Council of the Year

Wicklow County Council has been crowned 'Council of the Year' in Ireland in prestigious national awards.

Council of the Year recognises a local council which has gone above and beyond for the people of the community. It must have developed and be continuing to develop a range of innovative projects and initiatives which improve and enhance the social, environmental, cultural and economic aspects of community lives.

The fantastic accolade for the County came as Wicklow County Council was also shortlisted in 10 categories on the night.

Wicklow was judged to be Council of the Year in the awards which were presented in a special ceremony in the Royal Dublin Convention Centre in Dublin on 17th February.

Now in its 18th year, the award scheme hosted by LAMA (Local Authority Members Association) and IPB Insurance, recognises and celebrates communities and the country's 31 local authorities working together.

Local Enterprise Week 2024

Small businesses and budding entrepreneurs will have the opportunity to sample a range of events aimed at helping them to start or grow their business as part of this year's **Local Enterprise Week** in Wicklow.

The initiative of Local Enterprise Offices nationwide, supported by Enterprise Ireland and the local authorities, takes place from the 4th to 8th March.

A range of events open to all across County Wicklow will focus on Green for Business, Sustainability, Digital for Business, Exporting and Start up Business Advice clinics.

The two National Spotlight events are open to everyone and can be accessed online. The first, "Understanding and leveraging future trends for your business" on Wednesday, 6th March, looks at what are the trends that will be emerging in the short and long term and how they will affect business. The session will also delve into how you can adapt and leverage these trends for business success.

The second spotlight event focuses on the area of sustainability. The "Sustainability imperative for business success" session on Thursday, 7th March, will look at how sustainability is becoming a bigger and bigger factor in business survival and success. Headlined by renowned broadcaster and science and environment expert, Liz Bonnin, it will show how the small changes in your business can make a big impact and most importantly how you can start.

Each of the 31 Local Enterprise Offices will be running a full programme of events in their area that will tackle a variety of areas relevant to small businesses and starting up. The events are open to all from budding entrepreneurs to established businesses and gives them the opportunity to get expert advice on key areas of business from financial skills, raising funds, exporting and boosting your business online to future trends such as sustainability and digitalization.

Housing Maintenance - Boiler Maintenance

Due to the withdrawal of a large Gas boiler maintenance contractor from our Framework we sourced alternative contractors via www.supplygov.ie. Meanwhile, planned replacement of our aging gas and oil boiler fleet has been continuing. 125 oil and gas boilers had been replaced before the end of Dec 2023 around the county using Planned Maintenance funding from the Dept of Housing, Heritage and Local Government. Our initial allocation from the Dept in April 2023 was €173,000 but we had successfully claimed and recouped €265,000 by the end of 2023. A further €165,000 which was incurred in 2023 will be claimed in early 2024.

Potential units

Wicklow County Council currently has agreements in place for units in Delgany, Rathnew, Rathdrum, Roundwood, Newtownmountkennedy, Blessington, Baltinglass, Dunlavin and Wicklow with delivery ranging from 2024-2026. This includes the units listed above. WCC is in negotiations in respect of over 100 further units with delivery dates yet to be confirmed.

Wicklow County Council is currently holding discussions with a number of developers at preplanning and planning stage. There are over 100 potential Part V units with planning permission but it's difficult to determine whether they will all proceed or even on what timescale.

Croí Cónaithe (Towns, Cities and Rural) - Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant

The Vacant Property Refurbishment Grant is a payment you can get if you are turning a vacant house or building into your permanent home or a rental property. The grant applies to qualifying vacant properties in cities, towns, villages and rural parts of the country.

A grant of up to €70,000 is available.

If the refurbishment costs exceed the standard grant of up to €50,000, a top-up grant amount of up to €20,000 is available.

To qualify for the grant, applicants must:

- have proof of ownership or evidence of active negotiations to buy the property (that is, confirmation of engagement from the estate agent or owner of the property) where you are seeking approval in principle for a grant.
- live in the property as your principal private residence or make it available for rent.
- have proof that the property has been vacant for at least 2 years and that it was built up to and including 2007.



Homeless Hap Place Finder

The Homeless HAP Place finder provides assistance in:

- seeking out potential properties suitable for households currently identified as homeless or at risk of homelessness;
- liaising with specific households to establish their specific needs;
- > establishing relationships with local property agents and landlords; and,
- > supporting those homeless households to (a) prevent the necessity to enter emergency accommodation or (b) to exit emergency accommodation and secure a tenancy.
- ➤ To date, 510 households (359 families & 145 singles) have been assisted under the Homeless HAP Scheme in Wicklow County Council from the inception on 1st October, 2018 to 31st January 2024. (212 homeless cases, 282 prevention cases to date and 15 direct provision). 135 properties were sourced by WCC.

Addressing Homelessness in partnership with Approved Housing Bodies

Homeless Supported Temporary Accommodation - Kilmantin Hill, Wicklow

Kilmantain Hill has 11 rooms to support persons either homeless, exiting a higher support facility or in danger of becoming homeless.

There are 10 clients supported in the Kilmantin Hill facility, operated by Dublin Simon, with continuing transition by the clients to suitable, alternative accommodation at the moment.

A report is being undertaken at present to cost the refurbishment of the current rooms with a few to making them all ensutie – more details will be available over the coming months.

Homeless Family Service - Fitzwilliam Road, Wicklow

Dublin Simon are engaged by Wicklow County Council to operate and manage the facility at Fitzwilliam Road, Wicklow as a Family Homeless Service. The building comprises of 3 x 1 bed units 2 x 2 bed units and 2 x 3 bed units – Eleven families have now transitioned or are in the process of transitioning to a permanent home and the resulting vacancies are in the process of being occupied with families experiencing or in danger of homelessness

It is envisaged that families will avail of the service for circa 6 month STA (Supported Temporary Accommodation) with key working support to enable family's transition from homelessness into Homeless HAP or alternative longer term accommodation.

Homeless Supported Temporary Accommodation - San Remo, Bray

San Remo is operated by Dublin Simon, incorporates a service model where there are a number of emergency/cold weather initiative Beds and Supported Temporary Accommodation Beds (STA). There is on site key working support linking in with clients.

CWI (Cold Weather Initiative) beds are now in operation in San Remo and will continue until Aoril 2024.



The Neighbourhood Liaison Committee is now operational and meets monthly.

Bi- monthly meetings are held with Dublin Simon and Wicklow County Council staff

Homeless Supported Accommodation - Carraig Eden, Greystones

The facility providing 35 ensuite bedrooms with associated kitchens and common areas is fully operational. Wicklow County Council run an in-reach service with the clients to support them as they continue their journey into more permanent accommodation.

Other Homeless Supported Accommodation

Wicklow County Council owned properties in Wicklow, Bray and Greystones, leased to AHBs, provide 12 units of low to medium supported accommodation targeted to the particular support needs of the clients. Six of these persons lving in shared accommodation have now successfully moved into there forever homes and this in turn create space to move further people out of homelessness.

A homeless outreach service has been rolled out in Bray and is proving very successful

Housing First

Peter McVerry Trust has been appointed as the Housing First Programme Implementer for the Mid-East Region. Wicklow County Council is committed to working with them and has now reached and surpassed the targets identified in the programme. Housing first recognises that a stable home provides the basis for recovery in other areas.

