1 COUNCILLOR STOKES: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I would like to propose a
2 vote of sympathy to the family of Hannah Large who very sadly passed away in
3 Iceland. I would like to thank the President of Iceland for their sympathies as well.
4 Obviously it is a very sad day for the Greystones community and in particular for her
5 mum Sam and dad Greg, and we wish the family the very best. A very, very sad
6 situation. Thank you.

7 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Stokes. Councillor Fenelon Gaskin.

8 COUNCILLOR FENELON GASKIN: Yeah, I'd like to be associated with that
9 condolence to the family of Hannah Large. She was actually a friend of my
10 daughter's, just completed her Leaving Cert, and it's very sad for the whole
11 community, her family, the community and her friends who she had just finished her
12 Leaving Cert with. Thank you.

13 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Mahon.

14 COUNCILLOR MAHON: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Yeah, sorry, I have four of
15 them. I will run through them quickly. Seamus Kelly, Ballyknockan, Valleymount,
16 to his wife Nuala, Seamus, Geraldine and Brian. He passed away recently. Larry
17 Cullen, also of Valleymount who passed away recently, to his wife Valerie, Glen,
18 Linda and Tony and Orla. And to a man that we buried last Saturday, Pat Byrne, a
19 very young man with a very young family, after a long illness, a great loss to the
20 community. And also to Rose Kennedy from Coolmore in Hollywood, to her
21 husband Jim, and her family of 11. I offer condolences to all. Thank you.

22 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Dunne.

23 COUNCILLOR DUNNE: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I would like to pass a vote of
24 sympathy for Teresa Doyle, formerly of Aughrim, and living in Wicklow Town, a
25 first cousin of mine. Four in the family, and she's a huge loss to the community to
26 die at such a young age, and my sympathy goes to family. Thank you.

27 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Duddy online.

28 COUNCILLOR DUDDY: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. If I could propose --

29 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Duddy, you're very low, I can't hear you.

30 COUNCILLOR DUDDY: If I shout can you hear me now?

31 CATHAOIRLEACH: Yes. We can hear you.

32 COUNCILLOR DUDDY: If I raise my voice is that of any assistance?

33 CATHAOIRLEACH: We can hear you, Councillor Duddy.

34 COUNCILLOR DUDDY: If I could mention Mary Prendergast of Charnwood,

1 Bray, and formerly Kilmacanogue. A very sad situation in that she passed away, and
2 condolences to her sons Paul and Alan. I would also extend my sympathy to her
3 brothers Tony Lawlor and Michael Lawlor. Michael was a long-standing councillor
4 from Bray, County Wicklow. If I can also mention Tony's late wife (inaudible) who
5 passed away within a week or so of her sister-in-law Mary, and if I could extend my
6 condolences to Honey, to their son Peter, to Mary, Evelyn, and Cody, and Nicola and
7 the extended family. The Lawlors have long been involved in politics in Wicklow
8 and in the community and in particular been very active in various organisations. So
9 if I could extend my sympathies. Go raibh maith agat.

10 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thanks, Councillor Duddy. Councillor Finn.

11 COUNCILLOR FINN: I would like to be associated with the condolences to the
12 family of Hannah Large. Such a sad thing to happen to her and her family and also
13 the community. She was very well-known. I know she will be missed by friends
14 and family in the community as a whole. Thank you.

15 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Glennon.

16 COUNCILLOR GLENNON: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Look, I'd just like to be
17 associated with what Councillor Mahon has said. Pat Byrne, a young man died after
18 an illness and left three small kids, buried just this week. Rose Kennedy, Seamus
19 Kelly and Larry Cullen, all from our locale and all buried in recent times. So I
20 would like to be associated with Councillor Mahon's comments earlier. Thank you.

21 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Langrell.

22 COUNCILLOR LANGRELL: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I want to extend my
23 sympathies to the family of Michael Kenna of Lickeen, Moneystown who passed
24 away there a few weeks ago who left his partner Ann and Sinéad behind. May he
25 rest in peace. Thank you.

26 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. And Rachel, is there any staff condolences?

27 MS GILLESPIE: Yes. We would like to extend our sympathies to our former
28 colleague and friend Alan Shane and to our colleague Roy Bowden on the passing of
29 his father John David Bowden. Thank you.

33 MS GILLESPIE: May their souls and the souls of all the faithfully departed, through
34 the mercy of God, rest in peace.

1 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thanks. Can I have any congratulations? I know, Councillor
2 Stokes, you wanted to come in there.

3 COUNCILLOR STOKES: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I'd just like to congratulate
4 Kavin Venkatesan on his selection for the Irish Chess Team in the upcoming Chess
5 Olympiad. I believe it is the first time that somebody from County Wicklow has
6 been selected for either of the squads, either the women's squad or the open squad,
7 since 1972, which was also previously another Greystones, Michael Keeshan. We
8 wish him the very best for the Olympiad. Thank you very much, Cathaoirleach.

9 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Corrigan.

10 COUNCILLOR CORRIGAN: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Just before the meeting I
11 wanted to acknowledge the amazing achievement on Saturday night of our own
12 Katie Taylor. The pride of Bray. An amazing role model for young people growing
13 up in any sport in Ireland, particularly in the boxing. It was fantastic. The seafront
14 was packed. It was a fantastic family event that those of us who weren't lucky
15 enough to get tickets for Croke Park attended, and I just want to pass on
16 congratulations to her. It's just absolutely amazing to see a young girl with such
17 determination, and she really has proven if you believe in your dreams you can
18 achieve it, and congratulations to her. Thank you.

19 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Corrigan. And before we get into the
20 agenda we have two standing orders.

21 MS GILLESPIE: Thank you. The first suspension of standing order, proposed by
22 Councillor Danny Alvey and seconded by Cathaoirleach Caroline Winstanley, and
23 supported by Councillors Barry, Doyle, Mulhall, O'Brien, O'Toole and ward: "This
24 Council calls on the Minister for Education and the Department of Education to
25 address the severe delays in primary and secondary school building projects and
26 provision of additional school places across County Wicklow. The population of the
27 county has increased considerably in the past decade, up 14% between the census in
28 2011 and 2022, with even higher growth rates in our main towns. Much of this
29 growth in population is made up of young families moving into the area which is
30 putting significant additional strain on primary and secondary school places. At the
31 same time there are school building projects that have been delayed for years and
32 years with no end in sight for these extensions and new builds to be complete. Now
33 the Government has requested our Council zones further land for housing to help
34 address the housing crisis. This is a process which we are pursuing but we want

1 assurances from the Minister and the Department that future school infrastructure
2 and capacity planning in the county reflects this new residential development.
3 Specifically this Council would like a clear, written update on the current stage,
4 reason for delay, next milestone, and an indicative timeline on the building projects
5 for primary and secondary school schools across Wicklow as listed in the appendix
6 to this motion. Schools include North Wicklow Educate Together Secondary
7 School, Bray; Temple Carrig, Greystones; Wicklow Educate Together Secondary
8 School; Arklow CBS; Blessington Community College; Avondale Community
9 College, Rathdrum; Coláiste Bhríde, Carnew; St Kevin's Community College,
10 Dunlavin; Newtownmountkennedy Primary School; Woodstock Educate Together,
11 Newtownmountkennedy; St Saviour's, Rathdrum; Blessington Educate Together
12 Primary School; Gaelscoil na Lochanna, Blessington; St Kevin's National School,
13 Dunlavin; Nun's Cross School, Ashford; and a new primary school for Wicklow
14 Town where the current ones are at capacity."

15
16 The second suspension of standing orders was requested by Councillor Behan,
17 however due to his absence it is now proposed by Councillor Fortune and seconded
18 by Councillor Leonard: "That this Council supports the hundreds of thousands of
19 Irish citizens who do not have children and who are subjected to punitive rates of
20 inheritance tax when they die, that this Council calls on the Government and the
21 Minister for Finance to rectify this gross injustice in the next budget."

22
23 Thank you.

24 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. So can I have someone to propose that we take
25 the standing orders at 4:30? Councillor O'Brien. A seconder? Councillor Alvey.
26 Thank you. Agreed? (Agreed.)

27
28 The first item on the agenda is: "To confirm and sign the minutes of the ordinary
29 meeting of Wicklow County Council held Monday, 6th July 2026." Can I have a
30 proposer, please? Councillor Langrell. Seconded by Councillor Corrigan. Agreed?
31 (Agreed.)

32
33 Item 2: "To consider the disposal of 1.7 acres or thereabouts in the townland of
34 Corballis Upper, Rathdrum, County Wicklow being the property known as Site No.

1 13 measuring 0.87 acre and Site 17 measuring 0.83 acre in the Avondale Business
2 Park, Corballis, Rathdrum, County Wicklow to Mordaunt Hire and Sales Ltd, 22-25
3 Harbour Road, Arklow, County Wicklow by way of a 999-year lease." As per
4 previously circulated. Can I have a proposer, please? Thank you. Councillor Burke,
5 did you want to speak on the item?

6 COUNCILLOR BOURKE: Is the mic on? Yeah, it's great that we're progressing
7 the sites that we have on offer because we for many years couldn't find anyone to
8 take these sites, and hopefully within the next few years as these units are all built
9 out there will be great employment in that business park. So I am very happy to
10 propose that we pursue the disposal to Mordaunt Hire and Sales.

11 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Bourke. Councillor Mahon.

12 COUNCILLOR MAHON: Yeah, I'd like to second that motion, please.

13 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Item 3: "To consider the disposal of 0.0934
14 hectares or thereabouts in the townland of Mount Kennedy Demesne being the
15 property known as 9 Church Road, Newtownmountkenedy to Kathleen Meuer as
16 legal personal representative of Mary Cummins." As per previously circulated. Can
17 I have a proposer, please? Councillor Langrell. And a seconder? Councillor Alvey.
18 Agreed? (Agreed.)

19

20 Item 4: "To consider the disposal of 0.0052 hectares or thereabouts in the townland
21 of Enniskerry Td being the property known as 16 Millfield, Enniskerry to Rita Wall."
22 As per previously circulated. Can I have a proposer, please? Councillor Corrigan.
23 And I would like to second this motion, please. Thank you. Agreed? (Agreed.)

24

25 Item 5: "To consider the vacancy on the Housing Strategy Policy Committee arising
26 from the resignation of Councillor Peter Stapleton." Do we have someone who is
27 taking -- Councillor Bourke?

28 COUNCILLOR BOURKE: I would like to propose Councillor Melanie Corrigan in
29 that role, please.

30 CATHAOIRLEACH: And do I have someone to second that? Councillor Langrell.
31 Are you happy to take that? Agreed? (Agreed.)

32

33 Item number 6: "To consider the vacancy on the County Wicklow Partnership..."
34 Do we have someone proposed?

1 COUNCILLOR BOURKE: Cathaoirleach, may I propose Councillor Ned Whelan
2 for that position, please?

3 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. And do I have someone to propose (sic)?
4 Councillor Fenelon Gaskin. And are you happy to take that role, Councillor
5 Whelan?

6 COUNCILLOR WHELAN: Yes.

7 CATHAOIRLEACH: Agreed? (Agreed.) Next: "To consider in accordance with
8 Section 11 of the Roads Act 1993 and Section 180 of the Planning and Development
9 Act 2000, as amended, the taking in charge of the following estates: Holywell
10 Grove, Kilcoole." Do I have a proposer, please? Councillor Stokes. And seconder?
11 Councillor Fortune. Agreed? (Agreed.)

12

13 And next item is: "To consider the Chief Executive's Monthly Management Report
14 August 2026." So, as usual, we'll take people in groups of three. As you will see
15 now in the top corner on the screen there is a little timer, so it will tell you once your
16 three minutes is up, if you kind of want to check in how long you're talking for and
17 I'll be keeping strictly to that timer in the corner there. Okay. Councillor Fenelon
18 Gaskin.

19 COUNCILLOR FENELON GASKIN: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Thank you, Chief
20 Executive, again for a very comprehensive report. Again I am on my bugbear;
21 Chapel Road. I have been up, I walked it there just over the weekend, and I am a
22 little bit concerned still about the dates. I think there's still a huge amount of work to
23 be done on it, so just to get an update of how we feel the dates are going on that.
24 And then obviously where after that that we will expect to find out how much of an
25 overrun that we will have on it. That's great. Thank you.

26 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor O'Toole.

27 COUNCILLOR O'TOOLE: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. Just a few things there. Firstly,
28 I'd like to thank Wicklow County Council for getting the road going into Newtown
29 resurfaced there, the R772. I have been speaking to a lot of parents and carers that
30 are using it going into St Catherine's, and I can't stress enough how important good
31 roads are for people with sensory issues. So thanks a million for that. There's a few
32 things there. The Samuel Hayes footbridge in Rathdrum, I'm wondering about an
33 update on that. Unfortunately the summer season is over now. If we could just see
34 where that is. I'd also thank the Council for the funding for the community use in

1 Arklow, but I am just wondering on that scheme there is 500,000 available, did
2 Wicklow County Council request more than 360,000 or is that what they requested?
3 Also, what criteria are being used to determine whether a property is suitable? And
4 will consultation take place between councillors regarding the use of it prior to the
5 purchase of the building? Another section there, six Arklow sites remaining on the
6 vacant sites register. Out of 17, six of them are in Arklow. Can we receive the
7 location and current status for each of the six? How long each has been on the
8 register? How much levies are outstanding on these properties? What enforcement
9 action has been taken where levies remain unpaid? The Flood Relief Scheme, the
10 2030 completion date, is there anything that can hinder that date or is that set in
11 stone? Also, with the report, the hydrological modelling for the Flood Relief
12 Scheme, the sediment and gravel build-up in the Avoca River, has any of the studies
13 found that subsequent build-up in different locations along the river will cause
14 excess flooding in the years to come? There's numerous places up along the river, up
15 past Shelton, up around Woodenbridge, all the way up to Rathdrum, that there's large
16 gravel beds. There's a few other bits. It looks like I'm out of time.

17 CATHAOIRLEACH: I didn't know it did that. That's brutal.

18 COUNCILLOR O'TOOLE: Can we come back in then?

19 CATHAOIRLEACH: No. Councillor Scott.

20 COUNCILLOR SCOTT: Okay. Don't start my time until it goes red. Thanks,
21 Cathaoirleach, and thanks, Chief Executive, for the report. First of all, just to say
22 thank you to the Executive for all the great work that's been done in Farrankelly. I
23 know you're tired of hearing us from Greystones raising it. I was up there recently
24 and was admiring the doors and windows. It is a great job. Thanks for all the work
25 behind the scenes on that. Chapel Road, I have a similar question to my colleague. I
26 know there were some works also going on in Killincarrig, and we are anxiously
27 awaiting the new scheme to start properly in Killincarrig but the traffic was
28 absolutely horrendous because of the two sets of road works going on last week.
29 And again very keen, there's so many people particularly with traffic going back to
30 school asking us constantly when is the date for Chapel Road to be finished. I know
31 early October is the last we heard but I just wonder is there any update on that. My
32 second query was around the bus stops. And I know there is an update there on the
33 bus stop enhancement scheme but I couldn't really understand it if I am honest. We
34 sent in a list of bus stops last year that we know need shelter in our area, and there's

1 one in particular in Blacklion which is a very busy bus stop for students coming out
2 of three different lots of schools there, there's no shelter and they will be standing
3 there again in the rain in the whole winter, that was sent forward for consideration
4 last year, there was no progress made on spending or allocation I believe. And again
5 there was a list sent in early this year of bus stops which we're proposing for need of
6 improvements and shelters, et cetera, in the district. And I was just wondering what
7 the update is on that, where are we, if stops have been prioritised, and will the money
8 get spent before the end of the year. Thank you.

9 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Chief Executive, do you want to take those
10 three?

11 MS O'GORMAN: Thank you, Cathaoirleach, and thank you, members. I don't have
12 a timer, I notice! I'll ask Joe to update on Chapel Road for both Councillor Gaskin
13 and Councillor Scott, and I will ask Sarah then to come in on the Samuel Hayes
14 bridge, and I think most of Councillor O'Toole's queries are yourself, Helena, in
15 terms of funding on derelict sites, and Sarah on the Flood Relief Scheme. Thank you
16 for the comments on Farrankelly. It's been a long process and we're starting to see
17 visible results on it as well. Joe might come in on Killincarrig and the bus stops.
18 Let's start with Joe and work across. Thanks.

