The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, (or Orders made on them respectively, as follows:)

Letter N^o 26,596 Dated the 9th Inst from the Commissioners for administering the laws for Relief of the Poor in Ireland acquainting the Board of Guardians that they have received a Report from Capt^r Owen Poor Law Auditor of his examination of the accounts of Mr Ryan the late Master of the Workhouse in which he states that after ^{Reasonable} ~~the~~ allowances to Mr Ryan he has found a Balance of £16.13 against him,

The Commissioners request that the necessary steps may be taken by the Guardians to prevent the Union suffering any loss by Mr Ryan.

Letter N^o 26,912 Dated the 11th Inst stating that the Commissioners have had before them the abstracts of the Union accounts for the half year ending the 25th March last from which they perceive that the Com^r of Mr McCann the Assistant Master is not yet suspected, the Commissioners request that the Guardians will have the goodness to require Mr McCann to have his Bond perfected forthwith

Circular No 18920 dated the 11th Inst, enclosing the Returning Officer, ~~Account~~ Account of Expende, attending the Election of Guardians for the Union in March last the same has been examined and passed as enclosed and the Comptroller, now forwards the accounts amounting to £12.16.0 for payment by the Board of Guardians.

In consequence of the state of the Funds of the Union the above acf was not paid.

In answer to Letter No 26.912 the Clerk states that the Bonds of the Assistant Master wants be perfected before next Board day.

The Clerk was directed to write to the Treasurer requesting that he wants be so good as to allow the Board to overdrew their acf 2000 more in addition to the 500 £ already granted, pending the making out of the Books.

The Clerk states that there were 10 of the New Valuation ready & that the other 2 would be ready by next Board day.

A pauper woman named Margaret Megan was brought up by the Master entered on the Punishment Book for having articles of Clothing concealed in her Bed and using abusive Language to the Master. She stated that the Master used force in removing her to the Probationary Ward, also that the Master was in the habit of talking in Bad Miltle from the Contractors in consequence of them sending him bribes of Meat &c

Those Charges were altogether disproved by the Master Mr Redmond one of the spectators stated that some of the Paupers informed him the food was bad except on Bowes days and that the Master had no right to use force with any of the Paupers, that the Pauper Megan did right to resist him.

The Master called upon the Board to put a stop to such proceedings in presence of a Pauper that if such was allowed the discipline of the House would go down, and that if the Board did not consider he discharged his duty properly he would resign. The Master at the same time took occasion to thank the Board for the strong support they gave him at all times.

The Chairman then called on Mr Redmond not to use such expressions in presence of a Pauper.

The Poor Law Commissioners State that much inconvenience will arise if the existence of Arrears of Poor Rates be not notified to the Incumbered Estate Commissioners in time to make provision for them previous to the distribution of ^{the} purchase Money of the property.

In all Cases in which Lands are directed to be sold the Boards of Guardians of the Unions where such Lands are situated shall direct Notices of Claim to be lodged for such Poor Rates as arrears as may be due upon them, some time previous

to the distribution of the Fund

Letter No 56,952 Dated the 19th Inst Stating that the Commissioners have had before them the Resolution of the Board of Guardians of the ~~Rathfriland~~ Union on the 8th Inst accepting the Contract of Mr Wm O'Phail for Printing and Stationary for the use of the Union and in reference thereto, the Commissioners state that they are not satisfied of the expediency of providing Printing and Stationary for the Union by Annual Contract, as the amount of such work required is so very uncertain, and besides, a sum having been paid to Mr Wm O'Phail in account of last year's Contract beyond the amount for which he had contracted to supply the Union in account of loss which he states has been sustained by him thereby.

The Commissioners think it would be more advisable for the Guardians to obtain Supplies of Stationary & Printing executed for the use of the Union, when necessary, as is done in other Unions.

