-day visit the general morale of the patients with whom we spoke was excellent.

Finally, we take this opportunity to express our gratitude to the Matron, Secretary, Resident Medical Superintendent, and Staff for the great kindness, courtesy and respect afforded to us on this occasion.

MARY LEDWIDGE.

The Chairman and the Members of the Council expressed appreciation of the work of Mrs. Ledwidge and Miss Walsh in visiting the Hospital and preparing so comprehensive a Report. Councillor J. Everett, T.D., inquired as to what action the Council intended to take in relation to the delay in the supply of clothing to some of the patients. He stated that he had raised the matter in June, 1965, concerning a patient sent to Peamount who had not been supplied with clothes and that he raised the matter again in November and a third time in January, and was then informed that a suit of clothes had been ordered for the patient in December. He had not, however, received an explanation as to the delay in ordering the clothes. It was agreed that a Report in regard to the matter of the supply of clothing be obtained for the next Meeting of the Council.

ITEM No. 14—Public Lighting at Baltinglass—Recommendation of County Engineer.

Resolved—That we approve of the following recommendations of the County Engineer in relation to public lighting at Baltinglass:—

1. Provision of extra lamp at Mill Street on pole No. 34 at no charge;
2. Provision of extra lamp in Weaver Square on pole No. 19 near "Ivy Restaurant"—£6;
3. Provision of extra lamp on wall bracket on Corner House opposite Vocational School in Weaver Square, provided householder gives permission—£7;
4. Removal of E.S.B. pole near Catholic Church which is a danger to traffic—£15.

We note that there will be an increase in the annual charge for supply of electricity in respect of these lamps of £17 12s. 6d.

Passed unanimously.

ITEM No. 15—Notices of Motion in Name of Councillor J. Whelan:

- (a) "That a Public Light be Provided at Ballycoogue; and (b)
"That an Extra Public Light be Provided at Knockanna."

The County Sec. stated that due to the illness of Mr. Caffrey, Assist. County Engineer, a Report was not available regarding the light at Ballycoogue. The Assistant County Engineer had reported that he felt that an extra public light was not necessary in the position pointed out to him by Councillor Whelan, which was on the Tinahely Road near the three Council cottages. He felt that it would unbalance the lighting of the village. Councillor Whelan expressed disagreement with the terms of the Engineer's Report, as he felt there should be a light at this place and suggested that possibly the lights could be re-arranged. It was agreed that a further Report be obtained from the Engineer on the matter.

ITEM No. 16—Proposed Use of Kish Lighthouse Base at Greystones Harbour—Report of Meeting of Members of Council for Bray Electoral Area with Representatives of Greystones Civic Association.

The County Secretary stated that the Members of the Council for the BRAY ELECTORAL AREA had met Representatives of the Greystones and District Civic Association in connection with the proposed use of the Kish Lighthouse Base at Greystones Harbour. The Representatives of the Association had stated that it was their intention to fill in the gap between the Pier and the site of the Lighthouse Base and that material had been offered to them which would be suitable for the purpose. It had been agreed at the Meeting that the County Engineer meet Representatives of the Association to inspect the material proposed for filling and to submit an estimate of the cost of the work to the Council at that Meeting. The County Engineer had reported that he met the Representatives of the Association at Greystones Pier on the 14th April, but that the material shown to him as being available for filling up the space between the proposed site of the Lighthouse and the existing Pier was not of sufficient weight to prevent it being moved by heavy storms. He considered it would be necessary to protect these boulders and rubble on the seaward face by a concrete wall and that the wall would have to be laid in dry concrete, protected with jute bags. The County Engineer estimated the cost of building the protection wall and the removing and dumping of the boulders on the shore side of the wall at £920.

Resolved—That having considered letter from Greystones and District Civic Association and recommendations of County Engineer and Members of Council for BRAY ELECTORAL AREA, we approve of the Association being informed that the Council has no objection to their proceeding with the proposal to place the original Kish Lighthouse Base at the Harbour, Greystones, the full cost being met by the Association and other interested residents of the area, subject to the Base being sited as recommended by the County Engineer, and subject to the undertaking given by the Association that they would undertake to remove the Base within a reasonable time should the Council consider that it should be removed.

That we authorise the expenditure of £920 in excess of the amount provided in the current year's Estimates to defray the cost of works recommended by the County Engineer in Report of 18th April, 1966.

The Council noted the particulars of County Manager's Orders which had been circulated to the Members.

SALE OF VESTED COTTAGE—SUSPENSION OF OPERATION OF STATUTORY CONDITION.

Sites for Industry.

The County Manager (in committee) reported to the Council regarding (1) the proposed disposal of the site at Rathnew owned by the Council for the purposes of an industry; and (2) the proposed purchase by the Council of lands at "The Murrough" Wicklow, as sites for new industries. The County Manager informed the Council of the terms proposed for the disposal to Messrs. Heyco-Werk Heynen and Co., of Germany of the site at Rathnew which had been originally acquired by the Council for the purposes of a County Hospital. The price being paid to the Council was £3,300, but the site was being disposed of subject to a Lease at a rent of £1 per annum, with a covenant that the site be used only for industrial purposes or for the erection of dwellinghouses for persons employed in the industry. On the proposal of Councillor J. Everett, T.D., the Council agreed with the arrangements. The County Secretary stated that the appropriate notices under Section 86 of the Local Government Act, 1946, would be circulated to the Members and the matter would be included for formal decision by the Council at the Meeting on the 9th May.

Item No. 1—Acquisition of Sites for Houses at Parkmore, Baltinglass.

The County Secretary stated that the Council's Architect had forwarded a Plan showing the extent of flooding at Parkmore last Winter and had indicated that it appeared that some of the plots being acquired by the Council had been covered by flood-water at that time. He stated, however, that the Assistant Fire Officer had informed him that apart from the occasion in November last Parkmore had never been flooded before, with the exception of two sites (Nos. 19 and 20 which were particularly low-lying and which were not being acquired by the Council. 1. **Northern Area:** No Tenders were received for this area, which covers the Bray, Newtownmountkennedy and Wicklow areas. This system, however, does not seem to be satisfactory, judging by the criticism received from Councillors.
2. **South-Eastern District:** Only one Tender was received for this area—Aughrim/Arklow. I consider the Tender is excessive and recommend that the area be re-advertised.
3. **Southern District:** It is recommended that the Tender of Mr. James Kelly, Jank, Abbeylands, Castledermot, at the standard rate, be accepted. This district comprises the areas Nos. 5, 6 and 7, that is, Carnew, Shillelagh and Tinahely.
4. **Western District:** It is recommended that the Tender of Mr. Laurence Kelly, Lipstown, Narraghmore, Ballytore, Co. Kildare, be accepted for District No. 8 (Blessington area) at the standard rate plus 7½ per cent., if and when Direct Labour organisation is not available or able to cope with the work.

It is recommended that the Tender of Mr. J. Kelly, Jank, Abbeylands, Castledermot, be accepted for District No. 9 (Ballinglass area) at the standard rate. It is hoped to carry out some repairs also in

this area by Direct Labour when it is economical to do so.

Decisions to Refuse Permission for Erection of Houses.

Members of the Council raised the matter of decisions having been made to refuse permission for the erection of houses for Mr. Farrington at Kilmacanogue and for Mr. Bohan at Blessington. It was agreed that particulars of these applications be made available to the Council at the Meeting on the 9th May, 1966.

Constitution of Deputation to Parliamentary Secretary.

Councillor H. J. Byrne stated that Councillor J. Temple was ill and was in hospital and he proposed that Councillor Edward Byrne replace Councillor Temple on the Deputation to the Parliamentary Secretary in regard to the Capital Allocations for Housing for the current year.

Councillor H. J. Byrne also suggested that as Councillor J. J. McCrea, Chairman, was now available that he should be a member of the Committee in place of himself (Councillor H. J. Byrne) who had been nominated as a member of the Committee by reason of being Acting Chairman at the time. The Council agreed that Councillor Edward Byrne replace Councillor Temple on the Deputation, but also agreed unanimously that Councillor J. J. McCrea (as Chairman) be a member of the Deputation, but that Councillor H. J. Byrne should continue as a member of the Deputation.

Ambulance Service in Bray.

The County Manager asked that, as a matter of urgency, the Council consider (in committee) the position regarding the Ambulance Service in Bray. Following consultation with the Members of the Council for the Bray Electoral Area, and with their agreement, efforts had been made to reach agreement with Mr. Savage, Contractor for the Ambulance Service in Bray, on the basis of the payment of an annual retainer of £1,000, together with the payment of 1/- per mile for actual journeys. This arrangement had been discussed and agreed with the Department of Health. The County Manager stated that he had received a 'phone call from the Department of Health that day indicating that Mr. Savage had informed the Department that he was not prepared to accept the Council's offer and Mr. Savage had also sent a registered letter to the Department informing them that he was withdrawing the services of his ambulance as from the following Monday. The County Manager stated that there had been negotiations with the Dublin Health Authority and a meeting had been arranged with Officers of the Health Authority with a view to seeing if an Ambulance Service for the Bray Area could be provided through St. Columille's Hospital, Loughlinstown. He pointed out that there was a considerable advantage in having a Service operated through a hospital in that trained personnel would always be available to travel with the ambulance if required. Following a discussion in which Members of the Council suggested that there should be further negotiations with Mr. Savage it was proposed by Councillor Edward Byrne, seconded by Councillor H. B. Hipwell, that the present offer to Mr. Savage be increased by agreeing to a payment of £1 per call in addition to the £1,000 retainer, plus 1/- per mile. The Council felt that this offer was a reasonable one and should be accepted. The County Manager agreed to convey the offer to the Department of Health for approval and also to Mr. Savage. The County Manager pointed out that due to the volume of traffic on the Arterial Road in the North of the County many car accidents occurred in this district and the Council would be open to criticism if a satisfactory Ambulance Service was not available to deal with emergency cases arising from road accidents. Item No. 3—Road Fund Grants, 1966/'67—Letter from Department of Local Government notifying Grants Allocated.

Letter of 22nd April, 1966, Ref.: R.201/4/14, from Department of Local Government, conveying the allocation of Road Fund Grants to the Council for 1966/'67, was submitted. The Council noted that the Grants allocated for the current year were as follows:—

County Road Improvement Grant—£25,440.

Main Road Improvement Grant—£57,970.

Main Road Upkeep Grant—50% of approved expenditure.

Arterial Road Improvement Grant—£78,200.

The Council noted that there was a reduction of £5,470 in the amount allocated for County Road Improvement as compared with the allocation for 1965/'66 and that the amounts of the other Grants allocated corresponded with the amounts allocated in 1965/'66. The Council noted the Report of the County Engineer that he was not in a position to determine the amounts of moneys which would be available for Road Works in the current year pending a final decision from the Department of Local Government in regard to the financing of the repairs to Roads and Bridges damaged during the floods in November, 1965. The Council agreed that it be indicated to the Department of Local Government that in the view of the Council the expenditure incurred in repairing flood damage should be allowed to rank for recoupment from Arterial Road Grant and Main Road Grant. The Council deferred arrangements for the holding of Local Roads Meetings pending a final decision from the Department of Local Government in regard to the defraying of the costs of repair of flood damage.

Item No. 4—Road at "Five-Mile-Point"—Report of County Engineer.

The County Secretary stated that the County Engineer had reported that no work had been carried out on this road during the

financial year 1965/'66, as he had been unaware that it had been taken over by the Council as a Public Road. He pointed out, however, that no funds had been provided by the Council for repairs to the road and that £1,300 would have to be spent to allow reasonably frequent passing places, in addition to £1,400 for surfacing and £200 for the cost of a bridge. The County Secretary stated that following the giving of the necessary public notice the road had been taken over by the Council as a Public Road in November, 1965. The matter of taking over the road and carrying out repairs to it was considered by the Local Roads Committee at their Meeting on the 19th July, 1965, and the Committee had agreed that steps be taken to have the road taken over as a Public Road and that widening and grading only be carried out during the year 1965/'66 over the portion of the road serving the permanent houses on it. It was agreed that no surfacing of the road could be done from funds available in 1965/'66. Following a discussion on the matter, in the course of which Councillor J. Everett, T.D., expressed disagreement with the record of the decision of the Local Roads Committee, it was agreed that the matter be referred for consideration by the Local Roads Committee when dealing with the Programme of Works for the current financial year.

2. The major part of the site (containing 21 acres 3 roods 10 perches) was acquired from Mr. P. Clements of Rathnew and the remainder of the site (containing 1 acre 0 roods 6 perches) from Mr. Thomas Kavanagh, Rathnew.
3. It is proposed to dispose of the land to Heyco-Werk Heynen and Co. Remscheid, Germany.

4. The consideration proposed is £3,300.
5. The site would be disposed of subject to a Lease for 999 years at £1 per year and subject to a condition that the site be used for industrial purposes, which would include the provision of housing for persons employed in the industry.

Ambulance Service for Bray Area and Northern portion of County.

The County Manager stated that the Council had been informed by the Department of Health that Mr. Savage of Bray had informed the Department that he had refused the Council's offer in regard to the Ambulance Service and was withdrawing his service as from 6.00 p.m. on that date (the 9th May, 1966). It had been necessary, therefore, to make alternative arrangements to provide a Service for the Bray Area and the districts adjoining and arrangements had been made with the Dublin Health Authority under which that Authority would provide a Service for emergency cases and road accidents in the Dispensary Districts of Bray, Delgany and Enniskerry. An additional ambulance had been delivered to the Council that day in Wicklow and this ambulance was being put into commission, based at Wicklow, to provide cover for routine calls in the areas mentioned.

The Council approved of using the Dublin Health Authority ambulances for emergency and accident cases and of having a second whole-time driver for the second County Council ambulance attached to the Hospital in Wicklow.

Sheep Dipping Scheme.

The County Secretary stated that the Council had been informed by telephone from the Department of Agriculture that the sheep dipping period in the present year had been extended and the first dipping period would operate as from the 1st June instead of from the 1st July (as had been previously the position). It was suggested that a Meeting of the Sheep Dipping Committee be arranged for Monday, the 16th May, 1966, to consider further the arrangements for the current year's Scheme.

The County Secretary stated that the main objection to the proposal was that the house was being sited alongside the Main Road north of Blessington. Item No. 2—Report of Meeting of Deputation from Council with Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Local Government re Capital Allocations for Housing.

The County Secretary stated that a Deputation consisting of Councillor J. J. McCrea, Chairman, and Councillors E. Byrne, H. J. Byrne, J. Everett, T.D., J. Miley and Miss M. Walsh had met Deputy P. Brennan, Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister for Local Government, on the 9th May, 1966. In regard to County Council Housing Schemes (for which the allocation was £33,000 in respect of existing commitments and £20,000 provisionally allocated for new works) it was agreed that having regard to the normal carry-forward arrangements in respect of Housing Schemes that the Council might proceed with the Schemes for the erection of ten houses at Kilcoole and six houses at Aughtrim, and that the Council might also invite Tenders for the erection of Rural Cottages. In regard to the Council's allocation of £33,000 for Loans for House Purchase the members of the Deputation had expressed the Council's concern at the inadequacy of the amount of the allocation when compared with the number of Loans provisionally allocated by the Council. Particular reference was made to the difficulties which would be experienced by persons purchasing houses at Bentley Park, Bray. The members of the Deputation had pointed out that the amount of the current allocation would allow only of Loans being made available in respect of ten out of the twenty-five houses at this place. Deputy Brennan informed the Deputation that there was not much likelihood of extra money being made available under this heading, but the matter was being sympathetically examined in the Department.

The County Secretary stated that following the Meeting application had been made to the Department for sanction to the Loans in respect of the Kilcoole and Aughtrim Schemes so that these Schemes could be commenced in the present year. Tenders were being invited during the following week for the Rural Cottages.

Item No. 5—Housing Subsidies and Review of Rents—Letter from Department of Local Government.

A copy of letter of 30th March, 1966, Ref.: H. 3/66, from Department of Local Government had been circulated to the Members. The County Secretary stated that the object of the review of rents was to secure that at the end of a reasonable transition period the same type of renting structure would apply throughout the entire Housing Estate of the Council. It was the intention that when the Scheme was fully effective each tenant would pay a rent which was related to his family and financial circumstances, and the standard and amenity of the accommodation which he occupied, and that persons who were in a position to meet the cost of their houses should pay a normal rent, while, on the other hand, no person who was in need of a house would be debarred from getting one on account of the rent to be charged. The Council had 3,326 cottages, of which 2,166 had been vested in the tenants. Of the balance 377 were on graded rents and 783 cottages still remained on fixed rents. The graded rent system had been applied in the case of all new lettings, but was not applied in the case of existing rents or where there had been a transfer of tenancy from the original tenant to another member of the family living in the house. Of the 783 cottages to which fixed rents applied applications to purchase had been received from 362, which left 421 cottages which might be dealt with under the review of rents. The County Secretary suggested that Schemes might be prepared for the different categories of cottages, distinguishing between the older

cottages and new ones, and those with services, such as piped water supply and sewerage systems. It was suggested that graded rent scales should then be applied to all existing cottages not already on such scales, excluding, however, cottages in respect of which applications to purchase had been received. It was proposed also that the existing Differential Rent Schemes would be revised where necessary, in accordance with the recommendations made by the Department of Local Government. The Council agreed that proposals for applying Graded or Differential Rent Schemes to the remaining cottages not already on such Schemes be prepared and submitted, together with any recommended revisions of the current Differential Rent Schemes.

Item No. 6—Planning and Development—Right-of-Way at Brittas Bay. (Letter from Department of Local Government).

The following letter from the Department of Local Government was submitted:—

County Manager, 26th May, 1966.
Wicklow County Council, Wicklow.

A Chara,

I am directed by the Minister for Local Government to refer to your letter of the 15th April, 1966, about the question of rights-of-way at Brittas Bay and to draw attention to the terms of Department's circular letter PD. 10 of the 29th March, 1966, in the matter.

If there is evidence of uninterrupted and unrestricted public use of an access way the Council are entitled in their own right to take appropriate steps for the preservation or restoration of the right. This entitlement is independent of any question of supporting action by a particular group of users of the right. As indicated in the circular referred to proceedings by a local authority to restore the right-of-way which has been impeded would normally be expected to take the form of a relator action by the Attorney-General. It is considered that the possibility of such action in this case should be explored by the local authority forthwith.

If, however, such action is not warranted having regard to the extent or circumstances of public use the local authority should take whatever steps are required on foot of their further powers to provide public facilities or to preserve or develop facilities already in existence.

The reservation expressed in regard to the recommendation in the circular that the preservation of existing rights-of-way might be secured through the making of partial development plans is not understood. The powers of planning authorities in this regard under the Local Government (Planning and Development) Act, 1963, are specific and they are clearly set out in the circular.

While the planning authority may acquire land as a means of providing public rights-of-way over such land it is not necessary that the planning authority should own or should acquire the sites for the purpose of establishing rights-of-way under sections 47 or 48 of the Act.

In view of the current prospective importance of the Brittas Bay area as a place of public resort the Minister wishes that the Council should give special attention to the preservation of existing public facilities for parking, access and use, and to the development of new facilities to meet growing demands. I have to request, therefore, that the assessment, referred to in a final paragraph of circular PD. 10, of requirements for the protection or development of such

public facilities in the area in question should be expedited and a report submitted as soon as possible on the conclusions reached and the action proposed.

The County Secretary stated that the Council's Solicitor had forwarded a Statement from persons who contended that a public right-of-way existed at Cornagower and this Statement bore 122 signatures. The Statement had been forwarded to the Attorney-General with the request that the necessary legal proceedings be instituted. In regard to the Department's request for an assessment of the position at Brittas Bay the County Secretary stated that the County Manager had written to the Department of Local Government setting out the details of the discussions with the Brittas Bay Development Association in regard to the Plan prepared for Brittas Bay by the Council and had pointed out that the views of the Department of Local Government and of Bord Fáilte in regard to the development at Brittas Bay had been sought by the Council some years ago, but that no written comments had been received. The County Manager reviewed the discussions and decisions which had been taken by the Council in regard to development at Brittas Bay and stated that at present Appeals made by landowners at Brittas Bay against planning refusals of the Council were under examination by the Department, but decisions had not yet been given by the Minister.

Proposed by Councillor H. J. Byrne;

Seconded by Councillor M. Deering;

Resolved—That the Attorney-General be requested to take appropriate action on behalf of the Council and the persons concerned to prevent any obstruction of right-of-way to beach at Brittas Bay.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 7—Application from Baltinglass National Farmers' Association for reception of Deputation from local farmers re Repair of Bridges at Tuckmill and Stratford.

The County Secretary submitted a letter from the Secretary of the Baltinglass Branch, N.F.A., asking that a Deputation of local farmers be received with a view to having the Bridget at Tuckmill and Stratford repaired. On the proposal of Councillor O'Neill, seconded by Councillor Timmins, it was agreed that the Deputation be received at the Meeting on the 13th June. In reply to the Chairman the County Engineer stated that parts required for the temporary bridges to be erected at Balisland and at other places were held up in a British Port on account of the Seamen's Strike. Work would have been commenced on repairs to the Bridges at Tuckmill and Stratford during that week but it had not been possible to obtain cement as paper bags were not available owing to the Paper Mills Strike. The Council was endeavouring to obtain cement in bulk and to have it put in bags by their own staff. It was agreed that the Secretary, Baltinglass Branch, N.F.A., be informed of the position, but that the Council would be prepared to receive the Deputation should they still wish to attend.

**Item No. 8—Notice of Motion in Name of Councillor G. Timmins:—
"That a public light be erected at Killamoat, Rathdangan."**

Seconded by Councillor M. J. O'Neill:

Resolved—That the E.S.B. be requested to submit a quotation for the provision of a public light on an E.S.B. pole at the main entrance to Killamoat Church, Rathdangan.

The County Secretary stated that the E.S.B. had in fact been asked to submit the necessary quotation.

Item No. 9—Public Lighting: Kiltegan.

The County Secretary stated that the County Engineer had recommended that two public lamps be provided at Kiltegan between the Doctor's Residence and the Cross in Kiltegan and that the estimated cost given by the Electricity Supply Board was £70.

