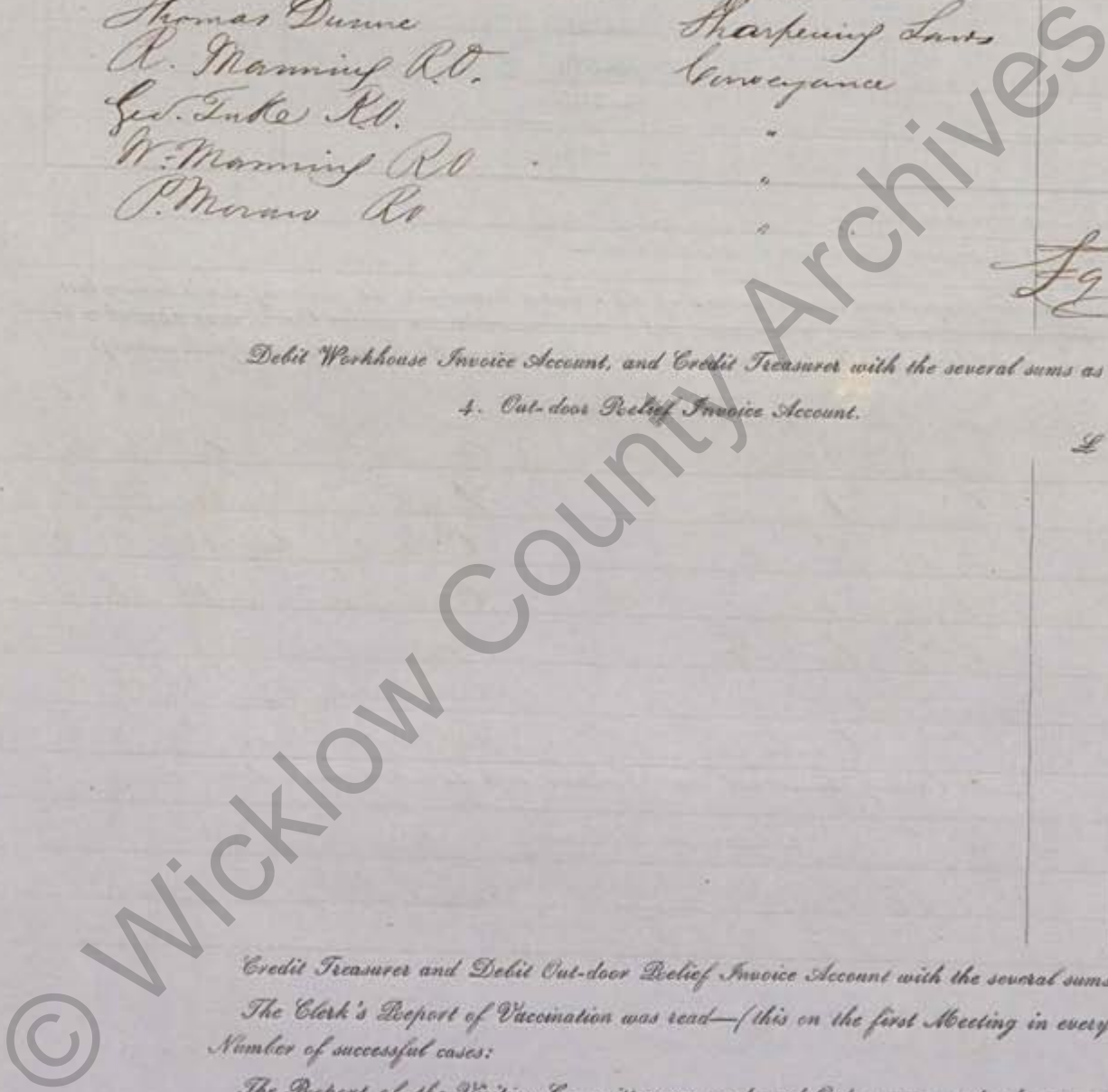

Letter No 29237 M/57 Dated 30 Nov. 1857 from the Poor Law Commissioners requesting the Clerk to furnish to them without further delay the Returns called for by their Circular of the 16th Ultimo.

Letter No. 29234 Dated 30th Ultimo with reference to the inquiry contained in Guardians Minutes of the 24th Ultimo, as to whether the Guardians can admit a child under 15 years of age, to the Workhouse Hospital, without its mother, who is at service and supporting her other children by her earnings, and in reply the Commissioners desire to state that there is no legal impediment to the Guardians admitting the child if they think it a proper case for relief in the Workhouse.

Letter No 29234 Dated 30th November 1857 stating that the Commissioners have had before them a Resolution of the Guardians of the 24th Ultimo relative to the Dietary at present in use in the Workhouse, and in reference thereto

The Commissioners request to be informed whether the Guardians cannot purchase vegetables in sufficient quantities to enable them to provide soup for the inmates, until such time as they shall be able to raise a supply on the Workhouse grounds.

The Commissioners consider the use of vegetables in the soup to be of great importance and the fact that, hitherto no perceptible injury to the health of the inmates, appears to have been noticed, does not necessarily prove that the discontinuance of their use for long periods may not prove injurious.

Order on the above, The Guardians desire to state that it would be impossible to obtain a regular supply of vegetables suitable for soup in their neighbourhood.

A Letter was read from the Commissioner of Valuation, acknowledging the receipt of a communication from the Clerk together with Lists of Tenements requiring Revision in this Union.

In reference to a Minute of the Guardians of the 24th Ultimo relating to the Lease of the Newbridge Dispensary the Commissioners state that by Section 8 of the Medical Charities Act the duty of providing Dispensary accommodation devolves upon the Board of Guardians and the Lease of the Premises in question should therefore be made to the Board of Guardians, it is only in cases of Premises taken under the Poor Law Act that the Lease should be made to the Commissioners.

The Commissioners do not find that any previous correspondence has taken place with them on the subject of the proposed Lease.

The Clerk was directed to write to Mr. Courtenay requesting him to have the Lease above referred to prepared without delay.

The Commissioners recommend the guardians to increase the amount of Solid Food to the Classes referred to, so as that the daily quantity of food allowed shall not fall short of the Standard Dietary which is a Minimum allowance.

The Commissioners also suggest to the Board of Guardians the propriety of there allowing Bread instead of meal to the Pauper in the above Classes at either the Breakfast or Dinner Meal.

The Guardians having taken the Letter of the Commissioners into consideration and having examined their officers on the subject, they have to report that they have found the present Dietary allowance to be quite sufficient to maintain the Pauper in good health, and that there are no complaints in respect thereof. They have therefore come to the conclusion that no alteration is necessary or expedient, — as soon as a supply of vegetables can be raised, the Pauper will have an allowance of Bread with their Soup.

The Board proceeded to revise the Salaries of the several Officers and to fix them for the next year and the Clerk having read over the Salary paid to each Officer.