Properties will be provided by both Wicklow County Council and Peter McVerry Trust for the implementation of the programme.

Wicklow County Council has, to date, successfully accommodated 19 clients under Housing First and it is hoped that at least one further allocation will take place before the end of 2023. Other clients proposed for Housing First have been assessed by the team and are availing of key support work pending finalisation of sourcing of accommodation – the main issue facing this programme is the availability of one bed units in suitable locations with easy access to services etc.

Homeless Action Plan 2024 - 2026

The plan is currently being updated and will be presented to the Housing and Corporate Estate SPC at their February meeting and to the full Council at the April meeting.

All 71 properties given approval for energy efficiency fabric upgrade works in 2022 have been completed and it is hoped to complete 90 before the end of 2024.

Ukrainian Response

 As of 13^h February the numbers of Ukrainians Displaced Persons in emergency type accommodation is 1,783 (although we know that there are considerably more in the County)

- WCC are currently assessing all Displaced Ukrainians persons in the County in order to identify their accommodation needs as well linking them in with all the relevant services and supports within the community.
- WCC are working through a list of pledged properties within the County and matching families accordingly. As of the 30^h January we will have housed 250 number displaced Ukrainian people into pledged stand-alone Offer a Home properties Larger buildings and vacant units are also being identified and explored as potential options for medium to long term accommodation.
- The Community Response Forum continues to meet on a regular basis.

Action 3.8 Appoint Healthy Age Friendly Homes Co-ordinator & Rollout Wicklow Programme

Healthy Age Friendly Homes (HAFH) Programme is a support coordination programme that aims to enable older people to age in place and reduce the need to transfer to long-term residential care. The Programme is a collaboration between the Department of Health and the Department of Housing and Local Government. It is funded by the Department of Health and operated by Meath County Council, on behalf of all Local Authorities.

The service is designed to enable older people to remain living in their own home for longer. The local coordinator undertakes home visits to older people living in the community, where a needs assessment is carried out, looking at four key areas of supports: housing, health, community/social supports, and technology. Home visits from the local co-coordinator are available to anyone aged 65+years. The rollout of the programme will commence in January 2024.

Older People's Council, Executive Group - Meetings and Representation

The Older People's Council (OPC) Executive Group will meet on the 28th of February 2024.

OPC Executive is planning for wider engagement with older people across the county and recruitment of more members of the OPC this year.

Age Friendly Ireland Committee

The Age Friendly Ireland team will meet for a planning workshop scheduled for Thursday 22nd of February 2024 and Friday 23rd February 2024 in the Headfort Arms, Kells, Co. Meath.

CLÁR Funding Scheme

Rathdrum Cancer Support (€44,034) and Wicklow Irish Community Rapid Response (€50,000) were awarded funding under the CLÁR Funding Scheme (Measure 2: Mobility, Cancer Care and Community First Responders Transport). In total, Minister Humphreys announced over €2 million for 37 Vehicles for Mobility, Cancer Care and Community First Responders throughout the Country.

On 1st December by Minster Humphreys announced the first round of successful applications, under Measure 1 of the CLÁR 2023 scheme, for rural sports facilities Knockananna GAA were successful in securing funding of €50,000 toward the cost of resurfacing the car park and a walkway around the pitch, to improve community accessibility.

On 12th January 2024 Mister Humphreys announced a further 152 successful applications under Measure 1 of the CLÁR 2023 scheme. Two County Wicklow projects were amongst the successful applications.



Askanagap Community Hall secured funding of €50,000 towards the renovation of the hall and Ballymanus Community Field secured funding of €26,865 to upgrade the lighting at the field.

Town & Village Renewal Scheme 2023

Closing date for submissions of Expressions of Interest in the Town and Village Renewal Scheme 2023 was 5th October 2023. The TVRS23 Projects Assessment and Selection Panel, met in Wicklow County Council, on Tuesday 10th October, to determine which projects will be selected by Wicklow County Council for submission to the Department for Rural and Community Development this year.

All Expressions of Interest were assessed based on the eligibility criteria and priorities contained in the 2023 Town and Village Renewal Scheme Outline. The panel selected 5 projects for development into an application for grant funding. These were submitted to DRCD on 10th Nov 2023.

Wicklow County Council awaits the announcement, by Minister Humphreys, of the successful applicants.

Disability and Inclusion Steering Committee

Wicklow's first Disability and Inclusion Strategy has been launched, with Wicklow County Council's Disability and Inclusion Steering Committee (DISC) working towards the development of the strategy since it was established in 2020.

The strategy outlines how Wicklow County Council and its partners intend to make the services they provide equitable and accessible to all. It aims to ensure that persons with a disability have an equal opportunity to pursue their ambitions, realise their potential and live fulfilling lives. Individual actions are aligned to the United Nations Convention on the rights of persons with disabilities throughout the document.

Wicklow Arts Office

2024 Strategic Projects Award Scheme Recipients Announced

2024 Arts Act Funding application deadline

Arts Act Funding support artists, communities, arts festivals, arts participation, and art form development across County Wicklow.

Applications are currently being accepted under three schemes:

This year the Arts Office offered a new application support service from Wednesday, 10th January to Friday, 9th February 2024. With over 50 artists participating, the application support service offered artists, communities, and festival organisers the opportunity to engage in a 30-minute consultation to pose questions and seek advice from Síle Stewart, Arts Services Coordinator. The deadline to apply was 16th February.

Creative Places Baltinglass: Sitting Room Session #2: 'Home'

Creative Places Baltinglass and local musician and producer Mark Caplice presented a night of original music featuring three artists, Padraig McGrath, One Night in August, and Amy Barrett in Horan's in Baltinglass, on Friday, 23rd February at 7pm.

IWC National Mentoring Programme 2024

Each year, the Irish Writers Centre (IWC) offers over 30 mentorships across the island of Ireland. Writers receive sustained creative and professional mentoring from an acclaimed Irish writer of their choosing. Writers living in all thirty-two counties are eligible to apply. Accepted genres/forms include literary fiction, creative non-fiction, children's / young adult fiction, and poetry.

Two mentorships will be available for County Wicklow writers and this initiative is supported by Wicklow County Arts Office and the Arts Council. The deadline to apply was 2nd March.

Artist one-to-one Coaching Returns

Designed to cater for a range of artists at different career stages, successful applicants will work individually with four experienced coaches from the arts and cultural sector.

To take part, applicants must submit an expression of interest through an online application process. Successful applicants will receive three one-to-one coaching sessions between April and September 2024 to support thinking processes, prioritisation, and goal orientation for 2024.

The deadline to apply is Tuesday, 19th March 2024 at 4pm.

Creative Wicklow Grant Scheme Announced

This scheme has been put in place to support Wicklow County Council's role in delivering the Creative Ireland Programme. The fund is open to not-for-profit organisations, local community groups, arts, heritage, biodiversity and cultural groups, venues, and societies.



Activities that effectively capture and showcase the richness of County Wicklow's arts, culture, creativity, heritage, nature, biodiversity, and history are welcomed. Applications by individuals must be in partnership with local community, arts, heritage, biodiversity, and cultural groups.