19 MR LANE: There is a wearing course to do on Chapel Road to start next week in
20 advance of the completion of the thing, the 1st October which is still the programme
21 date. Chapel Road. On the Blacklion footpath, I will get an update to the area
22 councillors on that particular one. There is a programme being prepared. There is
23 also work being done by the bus company so there's a number of bus stops being
24 improved. Blacklion in particular.

25 MS DENNEHY: Councillor O'Toole, just in relation to the funding for the
26 community buildings. There was strict criteria in relation to the application form
27 that went into the Department for that. So we had to provide a valuation on a
28 building that we may be interested in purchasing in relation to that. So those
29 details -- that detailed information was part of that submission. So the valuation we
30 had on the buildings we were interested in at that time came to 360,000. It is not a
31 case we can look for 500 and it is only valued at 360. We had to have the
32 documentation to support that. When we move then to select a building we will be
33 back in touch with the local community and the Elected Members in Arklow in
34 relation to the facilities, et cetera, that might be provided there. In relation to the

1 vacant sites. So there are six vacant sites on the register for Arklow. I can get you a
2 list of them, how long they've been on it and what levies are due for the specific six
3 sites. In total, of the 17 sites on the vacant site register, nine of those 17 have been
4 referred to law agent for proceedings in relation to collection of that levy at this
5 stage. I think they were the only two for me.

6 MS McCULLOUGH: In relation to the Samuel Hayes bridge I'd expect tenders to
7 be returned very shortly, within the next week or two, and then hopefully we will be
8 able to appoint a contractor to complete those works. In relation to the Arklow
9 Flood Relief, I suppose quarter 4/2030 is the predicted completion date. Anything
10 could happen when you go on site. Tender documents are planned to be complete by
11 quarter 1/2027. There's lots of variables that could happen, but it is anticipated that it
12 will take three and a half years to construct. I will have to get back to you in relation
13 to sediment along river course, and I will consult my colleagues in relation to that,
14 and the predicted flooding impacts.

15 COUNCILLOR O'TOOLE: Can I just come in on that? Thanks a million. It's just
16 that I have been down numerous times on kayaks during the summer and you can see
17 where there is a lot of corrosion on a lot of the banks that is also moving the gravel
18 pits down where a lot of the beds are. That's what I am saying. And I do understand
19 also that removing certain gravel pits in areas can cause issues too, but from what I
20 have seen it is warranted to look at the whole river, the whole way up along it, if
21 possible. And sorry, just for Helena. During liaising with Wicklow County Council
22 as well and local auctioneers I was looking at kind of valuation on different
23 properties over the last number of years for the likes of a community centre, and
24 there was never -- I never really seen anything below the 400,000 mark. Like, is
25 there a list of properties that you are seeking, you've identified along the Main Street
26 for that price?

27 MS O'GORMAN: It'd be commercially sensitive, Councillor O'Toole. It wouldn't
28 be something we would put into the ether at the moment because it could jeopardise
29 any negotiations with properties for sale.

30 COUNCILLOR O'TOOLE: Thank you.

31 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Glennon.

32 COUNCILLOR GLENNON: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Yeah, no, I'll be brief. My
33 first question really is for the Chief Executive, and I understand there might be
34 commercial sensitivity on it but it is a matter raised with you when you were in

1 Blessington, and that was the purchase of the piece of ground in the town that's for
2 sale currently close to the Catholic church. It would be building potential on it, it
3 would have parking potential on it and the use of the building as a community centre
4 would be a big benefit to the community in Blessington. That's the first item that I
5 wanted to ask about. The second item is the RRDF in Baltinglass and Blessington,
6 it's going on for years and very little progress to be seen. I wonder, have you any
7 update, a meaningful update on when we're going to see actual work happening?
8 The third item is the park and ride in Hollywood. I understand the piece of ground
9 has been identified. I'm wondering where that's at. And then the next two items are
10 more complimentary than questions, and that is Director Jackie Carroll circulated
11 this morning that the two fire stations are going to commence in mid-September or
12 be sent for tender in mid-September. That's a welcome development, because it is an
13 issue of great concern to both staff and locals in Baltinglass and Dunlavin so I
14 welcome that announcement. Finally to compliment our engineering staff in our part
15 of the world. They have done tremendous work on the roads over the summer, and
16 they're welcome improvements because our roads are particularly bad. I would like
17 to thank Pat Byrne and Darren Graham for their efforts on our behalf. Thank you.

18 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Dunne, I'm just going to bring
19 Councillor Mahon in first because he accidentally knocked off his mic.

20 COUNCILLOR DUNNE: I know Pat, it's okay.

21 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you.

22 COUNCILLOR MAHON: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Very briefly on the RRDF in
23 Baltinglass, with Councillor Glennon as well. I think at July's meeting we were
24 promised an update today at this meeting, and I would like to see is that brought
25 forward as quick as well. After attending a couple of different functions up in
26 Baltinglass over the last couple of months patience is running out up there at an
27 alarming rate and you can see why, it's been dragging on and dragging on, and really
28 they're at their wits end up there with the state their town is being left in. So you can
29 see their point of view, and we really would like it to be pushed on as soon as
30 possible. Okay. Thank you.

31 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Dunne.

32 COUNCILLOR DUNNE: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I just have a question about
33 the Older Persons Grant. Earlier this year we ran out of funding for it, and we wrote
34 out to a number of people who had already received funding asking were they going

1 to proceed with the works this year. I'm just wondering what sort of response we got
2 from that and did it free up any money. Just a thing that's been bothering me
3 recently is line marking within Wicklow Town and surrounding areas. I know by
4 talking to a few of the officials it's very difficult to get people in to do the line
5 marking but this should be priority because especially in our area we'll have people
6 doing their tests and things like that, and I am getting a few complaints to say that
7 they're failing because the line marking isn't up to standard. Just on Chapel Lane in
8 Glenealy, we have had water problems out there. I've contacted Irish Water on
9 numerous occasions on this issue and while I accept that it is probably out of the
10 remit of the Council I am banging my head against the wall with them. What can I
11 do? And is there anything we can do maybe? Maybe Ms McCullough to come back
12 to me with some sort of solution, because we don't seem to be going anywhere with
13 the water pressure out there. I think that's it. Thanks very much.

14 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thanks, Councillor Dunne. I will pass over to you, Chief
15 Executive.

16 MS O'GORMAN: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. And thank you, members. Councillor
17 Glennon, just in relation to the lands in Blessington. Look, we are actively looking
18 at those. I will come back to the district members when we are further along the line
19 on it. I will ask Helena to go through the RRDF with you all on that and Joe on the
20 park and ride for Hollywood. The Older Persons Grant, I'll ask Michael to make a
21 comment on that for you and Brian might deal with both the line markings and the
22 water pressure and Uisce Eireann, to see if there's any contact we can make directly
23 ourselves. I will start with Joe and then Helena, please.

24 MR LANE: TII will not be funding or currently are not funding the park and ride in
25 this location. We are currently looking for funding from other sources regarding
26 this. In the road safety, the funding source they had was linked to the bus stop down
27 in Annalecky and they're not proceeding with that particular funding stream at the
28 moment.

29 MS DENNEHY: RRDF Baltinglass. So the tender submissions were completed by
30 our consultants, received on the 18th of August. They still have a number of queries
31 included on them before we can go to publication. So we had hoped we would be
32 publishing that tender document in August. We are looking at the next couple of
33 weeks for that. We're sitting down with the consultants to finalise that on
34 Wednesday of this week. So hopefully within the next week or two they will

1 definitely be published. In relation to the RRDF for the Blessington HSE building,
2 again we are awaiting confirmation from the Department that we can proceed to the
3 feasibility, the 130,000 to be spent on the HSE building.

4 MR NICHOLSON: Yes, in relation to grants, we wrote out to all those who have
5 received announcement of grants and we gave them 'til the 1st September to come
6 back and let us know if they're proceeding and when they are likely to spend money.
7 It was a worthwhile exercise because quite a few will not be proceeding for various
8 reason. We have a lot of applications, and we have contacted all those whose
9 application had been frozen and we reignited them all and they're all back in. So we
10 will be getting a lot more grants allocated between now and the end of the year to
11 make sure we spend all the money. Thanks.

12 MR GLEESON: Just in relation to water pressure, we will contact Uisce Eireann
13 directly and see if we can get an update on that. In relation to line markings, this
14 started to be progressed around the MD for Wicklow. Obviously for the first quarter
15 of the year weather conditions didn't allow for line marking. As the weather has
16 improved we have commenced work in relation to that. There was refreshing of
17 ramps that started around Wicklow Town, and for example road markings were
18 completed along the R750 from the Port Road to Bollarney Pump Station, further
19 road marking improvements took place at the R750 Tinakilly crossroads. There
20 were completed. So it is a work in progress and we are progressing it. Obviously
21 the members will be aware that an additional 110,000 was allocated out to each
22 municipal district in respect of line markings. So we are progressing it, albeit I know
23 the Council did mention it is particularly tough to engage contractors at the moment
24 because they're flat out as you know with different types of work. But that matter is
25 being progressed, rest assured. Thank you.

26 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Cronin.

27 COUNCILLOR CRONIN: Thanks very much, Cathaoirleach. Apologies. Just to
28 clarify, Helena, just on that question about the RRDF, the tender. Do you have any
29 idea of a date of when the document will be ready to go to tender? If they just clarify
30 that. Sorry. In relation to the building in Blessington, I raised this at the June
31 meeting and as I said back then the building is ideally located in the centre of the
32 town, it has great potential for community use or alternatively part of it for
33 community use, part of it for housing, and the lands at the side of the building are
34 adjacent to the housing estate which has the old rectory. So there's great potential

1 there from both a housing point of view and community use. I really think that this
2 building and piece of land really has great potential and I think will be a fantastic
3 opportunity for the Council to explore the possibility of purchasing that building.
4 Following on from that, just the NTA funding. Sorry, Joe you said, just to clarify as
5 well, they're not funding the park and ride at the moment. Is there alternative sources
6 of funding we can explore or can we pursue it to hope that they will fund it in future?
7 Finally, the meeting with TII that was promised back in June. When I was
8 Cathaoirleach of the Baltinglass Municipal District I was invited to a meeting with
9 the TII. Obviously we've Councillor Mulhall now, but there has been no follow up
10 to the meeting with TII. Is that meeting still going ahead in relation to the N81?
11 You might just clarify if there's been any update. Thank you.

12 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Bourke.

13 COUNCILLOR BOURKE: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I just want to highlight an
14 issue in Arklow. It was raised at the July meeting but it is still an ongoing issue.
15 That's the discharge of the wastewater in the dock area, the harbour there. It's really
16 in such a bad state that I think we should be moving on it faster. Myself and my
17 colleagues will probably be lodging a motion calling on the Council to connect it to
18 the wastewater treatment plant because the water coming down can be cloudy some
19 days and it can have discharges of grease in the last couple of weeks. So we need to
20 act on this quickly and I am urging you to do so. Thank you for your updated reports
21 that we got over the last two weeks on it, but it's definitely something that needs
22 urgent attention. Thank you.

23 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Bourke. Councillor Stapleton.

24 COUNCILLOR STAPLETON: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Yeah, my first query
25 somewhat follows on from Councillor Dunne's issue he raised about line markings.
26 Just in Tinahely Village, in the last couple of weeks we had an unfortunate accident
27 where a car crossed over a corner too sharply I believe. And I suppose it's just to
28 highlight that I think line markings may potentially as well as uplifting villages in
29 terms of appearance contribute significantly to road safety as well in our towns and
30 villages. So I welcome the kind of funding we ring-fence for line markings in each
31 municipal district but wonder considering that it is highlighted across the county if
32 there might be some scheme or approach we take next year to look at it countywide
33 just given the difficulties in appointing contractors with very small funds on a very
34 local basis, if it is something where MDs could feed in and it'd be kind of taken on

1 by the Council across the county wide. And just to see as we approach our budget
2 discussions that we keep it forefront of our mind as well. And then, following up on
3 an issue raised by Councillor Kennedy at our meeting on the state of footpaths in
4 Carnew in the south of Wicklow. We had a lot of funding designated for footpath
5 repairs. My understanding is that has been taken up in the Baltinglass district so
6 there's no funding available for that, and also that the teams are somewhat stretched
7 with the ground maintenance teams addressing all of the road repairs as a result of
8 Storm Chandra. I am wondering is there any central support that those teams can
9 get, possibly not available but just to highlight that they are saying that they're under
10 significant pressure just understandably as a result of this additional workload. So
11 just highlighting and seeing if there's any update there.

12 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Stapleton. I will pass to you now for
13 response, Chief Executive.

14 MS O'GORMAN: Thank you, Cathaoirleach, and thank you, members. I will ask
15 Helena to come back to you, Councillor Cronin, on the RRDF and just exactly where
16 we're at with that tendering piece. Yeah, your points are noted I suppose on the
17 building in Blessington. As I said, we're actively pursuing it and looking at it, and as
18 soon as I have a meaningful update on it I will come back to you all on it. Joe then
19 might come back in on the park and ride to clarify funding and the meeting with TII
20 as well on the N81 specifically. Councillor Bourke, yeah, I note your comments on
21 Arklow, on the discharge into the river. Extensive testing has been done. You
22 would have got some of the reports from Sarah and the team, so EPA and Uisce
23 Eireann. We're trying to trace the source of the discharge and that's the key issue.
24 So before we can connect anything to anything we need to know where it's coming
25 from, and that's a problem at the moment. I will get Sarah to give a bit more detail
26 on it. But it is something that is of great concern to us all, that there's free-flowing
27 matter into the river. You know, it's not where we want to be at all. So we're
28 working on it with our colleagues in the two other statutory bodies as well.
29 Councillor Stapleton, on line markings, your point is well made about Tinahely, in
30 general the resources that are required to get through these works in every district.
31 We do operate a number of framework procurements where Joe's directorate will
32 procure on behalf of the county and then each district can draw down on it, and that
33 makes it probably a little bit easier to get contractors for the works, but as you
34 mentioned yourself with Storm Chandra and the amount of rehabilitation of our road

1 network that we've had to do that has pulled the staff in all sorts of directions. I
2 know resourcing comes up regularly about the number of outdoor operatives that we
3 have in each of our districts and to be very blunt with you, we have them included in
4 our Workforce Plan but the funding to pay for them is the issue. I would love to be
5 able to take on additional staff in our district areas, but at the moment without a
6 change in our approach to raising income in the county we just simply can't afford to
7 hire in more permanent staff in those areas. But Sarah might have an update on
8 Carnew footpath repairs separately. I will go to Helena first just on the couple of
9 points of clarification and then Joe, please.

10 MS DENNEHY: Okay. Councillor Cronin, just to clarify in relation to the RRDF.
11 So for Baltinglass, the tender documents have been received from our consultants in
12 mid-August. There are still some small anomalies with that before we can go to
13 tender. We are meeting consultants on Wednesday, and hopefully they will turn
14 around any of those queries very quickly, and I would still hope that we would be
15 able to go out to tender in the coming weeks in September. That is dependent on the
16 turnaround time from the consultants on the remaining queries but certainly would
17 be hopeful for September.

18 COUNCILLOR CRONIN: Thank you.

19 MR LANE: As I detailed earlier we are currently looking for a funding source for
20 the park and ride. As regards the Carnew footpath, there is no resource. As the
21 Chief Executive said, all roads have been stretched particularly with the rather busy
22 and extended road programme with the extra monies we got and were all delighted
23 with. In addition, active travel who normally have assisted, if possible, in the early
24 and national side are trying to deliver safe route to school programmes. So there is
25 no central free resource capacity at the moment.