Proposed by Councillor G. Timmins;

Seconded by Councillor M. J. O'Neill:

Resolved—That we approve of the acceptance of the quotation of the Electricity Supply Board in the sum of £70 for the provision of two public lamps between the Doctor's Residence and the Crossroads at Kiltegan.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 10—Dumping Ground at Dunlavin.

The County Secretary stated that the site at Dunlavin which had been offered by Councillor M. Deering was situated 1½ miles from the town and was not considered suitable. It was felt that private individuals would not be prepared to use a site at such distance from the town. The Council agreed that efforts be made to obtain a suitable site closer to the town.

Item No. 11—Revision of Wages of Labourers and Craftsmen in Building Industry.

The County Secretary stated that the Council had received the Recommendation of the Construction Industry Joint Industrial Council in regard to wages of Craftsmen and Labourers and that the Council had recommended that as from 1st June, 1966, the weekly wages of all adult operatives in the construction industry be increased by £1, with pro rata increases for Apprentices; that the consolidation of hourly wage rates become effective from 1st June, 1966; and that in connection with the payment of annual leave for current year the leave should be calculated on the basis of five-sixths at the old rate of pay and one-sixth at the new rate, i.e., the rate effective from 1st June.

Seconded by Councillor J. Miley:

Resolves—That having noted Recommendation of the Construction Industry Joint Industrial Council we approve of the payment of revised rates of remuneration to Craftsmen and Labourers at the new agreed rates with effect from 1st June, 1966, and approve also of the agreed arrangements in connection with Annual Leave for the current year.

Deputation from Baltinglass N.F.A.

As arranged at the previous Meeting of the Council, the Council received a Deputation from the Baltinglass Branch of the National Farmers' Association. The Deputation consisted of Messrs. Hanlon, Bourne, Wilson, Doyle and Byrne. Mr. Hanlon, speaking on behalf

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of the Deputation, thanked the Council for receiving them and stated that their purpose in attending was to emphasise the need for the carrying out of repairs to the Bridges at Tuckmill and Stratford-on-Slaney as soon as possible. He gave details of how farmers in the area were affected and mentioned that several farmers had to drive distances of five or six miles a number of times each day on account of the Bridge being damaged and that eight farmers had to make a detour to get from their houses to their lands at Tuckmill. Councillor J. J. McCrea, Chairman, assured the members of the Deputation that the Members of the Council were anxious to have the Bridges repaired as soon as possible and explained the difficulties the Council had experienced both in obtaining temporary bridges and recently in obtaining supplies of cement.

Item No. 1—Notice of Intention to Propose Resolution Under Section 4 of the City and County Management (Amendment) Act, 1955: "Rockfield House," Ballinacarrig, Co. Wicklow.

In accordance with Notice which had been circulated to the Members of the Council:

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Everett, T.D.;

Seconded by Councillor R. Miley:

Resolved—That we, the Members of Wicklow County Council, hereby instruct the County Manager to issue Town Planning approval for the erection of eighty-four bedrooms and bathrooms to be built at "Rockfield House," Ballinacarrig, Co. Wicklow, as described in Plans submitted on behalf of Rockfield, Ltd.,

Members spoke in favour of the Resolution and expressed surprise that permission should have been refused for the development of a Hotel at "Rockfield House," which represented a very big investment and appeared to be a very desirable development in the area. It was suggested that the local Members might be consulted before a decision was made to refuse permission for new developments. The Deputy County Manager stated that Members who had spoken seemed to be under a misunderstanding in regard to the proposal and the decision on the matter. The Council's Officers had not and did not oppose the project of a Hotel, together with these bedroom blocks, at "Rockfield," which it was agreed was a desirable development, and in fact had advised and helped the applicant in regard to the development generally. The point at issue in the matter was the exact siting of the bedroom blocks, which on the Plan submitted were shown as being sited on the highest point of the site. When the Council's Architect had visited the site in September, 1965, prior to the submission of Plans for this part of the project, he had discussed the matter with the owner's representative and had pointed out the objections to the siting of the bedroom blocks at this particular part of the site and had suggested an alternative siting which it was felt would be more suitable and more convenient and would avoid the objections to the siting proposed. The Council's Technical Officers considered that the siting of these buildings in the location proposed would dominate the surrounding countryside as they would be located on the highest contour of the entire site, which overlooked the whole of the Northern Brittas Bay Area and did not partake of the natural screening and shelter available in the nearby wooded hollow, and that this exposed location would be damaging to the scenic character and amenities of the area. It was considered also that the proposed buildings would not relate with the existing development and would have a haphazard sprawling effect rather than that of a compact grouping or cluster. It was further considered that due to the steeply falling slope of the

site at this point away from the public road to the foreshore and beaches, the view of the foreshore and beaches from the public road would be obliterated by the expanse of roof presented. While at present there was a high wall bounding the property at this point, it was felt desirable that the buildings should be so sited that the wall could be lowered or removed and replaced with railings or post-and-rail fencing, so as to provide a better view of the Bay from the public road. It was felt that it would be deplorable if the opening up of this view should be prevented by the erection of a large structure at this point. The Deputy County Manager pointed out also that the original Plans, which were the subject of an Appeal to the Minister, involved the erection of blocks containing a total of fifty-six bedrooms, but the Plans submitted on the 6th inst. showed two additional blocks, bringing the total of bedrooms to eighty-three. The County Engineer was not prepared to approve of the siting of the six blocks containing eighty-three bedrooms in all, shown on the Site Plan now under consideration and submitted on 6th June, 1966. He suggested that since the disagreement between Council's Technical Officers and the representatives of the developers was restricted only to this matter of the siting of the blocks that it would be reasonable that the decision in the matter be made by the Minister. Councillor Gregory stated that the Appeal which had been submitted to the Minister had been withdrawn.

The Motion having been put to the Council was declared passed unanimously.

Item No. 8—Revision of Remuneration of Roadworkers and Officers—Applications from Unions.

The County Secretary stated that applications had been received from the Irish Transport and General Workers' Union and from the Federation of Rural Workers applying for an increase of £1 per week for their members employed by the Council. An application had also been received from the Staff Panel under the Scheme of Conciliation and Arbitration for Officers of Local Authorities for an increase of £1 per week for Officers, but it was suggested that this matter might be deferred as negotiations were still proceeding. The Deputy County Manager pointed out that the increase of £1 per week had been agreed in respect of the Building Industry with effect from 1st June, 1966, and suggested that the Council might consider applying the same date for an increase to Roadworkers. The increase to Agricultural Workers operated as from the 6th June, 1966. The Deputy County Manager also stated that he understood that an offer of an increase in wages by 20/- a week, with effect from 1st June, 1966, by Dublin County Council, had been accepted by the Union on the understanding that representations for an earlier date of operation would be considered should it be possible for the Unions to establish same. In reply to Councillor J. Temple, the Deputy County Manager stated that the application of the Irish Transport and General Workers' Union was dated the 28th April, 1966, and was received on 2nd May, 1966.

Seconded by Councillor J. D. Haughton;

Resolved—That we approve of the payment of an increase of £1 per week in remuneration to all Roadworkers employed by the Council, with effect from 1st May, 1966, subject to the sanction of the Minister, and hereby authorise the necessary expenditure in excess of the amount provided in the current year's Estimates to defray the cost of the payment of the increased remuneration in the present year.

Resolved—That the increase to Roadworkers operate from 1st June, 1963.

Following a discussion on the matter Councillor H. J. Byrne, with the agreement of Councillor A. H. Hadden, withdrew his amendment and the Resolution proposed by Councillor J. Temple and seconded by Councillor J. D. Haughton was declared passed unanimously.

In reply to inquiries from Members, the Deputy County Manager stated that the cost of applying the increase in respect of Roadworkers would amount to about £16,000. No provision had been made in the Estimates to meet this cost and if the Council were to keep within the amounts provided in the Estimates it would involve a reduction in the extent of work that could be carried out and a restriction in

employment. Excess expenditure over the Estimates would have to be met in the Estimates for the coming financial year.

Item No. 9—Report of Local Government Auditor on Audit of Accounts of the Council for Two Years Ended 31st March, 1965.

Copy of the Auditor's Report has been circulated to the Members of the Council and the Audited Accounts were submitted.

Item No. 10—Greystones Harbour—Letter from Bórd Fáilte in Reply to Application for Grant.

The County Secretary stated that Bórd Fáilte Eireann had indicated that they regretted they could not make any Grant towards improvement works at Greystones Harbour, which had been authorised by the Council, and which were estimated to cost £920. The Board, however, stated that they would contribute towards the Consultant's Fees and Expenses, which had been agreed at £550.

Seconded by Councillor H. B. Hipwell;

Resolved—That we note letter from Bórd Fáilte in relation to the Council's application for a Grant in respect of works at Greystones Harbour and ask that the Board meet the full cost of the Fees and Expenses payable to the Consulting Engineers in respect of the Survey and Report on the Harbour.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 11—Blessington Courthouse—Report of County Engineer on Repairs Needed and Letter from Agents of Owners.

The County Secretary stated that in letter of 27th April, 1966, from Department of Justice, it had been indicated that the District Justice had found it necessary to bring the inadequacy of the accommodation in the Courthouse to the notice of the Department. Complaint was made of the temperature of the Courtroom being uncomfortably low and it was stated that the heaters installed were not adequate and that the heating which was provided was counteracted by constant draughts from defective windows. It was pointed out also that no seating was provided for the public in the body of the Court and that attention had been drawn to the fact that the roof was not weatherproof. It was pointed out by the Department that primary responsibility for the provision and maintenance of suitable Courthouse accommodation was imposed on the Council by the Court-houses (Provision and Maintenance) Act, 1935, and that the Council should arrange to carry out whatever work was necessary. A reply had been sent to the Department of Justice pointing out that the building in question was not owned by the Council and that the external repairs required were being brought to the notice of the owners. A copy of the Resolution passed by the Council at the Meeting held on 13th September, 1965, in which the views of the Council on the maintenance of buildings required for Court purposes were indicated, had been forwarded to the Department. It was pointed out that Local Authorities had no functions in relation to the direct administration of justice nowadays, but had many functions relating

to Health, Housing, Roads, etc., and for these reasons the Council considered the maintenance of this and other Courthouses should be the responsibility of the Department of Justice. In regard to the repairs required the County Engineer had estimated the total cost at £171, of which the cost of external repairs was reckoned at £18. Improvements included were estimated to cost £20 in respect of a concrete block wall in the porch and a door in the porch, and the provision of a draught curtain at £6, while the provision of a Store in the porch would also be an improvement. The items of repair required externally had been brought to the notice of the Agents for the owners and particulars of their reply dated 3rd June, 1966, were submitted to the Council. The Council noted that the annual rent being paid by the Council was only £9, and having regard to the small amount of rent being received by the owners:

Passed—Councillors Temple and Deering dissenting.

The Council indicated, however, that the position in regard to the possibility of an increase in rent and the liability of the Council in carrying out external repairs be examined by the Council's Law Agent.

Item No. 12—Report of Visit to Peamount Hospital by Councillors Miss M. Walsh and Mrs. M. Ledwidge.

The Report which had been submitted to the Council at a previous Meeting and deferred for the attendance of Councillor J. Everett, T.D., was re-submitted. Councillor J. Everett, T.D., again complained of delays which he alleged had occurred in the supply of clothing to two patients. The County Secretary gave details of the clothing supplied and the dates on which they were ordered and delivered. Councillor Hipwell referred to the time which had elapsed between the ordering of an overcoat for a patient and its despatch to the patient, and suggested that if such delays were occurring in the supply of goods from any particular supplier that the matter should be reported to the Combined Purchasing Section of the Department of Local Government. Councillor Hadden stated that a person who he considered was well qualified to judge had informed him that Peamount Hospital was one of the best conducted hospitals in the country.

Item No. 13—Maintenance and Treatment of Patients in Dublin Health Authority Institutions—Revision of Charges.

The County Secretary stated that the Council had received notice from the Dublin Health Authority of their proposal to increase the rates of charges for maintenance of patients in their Institutions with effect from 1st April, 1966, to bring the rates of charge in certain cases up to the same level as the charge approved in respect of Dublin Hospitals. The extra cost involved in the current financial year would be approximately £3,500.

Seconded by Councillor H. B. Hipwell;

Resolved—That we approve of the payment of the revised rates of charges proposed by the Dublin Health Authority for the maintenance and treatment of patients admitted to their Institutions, with effect from 1st April, 1966, and hereby authorise expenditure of £3,500 in excess of the amount provided in the current year's Estimates to

defray the cost of the increase in the charges.
Passed unanimously.

Item No. 14—Clinic at Killarney Road, Bray—Provision of Pram Shelter and Toilets.

The following letter from the Department of Health was submitted:
H. 33/32/1. Bealtaine, 1966.

A Chara,

I am directed by the Minister for Health to refer to your letter of 4th April, 1966, and enclosures, regarding the proposed extension to the Clinic at Killarney Road, Bray, and to state that, in view of the present need for economy, it would be imprudent to proceed with the extension as proposed. Furthermore, the accommodation at present used by the District Medical Officers and Pharmacist will no longer be required when the proposed General Medical Service with choice of doctor is introduced. This accommodation, at that stage, would appear to be adequate to provide any additional space required for other clinics.

With regard to the provision of a pram shelter and toilets for children and adults attending the Clinic, it is suggested that the health authority should consider providing these facilities in a relatively small extension to the Clinic. I am to request that the health authority reconsider, on this basis, the proposed scheme of additional accommodation and other works at the Clinic.

The County Secretary stated that Plans had now been received from the Council's Consulting Engineer for the construction of a static water storage tank for St. Colman's Hospital, Rathdrum, and that this work would be part of the general Scheme for Improvements at St. Colman's Hospital. The Plans had been submitted to the Department for approval. The estimated cost of the work was £3,500.

Resolved—That we approve of Tenders being invited for the construction of a Static Water Storage Tank for St. Colman's Hospital, Rathdrum, in accordance with Plans prepared by a Consulting Engineer, and hereby authorise the borrowing of a sum of £3,500 from the Commissioners of Public Works, repayable over a period of twenty-five years, to defray the cost of the work.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 16—Sheep Dipping Scheme—Provision of New Dipping Baths.

The County Secretary stated that Mr. James Balfe of Kylebeg, Lacken, Blessington, had written to state that he was agreeable to allow the Council to acquire an area of his land for the erection of a Sheep Dipping Bath which was needed in the area, but indicated that he would be expecting £100 or thereabouts for the quarter-acre of land. The County Secretary stated that the price seemed excessive for a quarter-acre of land in that area.

Proposed by Councillor J. Miley;

Seconded by Councillor H. B. Hipwell;

Resolved—That we approve of the purchase of site from Mr. Balfe, Lacken, for sum of £100.

Passed unanimously.

The County Secretary stated that the County Engineer had been asked to arrange for an inspection of the site as regards its suitability. Councillor J. Miley stated that a water supply was available adjoining the site. In reply to inquiries from Members, the County Secretary stated that arrangements were being made for repairs to Sheep Dipping Baths at Bracken's, Johnstown; Harmon's, Ballingule; at Coolahullen, Threewells and Aughavannagh, and that the County Engineer had been asked to report in regard to proposed improvements to Mr. Mitten's Bath at Sleamaine, Roundwood, or alternatively, the provision of a new Bath at this place. The Department of Defence had agreed to make available a site at Cannow, Glen of Imaal, for a Dipping Bath, but the site would involve the improvement of a Bridge giving access to it and the County Engineer had been asked for an estimate of the cost of this work as well as the erection of the new Bath.

Resignation of Mr. P. T. Hickey, Assistant County Engineer.

Councillor H. B. Hipwell referred to the resignation with effect from 11th May, 1966, of Mr. P. T. Hickey, Assistant County Engineer, and proposed (seconded by Councillor H. J. Byrne);

That we place on record our appreciation of work done by Mr. P. T. Hickey, Assistant County Engineer, and regret his leaving the service of the Council.

Passed unanimously.

Development at "The Quill," Kilmacanogue.

Councillor H. B. Hipwell referred to representations received from persons living at Glencap Commons in regard to development taking place, or about to take place, at "The Quill," Kilmacanogue. The residents were concerned at damage being caused, and likely to be caused, to the road due to heavy traffic. The County Secretary stated that the land in question was owned by Mr. Ambrose Stephens of Kilmacanogue, and that some while ago it had been noted that a sign had been erected offering plots for sale on his lands. Mr. Stephens' attention had been directed to the fact that no permission had been granted by the Council for any development on his lands. Following receipt of further representations from residents in the area and an inspection by the Council's Architect, a letter had been addressed to Mr. Stephens again pointing out that permission had not been granted for any development on his lands and that, furthermore, there would be objections to development at this place for the following reasons:
(a) the subsoil was rocky and unsuitable for drainage by means of

septic tanks and no public sewage disposal system was available, and on public health grounds, therefore, there was grave objection to development through building or the placing of other structures on the land; (b) the approach road to the land was too restricted to serve any development; and (c) development by way of housing weekend cottages or use of land for Caravan Sites would be injurious to the character and amenities of the district.

Item No. 17—Inquiries Arising from County Manager's Orders.

The Council noted the particulars of County Manager's Orders which had been circulated to the Members.

Superannuation Allowance to Dr. Clearkin.

Councillor J. Miley stated that no payment had been made to Dr. J. Clearkin of his Superannuation Allowance and asked that arrangements be made for payment of this without further delay. The Deputy County Manager pointed out that Dr. Clearkin still continued to occupy the Dispensary Residence at Blessington and had refused to surrender possession, which he was required to do on the termination of his appointment. The Council were taking legal action to recover possession. The Acting Dispensary Medical Officer in Blessington was being handicapped by not having the Dispensary Residence available to him and it was felt that Dr. Clearkin was acting most unreasonable in the matter.

Item No. 4—House Destroyed by Fire at Ballinacrow, Stratford-On-Slaney: Reports of County Engineer and Chief Medical Officer.

The Council noted the Report of the County Engineer in which he indicated that the cost of providing a prefabricated house at Drummin, Ballinglen, was £1,042, and allowing for cost of preparation of site the estimate for providing a similar prefabricated timber house at Ballinacrow would be £1,100. It was noted from the Report of the County Medical Officer that it was accepted that Mr. O'Brien was in need of re-housing, but he considered it was not a matter of immediate urgency. Members of the Council having pointed out that Mr. O'Brien would prefer, if possible, to reconstruct his existing house, which had been badly damaged by fire, the Council agreed to defer the matter to enable the County Engineer to report as to the possibility of reconstructing the existing house.

Item No. 5—Application for Transfer of Tenancy of Cottage at Ballymorris, Aughrim, to Mr. John O'Brien.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 2—Scholarship in Secondary, Vocational and other Approved Schools, 1967, and University Scholarships, 1967 — Letter from Department of Education re Schemes for 1967.

The Circular Letter dated 30th June, 1966, from the Department of Education (Primary Branch) was submitted. The County Secretary stated that the effect of the change in income limits to be made in the Schemes for 1967 was to increase the limit in the case of Scholarships in Secondary, Vocational and Other Approved Schools from £800 to £1,000 and the allowance in respect of each child from £50 to £60. The limit of rateable valuation was increased from £50 to £60 and the allowance of valuation in respect of each additional child from £5 to £6. In the case of the University Scholarship Scheme the limit was increased from £1,200 to £1,400, the allowance in respect of each additional child from £75 to £90, the rateable valuation limit from £75 to £90, and the allowances in valuation in respect of each additional child from £7 10s. to £9. It was indicated in Circular that during 1967 and subsequent years Roman type would be used exclusively in setting of the examination papers in the Irish Language in the Post-Primary Scholarships. The Council discussed a suggestion that a Scholarship or Scholarships might be reserved for students attending one and two-teacher schools, but decided that in view of the results achieved by smaller schools in recent years that there appeared to be no necessity to make such reservation.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Miley;

Seconded by Councillor G. Timmins:

Resolved—That having considered letter of 30th June, 1966, from Department of Education we approve of the adoption of Schemes of Scholarships for Secondary, Vocational and Other Approved Schools, and for Universities, on similar terms to the Schemes adopted in respect of the year 1966, but subject to the amendment of the provisions in regard to income and valuation limits so as to correspond with the new limits approved by the Department of Education in their letter of 30th June, 1966.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 3—Scholarship Scheme—Letter from Educational Building Society re Scheme for "1916 Commemoration Scholarships."

Details of the "1916 Commemoration Scholarships" to be provided by the Educational Building Society, Westmoreland Street, Dublin, 2, were submitted to the Council. The Council noted that the Scholarships would be awarded on the results of the Examination for Post-

Primary Scholarships and would be of a value of £50 and tenable for a similar period at the Council's Scholarships.

Item No. 4—Application for Closing of Road at Wicklow on 1st August, 1966.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Miley;

Seconded by Councillor J. D. Haughton:

Resolved—That we hereby close to public traffic the road described hereunder on Monday, 1st August, 1966, between the hours of 12 o'clock noon and 5.30 p.m. in connection with the Wicklow Regatta:

"Portion of Road No. L29B across the Bridge known as the 'Stone Bridge' over the Leitrim River, in the Urban District of Wicklow, and from the said Bridge to the North end of Leitrim Place, in the said Urban District."

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 5—Application for Taking Over Road at Newtownmountkennedy as a Public Road.

The County Secretary stated that representations had been received from Rev. Fr. Gallagher, C.C., Newtownmountkennedy, that the road which served Schools, Presbytery, Parish Hall and the Council Dump at Newtownmountkennedy should be taken over for maintenance as a Public Road. The County Engineer had reported that the road was 320 ft. long, 33 ft. wide between fences, with a 15 ft. carriageway, and that the cost of putting the road in a proper state of repair was £80, and the annual cost of maintenance £15. The road served two Schools, Presbytery, Parish Hall and an avenue leading to one house, and also served the Newtown G.A.A. pitch and the Council Dump. The County Engineer considered that from a public utility point of view taking over the road would be justifiable, but pointed out that extra funds would need to be provided for the taking over and maintaining of the road. The Council decided that the matter be referred for consideration by the Members of the Council for the Wicklow Electoral Area when considering the Road Works Programme for the current year.

Item No. 6—Notice of Motion in Name of Councillor J. Whelan for Taking Over and Repairing Road leading to Mrs. M. J. Lott's residence at Kilmacoo, Avoca.