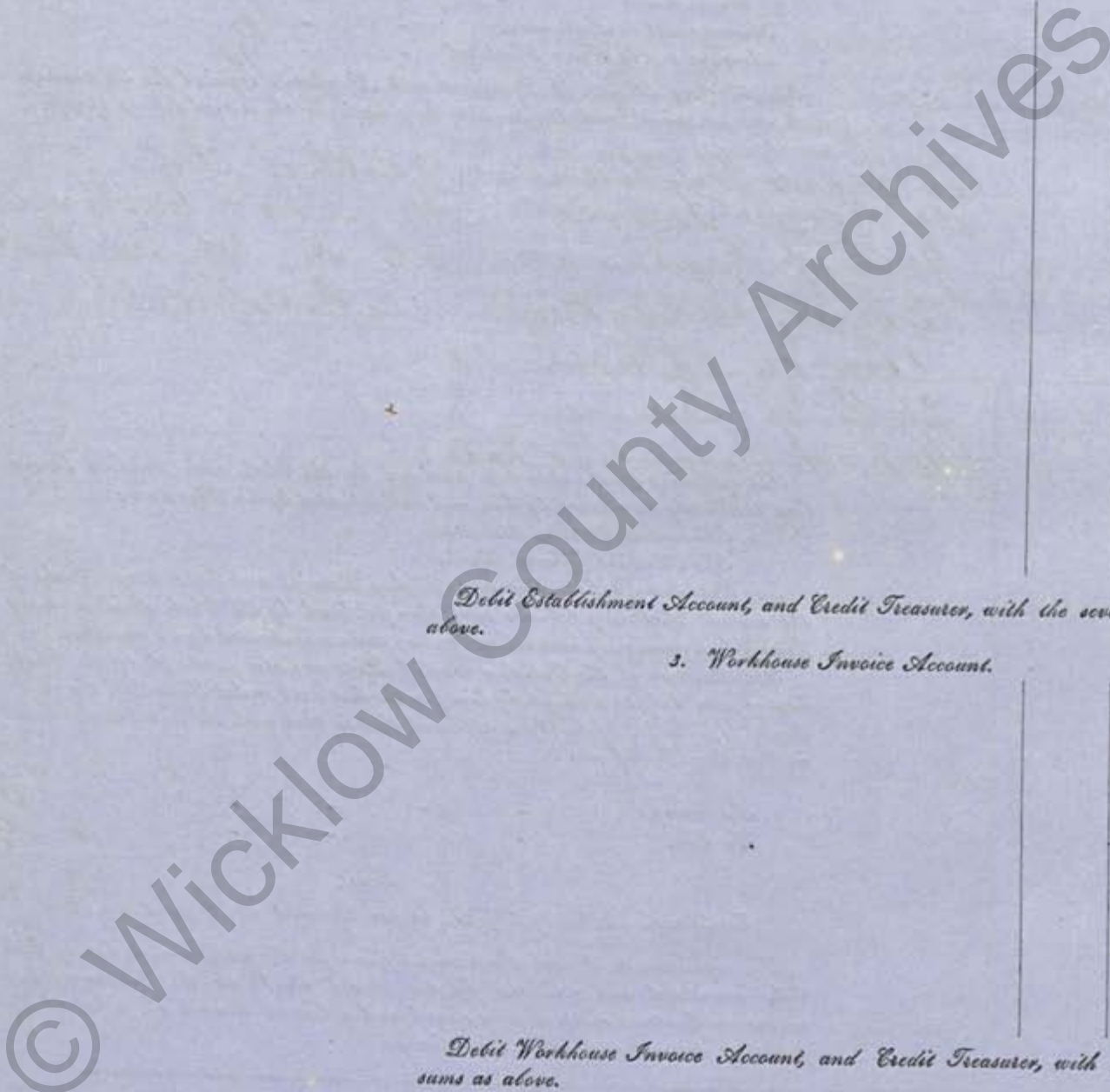

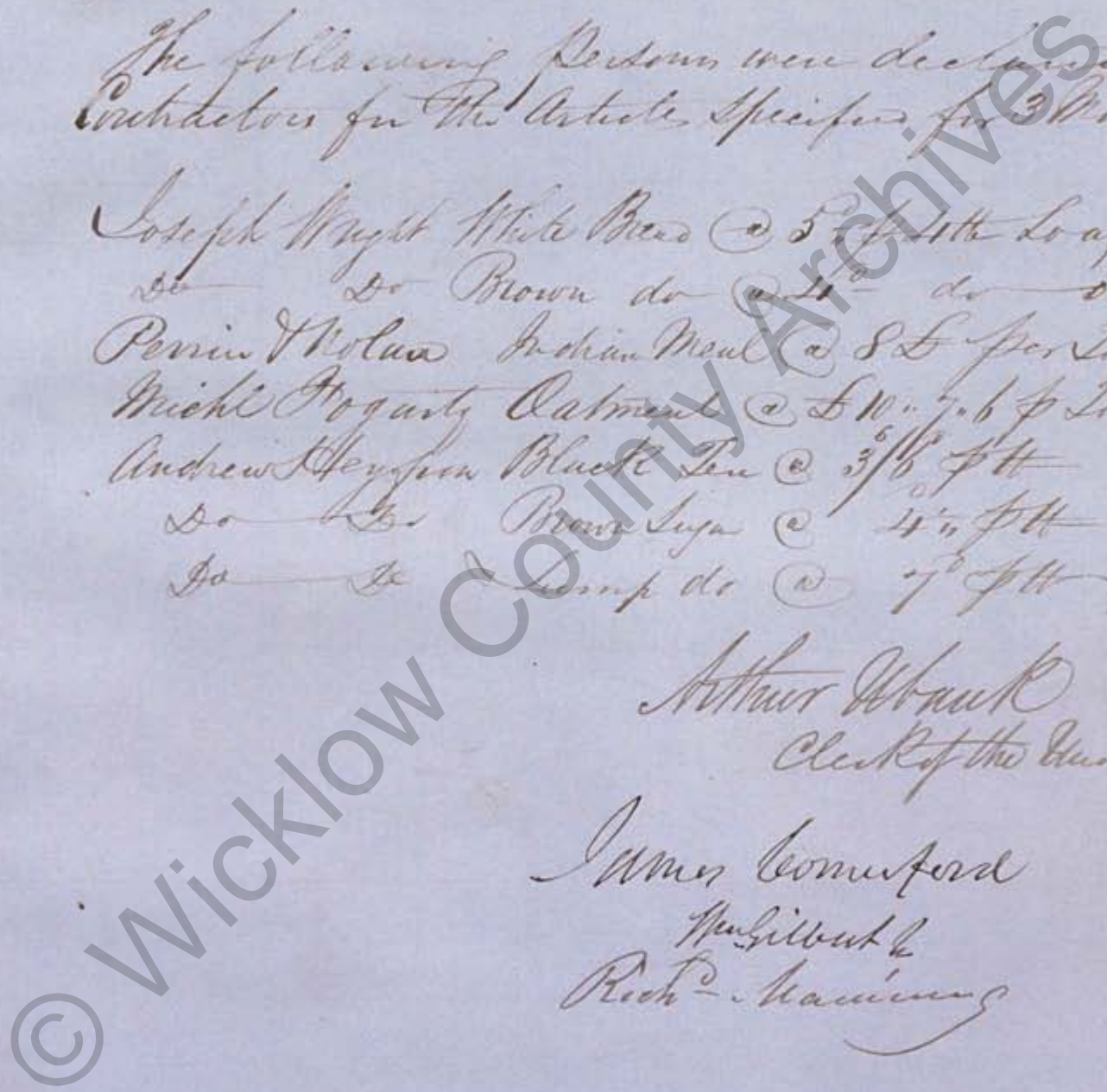

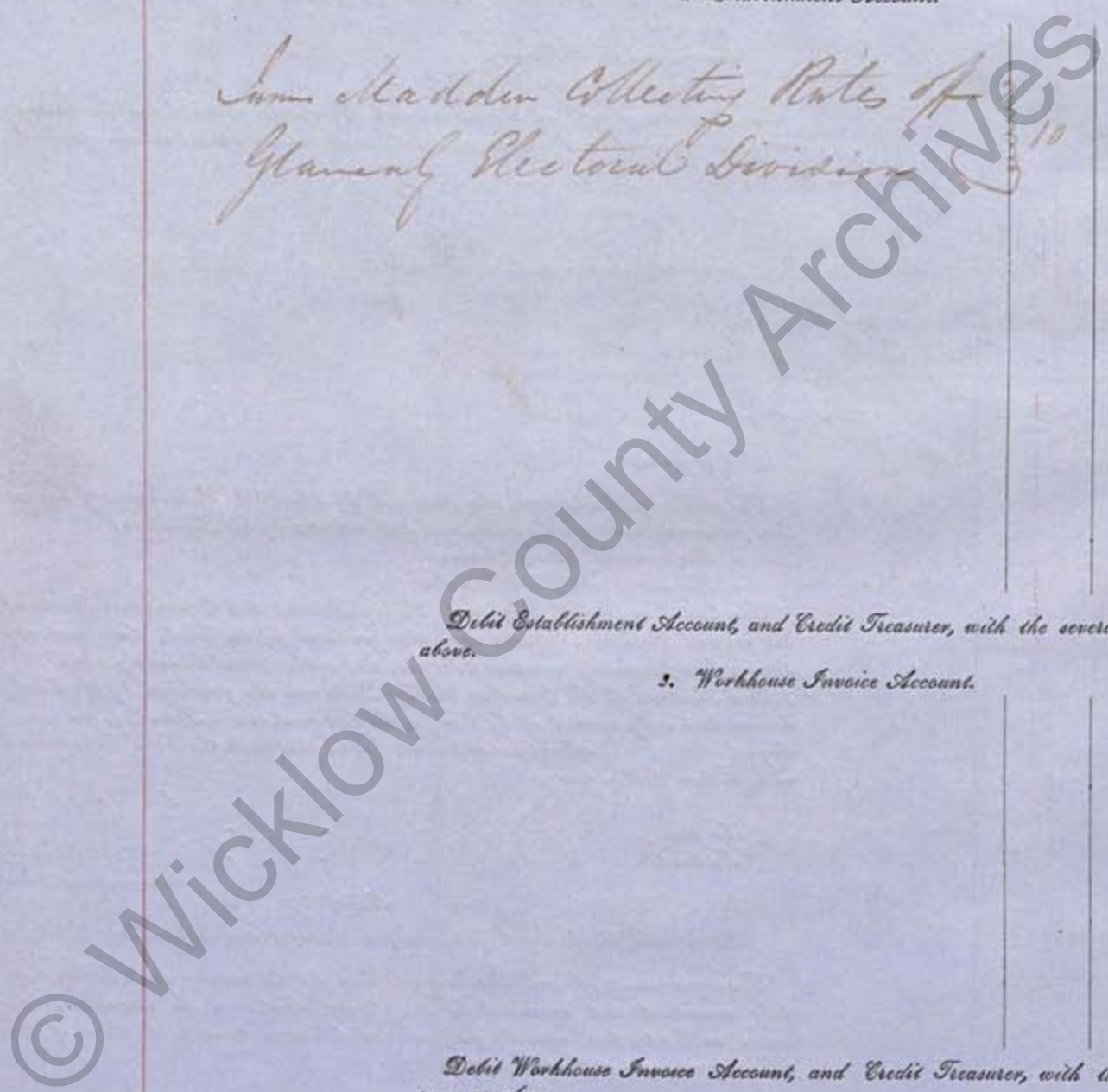

Gentle

I have to report the Schoolmaster for shewing
some at all times, the utmost contrivance and Contempt
in the discharge of his duties.

On the Morning of Tuesday the 19th Inst I gave
him direction, to have all the Desks, of the Boys School
removed up to one of the Sleeping Wards in the first Floor
of the House which has not been in use for the last 14 or
5 Months, that the School might not be discontinued he
having returned the day previous, to which he made
no objection either to the Board on that day, or to me, but
got the Desks and all requisites removed up at a
great deal of trouble. I then found he held no School,
when I asked him his reason for not doing so, his answer
was that I had not sent him the persons to scour the
Desks &c as I promised. I told him in the Morning to
go to the Matron and she would give him women
for that purpose, he always got the Desks washed