Grants of between €1,000 and €3,000 will be allocated to projects that communicate and celebrate aspects of Wicklow People and Place in creative and innovative ways.

The deadline to apply is Tuesday, 19th March 2024 at 4pm.

Blessington Greenway

Planning documents were submitted to An Bord Pleanála under Section 177AE of the Planning and Development Act. On 16th March 2023, Wicklow County Council received a request for further information (RFI) from An Bord Pleanála. The Board had sought a response to this RFI request by the 8th of June 2023. However, due to the significant information sought by ABP, an extension to the 29th of January 2024 was granted by ABP.

On Friday 26th January 2024, Wicklow County Council submitted a full comprehensive response to this RFI to meet the deadline.

Pride of Place 2024

The new 2024 Pride of Place brochure will issue in March 2024, including new categories for this year's nominations. The 5 Wicklow MD's have been notified and they can submit suggestions of voluntary organisations in their area for nominations. The selection process will commence once submissions are received from the MD's.

Coastal Blueway

Following meetings with Irish Leisure Consultants (ILC), we are developing a timeline for the project over the next few months, with online consultations taking place in the next few weeks and in-person meetings in Wicklow due to take place from mid-March.

Wicklow Outdoor Recreation Committee (WORC)

The WORC meeting took place on the 25th January 2024 to continue to delivery and progress the County Wicklow Outdoor Recreation Strategy 2020- 2025. Additional funding of €30k was allocated in budget 2024 to support the Strategy.

Wicklow Way Partnership

A meeting of the Wicklow Way Partnership took place on the 6th February 2024 where a MOU was signed by all parties and updates were given on the new Wicklow Way logo and a formal maintenance structure for the trail.

The Wicklow Way is Ireland's oldest long-distance trail, established in 1981 and now attracting many visitors from both home and abroad to its 132km of trail that stretch from Marlay Park in South County Dublin to Clonegal in County Carlow, passing across lands owned by Coillte, the National Parks and Wildlife Service, private landowners and roads managed by the local authority.

Over the last number of years there has been a steady improvement in the quality of the trail with works carried out under the Walks Scheme, by Coillte, NPWS, the Dublin Mountains Partnership and Mountain Meitheal. Despite this work, there has been a lack of coordinated management and regular monitoring and has lacked a focussed approach to delivering improvements in a strategic fashion. A key conclusion of the Review of National Trails suggested that trails need to be managed as an integrated entity and, therefore, require a representative management structure with shared commitment. To address this important issue, the ad hoc group agree to the establishment, by way of a Memorandum of Understanding, The Wicklow Way Partnership or WWP.

The overall objective of the Wicklow Way Partnership is to bring together all those organisations who have some part to play in the management and improvement of the trail and who currently contribute resources to the trails management, to develop an integrated plan and management structure for the trail.

All WWP partners: Wicklow Co Co, Coillte, Mountain Meitheal, County Wicklow Partnership, National Parks and Wildlife Service and Dublin Mountains Partnership shall commit to support the partnership for a five



year period to be reviewed in June 2028. Mountain Meitheal will contribute an approximate 200 hours of labour and will provide expertise and training support to agreed projects. The other partners will each contribute €5,000 per year to the maintenance fund.

Project Development Measure (PDM) 2023

Funding was approved under the Project Development Measure of the 2023 Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme:

OR423WW01 Lugnaquilla Recreation Plan €45,000.00

Quotation requests were sought from six companies based in Co Wicklow to provide a Feasibility study into management of Recreation on Lugnaquilla. The deadline for submission of quotations was Monday 12th February 2024.

Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme

The Outdoor Recreation Infrastructure Scheme (ORIS) supports the development of new outdoor recreational infrastructure and the necessary repair, enhancement, or promotion of existing outdoor recreation infrastructure in countryside areas across Ireland. The Scheme is funded under "Our Rural Future" which specifically prioritises the growing outdoor activity tourism sector as part of a long-term vision for a vibrant and sustainable rural Ireland.

There are two large Measure 3 projects which will commence in 2024 -

Roundwood Recreation Area – Part VIII CE Report submitted. This planning was granted on 18th December 2023. It is envisaged that these works will commence in quarter 2 2024.

<u>The Sugarloaf Repair Scheme</u> – Part VIII submissions being received. CE Report to follow in February which will be submitted to the members of Bray Municipal District.

Healthy Wicklow

Activators in Care trainers' workshop – this one-day workshop will take place in Carnew Community Care Centre on Friday 9th February. 12 participants will complete this workshop which will provide training to staff in a care setting and will enable them to lead activity sessions with older people with balance concerns or mobility issues.

Pickleball programme – two Pickleball programmes come to Tinahely Community Hall for the first time. Both commenced on 24th February - one targeting children 10 – 15 years, and the other for adults.

Knockananna physical activity programme – started in Knockananna Community Hall and continues every Friday growing in numbers each week.

Wicklow Travellers Group - In February, the WTG Boy's youth group are planning on using Healthy Ireland funding to rent the Rathnew AFC Hall for 6 weeks of indoor football. It is proposed that 10-12 young Traveller males between the ages of 11-14 years will partake in the activity. The aim is to build their strength and endurance, encourage team building and to support both their physical and mental health. They will be provided with fruit, water, and other healthy snacks.

Period Poverty Initiative – has really gathered momentum across the County. We have now targeted sports clubs where there has been huge engagement to provide free period products to sporting female facilities. This month alone the below clubs will benefit from the period poverty project:

Sláintecare Healthy Communities

The Traveller Community Trauma Project is underway this month. Two-day in-person Trauma Training aimed specifically for Travellers was provided under SHC Seed Fund. In attendance were the Bray Traveller Community Development Group and a host of community stakeholders and partners including the Bray Community Gardaí, Bray Community Addiction Team, Bray drugs Task Force, HSE Traveller Mental Health Officer, Bray Sports Promotion Unit, St Fergal's School Liaison Worker, Bray Youth Service, and the Fassaroe Resource Centre. The training went very well, and feedback from all was very positive.



Wicklow Sports & Recreation Partnership

Club Development Grants

Wicklow Sports & Recreation Partnership have opened the 2024 Club development small grant scheme. The maximum amount available to each club is €1,500. The closing date is 20th March.

Get Going Get Rowing Programme

The get going get rowing programme gives secondary students the opportunity to give rowing a try in school during their PE timetable. Rowing Ireland coaches attended three secondary schools in Arklow: St Marys College, Glenart College and Arklow CBS. The coaches delivered a 4-to-6-week rowing programme to 250 students approx. On conclusion of the programme, Wicklow Sports and Recreation Partnership and Rowing Ireland organised a rowing blitz for the schools participating in the programme in Coral Leisure Arklow.

Shuttletime Teacher Training

Badminton Ireland in conjunction with Wicklow Sports and Recreation Partnership held teacher training for primary schools in County Wicklow. Teachers attended the training from Lacken National School, St Catherine Special School, Greystones Educate Together and Scoil Chulann Bray.