In accordance with Notice of Motion Councillor Whelan proposed that this road be taken over. The County Secretary stated that the Council's Engineer had reported that the road was not maintained by the Council, but had been repaired under a minor Employment Scheme in the 1930's. To put it in proper order and surface-dress

it would cost about £800 and the road served three persons. If the Council considered taking it over the necessary additional moneys would need to be provided as the funds available for maintenance were sufficient only to keep in repair roads already maintained by the Council. The Council decided to refer the matter for consideration by the Members of the Council for the Arklow Electoral Area when considering the Road Works Programme for the current year.

Item No. 7—Notice of Motion in Name of Councillor J. Miley: "That Road at Manor Kilbride (the Banks Road) be taken over by this Council, now constructed to the standard required by the County Engineer."

Councillor J. Miley stated that the road had been put in proper order and urged that the Council now agree to take it over.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Miley;

Seconded by Councillor G. Timmins;

Resolved—That the necessary public notice be given of the Council's intention to take over as a public road the road at Manor Kilbride known as the "Banks Road."

Passed unanimously.

It was agreed that before the road was taken over the County Engineer be satisfied that the road was in a satisfactory state of repair. The County Secretary pointed out that it would be necessary to provide the moneys required for surface-dressing of the road in the current financial year.

Item No. 8—Notice of Motion in Name of Councillor J. D. Haughton: "That Road from Red Pegs via Blackhill to Glenealy be taken over by the Council."

The County Secretary stated that the length of road involved, which varied in width from 9 ft. to 13 ft. carriageway and 24 ft. between hedges, was 2.2 miles. The cost of reconstructing the road to put it in a condition for taking over was estimated by the County Engineer at £4,237 and the annual cost of maintenance would be £140. The County Engineer had reported that the road was in a very bad state of repair and required drainage and strengthening before it could be surfaced. There were five houses along the road and it was estimated that the number of users would be twenty. Councillor Haughton stated that there were three Council cottages on the road and that Rates amounting to £336 13s. were paid in respect of lands beside the road. The Council agreed to refer the matter to the Members of the Council for the Wicklow Electoral Area when considering the Road Works Programme for the current year.

Item No. 9—Notice of Motion in Name of Councillor J. Gregory: "That Accommodation Road leading to Council Cottages at Kilpedder be completed and that concrete stakes erected on this road be removed immediately."

Councillor Gregory stated that when land was being acquired for the improvement of the road between Kilpedder and Newtownmountkennedy tenants of the cottages at Kilpedder had been told by the former County Engineer that the new access road to be provided would have access on to the Main Road at both the northern and southern ends. Recently concrete stakes had been erected at the

southern end of the road and he asked that these be removed and the southern access to the Main Road provided. He stated that lorries or vans going to the cottages had no place for turning and that it was dangerous for children due to the lorries having to back down the access road. The County Engineer stated that he was unable to trace any Agreement that a southern access be provided and felt that the making of an additional access on to the improved road would not be approved by the Department of Local Government. He suggested that a turning point could be provided at the end of the present road to obviate the difficulty referred to by Councillor Gregory.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Gregory;

Seconded by Councillor J. D. Haughton;

Resolved—That accommodation road leading to Council cottages at Kilpedder be completed and that concrete posts erected on this road be removed immediately.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 10—Report of Technical Committee on Revision of Speed Limits.

The County Secretary stated that the Technical Committee (representative of the Superintendents of the Gardai for Districts in the County and the County Engineer and his Assistants) had met on the 4th July, 1966, to consider the matter of Speed Limits on roads in the County. The Committee had examined the existing Speed Limits in the following places and had decided that they were satisfactory and no changes were required:—

Baltinglass, Blessington, Tinahely, Carnew, Shillelagh, Auglinn, Ashford, Greystones, and Newtownmountkennedy.

The introduction of Speed Limits in respect of the following places was considered, but it was decided that no Speed Limit was necessary at present:—

Dunlavin, Donard, Rathdrum, Brittas Bay, Rathnew, Kilcoole, Newcastle and Enniskerry.

In the case of Kilmacanogue it was reported that there had been a lengthy discussion on the possible value of Speed Limit Signs at this place, but that the Committee agreed that no Sign was warranted, at least for the present. The following revisions of Speed Limits were recommended in respect of Bray and Wicklow:

Bray: That the position of the existing 30 m.p.h. Speed Limit Sign be amended so as to include the junction of the Upper and Lower Dargle Roads within the 30 m.p.h. area.

Wicklow: That the existing Speed Limit Sign on the Dublin Road be moved towards Rathnew sufficiently to include the entrance to Vocational School, the exact location to be decided on the site by the Council. It was agreed also that repeater Signs for 30 m.p.h. be erected on the Dunbur Road leading to the Silver Strand. As no representative from the Gorey Garda District was present at the Meeting no action was taken in relation to Arklow and the County Engineer had arranged to contact the Superintendent for that Area and to report further.

On the proposal of Councillor M. Deering, seconded by Councillor M. J. O'Neill, the Council recommended that Speed Limits be applied

at Dunlavin and Donard. On the proposal of Councillor H. B. Hipwell, seconded by Councillor Mrs. M. Ledwidge, the Council agreed that a 30 m.p.h. Speed Limit be applied at Enniskerry; and on the proposal of Councillor H. J. Byrne, seconded by Councillor H. B. Hipwell, it was agreed that a 40 m.p.h. Speed Limit be imposed on the section of Arterial Road T.7 at Kilmacanogue for a distance of a quarter of a mile on either side of the 'T' junction with the road leading to Roundwood and Glendalough.

The Council approved otherwise of the recommendation of the Technical Committee.

Item No. 11—Capital Allocations for 1966/'67 in respect of Sanitary and Miscellaneous Services—Letter from Department of Local Government.

The following letter from the Department of Local Government had been circulated to the Members:—

**Sanitary and Miscellaneous Services
Capital Allocations 1966/'67.**

A Chara,

1. I am directed by the Minister for Local Government to State that commitments, arising on works already in progress or completed, will have priority in the distribution of the capital available in 1966/'67 for the financing of Sanitary and Miscellaneous Service.

2. In the case of urban areas, the allocation being made is designed to meet in full balance carried forward from 1965/'66 and the estimated expenditure falling due within the current year. In rural areas, however, the amounts allocated have been abated to keep the expenditure within the limits of the over-all provision for capital purposes, but, in general, the allocation should be sufficient to meet expenditure arising within the year, subject to a normal carry-over into 1967/'68 in respect of schemes financed from the Local Loans Fund.

3. As pointed out in this Department's circular letter (Housing) of the 22nd March, 1966, it will be necessary in all cases to finance approximately 10% of the capital allocation from sources other than the Local Loans Fund.

4. The progress of expenditure on schemes should be examined monthly and should any savings occur it will be open to the local authority concerned to propose new sanitary services schemes to absorb such savings.

5. In addition to the moneys now being allocated the Minister will be prepared to consider applications, within the total amount of capital available to him, for approval to loans to be raised from sources outside the Local Loans Fund to finance schemes of supplementary grants for the provision of water and sewerage facilities and,

to a limited extent, for extensions of main or other works which are urgently needed. Works of this kind may be selected from among those at present before the Department or they may be new proposals. Subsidy at the usual rate will be available in appropriate cases towards the repayment of any such loans raised.

6. Pending a general reassessment of the position later in the year and in view of the level of expenditure estimated to arise on sanitary services and other works currently on hands it will not be possible to approve of new works, except as indicated in paragraphs 4 and 5 above.

7. The allocations in respect of sanitary services and other miscellaneous works in respect of the local authorities within your administrative area are as follows:

The County Secretary stated that the amount of the allocation would be scarcely sufficient to meet the outlay on Schemes at present in progress. The Blessington Water Supply Scheme would require about £35,000 to meet the costs which would be incurred on the Scheme within the present financial year and a further £1,700 would be required for the balance of the Kilcoole/Knockroe Water Supply Scheme. In addition the Scheme for the Sewerage Outfall at the South Beach, Greystones, would cost £6,920. This gave a total of £43,620. In consequence it would not be possible within the allocation to proceed with any of the other Water Supply Schemes which had been approved by the Council. The Council noted the position in regard to the moneys available for Capital Works on Sanitary and Miscellaneous Services in the present year.

Item No. 12—Provisional Development Plans for Greystones-Delgany and Rathdrum.

The County Secretary stated that the Provisional Development Plans for the Scheduled Towns of Greystones/Delgany and Rathdrum were ready for submission to the Council and copies of the Plans were being circulated to the Members at the Meeting. Copies of the Map in relation to the Greystones/Delgany Scheme would be forwarded to the Members during the next week. It was suggested that the Members of the Council for the Bray Area and the Members for the Wicklow Area would first consider the Development Plans and that the Plans be then considered by the Council at their next Meeting. The County Secretary stated that the Provisional Plan for the County was likely to be available for the Members of the Council for the August Meeting. The Council agreed that the Development Plans be considered by the local Members at their Meeting prior to the next Council Meeting.

Meeting of Committees of Members of the Council for the four electoral Areas.

It was decided by the Council that Meetings be held of the Members of the Council for the respective Electoral Areas to consider the

Road Works Programme for the current financial year and to consider the Provisional Development Plans for Greystones/Delgany (Bray Electoral Area) and Rathdrum (Wicklow Electoral Area). It was decided that Meetings be held as follows:—

For the Members of the Council for the Bray Electoral Area and for the Wicklow Electoral Area: At 2.30 p.m. on Monday, 18th July, 1966, at the Council Chamber, Kilmantin Hill, Wicklow.

For the Members of the Council for the Arklow Electoral Area: At Shillelagh on Monday, 25th July, 1966, at 3.30 p.m.

For the Members of the Council for the Baltinglass Electoral Area: At Baltinglass on Thursday, 21st July, 1966, at 3.00 p.m.

The County Manager stated that particulars of the proposed improvements to the Arterial Road between Bray and Arklow would be available for the Members at the Meeting on the following Monday.

Item No. 13—Letter from Aughrim Development Committee re Flooding and Housing Scheme.

The Council considered letter of 4th July, 1966, from the Hon. Secretary, Aughrim Development Association, in regard to the flooding at Aughrim during the past year and also in regard to the Housing Scheme for Aughrim. The County Secretary stated that the reply received from the Office of Public Works to the Council's request that a survey be carried out on the river at Aughrim to deal with the matter of flooding had been submitted to the Council at their Meeting in February, 1966, and had been reported in the press at the time. The Parliamentary Secretary to the Minister had indicated that the functions of the Commissioners in relation to Arterial Drainage Works were derived solely from the Arterial Drainage Act, 1945, and that following the passing of the Act catchment areas throughout the country which were thought to be most in need of drainage were listed in order of priority. Of the Rivers mentioned by the Council only the Slaney (including the Derry) was so listed and that was No. 28 on the Priority List. The Parliamentary Secretary stated that both the Survey and Operation Staff of the Commissioners were fully committed on very urgent works throughout the country and that in the circumstances it was not possible to accede to the Council's request to undertake the Surveys which had been mentioned and which included the River at Aughrim. The County Engineer reported that in his view it would be necessary to remove the weir at Aughrim to relieve flooding, but that while the removal of the weir might relieve the flooding at Aughrim it might cause flooding of land downstream and would also mean that the existing Mills could no longer be worked by water powered from the millrace.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Quigley;

Seconded by Councillor Miss M. Walsh:

Resolved—That a Consultant be engaged for survey of flooding at Aughrim.

Passed unanimously.

In regard to the Housing Scheme at Aughrim the Council had decided in September, 1961, to proceed with the Scheme for erecting four houses at Aughrim and the number had subsequently been increased to six, and Plans for the Scheme were submitted in January, 1962, but approval to the Plans was not available until November, 1964. Tenders had then been invited and the lowest of the three Tenders received was accepted and sanction obtained in May, 1965, but some months later the lowest tenderer informed the Council that he was not prepared to enter into the Contract and in consequence further Tenders were invited. Only one Tender was received and since this was not complete it was necessary to re-advertise and finally a Tender was accepted in February, 1966, and sanction received from the Department of Local Government in June, 1966. The Contractor had been informed immediately and requested to submit details of his Insurance Bond and the Council's Solicitor had been instructed to arrange for the completion of the Contract Documents. It was expected, therefore, that the Scheme for the erection of the six houses could commence very shortly. The Council noted the position in the matter.

Item No. 14—Creation of Additional Post of Public Health Nurse.

The County Secretary stated that the Fr. Healy Nursing Association, Bray, had terminated their activities with effect as from 1st May, 1966, and the County Medical Officer had recommended that an additional post of Public Health Nurse, with District Nursing duties, be created in order to serve the area. It was intended to assign the person to be appointed to the Bray Dispensary District. The former Jubilee Nurse attached to the Association was being employed by the Council temporarily.

The County Manager referred to letter dated 27th July, 1966, received from L. M. Cullen, Hon. Secretary, Little Bray Residents' Association, concerning the carrying out of a Survey of the Dargle River and County Brook area which had been the subject of flooding in recent months. The Association sought an assurance that the needs of residents in that area would receive full consideration when the Survey was being made and that steps would be taken to ensure the implementation of the recommendations of the Consultant when his Report was received. Councillor J. Temple stated that this matter was considered at Meetings of the Bray Urban District Council and on the proposal of Mrs. Ledwidge it was decided to adjourn consideration of the correspondence pending the submission of Report by the Consultant.

Item No. 15—Water Supply for North-East Wicklow—Interim Report of Consultant.

The County Manager presented the Interim Report of the Consultant, Mr. John B. Barry, B.E., on the proposed Regional Water Supply for North-East Wicklow. He pointed out the extent of the Scheme, the area to be served, and the Consultant's recommendation regarding the utilising of the Dargle River for supply purposes. It was stated that the Consultant in his Interim Report estimated that a maximum supply of 1½ million gallons per day could be made available and would be adequate to serve the environs of Bray, Kilmacanogue, and Gréystones areas. The estimated cost of this Scheme was indicated as £265,000, 50% of which would be recoupable by the Council.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Temple;

Seconded by Councillor H. B. Hipwell:

Resolved—That we approve of recommendations of Consultant for Water Supply for North-East Wicklow.

Passed unanimously.

It was decided that a Report of the County Engineer dated 22nd August, 1966, which summarises the investigations and recommendations of the Consultant be circularised to the Members and that the proposals regarding the Scheme be discussed at a Special Meeting of the County Council to be held on Monday, the 29th August, 1966.

Item No. 16—County Planning Scheme.

The Council agreed that a Special Meeting be held on Monday, 29th August, 1966, at 2.30 p.m. for the purpose of discussing the County Planning Scheme, copies of which had been circulated to each Member of the Council.

Item No. 17—Application of Nitrigin Eireann for Construction of New Road from Ferrybank to serve their Factory at Shelton, Arklow.

The County Manager referred to an application which had been made by Messrs. Nitrigin Eireann Teo., Arklow, to the County Council requesting that the County Road leading from Ferrybank in the direc-

tion of Shelton Abbey might be widened and improved and that the continuation of the road which is not in public charge might be taken over by the County Council and improved. The Company also asked that a new length of roadway might be constructed within the boundary of the lands owned by the Company. Nitrigin Eireann, Ltd., would be importing large supplies of Sulphur through Arklow Port and if the large heavy trucks of the Company were to use the Main Street through Arklow grave traffic difficulties and hazards would occur. Consequently, it was felt that it would be in the public interest to have an alternative route to the factory via Ferrybank, thus obviating the use of the Main Street in Arklow.

A Report of the County Engineer dated 12th August, 1966, was submitted to the Members in which it was estimated that the total cost of the work involved would be £17,020. This amount would cover the cost of improving the total length of road for a distance of 2,900 yards. The County Engineer considered that in view of the extent of the heavy traffic proposed and the additional traffic hazard which would be created through Arklow that a Special Grant should be obtainable from the Department of Local Government. The County Engineer stated that a detailed Survey would have to be carried out along the proposed route and recommended that a Consultant be appointed.

Resolved—That we approve of the Report of County Engineer for the construction of a new access road to the factory of Nitrigin Eireann Teo. at Shelton, Arklow, and request a Grant from the Road Fund, or other State Grants, to meet the cost involved, estimated at £17,020.

The County Manager informed the Members that the allowance at present made to foster-parents for the care and maintenance of boarded-out children was £55 per annum and that this allowance operated as from 1st April, 1964. A clothing allowance per child of from £9 to £13, depending on age, was also provided. Councillor Miss Walsh considered that foster-parents were fulfilling an urgent need in looking after these children and since rising costs were the order at present these foster-parents should also be paid an additional amount per child.

Resolved—That we approve an increase in allowances to £5 per month in respect of boarded-out children.

Councillor Miss Walsh stated that the present dumping ground at Tinahely constituted a danger to public health and she considered that an alternative dumping ground should be sought. The Council's Engineer in a Report dated 2nd August, 1966, stated that the present dumping ground at Tinahely had only capacity for dumping for a further 1½ years and that there was no suitable site readily available in the area for a new dumping ground. Councillor Miss Walsh was of opinion that a new dumping ground could be obtained on a site the property of a Mr. O'Toole at Lugduff, Tinahely. It was requested that the Engineer would consult with the owner of this site at Lugduff, and submit a report for the next Meeting of the County Council.

Item No. 21—Report of County Engineer on Inspection of House at Ballinacrow, Stratford-on-Slaney, Destroyed by Fire.

A Report dated 19th August, 1966, from the County Engineer was submitted and he considered that the estimated cost of reconstructing the dwellinghouse of Mr. Timothy O'Brien at Ballinacrow, Stratford-on-Slaney, which was recently destroyed by fire would be £850. It was indicated that this was a three-roomed house and was not the property of the County Council. Councillor G. Timmins inquired if the Council could contribute in any way towards the cost of re-erection of the dwellinghouse and the County Manager pointed out that a Grant might be available but such Grant would be small in view of the fact that it was a three-roomed house. Councillor Timmins also stated that efforts were being made locally to organise functions, contributions, etc., to assist in financing the reconstruction of the dwellinghouse. It was agreed by the Members that when proposals were submitted by the owner, Mr. Timothy O'Brien, regarding the reconstruction of the house the Council's Engineer would examine the proposals and would submit a report.

Item No. 1.—Ambulance Service.

The Co. Manager stated that from the discussion at the previous Meeting it appeared that it was held by a Member of the Council that the Council had purchased Ambulances recently which were unsuitable or were in some way defective and he wished to make it quite clear that this suggestion was incorrect. Provision had been made in the Estimates for 1965/66 for the purchase of two Ambulances and Specifications were prepared by the County Engineer and the Chief Assistant and approved by the County Medical Officer. The Specification was forwarded to the Department of Local Government, who had indicated that Ambulances were no longer on the Combined Purchasing List, and the Department also stated that the Specification was acceptable and that there was no objection to the Council's ordering two Ambulances to conform to the Specification. Following receipt of Quotations and the examination of Tenders the Tender of Messrs. P. Ryan and Co., Ringsend, Dublin, was accepted for the supply of two Ambulances. Delivery was not effected until May and June of the present year and the two Ambulances had been in service since they were received, one at Wicklow and the other at Rathdrum, and both had proved quite satisfactory. The County Manager stated that during the month of May he was in the Department of Health and it was suggested to him that he might inspect a new prototype Ambulance which had been supplied to the Department that day for inspection. As he felt that the new Ambulance (known as an "Appleyard" Ambulance) had certain special features, such as stretchers on retractable wheels and undercarriage, and selective springing, he arranged for the Ambulance to be inspected by the County Engineer and by the Chief Medical Officer and on their recommendation an Order was placed for one of this new type of Ambulance. The Ambulance had not yet been delivered. Provision had been made in the current year's Estimates for the purchase of an Ambulance, which it had been intended to station at Baltinglass, but he felt that having regard to the special features of the "Appleyard" Ambulance it appeared to be more suitable for dealing with accident cases and, consequently, should be stationed at Wicklow to serve the North-East area, where, unfortunately, the greater number of road accidents occurred. Councillor Timmins pointed out that in the County Manager's Order for the purchase of the new Ambulance it had been indicated that the Ambulance be stationed at Baltinglass and in view

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of the special springing system he felt it would be most suitable for stationing at Baltinglass in the area where there were many miles of poor surfaced roads.

It was

Proposed by Councillor G. Timmins;

Seconded by Councillor M. J. O'Neill;

Resolved—That the new "Appleyard" Ambulance when delivered be stationed at Baltinglass Hospital.

Councillor Temple stated that as the new Ambulance would not be available for some while he would propose an amendment that the matter be referred to the Department of Health and the views of the Members of the Council conveyed to the Department with a request that they advise as to the most desirable location for the Ambulance.

The County Manager having pointed out that the Bray Area was at present served from Loughlinstown Hospital and, in addition, the Ambulances of Messrs. Gleeson of Stillorgan were also available, if required, Councillor H. J. Byrne withdrew his amendment. The County Medical Officer, who attended the Meeting, informed the Members that both Ambulances had been satisfactory. They were excellent Ambulances and the Drivers were very pleased with them. The Chairman having examined the Order made by the County Manager on 22nd June, 1966, regarding the purchase of the Ambulance, ruled Councillor Temple's amendment out of order and the Motion in the name of Councillor Timmins, seconded by Councillor O'Neill, was declared passed.

Item No. 2—North-East Wicklow Regional Water Supply — Interim Report of Consultant and Report of County Engineer.

A Chara,

The Consulting Engineer, Mr. Barry, in preparing his original Report submitted six alternative Schemes, showing the areas which could be served from the Dargle River and Lough Dan sources. The most suitable of these sources is Lough Dan but it would be uneconomical unless fully developed to serve the demands of the Bray area and Dublin Corporation. Dublin Corporation have more or less definitely intimated that they are not at present interested in using Lough Dan as a source to augment their existing Water Supply. The Consultant Engineer has now submitted a Report outlining what I consider the most suitable and economic way of giving a water supply to the North-East Wicklow Region.

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Briefly his investigations and recommendations are as follows—

1. Area to be served:

- (a) Bray Environs.
- (b) Kilmacanogue, Delgany/Greystones area.
- (c) Kilcoole/Ashford rural area.

2. Estimated Demand.

- (a) Bray environs (Boghall/Kilruddery area).

(i) Population demand—7,000 people	420,000 gallons
	per day
(ii) Light industry	80,000 " "
Total:	500,000 gallons
- (b) Kilmacanogue, Delgany/Greystones area.