26 MS McCULLOUGH: So in relation to Arklow Harbour, yeah, we do appreciate
27 there is a lot of work to do there. We have got teams coming to us. We will have an
28 engineer coming and a surface water team as well. We will start those surveys with
29 those teams in October. We have engaged consultants to start mapping the lines for
30 us as well, and we will keep you updated on that. Our scientist has confirmed that it
31 was absolutely fats and oils. Even though it did resemble another material it has
32 been confirmed that it absolutely was the fats and oils that went into the harbour
33 there a couple of weeks ago. So we are now working with Uisce Eireann, the MD
34 and all the teams there as well to work on this and make sure we get it resolved as

1 soon as possible.

2 COUNCILLOR O'TOOLE: Sorry, would there be any chance of coming in there for
3 one thing? I know Councillor Bourke brought this up but I haven't been engaging
4 with some of the staff regarding this matter. I completely dispute the findings. I
5 have photographs from three different occasions personally taken by me. I'm also a
6 plumbing contractor for 30 years and I've seen enough stuff to know what faecal
7 matter is. So I completely -- and the photographs that I have, it's clear as day. And I
8 think the timeframe that is on some of the photographs might be -- that was sent in as
9 the explanation don't actually line up to the dates. So I presume with the rain that
10 came and then the fog that went into the dock that's what the findings were but the
11 findings that were clearly on the dock for over five days I reckon it was faecal matter
12 anyway, and I don't necessarily need lab tests to confirm that. Like, clearly on the
13 photograph that was given to us there is no sign of faecal matter but it was the day
14 after the heavy rain and high tide, so I presume that might be the situation. Could we
15 get a meeting to kind of discuss this? It was requested but I haven't heard anything
16 back from anybody. With all the councillors.

17 MS McCULLOUGH: Yeah, we can arrange a meeting.

18 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Kennedy.

19 COUNCILLOR KENNEDY: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. I have a few things I'd like to
20 bring up today. The first thing I would like to get to and I will get straight to it, is
21 under the energy retrofit upgrade works. I know there's been a few housing estates,
22 Hawthorn Drive in Rathdrum, Corballis in Rathdrum, and Brewery Bends in
23 Rathdrum, and the new houses in Connery have been on the list for years, and I'm
24 just wondering can they be included in a meaningful way. Because we have been
25 told before they would be included and yet nothing has happened in any of those at
26 all. Under the roads we got 7.2 million. I am just wondering maybe perhaps at the
27 next meeting can we have an update on what roads are being done in each municipal
28 district and how much money has been drawn down or spent out of 7.2 million.
29 Onto flooding we had last February in Aughrim, and there's a lot of very concerned
30 residents throughout that could happen again this year, I'm wondering are we
31 undertaking any mitigation works at all to try and help that that doesn't happen this
32 year again for those residents. The other thing, Chief Executive, I'm extremely
33 worried about, and I'm sure other members of the Arklow area are as well, there's not
34 a day that goes by that I don't get calls from Arklow people looking for housing. It's

1 a huge issue. Also in Aughrim, but it's not as big -- it's not the same issue -- it's not
2 as big I should say, as it is in Arklow. But in Arklow I think if I went back to last
3 May I think there was over 900 on the housing list in Arklow so it is getting to a
4 crisis point. I don't know why there's no houses being built in Arklow but it doesn't
5 seem to be happening. We spent 139 million, the Government has, a new
6 wastewater treatment plant yet we don't seem have an awful lot of houses coming on
7 stream for people. I think we are moving to a stage where we might have to ask for a
8 special meeting to deal with housing in South Wicklow. Thanks, Chief Executive.
9 Thanks, Cathaoirleach.

10 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Doyle.

11 COUNCILLOR DOYLE: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. You will be delighted to hear
12 that I don't have a question, I just wanted to make a very brief comment. Just to pay
13 tribute to the municipal district in Bray. On Saturday evening we had a Fanzone
14 event on Bray seafront so that whoever chose in Bray could come down and watch
15 the fight on the big screen and be part of Katie Taylor's last fight in Croke Park. It
16 was on quite short notice, and it is more than just a screen, it is a whole event
17 undertaking that happened very quickly and only happened because of the great
18 work of the staff there, particularly Jackie and Brian in Bray who led on that. It was
19 a wonderful event for anybody who saw any coverage of it. It was like an extension
20 of the Croke Park fight; when the anthem came on everybody in Bray stood, when
21 the phone lights came on everybody in Bray did the same, any mention of Old Court
22 or Bray there was an extra big cheer. It really was a wonderful community event and
23 it was fantastic for us all to be able to feel like we were there with Katie, and I know
24 that Katie would have appreciated that as well. Just a quick thank you to the staff in
25 Bray that made that possible. Thank you.

26 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Doyle. And I would also like to be
27 associated with those compliments. It was such a well-run event. There was no
28 issues at all with any kind of people's behaviour. It was such a friendly, warm event.
29 I really, really enjoyed it. Well done. It was such a short notice event. Councillor
30 O'Brien.

31 COUNCILLOR O'BRIEN: Thank you, Cathaoirleach and Chief Executive, for the
32 comprehensive report as usual. A number of months ago I raised about Rathnew
33 graveyard and the €175 admin fee that is being charged only to Rathnew graveyard,
34 and I was told by the outgoing director at the time, Theresa O'Brien, that it would be

1 looked at with a view to eliminating it. Since then a number of funeral directors
2 have been on that they're being chased now for the €175 admin fee. Can I get
3 clarification that it has been waived and that we're not bringing this unnecessary
4 burden to people already grieving as well. I'd like to back up Councillor Dunne
5 about Chapel Lane. It is something I was working on as well. I did get a response
6 from Irish Water this morning and I'm happy to share that with you. Thank you.

7 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. I will pass to you Chief Executive for a response.

8 MS O'GORMAN: Thank you, Cathaoirleach, and thank you again, members. On
9 the energy retrofit programme, Councillor Kennedy, I might get Michael to come in
10 on that. And we will certainly bring back a report on the 7.2 million and what's that
11 been spent on, what roads and what districts, for the next Council meeting. Sarah
12 can go through Aughrim and mitigation works. We have had very close contact with
13 the OPW around Aughrim and obviously with Minister Moran as well who was out
14 in the area; he knows well what the local people are dealing with. In relation to
15 housing in Arklow and in South Wicklow, Joe might just highlight the pipeline of
16 our own housing that's coming on stream. We certainly have experienced a bit of a
17 slowdown certainly in private-led development as well, and I know Helena and her
18 team have been actively working in trying to see what the blockages are, just to try
19 and free up -- Because we will get social and affordable housing as part of those
20 developments as well. I know one came in for contingent planning permission and
21 there's one that changed ownership. There's a few different bits and pieces going on,
22 but you're right we need to put pressure on in the area. To be fair to Helena's team
23 on the activation side of things they have been engaging with local development. Joe
24 will give an idea of what pipeline we have from our own front. Yeah, Councillor
25 Doyle and Councillor Winstanley, just to reiterate what you said about the staff in
26 Bray in making the event happen on Saturday. From the word go Jackie and Brian
27 were pushing hard to remove any barriers to the event happening. Katie Taylor's
28 own management were excellent in dealing with our staff and just again trying to
29 make sure to facilitate the event on the day. It did go smoothly, we were very lucky.
30 I suppose it was a dry evening. A great celebration for the people of Bray to
31 recognise a true hero of Bray, Wicklow and the country. No small amount of credit
32 is due to Jackie or that work. I will get Sarah to comment on Rathnew graveyard.
33 I'm not aware of the current status of it, on the admin fee. I would suggest that
34 whatever discussions or policy decision that is needed to change there will have to

1 go through the relevant SPC maybe to regularise how all of our graveyards interact
2 and behave and standardise that. I will go to Michael first of all on the retrospective
3 and then Sarah and then Joe, please.

4 MR NICHOLSON: Thank you. We've had a very successful energy retrofit
5 programme in the county. We do lots of houses every year. We send in submissions
6 at the start of the year listing all the houses we intend to do because we have a
7 limited budget and we can't go above that. Then we have to go to tender and get it
8 all organised. We try and spread it across all MDs. We don't concentrate on any one
9 MD. We have had a lot in the Arklow MD. As you mentioned, councillor, a lot of
10 houses in Rathdrum. So Connery was listed for this year. We're starting to do those
11 surveys now for the next year and the list of properties for next year. We will have a
12 look at Connery and see does it qualify under the condition survey. It has been a
13 very successful programme. We're getting great feedback from the residents in terms
14 of their energy bills, et cetera. It has been very successful. We are getting huge
15 funding from the Department which is very welcome. We will have a look at
16 Connery and see if we can stick it in for next year, councillor.

17 MS McCULLOUGH: In relation to Aughrim mitigation works I will have to ask our
18 engineering team to do up a short report and outline what mitigation measures are
19 being implemented there, are under review or Arklow. In relation to Rathnew
20 graveyard and fees, as our Chief Executive has suggested we will discuss those fees.
21 I am not up to date on that, so I do apologise there, but we will bring it to our SPC as
22 well and have a look at those fees and find out where that was left. Okay.

23 MR LANE: Okay. Councillor, as you know, and as the Chief Executive or yourself
24 pointed out, there's (inaudible) going into Arklow there in the last year or two, and
25 there's a lead time between this infrastructure and between when all the developers
26 develop, including ourselves. Now we have three larger schemes there, Tinahask
27 phase one, there was a Part 8 on that, we have gone to tender and a successful tender
28 has been made and a letter has gone out to those tenderers. Sheep House, we have
29 engaged with the Department regarding that particular site and we have taken their
30 points into account. Therefore we will -- a Part 8 presentation was made to the
31 members I believe and we're doing detailed design for Part 8 for Sheep House.
32 That's circa 50. And Tinahask phase two, we will be looking at that and going back
33 to the Elected Members in the context of splitting the larger scheme, which was in
34 the PPE, to smaller bites and possible having affordable housing there, a mixed

1 tender site. We're just looking at that at the moment. The other two will be on site
2 quickly. As the Chief Executive pointed out there is a dearth of other developers
3 there at the moment and we would expect one or two of those may come into stream
4 also.

5 CATHAOIRLEACH: Sorry, Councillor O'Neill, could you put your -- Just, yeah.

6 COUNCILLOR O'NEILL: Grand, thanks, Cathaoirleach. I don't know, the three
7 minutes there, it's a long way to come across Sally Gap for three minutes there, you
8 know. I don't know who came up with that idea, but anyway.

9 CATHAOIRLEACH: The standing orders came up with that.

10 COUNCILLOR O'NEILL: Who?

11 CATHAOIRLEACH: The standing orders.

12 COUNCILLOR ALVEY: It's from the standing orders.

13 COUNCILLOR O'NEILL: I don't know who created -- we won't argue, the time is
14 closing in. I think it discriminates a little bit too against maybe somebody like
15 Councillor O'Neill and that with a slight stammer. So there's no allowance, we have
16 to move on. Could I move on there? The point -- I've known Katie Taylor from
17 when she was a child and it was a great occasion that she came out there with the
18 massive turnout, but I don't think we should be clapping ourselves on the back there
19 about big screens from Bray. I got calls from Enniskerry Boxing Club who you gave
20 the boxing club to the rowing club or whatever, and all the promises we heard about
21 them being looked after, they're still not being looked after. So we're great at this
22 auld craic, we'll bring Katie Taylor in here, we'll do the whole shebang and we still
23 look back. There's great kids coming out of Enniskerry. The Bomber Corrigan, I
24 know his proud ma is behind me here, and he's doing so well at boxing in Australia,
25 and hopefully Shane will come back as the Australian champion. He's doing very
26 well. He started off in Enniskerry Boxing Club. So again I'd urge some work is
27 done so we get this up and running. I will move on quickly. My time is 107. Oh my
28 god! I have asked a few times about the sewerage that's been taken out of Kippure
29 Lodge. There's 6,000 gallons a day being taken out. I still don't know where it is
30 going. I would like to draw attention that there's 7 acres of land that have been taken
31 from us in Blessington at Avonree, the multimillion outfit, Quantum Capital who
32 own Kippure Lodge, they are the owners of Avonree, and they have sealed off 7
33 acres to use for whatever. I would like that to be looked at and for us to cop on once
34 and for all. You know, it is just not good enough. Could I call on -- as regards the

1 relief road. We have a dead end road now in Blessington with the building of the
2 northern end of the relief road but the southern end is still not completed and even at
3 that it is not a proper job. What we need is a bypass to the town. The last thing
4 could I get an update on the land at --

5 CATHAOIRLEACH: Sorry, that's your time, Councillor O'Neill.

6 COUNCILLOR O'NEILL: What?

7 CATHAOIRLEACH: That's your time. You had your three minutes.

8 COUNCILLOR O'NEILL: I want to know --

9 CATHAOIRLEACH: No, that's your time, Councillor O'Neill. Councillor
10 Richmond, would you put your -- Councillor Richmond. Councillor O'Neill, you've
11 had your turn. It is Councillor Richmond now. You've had your turn. Councillor
12 Richmond, sorry, you can come in there.

13 COUNCILLOR RICHMOND: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I will continue as my
14 clock is running. I have only two quick issues, 30 or 40 seconds each. The first one,
15 I was reading recently about the revised date for the delivery of the DART service to
16 Wicklow is now, reading the Department of Transport, put back to 2030, and I'd ask
17 the Chief Executive could we actually look for assurances because unfortunately as
18 public representatives I feel many of us are being left with egg on our faces saying
19 this date and this date, and it is just a clarification that once and for all the DART
20 service is due to arrive in Wicklow for 2030. And just the second issue I just want to
21 raise, and it is more a note I have written to the Minister for Health in relation to this,
22 it's the lack of support services for families from south of Bray with families in
23 addiction and the number of families that are having to travel to Dublin for supports,
24 and with the growth in the population in Wicklow it is to look for increased funding.
25 Okay. Thank you.

26 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Snell, sorry, I knocked you off there.
27 Do you want to put your light on?

28 COUNCILLOR SNELL: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. First and foremost, could we get
29 that information that Councillor O'Neill is looking for on Troopersfield, Blessington?
30 Part 8 went through three years ago. If you could even circulate it to the MD in West
31 Wicklow. Just in regards to the Wicklow Town-Rathnew Local Transport Plan. It
32 was in conjunction with our Local Area Plan 2025-2031. I have concerns in regards
33 it. At the time we were doing the plan it was relayed to us that we would be engaged
34 at every stage in this. I would like if somebody from the relevant section, the roads

1 section, could come to our MD and maybe go through it with us. Phase two of the
2 inner relief road in Rathnew, we know where it's come out but unfortunately we
3 don't know where it's going to come out on the Ashford to Rathnew Road, the R772
4 which is outside of this plan. And if we don't have a plan we've nothing. In regards
5 to the councillors working on the call for sites, we are looking at roads from the
6 Friars Hill Road in Broomhall up to the newly refurbished Rocky Road, which was
7 done here recently, also the Greenhill Road to Dunbarrow Road. Which brings me
8 to the point in regards to a lot of our new developments we're failing in regards to
9 pedestrian crossings. And it is a strategy as part of this that we would put in
10 cycleways and pedestrian crossings. There's two to go in in Rathnew which
11 unfortunately pains me to say that it's actually the local authority that is delaying it
12 not the develop who is waiting to go. And then on the other hand in
13 Newtownmountkennedy in Rossmore it's the opposite way around; the Council are
14 gung-ho to get going with it and unfortunately the developer is delaying the process
15 out there. Could I have an update, maybe Chief Executive that could be sent out to
16 us through the director of housing, on the numbers of people on notice to quit? I am
17 dealing with an awful lot of people on notice to quit and it is a huge issue at the
18 moment. Could we also have a list of zoned lands, educational lands in each
19 municipal district? It would be an item later on at half four to be discussed but if it
20 could be sent out. Could I thank the staff for their work on the civic reception in
21 Clermont in Wicklow GAA. It was hugely well attended by that members and
22 thanks to the staff for arranging that. While I have a few seconds left, unfortunately
23 I would like to see a list on this of the members as they clock in here to put the
24 time -- No, but it would be much easier if it's up there and we could see it. You
25 could get a clock here after a couple of years of me requesting that a list should go
26 up there and we will see who is next in line and not at the discretion of the top table.

27 CATHAOIRLEACH: What I do is when people come up I do keep a list in case I
28 accidentally knock them off. As you see I knocked you off there and I brought you
29 in before someone else is flashing. I'm keeping a record in case anything happens.