Beginners' Strength and Conditioning

Fifteen people attended beginners' strength and conditioning classes with Jenny Fortune in Coral Leisure Arklow on Monday mornings for a 6-week programme. The class is designed to increase strength, enhance cardiovascular health, and improve posture, flexibility, and mobility.

Buggy Buddies Pilates Baltinglass

Fourteen women along with their babies attended the 6-week buggy buddies Pilates class in Baltinglass Badminton Hall. The tutor, John Kenny worked on mobility, flexibility, pelvic floor, and core work. This class provided a platform for new mums in the area to get to know each other.

Social Volleyball

A six-week Social Volleyball Programme in partnership with Volleyball Ireland is taking place Sunday mornings at 10am in Gaelscoil Chill Mhantáin. Lina Dzurnak from Volleyball Ireland is leading the programme. Participants are shown the basic volleyball skills, drills rules, and mini games.

Ireland Reads 2024

Throughout February, libraries throughout county Wicklow are took part in Ireland Reads, a national campaign to get the whole country reading in the lead up to a National Day of Reading on February 24th. The campaign asked everyone to 'Get lost in a good book' on "Ireland Reads Day". Campaign partners and libraries all over the country ran 'Ireland Reads' initiatives and events throughout the month of February.

Libraries have teamed up with publishers, booksellers, authors, and others for the campaign which is part of the government's Healthy Ireland programme and aims to celebrate reading and all the benefits it can have for wellbeing and enjoyment.

The *Ireland Reads* website also offers book recommendations suited to a person's interests and the time they have available. There are more than 1,500 recommendations from librarians all around the country for all interests and reading levels.

A website user can simply enter their favourite type of book and how long they would like to read each day and the website will offer the perfect book suggestion and work out how long it will take to complete – so you can set yourself a challenge if you're finding it hard to get back to reading. People can also recommend a book to a friend through the website.





Libraries of Sanctuary

As a service we have pledged to be Libraries of Sanctuary. This venture underscores the library's dedication to fostering a sense of belonging and support for individuals from diverse backgrounds, including refugees, asylum seekers, and migrants. To date, we have announced our intention with a press release (Dec. 2023) and put together a portfolio of events, services and activities we provide, to underpin this pledge.

The 'Library of Sanctuary' initiative, a part of the wider 'Places of Sanctuary Ireland' movement, aims to recognise and celebrate libraries that go the extra mile in embracing diversity and promoting inclusion within their communities. To support staff on this initiative, we had a training webinar with Dr Rachel Hoare in late January. The presentation: **Working with asylum seekers and refugees** explored the work Rachel does with TUSLA in relation to unaccompanied minors and the Centre for Forced Migration Studies in TCD.

We have also been in contact with Meadhbh Quinn, co-ordinator of our newly formed Local Authority Integration Team, and feel there is much we can collaborate on. We are keen to support Meadhbh and her team and look forward to working with them. Achieving 'Library of Sanctuary' status is our goal but it is not the end. It will involve continuing efforts, and a focus that the programmes we already have cater to the needs of diverse populations. It will inform our planning for the future and commitment to creating a space that is welcoming and inclusive for all visitors.

Made in Wicklow - series of crafting workshops

This amazing opportunity is financially supported by the Transitional LEADER Rural Development Programme and implemented in all libraries by Wicklow Craft Foundation. This series coincided with the launch of the Made in Wicklow Craft Trail and launched in Powerscourt on St. Bridget's Day 1st February. The series of workshops has succeeded so far in bringing a fantastic opportunity to people to get taster sessions in arrange of crafts including bookmaking, felting, woodworking, pottery, weaving and more.



Aisling Ennis – 'The Harp Concert Series' returns for young audiences.

Aisling Ennis is a Wicklow based harpist who performed a fairy inspired recital in every Wicklow County library branch last October. Aisling returned to our libraries with a special version for young audiences in February. This has so far included inviting a local school class to the library (Tinahely), connecting with home school hubs (Arklow Library), baby music sessions (Wicklow Town), and small intimate story time sessions in Aughrim and Carnew libraries, as well as a toddler story time session in Bray library. This project has been funded by the Arts Council and Wicklow County Arts office through the Strategic Projects Award Scheme.





Local History Talks and Events

Local History Talk: Junkers plane crash in the Wicklow Mountain

This Library local history talk by Bill Nelson, a retired Aviation Engineer, took place in Enniskerry Library on Wednesday 7th February. Members of the Wednesday Book Club joined the talk after reading the book based on the incident, 'When Our Plane Hit the Mountain', by Suzanne Barnes.

Bill gave a most engaging and entertaining talk about the Junkers 52 plane that crashed in the Wicklow Mountains in 1946 and had a piece of the fuselage from the plane on show, which was retrieved from the mountain in 1952. Junkers plane crash talk also took place in Blessington Library on 15th of February.



Local History Talk: Rough Justice Crime and Punishment

Local History Talk 'Rough Justice' took place at Wicklow Town Library' on 15th February. From the latter half of the 18th century until the Act of Union in 1800, over 220 crimes were punishable by death. While this number declined to a mere 10 by 1820, sentencing remained severe. Following from his successful 'Rough Justice' talks in Dublin last year, historian James Scannell used Wicklow criminal reports from the 1860s to demonstrate that, while rehabilitation of offenders evolved during this time, this was limited. His talk showed that sentencing of Wicklow offenders for minor offences remained, in many cases, out of proportion to the nature of the offence.



Local History Workshop: Researching your Family Tree

This workshop took place in Ballywaltrim Library on 10th February and was well attended. Claire Bradley is a professional Irish genealogist working with both traditional paper records and genetic genealogy. She holds a Certificate in Genealogy from University College Dublin and a Masters Degree in History of the



Family from the University of Limerick. Wicklow Libraries has an array of available subscription sites that you can use in all their branches and the local archives.

Local History Talk: 'The History of Enniskerry and District' with Brian White

Brian provided lots of gems of information about forgotten events and people from Enniskerry and the surrounding districts on 16th February. His talk included lots of unseen photographs and paintings. He has so much information that this talk was Part 1, and he is already planning a Part 2 talk at a later date.



Greystones Library




Baby and Toddler story time takes place every Friday morning from 10-10.30 with Ana.

County Wicklow Archives & Geneology Service

Collections management & outreach

The Archives Service installed new archival cataloguing software <u>Axiell</u> Collections to document and describe each of the County Wicklow local government and private collections, to be published on a phased basis to Wicklow.ie.

The estate papers of the Actons of Kilmacurragh dating from the 1660s. The Actons acquired the Kilmacurragh estate during the 17th century and developed the famous arboretum in the 19th century, now operated by the OPW. In 2021 the OPW announced funding of €5.45 million for structural work at Kilmacurragh House. The County Archives is currently cataloguing this new collection in preparation for an exhibition to coincide with the refurbishment of Kilmacurragh House.

Arklow Street Preachers project based on our glass plate negatives collection of late 19th century images of these events in Arklow. Reverend Hallowes, Church of Ireland minister, caused scandal and riots in the 1890s by preaching on the streets of Arklow. Phase one now completed – digitisation of the images. Phase two begun - collaboration with historian Pat Power and the Arklow Maritime Museum on a publication and exhibition.

