The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, (or Orders made on them respectively as follows:)

Letter N<sup>o</sup> 14762 Dated 26<sup>th</sup> Instant Stating that the Commissioners have been with surprise and regret the sanction given by the Board of Guardians to the very improper language contained in the letter addressed to the Guardians by the Master of the ~~Master of the~~ Workhouse as entered on the Guardians Minutes of the 20<sup>th</sup> Instant and to the Master equally improper proposal of placing himself in communication with the Guardians of other Unions in Ireland on the subject of the existing form of Workhouse accounts as prescribed by the General Order of the Commissioners. In that letter the Master assumes that he has invented a Form of Accounts which if adopted will protect Unions against fraud, on the part of the Officers keeping those accounts; but this statement is wholly without foundation, as a careful examination of the Form in question will show to those who are conversant with Workhouse Accounts. The statement that the existing Form are open to frauds from which the suggested form are exempt, is also without foundation; Nor do the Commissioners believe that any Form of accounts could be adopted, the use of which would prevent the possibility of fraud by fraudulent Officers.

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if the accounts be not duly examined by those charged with the duty of examining and auditing them.

The Commissioners have already stated that they have no objection to the process suggested by the Workhouse Master being used as subsidiary processes to facilitate the examination of the Workhouse accounts of this Union; but they must require the Master to desist from so improper a proceeding as that of placing himself in communication with the guardians of other Unions in Ireland as the Author of a Form of accounts which he proposes should be substituted for those prescribed in the Order of the Commissioners.

Ordered in the above, The guardians with a View as is referred to in this Letter that although the Master may have committed an error in judgement they do not consider that he was intentionally disrespectful to the Commissioners, nor would they knowingly sanction any such conduct on the part of any of their Officers. The guardians still hold the opinion that the Form of accounts proposed by the Master is superior to the Form in present use and would assist to prevent many frauds and abuses now often perpetrated with impunity, but as the Commissioners have expressed such a decided opinion on the subject the Master must of course submit to their decision.

A letter was read from Richard Griffith Esq. Commissioner of Valuation in reply to a Resolution of the Board on the 6<sup>th</sup> instant, calling the attention of the guardians to his letter of the 25<sup>th</sup> ultimo in which he explained that he did not feel himself justified in disturbing the existing Valuation for the present year on the Liganure Lead Mines and that he therefore determined to ascertain the result of another year receipts and expenditure before making any increase in the rateable Valuation. In pursuing this course the Commissioner conceives that he performed his duty as Revising Valuator of the Union, both to the Board of guardians and the Mining Company. The Commission states that he purpose next year to state the Mines up to the full value that may appear <sup>fair</sup> and reasonable from an examination of the accounts of the Company for the year, but the data already supplied did not warrant any increase on the last Revision. Ordered that the Clerk bring this letter under the notice of the Board of guardians previous to the next Revision of the Union.

The following Extracts from the District Inspector's Report on the State of the Workhouse <sup>in 1840</sup> School, was read by the Clerk

"The Teacher Catherine Byrne's literary acquirements, and her Method of Conducting the School business, are tolerable; I found the Young Children of the 1<sup>st</sup> Class much improved in Reading and Spelling; the Sequel 3<sup>rd</sup> & 4<sup>th</sup> Divisions also read with great accuracy and distinctness of Pronunciation. Their Answering on the Subject Matter of what they had read was not however quite satisfactory. In many Cases they failed in giving even an imperfect Explanation of the Subject of their Lesson, and scarcely represent answered with Reading and Intelligence. This serious defect arises from the want of a judicious & systematic Method of examining a Class on the part of the Teacher who although very painstaking and intelligent has not been trained as yet, and consequently fails in the most essential part of his duty. I shall recommend her for training on the earliest opportunity and I feel satisfied from her great Anxiety to qualify herself for the Situation of Teacher that she will after training be a Credit to the Board.

The proficiency of the several Classes in Writing from dictation was pretty good, the Spelling Book

Superadded appear to have been extensively used; Most of the Third and Fourth Class Pupils acquitting themselves Creditably when Examined on the Rules, Exercises &c. I regret it is impossible for me to Report very favourably of the Answer on Grammar, Geography and Arithmetic very slight proficiency having as yet been made in these essential branches.