30 COUNCILLOR SNELL: No, and I trust what you are doing but I think for openness
31 and transparency when it comes to people proposing and seconding, particularly
32 when it comes to budget meetings and the like, it's hugely important. You can go
33 back through the minutes for the last ten, 20 years, there'll always be people who are
34 in the controlling parties of the Council. Just for transparency, if we could do that,

1 Cathaoirleach. That's all the I'm asking.

2 MS PURCELL: There's one problem with it, and the problem is that the two
3 systems aren't integrated. So the system where people are remote, like Councillor
4 Murphy at the moment, and those in the chamber, the two systems don't talk to each
5 other. So when somebody remotely puts their hand up it doesn't integrate into the
6 system where there are six people waiting in the chamber. That's the problem we
7 have. That's why the Cathaoirleach adds in the people who are remote in the list as
8 to where they are in relation to everybody else so they don't talk to each other.

9 COUNCILLOR SNELL: Well, I have no problem with the Cathaoirleach still doing
10 that system in that regard. Like it'll catch the people who are in the chambers. We
11 can put a man on the moon, surely to God we can locate and put up on the screen the
12 people who have logged in or pressed their light on. My light went out twice. I've
13 no issue. You brought me back in. And I understand if there's too many waiting to
14 come in we have to wait, but I just feel for openness and transparency that if we can
15 do that. We can put a clock up there. This brings us back to no Protocol Committee.
16 We asked about this last year. We said that we would discuss it again. The protocol
17 again decides these issues, and while I understand it is standing orders in regards to
18 the three minutes but it does feel a little bit -- To members that are coming here
19 today if they're not on the Corporate Policy Group they're not aware of what you're
20 trying to implement. I would like to see us going back to bringing in Protocol
21 Committee.

22 MS O'GORMAN: Just to advise, the matter of the clock was discussed and
23 mentioned at a previous meeting, particularly when the Cathaoirleach was elected as
24 Cathaoirleach she mentioned she was going to look at a clock. I completely take
25 your point about the transparency. In other local authorities I've worked in the
26 members press a button and it comes up on the screen so you can see the tás and the
27 níl. So you can see all of that. So we can certainly look at other systems, but in the
28 county I'm referring to they don't have hybrid meetings, everybody comes into the
29 chamber. So it works. I don't know whether that kind of solution would work with
30 the dual system, as Helen said. We will certainly look at that, because I do think that
31 anything that makes it easier for members to see what is going on, who proposed and
32 seconded, we can certainly look at that.

33 CATHAOIRLEACH: There's actually just one more, we will take Councillor
34 Fortune before we go on to the responses.

1 COUNCILLOR FORTUNE: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. I will only use up a short
2 space, I might use the rest of it to make a point. The affordable housing. We talked
3 about affordable housing several times during the meeting today. Could I get a list
4 of the affordable housing and where they are and what kind of pricing we're talking
5 about and when they're going to be delivered? Because we keep saying social and
6 affordable, and it's not really happening. I know it is the fault maybe in here but I'd
7 like to understand it better when people ring me and ask me what's happening with
8 such a development. So if we could have that list I'd appreciate it. And if I can
9 then -- That's the main point I want to make. I want to make an observation on the
10 clock, if I may. You know, in my time here in the chamber we've gone from having
11 two Council meetings to one, to then the Protocol disappeared which really was a
12 good entity I thought and was more productive than other meetings, and now we're
13 on the clock and we've got three minutes. And speaking personally I would very
14 seldom use the three minutes but on a point of principle I think that is ridiculous and
15 I think it is an insult to public representatives who have a mandate to come into this
16 chamber and represent the people who elect them. I think that's an insult to public
17 reps.

18 CATHAOIRLEACH: We have standing orders where you should be staying to three
19 minutes, and previous chairs have kept you to three minutes. I actually think it is
20 helpful, it is helpful for myself, if you can see yourself the time you're meant to be
21 keeping to, but this is not something I have invented or created. It is in the standing
22 orders which are set in stone and have been there way before I was a councillor. I
23 am enforcing the standing orders, which is my job, as clarification.

24 COUNCILLOR FORTUNE: A clarification if I may. The rubbish of having it up
25 on the screen for people to race through their contribution to the meeting, that's brand
26 new. I didn't know that was in existence and I'm here a while.

27 CATHAOIRLEACH: I will pass to you, Chief Executive, for response.

28 MS O'GORMAN: Thank you, Cathaoirleach, and thank you, members. In relation
29 to the boxing club in Enniskerry, Councillor O'Neill, I will ask Jackie to maybe give
30 you an update on where we're in finding a location for them. There certainly has
31 been a lot of work going on in the background to make sure we have a suitable site.
32 I don't know if Sarah might be able to give some insight on Kippure Lodge and
33 Avonree, and the sewage being moved, enforcement proceedings. It is outside the
34 planning. It is the waste movement. Just to have a look at that. Councillor

1 Richmond, yeah, I will certainly get on to colleagues in the Department of Transport
2 and see if I can get a firm commitment on the DART coming to Wicklow. I'm not
3 quite sure what you were asking in relation to the support for those families suffering
4 addiction and the consequences of that and the services. If it is something you want
5 us to right we can certainly do that. Councillor Snell, look, thank you for bringing
6 up Troopersfield. Joe might be able to give an update on that and Brian will update
7 you on the Local Transport Plan and the pedestrian crossings as well. Michael might
8 be able to circulate an update on the notice to quit numbers to all members, and again
9 Helena the lands that we have currently zoned for educational purposes in the county
10 we can circulate them. Councillor Fortune, when you're asking about affordable
11 housing are you asking about Council-led delivered affordable housing or the
12 element we get through Part 8 from developers?

13 COUNCILLOR FORTUNE: I'm talking about both. A global figure. Where are
14 they? When are they going to be there? What is the costing?

15 MS O'GORMAN: A global figure, yeah.

16 COUNCILLOR FORTUNE: We've been talking about the costing for the last two
17 and a half years.

18 MS O'GORMAN: Yeah. Okay. We will get data. I might go to Jackie first.

19 MS CARROLL: Thanks, Cathaoirleach and Chief Executive. Councillor O'Neill, as
20 stated previously in this chamber, Bray MD have made a commitment to the boxing
21 club in Bray that we will work actively towards procuring a facility that will be
22 suitable for the boxing clubs in Bray. Obviously we will continue to work with them
23 to identify and develop such a facility and it is very high on our radar. It is a big
24 priority for Bray MD. Thank you.

25 MS O'GORMAN: We haven't moved to that director yet. Councillor O'Neill, if you
26 let the staff answer your questions. There's different directors with different
27 responsibilities. One of my other colleagues is going to answer on Kippure Avonree
28 for you. If you would just let the staff answer, please. I just said to you we haven't
29 got all the responses back to you. One director answered a specific question about
30 the boxing club. Your other questions are going to be answered.

31 Gerry, will you let the people speak, let the staff speak, to answer your question?

32 MS McCULLOUGH: I believe there are ongoing issues there with Kippure. I know
33 there's an enforcement case and legal cases as well at the moment. There is an issue
34 with water I believe. I will have to get more information on that because I'm not a

1 hundred percent sure what the issue with water is. There is a waste licence in place
2 but I will have to get more information on that.

3 MR GLEESON: Councillor Snell.

4 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor O'Neill, I will bring you in once all the directors
5 have finished speaking but I need to put your mic on. I want to give you a proper
6 chance to speak with your microphone on but the directors are still speaking.

7 MS PURCELL: I would like to say in accordance with standing orders the standing
8 orders are quite clear. They say that: "The chair is the sole judge of order in the
9 Council and has the authority to maintain order and enforce prompt obedience in his
10 or her ruling." That's very clear in the standing orders.

11 MS O'GORMAN: Director McCullough said there is a waste permit in place. There
12 is a licence in place. No, but she answered you here today and said there is a permit
13 in place.

14 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor O'Neill, you're taking a disproportionate amount
15 of time now and Director Gleeson was about to speak. Would you just speak?

16 MR GLEESON: Okay. Councillor Snell, just in relation to your query. Separate to
17 but complementing the Rathnew Inner Relief Road Plan, as you know we have the
18 Wicklow Town Rathnew Local Transport Plan which is currently in progress. As
19 part of that plan we do have a consultation session to be arranged with the Wicklow
20 MD Elected Members which will take place later this year. So in relation to the
21 Rathnew Inner Relief Road plan itself, the specific plan I might hand over to
22 Director Lane just for an update on that. Thank you.

23 MR LANE: There was two questions regarding the consultants, Bray Inner Relief
24 Road South and Tinahely, because they're both linked to framework. The Bray Inner
25 Relief Road phase three, tender from consultants were received in late August and
26 are currently being assessed. We will look at various options with the route and
27 timelines in that particular one. We're also at the same time with the same
28 framework looking at consultants for phase three of Tinakilly which is to the
29 regional road to the end of the link and also to look at the original times to see if that
30 can be relooked at and whether there's other options there. So that will be given to
31 the consultants and we will be back to the areas there. In answer to your specific
32 question, Councillor Snell, on Trooperstown we have gone to tender, we have
33 successful tenders in that case, even though you are asking outside your area, and
34 there's a programme with the consultants. So we have prepared tenders in that

1 particular case. Councillor Fortune, all reference from now on with the new housing
2 plans, affordable housing are called starter homes. So when you're doing any
3 googling just be aware affordable is now starter homes.

4 Regarding our particular ones, I will give an update on prices because I haven't got
5 prices and they evolve. So Lott Lane place three we will be advertising -- phase two
6 which is the affordable 26, we'll be advertising them shortly. It'll be when we know
7 the exact date on that. That's a little bit fluid, and that date will be tied in with the
8 other 76 units there. So they will be circulated shortly. We will make sure that's
9 circulated to the area. There's also Lott Lane phase three which is the 46 other
10 affordables. That's a new tender and that'll be going out to tender again shortly,
11 probably quarter 3 or Quarter 4 of this year for the next phase of those. Mariner's
12 point, that's in Wicklow Town. They're now starter homes. We've all applicants
13 there, processing those. In Dunlavin, all been offered. We have launched recently in
14 Ballycomyn, Blessington, 42 affordable units there. Prices, I'll have to get for you.
15 And then the next, Rockbrae, we've recently issued tender in that and there's nine
16 affordables in that site. We'll give you a better list of prices in the launch later on.
17 But there's a good few units there. And again Sheep House, I indicated Part 8,
18 there's four or six affordables there too. So we're going towards mixed tenure but the
19 problem is trying to get a pinch point where we can sell them subsequently.

20 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Dunne you had your light on before,
21 did you want to come in?

22 COUNCILLOR DUNNE: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Just on the time thing here.
23 Three minutes is in the standing orders but I presume it is at the discretion of the
24 Chair. But if you go to the Senate or if you go to the Dáil you have a time that you
25 have to adhere to. You often hear them, people overstepping the mark, and the
26 Cathaoirleach comes in and says no, your time is up, that's it. So just if you allow
27 everybody to speak for three minutes with the 32 members it's an hour and a half.
28 You can't have that. So like most of the members, some people don't speak, some
29 people do, but as Chair your job is to get through the agenda, and I have to support
30 you on the three minutes. I just want to make that point clear. But I think you
31 should have a small bit of discretion if you want to. If you want to. If you want to
32 give people a bit extra. But three minutes I think is enough. Thank.

33 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Doyle.

34 COUNCILLOR DOYLE: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Just on the same note. We are

1 all equal here. It's just that some appear to feel that they're more equal than others.
2 The people who are tuning in online for whatever reason they need to tune in online
3 are at a disadvantage because when you are tuning in online you cannot hear when
4 people are speaking without a microphone and so you are missing the cause of the
5 disruption but all you see is a meeting that is stilted and comments out of context,
6 and you're not able to follow the meeting. It is not appropriate for a member to
7 continue roaring and shouting over members of the executive or other councillors
8 whose speaking time is up, who have waited their time to be able to speak. The
9 reason this is being implemented now is because certain members will just talk and
10 talk and talk and talk and remake their point over and over again. And yes, we all
11 have a right, a democratic right to be here, represent our constituents and speak but
12 we're all colleagues as well and most people here work fairly and have a bit of
13 respect for others. I heard name calling, I heard accusations, I heard language that I
14 don't want to repeat from that side of the chamber, from Councillor Gerry O'Neill.
15 Absolutely shocking. He's doing it again now for the benefit of those in the
16 chamber. He will continue to speak over people so that the responses cannot be
17 given so that other members cannot speak. It is absolutely unfair. And I move to
18 have a disruptive member removed from the chamber if that behaviour continues.
19 And comments, specific personal comments against the Cathaoirleach, I heard that as
20 well, I don't know if anybody else did, absolutely inappropriate in a professional
21 capacity in a place of work. Thank you, Cathaoirleach.

22 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Stokes. Councillor Stokes is before
23 you.

24 COUNCILLOR STOKES: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Just to say I don't actually
25 have business to raise. Some of my colleagues have already raised it. But I just
26 wanted to speak up in favour of the three minutes. We're all equal in the chamber
27 and I am, you know, sometimes very close to three minutes or just over so I will in
28 the future may be a victim of that but I understand that there has to be a fair process
29 for everybody. We represent everybody equally. And you know just to say that
30 quite often, you know, I don't always get the precise answer that I'm looking for to
31 my question, usually it is very good but sometimes there's a little bit I would like
32 more, but I am happy to have a middle ground on this, that if after everybody has had
33 an opportunity of three minutes if someone wants to come in for clarification on one
34 point briefly I warmly welcome that. In fact I quite often wait for that opportunity

1 myself if there is an opportunity. But just to point out that part of the issue is that
2 further down the line when we may have a presentation in we may have very little
3 time. We've had presentations here through no fault of anybody we've run out of
4 time, there's no time to question the presenters on some very relevant topics. I have
5 gone away frustrated that I haven't been able to answer any questions in the chamber
6 on behalf of people. That's not knocking anybody, it is just a reality. So I just think
7 that we -- I am a supporter of the three minutes and I wanted to go on record.

8 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Duddy, online.

9 COUNCILLOR DUDDY: Go raibh maith agat, Cathaoirleach. I hope you can hear
10 me properly? You can hear what I am saying?

11 CATHAOIRLEACH: Yes, we can.

12 COUNCILLOR DUDDY: Yes. Thank you very much. Because I am attending the
13 meeting online it's been said already when the microphones are turned off it's
14 impossible to follow them other than going on to the live stream and reading the
15 transcript. And it seems to be contradictory that the transcript is taken when the
16 microphone is turned off. So I would rather that rather than using the microphone to
17 penalise speakers that the microphone wouldn't be turned off or at least there would
18 be a way that councillors who are attending remotely can participate fully in what's
19 being said. But certainly by turning the microphone off I have got very little of what
20 has been -- of the interaction in this discussion, and I'd ask that if the transcript is
21 being taken by someone in the chamber could we not leave the microphone on as
22 well so it's possible to actually hear what's going on, as part of that reordering of the
23 meeting. You know, I'd like to hear what is actually going on. Go raibh maith agat.

24 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor O'Neill.

25 COUNCILLOR O'NEILL: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. Yeah. One issue I brought up
26 earlier on I didn't get an answer to. All I'm looking for is an answer. I don't want to
27 be arguing with anyone, but I asked for an update on the southern end of the relief
28 road in Blessington. We have a dead end road there at the moment where the traffic
29 would come out the Naas Road from the northern end, and the other end I know
30 there's wheeling and dealing. We are at talks with Kildare County Council. All I'm
31 asking, again a simple question, for an update on that, please. And again I'll call on
32 Councillor Doyle over there to withdraw that remark. I'm not going to sit here and
33 listen to that. You can get whoever you like to remove me, but to be accused in this
34 chamber of using bad language when Councillor Gerry O'Neill did not use any swear

1 words whatsoever. She's the only one that heard the stuff according to herself. She's
2 not sure if any other councillor heard it. She has heard me using this bad language. I
3 want her to withdraw that remark now. We'll take it from there. Withdraw that
4 remark now. You're not going to withdraw it? Could I get her microphone on? I
5 can't hear.