Digitisation programme

The minute books of the Rathdrum Boards of Guardians 1839 – 1921 funded by Creative Ireland. Soon to be available on Wicklow.ie.

New digitisation project now completed – the late 19th century Valuation Revision Books of County Wicklow – a valuable substitute for the pre-1901 census records destroyed in the fire at the Public Record Office, Dublin Four Courts in 1922. These volumes show changes in ownership of land and dwellings in late 19th century Wicklow, documenting family succession and emigration. Both collections feature the new Al-powered technology *Transkribus* rendering hand-written records machine-readable and searchable for the first time.

Social Inclusion Community Activation Programme (SICAP):

Assessment and approval of the 2023 End of Year reports is underway for both Partnerships. Once finalised, March 2024 funding will be released for the continued implementation of SICAP in both Lot areas.



Bray Area Partnership were successful in application to Dormant Accounts under the LGBTI+ funding stream. Two new LGBTI+ projects will be developed in conjunction with Club Enclave Bray and Greystones Family Resource Centre.

Economic Development, Planning, and Infrastructure

Economic Development

Local Economic and Community Plan (LECP)

The Local Economic and Community Plan Framework (LECP) was approved by the elected members of Wicklow County Council and the first two-year implementation plan has been finalised. The Co. Wicklow LCDC will oversee the implementation of the community elements of the plan, while the SPC for Economic Development and Enterprise Support will oversee the economic implementation. Progress reports on the LECP will be received at each meeting of the LCDC and the EDES SPC. Monitoring and reporting will be overseen by the LECP Advisory Group.

Town Regeneration

A suite of funding supports for town teams has been announced by the Department of Rural & Community Development.

- a) Town Team Support Fund: up to €10,000 each for three towns in each eligible local authority area to support the establishment and/or development of town teams where they are not already well established
- b) Town Centre First Plans: Funding of €30,000 in each eligible local authority area to support the development of a TCF plan in a rural town
- c) Project Development Measure: This measure will assist local authorities to contribute to a pipeline of significant, well developed projects by providing funding of €50,000 each to support two projects.

Please note these supports from DRCD only target rural towns with a population of under 10,000 people, therefore Town Teams in an area with a population of over 10,000 are not eligible. This is an issue for Co. Wicklow with 4 out of 5 town teams in an area with a population of over 10,000.

Town Teams

Wicklow Town Team

The Town Team are currently examining proposals for 2024 projects.

Pilgrim Walk: A new route (not over private lands) has now been decided and approval is sought from Carol Coad, County Wicklow Partnership regarding the funding approval for the new route.

Assembly Hall: refurbishment works are due to commence on 4th March 2024.



Sustainable Energy Community: the SEC are organising a third Energy Awareness Day on 15th June 2024.

Arklow Town Team

Town Team Rejuvenation – The Town Team held an open day on the 20th January in Bridgewater Shopping Centre. It was a great opportunity to showcase the projects completed by Arklow Town Team. The event was well supported with quite a number of people stopping by to find out further information. A number of expressions of interest forms were received which will be assessed.

Harbour to Headwater – With work on-going to extend the information available on the website, the Town Team were delighted to learn that the project has been shortlisted for the LAMA awards for 2024. The project is included in the category Best Trail/Waterway in Ireland.

Blessington Town Team

Blessington is a pathfinder town and is the first to receive funding for a Town Centre First Masterplan. The Masterplan will provide Blessington with a clear framework to positively develop the town now and into the future. The final plan will be launched at a national event at the end of February.

Blessington Town Team has begun the planning process for the implementation of the Town Centre First Masterplan in conjunction with Wicklow County Council. The plan contains eight key themes under which a number of place making projects can be developed.

Bray Town Team

Discussions are continuing on the future of Bray Town Team.

Rural and Urban Regeneration Development Fund Grant Applications

Steering Group for the Progression of URDF and RRDF Projects

The Chief Executive has established an interdisciplinary team for the progression of Wicklow County Council's URDF (Urban Regeneration and Development Projects) and RRDF (Rural Regeneration and Development Projects) projects. The group meets monthly to streamline the advancement of RRDF and URDF projects along with a working subgroup that will meet fortnightly and report to the steering group. This is a significant step in setting up the structures for town regeneration in the County.

RRDF Rural Regeneration Development Fund

specifically,RRDF: Blessington has been awarded over €1m funding under the Rural Regeneration Development Fund (RRDF CAT 2) for the purpose of the regeneration of Blessington Town Centre,



specifically the development of plans for public realm works and the development of a vacant/derelict property to create an eHub and a Visitor Centre for the forthcoming Blessington Lakes eGreenway.

Baltinglass RRDF: The costings for the Baltinglass RRDF project (Making Baltinglass a Hub for Southwest Wicklow) have come in over budget on both the public realm and the Courthouse refurbishment. The proposals have been revised and the necessary technical plans are complete in order for the works to commence. Works on the Public Park and playground are underway. In addition a new submission has been made to Dept. Rural & Community Development under the RRDF (5th Call) for further funding to achieve more of the aims of the original project. A decision should be received on this in Q2 2024.

Newtownmountkennedy RRDF: The project is under review at present due to revisions necessary to the public realm, as there are contested issues regarding the design of the public realm. Following the necessary revisions, it is hoped that agreement will be reached, the plans will be signed off and submitted for Category 1 funding.

URDF: Urban Regeneration Development Fund

URDF Call 3: The URDF announced recently that Wicklow will receive €2.5 million to assist long term vacancy and dereliction. Four properties have been chosen (two in Arklow and two in Wicklow) and the process has commenced in acquiring these properties. An information gathering notice has been published on a number of the properties seeking information to be directed to the Council. DHLG&H have stated that funding is available to identify more properties based on residential capacity, town centre location, and whether they are located close to a URDF supported project. More vacant properties will be sought in both Wicklow MD and Arklow MD

In early 2024 it is expected that the Minister will be announcing a Call 4 Funding for URDF proposals.

Bray Harbour Improvements: A tender will be issued when the URDF funding has been confirmed for the next phase of the project. A business case has been sent to DHLG&H and a tender brief is being prepared for the procurement of engineering consultancy services to produce detailed designs, environmental reports and an application to An Bord Pleanala for the proposed works.

Tourism

Wicklow County Council Tourism Office continues to promote County Wicklow as a destination not only to domestic visitors but also on the international market using a range of tools and activities including:

Press Releases and Articles: During the month of February, communication focussed on Valentine's Day, featuring unforgettable activities for Two, and top romantic locations for a Wicklow marriage proposal. Articles also featured Wicklow's latest Ambassadors.



Social Media Campaign: From October until the end of December, Wicklow County Council ran an extensive online promotional campaign promoting Halloween and mid-term, Christmas in Wicklow, and the Wicklow Passport. The campaign achieved tremendous reach and engagement.

Wicklow Passport: The Wicklow Passport is currently being redesigned. The new design will add additional pages to the passport, which will allow visitors to collect more stamps. The idea is to allow participating stamping locations to develop and use their own stamps as part of the Wicklow Passport.