on Tuesdays without ever applying to me for women
to do so. He then got them washed and got all
in readiness for School next day but held none and
pleaded as an excuse that it would not be conducive
to the Health of the Boys. He gave no notice of such
intention either verbally or by his daily Report Book,
" That he should report to me all matters relating to the
" Boys and School & at once enter same on this Book
" if this order is not complied with I will take such steps
" that in future it shall. This order was given on 26th Inst

On one occasion when asking him a Question about
the Boys in the Dining Hall his answer before the
Parsons was do you think I am mad, on another occasion
I heard some person passing at dark down the Hall
I called 2 or 3 times to know who it was, I received no
Answer but had to go out and call after him in

the walk, he then answered, In some time after I went to the Porter Lodge where the Schoolmaster was, I asked him why he did not answer me he then replied in an insolent manner before the Paupers do you want me to say something and have you follow me to bullyrag me, He sometimes will not answer my enquiries.

The Roman Catholic Chaplain requested me to get a Box to keep the Prayer Books &c in which he was about to send to the Workhouse which I promised to do I was informed by the Porter, that the Schoolmaster had taken away the Box which was made for that purpose I desired him to give it to me again on Tuesday the 19th he made me no answer but has not done so since.

The School would not have been held in the Ward for more than 3 or 4 days at which time the new floor of the Brewery would have been perfectly dried, the Ward is about 35 feet long having 3 windows, in which I desired him to have the School, in consequence of the Schoolroom requiring a new floor which I was getting made during his absence on leave.

The Schoolmaster was called before the Board and reprimanded by the Chairman he was also desired to give up the Box.