6 CATHAOIRLEACH: No, I'm going to end this now and I'm going to bring Joe in to
7 reply to your question.

8 MR LANE: Sorry, I answered Bray Inner Relief Road South -- Blessington, sorry.
9 Tenders from consultants were received on the 27th of August and are currently
10 being assessed. Right? We have various options for the routes will be assessed and
11 we will come back to the municipals then as we are progressing that plan.

12 COUNCILLOR O'NEILL: Thanks, Joe. You did say Bray that time.

13 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor O'Brien.

14 COUNCILLOR O'BRIEN: Cathaoirleach, I'll be very brief. Just to come in support
15 of you about the three minutes. It's something I tried to introduce two years ago
16 when I had the privilege of sitting where you are. Actually what I did was I took a
17 note of how long speakers spoke for as well, and I'm happy to share that information
18 because you'd be surprised who spoke the longest in this chamber and that's the
19 reason I think we have that up there. In terms of Councillor Doyle here, I didn't hear
20 her say bad language or call on bad language, but I did hear right wing and I did hear
21 dictatorial, and that is out of order. No one is a dictator in this chamber. No one is
22 right wing in this chamber up on that top table anyway. I think those comments
23 should be withdrawn and apologised for, not what Councillor Doyle allegedly didn't
24 say. So I think, Gerry O'Neill, you called it right wing and you called it dictatorial. I
25 think you owe the top table an apology and withdraw those comments. Thank you.

26 CATHAOIRLEACH: I think we can move on. Now I would like to invite
27 Councillor Gillespie up to receive -- Sorry, yeah, can I bring the Chief Executive in?

28 MS O'GORMAN: Just very briefly, members, I want to give you advance notice on
29 where we are for on the call for sites and draft variations to the Development Plan.
30 As you know you have all been working very hard on the sites and what we have
31 been looking at over the next couple of months. The draft variation will be
32 published on the consultation portal this Thursday, 10th September. An email link
33 will go to yourselves probably late tomorrow evening once we have all the
34 documents uploaded. There will be four weeks of public consultation. We're now

1 moving into the statutory part of this process. So it's the statutory four weeks public
2 consultation which will take us until 8th October or so. The Chief Executive Report
3 then will issue in early November and then subject to the number of submissions,
4 and I do expect that we will get a significant number of submissions, we would
5 intend to hold a special meeting of the Council on possibly the 14th December to
6 consider those submissions and any amendments that need to be made by way of
7 motion. So that is just to give you advance notice. You will get an email link
8 tomorrow evening to all the documents and the process will publish on Thursday
9 formally. Thank you, members.

10 CATHAOIRLEACH: I would like to invite Rachel Gillespie up to give a
11 presentation on the Register of Electors, the mitigation project update. Thank you.

12 MS GILLESPIE: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Thank you. Good afternoon,
13 everyone. I welcome this opportunity to present a short update on changes to the
14 electoral registration process. Most of you are familiar with the changes
15 implemented under the Electoral Reform Act to date which include the rolling
16 register, pre-registration, an online application process, inclusion of a unique
17 identifier in the form of a PPS number. One of the objectives of the Act was to
18 provide a legal basis for a single national registration system. To implement this the
19 Local Government Electoral Registration System Project Board was established in
20 2021. The project was fully funded by the Department and this system already in
21 use by the Dublin authorities was redeveloped and selected as the new National
22 Registration System. The migration project commenced in quarter 2/2026 and is due
23 to be completed by the end of this year. In advance of the switchover to what is the
24 new system on Voter.ie our wonderful franchise team in County Buildings, headed
25 up by Anne-Marie Roberts, undertook a body of data cleansing and data
26 standardisation work. So, for example, where we're omitting Eircodes or removing
27 any duplicates. During 2025 and 2026 we have undertaken promotional work such
28 as attendance at the Tinahely show, Comhairle na nÓg Youth Summit and
29 registration drives in Blessington in conjunction with the KWETB and PPN. So we
30 are keen to promote the register in such ways and intend running events in secondary
31 schools across the county from this month. So if you have anywhere suitable or you
32 feel like we could bring our merchandise and our promotional material please let me
33 know.

1 As of today there are - actually a slide change from the slides - 111,751 electors on
2 Wicklow's register. This is a reduction to our end of year figures due to the data
3 quality work that has been undertaken, such as where we removed electors where we
4 had received three pieces of correspondence returned, such as returning of polling
5 cards from the presidential in October, et cetera. So during the month of June
6 actually -- so we're a little bit late coming to you, during the month of June we
7 migrated to Voter.ie. This means we are responsible for retaining our register but
8 Dublin City Council are responsible for the system. Is that my three minutes! You
9 didn't even notice my mic had stopped. So this means we are responsible for
10 maintaining our register, but Dublin City Council are responsible for the system and
11 the related data security. Other local authorities who already migrated earlier in the
12 year include the Dublin, Wexford, Longford and Kerry.

13
14 So changes for electors. Electors in Wicklow will now register or update their
15 details on Voter.ie. So when all local authorities migrate it will provide a seamless
16 system where electors are moving counties. So previously it was quite difficult for
17 anyone moving from Dublin to Wicklow because we were on -- some of us were on
18 Voter.ie and some on Check the Register, but this is now working very well, and
19 when all counties move across it will be much easier for someone moving counties.
20 Electors using the online system must provide their PPS or user MyGov ID but any
21 elector who is uncomfortable with this has the option of using paper-paced
22 application form. They will just need to verify their identity in other ways. So the
23 system brings welcome changes to the back office. As previously, the customer
24 portal and the system were separate applications whereas Voter.ie application is now
25 one system. The system will in time further reduce and eliminate duplicates. So just
26 changes for you the elect member include a more accurate register, fingers crossed.
27 The system is also an elector-based rather than a property-based system. So the
28 register will be sorted alphabetically by surname within townland or estate rather
29 than by dwelling. So it will look a little bit different. However for the purpose of
30 canvassing, the traditional format can be provided. And just on a small additional
31 note: We are undertaking an exciting project thanks to our ITGIS team of Paddy
32 O'Flaherty and Helen Flynn. They have been able to overlay maps to identify any
33 properties within the county that don't have any electors registered. So we're in the
34 process of printing those letters and they will be landing on potential constituents'

1 doormats in the next few days just offering them the opportunity to register to vote.

2 Thank you for your time and if you have any questions. Thank you

3 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Do we have any questions? Councillor Doyle.

4 COUNCILLOR DOYLE: Thanks. Yeah, just a quick question. When you say it is
5 going to be done alphabetically by townland - did you say - not district?

6 MS GILLESPIE: Yeah.

7 COUNCILLOR DOYLE: So by townland, is it?

8 MS GILLESPIE: We definitely have some teething problem with the microphone
9 here. Yeah. So it will be by townland in rural areas but, like, for the likes of Bray it
10 will be by estate. So you will have, Adams will come up first in Old Court as
11 opposed to No. 1 Old Court, yeah. But we can give you the canvassing version
12 which is the same as the current one. Thank you.

13 CATHAOIRLEACH: Anyone else? Councillor Snell.

14 COUNCILLOR SNELL: Yeah, thanks, Cathaoirleach. Thanks for the presentation,
15 Rachel. It's more to do with the historical system that we had. And it was a question
16 in regards to before the last Local Elections when Trudder House was listed as an
17 IPAS centre, some of the people who were hosted there, they were only there six to
18 seven weeks, they actually got a vote in the Local Elections, and I'm wondering how
19 that will happen when people would obviously have to have PPS numbers and
20 everything else. And as we know they didn't stay there, they moved quite quickly
21 because at the time the Government was trying to move them off the streets of
22 Dublin for St Patrick's weekend. So around April of the last election 2024, two years
23 ago. I do know that some of them was drove to the local election centre by a
24 political party. Again that's their prerogative, if that's what they want to do but
25 unfortunately a lot of them didn't know the system or who they were to vote for, and
26 there was an approach to try and gain entry to show them where to vote. Now,
27 thankfully that was caught on the day and ceased to be, so it wasn't an issue. But it
28 did have a lot of people locally at the time felt that if there was large numbers of
29 illegal immigrants coming into a local area they could define the outcome of an
30 election. We never really got an answer to that at the time and as I say they didn't
31 stay in the county certainly. A lot of them would have been moved to other counties.
32 But to get a vote in an election in Ireland after being six or seven weeks in the area
33 was hard to stomach for a lot of people to be honest, particularly when there was
34 people who went, through their own naivety they were taken off the register. It's

1 well advertised you have to go, you have to make sure that your information is
2 updated so that was their fault as pointed out at the time, but just in regards to that
3 system. And it is not to put anybody on the spot. Maybe it is more for the top table
4 because I know you wouldn't have been doing the roll at the time. So maybe, Chief
5 Executive, if there was anything you could add to that. I know it's not an au fait
6 subject to be bringing up but it's an issue all the same.

7 MS O'GORMAN: Thanks, Councillor Snell. I wasn't aware of that situation. I
8 suppose, I mean the legislation is there and it guides the rules and how you can vote
9 and what elections you can vote in, be it local government, EU or national elections.
10 And, you know, somebody that is subject to international protection as opposed to an
11 illegal immigrant -- to draw a distinction there. So an international protection
12 applicant do have status until their application is determined. So if they're living in
13 an area and they have registered, they have a PPS number and they have all of that
14 because the State has given that to them while they're processing their application it
15 follows through then that if they're eligible to vote that they can register. I take your
16 point about the duration of residency in an area and how that might influence things.
17 It is certainly something we can raise with the Electoral Commission just to bear in
18 mind into the future. But I suppose it is probably a very grey area in terms of when
19 somebody is awarded or given access to a PPS number how does that then define
20 their status in terms of their eligibility to Local Elections. But we will certainly seek
21 clarification on that. Thanks for raising it.

22 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Ward.

23 COUNCILLOR WARD: Can I just ask: I was removed from the Electoral Register
24 before the Presidential election, and I am wondering is there a mechanism where the
25 people who is removed is told that they are removed or do you have to go out and
26 find out yourself? Because I didn't realise, I didn't know until one of the girls in the
27 office said, John, you're not on it, where I was through no fault of my own taken off
28 it but I wasn't notified.

29 MS GILLESPIE: Okay. I can certainly look into that more for you, councillor.
30 What I would say is that we would be highly careful I suppose when we are
31 removing electors from the register, and it is only undertaken where we have had
32 three pieces of correspondence and then an ultimate letter issued to remove that
33 person. So what happened in the -- because there was a number of electoral events
34 where polling cards were returned to us, they were all categorised by the staff and

1 where we had three pieces of returned correspondence we then issued a fourth piece
2 of correspondence to say you are being removed. So I can only assume that that is
3 what happened. Did you potentially move or your address changed or something in
4 that time?

5 COUNCILLOR WARD: No, no, I didn't move at all. I got no letter. It was very
6 strange. I did phone up the Council because I wasn't a member at the time, and no
7 one could give me a straight answer or even tell me why.

8 MS GILLESPIE: Okay. I will personally ensure I look into that for you because I
9 hate that that's come up today but that is certainly a rare occurrence. We have one of
10 the strongest registers in the whole country actually, and we are very proud of it.
11 Thanks.

12 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Murphy online.

13 COUNCILLOR MURPHY: Yeah, thank you, Chair. Yeah, it's a very interesting
14 report actually. It's very well done by the members of Wicklow County Council.
15 And just on what the last councillor said there, I know a relation of mine had been on
16 the register for years and at the last election she went out and she wasn't on it. And
17 so, it has happened in that situation as well, and she couldn't understand it. But also
18 just to highlight the accessibility to polling stations. I know there has been work
19 done in some areas, and I think that needs to be highlighted in research as well, the
20 accessibility of the polling stations. Like even from the car park in, you know not
21 just the building itself but the car park and everything else. You know, I am very
22 lucky where I am it's very, very accessible and most of the schools the accessibility
23 is very good, but just in the rural areas I think we need to be very conscious of the
24 accessibility. And also, sorry, maybe you can't tell me now but I would be interested
25 to know of how many people with disabilities apply for the postal vote in Wicklow if
26 that's possible.

27 MS GILLESPIE: Thank you, Councillor Murphy. On your first point again, I am
28 happy to review. The back office allows us to review the history for so many years
29 of if somebody has been removed, so I will gladly look into that for you. In fact, the
30 new system because it's much heavier on the elector keeping their information up to
31 date it gives a much better audit trail, but there is facility in the old system. So we
32 certainly will be happy -- if you want to email me I will look into that four. In
33 relation to the polling stations, that is the returning officer who obviously selects the
34 polling places, but again it can be difficult. We're aware of that from when we had

1 the boundary split. There are some areas which have very limited facilities where
2 you are -- you know, there is not many buildings in some rural areas. But certainly it
3 is something I would be aware of you know having worked in Greystones previously
4 even where the car parking can be an issue because it can be outside of the school
5 grounds in some instances. But certainly that's a conversation we will have with the
6 returning officer. And in terms of the voters, special voters or postal voters I can
7 certainly get that figure for you, no problem. Thank you.

8 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. I think that's all the questions now. I am going to
9 pass you over to Director Nicholson, I believe he wanted to introduce the next
10 speaker.

11 MR NICHOLSON: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Yeah, the local community safety
12 partnerships have been going now since December last year, so almost nine months.
13 A lot has happened in those nine months. So just to refresh what it is. It didn't
14 replace JPCs. It's a completely different project than JPC. It is much wider. It is
15 based on community safety. We have two members of staffs. We have Patricia
16 Carmody and Lorraine Horan, chaired by Councillor Tom Fortune and we have a
17 committee of currently 29. So we have asked Patricia to give an update on progress
18 to date because there has been an awful lot of progress to date. So Patricia.