EcoTrail Wicklow: EcoTrail Wicklow was featured in over seven pages of one of the most popular trail running magazines (Nature Trail). The magazine enjoys a print run of 20,000 copies and extensive online readership in France. As we launch the 2024 EcoTrail Wicklow campaign, the feature offers a tremendous exposure to the French trail running market.

New Website: The visitwicklow.ie website has enjoyed a facelift with some needed upgrades and added functionalities including a new layout for the homepage with enhanced imagery, search bar, and special focus on news and events.

Networking & Workshop Event - Wicklow County Council in partnership with Wicklow Tourism Alliance organised a networking and workshop event on Thursday, 8th February at Beyond the Trees, Avondale. The event was attended by more than 100 participants including local tourism businesses and organisations representing various sectors of the tourism trade in Wicklow.

Tourism Ireland held its annual marketing launch in Dublin on the 9th January. This was a great opportunity to get insights on international promotions, find new opportunities for Wicklow and meet up with representatives from the various international markets.

Abbey Grounds, Wicklow

A detailed design of the Abbey Grounds has been completed to date. The Architect and Structural engineers are almost complete on the tender drawings and tender package for the Coach House refurbishment. This tender is to be issued within the coming weeks through Etenders.

The detailed design for the Amphitheatre and Park area are being finalised. These works will be issued as a separate contract due to the nature of the works. A proposal for the lighting design for the Amphitheatre and Park area has also been commissioned. WCC have received an extension from Failte Ireland until the end of May 2024 for completion of the project.

Glendalough Masterplan and Wicklow Visitor Orientation Study

Following on from the launch of the Glendalough and Wicklow Mountains National Park Visitor Experience and Management Masterplan, work has begun on the implementation of the Plan. A Steering Group has been established, which is chaired by the Chief Executive of Wicklow County Council.



A Working Group comprising representatives from all stakeholders has also been formed and has commenced work on short term actions for 2024, along with longer term actions also. As community consultation and participation is a central tenant of the Master Plan, a Local Advisory Group will be established to keep the local community informed and ensure their input to the process.

Special Projects

Greystones Enterprise Centre: The purchase of the Enterprise Space in Greystones has completed and work is underway to prepare for fitting-out the building. Property Management Contracts have been signed between Greystones Enterprise Hub CLG and Cushman and Wakefield for the fit-out, market, and management of the centre.

Sites on Mill Road, Greystones: Progress on the Mill Road sites is on hold pending PRA confirmation of site registration.

Carnew Remote Working Hub: A tender has issued for the design of the former Bank of Ireland building in Carnew for the provision of a remote working hub and ancillary facilities.

Marketing Plan: MarketingCoach have been awarded the contract to develop a Marketing Plan for County Wicklow, highlighting the availability of Remote Working Hubs and Broadband Connection Points. Work is currently underway with engagement sought from numerous stakeholders.

Offshore Renewable Energy

The Offshore Renewable Energy (ORE) Network continues to meet regularly and engage with the offshore renewable energy companies who are developing proposals off the coast of County Wicklow.

Skills Strategy

The Draft Skills Strategy has been presented to the Skills Taskforce and is under final review. It is expected to launch early in 2024.

Food and Beverage Strategy

Work continues on the development of an Action Plan to achieve objectives set out in the Wicklow Food and Beverage Strategy.

Wicklow Naturally - The 2024 Wicklow Naturally Action Plan has been prepared and agreed by the board.



The team is finalising the various reports to claim the last LEADER funds from the previous campaign. The job description for the new coordinator is under review and the position will be advertised in the coming weeks.

Regional Enterprise Innovation Scoping Scheme (REISS)

A Priming Grant of €199,600 was awarded to Clermont Enterprise Hub CLG from Enterprise Ireland's Regional Enterprise Innovation Scoping Scheme (REISS) for the provision of Design Services for a Food Incubation Development Hub at Wicklow County Campus.

Wicklow Town - Rathnew Local Area Plan

Pre-draft consultation closed for the new Wicklow Town - Rathnew Local Area Plan closed on 28 September 2023 with 84 submissions received. A well-attended public information day was held on 14 September 2023. All valid submissions have been reviewed and considered and a draft plan is being prepared. Once the draft plan is prepared it will go out on public consultation for 6 weeks with submissions invited from everyone.

Work has commenced on the review of the Arklow and Environs Local Area Plan and Bray Municipal District Local Area Plan. Consultants have been appointed to carry out the Strategic Environmental Assessment and the Appropriate Assessment. Pre-draft consultations for the draft Local Area Plans will be held in mid 2024.

RZLT - Residential Zoned Land Tax

The RZLT is a tax aimed at activating serviced and residentially zoned land for housing. Local authorities are responsible for identifying the land that is liable to pay the RZLT. The RZLT maps are updated annually.

The Final RZLT 2023 maps were published on 01 December 2023.

The Draft RZLT 2024 maps were published on 01 February 2024, with general submissions invited on the draft maps up to **01 April 2024.** Submissions requesting a variation of the zoning of land are invited up to **31 May 2024.**

The Minister has advised that the first liability date for the tax is proposed to be deferred from 1st February 2024 to 1st February 2025.

Vacant Site Levy

This programme is still ongoing and is affected by the proposed deferral of the RZLT. As liability to the RZLT is now proposed to be deferred for one year, it is considered appropriate to maintain provisions in legislation for the management and continued charging of the vacant site levy in respect of land which is identified on the register. This will continue to facilitate imminent placements on the register, conclusion of appeals and to facilitate the issuing of demands in relation to the levy for the period to the end of 2024. This will ensure that the use of the levy as an active land management measure will continue until the RZLT is in effect.

Climate Action Plan

The Climate Action Plan was adopted by the Members at the Ordinary Meeting on the 08th January 2024. The adopted Plan has been circulated to members and TD's and has been uploaded onto the Council website. The plan has been translated into Irish. The Plan will be launched at the CABA SPC on the 22nd February.



Community Climate Action Programme

Funding of €646,000 allocated to Wicklow. This programme was formally launched on the 6th December with Communication campaign and Grant Application Pack. There is ongoing engagement with various communities through Drop In Clinics, Social Media, and various meetings. The closing date is the 6th March for Expressions of Interest.

Climate Adaptation

Coastal Erosion

- Wicklow County Council continues to reduce and manage the risk of flooding in developed areas by cooperating
 with other agencies in implementing government policy in respect of the management of Coastal and Fluvial
 Flood Risk and Coastal Erosion Risk.
- It is a priority of Wicklow County Council to work in conjunction with Irish Rail on the East Coast Coastal Erosion Study (ECRIPP East Coast Railway Infrastructure Protection Project) and seek funding from OPW as appropriate.

M11N11 Junction 4 to 14 Improvement Scheme

The Option Selection report was published along with Bulletin #11 on the project website www.n11m11.ie on 14 December 2021. The publication followed the review of submissions received during public display in 2021. Phase 3 Design and Environmental Evaluation was due to commence in Q1 2022. The scheme is currently suspended as no funding was provided to continue during 2022 or 2023. The Wicklow County Council project team are continuing to meet with the public and any interested parties.



