The vessel was moored in the dock and it was proposed to fill the hopper and then make a run in the river with the propelling Engines. Unfortunately directly dredging commenced, the grab being dropped too near a buoy in dock got fast in its moorings and could not be brought up. Being unable to release it after several attempts, it was decided to slip the grab chains and take a run with the Engines, leaving the grab to be recovered by divers afterwards. The trimming tank was pumped up, which with hopper empty (except water) gave the vessel a trim of 4 ft forward and 5 ft 6 in aft. Runs were made for some time up and down the Stumher, the propelling Engines working at 150 revolutions. There was no measured mile available, but from observations made at fixed points the pilot estimated the mean speed of the vessel in the above condition at about 6 knots which I think was fairly correct. The Engines, pumps, &c, worked well and without heating, and the boiler steamed freely with ordinary hard steam coals. The auxiliary fan engine to the stroke hold worked satisfactory but steam was well maintained without it. The vessel both steered and went astern well, and the pilot spoke highly of her handiness for a craft of this sort. The Contractors expect to recover the grab without difficulty and will test it for dredging before the vessel leaves, and I do not anticipate any difficulty with this. The hopper doors were raised and lowered, the winches acted well; the vessel was exceptionally steady when swinging the Crane and grab, she looks and trims well, and will I hope prove satisfactory. I understand the vessel is to proceed to Wicklow under her own steam and her Captain is expected at Hull at once to arrange for this.

In Conclusion I wish to point out that these preliminary trials are made by the Contractors for their own satisfaction and I was careful to remind them that the official trial

I proceeded to Wicklow on 25th April on receipt of notice that the Dredger was ready for her trials. Owing however to the breaking of one of the Crane wheels and other various delays, the Contractors were not ready for the trials until April 30th.

On that date the Dredger was moored in the Harbour under the Harbour Masters direction and commenced work in the morning. She had about 4 tons of coal on board and her trimming tank was full. Her draft in this condition was 4 feet forward and 5 feet aft. The ground was very unfavourable for dredging, being composed on one side of decayed seaweed compressed with sand, which resisted the teeth of the grab, and on the other of hard silt which having been undisturbed for some years - as I understand - presented an exceedingly hard surface. The crane and grab however worked well, although there were several stoppages owing to the seaweed getting entangled in the teeth of the grab, and the adjustment of machinery from time to time which is almost inevitable with a new plant working for the first time: - When working on new ground the grab brought up small loads at first, but after the surface had been broken up obtained good loads and did much better work generally: - I am of opinion that the output will steadily increase as the ground becomes broken up, the new machinery works more freely, and the men become accustomed to the work: - The hopper was filled to an average of about one foot below deck level which would represent roughly about 100 tons of Spoil, and would probably represent an average load: - As the wind was freshening it was not considered advisable to dredge longer on account of the possibility of having again to postpone the Sea trials: - The draft of the vessel in the condition stated above was 6 feet forward and about 6 ft 3 inches aft, and it is evident that the vessel is well within her specified draft of 7 feet with a full load: - The vessel was then steamed out to sea and the speed checked by the Harbour Masters patent log, as observations from the shore were not found practicable. The necessity for cutting some links out of the hopper chains and repairing the lug of the grab can only be regarded as incidental to the working of such machines, but the failure of the pinion race of the crane is a more serious matter, and I have little doubt that as long as the crane continues to work with broken teeth in the race, further trouble will result, and Messrs Rose Dunn & Thompson should be called upon to provide a new complete casting for this part.

This part of the crane is always subjected to a very severe strain, especially on ship board, and the castings on this part of Messrs Rose Dunn's crane are certainly of exceptional thickness.

I may say that Mr. Tritton carefully examined the crane race after the trials were over and it was then in good order and the breaking of one tooth no doubt since has caused failure of others.
