Order Dated 26<sup>th</sup> Ultimo under Seal of the Commission, for Administering the Laws for Relief of the Poor in Ireland, altering and amending the Several Orders relating to the Conducting of Elections of Guardians, and calling the attention of the Clerk of the Union as to the duties to be performed by him as Returning Officer

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, (or Orders made on them respectively, as follows:)

Circular No 5 M 52 Dated 31<sup>st</sup> Ultimo enclosing the above order under Seal and setting forth the Several Duties of the Returning Officer & Poor Rate Collectors for Conducting the Annual Election of Guardians.

After the admission of Pauper Mr Gilbert vacated the Chair & John Parnell Esq. was moved there to, Agreeable to a Notice served on the Clerk on this day week, The following Resolutions passed at a Meeting held in Dublin on the 30<sup>th</sup> Ultimo of the Representatives of 129 Poor Law Unions were read by the Clerk

Resolved - "That the Local taxation in Ireland is excessive, a large proportion of it being imposed by Compulsory Assessments; and from the depreciation of the value of property, has become, (in some districts), intolerable, and impossible to collect. That these oppressive local Charges should not, in justice, be thrown on the owners and Occupiers of land alone, but should be extended to all Classes equally. And we consider that it is highly unjust and impolitic to increase this taxation by the imposition of the Consolidated Annuities Tax

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2<sup>nd</sup>

Resolved - "That in reference to that portion of the  
Said Annuities which refers to the Temporary Relief Act  
we beg to observe, that such relief was necessary in consequence  
of a famine unparalleled in its extent and its duration,  
and which has been admitted by Parliaments to have been  
a National Calamity - That it is contrary to all sound  
principle, and to the practice of civilized nations, that  
such an expenditure by the Public Treasury should be  
charged solely on that part of the empire which suffered  
most seriously - that in reference to that portion of the  
Consolidated Annuities which was advanced under the  
Labour Rate Act, we submit that we ought not, in justice,  
be called upon to repay monies which were not advanced  
in accordance with our views, or placed at the disposal  
or under the control of our Boards, or any local authority,  
but were, on the contrary, applied and expended in opposition  
to our oft repeated, but as oft unheeded, objections and  
public remonstrances, and by officers, independent of us,  
and responsible to the Government alone."

3<sup>rd</sup>

Resolved - "That a general Revision and Amendment of the  
Irish Poor Law Code is imperatively required"

4<sup>th</sup>

Resolved - "That we hold it to be foreign to our duties as  
Guardians of the Poor to lend monies for other purposes than  
for the relief of the destitute, and that we consider that our  
being made agents for the Collection of any other taxes  
whatever both dangerous in principle and mischievous in the  
consequence out that Law which it is our first duty to administer."

5<sup>th</sup>

Resolved - "That in the passing of the Labour Rate Annuities  
Act we cannot believe that the Legislature gave it that  
consideration which it deserved, but that it allowed it to  
pass uninformed of the frightful amount to be charged  
upon certain parts of this Country, that amount being  
heavier, generally, in proportion to the extent of the districts  
and we are satisfied that the Legislature will not refuse  
to re-consider an enactment so oppressive and unjust"

6<sup>th</sup>

Resolved - That a general feeling prevails that the  
Irish Representatives in Parliaments, with a few honorable  
exceptions, have not discharged their trust with the  
attention which the unfortunate Condition of their Country

So absolutely required; they have either been the Slaves of a Minister or the tools of a faction. The result has been a course of legislation, not only unconstitutional and unjust, but so impracticable that the very last Act of it had to be suspended on the responsibility of the Prime Minister. We therefore, call upon the Boards of Guardians and Rate Payers, of whom the Constituency is now composed to require their representatives to lay aside their party divisions and personal objects that have brought such unexampled ruin and degradation on this Kingdom, and to unite for the redress of the grievances and to advance the prosperity of their Common Country and to support measures to reduce its taxation"

I must also inform you that the Female infirm Ward is much overcrowded the Floors of the day Room at the Female side of the

Tearing the Cocoa Fibre in the Boys Sleeping Dormitory is highly improper and should be discontinued.

The following Orders of the Poor Law Commissioners were laid before the Board, and directions given thereon, as follows:

The following Letters from the Poor Law Commissioners and others were read by the Clerk, and directions given to answer them respectively, to the following effect, (or Orders made on them respectively, as follows:)

Letter No 51903 Dated 21<sup>st</sup> Inst in reference to a Resolution of the Guardians on the 17<sup>th</sup> Inst directing the Master of the Workhouse to provide Clothing for a Pauper Inmate of the Workhouse named Patrick Sutton, on Condition that the boy shall not again apply to the Guardians for Relief. In reference thereto the Commissioners inform the Guardians that they cannot make a Condition of the nature mentioned in the Resolution and that if the party again becomes destitute it will be incumbent upon them to provide Relief.

A Letter was read from Mr Edward Barrow Relieving Officer setting forth that at the time he was appointed he came forward agreeable to an advertisement from the Guardians and was appointed at the Salary of £40 per Annum. Shortly after Mr Barrow's appointment the Guardians conceiving the Salary was too small for the distance he had to travel, passed a Resolution raising his Salary to £50 per Annum, that similar Resolutions passed the Board with respect to the other Relieving Officers, and after repeated applications the Commissioners <sup>refused</sup> giving ascent until the

efficiency of the Officers, were reported on, by their Inspector Capt. Hubbard who was sent down for that purpose, and his report was in favor of all the Officers. the Result was that six of the Officers got an Increase of 10<sup>s</sup> each. but Mr. Barne the Newcassel Officer was passed over. Mr Barne further states that he feels aggrieved by having his Salary reduced now to £30 per Annum, inasmuch as he was not allowed the increase in the first instance

Ordered that Mary Kearney a Pauper inmate and two Children be provided with Clothing not to exceed 10<sup>s</sup> each Suits in order that they may leave the Workhouse.