The Teacher has I believe honestly exerted herself to improve all the Classes under her Charge, but the want of a Competent Assistant and the shortness of the time allotted for letterary instruction are serious Obstacles in her way.

A Letter was read from Mrs Ogilby the Mother of the Workhouse requesting that the Board would be so good as to allow her Leave of absence for one month in order to go see one of her daughters in England who is unwell, her daughter Mrs Flower to act as Matron during her absence.

Leave granted provided the Commissioners do not object.

Ordered that the Clerk write to the agent of Earl Fitzwilliam to request him to have the necessary Repairs executed to the Window Sashes of that part of the Manual Hall occupied by the Guardians, the Sashes being quite rotten and not able to hold the Glass, also to repair the Plastering inside.

The Guardians have paid a high Rent for the Building for many years and have also expended considerable sum in repairs to the Roof and Building in general.

Ordered that the Clerk shall advertise for the supply of 300 Tons Coal Tenders to be received this day fortnight.

### Medical Officer's Report

Gentlemen I beg to submit the following Report for the approval of the Board and Commissioners. In accordance with the wish of the Committee appointed by the Board on Tuesday 17<sup>th</sup> inst for the purpose of taking into consideration the propriety of moving the children from the Flannel Hall Auxiliary Workhouse to the Main Building. It was proposed that the present Female and Work Room be used for a day and School Room for the female children - this is only objectionable in consequence of the children having no day yard and must necessarily be mixed up with the adult Female Clap. That the boys dormitory now unoccupied be converted into a day and Work Room for the adult Working Female Clap, this may in some degree be objectionable in consequence of the want of a day yard & not being on the ground floor, also breaking up classification to a certain extent, I would strongly recommend that the children during the summer go daily from the Workhouse to the Flannel Hall during school hours and sleep at the Workhouse, which arrangement I think can be carried out without breaking up classification to any extent.

In reference thereto the Commissioners desire to state that they are of opinion that it will be found impossible to make any satisfactory arrangements of the kind proposed with the present available accommodation in the Workhouse as if the girls be brought back from the Auxiliary Workhouse the Reform Inmates will have to be removed and must be placed either in the Infirmary Ward (now appropriated to Nurses & Infants) or in the

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Women's day Room these being the only Wards which the Commissioners understand are adapted for the purpose. The Commissioners think that a shed might be erected at little expense along the Boundary Wall of the Women's Yard which would answer for the purpose and which the Commissioners are of opinion would be the cheapest and best mode of meeting the necessity of the ladies and of removing the difficulty that at present stands in the way of providing accommodation for the Children in the Workhouse. Looking to the large proportion of women with illegitimate offspring who are nearly always in the Workhouse and which exceeds the average in other Workhouses with a similar number of inmates the Commissioners are of opinion that it will be worthy the consideration of the Guardians in deciding upon the subject of accommodation to consider whether the Union would not be benefitted by making arrangements whereby women of notoriously immoral character would form a separate class and which the Commissioners have no doubt would be found to be in many respects desirable and serviceable to the Union.

The Guardians having inspected an alteration proposed by the Master of the Workhouse with the view to provide a day Room for the Nurses and Children have agreed that the sanction of the Commissioners be requested to the present Coal store and passage to the Female District Ward be altered into the day Room required.

 Adverting to a resolution of the Guardians on the 2<sup>nd</sup> September last proposing to allow the Master of the Workhouse to convert a Shed at the back of the Laundry into a kitchen for the use of himself and the Station, and to the Letter addressed by the Commissioners to the Guardians thereon on the 10<sup>th</sup> Sept<sup>r</sup>, the Commissioners desire to state that they have since been informed by their Inspector Mr. Clunford that on inspecting the Premises he observed that there is a door leading into the yard, which renders it unnecessary in case the proposed arrangements be carried out, to go through the Laundry, and that it will not be necessary to build a flue, as there is one already in existence which has been unused for some years. He is further of opinion that no injury can arise from making the alteration proposed under these circumstances, if the Guardians continue to be desirous of having the proposed alterations made, the Commissioners will not object to the Guardians wishes being carried into effect.