(i) Population demand (5,500 existing, season population 2,500, Increase 3,000—11,000)	550,000 gallons
(ii) Agricultural and Commercial demand	50,000 gallons
Total:	600,000 gallons
- (c) Kilcoole/Ashford rural area.

(i) Population demand (4,000 present, increasing in season 1,000—5,000)	120,000 gallons
(ii) Agricultural demand	120,000 gallons
(iii) Light industry and commercial demand	30,000 gallons
Total:	400,000 gallons

Total Demand for North Eastern Area—1,500,000 gallons.

2. Sources Available.

- (a) **Lough Dan**—There is available from this source without impounding two million gallons per day and with storage this could be brought up to fifteen million to twenty million gallons per day. Owing to it being situated on the southern extremity of North-East Wicklow, it is not economic to develop it as a source to serve the area, unless as part of a regional scheme as a supplementary supply to Dublin Corporation. As already stated, Dublin Corporation is not interested and, therefore, this source has to be ruled out on economic grounds. Source available could be conserved to serve any future expansion that may take place on the southern side of the Dublin Metropolitan area or South of Wicklow towards Arklow.
- (b) **Glencullen River**—This area has a catchment of some 5,300 acres. The minimum straight run off from the area would probably not be half-million gallons per day and, therefore, it would be necessary to construct an impounding reservoir if this were to be used as a source of supply. The configuration of the area and the geology of the area is such that the construction of a dam would be difficult and extremely costly. Borings made available confirm the unsuitability of the valley in this respect. Accordingly, the possibility of using the Glencullen River as a source for the scheme could not be entertained.
- (c) **Dargle River**—The catchment area of the combined Dargle and Glencree river downstream of their confluence of Onagh Bridge is approximately 12,900 acres, which could be further increased to about 15,000 acres at Tinnahinch Bridge. The estimated yield of Tinnahinch Bridge would be about two million gallons per day. The required demand of 1.5 million gallons could be

extracted at this point without effecting riparian or other interests of the river. The demand for many years would not be more than a million gallons per day and treatment works would be designed to serve this quantity. An impounding reservoir would not, therefore, have to be constructed for the present and may never arise if gaugings to be subsequently taken of river would show that the compensation water was adequate. In any case the geological formation of the valley is such that it is suitable for the construction of a dam. The chemical and bacteriological analysis of the water show that it is suitable as a source of supply following the usual treatment.

The works briefly, which are as follows, involve:

- (a) Construction of Intake Works at Tinnahinch Bridge.
- (b) Treatment Works at Newtown to treat 1,000,000 gallons per day, consisting of Rapid gravity filters with settling tanks, chemical coagulation and would include chlorination and fluoridation.
- (c) A clear water tank of 500,000 gallons capacity which would serve as a service reservoir for the Bray environs area.
- (d) 500,000 gallons service reservoir sited near Glencormac North and another 500,000 reservoir near Drummin East to serve the Delgany, Greystones and Kilcooie areas.
- (e) The laying of rising and distribution main varying in size from 15 inches to 4 inches diam.

The estimated cost of this proposed Scheme is £265,000, and is considered reasonable.

The Scheme put forward is recommended as being a most economic one to serve this area for which development has been held up due to lack of water supply.

The County Manager referred to the difficulties which the Council had been experiencing in providing water for development in the Bray area. Dublin Corporation had indicated that on account of the demands on water in the City they could not continue to supply additional water for the area South of Bray. The estimated cost of the Scheme was £265,000 and allowing for a Grant of 50 per cent. of loan charges the Scheme would cost about 1s. in the £ on the Rates in respect of a Loan re-payable over twenty-five years. If the Council approved the Scheme would be submitted to the Department for approval.

Item No. 3—Housing—Letter from Department of Local Government indicating that a Further Capital Sum of £20,000 would be available in the Year 1966/67.

The County Manager stated that the original allocation for Housing Construction Loans for the current year was £36,000 and if the Council decided to allocate the additional sum of £20,000 for this pur-

pose these sums, together with a credit balance at the 31st March, 1966, of £1,644, would make a total available for Housing Construction Loans for the year of £57,644. To date the Council had issued payments amounting to £15,350 and a further £5,500 would be required to meet balances of Loans on which instalments had already been issued. Having allowed for other Loans to which the Council was committed, amounting to £9,700, a sum of £27,094 would be available towards meeting Loans required for the Bentley Park Housing Scheme. This sum could be applied either to meet twelve full Loans of £2,170 each, or to issue an instalment of £1,350 to each of the twenty applicants remaining. Loans to five applicants had already been provided for. In regard to Grants for New Houses and for Reconstruction of Houses the allocation for the year was £19,000 and the total required for New House Grants and Reconstruction Grants approved for payment would be £16,116, leaving £2,884 available for further Grants. There would not, however, be adequate moneys available for meeting all applications made to date for New House Grants and Reconstruction Grants.

McCrea, Chairman, pointed out that a great many people had availed of Reconstruction Grants to improve their houses and had already carried out the work, but were unable to obtain the Grants on which they had relied, and he considered some portion of the additional allocation of £20,000 should be made available for these Grants.

Resolved—That £3,000 out of the extra allocation of £20,000 be assigned to payment of Supplementary Grants.

Following a discussion on the matter it was decided to adjourn a final decision to the next Meeting of the Council and to have a further Report available from the County Manager as to the number of applications on hands for Reconstruction Grants and for Grants for New Houses.

Item No. 4—Provisional Development Plan for County Wicklow.

A copy of the Provisional Development Plan for County Wicklow had been circulated to the Members of the Council. The County Manager stated that the objects of the Development Plan to be prepared by the Council were the re-shaping and modernisation of towns to meet the demands of to-day, especially those of traffic, the identification and development of centres of economic and social growth, and the preservation and improvement of amenities. The Council had three years from the 1st October, 1964, to prepare the Development Plan and in this County the three Urban District Councils had prepared their own Provisional Plans and the Co. Council had already completed the Provisional Plans for Greystones/Delgany and Rathdrum and the Provisional Plan for the County was now before them. Surveys had been in progress for some time past and the Report submitted represented the results of these Surveys. The County Manager went on to refer to the details given in the Report in relation to population, its distribution and expected changes, and in regard to land use and employment,

He pointed out that a Report of this nature was significant in the determination of future policy in relation to Housing and to services such as Water Supply and Sewerage, and could be of assistance to persons contemplating the establishment of industry in the County. The Council noted the submission of the Provisional Development Plan.

The County Secretary stated that the Council's Engineer had valued the cottages at £650 and £435 respectively. He pointed out that figures obtained at a public auction did not necessarily represent the proper market value of a house and suggested that the Council might seek an independent valuation. The County Secretary pointed out that the Solicitor acting for the representatives of the late Patrick Somers had agreed that £650 could well be the proper market value, but had pointed out that he was unable to obtain a higher figure than £435. Councillor H. J. Byrne suggested that an independent Valuer should be obtained to act in all cases of sales of cottages and agreed that prices obtained at auctions did not necessarily represent the true market value.

Item No. 2.—Notice of Motion in name of Councillor J. Quigley Requesting Report from County Engineer "As to Site of Right-of-Way to Peter Byrne's Cottage at Tinnakilly Hill, Aughrim."

The County Secretary stated that the Assistant County Engineer had reported that whenever visiting the cottage he had to cross the lands of Mr. George Woodbyrne, whose father, he understood, had given a right-of-way to the cottage to a former tenant. Originally the cottage was on part of the land now occupied by Mr. James Nolan, which was later bought by the late Mr. George Woodbyrne, but the Assistant County Engineer had no information as to whether the original right-of-way was through the lands of Mr. Nolan or Mr. Woodbyrne. If through the land of Mr. Nolan he would have to pass through some of his fields, and if through the land of Mr. Woodbyrne the laneway would need to be reconstructed. The County Secretary stated that there obviously was a right-of-way to the cottage and that the matter would be looked into and the correct right-of-way verified.

Item No. 3.—Layout Plan for Proposed Houses at Newtownmountkennedy.

The County Secretary stated that Plans had been prepared by the Council's Architect for the provision of twelve houses on the site ac-

quired from cottage tenants at Newtownmountkennedy. The Scheme provided for nine two-storey houses and three single-storey houses and the layout provided for a small semi-enclosed cul-de-sac with road access from the road serving the existing Scheme. A separate pedestrian approach from the village was provided and also off-street car parking, a public open-space, and children's play-space. The area of the site was 1.48 acres and the density of development 8.2 houses to the acre. The cost of development and building was expected to amount to £25,200, or £2,100 per house.

Resolved—That we approve of the Layout and Plans for the erection of twelve houses on site at Newtownmountkennedy and direct that the sanction of the Department of Local Government to the Plans and Specifications and to the invitation of Tenders be sought.

Item No. 4.—Housing Scheme at Grattan Park, Kindlestown—Report of County Architect Regarding Provision of Underground Services.

The County Secretary stated that the Council's Architect had reported that the E.S.B. had agreed to provide underground main supply to the nine houses at Grattan Park without additional charge. The Department of Posts and Telegraphs had also agreed to provide underground telephone supply to the houses for possible future connections without additional charge. In consequence no unsightly wires and poles would be located in the Scheme and this would contribute greatly to the visual amenity. The Council's Architect had obtained an estimate of £176 19s. 0d. for the erection of a master T.V. and V.H.F. Aerial and Amplifier, with underground wired T.V. and V.H.F. supply, to one outlet in each house. The cost would work out at £19 13s. 0d. per house as compared with a cost of approximately £30 to a tenant for erecting an individual Aerial. At the suggestion of Councillor J. Temple it was agreed that the matter be referred for consideration by the Members of the Council for the BRAY ELECTORAL AREA at a Meeting to be held on 21st September, 1966.

Item No. 5.—Housing Capital Allocation—Report on Applications Received for Supplementary Grants for New Houses and for Reconstruction of Houses.

The County Secretary stated that the position in regard to applications for Reconstruction Grants was that there had been a debit balance on the Council's Account of £1,208 at the beginning of the year and to date Grants amounting to £9,917 17s. 4d. had been approved for payment. Applications for Grants amounting to £8,925 in respect of New Houses (other than those at Bentley Park) and £6,875 in respect of the twenty-five houses at Bentley Park, together with £9,215 in respect of Reconstruction of Houses, were under investigation, and the total requirements were, consequently, £34,140 17s. 4d. As against this sum the allocation made to the Council was £19,000. It would be noted from the figures submitted that of the allocation of £19,000, £11,125 17s. 4d. could be absorbed immediately in clearing the debit balance and meeting the amount of Grants already approved. It was expected that further Grants for New Houses and for Reconstruction, amounting in all to £5,783, would also be ready for payment. The County Secretary pointed out that Supplementary Grants could only be paid by the Council after the State Grant had been paid and suggested that, accordingly, the Council should pay Supplementary Grants in the same order in which the appropriate State Grants had been paid by the

Department. The Council agreed with this recommendation.

The amendment was declared carried by twelve votes in favour to six votes against and declared passed on the same voting when put as a substantive motion. The County Secretary stated that in consequence of the Council's decision a total of sixteen full Loans of £2,170 each could now be granted in respect of the Scheme of twenty-five houses at Bentley Park, Bray.

Item No. 5A.—Developments at Clogga Beach, Arklow.

The County Secretary stated that the Members of the Council for the ARKLOW ELECTORAL AREA had met in Arklow on the 31st August and had visited Clogga Beach and examined the area and the proposed developments there. The Members agreed that legal action should be pursued for the removal of the wall obstructing the right-of-way claimed to exist to the Beach at Clogga and also to allow the proposed development which involved the provision of a Motel with public access to the sea and Public Car Park being provided. The Committee recommended also that permission be given for a Caravan Park, which also had been applied for. The Report of the County Engineer in regard to the proposed developments was submitted to the Council and the County Manager stated that he felt it would be in the interests of the community as a whole that the recommendation of the County Engineer be accepted.

Councillor Whelan referred to the condition of the existing road and asked if something could be done to ease the bad bends and also stated that he had been informed by residents that heavy petrol lorries were using the road. The Assistant County Engineer stated that while he understood that the petrol lorries generally used the other road from the Jetty, South of Arklow, towards Arklow Town, possibly some of the lorries did use the road at Clogga. The Council noted the recommendation in the County Engineer's Report that the approach road be improved by way of providing passing-bays and sight-lines at bends.

The Council noted the particulars of cottage repairs submitted to the Meeting.



Item No. 1—Notice of intention to propose the following Resolution, (in the names of Councillors James Everett, T.D., John Quigley, H. W. Hopkins, James Gregory and Mary Walsh), in accordance with Section 4 of the City and County Management (Amendment) Act, 1955: "That we direct the County Manager to agree to transfer of Cottage at Ballinvalley, Avoca, Co. Wicklow, to James Stedman, as already passed by Council in December, 1963."

Councillor J. Everett, T.D., in moving the Resolution, stated that the Council had agreed in 1963 to the sale of the cottage at Ballinvalley, Avoca, by Mr. Phelan to Mr. James Stedman for the sum of £50. Mr. Phelan had bought 3½ acres of land at Ballard with a house on it. He stated that Mr. Phelan was an auxiliary Postman whose wife had died since he agreed to sell the cottage and that his cottage at Ballinvalley was too far away from the area in which he worked. He stated that there was no other employment available in the Ballinvalley area. Deputy Everett asked that the County Manager agree to complete the transaction in regard to the transfer of the cottage to Mr. James Stedman. The County Manager stated that the Council had agreed to the sale of the cottage to Mr. Stedman in October, 1963, but had not affixed the Seal to the Transfer of the cottage when Mr. Whelan called to the Council's Office on the 3rd January, 1964, and asked if the Council would build a house for him on his lands at Ballard. He could not agree with the suggestion that this remark was made by Mr. Phelan by way of a joke. The Council were informed of the position at the Meeting on the 13th January and agreed that no further steps be taken in regard to the completion of the sale as it appeared that Mr. Phelan had not suitable alternative housing accommodation. The house on Mr. Phelan's lands at Ballard had been inspected by the Assistant County Engineer whose Report indicated that the walls were of mudbound masonry, cracked in places, and buttressed in another place, and that the roof was of galvanised iron, and that part of the gable was protected by old tar barrels. The Assistant County Engineer considered the house was not suitable housing accommodation. The County Manager pointed out that under the provisions of the Labourers' Act, 1965, the Council were authorised to refuse consent to a sale if the person selling the cottage had not suitable alternative housing accommodation.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Everett, T.D.;

Seconded by Councillor J. Quigley;

Resolved—That in accordance with the provisions of Section 4 of the City and County Management (Amendment) Act, we, the Members of Wicklow County Council, hereby direct the County Manager to agree to the transfer of cottage at Ballinvalley, Avoca, Co. Wicklow, to James Stedman, as already passed by Council in December, 1963.

Passed—Councillor H. J. Byrne dissenting.

The County Manager pointed out that Mr. Phelan would not be eligible for any type of Council house in the future, nor would he be qualified for a Loan or a Grant.

Item No. 2—Minutes.

As the Minutes of these Meetings had been circulated to Members only at the Meeting the Council decided to defer confirmation of the Minutes to the next Meeting.

Item No. 3—Overdraft Accommodation on General Account for Quarter to 31st December, 1966.

It was

Seconded by Councillor Mrs. M. Ledwidge;

Resolved—That we hereby authorise our County Secretary to make application to the Minister for Local Government and to the Council's Treasurer, the National Bank, Ltd., for such financial accommodation by way of temporary overdraft on the Council's General Account as may be required, and we hereby determine that the maximum amount for the Quarter to 31st December, 1966, shall not exceed £350,000.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 4—Scholarships in Secondary, Vocational and other Approved schools, 1967 — Letter from Department of Education and to arrange Meeting of Scholarship Committee.

The Council decided that a Meeting of the Scholarship Committee of the Council would be held on Monday, 19th September, 1966, following the termination of the Special Meeting arranged for that day in relation to the Health Services.

Health Services — Special Meeting.

At the suggestion of Councillor J. J. McCrea, Chairman, it was agreed that a Special Meeting of the Council would be held at the Council Chamber, Kilmartin Hill, Wicklow, on Monday, 19th September, 1966, at 2.30 p.m. to consider the White Paper on "The Health Service, and their Further Development."

Item No. 5—Flood Damage to Roads — Application for Road Grants.

The County Secretary stated that the expenditure on flood damage to Roads and Bridges to date amounted to £6,536 in respect of Main Roads and Bridges and £35,773 in respect of County Roads and Bridges, making a total expenditure of £42,309. It appeared that the Department of Local Government were not so far agreeable to allowing the Council to charge the costs of repairing flood damage in respect of County Roads to Grants other than County Road Grants and as there was only a small balance of County Road Grant Works not carried out in respect of 1965/'66 it would seem that the full allocation of County Road Grants for the current financial year would have to be utilised to defray the cost of restoring Roads and Bridges damaged by flooding. County Road Grants available, however, would not be adequate to meet the full cost of storm damage. The matter was being discussed with the Department and the Council had already passed a Resolution urging that the Council be permitted to charge the cost of such works against Arterial Road Grants which had been unexpected. In reply to Councillor J. Temple the County Secretary pointed out that it had not been possible to acquire the necessary lands for the purpose of certain of the Arterial Road Grant Improvement Schemes and it was only in the present year that the approval of the Department of Local Government to the Plans for the Scheme from St. Valerie Bridge to Kilmacanogue had been obtained. The Council noted that arrangements had been made for a discussion with the Department of Local Government on the matter.

Item No. 6 — Improvements at Greystones Harbour.

The County Secretary stated that while the recent work of transferring the former Base of the Kish Lighthouse to Greystones had been met by Messrs. Christiani and Neilsen and the Greystones Civic Association, the Council had paid the Consultants' fees of £550, towards which a Grant had been received from Bord Failte, but had also agreed to meet in full the cost of filling between the Lighthouse Base and the Pier, which had been estimated by the County Engineer to cost £920. Councillor J. Temple asked that this matter be referred for consideration by the Members of the Council for the Bray Electoral Area and the Council agreed to this proposal.

Item No. 7—Notice of Motion in name of Councillor Miss M. Walsh:
"That an up-to-date Report be supplied by the County Engineer with regard to the Drainage Problem on the lands of Mr. Patrick O'Toole, Ballybeg, Tinahely."

The County Secretary stated that the County Engineer in Report of 26th August, 1966, had stated that there had been considerable difficulty in getting permission from Mr. O'Toole and his Solicitors to carry out the work which the Council had agreed to do. Owing to the Surface-Dressing Programme and Repairs to Bridges and Roads necessary due to the flood damage it had not been possible to start the work, but it was hoped to put the work in hands within the next couple of weeks. Councillor Miss Walsh stated that works carried out by the Council on the lands of Mr. O'Toole several years ago had resulted in the blocking of a drain and caused flooding on Mr. O'Toole's lands and that in consequence a large area of one field, on which she stated wheat had previously grown, was now covered with rushes. The Council had already agreed to pipe the drain and remove the dam and direct the water into the tank from which the Council at present provides a supply from the pump erected on the roadside and also leave an overflow from the tank to the drain in Mr. O'Toole's field to give water for his cattle, but she considered that in addition the Council should plough and re-seed the area of the field which had been affected by the flooding.

It was

Proposed by Councillor Miss M. Walsh;

Seconded by Councillor J. Quigley;

Resolved—That Council plough and re-seed land of Mr. Patrick O'Toole, which the Council has agreed to drain.

Passed unanimously.

The County Manager pointed out that he could not agree to give effect to the Council's Resolution as there was no authority to do so. The works which the Council were carrying out were being done without prejudice and were in no way any admission by the Council that they were in any way responsible for the alleged flooding charge which had been made by Mr. O'Toole.

Item No. 8—Notice of Motion in name of Councillor J. Quigley requesting Report from County Engineer "as to why steps were not taken to abate Nuisance on Mr. Henry Johnston's Farm at Redcross (formerly Mates' Holding), opposite Forge."

The County Secretary stated that this alleged nuisance had been investigated by the Health Inspector, who had reported that the difficulty in this case was being caused by the discharge of sewage

into a field from a drain which was intended only for the carriage of surface water. The drainage of three houses had been connected into this old surface water drain and it was the discharge of this sewage on to the field which caused the difficulty. The Health Inspector stated that crude sewage was also being discharged into the River by three other persons and he suggested that while the persons concerned could be required to abate the nuisance themselves it would seem desirable that the Council provide a small Treatment Plant at the lower end of the village and convert the existing inspection chambers in the drain into proper manholes. The Council approved of accepting the recommendation of the Health Inspector, as approved by the County Medical Officer. The County Secretary stated that an estimate of the cost of the necessary work was being obtained.

Item No. 9—Blind Welfare Scheme—Letter from Department of Social Welfare re proposed increase in Capitation Grant in respect of each out-resident Blind Person employed in a Workshop for the Blind.

The County Secretary stated that the Department of Social Welfare had written regarding the costs of the operation of the Board for the Employment of the Blind and that it was proposed to increase as from 1st April, 1966, from £60 to £120 per annum the State Capitation Grant in respect of each out-resident blind person. The Minister recommended that the existing Workshop Capitation Grant of £60 made by Local Authorities be increased by £40 to £100 with effect from 1st April, 1966, in respect of each out-resident blind person employed in a Workshop for the Blind. The County Secretary stated that the Council had not any person employed in such Workshop at present.

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Quigley;

Seconded by Councillor Miss M. Walsh;

Resolved—That we approve of an increase in the Capitation Grant in respect of each out-resident blind person employed in a Workshop for the Blind to £100, with effect from 1st April, 1966.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 10—Proposed Purchase by Council of Vested Cottage at Ballynagran, Kilbride.

