Broada Mountain is in the Ta. of Broada; it is a very high Mountain and appears at the distance 5 or 7 miles to Overhang the Road from Laragh Village to Hollywood.

The Cathedral is in the Grave yard at the extreme West corner of the Td. of Commanderry alies Seven Churches. It measures 48 Ft. in length by 30 in breadth; the wells are nearly entire but the roof is quite (entirely) demolished; within are many Tomb stones of very antient date with divers inscriptions in the Trish language (Jack asses!). The Tvy is daily extending itself over the walls as if with intent to conceal the havoek of time. This Cathedral is called St. Peter & Paul's: it was founded by St. Revin about the year A.D. 497.

There is a Tombstone in the church overgrown with grass on which is the following opitaph: "Jesus Christ" "Mile deach fouch corp re Muc Mthiul" (Folly! how do you know?). which is Behold the resting Place of the Body of King Me Thuil who died in Erk Christ A.D. 1010.

This Tower is 91 feet high, 48 feet in circumference & 9 feet in the Curity and the Walls upwards of 3 feet in thickness; it has been divided into Five Floors with a small oblong window in each, excepting the Upper wherein there are Four. The Ground Floor which is (was) destitute of Light was propbly (probably) intended for a Sungeon or cell, and the Floors which were ascended by stone steps (how do you know?) are long since demolished. The sill of the door is 12 feet above the surface and the Building gradualy narrows from the base to the summit. This Tower is in the Grave Yd. with the Cathedral.

This Lake is about 30 chains further West than the Lower and is an English mile along the North side; its mean Breadth is about 15 chains it has a great precipice on each side which are (is) nearly overhanging with rocks: in the Guide to the Co. Wicklow quoted as authority (by whom?) it is stated, "That the Valley of Glendalough was a Bishoprick from the days of St. Kevin A. D. 490 to the year 1491 at which time it was governed by the Rings of Imaly (the O'Toole). That Friar Dennis White was Arch Bishop that year, that he surrendered his right & claim in the Chapter House of St. Patrick's Dublin to Welter Fitzsimons then Archbishop of Dublin in the Reign of Henry the Seventh". The large Rocks a little Bastward of the East corner of the lake are admirable, they broke off from the hanging rocks on both sides probably after long conbinuances of snow and bad weather rolled over each other into the valley & are heaped in piles some of which by & their precipatating force and huge size tumbling over others have been split in two as evenly as if sawed, there are some of them 21 feet high.

This stone is round, about three feet in Diameter & two feet thick: it is 150 links from Glendasson River & opposite St. Kevin's Kitchen.