There is at present in the Haase a dangerous Lunatic named Anne Morrissey who escaped from her Minder in the County Carlow this is unmanagable Information to be sworn against her

I have to report that on the Morning
of Wednesday the 27th the Assistant Trustee
knocked at my Bed Room door for
the Key of the House between the Rooms
of the 1st and 2^d Floor. The usual hour being
about 6.0 O'clock and it being dark at that time
I gave him the Key in some time after the Clock
struck 2. I got up and went down and found
a light in the Bed Store and also in the
Kitchen but did not see the Assist Trustee
until he walked out of the Dining Hall

and found them locked with the Exception of One
which was then unlocked for about half an
Hour being about 3/4 O'Clock

any Explanation for the time. The Male Ward
was not opened until 2 Hours after the
Assist Master opened the Female Side of
the House

I have reason to believe that it
was for no proper purpose the Female
side of the House was opened at that
Hour

I have also to report the Assist
Master for being under the influence of
drink between the Hours of 9 and 10. O'Clock
at Night on Saturday the 30th Nov^r 1850

The Assist. Master was called before the Board
and questions relative to the above charges



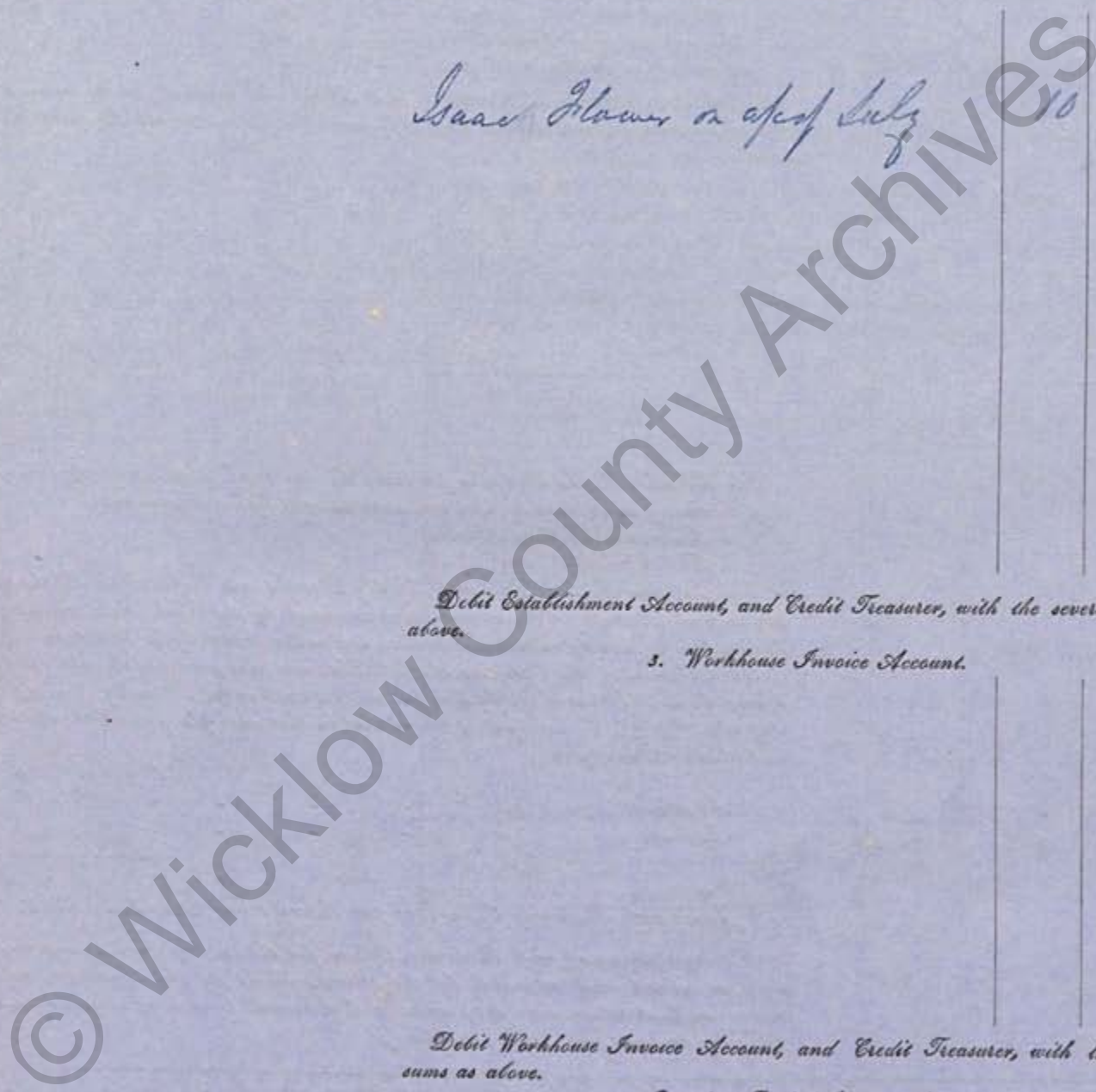