19 MS CARMODY: Cathaoirleach, Elected Members, I welcome the opportunity to
20 inform you of our progress to date with the Local Community Safety Partnership.
21 Next slide there, please. Wicklow's Local Community Safety Partnership was
22 established on the 1st December 2025. We held our inaugural meeting in the council
23 chamber on the 4th September. The election of a chair and vice chair was held by
24 secret ballot, and Councillor Tom Fortune was selected chairperson and Selena
25 McKenzie of the IFA was elected as vice chair. A steering group was established at
26 that meeting and since then in 2026 we've had four meetings including our statutory
27 public meeting which was held on the 15th June in Greystones. The steering group
28 has held seven meetings. Our next meeting is tonight following this meeting. And
29 we've established four working groups as follows: Domestic Violence; Roads and
30 Road Safety; Antisocial Behaviour; and Safety and Secure at Home. Next slide,
31 please. This is our membership. Members are appointed officially by the Minister
32 for Justice. Currently we've had some changes since we were first established.
33 We're currently awaiting on appointments from the Garda Síochána, the PPN for the
34 Baltinglass MD, the Disability Federation of Ireland and Mental Health Ireland. And

1 once they are appointed they will go then to the Department of Justice to be officially
2 appointed by the Minister. They do them in tranches so it can take several weeks for
3 them to be appointed. Just to give an idea of the steering group and members of the
4 working groups. In the working groups there's a maximum of three members from
5 the partnership so that we have other people who come on that have experience in
6 the areas of that. Next slide, please. Just to go through the activities that we've held
7 so far. Over the past year the activities of the LCSP has been focused on four key
8 areas which has been strengthening the partnership, consultations for our community
9 safety plan, delivering community safety initiatives and raising the profile of the
10 LCSP. Under the partnership equation, a key priority has been strengthening the
11 partnership. We hold our meetings in each municipal district in community halls.
12 We allow a 15-minute refreshment break before meetings so that the members can
13 network at the beginning of each meeting. We've also been working to establish and
14 support our working groups which are part and parcel of delivering the work of the
15 partnership. The chair and I have also held one-to-one meetings with members and
16 we intend to resume those meetings over the coming months. Most recently the
17 Chair has issued a letter to all members reiterating the commitment required from
18 members going forward and the importance of everyone playing a part in the
19 partnership. We've also continued to attend information events organised by the
20 national office both online and in person. We also attend Eastern Region
21 Coordinator Administrative forums each month which provides valuable opportunity
22 to share ideas and learn from experience of other LCSPs. With regard to the
23 Community Stated Plan I will talk about that in the next slide. Community Safety
24 Initiatives, these include a property marking initiative which I will also talk about in
25 a minute, tractor safety awareness as well I will talk about that. And then raising the
26 profile of the LCSP, we have developed presence across Facebook and Instagram
27 and we are one of only a small number of LCSPs to have our own dedicated
28 Facebook and Instagram page. I have to acknowledge the work carried out by my
29 colleague Lorraine Horan who has done a tremendous amount of work in developing
30 our social media presence. We are getting a very positive level of interaction with
31 our content, and I want to thank all of those here today who follow us and engage
32 with our posts and share our content. We have a dedicated page on the Wicklow
33 County Council website where we publish information about the LCSP and upload
34 our adopted minutes. We have also had the opportunity to engage directly with the

1 public through Shelton Abbey Open Day and at the Tinahely Show. Our work has
2 received a number of positive mentions in the local press which has helped raise
3 awareness of the partnership and the work we are doing. Councillor Tom Fortune,
4 the Chair, has promoted the work of the LCSP through interviews and talks and on
5 East Coast FM, and the station attended our community safety event which I will talk
6 about also in a moment. We have also presented four out of the five MD meetings
7 which were welcomed and got lovely feedback from you all. Next slide, please. Our
8 main key aim this year has been developing the Community Safety Plan and we have
9 had very focused consultation activity. We developed two detailed community
10 safety surveys under the guidance of the partnership: a youth survey and an adult
11 survey. To date the adult survey has 520 responses and over the weekend the youth
12 survey surpassed 300. So if you haven't already done so please take the survey. It
13 will be closing in the next couple of weeks. We have done focused engagement
14 which includes six public consultations in each MD. We have focused consultations
15 with the IFA, domestic violence groups, older persons, the travelling community,
16 both adults and kids, and new and minority groups and youth groups. We opened the
17 consultation hub. Unfortunately we only received two submissions. We also use
18 social media to circulate our survey and information. Also we attended the Tinakilly
19 Show and Shelton Abbey, and as we met people there we asked them to give
20 feedback which we have noted. Next slide, please. We launched the LCSP
21 Community Safety Event on the 29th of April. This even brought together relevant
22 service providers from across the county providing an excellent opportunity to
23 connect and share information and strengthen relationships. We received very
24 positive feedback, particularly around the networking opportunities being provided.
25 We also had a number of guest speakers and we were delighted to welcome East
26 Coast FM who subsequently presented a ten-minute slot which was aired on the 15th
27 May. Next slide, please. The partnership has acquired a property marking machine
28 and we held our first training day in the Glen of Imaal Centre in Laragh. The
29 training was attended by LCSP members, members of An Garda Síochána and
30 members of the local community. The machine marks property with a unique
31 identifier which has two benefits. Firstly, it acts as a deterrent for theft, because
32 once the property has been marked official signage can be displayed on the premises
33 advertising that the property is marked and identifiable, signage can carry the official
34 An Garda Síochána logo and most recently the LCSP logo has been added to that

1 signage helping to make the initiative clearly visible within communities. Certainly
2 and more importantly the unique identifier provides a means of returning stolen
3 property to its rightful owner. We had the machine on display in Tinahely Show and
4 it got great interest. And I want to give a shout out to Nathan from Tinahely Men's
5 Shed who took the initiative to property mark equipment and plant machinery before
6 it left the Tinahely Show grounds following the event, in the days following the
7 event, and Nathan also property-marked all of the Men's Shed equipment. We will
8 be holding our training days soon. Hopefully we will get more people involved and
9 then we will be rolling out initiatives across the county. Next slide, please. Tractor
10 safety awareness. We were delighted to be successful in securing funding from the
11 Department of Agriculture to provide this training. We've had participants from
12 mostly Wicklow but we've also welcome participants from Carlow and Wexford, and
13 we've even had like interest from counties as far away as Sligo, and this highlights
14 the strong demand for this training. We've additional dates booked in Ballymount
15 going forward. And to complement this training we've incorporated a safety talk
16 from An Garda Síochána, and this is in keeping with the ethos of the Local
17 Community Safety Partnership, and this is all being very positively received by the
18 Department of Agriculture and also the participants of those courses. I want to give
19 a shout out to Jack Patton of the Hillbilly Tractor Run who has been a great help in
20 coordinating the programme and making it possible for the training to move beyond
21 the Hillbrook Hub which is where the FRS training would normally have their
22 training and into the wider community of Ballymount and Dunlavin. Next slide,
23 please. PsyCare Ireland is a social enterprise and a registered charity who supports
24 members of the public attending these events and festivals. They have received
25 funding under the Community Safety Fund and they want to work with the Wicklow
26 Local Community Safety Partnership. They had hoped to have some dates in August
27 but because of the summer holidays that didn't work out, but we are going to be
28 working with them over the next few months to deliver the night programme, which
29 is the Nightlife Intervention, Training and Education Programme. This programme
30 promotes a safer nightlife experience. Next slide, please. The priorities for the
31 remainder of 2026 is to complete the consultation process, maybe identify gaps
32 where we haven't, you know, consulted with everybody that we needed to consult
33 with. Then we look at the feedback analysis from the consultation process. Then we
34 are going to develop and adopt the Community Safety Plan in the next couple of

1 months and we also have to hold a statutory closed meeting of the partnership with
2 all elected representatives in the local authority area which you will all be invited to
3 and I hope you will endeavour to attend. That date is yet to be decided but it will be
4 before the end of the year. We hope to continue to deliver youth safety initiatives
5 and safety initiatives in general. Thank you for your time. Any questions?

6 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. I'm going to bring Councillor Fortune in before
7 we take questions as he's the Chair of the group.

8 COUNCILLOR FORTUNE: Thanks, Cathaoirleach, and thanks, Trish, and well
9 done on all that. The amount of work that has been done by Trish and Lorraine and
10 the partnership basically since January has been quite phenomenal. This particular
11 initiative has the potential to be a massive game changer but not only a game changer
12 obviously in due course it will have to be taken on board, put in place and lived. The
13 amount of work done since January is quite phenomenal and Trish has outlined that.
14 We're at a stage now where we basically have loads and loads of information. What
15 I would ask ye as members here today would be is to -- ye all have massive social
16 media lists of all kinds of people, if you would particularly over the next week get
17 the survey completed. We're up over 800 I think, Trish, at the moment?

18 MS CARMODY: Yes, in total.

19 COUNCILLOR FORTUNE: Yeah. So we'd love to obviously -- That's very, very
20 good. When we compare that to some of the pilot groups that were done, back in the
21 day there was a pilot done in Waterford, Longford and Sheriff Street in Dublin, and
22 we have surpassed that. So we would like to hit over a thousand because that makes
23 the information more broad and gives us more details. So we would like you to do
24 that, if you could over the next week. We would really appreciate that. As Trish
25 said, we will be having a meeting with you all in due course. Where we are right
26 now is that we are about to get in to putting the plan together. We're mandated to
27 have our draft plan done by the end of October and final plan by end of December.
28 That probably will run into February maybe, maybe early March, because the
29 Department of Justice themselves were slow in putting in place their own strategic
30 intent as well. That's no harm because we need to get it done right. I must say
31 everyone involved in it is very energised. I did write out to the whole partnership.
32 We're at a stage where one or two had to step away. We said hang on, we're at a
33 moment in time where people who are there at it, if you don't like being there, there's
34 no problem, opt out, we'll get someone in. The main thing is that all the service

1 providers, that every service provider within the county are involved. Obviously
2 we're working very hard to make sure there's input coming from them all. The intent
3 behind it is to support the garda efforts, not to do the garda work but to have every
4 service provider doing their bit to support the effort. The plan actually will be
5 determined in the final analysis, it'll be determined when it's in place, do people feel
6 safer in their communities, because the bottom line is that's what it's all about. The
7 whole intent is to make people safer. As Michael said when he was introducing
8 Trish, it isn't the JPC. It's a totally different entity. It's kind of way beyond that. I
9 think for us to drive this forward and carry on driving it forward we actually do need
10 the support of every public rep, and if we're being brutally honest we'd like you to do
11 a little bit more than maybe you've actually been doing. If you don't know me at this
12 stage you'll never know me, I say it as I see it. We do need more support. I would
13 like to complement Trish and Lorraine on the fantastic job they are doing and
14 continue to do. My job is like the quarter back, just it keep going and push and argue
15 and whatever has to be done. It's great. It's very exciting. As I say, it has the
16 potential to be a game changer. I would like to acknowledge the support from Emer
17 as the CEO of the Council and from Derek who is the garda chief superintendent.
18 That's very, very important, to have that support to make this happen because with
19 that support we can then build on it and drive it forward. That support is there and
20 we're certainly thankful for that. That's my input.

21 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor O'Brien.

22 COUNCILLOR O'BRIEN: Thank you, Cathaoirleach, and thank you to Trish for the
23 presentation. Again I just want to say well done on the work to date and to Lorraine
24 and everyone involved but can I also say, I want to say congratulation and my
25 sincere thanks to Councillor Fortune who has really stepped up to the mark on this
26 and proved to be a really capable chairman of this group, which is not easy. Having
27 sat on the JPC, I want to say, Tom, you have done a great job. I mean that, by the
28 way, because if I didn't mean it I wouldn't say it. I think you have done trojan work
29 on it and I am looking forward to the outcome. Councillor Fortune, you said it is
30 about people feeling safe in the community but until that happens it is also that they
31 feel heard in their community. I think it is important, especially in rural Wicklow,
32 that people are heard and their voices are heard. It is a good way of the gardaí
33 communicating and listening to what's going on in the communities because
34 obviously the numbers of gardaí in the county are down. They're under enormous

1 pressure. They've gone through enormous change themselves structurally. Now, I'd
2 say morale is at a very all-time low in the Gardaí, so it is important that they hear
3 back from the community not just a negative. And I'm happy to say that when I've
4 sat on these, they do get positive feedback and they do get compliments for the work
5 they have done. But the main thing I want to say today is to congratulate Councillor
6 Fortune and your team on trojan work and I look forward to the finished article.
7 Thank you.

8 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Corrigan.

9 COUNCILLOR CORRIGAN: Thank you, Cathaoirleach, and thank you to Trish as
10 well and Lorraine, and all the trojan work that you have done. I see this as becoming
11 a one-stop shop for public safety and something that us as public reps can bring as
12 issues of concern from our constituents. In my own area there was a very bad
13 incident of a horse, somebody coming off their horse when a bus flew past it and I'd
14 like to see - I thought the tractor information was fantastic - a campaign done on road
15 safety and road issues for cyclists and motorists when they're passing animals. That's
16 something in the rural areas -- we all know it as second nature but people coming
17 into our rural areas aren't aware of. I know you have to do it as part of your driving
18 test but the actual practicalities of animal handling when you're driving past them,
19 and I would love to see something, a public campaign or safety information put out
20 through this forum in relation to that. So I'll be certainly sending that in to let you
21 know about, but I just thought I would raise it here today because I think that is very
22 relevant for any of the issues that we do have, that we can bring them to yourself.
23 Thank you.

24 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Kennedy.

25 COUNCILLOR KENNEDY: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. Can I again reiterate what
26 Councillor O'Brien has said, just to thank everyone for the wonderful work they have
27 done, but also I want to concur with the comments on Councillor Fortune.
28 Councillor Fortune has been an excellent Chair. He has gone above and beyond to
29 include everybody. He has reached out to the whole community of County Wicklow
30 to make sure they have been included and it is open for them to network into the
31 partnership. So, Tom, I just want to thank you for the work you have done especially
32 the way you have reached out to people and the way you are reaching out to
33 communities and continue to do it but also to all the team. So well done to
34 everybody. This is working and keep up the good work. Thank you.

1 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Mahon.

2 COUNCILLOR MAHON: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I'd just like to add in my little
3 bit from that. Just going back to that tractor safety around Ballymount, just feedback
4 from members of my own family. They found it very, very good and they were
5 delighted, and look forward to going to -- I think it should be something that should
6 be repeated right around the county. It is very, very important. When you see the
7 amount of young people actually involved in tractors and machinery at the moment
8 around the county, especially on our roads. There was a tractor run and the amount
9 of young people, nearly all youngsters, young teenagers driving the tractors around
10 the road. The feedback I got from the project you ran in Ballymount was very, very
11 good. Thank you for that.

12 MS CARMODY: Can I come in on that?

13 CATHAOIRLEACH: Yeah.

14 MS CARMODY: We have funding to train up to 180. Today we are in St Kevin's
15 Community College in Dunlavin with the TYs, and will be tomorrow. We same
16 some more dates planned. Unfortunately the deadline for the tractor safety training
17 funding is the end of November, which means we would have to have everything
18 spent by the 1st of October to get it through our system. But they have said that
19 there is a possibility of maybe extending it. Once it is we would be able to get into
20 the schools which would be really good, for the TYs. It's maximum 12 per class so
21 we are quite restricted to getting trainers, and the trainers actually come from
22 Roscommon and Galway because there's no local trainers.

23 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor O'Toole.

24 COUNCILLOR O'TOOLE: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. And thanks for the wonderful
25 presentation. Congratulations everyone involved. It's a great initiative and
26 Councillor Fortune as well for spear heading it. Just regarding the property marking,
27 what does that entail? That's going to be done throughout the county, is it going to
28 be done in each district or is it going to be in multiple places in each district, or what
29 way are you going to do it? Thanks.

30 MS CARMODY: We're hoping to put a scheme together and work with the town
31 teams, the IFA and the committee members and also the Gardaí. The Gardaí from
32 Greystones have reached out recently saying that they would like to get involved in
33 running something in Greystones. It is putting together a programme. But ideally,
34 the next training is on the 31st of here in County Buildings, we are hoping to get

1 more people trained so that we can get more people out doing the property markings.
2 We are also in the process of purchasing some more machines. The machine itself
3 puts on, scans on an identifier, one covert and one overt, so that if someone steals it
4 they won't see there's a mark there, that the guards will know it is there or will look
5 for it going forward, to be able to return the item.

6 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Scott.

7 COUNCILLOR SCOTT: Yeah, thanks a million and thanks for the presentation.
8 We also had an excellent presentation of this at our MD meeting there a while ago
9 and I look forward to seeing this growing strength to strength. I have two queries on
10 the membership, and it is brilliant to see such a wide sort of community representing
11 so many areas of our communities on the membership list. I was just wondering
12 about the vacant disability and mental health piece, because obviously just those
13 members, it would be very important to include those. I was wondering why, is
14 there an issue with recruitment there. My other question is, is there member
15 representation from our newer communities in the areas, particularly people from
16 different countries that are living in Wicklow? Just to link in with those. Perhaps
17 there's not an appropriate representative group. I don't know. I was just wondering
18 if you had looked into that. Thank you.

19 MS CARMODY: Can I respond to that? In terms of the mental health and the
20 disability we do have calls out for nominations from both those organisations at the
21 moment. We had the disability out for a couple of months but they just couldn't find
22 someone who would be appropriate. We have that out again at the next meeting for
23 a nomination to be put forward to us. And Mental Health Ireland have
24 acknowledged they will be making a nomination to us. In regard to the newer
25 communities, while we don't have a direct newer community representative we do
26 have Deirdre Joyce from the County Wicklow Partnership, she sits on the
27 Community Integration Forum so she will be able to have a voice for the new
28 communities.

29 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Whelan.

30 COUNCILLOR WHELAN: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. First of all, I'd like to thank
31 Trish for your great presentation and you've done tremendous work over the last
32 year, everyone has done tremendous work over the last year but particularly yourself,
33 Michael and Lorraine has done tremendous work over the last nine. I think you have
34 captured everything you have said there in what you have done over the last nine

1 months. I think we're very lucky to have Tom Fortune as our Chair. I know Tom
2 has done tremendous work. He's a good team worker, he gets the team going and
3 he's a great man to drive people and get things done. So well done. I know you had
4 a meeting with MDs around the place. Some were well attended and some weren't. I
5 think you got the message across. So well done and thank you very much.

