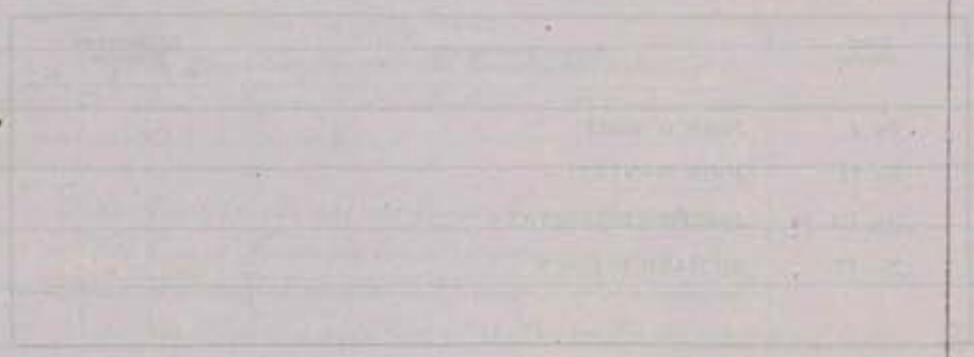

We have examined the string closet and consider the damp is caused by water percolating through the outer wall getting in by the fastenings of the down pipe outside, also that the ventilation is defective and that the flooring of porous granite retains the wet and cannot be kept dry -

We recommend that the down pipe be removed to the corner, a distance of about 10 feet and that the wall be pointed fresh with cement; that the granite flooring be taken up and a cement floor with a good foundation of rubble be substituted; also that 3 ventilators be added, one on the north side to under the staircase, at about 6 feet from the ground, similar to the 2 ventilators opening into the Registration Room; and 2 below the new floor level, one into the yard the other below the staircase.

With these improvements we believe the closet can be made dry and fit for the reception of the records -