The County Secretary stated that at the previous Meeting of the Council it had been proposed that the Council should make an offer for the purchase of a vested cottage at Ballynagran, Kilbride. This cottage had originally been offered for sale and a sum of £1,070 had been offered, but consent to the sale was refused by the Council as the proposed purchaser was a farmer who required the cottage to accommodate a workman. The consent of the Council had subsequently been sought to the sale at a figure of £600, but the purchaser in this case withdrew. Finally, the consent of the Council had been sought to the sale of the cottage at a figure of £500 to a Mr. Bradshaw who had recently retired from farming and the Council had indicated they were not prepared to consent to the sale as the purchaser was not regarded as a qualified person. The Solicitors for the representatives of the deceased tenant-purchaser had suggested to the Council that the market value of the cottage be taken as £1,500 and that the Council should pay a sum of £1,000 for the acquisition of the cottage. The County Secretary stated that this proposal seemed altogether

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unreasonable and that since the sellers had been prepared to accept a figure of £500 this should be accepted as representing the market value and the Council's offer should be based on a market value of £500. The Council agreed that the offer for the purchase of the cottage be based on a market value of £500.

Item No. 11—Letter from County Council's General Council re Resolution submitted by Wicklow County Council in relation to Court-houses.

"From criticisms offered from time to time, it appears that Court-houses provided and maintained out of local funds are as unsuited to present-day requirements as would be the outworn system of administration of justice with which they were originally associated. It is considered that these buildings should revert to the ownership and full control of Local Authorities, who would then use them for the needs of their own Services, as they might think fit. It is furthermore considered that the Department of Justice, being the Central Authority charged with the administration of Justice, should from state funds, provide up-to-date Courthouses, which would meet the needs of those using them."

A Chara,

With reference to your letter of 26th August, 1966, I have to inform you that we cannot agree to carry out a special survey for

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the purpose of determining measures to relieve the above-mentioned flooding. Our powers are derived from the Arterial Drainage Act, 1945, the primary purpose of which is the relief of flooding of agricultural land, and are limited to the carrying out of comprehensive drainage schemes on a catchment basis. The flooding at Aughrim could be dealt with by us only as part of a comprehensive drainage scheme for the Avoca catchment in which the river which is causing the flooding lies. The Avoca catchment is noted for treatment in the drainage programme, but owing to present commitments and the extent of the drainage problem generally it is unlikely to be reached in the foreseeable future.

A Special Meeting of Wicklow County Council was held at the Council Chamber, Kilmantain Hill, Wicklow, at 2.30 p.m. on Monday, 19th September, 1966, to consider the provisions of the White Paper on THE HEALTH SERVICES AND THEIR FURTHER DEVELOPMENT."

The following Members attended:

Councillor J. J. McCrea, Chairman.

Councillors John Quigley, Alan H. Hadden, James Whelan, James Miley, G. Timmins, Mark Deering, M. J. O'Neill, Seamus Ua Tuathail, Miss Mary Walsh, Mrs. Mary Ledwidge, H. J. Byrne, Hugh B. Hipwell, John Temple, James D. Haughton and J. Gregory.

The County Manager, County Secretary and County Medical Officer also attended.

Councillor J. J. McCrea, Chairman, suggested that the Council might consider the various proposals contained in the White Paper so that the Council would be in a position to submit their considered views on the proposals to the Minister when they met him on Wednesday, the 21st September.

Following a discussion in regard to the proposal that a choice of doctor be provided for persons in the Lower Income Group the Council agreed generally that they did not favour the abolition of Dispensary Districts and the arrangement under which patients would have to attend at a doctor's private surgery. Members expressed concern that in the rural areas this would result in persons having too long a distance to travel in order to visit a doctor. While the Members of the County Council were not opposed to the idea of making available a choice of doctor to persons in the Lower Income Group it was their view that doctors participating in the Scheme would be required to attend at the Council's Dispensaries and Sub-Dispensaries. At the request of Members of the Council the County Manager gave a summary of the present position in regard to the Health Services and indicated that the present Rate in the £ for Health Services was 22/3d. out of a total Rate in the £ of 53/4d. for the present year. It would be seen, therefore, that Health Services represented about 40 per cent. of the total Rate. Of the total expenditure of £758,122 provided in the current year's Estimates for Health Services £547,000 was in respect of Hospital Services and £60,000 in respect of General Medical Services. The County Manager pointed out that one in ten of the population received in-patient hospital care in a General Hospital, Children's Hospital, Maternity Hospital, or in a special Acute Hospital, in the previous year. More than half the number of patients were treated in Voluntary Teaching Hospitals and in the Regional Hospitals and it was probable that it was in view of this trend that the question of appointment of Regional Health Authorities was proposed.

Approximately 30 per cent. of the population were in the Lower Income Group, about 55 per cent. in the Middle Income Group, and 15 per cent. in the Higher Income Group. Consequently about 85 per cent. of the community obtained General Hospital and Specialist Services at a charge not exceeding 10/- a day and were also entitled to Maternity Services free of charge, with a choice of doctor for Maternity Services. In County Wicklow the number of persons in the Lower Income Group represented 35 per cent. of the population. The proposals under the White Paper provided for the Minister fixing Income Limits generally in respect of persons entitled to Medical Cards, but it did not seem that any radical change in the class was proposed. The County Manager gave further details in regard to the Services provided by the Council and gave details of the proposals in the White Paper on

"THE HEALTH SERVICES AND THEIR FURTHER DEVELOPMENT." Following a further discussion on the proposals in the White Paper the Meeting terminated. The Council agreed that the Meeting with the Minister for Health be held at the Council Chamber, Kilmantin Hill, and not at the Courthouse, as had previously been arranged.

A Special Meeting of Wicklow County Council to meet the Minister for Health for a discussion on the provisions of the White Paper on "THE HEALTH SERVICES AND THEIR FURTHER DEVELOPMENT" was held at the Council Chamber, Kilmantin Hill, Wicklow, on Wednesday, 21st September, 1966, at 10.00 a.m.

The following Members attended:—

Councillors John Quigley, James Whelan, James Miley, G. Timmins, Mark Deering, M. J. O'Neill, Seamus Ua Tuathail, Miss Mary Walsh, Mrs. Mary Ledwidge, H. J. Byrne, Edward Byrne, John Temple, J. Everett, T.D., and J. Gregory.

The County Manager, County Secretary, County Medical Officer, and Mr. J. A. Duggan, Staff Officer, were present.

Mr. Sean Flanagan, Minister for Health, attended to meet the Council and was accompanied by Mr. P. Murray, Secretary, Department of Health, Dr. B. Hensey, Mr. R. Whyte, and Dr. J. C. Joyce, Chief Medical Officer.

The Minister having been introduced to the Members of the Council, Mr. J. J. McCrea, Chairman, extended a welcome to him on behalf of the Members of the Council.

Councillor J. J. McCrea, Chairman, informed the Minister that the Council had had a Meeting on the 19th inst., to consider further the provisions in the White Paper on "THE HEALTH SERVICES AND THEIR FURTHER DEVELOPMENT" and had indicated their opposition to any proposals which would involve the abolition of Dispensary Districts and discontinuance of the present Dispensaries. The Members of the Council also were opposed to the proposed Regional Health Authorities and feared that such Regional Bodies would not provide as satisfactory a Health Service as was provided by the existing Health Authorities. The Chairman stated that Members of the Council felt that persons in the Lower Income Group were well catered for by the District Medical Officers. He pointed out that alterations to County Boundaries would present special problems in relation to both provision of services and allocation of costs. The Chairman stated that the Co. Council would be reluctant to hand over services to a new Body who would not be directly representative of the Ratepayers within the County. The Minister for Health having stated that he would prefer to hear the views of all Members of the Council who wished to express any opinions before replying, Councillor H. J. Byrne drew attention to the very high charges in respect of service of surgeons and hospital fees which had to be met by persons in the Higher Income Group and asked if anything could be done to control such charges. He suggested that instead of building more hospitals from Sweepstake Funds that such moneys be used to subsidise the running costs of hospitals. Mr. J. Temple emphasised the opinion expressed by the Chairman that the Council considered that the existing Dispensaries should be retained, but that the Members had no objection to the proposal to provide a choice of doctor. He felt, however, that if a choice of doctor were introduced that any doctors participating in the Scheme should be required to attend at the Council's Dispensaries. Councillor Whelan stated that he had an open mind in regard to the proposals relating to the Dispensary system and pointed out that if the local Dispensaries were

retained this would result in the retention of the present system of segregation under which paying patients attended doctors in their private Surgeries whereas persons in the Lower Income Group had to attend at the Council's Dispensaries. Councillor J. Miley inquired when it was expected the new arrangements proposed in the White Paper would come into operation. In regard to the scale of income for Medical Cards he stated that there should be full knowledge available to the public of such scales of income so that any person would be in a position to know whether or not they were entitled to a Medical Card. Councillor Deering referred to the reference in Paragraph 113 (on Page 58 of the White Paper) to the effect of the Agricultural Grant in relief of Rates, but pointed out that farmers also contributed by way of Taxation towards the funds from which the Agricultural Grant was paid. Councillor J. J. McCrea, Chairman, inquired also whether, in the event of the proposals for a choice of doctor for persons in the Lower Income Group being implemented, the position of existing dispensary Doctors would not be prejudiced.

Councillor J. O'Toole referred to the distance some patients had to travel to Dispensaries; lack of heating in some Dispensaries; difficulties in supply of drugs; and unsatisfactory heating at the County Home, Rathdrum.

The Minister for Health in reply stated that the preliminary Meeting which the Council had arranged, and the discussion which had taken place in relation to the proposals, had been very helpful. He stated that the proposals were radical in some ways. He felt that the distinction between paying and non-paying patients should be ended. The Minister stated that while he had agreed to introduce legislation in 1967 the proposal would not necessarily be implemented in full in the coming year. The cost of the proposals would effect a strain on central funds and the introduction of the new services would be related to the growth of the economy and of Tax Revenue. At present over £2 million a year was being paid from Hospitals Trust Funds to subsidise hospital running costs. The cost of the Health Services was at present borne equally by central funds and local Rates, and as had been indicated in the White Paper, it was intended that the amount borne by Rates would not rise about the 1965/66 level. This involved a transfer of an added burden to the Taxpayer.

In regard to the Dispensary system the Minister stated that some County Councils had sought the retention of the present system, while other County Councils favoured its total abolition. He felt that it was desirable, socially and otherwise, that every person should have a choice of doctor and the same facilities in regard to treatment. He agreed that there was no problem involved in built-up areas, but that in certain rural areas circumstances would make a choice difficult. He intended to give special consideration to these difficulties. He referred to the recent tendency of doctors to practice in groups and stated he regarded this as a welcome development. In regard to entitlement to General Medical Services the Minister stated that a standardised scale would be introduced so that there would be no variation between Districts and every person would know whether or not he was entitled to free service. It would be necessary, however, to leave an element of discretion to Health Authorities. In regard to the proposed Regional Boards the Minister stated that it was not desired, nor was it the intention, to remove the influence of County Councillors or to minimise them. A certain number of Councillors would be on the Regional Boards and there would also be local Advisory Committees for each District in a Region. He would be interested to have precise proposals in relation to the constitution of Regional Boards. The Minister also gave an assurance that the position of present holders of posts as

District Medical Officers would not be worsened. Almost exclusively the increase in cost of Health Services would be met from central funds. The Minister pointed out that full-scale specialist services could only be provided in a limited number of centres and it was inevitable that such type of services could be provided only on a regional basis. In regard to the cost of Health Services in relation to Rates the Minister pointed out that there was a proposal for equalisation of Rates and costs as between Local Authorities. Consequently he could not give an absolute guarantee that Rates would not be affected at all, but in the main the cost of the extended services would be borne by the Exchequer.

In reply to an inquiry from Councillor Whelan regarding Dental Service for Schoolchildren and difficulties in treatment of children during school holidays the Minister stated that there had been difficulty in filling vacancies in this Service.

In reply to Councillor Temple's inquiry as to whether the arrangements under which Councillors could issue emergency directives to persons requiring Health Services would continue, the Minister stated that these arrangements would not be withdrawn. Councillor Temple urged that the local Advisory Committees referred to by the Minister should meet periodically and suggested that such Meetings should be at least once a month. He suggested that there should be local Advisory Committees set up representing each Electoral Area.

In reply to Councillor J. Miley the Minister stated that it was intended that treatment would be available to school-going children whether in respect of defects found at school medical inspections or otherwise.

The Chairman thanked the Minister and his Officers for their attendance and the Meeting terminated.

Councillor Quigley in proposing the Motion stated that the cottage had been built for Mr. O'Brien's father and while the present occupant was over seventy years of age he had numerous nephews and nieces and wanted the cottage to remain in his family. He pointed out that the cottage should have been vested in Mr. O'Brien's brother, who had applied a number of years previously, but had died before the vesting was completed. The County Manager stated that he had been hesitant to appoint Mr. O'Brien as tenant on account of his age and it had been felt that if appointed tenant he would then apply to purchase and on the cottage being vested might sell it. The terms of the Resolution would be complied with.

Item No. 2—Provision of underground services for Houses at Grattan Park, Kindlestown—Recommendation of Members of Council for Bray Electoral Area.

The County Secretary stated that the Members of the Council for the Bray Electoral Area had considered the Report of the Council's Architect, in which he indicated that the Department of Posts and Telegraphs and the Electricity Supply Board had agreed to put their services to the houses at Grattan Park underground, which would substantially improve the appearance of the Housing Scheme. The Council's Architect had also suggested that a connection be provided to each of the nine houses for the reception of television and also a V.H.F. supply, with one master T.V. and V.H.F. aerial. The cost of the work would be recouped by a charge of 2/6d. per week to tenants availing of the service and payable for a period of four years. The Members of the Council for the Bray Electoral Area had recommended the acceptance of this proposal.

Proposed by Councillor E. Byrne;

Seconded by Councillor Mrs. M. Ledwidge;

Resolved—That we approve of the recommendation of the Council's Architect for the erection of a master T.V. and V.H.F. aerial and amplifier, with underground wired T.V. and V.H.F. supply to one outlet, in each of the nine houses at Grattan Park, Kindlestown, and of a charge being made of 2/6d. per week for a period of four years to the tenants to recoup the cost of this service.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 3 — Sites for Housing at Rathnew — Recommendation of Council's Architect.

The County Secretary stated that the Council's Architect had examined sites in Rathnew for housing and had reported in respect of six sites, of which the total area amounted to 12.278 acres. Site No. 1, which adjoined the New School, contained .652 acres and would accommodate six houses; Site No. 2, adjacent to the Cemetery and School, contained 1.893 acres and would accommodate fifteen houses; Site No. 3 adjoined existing Council housing to the South of the railway line (.4 acres) and would accommodate four houses; Site No. 4 South of the railway line (.5 acres) would accommodate four houses; Site No. 5, adjoining Site No. 4, containing 6 acres, would accommodate forty houses; and Site No. 6, near the Station, south of the railway line, and adjoining the Arklow Road, containing 2.833 acres, would accommodate twenty houses. The sites in all would, therefore, accommodate eighty-nine houses. The Council's Architect re-

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commended that the sites be acquired and that priority be given to the acquisition of Sites Nos. 1 and 2.

Resolved—That having considered Report of Council's Architect we approve of negotiations being entered into for the acquisition of the six areas of land at Rathnew which would provide sites for eighty-nine houses; priority to be given to acquisition of Sites Nos. 1 and 2.

Item No. 4—Report of Council's Architect submitting Layout Plans for Housing at Laragh, Blessington, and Parkmore, Baltinglass.

The County Secretary stated that the Council's Architect had submitted a Layout Plan in respect of two extra houses proposed to be erected at Laragh. The houses would be sited on the opposite side of the road to the existing six houses. In reply to inquiry from Councillor R. Miley the County Secretary stated that there was an adjoining site which the Council could acquire later if more houses were required. Councillor R. Miley proposed that this site, which would accommodate two or three more houses, be purchased.

The Council considered an application from Mr. Thomas Healy to dispose of his interest in his vested cottage No. 425/6 at Leabeg, Newcastle, to Mr. George Illingworth, c/o Vale Cafe, Upper Main Street, Arklow, for £500. Mr Illingworth resided in Bradford, England, but came to Ireland periodically on holidays, and stated that he and his son wished to settle here. It was reported that Mr. Illingworth had purchased a cottage at Rathdangan village, which would be made available to Mr. Thomas Healy. The County Secretary stated that Mr. Healy was aged about sixty-two and was semi-blind, and was a widower living alone in the cottage and in receipt of a Blind Pension. It appeared that their house in Bray was overcrowded, in that Mr. and Mrs. McGrath occupied the house, together with two adult sons, two adult daughters, and one daughter of school-going age, and in addition a married son, his wife, and two children sometimes lived in the house and sometimes at the wife's mother's house. The County Manager pointed out that as Mr. McGrath was resident in Bray and the tenant of an Urban District Council house it was felt that the County Council could not provide a house for him. At the suggestion of Councillor J. Temple it was agreed that the matter be referred for consideration by Bray Urban District Council

Item No. 8—Domestic Scavenging Services for Enniskerry and Newtownmountkennedy.

The County Secretary submitted the Maps showing the boundaries for the Scavenging Services to be provided at Enniskerry and Newtownmountkennedy and informed the Council of the areas which would be served. It was indicated that Tenders for the Service would be invited within the following week. The Council approved of the areas proposed.

Item No. 9—Repairs to Council Cottages carried out in September, 1966, and Cottages to be repaired in October, 1966.

The Council noted the list of cottages repaired and of those to be repaired during the month of October, 1966.

Blessington Housing Scheme.

Councillor J. Miley asked if arrangements could be made to allow the persons who were selected for the tenancy of the new houses at Blessington to go into occupation. He stated that the houses were completed, although some of the development works had not yet been finished, but thought that the tenants could at this stage be allowed in. The County Secretary stated that the matter would be

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looked into and arrangements would be made to allow the tenants into occupation as soon as possible.

Lighting, Etc., at Greystones.

Councillor J. Temple stated that the Greystones Branch of the Irish Red Cross Society had written to the Council on the 12th November, 1965, concerning public lighting and other matters, and beyond receiving an acknowledgement stating that the County Engineer would examine the matters referred to, had not received any subsequent reply. The County Secretary stated that the matter would be looked into and a reply sent.

Employment of Roller Driver.

Councillor J. Everett, T.D., inquired again why a Roller Driver in the Carnew area had not been re-employed recently when rolling was being carried out in the area, and also referred to chippings having been purchased from Messrs. Roadstone instead of being supplied from Ballinclare Quarry. In regard to the chippings, Councillor J. Temple asked that particulars be supplied of the quantity of chippings produced from Ballinclare Quarry and of the amount purchased from Roadstone. Councillor J. J. McCrea stated that the Roller Driver concerned had been one of the best machinery workers the Council had, but alleged that he was being victimised because of certain matters. He asked that the County Manager investigate this complaint.

Ambulance Service.

Councillor J. Temple stated that a patient who had been accompanied by a relative and a trained Nurse was taken by ambulance from her home in Bray to a Dublin Hospital, but that on the return journey the patient's relative and the Nurse had been left at St. Columcille's Hospital, the Ambulance Driver having refused to bring them back to the patient's home. He asked that this complaint be inquired into.

Suspension of Rate Collector.

The County Manager informed the Members in committee that one of the Council's Rate Collectors had been suspended and explained the reasons for the action taken. The Council noted the position in the matter and that temporary arrangements were being made for the collection of Rates during the period of suspension.

With reference to yours of the 16th instant.

I agree that the workmen carried out the work most diligently and conscientiously and in a most creditable manner. They worked for very long hours without any complaint, and seemed to take a pride and interest in their work. This is borne out by the fact that the three bridges were assembled and erected in less than six days.

I recommend, therefore, that if it is allowable under existing regulations and legislation, that they be paid a bonus of £5 per man. About fourteen men will be involved in all. It should be borne in mind, however, that the men were transported to and from the site and were paid overtime for their work.

If it is agreed to pay a bonus, I would further recommend that the Engineers who supervised and organised the work and worked very long hours until late in the evening, at considerable inconvenience to themselves, should be paid a bonus of Fifteen Guineas each. It must be borne in mind that the Engineers concerned, Mr. P. McGuinness, Chief Assistant County Engineer, and Messrs. N. D. Farrell, B.E., S. F. Coffey, B.E., and E. Doyle, B.E., worked late into the night and were not remunerated in any way for the long hours worked.

ITEM No. 8—Employment of Roller Driver—Mr. M. Somers.

The County Secretary read Report of Mr. R. L. Farrell, Chief Assistant County Engineer, in which he denied emphatically that he had informed Mr. Somers that he would see that he was never employed in the County Council again because of the support given by the Chairman to purchase of certain lorries, or that he had repeated

such a statement to Councillor McCrea in his house. He stated that the purpose of his interview with Councillor McCrea was to deny such a rumour, which was being circulated at that time. Mr. Farrell pointed out that Mr. Somers had been employed as a Roller Driver every year since the time of this incident when there was a vacancy for one, as he was trained in this work and was very efficient. The Council was anxious to employ him the whole year round, but could not do so as a Machinery Attendant, and offered to keep him employed as a Labourer in the intervening periods. Mr. Somers did not avail of this offer and obtained employment elsewhere, but returned to the Council as a Roller Driver when such a position was vacant. Councillor J. J. McCrea, Chairman, disagreed with the statements made by Mr. Farrell and asked that the matter be adjourned to the next Meeting.

Item No. 9—Increase in Wages of Roadworkers — Letter from Department of Local Government conveying Sanction to payment of Additional £1 per week from 1st June, 1966.

The County Secretary submitted letter of 27th July, 1966, Ref.: E.L. 27/65, from the Department of Local Government, in which it was indicated that the Minister was not prepared to approve the operative date proposed for the wage increase to Roadworkers. Sanction was, however, conveyed in the letter to the grant of an increase of £1 per week in the existing remuneration of Roadworkers (including supervisory and allied Roadworkers) with effect from June 1st, 1966. The County Secretary stated that payment had been made in accordance with the sanction received. A letter had been addressed to the Department asking the Minister to reconsider the matter and to approve of payment as from the 1st May, in accordance with the Council's Resolution. The Council approved of the re-submission of the proposal.

Item No. 10—Application for £1 per week increase in remuneration of other staff as from 1st June, 1966.

Proposed by Councillor J. Temple;
Seconded by Councillor H. B. Hipwell:

Resolved—That having considered applications of Unions representing staff we approve of the following increases in remuneration:

- An increase of £1 per week to wholtime adult male staff;
- An increase of £1 per week to wholtime adult females where the competition for the work is open to males and females, and
- An increase of 15s. per week to wholtime adult female staff not included in paragraph (b) above.