M11N11 Bus Priority Interim Scheme

The BPIS seeks to achieve the early delivery of bus priority measures in advance of the main scheme between Loughlinstown Roundabout and Junction 9 (Glenview). The scheme is currently at the Options Selection phase (Phase 2 of TII's Project Management Guidelines).

A non-statutory public display on the emerging preferred options for sections A and C took place in November 2022.

Following further analysis, an emerging preferred option for the provision of bus priority measures between Junction 6 (Fassaroe) and Junction 8 (Kilmacanogue) was identified. A Public Display event was held in the Glenview Hotel on 12th September 2023. The display presented the overall emerging preferred option for the BPIS between Loughlinstown Roundabout and Junction 9 (Glenview). The public display documents are available to view on the project website www.n11m11bpis.ie. The deadline for receipt of submissions on the emerging preferred option was extended by 3 weeks to the 3rd November 2023. The Project Team are now considering all submissions received.

N11 Parallel Service Road at Kilmacanogue

A noise assessment for the 7 no residential properties to the east of the new Parallel Service Road Scheme was carried out during April and May 2022. The options review and design commenced in March 2023 following confirmation of funding from TII. Site investigation works were completed in November 2023. This information has been reviewed by the Design Team and the final design option is being prepared.

N81 Knockroe Bend Realignment

Tenders for a Per-Cent Art Feature are being procured by the Arts Office. The preferred feature has been selected pending the completion of the final assessment stage.

N81 Irishtown West, Whitestown Lower, Hangman's Bend and Tuckmill Lower "N81 Four Studies"

Following completion of Phase 1 feasibility studies (The N81 Four Studies – Feasibility Report), Wicklow County Council are now progressing the following two projects:

- N81 Whitestown Lower Project; and
- N81 Hangman's Bend and Tuckmill Project.

The Phase 2 Options Selection work is currently progressing under TII's Project Management Guidelines.

N81 Pavement Capital Works

Resurfacing works of 1km of the N81 between Tuckmill and Saundersgrove is now expected to be carried out in Q1 2024.

N81 Rural Traffic Calming & Bus Stop at Hollywood

The Feasibility and Options report was finalised and approved by TII in November 2023. TII have also approved funding to proceed with the design phase in accordance with TII Standards. Wicklow County Council will now progress this project to the design phase to be followed by any necessary statutory approvals process.

Park & Ride/Share at Hollywood

A feasibility report, funded by the Baltinglass Municipal District was prepared and submitted to TII in Oct 2021. This report considered an option for parking accessed from the N81. TII subsequently provided funding to further examine the feasibility and options.



TII have indicated that they do not support the proposed additional access to the N81. As a result, the option for a parking facility accessed from the N81 has been discounted from the current scheme. A way forward is to consider suitable parking locations that can be accessed from the regional/local road network

N81 Blessington Gateway Project

The Feasibility and Options report was finalised and approved by TII in October 2023. TII have also approved funding to proceed with the design phase in accordance with TII Standards. Wicklow County Council will now progress this project to the design phase to be followed by any necessary statutory approvals process.

N11/M11 Park & Ride Facilities

Proposals for bus-based Park & Ride facilities are being progressed adjacent to the N11/M11 at Junctions 6 (Fassaroe), Junction 11 (Kilpedder) and Junction 16 (Ashford/Rathnew).

A part 8 for the Park and Ride at Junction 6 Fassaroe commenced on Wednesday 23rd August 2023 with plans and documents on public display until Wednesday 20th September 2023. Submissions or observations were accepted on or before 12 noon on Wednesday 4th October 2023. The Chief Executive's report was presented to the full meeting of Wicklow County Council on the 6th November 2023 where it was passed following a vote by Councillors.

Arklow Public Realm

The Parade Ground Public Realm works have reached a significant milestone, with substantial completion and successful snagging. Following a meeting with DoHLGH, Project Completion Reports were submitted with additional funding requested in December 2023.

Arklow to Shillelagh Greenway

After the successful non-statutory public consultation, we are currently reviewing submissions received as part of the public consultation process. We are in the final stages of Phase 2 Options Selection, which will determine the preferred route for the Greenway with landowner consultation ongoing. Following this, we will proceed to Phase 3, involving Design and Environmental Evaluation.

Baltinglass Town Centre Plan

Enabling works started in Baltinglass in mid-February with the WCC Direct Labour crew commencing site investigation works to aid in de-risking the project. The consultants are actively engaged in preparing documents for the delivery of a revised tender package for the town centre works, focusing on a reduced scope.

Blessington Inner Relief Road

The current focus of the project is on the detailed design phase, including the preparation of associated documents such as the Compulsory Purchase Order (CPO) documentation. These efforts are crucial to advance the scheme towards obtaining statutory approval. Given the potential impact of the project on the Poulaphuca Special Protection Area (SPA), it is necessary to prepare a Natura Impact Statement (NIS) to assess and document any potential effects on the SPA. Once the detailed design and associated documents, including the NIS, are completed, the project will proceed to seek statutory approval from An Bord Pleanála.

Wicklow County Council Compulsory Purchase (Chapel Road Pedestrian and Cycle Infrastructure Improvement Scheme) No. 1 Order 2021

The CPO Notice to Treat was issued on all landowners in October 2023. There is active engagement between Wicklow Roads Project staff and landowners who are part of the CPO, with landowner meetings taking place on November and December and January. Our project valuer is engaging with valuers and homeowners as part of the CPO process. Consultants are making steady progress in the detailed design phase and are currently focused on preparing the tender



documents for the construction phase which are anticipated to be issued in early 2024. Simultaneously, we are in the process of developing tender documents for the appointment of a consultant to oversee the works during the construction phase.

Wicklow Greystones Greenway

Wicklow County Council has recently engaged consultants Atkins for the project and their work is already in progress, focusing on data gathering. Additionally, the consultants are actively organizing detailed environmental surveys, which will play a vital role in shaping the route options and conducting constraint studies.

In April, a productive meeting took place with Irish Rail concerning the East Coast Rail Infrastructure Protection Project. During this meeting, an agreement was reached to facilitate the sharing of environmental data, fostering collaboration between the involved parties.

Meeting with the National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPWS) took place in June. The meeting provided an opportunity to engage with the NPWS and discuss important aspects related to the project.

Atkins and Irish Rail consultants Jacobs are in communication regarding environmental surveys with a further joint meeting taking place in late August. Further meetings took place in February with Irish Rail to help progress the project. A Constraints Report has been finalised, Landownership maps are being completed and Draft Stage 1 Route Corridor Assessment has been issued from Atkins. Draft public consultation material is being developed. An Independent agronomist appointed for the scheme. A meeting with IR has been requested as the IR coastal protection project will have a major impact on the preferred greenway route corridor.

Blessington eGreenway

Under Section 177AE of the Planning and Development Act, we have formally submitted our planning documents to An Bord Pleanála. Given the need to conduct comprehensive additional surveys and generate a substantial volume of supporting material, An Bord Pleanála granted an extension to the submission deadline, now set for January 2024. We are currently in the process of finalising the reports, documents, and drawing responses, and will be submitted to An Bord Pleanála before the January 29th, 2024, deadline.