6 MS CARMODY: Thanks.

7 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Mahon, did you want to come back
8 in? You're okay. Was there any other questions or comments before we move on?
9 No.

10 MS CARMODY: Thank you very much.

11 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Any correspondence?

12 MS GILLESPIE: No correspondence.

13 CATHAOIRLEACH: Okay. So we can go on to the prehistoric notice of motions.

14 MS GILLESPIE: Thank you. Notice of Motion No 1. Proposed by Councillor
15 Stokes, seconded by Councillor Behan and supported by Councillor Stapleton,
16 Councillor Leonard, Councillor Kennedy, Councillor Fenelon Gaskin, Councillor
17 Fortune, Councillor Doyle, Councillor Mulhall and Councillor Duddy of the 9th
18 January 2026: "The councillors of Wicklow County Council express concern at the
19 unilateral removal of their preferred email addresses from the Wicklow County
20 Council website. Councillors must be permitted to interact with members of the
21 public in the way they deem best serves the community. Going forward Councillors
22 shall be able to have their preferred email address listed on the Wicklow County
23 Council website."

24

25 Response from Brian Gleeson, updated most recently on the 8th June: "Cyber
26 security threats pose a significant risk to modern organisations. One of the main
27 protection measures put in place by Wicklow County Council to counter threats by
28 cyber actors is to provide official Council email accounts to Council staff and
29 Elected Members.

30

31 The use of Council email accounts protects the integrity of Wicklow County
32 Council's information systems through several ways, including:

33 1. Enhanced security monitoring. All Wicklow County Council email accounts are
34 actively monitored for breaches and suspicious activity. The same level of

1 protection is not provided by non-Council personal email services.

2 2. Lack of control over personal accounts. The Council cannot manage or secure
3 personal email accounts. This creates a significant risk when sensitive or official
4 correspondence is conducted outside the Council's protected environment.

5 3. Incident investigation capability. Wicklow County Council maintains detailed
6 logs for all activity on its email system enabling thorough investigation of any
7 suspicious incidents. This capability does not extend to personal email accounts.

8 4. Impersonation protection. A VIP protection rule is in place to ensure that only
9 emails sent from your official Wicklow County Council email address are recognised
10 as authentic. This helps to prevent impersonation attempts and protects your identity
11 in Council communications.

12 5. Rapid threat response. Suspicious or malicious emails sent to Wicklow County
13 Council accounts can be quickly identified and removed across the system. This
14 level of response is not possible with personal email accounts.

15 6. Cyber security training integration. Wicklow County Council has launched a
16 cyber security awareness programme in line with the industry standards. These are
17 linked to official Wicklow County Council email accounts. Councillors using
18 personal email addresses exclusively will not receive training notifications or be
19 included in simulations reducing their preparedness against cyber threats.

20 7. Advanced email filtering and intelligence sharing. Wicklow County Council
21 email accounts are protected by a dedicated email security system that applies
22 multiple layers of filtering and policy enforcement to block incoming threats. These
23 protections are continuously updated based on intelligence shared by the security
24 officers in other local authorities and the NCSC, ensuring proactive defence against
25 emerging risk.

26 8. General data protection regulation. Under Article 5(2) of GDPR elected
27 representatives are considered data controllers and therefore they must be able to
28 demonstrate compliance regarding the processing of personal data. With the
29 evolution of email threats from a cyber security perspective it is important that
30 councillors' email accounts are secured and protected. The use of a corporate email
31 account provides increased security and reduces the risk of data breaches occurring.

32
33 For these reasons it would be ill advised for Wicklow County Council to promote the
34 use of non-Wicklow County Council email accounts on its own website. However, it

1 is acknowledged that some members were experiencing difficulties with the use of
2 Wicklow County Council email accounts. To this end the Council's IS security team
3 has reached out to all Elected Members to identify the specific issues and an FAQ
4 document was issued in response. Moreover, system enhancements were recently
5 implemented by the IS department which further improved the email functionality
6 for both Council staff and Elected Members.

7
8 A pilot for migration to Microsoft 365 was recently rolled out which involved five
9 Elected Members. Following the completion of this pilot all Elected Members have
10 now been moved over to the Microsoft 365 environment. The benefits of this new
11 development include: Provision of self-release functionality which allows members
12 to manage email blockages and aspects of email security directly, subject to
13 compliance with the Council's cyber training programme; fewer emails being
14 blocked due to size as the incoming email size limited has been increased to 60
15 megabytes which is above the standard industry allowance; and elimination of the
16 automatic removal of historical emails from inboxes."

17
18 Moving on to Notice of Motion No.2? No. Sorry. Do that first. Thank you.

19 CATHAOIRLEACH: Just before I go to Councillor Stokes, in the absence of
20 Councillor Behan we just need a new seconder for that motion. Councillor
21 Stapleton. Agreed? (Agreed.) And I will go over to Councillor Stokes now.

22 COUNCILLOR STOKES: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. And I suppose to start, what I
23 was going to say in relation to this matter has evolved over time because it has been
24 on the agenda for so long but I am pleased we are finally getting to it. I do believe at
25 the outset that councillors should have been consulted in advance of any email
26 change to the Wicklow County Council website. Emails seem to be updated and
27 changed without any notice to us as far as I can recall. This motion also partly came
28 about because of the difficulty with the email system and I can certainly understand
29 that Wicklow County Council may wish for councillors to write to them using their
30 Council email. So I follow this when liaising with Council staff. And I would also
31 encourage any of my colleagues who have yet to complete the IT security training to
32 do so at their earliest convenience. I do accept that there have been significant
33 improvements with the Council's email system for councillors, and I would like to
34 thank Director Brian Gleeson for his continued engagement on the rollout, and I

1 commend Gary Redmond and all of the IT team for their diligent service. In many
2 ways this isn't a knock on the IT team. They're very dedicated professionals. That
3 has to be said. However, in liaising with constituents we need the most effective
4 communication tool for us personally. This is why some councillors use other
5 systems. I certainly believe we need to treat public -- we need to trust public
6 representatives to communicate with members of the community, this includes being
7 able to advertise what is the best way to reach councillors. Go raibh maith agat,
8 Cathaoirleach.

9 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Stapleton.

10 COUNCILLOR STAPLETON: In support of that motion I think it is also worth
11 acknowledging the massive improvements that have been made to the Council IT
12 systems over the past number of months that have now made it much more easy to
13 use and more effective to use the Council's email and messaging system now that it
14 is on Microsoft 365. I suppose for me I listen to the large litany of reasons of why
15 we can't have our own email addresses publicly kind of made available on the
16 Council's website, but for me it's kind of -- there's no real difference. My mobile
17 phone is publicly available on the Council website. It's a personal mobile. And
18 when I'm messaging constituents with queries through WhatsApp or Messaging there
19 it is quite similar to the way I would interact with them via my own personal email.
20 So it is just kind of a tool for them to get in contact with me. I don't know if that
21 raises a question over use of personal phones now as well. But yeah, head down in
22 the sand. But yeah, that was just the way. For me it was more effective for me to be
23 able to use my own email and phone number, so that's why I'm supporting the
24 motion.

25 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor O'Brien.

26 COUNCILLOR O'BRIEN: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I'll be very brief. Just the
27 only concern I have is that to make our jobs a little bit easier at times it's just we can't
28 copy and paste anymore. So if you get an email you can't copy it over into a private
29 let's say from WhatsApp. From your work to your personal. So if I get an email
30 from the Council I can't copy let's say some of the contents for a WhatsApp message.
31 I actually have to forward it on to my personal email address which is probably
32 counterintuitive to what we are trying to do here. It makes the job a little bit more --

33 MS O'GORMAN: That's news to me now. Because I'm just literally as you are
34 saying that just copying a text from email and putting it into my WhatsApp and it's

1 fine.

2 COUNCILLOR O'BRIEN: Well, unless I am -- I'm the only one, am I?

3 COUNCILLOR ALVEY: No, no, no, we're all in the same boat.

4 COUNCILLOR O'BRIEN: If I was any way paranoid I would say you're trying to
5 get at councillors here but I have only two minutes left so I will leave it at that.

6 MR GLEESON: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. I would like to thank Councillor Stokes
7 and Councillor Stapleton just for the acknowledgment of the improvements that have
8 been made. I know our IT and security team are working very hard and very closely
9 with the members. That's a prime example of Councillor O'Brien's issue. I suppose
10 it is a case of make sure you reach out to our IT team who are very helpful and
11 usually it'll be a solution that could be made very quickly. I suppose the issue, one
12 point you made about the communication, there was an email sent to all the members
13 on the 21st of October in relation to issuing correspondence to only Wicklow County
14 Council email addresses and personal addresses being removed from the group,
15 members' email grouping, however it didn't specifically state about the website and
16 the contacts. So I suppose that was an oversight on our behalf, the Council. So we
17 apologise for any confusion in relation to that. But I suppose the outset is that, and
18 you're well aware, cyber threats are probably the biggest risk to any organisation at
19 the moment, whether it is public sector or private sector. So we can't compromise on
20 security. We've seen the impact it's had on the likes of the HSE, NTU, even the
21 Ombudsman office. So it's the biggest threat we have and we have put in a huge
22 amount of resources in relation to that. We're trying to make the email as convenient
23 as possible. It might never be as convenient as you're Gmail account and so forth but
24 I would say a small bit of inconvenience for a large amount of security and
25 protection is a good trade-off as far as I'm concerned. Because an important point
26 that was made in Rachel's response was the whole issue of GDPR and the fact of the
27 matter is you are data controllers, so you have a responsibility to protect the
28 information that you have. And as councillors you do receive a lot of personal and
29 sensitive material. So God forbid there was a breach within one of your
30 non-Wicklow County Council email addresses, we could not respond, whereas once
31 it's part of the Council email as I said there was a whole list of actions that we could
32 take. But look, I suppose this is a work in progress. We're trying to make things
33 better. Over the last 12 months we have improved the email services greatly and
34 we'll keep working with the members to improve that, and we welcome the feedback

1 from the members to help us improve the services, not just on an email front but I
2 suppose any sort of IT improvements that we can make. Thank you.

3 CATHAOIRLEACH: I just have two more people that want to come in before we
4 move on to the suspension of standing orders. Councillor Fortune.

5 COUNCILLOR FORTUNE: Yeah, thanks, Cathaoirleach. Very quickly. I am just
6 wondering though most of us, all of us probably, when we send out our emails to
7 constituents we have our logos and different things on it, is it possible that that can
8 be facilitated if needed with the change?

9 MR GLEESON: Logos?

10 COUNCILLOR FORTUNE: You know we have our --

11 MR GLEESON: Okay. You want it at the bottom -- you want your own personal
12 logo at the bottom of your Council email?

13 COUNCILLOR FORTUNE: I'm just asking.

14 MR GLEESON: We can look into that. I'm not sure myself.

15 COUNCILLOR FORTUNE: It's all about branding, Brian, you know.

16 MR GLEESON: Absolutely, yeah. We'll look into that. Thank you.

17 CATHAOIRLEACH: And then Councillor Duddy online.

18 COUNCILLOR DUDDY: Go raibh maith agat, Cathaoirleach. Yeah, thanks a
19 million for those responses, but I don't think it really addresses the potential issues
20 that most councillors have been seeking. We just want to have email of our choice
21 posted on the website of the County Council. Our emails are transmitted to those
22 sites, really it shouldn't be an issue for the County Council. In the remarks that have
23 been made I feel that the privilege communications that politicians enjoy with their
24 constituents as a constitutional right seem to be completely out of the ambit, seems to
25 have been ignored, and it has been established that communications between TDs
26 and their constituents are constitutionally protected, and it's been advised by the
27 (inaudible) commission that communications between constituents and councillors
28 would likely enjoy the same privilege. So if there is a delay in communications
29 between constituents and councillors or if communications are being stopped that
30 would seem to be in breach of both the constitutional right of the constituent to
31 communicate with their representative but also the constitutional rights of public
32 representatives, and I haven't heard any of that mentioned as a reason or having
33 played a part in the reasoning in the new email scenario. All I want is an email of
34 my choice to be placed on the Wicklow County Council website. I'm happy that

1 official communication between the Council and myself should go through a
2 Wicklow County Council email address but I would like to be able to post an email
3 address of my choice on the Wicklow County Council website to allow constituents
4 communicate with me. So that's really the crux of the issue for me. But I do think
5 that it seems no thought has been given to likely abuses to the constitutional rights of
6 both constituents and representatives. Go raibh maith agat.

7 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Gleeson.

8 MR GLEESON: Yeah, look, I suppose there's a difference, there's constitutional
9 protection and there's protection from cyber hackers and that's what I'm talking about
10 here. As I said before, all the members have a responsibility under the GDPR to be
11 data holders and I suppose what we're trying to do is protect the members in relation
12 to that. What I would say, with regard to any emails being blocked, as was outlined
13 in the response, the provision of a self-release functionality which allows members to
14 manage email blockages and aspects of email security directly is provided but is
15 subject to the completion of the Council's cyber training programme. And I know
16 there's a number of councillors who have completed the cyber training programme
17 and have been provided with that self-release functionality. So you can do at any
18 stage. You don't have to send an email to the Council's IS department for it to be
19 released, you can do it yourself, you view it and do it yourself, but you have to carry
20 out the cyber training programme. I think, Councillor Stokes, you were one of the
21 first people who availed of that functionality and I believe that is working well for
22 you. So I would advise and I know, councillor, you implore your fellow members to
23 do the same to undertake that cyber training and then avail of this functionality.

24 Thank you.

25 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. And now for the suspension of standing orders.

26 MS GILLESPIE: Thank you, Cathaoirleach.

27 COUNCILLOR STOKES: Sorry, Cathaoirleach. Just to say that we have a
28 motion -- There doesn't seem to be any dissent, so I'm assuming that the motion has
29 been accepted then?

30 MR GLEESON: Well, if you mean will the personal email addresses be put back on
31 the website then no.

32 COUNCILLOR STOKES: That's not what I am asking. There's a motion that has
33 been put forward. There's a proposer and seconder. I'm asking for that motion to go
34 forward. If the Executive decide not to do it then it's just in breach of the motion was

1 passed by the members.

2 MS O'GORMAN: The members can't instruct the Executive to do something that
3 would endanger the functionality of the organisation. You can pass the motion.

4 COUNCILLOR STOKES: Yes.

5 MS O'GORMAN: There's no issue. Whether we can take action on foot of that
6 motion is another thing altogether.

7 COUNCILLOR STOKES: I would like the motion to go ahead.

8 MS O'GORMAN: If you're all happy to pass the motion the motion is passed.

9 COUNCILLOR MURPHY: Sorry, can I just ask a question?

10 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Murphy online.

11 COUNCILLOR MURPHY: Yeah, sorry, Cathaoirleach. I just want to be clear on
12 something. If, say, we are using two emails for our Wicklow County Council and
13 our original one that I have had for many, many years, and somebody sends an issue
14 on to, say, my Gmail and I pass that on to Wicklow County Council staff or
15 whatever department, how long does that go into quarantine, or that system -- I'm not
16 very IT, so my question might be a stupid question.

17 MR GLEESON: Councillor, we might take that offline. I wouldn't like to go
18 through specific IT issues in an open meeting. So we might take that offline and sort
19 out any particular issue that you have. If that's okay.