These increases in remuneration shall apply as from 1st June, 1966, and shall be subject to a limitation that the increases are allowed only to officers or employees whose existing rate of remuneration does not exceed £1,200 per year, after allowance is made for Superannuation contributions.

We hereby authorise the necessary expenditure in excess of the amount provided in the current year's Estimates to defray the cost of the payment of these increases in remuneration.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 11—Creation of Additional Post of Clerk/Typist.

The County Secretary stated that the County Engineer had recommended that an additional post of Clerk/Typist be created to enable a Clerk/Typist to be assigned for duty with the Assistant County

Engineer for the Northern Engineering District. The Engineers in the South-Eastern, Southern, and Western Districts had a Clerk/Typist assigned to each of their Offices. The Assistant County Engineer for the Northern Area had availed of the services of one of the two Clerk/Typists in the County Engineer's Office, but due to the present volume of work to be discharged an additional Clerk/Typist was required.

Seconded by Councillor E. Byrne:

Resolved—That we hereby approve of the creation of an additional post of Clerk/Typist required for duties in the Office of the Assistant County Engineer for the Northern Engineering District.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 12—Notice of Motion in Names of Councillors J. Temple and Hugh B. Hipwell: "That a Health Committee be set up, consisting of all Members of the Council, to deal with all Health matters, pending the Implementation of the new Health Act."

Councillor Temple stated that the Committee proposed would deal with matters relating to Newcastle Hospital, the issue of Medical Cards, Ambulance Service, Dental Treatment in Schools, and other matters in respect of which Councillors frequently received representations. He felt that a Committee consisting of all the Members of the Council should be established which would meet every month or every Quarter to deal with health matters only. The County Manager stated that as regards Newcastle Mental Hospital a Mental Hospital Visiting Committee would have to be appointed as soon as the Hospital opened for the reception of patients and it was hoped to have patients received into the Hospital from the 1st November, 1966. The Mental Hospital Visiting Committee would consist of one-third of the Members of the Council, which in the case of Wicklow County Council was seven Members. The functions of the Committee would be to receive any complaints from patients and to report on the state of repair of the Institution and certain other matters. The County Manager pointed out that inquiries received by Members, as referred to by Councillors Temple, generally related to the provision of Health Services to particular individuals and, of course, such matters could not be discussed at a Public Meeting. Consequently, if a Committee of the type proposed were set up Meetings would have to be held in committee. The Chairman having expressed the view that all Councils had a separate Mental Hospital Committee which consisted of all Members of the Council, it was agreed, on the suggestion of the County Manager, that an inquiry on the matter of the constitution of the Committee be addressed to the Department of Health. The County Secretary pointed out that during the six months to 30th September there had been seventeen Meetings of the County Council and, in addition, eight Meetings of Committees of the Council. The large number of Meetings involved considerable work and it was necessary for the Secretary to devote much time to the preparation of Agendas, recording of Minutes, and dealing with matters arising at Meetings, and inquiries received from Members in the course of and after Meetings. If it were decided to hold a further Meeting of the Council each month for Health Services he felt he would have to ask for some additional staff in order to cope with the volume of work. Councillor Temple pointed out that Meetings of such a Committee would be held only when thought necessary by the Council.

Resolved—That a Health Committee be set up, consisting of all Members of the Council, to deal with all health matters, pending the implementation of the new Health Act.

With reference to yours of the 14th ultimo.

The area referred to has been inspected and there does not seem to be a reliable source from which a gravity supply could be taken to supply the four cottages. Consequently a well will have to be sunk and the cost of this work, including installation of pump, is £230.

The four houses are spread along the road over a distance of approximately 340 ft. yards and the positioning of a well and pump to facilitate everyone will be difficult and will, of course, depend on where the diviner finds the water.

It would be more advantageous to all the houses in the area if a Group Scheme was organised and an electric pump installed in the well to supply water to each house under pressure.

The County Secretary stated that the Assistant County Engineer had reported that he would recommend that an additional public light be provided on an existing pole at the position marked on a Map submitted. The E.S.B. had been asked for a quotation. On the proposal of Councillor J. J. McCrea, seconded by Councillor Hipwell, it was agreed that the light be provided, subject to the estimate of the E.S.B. being reasonable.

Item No. 16—Notice of Motion in Name of Councillor J. Quigley, requesting Report "As to steps proposed to be taken in order to prevent objectionable odour at Avoca from dumping from Fertiliser Factory at Shelton."

The County Secretary stated that the Health Inspector had reported that he had inspected the Dump and had found that there was a very objectionable odour coming from it, which was caused by the burning of carbon waste dumped there by the Fertiliser Factory at Shelton. He had consulted the Security Officer of Nitrigin Eireann, who explained that the waste would normally be mixed with crude oil to make carbon pellets for use in generating steam, but that occasionally this mix went wrong and the material had to be dumped. The Health Inspector was of opinion that this type of waste should not be dumped on any of the Council's Refuse Dumps. He pointed out that it was very combustible and caused frequent fires and hence the offensive smell. The County Medical Officer had advised that the Council was not under any obligation to accept trade waste from factories and if they did accept it it was a matter of courtesy and not of right. He recommended that users be informed that neither carbon waste nor sawdust could be accepted by the Council. The Council agreed with the recommendation of the County Medical Officer.

Item No. 17—Letter from Resident at Kilcoole re Camping of Itinerants on Upper Green at Kilcoole.

The County Secretary submitted a letter received from Mrs. L. O'Gorman, "Roseville," Kilcoole, in regard to the camping of itinerants on the Village Green. Councillor E. Byrne stated that the people of Kilcoole had a grievance as the Green was in the heart of the village and when itinerants occupied any site they left a lot of dirt and filth behind them. Members of the Council suggested that Notices should be erected to prohibit trespassing on the Green, or camping on it, and Councillor J. J. McCrea, Chairman, pointed out that Carnew had experienced similar trouble, but that the area concerned had been enclosed and they had had no further difficulty since that time. He suggested that a local Development Committee might be formed in Kilcoole and arrangements made to convert the Green into a Park, which would be enclosed. It was agreed that the Chairman's suggestion be conveyed to Mrs. O'Gorman.

Item No. 18—Inquiries arising from County Manager's Orders.

The Council noted the particulars of County Manager's Orders which had been circulated to the Members.

Foreshore Protection at Wicklow.

The following letter from the Acting Town Clerk, Wicklow Urban District Council, was submitted:—

At the meeting of the Urban Council held on the 4th instant, the question of Foreshore Protection was raised and the members have instructed me to write to the County Council drawing attention to the fact that the Urban Council has now a very valuable industrial estate in course of development at the Murrough and that several factories have already been erected there. The members have asked me to indicate to you that it is their opinion that every effort must be made to ensure that this development is not endangered by coastal erosion and it is this Council's opinion that any works necessary to protect this part of the foreshore should get priority over all others. They asked me to request you to have the matter raised at the next County Council meeting. I should be much obliged if you could have this done and endeavour to have the question of seeking any grants which may be available towards the cost of such work carefully examined. I have been requested to convey to the County Council the fact that the members of this Council consider this matter to be one of the utmost importance and one which should be given immediate attention in view of the onset of the Winter season. The Council will be most grateful for any assistance the County Council is in a position to afford in this matter.

I shall be much obliged if you will have the views of the Urban Council as indicated above considered by the County Council on the earliest possible occasion.

The County Secretary stated that the Office of Public Works had informed the Council in September, 1965, that a Preliminary Survey would shortly be carried out in "The Murrough" area, but no information had since been received as to the progress of the Survey. The Council agreed that an inquiry be addressed to the Office of Public Works on the matter.

'Bus Service.

Councillor J. Everett, T.D., supported by Councillors J. D. Haughton and R. Miley, urged that representations be made to the Minister for Education and to C.I.E. to provide facilities for about sixteen students from Glenealy who had to travel to school in Wicklow town. It was suggested that the 'bus service from Carnew to Rathdrum be extended to Wicklow in the mornings and a connection also be provided in the evenings. The Council approved of representations on the lines suggested being made to the Minister and to C.I.E.

Telephone Service.

Councillor J. D. Haughton urged that the Council protest to the Minister for Posts and Telegraphs at the unsatisfactory telephone service in the Rathdrum area. Members of the Council referred to similar difficulties in regard to telephone calls in other areas. It was agreed that representations be made to the Minister for Posts and Telegraphs on the matter.

County Road Grants.

Councillor G. Timmins stated that some Council workers had been laid off work in his area and inquired as to the position regarding County Road Grants for the current year. The County Secretary stated that a decision had not yet been received from the Department of Local Government in regard to the charging of the cost of flood damage against Arterial Road Grants instead of County Road Grants. The Council asked that a reminder be addressed to the Department on the matter.

The County Secretary stated that the grounds of refusal of permission were that the site of the proposed structure was on the line of the new Arterial Road where a dual-carriageway was to be provided. At present there was a Shop and a Filling Station on this site and these would have to be acquired by the Council when the road improvement was being carried out. There was a further difficulty in that it seemed that it would not be lawful for the County Manager to implement the Resolution (if passed) as the dwelling on the site was a vested cottage and the plot attached to the cottage was being used for a Shop and Filling Station, which was a breach of one of the Statutory Conditions. If permission were granted by the Council it would give rise to additional compensation becoming payable when the dual-carriageway was being provided and the site had to be acquired. Prior to a vote being taken on the matter the County Manager pointed out that it was his duty to inform the Council that since the passing of the Resolution might give rise to a loss to the Council's funds by reason of additional compensation becoming payable he was obliged to inform the Council that Members might be liable for any additional expense involved.

The County Secretary stated that it would be necessary to have the advice of the Council's Solicitor as to whether it was lawful for the County Manager to give effect to the Resolution and also to consult the Department of Local Government on the matter of the effect on the Road Improvement Scheme.

Resolved—That in accordance with the provisions of Section 4 of the City and County Management (Amendment) Act, 1955, we, the Members of Wicklow County Council, hereby instruct the County Manager to issue Town Planning approval for the erection of a dwellinghouse to be built by Peter Murphy, 2, Troopersfield, Blessington, on site at Haylands, Holyvalley, Blessington, Co. Wicklow.

The County Secretary stated that permission had been refused as the County Medical Officer had reported that the site was not suitable since effluent from the septic tank would be likely to penetrate into the stream adjoining the site and from that to the lake at Blessington, which was a reservoir for the Dublin Water Supply. Councillor J. Miley stated that the applicant was clearing a drain at the back of the site which would have the effect of diverting the stream and that in consequence effluent from the septic tank would not penetrate to the stream nor reach the lake. The Council decided to defer the matter to the next Meeting and asked that the County Medical Officer in the meantime arrange for a further inspection of the site by the Council's Health Inspector with a view to seeing if the works proposed to be carried out by the applicant would overcome the difficulty.

Item No. 3—To receive Deputation from Annacurra Parish Guild, Muintir Na Tire, in connection with Annacurra Crossroads.

The Deputation from the Annacurra Branch of Muintir Na Tire which was received by the Council consisted of Mr. Kevin Fitzgerald (Chairman); Mr. Michael Nolan (Secretary); and Mr. William Mordant. The members of the Deputation stressed the urgent need to have improvements made at the Crossroads at Annacurra, which they contended was very dangerous for motorists, and where it was stated a number of accidents had occurred. They expressed the fear that if the crossing was not improved there would be a serious accident, and referred in particular to the number of school-children who used it every day. They realised that there had been difficulties in regard to the acquisition of land for the purpose of carrying out an Improvement Scheme, but urged that the Council use compulsory powers if it were not possible to acquire the land by agreement. Councillor H. J. Byrne, Vice-Chairman, assured the Members of the Deputation that the Council would give serious consideration to the views expressed. The Deputation thanked the Council for receiving them and withdrew. The County Secretary stated that the Assistant County Engineer had reported that when efforts were made previously to obtain the necessary lands for improving the Crossroads it was not possible to obtain agreement with the reputed landowners and there were also difficulties in relation to title. He understood that the present owner was a Mr. Michael Caulfield, who resided in Dublin, and he recommended that a Plan be prepared for the improvement of the corner and an offer be made to Mr. Caulfield, and in the event

of being unable to reach an agreement that the lands be acquired compulsorily. The Council agreed that the necessary Plans be prepared and efforts be made to acquire the necessary lands for the work.

Item No. 3A.—Flood Prevention Scheme on River Dargle, Bray.

Copies of the County Manager's Statement in regard to the Report of the Consultant Engineer on a Scheme for Flood Prevention on the River Dargle at Bray had been circulated to the Members, together with a copy of the Consultant's Report. The Council decided, in view of the importance of the matter, to hold a Special Meeting on Friday, 11th November, 1966, at 2.30 p.m. to consider this matter and asked that a copy of the County Engineer's Report on his examination of the Consultant's recommendations be circulated prior to the Meeting.

Item No. 4—Erection of further Eleven Houses at Grattan Park, Kindlestown.—Recommendation of Bray Electoral Area Committee.

Having considered the recommendations of Members of the Council for the Bray Electoral Area:

Proposed by Councillor Mrs. M. Ledwidge;

Seconded by Councillor J. Temple.

Resolved—That we approve of the recommendation of the Bray Electoral Area Committee for the acceptance of the Tender of Mr. William Eager, Contractor, Newtownmountkennedy, in the sum of £20,945, for the erection of a further eleven houses at Grattan Park, Kindlestown, and direct that the sanction of the Minister to the acceptance of this Tender be sought.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 5—Notice of Motion in Name of Councillor M. Deering as follows: "That Additional Houses be provided in Dunlavin."

The County Secretary stated that three houses could be accommodated on a site acquired by the Council, where there had been a dangerous building at Dunlavin, and that a further site was being acquired from a Mr. O'Reilly, which would accommodate another house. The County Architect had reported on a site near the Fairgreen, which contained 1.67 acres, and would be suitable for the erection of 12 houses. The site contained portion of 3 cottage plots and it was proposed that each tenant would be offered £100 for the plot and in addition £25 might be offered to one of the tenants in compensation for the access strip.

It was

Proposed by Councillor M. Deering;

Seconded by Councillor J. Miley;

Resolved—That we approve of Plans being prepared for the erection of four houses on the sites at Dunlavin being acquired from Mr. O'Reilly and Mr. O'Brien and direct that Tenders be invited for the erection of these houses as soon as the necessary Plans have been approved by the Department.

We approve of the acquisition of site containing 1.67 acres from Mr. V. Corrigan, Misses Julia and Annie Doyle, and Mrs. Fay, and of offers of compensation at £100 each, with additional £25 for access strip to Mr. Corrigan.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 6—Proposed Acquisition of Site for Houses at Laragh.

The County Secretary stated that the Council had agreed to provide two additional houses at Laragh and the Council's Architect had recommended that a site be acquired from Mr. J. Byrne, Laragh, which adjoined the existing village, and contained approximately a quarter of an acre, and would be sufficient for the provision of the two houses.

It was

Proposed by Councillor R. Miley;

Seconded by Councillor J. Gregory;

Resolved—That we approve of the purchase of plot of land containing approximately one-quarter of an acre from Mr. J. Byrne, Laragh, for the purposes of a site for two additional houses.

Passed unanimously.

The County Secretary stated that the total cost of the Scheme for the erection of six houses at Laragh had now been ascertained at £14,369 and a Supplementary Loan of £3,920 would, accordingly, be required to meet the balance of the cost of the Scheme.

Resolved—That we approve of consent being given to Michael Dempsey to dispose of his interest in Vested Cottage No. 355/10 at Ballyshanogue, Tinahely, to Mr. Colum Dalton, Killalash, Kiltegan, subject to the payment by the vendor to the Council of the sum of £316 13s. 4d., the Statutory Conditions to remain attaching to the cottage and the Annuity to continue to be payable to the Council.

Councillor Miss Walsh stated that she understood that Mr. Dempsey had spent a considerable sum in carrying out improvements to the cottage and she felt that the amount being sought by the Council (£316 13s. 4d.) was excessive. She stated that she intended to hand in a Notice of Motion on the matter. The Resolution was marked "Passed unanimously."

The County Secretary stated that Mr. Joseph Quinn, the tenant-purchaser of Vested Cottage No. 242/4 at Redford, Greystones, proposed to transfer his interest in the cottage to his son-in-law (Mr. James Caulfield), who had been living in the cottage with his wife, and that there was no payment being sought in respect of it. Mr. Quinn was getting married again and was going to reside in Dublin.

The County Manager, County Secretary, and County Engineer were present.

The Council considered the Preliminary Report and Estimate of Mr. J. B. Barry, Consulting Engineer, who had been engaged by the Council and by Bray Urban District Council to carry out a special Survey and submit a Report on flood prevention measures which might be undertaken to deal with flooding from the Dargle River. A copy of the Report had been circulated to the Members, together with the following Statement of the County Manager:—

Re: Flood Prevention Scheme at Bray.

A Chairde,

Consequent on the occurrence of serious flooding in Bray on 17th November, 1965, it was decided by Bray Urban District Council and Wicklow County Council some months ago to engage a Consultant Engineer to carry out a special Survey and to submit a Report on flood prevention measures which might be undertaken.

Immediately after the flooding occurred in November last Bray Urban District Council and the County Council provided relief in various ways for many of those who had been affected, and in this they were assisted by voluntary effort. Many Voluntary Organisations came forward to help and there was a generous response from the public to an appeal for special funds to relieve immediate distress. In all at that time about £12,500 was spent from public funds and the proceeds of voluntary subscriptions on such immediate measures to relieve distress. Bray U.D.C. also spent £2,450 on strengthening Riverside Walls.

It was felt by the Members of Bray Urban District Council and Wicklow County Council that measures which would serve to prevent flooding in the future should be looked on as a State Scheme and the cost be defrayed from State Funds. It was recognised that the responsibility of Local Authorities over the years in the matter of drainage had been related to Sanitation; major measures for the relief of flooding from Rivers had been regarded as coming within the

term "Arterial Drainage" and special provision had been made for the carrying out of Arterial Drainage Schemes by the Central Authority through the Office of Public Works. It was represented to the Department of Local Government and to the Office of Public Works that flood prevention measures at Bray should be undertaken as a special State Scheme. Apart from the question of cost it was felt that the Office of Public Works had available specialist staffs and experience for the carrying out of Drainage Works. At the end of January, 1966, Bray Urban District Council and Wicklow County Council were informed that the Dargle River was not included in any proposed Scheme of Arterial Drainage and that the Office of Public Works would not be in a position to carry out a Scheme to relieve flooding in Bray. This information was considered by the two Local Authorities, and after a Joint Meeting between them on 15th February, 1966, it was decided to engage a Consultant Engineer to report on a suitable Scheme. On 21st February, 1966, it was decided that Mr. J. B. Barry, B.E., Consultant Engineer, be engaged to carry out a Survey and report on a Flood Prevention Scheme. The sanction of the Minister to the appointment of Mr. Barry was received by Bray Urban District Council at the end of March and by Wicklow County Council at the end of June, 1966. The Consultant and the specialist staff attached to his Office have been engaged on Surveys and the preparation of a Scheme over the past six months. In addition to specialist engineering staff the Consultant has employed divers and used special equipment for the examining of the River-bed.

A Preliminary Report and Estimates of Cost were submitted by the Consultant on 20th October, 1966. The complexity of the Survey and the detailed manner in which it has been carried out will be evident from the Report and the many Maps and other documents supporting it. Briefly the Survey relates to the three Rivers—Dargle, Glencree and Glencullen—and also to three minor tributaries—Kilcrouney and Swan Streams and the County Brook. It is pointed out by the Consultant that the retentive capacity of the drift found in the three River Valleys is low, with the result that run-off during heavy rains would be rapid. It is mentioned that the development in the Little Bray area by way of houses, shops and factories has taken place on what was the old "Flood Plain" of the Dargle River in its lower reaches. It may be of interest to note that the area which on three occasions was subject to severe flooding, viz., in 1905, 1931 and 1965, was at one time known as "Bray Commons" and it was only about one hundred years ago that these Common lands were enclosed. The area between Lower Dargle Road and the River was mainly left as a Public Park, but prior to 1905 a fair number of dwellings had been erected on part of the former Commons. All of these were private dwellings, i.e., erected through private enterprise. As the lands previously had been a Commons it is likely that sites for building in the area could be acquired at low prices. After the flooding of 1905 the wall forming the Northern boundary of the River, along by the People's Park, was strengthened and in the next ten years a number of houses were erected by the Urban District Council in the lower part of the area known as "Little Bray." Apparently it was expected that the new River-wall would serve to prevent flooding in future. In 1931 severe flooding again occurred and subsequently the Northern River-wall was raised to a higher level. This wall, however, was not found to afford adequate protection during the flooding of November, 1965.

It will be found that the Consultant in his Report mentions that the influence of the tide on major flooding experience in Bray is not significant and that the condition of the Harbour would have no

effect on the flood levels in the River channel.

The Consultant also points out in the Report that the weir across the River is no longer required for the purpose for which it was originally constructed. It should also be mentioned, however, that about fifteen years ago there was costly litigation in relation to water rights from the headrace leading from this weir. The main recommendations of the Consultant fall under a number of main headings, viz:—

- (a) Excavation of channel of River;
- (b) Underpinning and repairs to Northern wall of River;
- (c) Raising of wall at River Walk;
- (d) New flood wall at People's Park;
- (e) New retaining wall between People's Park and point near Laundry;
- (f) Construction of Gravel Trap in the Dargle River;
- (g) Removal of weir;
- (h) Works in vicinity of Laundry and "The Slang"; and
- (i) Excavation and other works to County Brook.

The cost of all the foregoing works is estimated by the Consultant at £116,000.

The County Engineer and the Town Engineer, Bray, have examined the Consultant's Report and are of the opinion that having regard to the scale of the works recommended and the considerable cost involved it would not be reasonable to expect the Local Authorities to defray such cost. Instead they consider that the Scheme now recommended, even if it were to be carried out by the Local Authorities, should be regarded as an Arterial Drainage Scheme and the cost be met from State Funds. The Office of Public Works had indicated that they were not in a position to carry out a Survey of the Dargle River owing to other commitments, but now that this Survey has been completed by the Consultant engaged by the two Councils, and a Report on a suitable Scheme has been submitted, it is felt that it would be reasonable to ask that the cost of such a Scheme be met from State Funds. The Scheme put forward by the Consultant is being recommended for your approval by the Town Engineer, Bray, and the County Engineer, but before further steps in relation to the preparation of final documents with a view to the carrying out of works can be arranged it would be necessary that the arrangements for meeting the costs should be determined after the Report and Estimates of Cost have been submitted to the Department of Local Government.