Active Travel Updates - February

NTA 2024 Funding Allocation

On Wednesday 7th February, the Department of Transport announced the National Transport Authority funding allocations for Active Travel projects nationwide. In total, €290m has been allocated for walking and cycling infrastructure. Wicklow County Council was allocated €8.5 million for 2023, across 28 projects.

Projects Under Construction

Ballyguilemore Active Travel Facilities (Wicklow MD)

Provision of new pedestrian facilities and road safety improvements along the Ballyguilemore Road between Carrig View and the entrance to the proposed new St. Patricks GAA Pitch. The scheme includes for new footpaths and road widening works. Construction works commenced in January 2024. Tree removal works have been completed along the eastern verge, and drainage works have been completed along the western verge. Embankment construction works will commence along the eastern edge of the road in the coming weeks.

Arklow North Cycle and Pedestrian Scheme (Arklow MD)

The construction of cycle and pedestrian facilities on the R-772 Dublin Road. The scheme involves construction of a footpath and segregated cycle facilities on the R-772 between the M11 Junction 11. The construction works are now complete. The public lighting will be energised by the ESB in the coming weeks.



Arklow South Cycle and Pedestrian Scheme (Arklow MD)

Provision of 2.8km of segregated cycle track along the R-772 Wexford Road, Arklow between Knockmore Roundabout and M11 Junction 21. The scheme will also construct 1.4km approx. of pedestrian footpath. Accommodation works are in progress at four residential properties on the northbound carriageway. Preparations works have commenced for slipform kerbing works on the northbound carriageway and a Contractor will be procured to complete the kerbing works next month.

Safe Routes to Schools: St. Kevin's National School, Greystones (Greystones MD)

Provide infrastructure for schools to increase walking and cycling as the preferred travel mode where possible and improve safety at front of schools. Front of school implementation works are substantially completed. Waiting on ESB power connection for signage. High friction surfacing has been completed. Remaining signage to be installed once available. Footpath connection from Church Lane at design stage. Consultation to be undertaken with school and local residents.

Safe Routes to Schools: St. Johns Senior National School, Arklow (Arklow MD)

Provide infrastructure for schools to increase walking and cycling as the preferred travel mode where possible and improve safety at front of schools. Front of school implementation works are substantially completed. High Friction Surfacing (HFS) will be completed once weather permits, most probably spring 2024.

Safe Routes to Schools: SS Michael and Peter Junior School (Arklow MD)

Proposals to improve road safety and make the areas adjacent to the schools safer, so that children can be encouraged and facilitated to walk and cycle to the schools safely. Construction works are substantially completed. High Friction Surfacing (HFS) will be completed once weather permits, most probably spring 2024.

Project Updates

Bray Dart Interchange (Bray MD)

New plaza and public transport interchange in front of Bray DART station, with revised car parking, set down and taxi rank arrangements. Drainage laid across the level crossing by Irish Rail contractor. David Walsh Civil Engineering appointed as contractor. Works scheduled to start week commencing 19th February. Phase 1 will consist of drainage works on Quinsborough Road and the Promenade.

Wicklow Active Travel Pathfinder Project (Wicklow MD)

The project scope has been changed and will focus on the provision of high-quality pedestrian and cycle facilities along R750 from Wicklow Town Car Park and along Station Road. It will also include the provision of a new pedestrian and cycle bridge linking Station Road to Wicklow Town relief Road. Feasibility report and Baseline Assessment have been completed. Work is ongoing on the Preliminary Design.

Greystones Active Travel - Pathfinder Project (Greystones MD)

Provision of new and improved pedestrian and cycle links to Greystones Train Station. The spine route extends from Greystones Marina to Shoreline Sports Centre. The project will include improved pedestrian and cycle crossings along the Charlesland Dual Carriageway. Design of pedestrian crossings on Charlesland Dual Carriageway agreed with NTA. Rapid Build Options Report for the main spine route approved and work has commenced on the Preliminary Design. Tenders have been sought for the provision of traffic signals. Works are expected to start in Q2 2024.



Bridge Rehabilitation (Local and Regional Roads)

During January and February, the Bridges crew has completed repair and maintenance works at 2 bridges and another 1 has commenced in recent days.

Machinery Yard

Works continue on the maintenance of council vehicles, plant, and machinery.

The Consultant has submitted the licence application for Dangerous Substances (oil, fuel, etc.).

Fitters are now using ProWork to do maintenance reports for vehicles.

Delivery of new velocity patcher in February and training to be undertaken in the coming weeks.

Winter Maintenance

More than ½ way through the season.

7 call outs since Jan 26th until February 18th. Of these, 0 were double runs.

1200 tonnes of salt have been collected so far this season over 2 orders.

Measurement of existing salt levels undertaken and currently being assessed.

Fire Service

Operational Fire Statistics January 2024

There were **106 incidents** attended during the month of January 2024. Due to laid down procedures to mobilise two stations to potentially serious incident types, individual Fire Stations were mobilised on a total of **132 occasions** including **13** mobilisations in other counties. On no occasion did an incident commander request additional resources over what was prescribed in the Pre-Determined Attendance.

Operational activity for the month of January 2024 increased by 6% (+7 mobilisations) on the preceding month (December 2024: 125 mobilisations).

Operational activity for the month of January 2024 was similar (+3 mobilisations) on the equivalent month in 2023 (January 2023, 122 mobilisations).

**BCA not notified on completion of opt out developments

97 new residential houses and 19 apartments were notified to LA for Commencement & 69 newly completed residential units plus 8 non-residential units were submitted, assessed and validated in January. There has been a 21% increase in Commencement Notice submissions compared to the same period in 2023 and a 375% increase in Certificate of Compliance on Completion submissions compared to the same period in 2023.

BER certificates for all newly completed units were requested & submitted to Building Control as per S.I. No. 243/2012 - European Union (Energy Performance of Buildings) Regulations 2012.

Building Control continued with site inspections in January to identify non-compliances with Building Regs onsite and 2 Section 11 Compliance Requests were issued.

Revised Information requests remained high in January for both Commencement Notices and Certificates of Compliance on Completion, 79% of Commencement Notice submissions & 63% of Certificate of Compliance on Completion submissions required revised information. It should be further noted that some Opt Out Submissions are requiring 2 to 3 Revised information requests which results in submissions being assessed 2 to 3 times to ensure compliance prior to commencement.

Opt Out submissions are both extensions and single unit dwellings, generally from BCMS users who are unfamiliar with both BCMS and Building Regulations which leads to Building Control resources being directed to resolving both administration and technical issues with Opt-Out Submissions. Wicklow Building Control continues to perform rigorous assessment of submissions at commencement stage and onsite presence during construction. These methods remain the best way to promote compliance with Building Regs.

Building Control staff attended both in person & online a National Building Control & Market Surveillance Office CPD Day event in Athlone on Modern Methods of Construction.

Civil Defence

New Volunteers

Induction training continued for 10 new volunteers completing civil defence specific manual handling and cardiac first response course. Integration of new volunteers into local training units will commence in early February.

Regional Assistance

Our swift water flood responder instructors assisted Kildare Civil Defence with the delivery of a Life Jacket Emergency Services Course and Food Responder Course in the rivers of Wicklow, using the Meetings of the Waters and Jacksons Fall in Laragh.
