This Lake is about 30 chains further West than the Lower and is an English mile along the North side; its mean Breadth is about 15 chains it has a great precipice on each side which are (is) nearly overhanging with rocks; in the Guide to the Co. Wicklow quoted as authority (by whom?) it is stated, "That the Valley of Glendalough was a Bishoprick from the days of St. Kevin A.D. 490 to the year 1491 at which time it was governed by the Kings of Imaly (the O'Toole). That Friar Dennis White was Arch Bishop that year, that he surrendered his right & claim in the Chapter House of St. Patrick's Dublin to Walter Fitzsimons then Archbishop of Dublin in the Reign of Henry the Seventh". The large Rocks a little Eastward of the East corner of the lake are admirable, they broke off from the hanging rocks on both sides probably after long continuances of snow and bad weather rolled over each other into the valley & are heaped in piles some of which by & their precipitating force and huge size tumbling over others have been split in two as evenly as if sawed, there are some of them 21 feet high.

This stone is round, about three feet in Diameter & two feet thick; it is 150 links from Glendasson River & opposite St. Kevin's Kitchen.

xx Contains 33,854 acres 2 roads 20 pers. a considerable portion of which is rough pasture affording tolerable pasturage for sheep & cattle; about 400 acres are woodland and 12000 good arable and pasture land; the quantity of bog and waste has been much reduced, the soil is various, and the system of agriculture improved; the principal 53 crops are oats and potatoes; the cultivation of which has extended far up the mountains; in the most western mountains are large tracts of bog of which those in the lower grounds have been nearly cut out for fuel. At Glenmacnass are some very extensive bad xx mines worked by the Irish mining Company & affording employment to 160 persons. The principal landholder is Mr. Bookey who resides at Derrybawn House.

The living is in the diocese of Dublin & Glendalough & in the patronage of the Archbishop of Dublin. The Glebe Ho. is situated close to the Village of Anamoe. The Church is situated in a wild & uncultivated tract, on the road between Roundwood & Anamoe. There is a national school at Glendalough.