20 COUNCILLOR MURPHY: Thanks yeah.

21 CATHAOIRLEACH: That motion is passed. So we will move on to the suspension
22 of standing orders now.

23 MS GILLESPIE: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. The first suspension of standing order,
24 proposed by Councillor Danny Alvey and seconded by Cathaoirleach Winstanley,
25 and supported by Councillors Barry, Doyle, Mulhall, O'Brien, and Ward: "This
26 Council calls on the Minister for Education and the Department of Education to
27 address the severe delays in primary and secondary school building projects and
28 provision of additional school places across County Wicklow. The population of the
29 county has increased considerably in the past decade, up 14% between the census in
30 2011 and 2022, with even higher growth rates in our main towns. Much of this
31 growth in population is made up of young families moving into the area which is
32 putting significant additional strain on primary and secondary school places. At the
33 same time there are school building projects that have been delayed for years and
34 years with no end in sight for these extensions and new builds to be complete. Now

1 the Government has requested our Council zones further land for housing to help
2 address the housing crisis. This is a process which we are pursuing but we want
3 assurances from the Minister and the Department that future school infrastructure
4 and capacity planning in the county reflects this new residential development.
5 Specifically this Council would like a clear, written update on the current stage,
6 reason for delay, next milestone, and an indicative timeline on the building projects
7 for primary and secondary school schools across Wicklow as listed in the appendix
8 to this motion. Appendix: North Wicklow Educate Together Secondary School,
9 Bray; Temple Carrig, Greystones; Wicklow Educate Together Secondary School;
10 Arklow CBS; Blessington Community College; Avondale Community College,
11 Rathdrum; Coláiste Bhríde, Carnew; St Kevin's Community College, Dunlavin;
12 Newtownmountkennedy Primary School; Woodstock Educate Together,
13 Newtownmountkennedy; St Saviour's, Rathdrum; Blessington Educate Together
14 Primary School; Gaelscoil na Lochanna, Blessington; St Kevin's National School,
15 Dunlavin; Nun's Cross School, Ashford; and a new primary school for Wicklow
16 Town where the current ones are at capacity."

17
18 thank you.

19 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Alvey.

20 COUNCILLOR ALVEY: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. Rachel, apologies for the
21 length of the motion but we were adamant to be as clear and comprehensive as
22 possible in our request that we are hoping will be passed on to the Department today.
23 Look, no councillor in this chamber will be unfamiliar with this issue but as we come
24 into another September and thousands of students across this county return to
25 overcrowded or unsuitable buildings I felt the timing was right to bring it to this
26 chamber and demand some answer on behalf of those schools. When I started the
27 motion I had some specific local schools in my district in mind but as I reached out
28 to some of my fellow councillors in other districts I was actually shocked at how
29 many schools were actually affected by this. So many I had to move them to an
30 appendix, current total 16, and some councillors here today might want to add others
31 to this list. So here we are in Ireland in 2026 with all the talk last week of record
32 corporate tax receipts and somehow we can't or just won't invest in these critical
33 school building projects all across our county and no doubt the entire country.
34 Where I am in Newtownmountkennedy both of our primary schools are in dire need

1 of new buildings. The Newtown primary school has a roof that is barely holding
2 together with constant leaks. Last year they even had to close the school on some
3 days after storms. They have the land ready next to them for a planned new build
4 but no timeline on when this would start. Across the road, in Woodstock Educate
5 Together, where my daughter goes, the building has been in prefabs since it opened
6 in 2019. That's seven years. The Department has a site purchased down the road but
7 again absolutely no timeline on this provided on the school. Down the road in
8 Wicklow Town in Rathnew the six primary schools are absolutely packed. I was
9 contacted earlier this year by a local mother returning to Wicklow Town after three
10 years abroad. She has three primary school age children and after applying to each
11 of these six schools she was unable to secure places for them and has had to look
12 outside the town. Ironically this mother is a teacher herself and eager to come back
13 and work in the system over here in Ireland. So against this backdrop the
14 Government has requested we zone additional land for housing all across the county,
15 something which as councillors we're all actively engaging with. We also need
16 assurances that these school building projects are finally going to happen and
17 capacity is going to increase to cater for the additional facilities, for the additional
18 families who move into this area. So for this reason I would welcome the support of
19 all councillors here today for this motion and indeed for them to add their own
20 experiences in the local area. Thank you.

21 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor Alvey. I would like to add to that as a
22 seconder, particularly in the case of North Wicklow Educate Together. There's
23 young people who have gone through their whole education and are now in
24 university and have never had a permanent school building. They're meant to have a
25 capacity of a thousand students but they're only able to take 300, and every year
26 we're contacted about people not having school places but we have the potential
27 there, it's just the buildings are not being built. So I strongly welcome this motion
28 and I think as you can see it is a cross-county issue and I think we're going to hear
29 from some other areas. Councillor Paul O'Brien, do you want to come in there?

30 COUNCILLOR O'BRIEN: I do. Thank you, Cathaoirleach. And I thank Councillor
31 Alvey for bringing this motion forward. Obviously I support it but forgive me if I
32 am being a cynic, I don't think anything will happen. And I say that for a reason.
33 Councillor Snell, Councillor Fortune, Councillor Fenelon Gaskin, and myself sit on
34 the KWETB. Seven years to get the roof fixed in BIFE.

1 COUNCILLOR FORTUNE: Not fixed yet.

2 COUNCILLOR O'BRIEN: I know that. Seven years and counting. Yet we're now
3 looking for more schools. So forgive me for being a cynic but we're talking about a
4 department here that said not so long ago that they didn't need a school in Greystones
5 which has just opened last Friday and practically at full capacity. Forgive me if I
6 have no confidence in the department. By all means we can send off this letter, we
7 can try our best but I can guarantee from experience we're going to get a letter back
8 acknowledging the letter in the hope then that we forget about it. Because that is
9 what is going to happen. We have Avondale, Councillor Snell and myself,
10 Councillor Stapleton, sorry, is on the board of management up there. They are
11 waiting for two science labs that were promised, went out for tender, no sign of
12 them. So now we're being asked to zone land again that will increase the population
13 and yet we haven't got the repairs done let alone new buildings. The other elephant
14 in the room, because we all sit on KWETBs, even if we build the schools today we
15 don't have the teachers to actually staff the schools. I sit on a lot of interview boards
16 and I have seen the shortage. They're still interviewing this week for staff in schools
17 to start last week. So we have a big problem at the moment and it's not going to get
18 any better. So if Councillor Alvey would be amenable to a slight amendment on it, I
19 think we should have the Department down here. Whether they come or not, I don't
20 know. But I definitely think we should try and get them down here to answer
21 questions. I think they're a disaster. They need to be held accountable. They sit on
22 high, look down and they don't look at the local need. They don't listen to what we
23 are saying, the people on the ground dealing with these issues day in day out, year in
24 year out. Thank you, Cathaoirleach, for that.

25 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you, Councillor O'Brien. I am just going to make you
26 aware, we have quarter of an hour of the meeting left and still one suspension of
27 standing orders. So I am going to bring as many of you in as possible, I would like
28 to be able to get to both standing orders. If you have something that is repetition I
29 encourage you to turn your light off. Councillor Cronin.

30 COUNCILLOR CRONIN: Thank you very much. On a point of order, there
31 actually is no school in Dunlavin called St Kevin's National School. That was
32 mentioned in your motion. There was St Kevin's Community College, which is
33 already mentioned, but the national school, there's no such school called St Kevin's
34 National School. There's Scoil Nioclais Naofa but it's not awaiting an extension.

1 Thank you.

2 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Scott.

3 COUNCILLOR SCOTT: Thank you. I want to add my name to this motion. I
4 didn't pick up Councillor Alvey's email until this morning. Look, this is not the first
5 motion that is brought to the chamber about writing to the Department of Education
6 about school places and school buildings crisis. It is one in a long list. It won't be
7 the last. I share Councillor O'Brien's cynicism about the response we're going to get
8 from the Department of Education. We may as well be writing to Santa Claus in
9 terms of receiving a coherent or meaningful response from them. My own feeling,
10 and again I have said this on the record here and I don't hesitate in saying it again, is
11 that the building section and the forward planning section in the Department of
12 Education are not fit for purpose. They're not functioning as they're supposed to be.
13 We had a very great day celebrating the long awaited new Greystones Community
14 College building on Friday of which I was formerly chairperson and it was a
15 fantastic day but it is notable that it took eight years from the time that that school
16 was agreed by the Department to be needed to the time it was delivered, and there
17 was a general sense that that was a quick delivery. To me, that's eight years that
18 caused enormous stress to people, to pupils and to parents and to families in our area
19 when they could not access a space for their child, when children that should have
20 been in special education classes were being put into mainstream classes because
21 that was simply the only case they could squeeze in in prefabs. That school, I'm
22 using that as an example, should have probably been sanctioned in 2013 in order to
23 be delivered when it is due. Again, reiterating the point about Bray Educate
24 Together Secondary School, it's ten years that that has been sitting in temporary
25 accommodation. It is absolutely disgraceful. I will just wrap up by saying the
26 Greystones councillors back in March, it is worth noting here on the record as it is
27 relevant to this motion, we adopted a notice of motion following our concerns about
28 the call to sites and the proposed increase, potential increased zoning population
29 growth in our area, and also noting the Department's own comment on the call to
30 sites plan about their concerns about the need for additional schools, et cetera, in the
31 areas, and we requested a meeting with the Tánaiste to discuss infrastructure
32 particularly around providing adequate accommodation just in our own district
33 would be delivered and we still haven't received a response. So I await to see if the
34 Department of Education respond to this. Thank you.

1 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor O'Toole.

2 COUNCILLOR O'TOOLE: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. I think childhood should be
3 enjoyed by children and their parents. The stress and uncertainty of trying to secure
4 places within their communities should never become an unnecessary burden to any
5 family. I think this is an example of a failing of the State and it should be
6 highlighted, and I appreciate that has been highlighted multiple times. My own
7 personal story, I seen how a school was promised 20 years ago and it's only starting
8 now. So I think it needs to be highlighted. There's people here within this chamber
9 that have access to certain ministers and everything else and people have to be held
10 accountable for the failings that we're looking at here. Thank you.

11 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor O'Toole. I just want to give you the
12 choice: There's two more speakers, would you like to continue the speaking or
13 would you like to move on to the second motion and we will have to leave it after
14 this motion?

15 COUNCILLOR FORTUNE: Sorry. Can you not extend the meeting for ten
16 minutes?

17 MS PURCELL: No. You have to extend the meeting before the standing orders,
18 before 4:30. So while you can keep talking you can't make any decisions.

19 CATHAOIRLEACH: I will try to get through both. Councillor Bourke.

20 COUNCILLOR BOURKE: Thank you, Cathaoirleach. I will be very brief. I just
21 wanted to support the motion. You mentioned the Arklow CBS. I know that
22 first-hand, my own son attends it. There are classrooms there that some of them are
23 in converted containers. So it's long beyond time for a new school. They have
24 planning permission. This is a motion that needs to be pushed. I mentioned it too a
25 couple of times at our group meeting in the Tánaiste about getting the Department of
26 Education down here to give presentations to us and he said it is a good idea, we'd
27 love to see it happening. There's a think-in in Wexford, I am invited to it and I'll
28 bring it up again.

29 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor Stokes.

30 COUNCILLOR STOKES: Thank you, Cathaoirleach, and just to say that there is a
31 St Kevin's National School in Greystones. I know this as a past pupil. But I don't
32 think they have any prefabs to the best of my knowledge. I would like to just
33 formally second Councillor Paul O'Brien's amendment. I think it is a very
34 reasonable approach, and also just to agree with Councillor Lourda Scott about the

1 call for sites. When people in our own district in Greystones hear about more houses
2 potentially being zoned the first question we get is what about the school places. It is
3 a legitimate question. You know we really need to see a decisive investment into our
4 education. You know my own area, we would be greatly boosted if a secondary
5 school in Newtownmountkennedy could be built. While that's in the Wicklow
6 district a lot of those pupils are having to travel into whether it is Bray, Greystones,
7 Kilcoole, Wicklow Town, and I just think that we have to redouble our efforts on
8 this. Thank you, Cathaoirleach.

9 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. I'm assuming there's consensus and we're all
10 happy with the letter to be written?

11 MS PURCELL: Councillor Alvey, you're happy with the amendment?

12 COUNCILLOR ALVEY: Yeah, I was going to jump in very quickly to say, yeah,
13 happy to take Councillor O'Brien's suggestion also adding in a line requesting their
14 attendance, and also apologies, take out the reference to St Kevin's National School
15 Dunlavin. I got the two of them mixed up. Yeah, absolutely take out the reference
16 to that one. Thank you very much.

17 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. I think we might have time to take the second
18 standing. And just as Councillor Leonard isn't here we need someone to second the
19 motion. And I believe Tom Fortune is now proposing it. So anyone happy to
20 second? Councillor O'Toole.

21 MS GILLESPIE: Thank you. So the second suspension of standing orders was
22 requested by Councillor Behan, however due to his absence it is now proposed by
23 Councillor Tom Fortune and seconded by Councillor O'Toole: "That this Council
24 supports the hundreds of thousands of Irish citizens who do not have children and
25 who are subjected to punitive rates of inheritance tax when they die, that this Council
26 calls on the Government and the Minister for Finance to rectify this gross injustice in
27 the next budget."

28

29 Thank you.

30 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor for town.

31 COUNCILLOR FORTUNE: Thanks, Cathaoirleach. Just to say that Councillor
32 Behan is unfortunately dealing with a family illness so that's why he's not here. The
33 motion basically speaks for itself. To me, it's common sense and I think it's a very
34 unfair situation, and on behalf of the motion I would appeal to all the members to

1 support it and that we do make contact with the Government and with the Minister to
2 sort it out because I think it is grossly unfair.

3 CATHAOIRLEACH: Thank you. Councillor O'Toole, did you want to speak or are
4 you happy just to -- I'm assuming there's no dissent and the motion will pass?

5 Agreed? (Agreed.) Thank you everyone. We did it. So we've got five minutes.

6 MS GILLESPIE: As if I haven't spoken enough today! Notice of Motion No. 2,
7 proposed by Councillor Scott, seconded by Cathaoirleach Winstanley and supported
8 by Councillor Corrigan and Councillor Murphy from January 2026: "The members
9 of Wicklow County council call on the Executive to stop using the X platform
10 immediately X, formerly known as Twitter, has become a vehicle for abuse, and the
11 promotion of far-right, racist and divisive politics. Recently several regulators at
12 home and abroad have launched investigations into X due to a potential criminal
13 breach by X. Grok the AI chatbot of X has been potentially breaching laws
14 governing child safety and harassment communications. Grok has been editing
15 images under prompts from users and re-uploading said images back on the platform
16 to reshare. Users have been requesting Grok to nudify images of women and minors.
17 This feature allows the creation of child sexual abuse material, and images of sexual
18 harassment. We call on Wicklow County Council to immediately cease posting on
19 the X platform."

20

21 The response is: "Wicklow County Council maintains a passive account on X which
22 is used as a tool to communicate with members of the public in cases of emergency
23 events such as flood, road closures, et cetera."

24

25 Thank you.

26 CATHAOIRLEACH: Councillor Scott.

27 COUNCILLOR SCOTT: I would just say if the Council -- it's not a passive account
28 if you are posting on it. Again my motion still stands. I don't believe that the
29 Council should be supporting X by posting on it. I would be interested to know what
30 your reach are. There are plenty of other ways of notifying the public about weather
31 events, storm events, et cetera, et cetera. So I don't accept the response from the
32 Council. Dublin City Council have been removed from X. You know, I think we
33 need to be taking the leadership on this.

34 MS PURCELL: Thank you, Councillor. And I welcome your comments on it. I

1 have to check the actual reach we have on it and I will check that and come back to
2 you. I know it is dropping. And as I say we use it purely for our flooding and road
3 closures, but if the members pass the motion we can delete the account.

4 CATHAOIRLEACH: Do people agree or do they want to put it to a vote? Agreed?
5 (Agreed.)

6 MS PURCELL: That is fine. Thank you very much.

7 CATHAOIRLEACH: Motion passed.

8 COUNCILLOR GLENNON: Vote.

9 MS PURCELL: Okay. You have three minutes.

10 MS GILLESPIE: So we will have a vote now on the second suspension of standing
11 orders in relation to the notice of motion relating to the use of the X account. So if
12 you are for the motion I will take the vote now. Councillor Danny Alvey?

13 COUNCILLOR ALVEY: For.

14 MS GILLESPIE: Councillor Mark Barry? Not present. Councillor Joe Behan? Not
15 present. Councillor Sylvester Bourke? Not present. Councillor Melanie Corrigan?

16 COUNCILLOR CORRIGAN: For.

17 MS GILLESPIE: For. Councillor Avril Cronin?

18 COUNCILLOR CRONIN: For.

19 MS GILLESPIE: For. Councillor Erika Doyle? Not present. Councillor Malachai

21 COUNCILLOR DUDDY: Nil.