The dwellings and other buildings affected by the flood of November, 1965, lie for the greater part within Bray Urban District, but a small number are situated in the County Health District. It is found that the Rateable Value of the buildings affected within the Urban District comes to about £2,400, whilst the Rateable Value of the buildings just outside the Urban Boundary in the County Health District amounts to roughly £220.

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In the final part of his Report the Consultant stresses that some of the works set out by him would be of an urgent character and should be carried out immediately. It is understood that the cost of these urgent works would be about £30,000. The cost of the entire Scheme, it will be noted, is estimated at £116,000.

It is felt that it is necessary to stress that the Consultant makes it clear in his Report that the works recommended by him will only give protection against a flood flow of an intensity of 7,000 cubic ft. per second. The Scheme has been related to the experience in the past sixty years, i.e., the three floods of 1905, 1931 and 1965. The Consultant emphasises that floods of a greater intensity might possible occur, but that protection against floods of such a magnitude would be prohibitively expensive.

Re: Dargle River Flooding—Prevention Scheme.

A Chara,

I have examined the Consultant's Report and agree with the Scheme, as proposed, to remedy the flooding. It is noted that the flooding which caused the recent damage did not coincide with the highest tide. I consider, however, that in view of the prohibitive cost of carrying it out a Scheme to safeguard against the possible highest floods would not be justifiable.

Very little benefit will accrue to the area under the administration of the County Council as the area drained is small in comparison with the expense involved and most of the land has not a very high agricultural value. Most of the benefit would be gained by property holders and industrial concerns in the Bray Urban District, whose losses could be estimated at £80,000 in the recent floods.

I consider that a Drainage Scheme of this magnitude, which is of an arterial nature, should be a national charge rather than a charge on the local Rates.

A very thorough investigation of the problem has been made by the Consulting Engineer appointed by the Council and a Scheme has now been put forward by him which will save the Board of Works the time of their staff in investigating and preparing a Scheme.

I would suggest, therefore, that the Board of Works should now be asked, if this Scheme is acceptable to them, to carry out the Scheme or make the necessary finance available for the Local Authorities to do so. In the carrying out of the Scheme the masonry weir across the Dargle would have to be removed and certain ancient rights of firms and individuals in the area would be interfered with, which they may wish to contest. The Board of Works under the Arterial Drainage Act of 1945 would have much greater powers in dealing with such matters than the Local Authorities have.

As pointed out in the Consultant's Report the County Brook Drainage Scheme would also have to be carried out in conjunction with the Dargle Scheme to prevent flooding caused by overflowing

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its banks in the lower regions. If and when the Schemes are carried out it is most essential that sand-traps would be cleaned periodically and the channels be properly maintained. Again the matter as to who would be responsible for the financing of this work would arise.

It is suggested that if the Board of Works are not prepared to finance the Schemes and maintain them when they are carried out that the cost be proportioned between the Wicklow County Council and the Bray Urban District Council on a valuation basis on the property coming within their respective jurisdictions.

Finally, I consider it is most important that the repairs estimated at £30,000 in the Consultant's Report be carried out immediately in order to safeguard the existing protection works.

The County Secretary stated that the Report had already been considered by Bray Urban District Council and the Council had decided to ask the Minister to receive a Deputation from the Urban District Council and from the County Council, if the County Council were agreeable, to urge the Minister to agree to have the Scheme carried out as a matter of urgency by the Office of Public Works, financed by State Grant. Councillor Quigley referred to the flooding at Aughrim and suggested that the Council should await the Report of the Council's Consultant in regard to the flooding at Aughrim before sending the Deputation to the Minister. Councillor M. J. O'Neill referred to the flooding which had occurred from the River Slaney at Baltinglass and suggested that Mr. Barry, Consulting Engineer, be asked to prepare a Scheme to deal with the flooding in the town of Baltinglass. The County Manager pointed out that there was a special responsibility on the County Council as well as on the Urban District Council in respect of the flooding which had occurred in Bray and no similar problem had arisen elsewhere in the County. The County Council was particularly concerned in relation to the flooding in Bray by reason of their responsibilities for relief of distress which had been caused by the flooding. Three hundred and sixty-eight families had been affected, houses had had to be evacuated, shelter provided for the people concerned while their houses were dried, clothing and bedding had also to be provided, and the value of property affected was substantial. Two industries also were affected and both these industries provided employment for persons living in the rural area. The County Manager referred to the aid supplied by Voluntary Bodies and the special funds which had been raised by voluntary subscriptions to assist the families who had been affected by the flooding. The extent of damage done was estimated at £80,000 and £12,500 had been spent from voluntary subscriptions and from public funds.

In regard to the destruction of the wall at Wood Cottage in Wood Bridge in the County it was agreed that the Department be kept in the matter with the Minister and seek financial assistance at Grant towards the cost of these works.

The County Secretary submitted a letter addressed by the Minister for Local Government to the Chairman of the County Council in regard to the Road Safety Campaign to be conducted during the period 1st to 11th December, inclusive. During the Campaign a Road Safety Congress would be held in Dublin on the 6th and 7th December, to which Members of the Council and Officers of the Local Authority were invited. A Free Vehicle Check Scheme was being operated in Garages throughout the country and the Safety First Association was also co-operating fully in the Campaign. As requested in the letter, an "As-

Whelan stated that the Members of the Council for the Area had asked that a list be prepared of all roads in the Area in respect of which representations had been made that the Council take them over as Public Roads and that this list be circulated to the Members. The County Secretary stated that arrangements were being made to have this done.

**Item No. 10—Representations Re Need For Repair of Bye-pass Road
at Cronalea, Shillelagh.**

The County Secretary submitted letter received from Mr. W. Wilson, Cronalea, Shillelagh, regarding the state of repair of a bye-pass road at Cronalea, which was not a Public Road, and complaining of the condition of the road and asking that repairs be carried out. The Council noted that since the road had not been taken over as a Public Road no work could be carried out by the Council on it and agreed that the matter be referred for consideration by the Members of the Council for the Arklow Electoral Area at the Roads Estimates Meeting for the coming year.

**Item No. 11—Road Known As “Fassaroe Lane” (Berryfield Lane)—
Recommendation of Committee for Bray Electoral Area.**

The County Secretary stated that Members of the Council for the Bray Electoral Area had noted the Report of the County Engineer that the cost of putting the road leading from Fassaroe Cross to Berryfield (commonly known as “Berryfield Lane”) into a proper state of repair was £450 and had agreed to provide this sum in the Estimates for 1967/68 for repairs to the road and recommended that it be taken over as a Public Road before the end of the present financial year.

It was

Proposed by Councillor Mrs. M. Ledwidge;

Seconded by Councillor J. Temple:

Resolved—That having noted recommendation of the Members of the Council for the Bray Electoral Area we approve of public notice being given of intention to take over as a Public Road the road known as “Berryfield Lane,” Bray.

Passed.

**Item No. 12—Appointment of Additional Clerical Officer in County
Engineer's Office.**

Resolved—That we hereby approve of the creation of an additional office of Clerical Officer for the County Engineer's Office.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 13—Revision of Salary Scale for Clerical Officers.

Proposed by Councillor H. J. Byrne;

Seconded by Councillor J. Quigley:

Resolved—That having considered recommendation under Conciliation and Arbitration Scheme we approve, subject to the sanction of the Minister, of the application of the following salary scales for Clerical Officers, with effect from 1st April, 1966, and hereby authorise the necessary expenditure in excess of the amount provided in the current year's Estimates to meet the cost of the application of the revised salary scales:—

For Post-1964 Clerical Officers: £400 x £40—£600 x £76—£676 x £40
—£916 x £45—£1,051. (Plus £125 on Marriage).

For Pre-1964 Clerical Officers: £400 x £40—£600 x £76—£676 x £45
—£1,126 x £50—£1,176. (Scheme of Marriage Increment to continue).

Passed unanimously.

**Item No. 14—Avoca River Flooding—Representations From Avoca Area
and Report of County Engineer.**

The Council considered letter dated 8th October, 1966, from Mr. John J. Brown, Kilcashel, Avoca, on behalf of himself and traders and householders in the district, requesting that steps be taken for removal of obstruction along the River to prevent a recurrence of flooding. The Council noted the Report of the County Engineer, in which he stated that when Mr. J. B. Barry, B.E., Consulting Engineer, had examined the drainage of the Aughrim area it was likely that his Report would also make reference to the Avoca Drainage District and suggested that a Report on the Avoca area might be deferred until Mr. Barry's Report had been received. The Council agreed to await the submission of the Report.

Councillor J. D. Haughton asked that Ballinaclesh Bridge be examined as it appeared that there was a lot of silting at this place and that it would be desirable to have it cleared.

**Item No. 15—Supplementary Grants For New Houses and Repair and
Improvement of Houses—Report on Present Position.**

The County Secretary stated that the total moneys allocated in respect of Supplementary Grants for the current year amounted to £22,000 and that it appeared that from this sum the Council would be in a position to pay Supplementary Grants where State Grants had been approved and paid by the Department prior to the 31st October, 1966, and where applications had been submitted to the Council for Supplementary Grants. It had been agreed by the Council at the Meeting on 5th September, 1966, that the Supplementary Grants would be paid in the same order in which the appropriate State Grants had been paid by the Department. The County Secretary pointed out that the amount of moneys available would not permit of the payment of

Supplementary Grants in respect of the houses at Bentley Park, Bray, as State Grants had not yet been paid in respect of these houses. The Council noted the position in the matter and agreed with the priority as regards issue of payments.

Item No. 16—Notice of Motion In Name of Councillor J. Quigley Requesting Report From County Engineer Re Removal of Fountain At Rednagh Road, Aughrim, Close To Proposed New Entrance To G.A.A. County Grounds.

Mr. J. P. Caffrey, Assistant County Engineer, stated that the G.A.A. proposed to provide a new entrance to their Grounds at Rednagh Road and this involved moving the fountain at the side of the road. Councillor Quigley urged that the cottage tenants who obtained water from the fountain be consulted and their agreement reached in regard to an alternative site for the fountain before it was moved. It was agreed that the Gaelic Athletic Association be asked to consult the tenants and to meet their wishes in regard to the alternative site for the pump.

Item No. 17—Notice of Motion in Names of Councillors M. J. O'Neill and G. Timmins: "That the Council extend the Watermain from existing Fountain at Raheen, Baltinglass, to Council Houses at Raheen."

The County Secretary stated that a Report on this matter was not yet available and the Council agreed to defer it to the next Meeting.

Item No. 18—Dumping Ground at Tinahely—Report of County Engineer on site proposed.

The Council noted the Report of the County Engineer on his examination of a site at Tinahely which had been suggested for a new Dumping Ground. The County Engineer had indicated that the site would not be suitable. At the request of Councillor Miss Walsh it was agreed that the County Engineer be asked to seek a suitable alternative site for the Dumping Ground.

Item No. 19—Filling of Vacancies for District Medical Officers at Blessington and Rathdrum.

The County Secretary stated that the Department of Health had indicated that representatives had been made to the Minister in regard to the decision that further vacancies for District Medical Officers would not be filled on a permanent basis for the present because of the question of the introduction of a "Choice of Doctor" Scheme and that the view had been put forward that this decision had taken from permanent District Medical Officers their normal opportunity to transfer to other Districts. In an endeavour to minimise the dissatisfaction which some District Officers might feel on this score the Minister had agreed to ask the Local Appointments Commission to hold a competition for the making of permanent appointments in a number of Districts, the candidature to be restricted, however, to existing permanent Officers. The Council had been informed that the posts of District Medical Officer for Blessington Dispensary District and Rathdrum Dispensary District had been included in the limited competition to be held by the Local Appointments Commission. Councillor J. D. Haughton welcomed the decision and referred to the position in Rathdrum where residents were dependent on a doctor who lived twelve miles away from the town. Councillor J. Miley stated that the temporary District Medical Officer in Blessington was providing a very satisfactory service for the

locality and asked that representations be made to the Department of Health to defer the permanent filling of the position in Blessington. It was agreed that the views of the Council in regard to the retention of the services of the temporary doctor at Blessington be conveyed to the Department of Health.

Item No. 20—Proposed introduction of 85 Hour Fortnight for Nursing Staffs and granting Additional Annual Leave in lieu of Public Holidays.

It was
Proposed by Councillor J. Temple;
Seconded by Councillor H. B. Hipwell:

Resolved—That we approve of the introduction of an 85 hour fortnight for Nursing Staffs and the granting of additional Annual Leave in lieu of Public Holidays worked, with effect from 1st December, 1966, as recommended by Department of Health, and hereby authorise the necessary expenditure in excess of the amount provided in the current year's Estimates to defray the cost of the application of the reduced working fortnight and of additional holiday relief.
Passed unanimously.

Item No. 21—Requirements of Circuit Court Judge for Courthouse, Wicklow—Report of County Engineer.

The County Secretary stated that the County Engineer had submitted an estimate of the cost of items requested by Judge Deale for the Circuit Court, Wicklow, amounting to £60, and that the replacement of linoleum in Offices of the County Registrar, which had been requested, was estimated to cost £55. Councillor J. Temple referred to the discussion at the Estimates Meeting in which the Council had expressed the view that repairs to Courthouses and their maintenance should be the responsibility of the Minister for Justice. The County Secretary pointed out that a sum of £600 had been provided in the Estimates for the maintenance of Courthouses, which remained a statutory duty of the Council, and that up to date a sum of about £370 had been spent.

Item No. 22—The Green, Kilcoole—Letter from Mrs. L. O'Gorman.

The Council considered letter of 19th October, 1966, from Mrs. Lily O'Gorman regarding The Green at Kilcoole, and agreed that the Scott Estate, who were the owners of The Green, be requested to arrange for the fencing of The Green.

Item No. 23—Inquiries Arising from County Manager's Orders.

The Council noted the particulars of County Manager's Orders which had been circulated to the Members.
Newcastle Mental Hospital.

It was
Proposed by Councillor J. Temple;
Seconded by Councillor H. B. Hipwell:

Resolved—That we hold a Special Meeting at Newcastle Mental Hospital.

The County Manager pointed out that the Members of the Council had been informed at the previous Meeting that Newcastle Mental Hospital would open on the 1st November, 1966, and that a number of patients would be taken in. At present there were about 20 patients in the Hospital. A Visiting Committee would need to be appointed and this matter would be included on the Agenda for the next Meeting of the Council. In regard to the proposal that a Special Meeting be held at Newcastle Mental Hospital the County Manager stated that it would not be desirable to have a formal Meeting at the Hospital and suggested that arrangements might be made for Members of the Council to visit the Hospital at an early date rather than hold a formal Meeting. The Council agreed to the proposal that arrangements be made for a visit by the Members of the Council possibly early in the New Year.

Tenders for Rural Cottages.

The County Secretary submitted letter received from the Department of Local Government conveying sanction to the acceptance of Tenders for the erection of Five Rural Cottages, subject to conditions in regard to the matter of water supply and sewerage facilities. The County Engineer had examined Tenders received for the erection of a cottage at Moylisha and recommended the acceptance of the lower of the Tenders received. The Council approved of the recommendation of the County Engineer and asked that the sanction of the Minister to the acceptance of this Tender be sought immediately. The County Secretary stated that the estimated total cost of the erection of the ten Rural Cottages was £23,800. The Council had authorised the raising of a Loan based on the estimated cost of the houses, but it would be desirable to have this authorisation replaced by one to cover the cost as now ascertained.

Proposed by Councillor G. Timmins;

Recorded by Councillor J. Miley:

Resolved—That we hereby authorise the borrowing of a sum of £23,800 from the Commissioners of Public Works, re-payable over a period of fifty years, to defray the cost of the erection of ten Rural Houses.

Passed unanimously.

The County Secretary stated that the moneys allocated to the Council for New Housing in the present year would not be sufficient to allow of the Council proceeding with the erection of these cottages for some months.

Greystones Harbour.

In reply to Councillor J. Everett, T.D., the County Secretary stated that a Report from the County Engineer in regard to Greystones Harbour would be available for the next Meeting.

Water Supply Schemes for Milltown Lane, Rathnew and Newcastle.

In reply to Councillor J. Everett, T.D., the County Secretary stated that Contracts had been accepted for both these Schemes and as soon as the Insurance Bonds had been completed work could commence.

Rathdrum Water Supply.

Councillor J. D. Haughton referred to the unsatisfactory condition of the water supply at Rathdrum and asked that this matter be attended to. He referred also to previous applications for the provision of an extension from the Glenealy Water Supply to serve houses at Bahana and asked that this matter be expedited.

It was

Proposed by Councillor H. J. Byrne;

Seconded by Councillor Mrs. M. Ledwidge.

Resolved—That in accordance with Section 4 of the City and County Management (Amendment) Act, 1955, we, the Members of Wicklow County Council, hereby instruct the County Manager to issue Planning approval for the erection of a Motel on site at Kilmurray, Kilmacanogue, Co. Wicklow, for Mr. D. W. T. Fitzmaurice.

As requested by the Council, a Plan showing the proposed dual-carriageway south of Kilmacanogue and passing the site on the proposed Motel was submitted to the Meeting. The County Engineer pointed out that the only method of access to Motel would be from the dual-carriageway and that this would give rise to a traffic hazard. The County Secretary stated that Planning permission had been granted for a Motel by this applicant on a site at Kilmacanogue subject to access being only from the County Road, which joined the Arterial Road at that point. As it appeared that the Site Plan submitted had shown the incorrect site, applicant submitted a further application showing the correct site, which was located near Kilmurray, south of Kilmacanogue. Details of the grounds of refusal of permission were submitted to the Council. Councillor H. J. Byrne stated that this was an important development, which would provide additional bedroom accommodation and attract more visitors to the country, as was being urged by Bord Failte, and the applicant was prepared to spend £30,000 on erecting a Motel. The resolution was declared passed unanimously.

Item No. 2—Development Plans — Letter Dated 9th November, 1966, from Department of Local Government Regarding Statutory Requirements for Completion of Development Plans, etc.

The County Secretary stated that a copy of the Department's letter of the 9th November, 1966, had been circulated to the Members. It would be noted that in order to have the Development Plan completed and adopted within the prescribed period of three years ending on 1st October, 1967, it would be necessary to have the Draft Plan adopted, if possible, by the 31st March, 1967, to ensure an adequate period for compliance with the procedures for having the Plan available for inspection and consideration of objections or representations. The County Secretary stated that subject to the agreement of the Members it was proposed to arrange Meetings with the Local Area Committees for the purpose of outlining the proposed provisions in the Draft Development Plan and it was suggested that these Meetings be held at an early date. The Council agreed that Meetings of the Local Electoral Area Committees be held during the month of January, the dates to be decided upon at a meeting of the Council to be held on 2nd Jan., 1967.

Item No. 3—Notice of Motion in Names of Councillors J. Temple H. B. Hipwell and E. Miley:—"That all Town Planning Applications be placed on the Agenda Before Refusals are Issued."

It was

Proposed by Councillor J. Temple;

Seconded by Councillor H. B. Hipwell;

Resolved—That all Town Planning applications where refusals are contemplated be placed on the Agenda before refusals are issued.

Councillor Temple stated that he had made this suggestion at a previous Meeting, but as no action had been taken on it he was now moving it formally. He stated that in his opinion Members should have the opportunity of discussing Planning proposals which were proposed to be refused before formal Orders refusing permission were made. The County Manager pointed out that there were two major difficulties in complying with this proposal, these being the large number of applications received and the requirement that a decision on the application be taken within a period of two months. About 500 applications were received in the course of a year and all of these had to be carefully examined and it was necessary that a decision be taken within a period of two months or permission would be granted by default. As it was not unusual that cases where the eventual decision was to refuse an application required lengthy consideration it would not be possible to ensure that all such cases were submitted to the Council in view of the requirement referred to that a decision be taken within two months. In reply to inquiry from Councillor Timmins the County Secretary stated that less than 10 per cent of applications had been refused in the previous year. The Resolution was declared passed unanimously. The County Secretary pointed out that due to the matter of the time-limit for decision it might be necessary for a decision to be taken on an application before the opportunity was available of submitting it to the Council. Councillor Temple stated that he appreciated that such a situation could arise. The County Manager stated that the opinion of the Council's Solicitor on the matter would be obtained.

Item No. 4—Notice of Motion in Name of Councillor J. Miley:—"That this Council supply up-to-date Report on New Housing Scheme of this Council with the Department at Advertisement Stage for Building."

The County Secretary reported on the position regarding Housing Schemes as follows:-

Blessington: The Department had approved of Layout, House Plan, Specification and Estimate of Cost for houses on Site 'A' at Blessington and the agreement of the Department of Posts and Telegraphs to proposed television and master aerial was being sought. It was expected that Tenders could be invited in time to be available for consideration at the February Meeting of the Council.

Ballywaltrim, Bray: Layout, House Plan, Specification and Estimate of Cost for three houses at Ballywaltrim, Bray, had been approved by the Department and Tenders were being invited within the next week and would be available for submission to the Council at the January Meeting.

Grattan Park, Kindlestown: The proposal to accept the Tender of the present Contractor to erect a further eleven houses had been submitted to the Department of Local Government for sanction, but sanction was not yet available.

Newtownmountkenedy: Layout, House Plan, Estimate of Cost and Specifications for the erection of twelve houses at Newtownmountkenedy had been approved by the Department and the necessary documents for inviting Tenders were being prepared and it was hoped that Tenders would be available for consideration at the Feb. Meeting of the Council.

Laragh: Approval had been requested to see the Layout Plan for two additional houses at Laragh, but sanction to inviting Tenders had not yet been received.

Parkmore, Baltinglass: Layout and House Plan had been submitted to the Department in respect of the erection of five two-storey houses at Parkmore, but sanction to inviting Tenders was not yet available.

Kilgarron, Enniskerry: Tenders for the erection of ten houses, together with development works, had been invited and Tenders re-

ceived would be opened later in the Meeting.

Dunlavin: The Council's Architect stated that he was at present engaged on Plans for housing at Dunlavin.

The Council noted the position regarding Housing Schemes.

Grattan Park Housing Scheme.