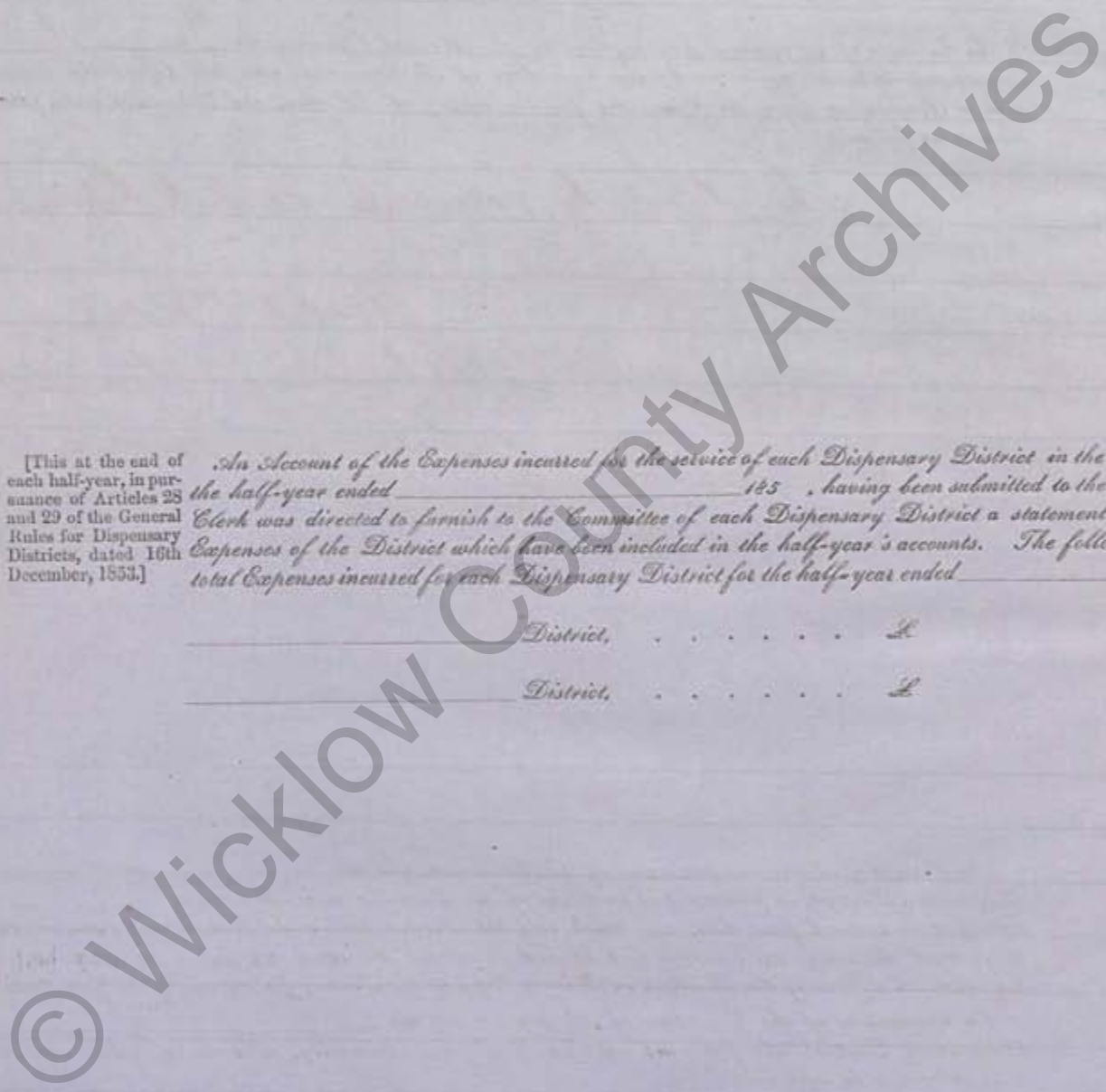