The County Secretary stated that the Council's Architect had reported that it was estimated that the extras on construction of the nine houses at Grattan Park would amount to £1,564. The major part of the extras would be due to increase in cost of labour and materials since the Tenders were invited (approximately two years ago).

It was

Proposed by Councillor E. Byrne;

Seconded by Councillor Mrs. M. Ledwidge.

Resolved—That we note the Report of the Council's Architect of 2nd December, 1966, and approve of the additional expenditure (estimated at £1,564) in respect of extras on the construction of the nine houses at Grattan Park, Kindlestown.

Passed unanimously

Councillor J. Temple stated he had received complaints in regard to the lack of rear entrances to the houses at Grattan Park and that tenants who wished to bring in a bag of coal had to take it through the front door as there was no side entrance. The County Architect pointed out that the houses had been designed with lobbies so that while coal would have to be brought through the front door it did not involve in being brought into any of the rooms in order to reach the rear of the house. The County Manager pointed out that the houses had been erected as terraced houses, which effected a saving in cost as well as providing a better appearance. Councillor Temple suggested that a side entrance could have been provided and asked that the matter be examined by the Architect and a Report submitted.

Item No. 5—Notice of Motion in Names of Councillors J. Everett, T.D., J. Gregory and J. D. Haugh on:— "That we Request a Report by Next Meeting on Progress made in Connection with the Erection of Houses in Rathnew where sites were already offered."

The County Secretary submitted a Report in regard to the approaches which had been made to owners of sites in Rathnew which had been considered suitable for housing by the Council's Architect. At the suggestion of Councillor J. Everett, T.D., it was agreed that consideration of the matter of the sites for housing in Rathnew be referred to the Members of the Council for the Wicklow Electoral Area.

The County Secretary having reported regarding the applicants referred to in the Notice of Motion, the Council, on the proposal of Councillor J. Everett, T.D., agreed that the matter of obtaining a site for housing at Ashford be referred for consideration by Members of the Council for the Wicklow Electoral Area. It was agreed also that the site at Milltown Lane, suggested by Councillor J. Everett, T.D., be investigated and a Report submitted to the Committee.

Item No. 7—Notice of Motion in Names of Councillors J. Everett, T.D., J. Gregory and J. D. Haughton:— "That County Manager Vest Cottages for following Tenants:— E. Vines, Kilpedder (applied November, 1957); and James Murphy, Old Village, Rathnew (applied in 1964)."

The County Secretary stated that in the case of Mr. Vines a Form had been sent to him for completion to indicate that he was satisfied

with the state of repair of the cottage, but so far this had not been returned. Councillor Gregory stated that Mr. Vines was satisfied regarding the condition of the cottage and would sign and return the Form. In the case of the application of Mr. James Murphy, Old Village, Rathnew, the County Secretary stated that he was a single man, but that a family resided in the house with him. Councillor Gregory stated that it was Mr. Murphy's intention, if he were allowed to purchase the cottage, to transfer it to the family who were living with him in the cottage. The County Manager stated that in the circumstances the cottage would be vested in Mr. Murphy.

Item No. 8—Notice of Motion in Name of Councillor Miss M. Walsh re Sale of Vested Cottage at Ballyshonogue, Tinahely:— "That in view of the Amount of Money Expended by Michael Dempsey on the Reconstruction of his Vested Cottage at Ballyshonogue, Tinahely, that we Consider the Amount of £316-13-4 to be Excessive and feel that an Equitable Adjustment be made."

The County Secretary submitted the Report of the County Engineer in regard to his valuation of the cottage, in which he indicated that he considered the market value of the cottage and plot as at present was £1,200 and the value of the improvements carried out by the tenant-purchaser amounted to £30. If allowances were made for the value of the improvements carried out by the tenant-purchaser the net market value would be taken at £900 and one-third of this sum, i.e., £300, would be payable to the Council. Councillor Miss Walsh contended that the value of the work carried out by the applicant was in the region of £450 and that a sum of not more than £200 should be payable to the Council. The County Secretary suggested that possibly the Council might consider that the actual sale price of £950 be taken as the present market value of the cottage and one-quarter of the market value be regarded as the value of the improvements made by the tenant, this being the proportion given by the County Engineer. The net market value would thus be reduced to £712-10-0 and the amount to be paid to the Council would be £237-10-0. Councillor Miss Walsh, however, contended that this figure was still excessive and it was agreed that the County Engineer re-examine the matter and personally inspect the cottage.

In consequence the rate of interest chargeable to borrowers in respect of Loans for the Purchase or erection of New Houses would be $8\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. where moneys were advanced on or after 28th November, 1966.

Temple, the County Secretary stated that no reply had yet been received from the Department of Local Government to the request of the Council for the reception by the Minister for Local Government of a Deputation (jointly with Bray Urban District Council) in connection with the flooding at Bray and other areas in the County in November, 1965. The Council asked that a reminder be addressed to the Department on the matter.

Derrybawn Bridge.

Councillor J. D. Haughton stated that persons who used Derrybawn Bridge had asked him to convey their thanks to the Council for completing the repairs to the Bridge in such a short time. They wished to point out, however, that there was no fencing at either side of the approaches to the Bridge and that in consequence sheep being driven across the Bridge had gone into the River. He asked if fencing could be provided at the approaches to the Bridge. The County Engineer stated that the matter would be examined.

Bray Clinic.

The County Manager stated that the Department of Local Government notified the Council of the allocation for Arterial Road Grants and Main Road Improvement Grants each year and that the main difficulties had arisen in connection with Arterial Roads. Before works could be commenced it was necessary to prepare detailed designs and Plans and Estimates for the particular sections of road and it was inevitable that time would elapse before these designs could be completed and approved by the Department. The County Manager stated that sometimes it was not very clear as to the standards to which particular sections of the roads should be done and in some cases this involved altering Plans to improved standards. He felt it would be helpful if more information in regard to the policy of the Department of Local Government in relation to the particular sections of Arterial Road to be improved was made available both to the staff and to the Members of the Council. In respect of the section of roadway between St. Valerie Bridge and Kilmacanogue it had been indicated by the Department of Local Government that this section be planned as a dual-carriageway road instead of as a single carriageway. The County Engineer stated that Plans had been prepared and had been approved by the Department in principle for the improvement of the road from St. Valerie Bridge to Kilmacanogue and also from Kilpedder to the Glen O' Downs. The estimated cost of these works was in the region of £250,000. Difficulty had been experienced in acquiring all the necessary land and this had delayed commencing the works. Councillor Temple referred to the moneys which had been expended by the Council on the Repair of Bridges and Roads damaged by Flooding and felt that the Council should insist that the costs of these works be accepted as a charge against the balances of Arterial Road Grants at present unexpended. The County Secretary stated that the Council had been informed by the Department that existing Road Fund Grants could be allocated against the cost of Repairs to Bridges and Roads damaged by Flooding, but that these costs could not be charged against Grants allocated for Arterial Roads. The County Engineer stated that to date the expenditure on Repairs to County Road Bridges was approximately £30,000 and Main Road Bridges £18,000.

A Chara,

I am directed by the Minister for Health to refer to your letter of the 17th November, 1966, regarding the view of the Wicklow County Council that the post of District Medical Officer should be omitted from the forthcoming confined competition for posts as District Medical Officer.

As you are aware the recruitment of permanent District Medical Officers has been suspended since May, 1965, pending consideration of the introduction of a general medical service with choice of doctor in lieu of the present dispensary system. The Minister received representations from the Irish Medical Association and the Medical Union that permanent District Medical Officers were being denied an opportunity of transferring to other districts following this "freeze" on the filling of permanent posts of District Medical Officer and the Minister agreed to the holding of the limited competition to remedy the position.

The Association and the Union were anxious that as many posts as possible should be included in the competition and the Minister does not consider that he would be justified in omitting the Blessington post on the basis that it is at present filled satisfactorily by a temporary District Medical Officer. Such a decision would be regarded as a precedent in other areas where a similar situation exists. Besides, the inclusion of the post in the competition should not result in a worsening of the service in Blessington as either a permanent District Medical Officer will move to the district or in the event of no such officer being interested in transferring to Blessington the existing temporary District Medical Officer can be continued in his post.

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Item No. 10—St. Colman's Hospital, Rathdrum — Construction of Static Water Storage Tank.

The County Secretary stated that it had not been possible to obtain a Loan for the carrying out of the work of providing a Static Water Storage Tank for St. Colman's Hospital, Rathdrum, and as it was considered that this Tank was urgently required it was suggested that the Council might agree to authorise the expenditure by way of an excess on the amount provided in the current year's Estimates pending the raising of a Loan for the General Scheme of Improvements for St. Colman's Hospital.

It was

Proposed by Councillor Miss M. Walsh;

Seconded by Councillor J. Quigley:

Resolved—That we hereby authorise excess expenditure of £3,500 (financed from Overdraft) in excess of the amount provided in the current year's Estimates to meet the cost of construction of Static Water Storage Tank at St. Colman's Hospital, Rathdrum, pending the raising of a Loan for the General Scheme of Improvements for St. Colman's Hospital.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 11—Notice of Motion in Name of Councillor J. Whelan: "That four Public Lights be provided at Askinagap."

The Council agreed to defer consideration of the Notice of Motion pending receipt of the Report of the County Engineer.

Item No. 12—Notice of Motion in Name of Councillor J. Quigley: "That two extra Public Lights be erected at Greerane."

The Council decided to defer consideration of this item pending receipt of the County Engineer's Report.

Item No. 13—Notice of Motion in Names of Councillors M. J. O'Neill and G. Timmins: "That the Council extend the Watermain from the existing Fountain at Raheen, Baltinglass, to the Council Houses at Raheen."

The County Secretary stated that the County Engineer had reported that the extension would entail the laying of 800 lin. yards of 3" H.D. polythene piping at a cost of approximately 8/- per yd., making a total cost of £320. The extension would serve five houses—those occupied by Messrs. O'Hara, Fleming, Faulkner, O'Brien and Molloy.

Proposed by Councillor M. J. O'Neill;

Seconded by Councillor G. Timmins:

Resolved—That we approve of the extension of watermain from existing fountain at Raheen, Baltinglass, to Council houses at Raheen.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 14—Water Supply for Houses at Ballynerrin, Wicklow.

The County Secretary stated that the County Engineer had recommended that a new 2" dia. main be laid at Ballynerrin and that seven cottages which at present had connections from the 8" main be served from the new main and that the further three cottages for which applications to connect had been made be also connected to the new main. The estimated cost of providing the main was £607.

Proposed by Councillor J. Everett, T.D.;

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Seconded by Councillor J. Gregory:

Resolved—That we approve of recommendation of County Engineer for laying of 239 yds. of 2" dia. Class 'B' watermain at Ballynerrin, including provision of connections for ten cottages, at estimated cost of £607, and authorise excess expenditure over the amount provided in the current year's Estimates to meet the cost of the main. Passed unanimously.

Item No. 15—Notice of Motion in Names of Councillors H. W. Hopkins, J. D. Haughton and J. Everett, T.D.: "That the Council give serious consideration to the Coast Erosion affecting the Wicklow Urban Area."

The County Secretary stated that a Preliminary Report from the Office of Public Works in regard to the Coast Erosion at Wicklow had been received. The Report was as follows:—

A. Chara,

I am to refer to the proposal submitted by your Council under the Coast Protection Act, 1963, for protection works at the Murrough, Wicklow.

The Commissioners of Public Works have completed a preliminary examination under Section 3 of the Act and have made a determination under Section 4 (1) (b) that the circumstances are such that the preparation and execution of a coast protection scheme is feasible. I enclose a report with accompanying map in accordance with Section 4 (3) of the Act.

It is not possible from a preliminary examination to state precisely the extent of land and property being endangered or likely to be endangered by the encroachment of the sea but at an appropriate later stage this would be gone into. The greater part of the cost of the works set out at 2 of the report would be for the filling of the beach with imported material. Maintenance of the works would include periodic replenishment of the beach. It is difficult to assess the extent of this replenishment but as far as can be judged at present-day rates, the average annual cost would be £1,500. Under the Coast Protection Act, maintenance of completed works is the responsibility of the Commissioners of Public Works but the costs and expenses thereof have to be refunded in full by the promoting authority.

I may add that should your Council now make a declaration under paragraph (b) of subsection (1) of Section 5 of the Act, further consideration of the case would have to be deferred owing to the present financial situation.

The total cost of the works was estimated at £23,000 and the annual maintenance cost at £1,500. Details of the Report were also submitted to the Council. The County Secretary stated that the Council (as Promoting Authority) would be primarily responsible for the costs of the Scheme and also be primarily responsible for refunding to the Commissioners the cost of Annual Maintenance. The Urban District Council of Wicklow would be responsible for con-

tributing to the County Council's expenditure both in regard to the cost of the Scheme and to the Annual Maintenance Charges. Councillor Hopkins stated that he could not agree with all the details supplied by the Commissioners and stated that he was concerned at the statement that even if the Council accepted the Scheme the matter would have to be deferred owing to the present financial situation. He stated that between 1956 and 1962 Wicklow Urban District Council had received Grants amounting to £21,950 towards the cost of Coast Protection Works, but had had to raise a sum of £6,025 from Rates. The cost of Coast Protection in Wicklow now amounted to 1/1d. in the Rates and he felt the Urban District Council should not be asked to contribute further to any Scheme. The County Secretary suggested that the Council might defer a final decision on the Scheme and refer the matter for consideration by Wicklow Urban District Council and for the Urban District Council's views as regards the matter of their contribution towards the costs of the Scheme and to the cost of Maintenance. The Council agreed that the views of Wicklow Urban District Council in regard to the Scheme and the costs involved be obtained.

Councillor J. Temple stated that he understood that the Board of Works had promised to have available at an early date their Report in connection with the Coast Erosion at Ballygannon, between Kilcoole and Greystones, and asked that a reminder be addressed to the Commissioners of Public Works on the matter.

Seconded by Councillor H. W. Hopkins:

Resolved—That we refer the Report regarding Coast Protection Works for consideration by Wicklow Urban District Council.

Passed unanimously.

Item No. 16—Report of County Engineer on Works at Greystones Harbour.

The following Report of the County Engineer was submitted to and noted by the Members of the Council:—

Re: Greystones Harbour.

A Chara,

Due to the uneven, rocky nature of the bed of the sea near the Harbour, it was not possible to bring the Kish Lighthouse as near the Pier as originally intended. The rubble offered for filling of the gap between the Lighthouse and the Pier proved to be unsuitable both in size and uneconomical as the owner of the site would only allow certain of the material to be removed. It was, therefore, necessary to get an alternative source of supply. Stone was got from the Sugarloaf and heavy facing stone was brought from Carrigmore Quarry which was fifteen miles away. In the recent heavy storms some of the stone was displaced from its original position by the high tides, with the result that the protection wall has subsided considerably. I have been informed locally that these particular tides were the severest in living memory.

The work carried out has afforded a great deal of protection to the foreshore, as has been evidenced by the very little damage that has been done by the high tides in comparison with the damage caused by much lesser tides in previous years.

The work carried out has and will continue to afford protection

to the foreshore and to boats anchored in the Harbour. Approximately 950 cubic yards of rubble were placed in position. If it is intended that a permanent Pier be constructed as a connection between the Kish Lighthouse base and the existing Pier it would be necessary to carry out a detailed Survey and design for a permanent retaining wall to withstand the highest tides possible.

As this is work of a specialised nature, it is recommended that a Consulting Engineer be appointed.

Councillor J. Everett, T.D., contended that the work carried out had not been satisfactory and that he could not agree with the terms of the County Engineer's Report. Councillor J. Temple stated that the Members of the Council for the Bray Electoral Area were very interested in the matter and he felt it should be left to them. It was agreed that the matter be considered further by the Members of the Council for the Bray Electoral Area.

Item No. 17—Acquisition of Plot of Land adjoining Dargle River, Bray—Letter from the Solicitors for Owner.

The County Secretary stated that a letter had been received from the Solicitors for Miss M. Barton, who was the owner of this plot of land, in which it was indicated that she had assigned her interest to the Rev. Fr. Gerald Healy. It was stated by the Solicitors that the rent received for the plot of land and the Advertising Hoarding thereon exceeded the offer being made by the Council and that they could not advise their clients to accept the offer. Councillor H. J. Byrne stated that he would arrange to contact Fr. Healy with a view to reaching an agreement in the matter and he pointed out that part of the site was owned by the Pembroke Estate. The Members of the Council noted that the matter was also being considered by Bray Urban District Council at their Meeting on the following night.

Item No. 18—Application of County Wicklow Vocational Education Committee for Grant of £20,000 to Finance Erection of extra Classrooms at various Centres.

The following letter from the Vocational Education Committee was submitted:—

Dear Sir,

I am instructed by my Committee to ask whether your Council would be prepared to make a grant of the sum of £20,000 to finance the erection of extra classrooms which are urgently required at various centres throughout the county. It is hoped that your Council would agree to raise a loan for the purpose of this grant, in which case one-half of the sum involved would be recouped to you by the Department of Education under the terms of Section 51 of the V.E. Act, 1930.

For the information of your members, I wish to state that the need for the additional classrooms arises from:—

(a) The substantial increase in enrolments in day classes at all centres which has already taken place.

- (b) The introduction of the Intermediate Certificate Programme to Vocational Schools and the resulting extension of day school courses from two to three years.

My Committee had planned for the carrying out of permanent extensions at its various schools and for the erection of a new school at Arklow, but due to the general economic conditions which prevailed over the past 18 months, these plans for development have been held up by the Department. As an interim measure, the Committee now proposes to try and meet the need for more accommodation by providing pre-fabricated wooden classrooms where required. Vocational Education Committees in other counties are proceeding along similar lines. It is estimated that the pre-fabricated buildings now envisaged would have a useful life of 20 years.

I give hereunder a list of the centres at which the additional rooms are required:—

Item No. 19—Courthouse, Tinahely—Estimate of Cost of Decoration of Hall.

The County Secretary stated that the Tinahely I.C.A. Guild had inquired if the Council would agree to their re-decorating the inside of the hall of the Courthouse in Tinahely and had suggested that the Council might supply the materials and they would have the work carried out. The County Engineer had reported that he did not think the suggestion that the Hall could be painted by the members of the I.C.A. to be a workable one in view of the height involved, the Hall being approximately 20 ft. high. He estimated the cost of labour and materials in painting internally the Hall, which is now used as a Dance Hall and Badminton Hall, at £110.

Resolved—That we approve of expenditure of £110 in excess of the amount provided in the current year's Estimates to defray the cost of internal painting of the Hall at Tinahely Courthouse.

Item No. 20—Courthouse, Baltinglass—Estimate of Cost of Painting and Decorating.

The County Secretary stated that the County Engineer in a Report regarding Baltinglass Courthouse had submitted an estimate of £455 in respect of cleaning fungus from external walls and sterilising affected area of brickwork, applying two coats of 'Snowcem' to the walls, and cleaning internal walls, sterilising areas affected by fungus, applying paint and decorating ceilings, painting woodwork, and varnishing benches.

Item No. 21—Sale of Vested Cottages at Cronehorn, Carnew, and Ballynultagh, Shillelagh, and application for Redemption of Annuity of Cottage at Cronehorn, Carnew—Report requested by Councillor Whelan.

As requested by Councillor Whelan the County Secretary gave details of the position regarding the sale of Vested Cottages, of whom the former tenant-purchasers were the late Patrick Somers (deceased) and Mr. Keogh. An application had been received from Mr. Patrick Kilbride for consent to the redemption of the Annuity on his Vested Cottage, but he had been informed that the Council was not prepared to accept redemption of the Annuity. Mr. Kilbride had been carrying on the business of retail grocery in a premises built with concrete blocks and roofed with iron, erected on the cottage plot, without having obtained any permission from the Council, and legal proceedings had been instituted against him to re-vest the cottage in the Council by reason of the breach of the Statutory Conditions. Mr. Kilbride had also commenced to erect a Garage as an extension to the "unauthorised structure" without having sought or obtained Planning permission.

Item No. 22—Inquiries arising from County Manager's Orders.

The Council noted the particulars of County Manager's Orders which had been circulated to the Members.

Notices of Motion.

The following Notices of Motion were handed in and accepted by the Chairman:—

In the names of Councillor James Miley, James Whelan and M. J. O'Neill as follows: "I, or some Member for me, move at the next Council Meeting instruct the Council erect the houses approved by the Minister for Local Government and that we finance them out of some of the money we instructed the Council to borrow up to 31st March, 1967, to-day (12/12/'66)."

In the name of Councillor Edward Byrne: "That the District Engineer report on the need for a public light midway down the road at the cottages at Redford, Greystones."

In the name of Councillor James Whelan: "That I, or someone for me, will propose that the Council advertise for Tenders for the erection of the house for Richard Breen of Rathmeigue."

In regard to the Notice of Motion in the name of Councillor Miss Walsh: ("That the road leading to the Holy Year Cross at Avoca be taken over and maintained by the Council")—Councillor H. J. Byrne, Chairman, pointed out that this matter would have to be referred to the Local Roads Estimates Meeting, and it was agreed that this procedure be followed.

Message from Chairman.

Councillor H. J. Byrne, Vice-Chairman, stated that a telephone message had been received from Councillor J. J. McCrea, Chairman, to say that he had hoped to attend the Meeting that day, but due to the bad weather he felt it would be unwise of him to come. Councillor H. J. Byrne stated that the Chairman had expressed his best wishes to the Members of the Council and to the Officers and Staff for the Christmas Season. Councillor H. J. Byrne stated that he felt the Council would wish to return the compliments of the Season to Councillor McCrea and to express the hope that he would be with them again as Chairman in the New Year.

Reception of Deputations.

The County Secretary stated that an application had been received from the Secretary to the Local Development Association at Dunlavin asking if the Council would receive a Deputation from the town in order that the need for houses in Dunlavin could be urged. The Council agreed to receive the Deputation at the Housing Meeting on the 2nd January, 1967.

The County Secretary stated that a request had also been received from the Labour Party (Kilmacanogue Branch) for the reception of a Deputation or for a Meeting with the Members of the Council in relation to the matter of water supply to cottages at Ballybawn. The Council agreed that a Deputation from the Branch be met by the Members of the Council for the Bray Electoral Area at their next Local Meeting.
